

SIMPSON NEGRO SHOT TO DEATH IN CHURCH YARD

Dallas Floyd Makes Escape After Shooting James Smith at Phillippi Church

SHOOTING OCCURED LAST NIGHT ABOUT NINE O'CLOCK, SAID

Investigation by Coroner Wilkerson Fails to Bring Out Cause of Shooting

Authorities were today seeking Dallas Floyd, colored man about 19 years of age of the Simpson community, who last night shot and instantly killed another colored man by the name of James Smith in the front yard at Phillippi church, a short distance from Simpson. While the negro had evidently made good his escape this morning, authorities are hopeful of bringing about his arrest within the next few hours.

According to facts gained through an investigation conducted this morning by Coroner S. G. Wilkerson and Sheriff Ernest Dudley, Floyd used a shotgun in killing Smith. He is believed to have fired one time, the entrance of a number two shot entering Smith's chest, producing instant death.

There was only one eye-witness to the tragedy, but he was unable to give any explanation for the shooting. He said he was standing between Floyd and Smith in front of the church, when Floyd suddenly walked away towards the road. When a short distance away, he is said to have turned and asked the witness to step out of the way.

Having no idea what was going to happen, the witnesses stated that he stepped out of the way, and the next minute was blinded by a deafening report from the shotgun. Smith dropped to the ground and was 35 feet when reached by people attracted to the scene by the shooting.

While search was made for Floyd immediately after the shooting, he vanished as if swallowed up by the earth, and today authorities began a diligent search for him without the slightest clue.

INTERRUPTION OCCURS UNEXPECTEDLY IN THE CONFERENCE AT MUDANIA AND ALLIED GENERALS RETURN TO CAPITAL

BANKERS CLOSE ANNUAL SESSION AT NEW YORK

Allied Debts and Reparations Consume Last Day of Convention

New York Oct. 5 — The allied debt to the United States and German reparations and settlement of these problems as they may affect the industry and commerce of the United States, were the outstanding topics of interest at the third and closing session of the convention of the American Bankers' Association here today.

While Sir Reginald McKenna, former Chancellor of the British Exchequer, in an interview, said he believed the new tariff law would increase prices in this country to such an extent that foreign merchants would be able to leap the tariff barriers and remain in the American market, the banker expressed the hope that "the President will not hesitate to make use of the power granted him by the new tariff law to make such adjustments in the schedules as may be necessary from time to time for a restoration of our international commerce."

Suspension of the debts to France, Italy and other European debtors of the United States for a period of one year, was recommended by President Alvin W. Kreh, of the Equitable Trust Company, as a means of taking the allied debt question out of politics for a definite period and creating an atmosphere of judicial aloofness in which the subject might be approached.

Governor Henry J. Allen, of Kansas, in defense of the Kansas Industrial Relations Court, said it should not be expected that every time a new contract is to be made between the miners and coal operators or between the railroad workers and railroad heads, that the contract should be the basis of a vicious and costly civil war upon the helpless public.

SOUTH AMERICA WON'T BUY FRENCH LIVESTOCK

Paris, Oct. 6 — Argentina and Uruguay are making commercial reprisals for the recent decrees of the French Ministry of Agriculture forbidding the importation of foreign cattle, according to Paris newspapers.

Stockholders in the South American countries who formerly purchased fancy cattle for breeding purposes in Normandy and other parts of France, are now patronizing Belgian and German breeders. Germany is said to have imported from Argentina alone so far this year 100,000 tons of fresh meat and 100,000 tons of frozen meat.

Representatives of Allies Return to Constantinople to Consult Commissioners

SNAG STRUCK WHEN THRACE EVACUATION BOBS TO SURFACE

Question of Evacuation of Constantinople and Other Matters Also Feature

Constantinople, Oct. 5—Abruptly, though not unexpectedly, the Mudania conference came to a halt this afternoon. When it will be resumed is a matter of conjecture.

Brigadier General Harrington, commander of the Allied forces and head of the Allied delegation, returned this evening on the battleship Iron Duke, and the Italian delegation also came to Constantinople. It is understood the Allied generals will go into conference with the high commissioners on certain serious difficulties, which have arisen at Mudania.

Various explanations for the separation of the delegates are given in the rumors which quickly developed here. The one most generally credited relates to the evacuation of Constantinople. According to unofficial information, Ismet Pasha, the Nationalist representative, suddenly raised the question at the afternoon conference of the evacuation of Constantinople. General Harrington replied that that would come after the conclusion of the peace treaty, as set forth in the joint Allied note. Ismet insisted repeatedly on an earlier evacuation, and it was found impossible to reach an agreement for the present on this important point.

General Mombelli, of Italy, supported General Harrington, but the French delegate, General Charpy, was non-committal.

At this juncture, M. Franklin-Bouillon, the special French envoy, intervened, declaring that he had been instructed by the French government to support the Turkish demand. The discussion grew very warm and the Allied generals adjourned to confer with the commissioners at Constantinople.

Both General Harrington and General Mombelli have further instructions from their governments. If these are received in time it is possible that the conference may be resumed at Mudania tomorrow.

Another report was current, but accepted as only a partial explanation, that the stoppage of the conference sessions was due to the necessity of the Greek delegates referring all matters for discussion to their government at Athens.

NEGRO CHILD HURT WHEN RUN OVER BY AUTOMOBILE HERE

Mary Edwards Run Down by R. L. Jones' Car Yesterday, and May Die

Mary Elizabeth Edwards, five year old daughter of Patty Edwards, colored woman residing on Reed street, is not expected to live as result of injuries sustained when run down on Dickinson avenue yesterday afternoon about four o'clock by an automobile driven by R. L. Jones, of Bell Arthur. While the child was reported dead several times today, she was still living at the noon hour, although physicians entertained slight hope for recovery.

The accident occurred in tobacco town during the congestion of traffic immediately following the afternoon performance of Hagenbeck-Wallace circus, and is said to have been unavoidable, although no investigation has yet been made. The colored woman attempted to cross Dickinson avenue, holding her two children by the hands. They saw the car approaching, became excited and fled in different directions.

One of the children darted directly in front of the car driven by Mr. Jones, and when he attempted to dodge, the other child ran in front of him also. The car was running slowly, but before the driver could apply his brakes and stop the front wheel had passed over the child's stomach, inflicting injuries of an internal nature.

It is believed death would have been instant if Mr. Jones had been running at a rapid rate of speed.

COLORED MAN HURT WHEN RUN OVER BY CHERO COLA TRUCK

Will Bell Narrowly Escapes Death When Wheels of the Large Truck Pass Over Him

Will Bell, colored man employed by the Chero-Cola Bottling Company of this city, sustained painful injuries yesterday morning when run over by the large truck of the company on the brick road a short distance from Greenville. While his injuries were considered very painful it is not believed they will occasion long confinement.

The truck was being driven by J. K. Spivey, manager of the Chero-Cola Company, when the accident occurred. Bell's hat blew off and he attempted to get off the truck to get it before Mr. Spivey could slow down. As he started to jump to the ground he stumbled and fell under the right front wheel, which passed directly over his back.

The truck immediately returned to the city where Bell received medical attention. He was reported as doing nicely this morning, and it is believed he will be able to return to work in the next several days.

His escape from death or probably serious injury is considered short of remarkable, as the truck was loaded with bottled drinks and weighed several tons.

ARMY PREPARING TO GIVE SERVICE TO EVERY SECTION

Great Chain of Homes and Institutions to be Extended Across Nation

The Salvation Army, on Wednesday Oct. 18 will begin its intensive campaign in Greenville and vicinity for a quota of \$1,000.

PREDICT PASSAGE OF SHIPPING BILL BY DECEMBER 25

Chairman Campbell expects Many Developments in House by That Time

(By International News.)

Washington, Oct. 6.—The administration's shipping bill will be passed by the house before Christmas, Chairman Campbell, of the House Rules committee, declared this afternoon. It is believed a large number of Republicans will vote for a ship subsidy, although this fact has not yet been determined. Chairman Lasker, of the shipping board, has been much encouraged by the recent growth of sentiment in favor of the legislation and also believes the house will pass the bill before the next session for the holidays.

SAYS AMERICAN VESSELS SHOULD GO AS OUTLAWS

Washington, Oct. 6.—All American ships, private as well as those owned by the government, will be outlawed by a run sellers in opinion of the Attorney General which is expected to be made public in a few days.

Attorney General Daugherty, it is understood, says that the law should follow the flag. The shipping board estimated that losses in passengers of American ships would increase the government deficit.

MOVE HISTORIC ENGLISH HALL TO SAN FRANCISCO

London, Oct. 6.—Norfolk Hall, an ancient homestead, near Halifax, England, is being dismantled and prepared for removal to San Francisco where it will be re-erected.

The stones and timber comprising the hall are being packed into crates and every stone and piece of wood is being numbered, so that the whole building will be re-erected exactly as it stood in England.

FIVE THOUSAND VIOLATORS OF WHISKEY LEGISLATION WILL GO SCOTT FREE NOW

Washington, Oct. 6.—Five thousand violators of the Volstead law have gone free under the statute of limitations. It was declared by the department of justice today. Reason for this is said to be in the shortage of judges to try the cases.

SEVEN PROMINENT MEN WILL COMPOSE COAL COMMISSION

Washington, Oct. 6.—President Harding's coal commission, which is to investigate the industry, will be composed of seven prominent men in public life. John Hammon, noted engineer, is reported to have accepted a place on the commission. The president, however, will make no appointment until he has time to study the situation, it was stated at the White House today.

HAGENBECK CIRCUS THRILLS HUNDREDS OF COUNTY PEOPLE

Afternoon and Night Performances Largely Attended Here Yesterday

PARADE CONSIDERED BEST EVER BEFORE SEEN IN THIS CITY

Numbers of New Features Contributed to the Success of the Attraction

The old saying "that when you see one circus you see them all" has proven false here yesterday afternoon and last night when Hagenbeck-Wallace, thrilled approximately five thousand people with several new acts of the most thrilling and intrepid kind. It is hardly probable that a simple person who saw the mammoth attraction will deny it was the best they ever saw. FENCE FOR LIVESTOCK.

One of the most necessary things to be done on most southern farms, including those of North Carolina, is fencing for livestock, yet this is one of the most sadly neglected parts of farm work at this time, states Mr. V. W. Lewis, of the North Carolina division of markets. But this will not always be the case, for the boll weevil is rapidly covering the entire cotton growing section and eventually more farm fencing will come to North Carolina as a result. Mr. Lewis finds that farm fencing has been neglected because our farmers have never seen the value of pasturage as they are to see it under boll weevil conditions, when more land must be devoted to food and feed crops. He believes that the boll weevil is a very serious pest to that landowner who wants to continue to mine his soil with no forward look as to what will happen to future generations, but to the man who now makes some of the necessary changes that will ultimately result in North Carolina becoming a better fed and more prosperous state, the boll weevil is not so serious after all.

"To have a better fed state," says Mr. Lewis, "we need a better fed boll. Livestock will help with both of these. To have better livestock, we need more pasture, to have more pastures, we must have more fencing. The agricultural extension service has begun a campaign for more fencing in North Carolina by which we hope to bring about some of these changes in time so that some farmers will not suffer so acutely by reason of the weevil's ravages."

City authorities should make an effort to keep a traffic officer on FIVE points every day when children are going to and returning from the public schools. While an officer is at his post most of the time, there are occasions however when they are not. An effort should be made to keep a cop posted there most all the time, especially on days when traffic is expected to be unusually heavy. The loss of one life might cost more than expenses incurred in keeping an officer there all the year around and this reason if for no other should inspire the authorities to keep the matter in mind.

Greece at last has declared war on Turkey. Why they should have waited so long is a mystery, but now some action has been taken it may be expected that something will be accomplished. Turkish atrocities were of the most ruthless kind occurring in history of the world and if the Greeks should do nothing to protect the Christians within the boundaries of their country it is certain conditions will increase in seriousness. Something must be done even if the allies have to do it, and the world will be glad to see the day when the Near East is free from Turkish cruelty.

Sweet potato storage warehouses are receiving a good deal of attention these days, but not as much as they should. Proper storage of the sweet potato crop is important to every grower and every community should erect some kind of building for this purpose. The old time way of banking potatoes in the ground has proven costly to the grower and unless some other kind of method is decided upon conditions will not improve to any great extent. Shortage warehouses are being promoted in every thriving community at this time, and Pitt county farmers should make it a point to keep in the front ranks of progress.

Pitt county hard-surfaced road are as dangerous today as they were a month ago when people began to realize the danger of speeding automobiles, and unless something is done to improve conditions loss of life eventually must occur. The speed demon will insist on speeding despite congestion of traffic or the danger ahead of him, and unless our officials

take some action to reduce his rate the situation will grow in seriousness as the miles of hard surfaced roads increase. We trust this important matter will not be neglected much longer as hundreds of lives are imperiled every day the speed fiend is allowed to go scott free.

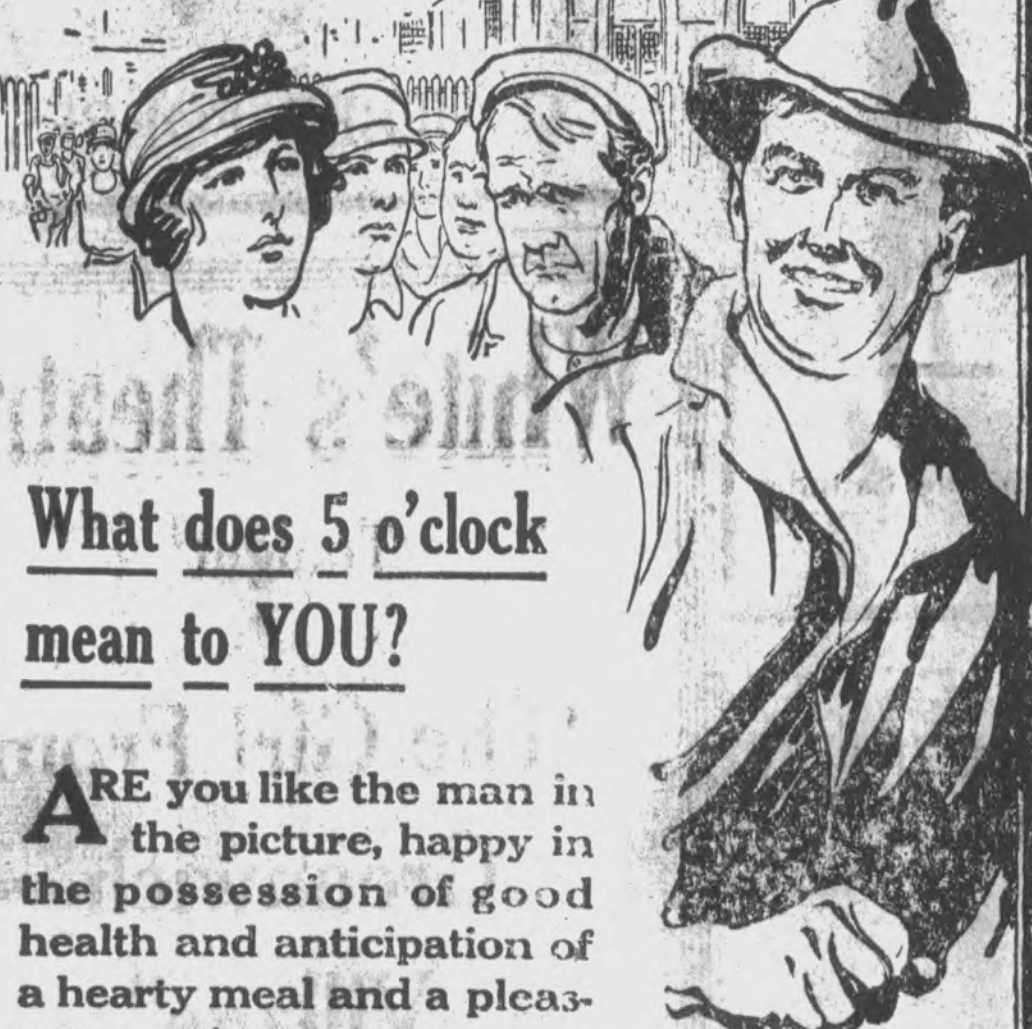

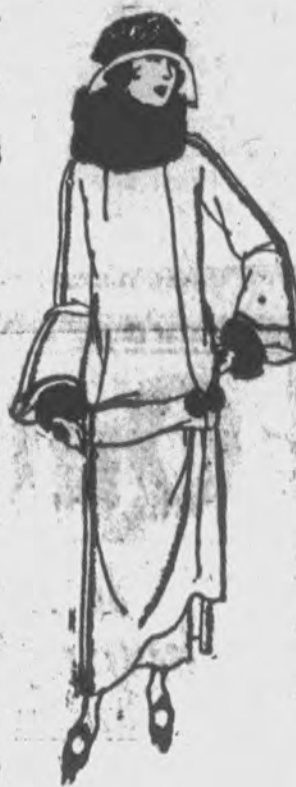

Letter to Members Co-operative Marketing Association

Dear Sir:

The leaf Department reports that they have contracted to deliver to Manufacturers and Manufacturers' Agents, large lots of pooled tobacco without having to redry it. These sales have been made at prices that are highly satisfactory and are sanctioned by your Directors. We cannot make these deliveries until the Association Members deliver their tobacco at the grading stations and I am writing this to urge you to grade and deliver your crop as early as you can. The sooner we fill these contracted sales the sooner we will be able to get final settlement from the Association. I know the Auction prices are tempting, especially when you get "cash" all at once, but I ask you to remember 1920 and 1921. If the tobacco made this year is so valuable and worth so much more, what has caused this advance in price? You had no Association those two years; you were told the world was full of tobacco and you let the buyers take your medium and common tobacco very low, much for less than it cost to house and handle it. Don't you know if the Association could be destroyed that we would all be right back where we have been for years, namely, completely at the mercy of the buyers? I ask you are you willing to sell yours and your children's future prosperity for a few dollars, "all cash?" It was "all cash" Judas fell for when he betrayed Christ. Are you willing to betray your fellow farmer for the game? Every thinking man knows if the farmer sticks to his contract and delivers his tobacco, the Association's success is assured and if he does not deliver it will be a failure. If the Association should fail, the tobacco farmer, in our time, will never again have the moral and financial support that is now offered them; as the Government, Banks, and business men will say: "the warehousemen were right when they said the farmers will not stick to a contract." I fully believe the Association will succeed for it is much stronger in other sections than here, and I want to plead with those in this section who signed, to stick to the contract; it spells prosperity to the tiller of the soil and this section, I believe in after years you will be made glad by knowing you "did your bit" in making Co-operative Marketing a success. You will not then think of the sacrifices you may have to make at this time. The Association keeps a complete and correct record of all tobacco delivered by each planter (kinds, grades, etc., in addition to the pounds) and this record will be checked with contracts at the end of the season to find those who break their contracts. Grade your tobacco and deliver it as early as you can. I am,

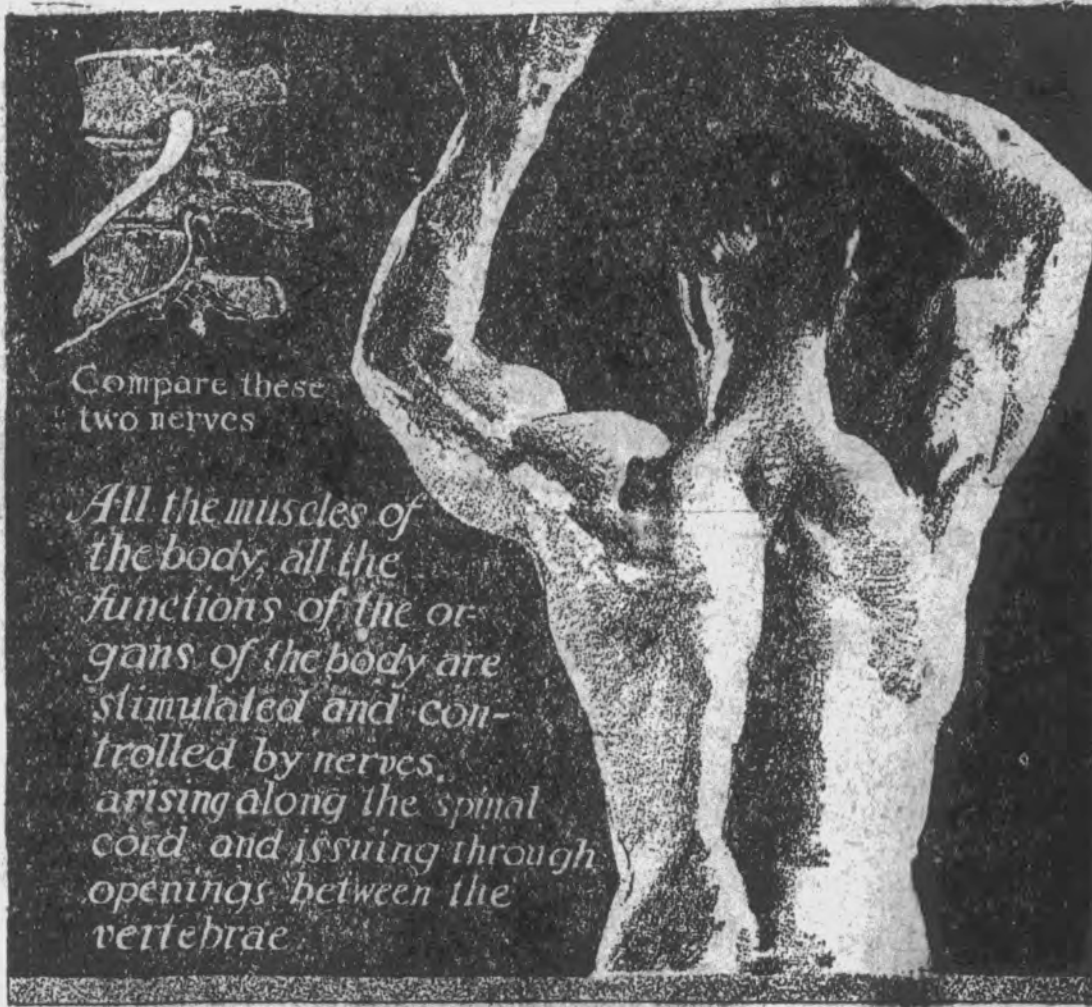
