NUMBER OF CASES GIVEN HEARING IN CITY COURT TODAY

Mayor Clark Explains What
Disposition is Made of Whis-
key Captured by Cops

EVERY DROP OF LIQUOR WILL BE POURED OUT SOON

Further More Citizens Are In-
vited Out to See the Per-
formance and Get a Smell

Mayor Clark returned to town this morning, and presiding at police court disposed of the following cases: James Starkey and Edgar Tyndall, both white, struck a difference and instead of submitting matters to arbitration decided to go to war, how- ever before much damage was done the neutral zone was respected and peace declared—paid a fine of \$5.00 and each one half the cost.

Geo. Whitfield colored, T. B. Whit- field, colored and Marshall Williams, white, as a result of a disagreement in Foxhall's warehouse, were taxed with the cost of the action.

Hubert Morton charged with al- lowing his dog too much freedom on the streets, was taxed with the cost.

Leslie Jones, white, sometimes con- fided by reason of his name with Chief of Police Lester Jones, taxed with the cost for parking auto, on the north side of 5th street between 5 points and Washington streets.

Dr. Laughhouse, taxed with the cost for parking auto on the north side of 5th street between 5 points and Washington street.

Geo. Jennie, colored, charged with operating auto in a reckless and care- less manner and in excess of the speed limit while towing a derelict truck of one Joe Dawson to port, al- lowed to pay \$10 on damages done and the cost of the action.

Joe Dawson, colored, driving the party in charge of the derelict truck and by reason of the speed of the touring car operated by Geo. Jennie, and the absence of brakes, lost con- trol of same and thereby in a reck- less and careless manner wrecked a horse and wagon and damaged the driver of same, allowed to pay \$10 on the doctors and mechanics repairs and the cost of the action.

Lubie Waters, colored allowing dog too much freedom of the streets, paid the cost.

John Hall, colored, charged with possessing and selling intoxicating liquors to one Will Baker, plead guilty and was bound over to the county court, under \$500 bond.

John Hall colored, having been visited by the police officers who pre- sented their cards in the form of a search warrant, and having been hoarding the distilled juice from sour molasses, and also a variety of the Kentucky Colonel's favorite bever- age, also small and large bottles, funnels and other paraphernalia in- cident to and commonly used in the traffic of intoxicating liquors, and last but not least having plead guilty to the possession of said liquor for the purpose of sale, was bound over to county court under \$500 bond, but Mayor Clark ordered the liquors stored in the police vault, stating that it would there remain until the case was disposed of, and then publicly poured out. Mayor Clark further stated that all liquor seized by the police was regularly poured out twice per year after disposal of the cases and that not a drop of this liquor was used for any purpose and that as long as he was mayor none of it would be used for any pur- pose, but that he would personally see that it was poured out upon dates that would be made public through the paper so that any skeptics might come and see for themselves.

Washington, Oct. 11.—The center of the negro population of the United States is in the extreme north- western corner of Georgia, the Census bureau announced today.

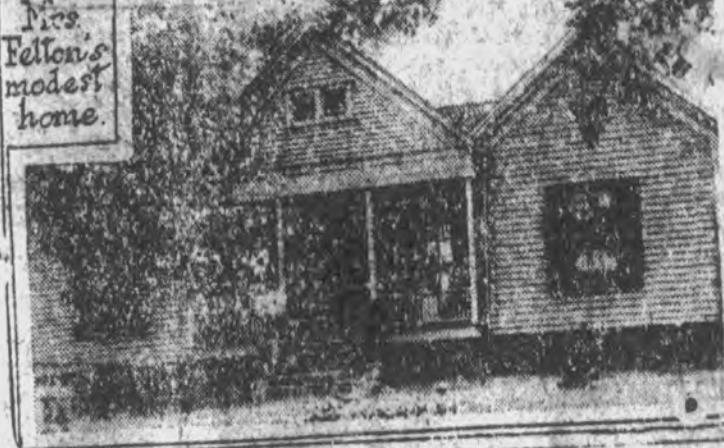

CRABTREE SLAYER DRAWS 30 YEARS IN STATE PRISON

Bootz Klutz Draws Long Sen-
tence After State Accepts
Plea of Second Degree

Raleigh, Oct. 10.—Charles "Boots" Klutz, on trial in Wake county superior court for killing Tom Crabtree, Raleigh detective, yester- day received a sentence of thirty years in the State Prison, bringing to an end a case that contained as- pects of brutality which stirred Ra- leigh almost beyond parallel.

The case was called soon after court convened in the morning and the trial proceeded by agreement of counsel with none of the tenor which accompanies a struggle for life between a man and the law. No wit- nesses were examined. The defense offered a plea of guilty of murder in the second degree and the State accepted the tender. Solicitor Norris recited the facts surrounding the fatal shooting in the early morn- ing of August 31. Attorneys for de- fendant outlined the evidence by which they would have sought to es- tablish insanity, and the trial was over. Within an hour Judge C. C. Lyon had pronounced approval of the courses pursued by counsel on both sides and had imposed the maximum penalty of the law for second degree murder.

Klutz, a 19-year-old cripple and an admitted moron and drug addict, sat calmly and with lowered head while he was called a murderer by attorneys for the State and while his own counsel was explaining to the court that the only defense they could offer for their client was that he was not mentally capable of the preme- ditation and deliberation which un- der the law, is a necessary element in murder in the first degree. Only once did Klutz's face show real ex- pression, and that came when it was all over. As soon as Judge Lyon finished his sentence and called for the next case, Klutz hobbled on his crutches to the door, showing ob- vious relief at the opportunity to es- cape from the hostile atmosphere of the court room to the jail.

DAUGHTERS BEGIN ANNUAL MEETING AT WILMINGTON

Daughters of Confederate Open Convention With Three Hundred Present

Wilmington, Oct. 10.—With more than 300 delegates from every part of the State attending the an- nual anniversary of the North Caro- lina Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy, opened here to- night with a banquet, at which Mrs. Josephus Daniels, General William A. Smith, Mayor James H. Cowan and others were speakers.

The compilation of a history of the Confederate women of North Carolina as an anniversary gift of the Daughters was urged by Mrs. Daniels in her address.

Mayor James H. Cowan, of Wil- mington, welcomed the delegates, saying a high tribute to their service to the state and to the cause for which their fathers died in the bloody days of the War Between the States.

The response to the Mayor's ad- dress was made by Mrs. Gorrell, of Winston-Salem, who assured the as- semblage that the Daughters were proud to stand as the guests of the city, which for years was the Gibrat- ar of the Confederacy and the spot upon which heroes died during the stirring days before the fall of Fort Fisher.

Little more will be heard by the merchants for every dollar paid in trade or on account and these will entitle the holder to shares at one of the prizes to be given away the last day. The opportunity to win the automobile or other prizes is ex- pected to stimulate as much interest as last year and it is believed sev- eral thousand receipts will be issued this month.

ALLIED ARMISTICE TERMS ACCEPTED BY THE KEMALISTS

Representatives of Powers
Pave the Way to Peace by
Signing Protocol

TURKS DISAPPOINTED BY SUDDEN CHANGE IN FRANCE ATTITUDE

Mudania, Oct. 10.—The armistice con- vention was signed here tonight at 11 o'clock. The representatives of the powers concerned affixed their signatures to the revised protocol which General Harrington had pre- sented for acceptance to Ismet Pasha and which the Nationalist delegate forwarded to the Ankara govern- ment for its decision.

General Harrington had informed Ismet Pasha that the convention em- bodied Great Britain's last word and that the other powers gave their un- qualified support to the terms. On the tenth of November, the closing day of the campaign, will see hun- dreds of accounts definitely closed.

In the meantime the British com- mander returned to Constantinople, where he remained until this after- noon, proceeding back to Mudania on the Iron Dike to hear the Turkish decision.

The Turkish delegates were some- what disappointed and disappointed over the turn of events in the past two days. The new attitude taken by France after the Paris conference puzzled them and they were amazed that French friendliness on which they counted as a main prop in the nego- tiations, did not yield the results they expected.

At the news of the convention, Monday night Ismet Pasha expressed dissatisfaction at the terms the Al- lied offered. He said to General Harrington:

"But your new armistice con- vention is a contradiction to the assur- ances given to me by General Charpy. The convention, instead of paving the way for peace only makes matters worse."

General Harrington replied that the terms were:

"After the close of the formal pro- ceedings, Ismet, in the course of a conversation on the recurring sub- ject of France's promises, said: 'It was upon France's suggestion that our army ceased operations against the Greeks, France promising us favorable armistice terms. France's responsibility there is considerable.'"

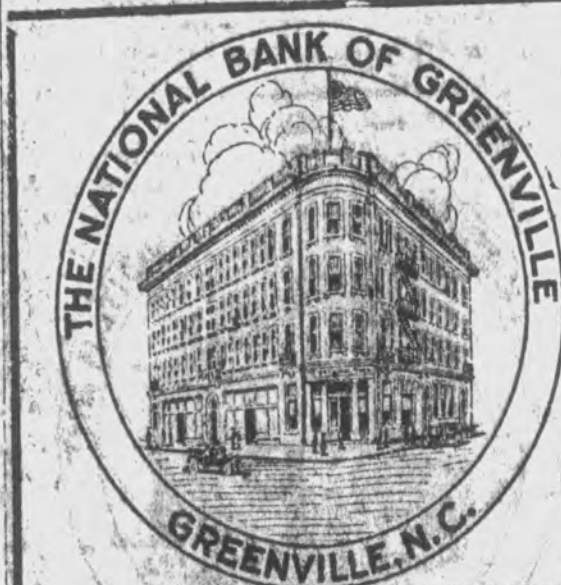

INCREASE IN ENROLLMENT.

Approximately 60,000 more children attended the public schools of North Carolina during the term 1921-1922 than during 1920-21. That is to say at a rough estimate, something like 443,000 children between the ages of 7 and 14 were in public schools in this State last year as against 383,000 between the ages of 8 and 14 enrolled the year preceding. These figures are based upon those from 65 counties reporting to the State Superintendent of Public

Instruction. In these 65 counties there has been an increase of 40,000 children enrolled since the extension of the age limit of the period of compulsory school attendance from 8 to 7 years.

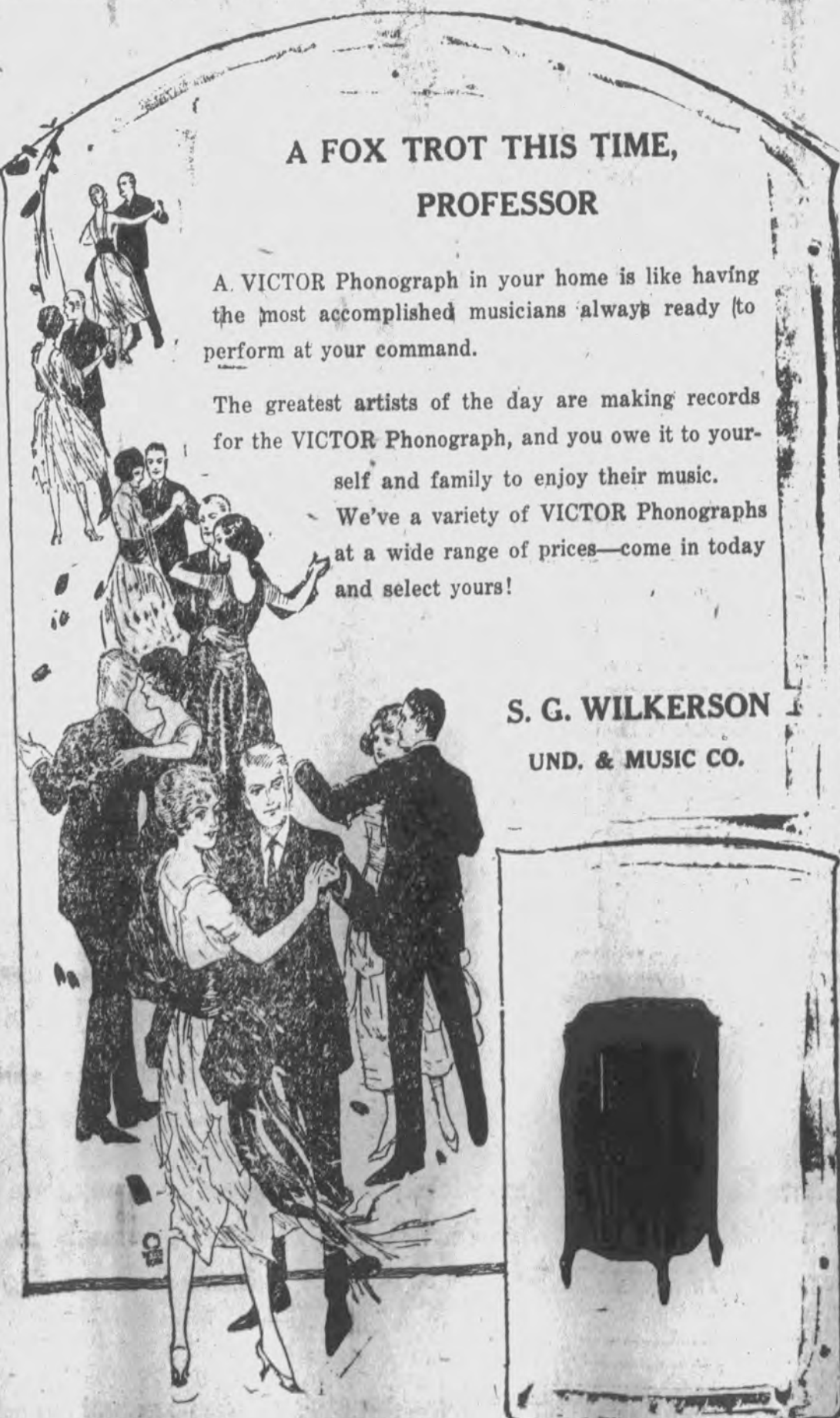

PREDICTS NORMAL TREND OF BUSINESS IN UNITED STATES

James S. Alexander, New York Banker Sees Splendid Future for Industry

New York, Oct.—A choice of two courses now lies before American business men in seeking a return of prosperity to the United States. National bank delegates to the Forty-eighth Annual Convention of the American Bankers Association at the Hotel Commodore were told today by James Alexander, President of the National Bank of Commerce in New York.

Relying on the substantial improvement which has taken place in domestic finance and industry, they may confine their outlook to their own country and accept modest profits within a restricted market, playing a relatively smaller role than before the war. On the other hand, the opportunity is offered them to take full advantage of America's new preeminence in world finance and production and attain old-time American progress and prosperity.

"If we content ourselves with a modest recovery," he added, "we shall take a position which shall constitute a signal retreat from the spirit of enterprise that has animated the country throughout a hundred years; and that has made of America a great progressive nation. We Americans, up to the last few months, have never been satisfied with mediocre results. We have been willing to take great risks; and, if necessary, to suffer great losses; but we have been determined to enter upon great undertakings and to ope for great accomplishments."

Mr. Alexander expressed his belief that now, for the first time since the war, there is substantial basis for considering what will be the normal trend of business in the future. He pointed out that the financial situation has cleared and there is reason to believe that whatever sound business may develop in the future can be properly financed; extreme price dislocations have disappeared to an important extent; volume of business has gradually increased until at present it is only 10 per cent. below normal; with certain marked exceptions, the agricultural position has improved over that of a year ago; the large stocks of certain goods that recently caused stagnation in the markets have been largely distributed or consumed; and the disproportionate development in the country's capital equipment is being steadily corrected.

"In short, we have made much real progress in recent months," he declared, "and in many ways we are in a position to handle a much larger volume of business. To recognize that fundamental conditions are right for a considerable further recovery, and to say that we are well on the way to something approaching a normal volume of business is not quite the same saying that we are assured of a speedy return to one of our pre-war periods of prosperity. It is this second question, I take it, that is of most interest to all of us."

"Gentlemen, the time has passed when any one looking to the future of business of America can ignore the rest of the world. For many years American business had been away before the war the whole trend of from the development of a self-sufficient state. The developments of the war and the changed economic and financial status of other great industrial and capitalistic nations, have added tremendous impetus to a movement that has extended our lines of economic activity farther and farther into other countries. To my mind this movement has now been carried so far as to leave the importance of a world-wide economic policy no longer a debatable question.

"As an outgrowth of the war we have lifted into a dominating position in the world's capital relations. This change, in itself, is bound to bring a corresponding change in many

of the trade currents that follow capital movements. The changes have thrown upon us a responsibility that we cannot evade whether we wish to or not. Moreover, this change must powerfully react upon our domestic business conditions and upon our important economic policies. Whenever we turn in our examination of the elements that make for business stability or instability in our own domestic affairs, whether it be that of the capital supply, the gold or currency questions, the future of price levels or the future of trade restrictions at home or in other countries, we find new economic conditions that compel us to consider the bearing of movements abroad.

"In looking to basic conditions that affect the future of American business, therefore, we are confronted with two sets of facts. On the one hand we find an abundance of evidence that very substantial improvement over the worst period of the depression has taken place at home. In addition to this we find to a somewhat less degree, but still to a degree that offers much basic for encouragement, a readjustment in commercial and financial conditions in many other countries. On the other hand, we find a condition of affairs in certain a signal retreat from their position in European countries that presents definite obstacles to anything like the full recovery of world trade. In view of these two sets of conditions, what may be said to be the outlook for American business?

"I believe that there are open to American business men two courses. By relying upon indications of improvement such as we already have had, by developing confidence and faith in the future and by bringing about certain additional readjustments (of a somewhat difficult but possible character) I believe that we may, within ourselves and by the help of what foreign trade must come to us in any circumstances, advance business development in this country and attain a moderate prosperity.

"The second course which I believe to be open to American business is a return to something approaching the old opportunities, the old gate of progress and a real prosperity. Never before has there been a time in the history of America when she occupied such a predominant position in the world finance, never before has there been a time when other countries so urgently needed our products.

"But in order to grasp the opportunities before us the rest of the world must be started upon a normal course. If we Americans are to take advantage of our new position in world affairs and if we are to have conditions in which we can make the most of our new international capital position, it is essential that we play our part in the readjustment of world conditions.

"I believe that the outlook for American business, therefore, depends largely upon whether American business men are going to be contented in playing a relatively smaller role than before the war, to restrict their international economic relations and to accept within a restricted market modest profits, or whether they are going to broaden their views to the new vision that is demanded by present problems and opportunities, and to assume their part in the great work of readjustment that is yet to be done."

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 10 — Fifty-four million pounds of burley tobacco, were sold late today by the Burley Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association to the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company. The total amount of money involved in the sale would not be known until the actual transfer of the leaf was made, officials of the association said.

The sale was announced by James C. Stone president of the association, who said that a part of the leaf was being purchased for export.

The transaction represents the largest sale of burley tobacco to a single manufacturer in the history of the industry, association.

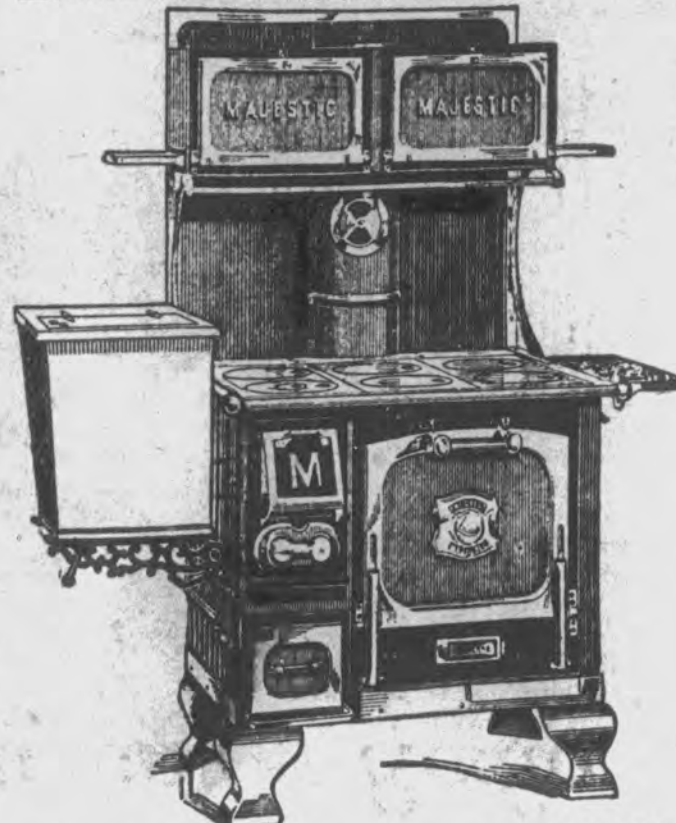
