MANY COUNTIES REPRESENTED TODAY IN CONFERENCE SCHOOL PRINCIPALS HERE; DR. C. E. BROOKS TO SPEAK THIS EVENING

CITY SCHOOLS ARE PRAISED FOLLOWING INSPECTION AT NOON

About Seventy-five Schools Represented by Principals and Superintendents

The Principals' Conference for the twenty-three northeastern counties of North Carolina opened this morning at East Carolina Teachers College, and will continue in session until one o'clock tomorrow. Mr. J. Henry Highsmith of the State Department of Education, State Inspector of High Schools is in charge of the conference. This morning, Mr. T. E. Brown, of the State Department of Education at Raleigh addressed the conference. This morning, Mr. T. ing Vocational subjects in the High School, also Mr. A. T. Allen of the State Department of Education addressed the conference on Teacher Training in the High School.

The conference adjourned at one o'clock for lunch, and met again at two o'clock at the Greenville High School building. At that time a complete inspection of the local High School plant was made as well as observation of work in the class rooms.

The men of the conference spoke very highly of the condition that they found things in the local High School.

Tonight in the auditorium at the college Dr. C. E. Brooks, State Superintendent of Public Instruction will address the conference, and all others who desire to come to hear him on the subject of the Financing of Public High Schools.

LEGAL BATTLE TO TEST DRY OCEAN NOW UNDER WAY

Anchor Line Gets Restraining Order Preventing Enforcement of Ban

OTHER LINES ALSO PREPARE TO OPPOSE GOVERNMENT RULING

Government Officials Expect Quick Decision of the Supreme Court

Washington, Oct. 12.—Issuance by Federal Judge Hand in New York of a temporary order restraining prohibition and customs agents from enforcing the liquor ban against vessels of the American Line was accepted today in government circles as effectively bringing before the courts the question of the government's authority. The failure of counsel for the British owned Cunard and Anchor lines to obtain a similar order was expected to lead to a renewal of their petition either in New York or some other Federal judicial district, with a more detailed showing of the damages which they allege would result from operation of Attorney General Daugherty's interpretation of the liquor statutes.

Promulgation of regulations by Secretary Mellon to carry out the terms of the liquor ruling was expected to be automatically postponed by the effect of the judge's action. Initial drafts of these regulations were laid before Secretary Mellon today, but it was indicated that several material changes were, in his opinion, desirable before they could be officially approved and distributed to enforcement agents.

An important phase of enforcement still under discussion was whether foreign vessels convicted of violation of the "transportation section" of the Volstead Act would be amenable to the forfeiture penalty imposed by that section. Attorney General Daugherty ruled formally that in such cases the ship, whether a palatial liner or a coastal tramp, would be liable to seizure and sale by the government. Secretary Mellon, however, indicated that such drastic measures would not be required effectively to achieve the purpose of the law and gave the impression that the penalties imposed for the time at least, would be confined to seizure of the illicit cargoes and imposition of fines.

BARBECUE DINNER FEATURES MEETING OF BETHEL BANK

Eighteenth Annual Meeting Largely Attended by Stockholders of Institution

REPORTS OF YEAR SHOW BANK TO BE IN GREAT SHAPE

Earnings Considered Satisfactory and Six Per Cent Dividend Declared

The eighteenth annual meeting of stockholders of the Bethel Banking & Trust Company was held in Bethel yesterday morning at eleven o'clock, being featured by a barbecue dinner, timely talks on bank conditions, reports of business of the past year and election of officers for the ensuing year. YOUNG WHITE MAN KILLED BY TRAIN IN AYDEN YARDS

Carl Pinkham, of Washington, Run Over by Northbound A. C. L. Passenger Train

TRUCK STALLED ON TRACKS BEING HIT HEAD ON BY TRAIN

Young Fellow Badly Mangled and Truck Completely Demolished by the Train

Carl Pinkham, young white man of Washington, about 19 years of age employed as truck driver by the R. G. Lassiter Construction Company, now building streets and sidewalks in Ayden, was hit and almost instantly killed yesterday afternoon shortly before five o'clock by a north bound Atlantic Coast Line passenger train as it pulled out for the station at Ayden for Greenville, according to information received here today. Pinkham's body was badly mangled and the truck which he was driving was completely demolished.

According to those who witnessed the accident there was a long line of box cars standing on the track to the left of the train, completely cutting off the engineer's view of the crossing and also preventing Pinkham from seeing the approaching train. As the truck reached the crossing, people who saw the train approaching yelled at the young fellow to stop. He made a vain attempt to do so, but in excitement of the moment, stalled the truck on the track and was hit head on by the train. While Pinkham was rushed to a near doctor's office his injuries were so serious that medical aid was without avail and he died a few minutes after the accident occurred.

The body was today shipped to the young fellow's home at Washington, where it is understood, interment will take place this afternoon. Pinkham had been connected with the construction company in Ayden for sometime and was very popular among the workmen and a wide circle of acquaintances formed during his stay in Ayden. He was hauling material for sidewalk construction work near the railroad which he crossed many times daily. It is believed by many that he thought the train had already pulled out of the station when he attempted to cross.

DISMISS MURDER CHARGE AGAINST CLIFFORD HAYES

Raymond Schneider Repudiates Statement Implicating Youth in Double Killing

New Brunswick, N. J., Oct. 13.—The case against Clifford Hayes, who was held four days as the slayer of Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills, blew up with a boom today, and the authorities turned back in their investigation to theories that provided a more logical motive for the double crime.

The blow up came when Raymond Schneider, Hayes' accuser, summoned Prosecutor Beekman, of Somerset county, to the jail at Somerville where Schneider was held as a material witness, and repudiated his entire story of the crime. The authorities immediately renewed their investigation of leads which had been relegated to the discard when Schneider's statement led them to declare they had solved the case.

The new turn took them back to the home of Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, widow of the slain clergyman, and to that of James Mills, widower of the slain choir singer. Detectives visited the Hall home and took away a fawn colored coat and scarf which she had had dyed in Philadelphia since the murders. They sent it to an analytical chemist for analysis of brown spots, which the Philadelphia cleaners reported were beneath the black dye they had applied.

Mrs. Hall is known to have worn a light colored coat in the early morning of September 15, the morning after the murders, when, according to her story, she went to the church of St. John the Evangelist looking for her missing husband. She has told the authorities her brother William Stevens, accompanied her to the church and back. Witnesses who saw her return home declares she returned alone at about 1:30 a. m.

FRIDAY, THIRTEENTH PROVES FATAL FOR A NEW YORK FIREMAN

New York, Oct. 13.—Friday, Oct. 13th has proved fatal to Clifford Lellon, fireman of company 13, who was today thrown from an automobile on his head and later died in a hospital. The accident happened on Thirteenth street, thirteen minutes after midnight.

COUNTY DOCTORS ENJOY SUPPER AT THERIOTARY CLUB

Matter of Establishing Dispensary and Laboratory Discussed at Length

COMMISSIONERS TO BE ASKED TO AID IN GETTING LABORATORY

Society Will Meet in Bethel Next Month With Drs. Hemingway and Basnight

Members of the Pitt county Medical Society were guests of Drs. A. M. Schultz and P. J. Chester at a delightful supper at the Rotary club last night, the occasion being the regular monthly meeting of the society. Dr. Chester could not attend the meeting on account of illness, and the entertaining was left up to Dr. Schultz, who did everything possible to make the evening pass off pleasantly. Dr. Grady Dixon, of Ayden, presided over the session.

After supper was over the matter of establishing a county dispensary and laboratory was discussed at length, it being decided at a previous meeting that some place was necessary where the poorer class might receive medical aid as provided by clinics in other progressive counties.

Dr. L. C. Skinner, chairman of the dispensary committee, asked that his committee be allowed to continue its investigation. He also desired assurance that every member would give proper support to the issue. This was given by practically every member of the society present. They said they would be glad to help those unable to pay for medical attention and would do everything possible in this direction.

Dr. M. T. Frizzelle, of Ayden, chairman of the laboratory committee, said he was still busy getting data, and this would be presented at the next session of the county commissioners. He said he had received much encouragement since the proposition became known and felt assured of hearty support from the public. Dr. Frizzelle asked that other members be added to his committee and the following were assigned: Dr. Laughinghouse, Paul Jones, C. M. Jones, Hemingway and Basnight.

It was stated that the laboratory and dispensary would be an enlargement of the county health department, and that activities would be considerably greater in many different ways.

Dr. Pace, chairman of the public health lecture committee, stated that the second series of lectures would be presented at a later date.

Several other matters regarding establishment of the dispensary and laboratory were discussed, after which Drs. Schultz and Chester were thanked for the splendid supper. The members expressed regret in the illness and absence of Dr. Chester.

The next meeting will be held with Drs. Garrington and Hemingway at Bethel.

Potato storage warehouses should
be receiving great attention at this
time as winter is approaching and
the crop will rot unless placed in
comfortable storage warehouses,
such as are being created in parts
of the country at this time. Pitt
county growers have been giving this
important matter much thought the
last few months, and while only a
few communities have actually de-
cided to but there are others to forge
to the front in the near future. We
know of no better investment and
the farmer that spends his money this
way need have any fear as to the fu-
ture.

The government's new bond issue
has been oversubscribed by a half
million dollars, so the public has been
informed. This is the best news we
have heard in sometime. When peo-
ple buy government securities it is a
safe bet the country is on a good foot-
ing. It's the best investment any
good business man or woman should
desire. Government securities not
only yield a good dividends but are
non-taxable. This last fact alone is

Bonded warehouses for the storage
of cotton are being erected in various
parts of the country at this time and
before the next crop is produced
many communities will be in better
position to preserve the crop. Pitt
county farmers have already decided
to erect one or more warehouses, but
these will not be sufficient to care for
the large crop produced here an-
nually. While the boll weevil may
reduce the crop considerably next
year, we do not believe the produc-
tion will be so seriously cut. The
farmers have awakened to the serious-
ness of the menace and every pre-
ventative measure possible will be em-
ployed in the fight against the pest.
This will result in yearly normal
acreage and there will be something
to place in the warehouses after all.

The first lecture of the public
health campaign will be delivered in
Greenville Friday night by physi-
cians well acquainted with conditions
prevailing in this county. That
great good should be derived from
these lectures is not to be doubted.
Much depends upon the interest which
people exhibit in the campaign, how-
ever, and its success will be largely
determined by this. It is to be hoped
as many as possible will turn out and
in this way show their appreciation
for what the doctors are trying to do
in behalf of humanity. The plan to
educate the public in public health
measures was decided upon at a re-
cent meeting of the society, and prac-
tically every physician will take an
active part. The lectures will be
prepared by members of the state de-
partment of health and everyone may
be sure they will embrace only the
latest and most timely subjects. The
physicians should be congratulated
for the splendid spirit exhibited in
the public, and should have support
of every community.

Peaceful solution of the Near East
situation has been reached, accord-
ing to reports received from Europe
yesterday. This news will be receiv-
ed with genuine pleasure on all sides
as the United States has been vitally
affected by fighting in progress in
Greece. It doesn't look like this would
have anything to do with conditions
over here but those fully acquainted
with things know this to be so.
With the clearing up of the clouds
business along all lines should ex-
perience a revival of benefit to every-
one.

The 70,000 men employed by Henry
Ford have been ordered to lay off of
strong drink, and unless they do it
is quite likely the great manufactur-
er will give them the pink slip, or
discharge. While this may sound like
taking a man's liberty away from
him it's a good idea and should be
fully enforced by Mr. Ford. If other
manufacturers would follow in the
pathway he has blazed it wouldn't
be long before conditions would be
much better in America. Contra-
band whiskey is doing more to harm
our people than ten times the amount
of good whiskey and unless some
drastic action is taken the loss of life
will increase alarmingly. If a man's
job depended upon his sobriety it's
safe to say there would be less drink-
ing going on and consequently there
would be more happy and prosper-
ous homes than there are.

Warning that another coal strike
is inevitable in April next year un-
less certain conditions are removed
has been issued by the American
Mining congress. Since the present
strike has not yet been definitely set-
tled we should worry about what will
happen in 1923. It looks like the
miners have been idle long enough
to be tired of it by this time, and if
there is anything to them at all there
won't be any more labor disorders
until their wages are cut about half.
Miners alone have lost millions of
dollars as result of the strike and
they would be foolish indeed to at-
tempt to walk out again in less than
six months after the present strike
ends. The warning may scare some
folks, but there are others who will
give it little consideration.

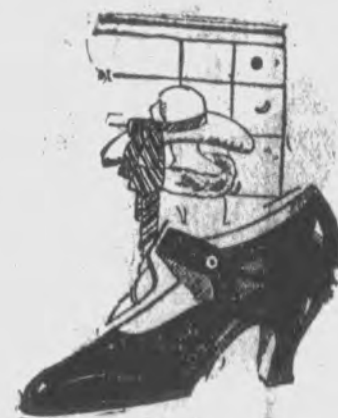

Food Remittances to be Basis of Adult Relief Work this Winter in Cleaning Up Russia's Famine Aftermath By A. R. A.



This line of Russians, waiting at a station in Odessa to receive food packages sent through the generosity of American relatives and friends, is typical of what will be the greatest form of alleviation of after-famine conditions in Russia this winter. The American Relief Administration, which built up rapidly a feeding program that reached 10,500,000 persons a day at the height of its operation, abolished adult feeding, at least temporarily, when this year's harvest came in. More than 1,000,000 children a day

are still being fed and a vast medical aid, involving \$8,000,000 worth of medical supplies is being continued.

Latest advices are that the Russian government over-estimated the crop when it gave out figures in July that forecast a yield of 13,000,000 tons in excess of last year. How far wrong this optimism was cannot yet be determined, but Colonel William N. Haskell, director of the A. R. A. in Russia, cabled late in September his belief that approximately 1,000,000 adults would sore-

ly need aid.

The most practical way of helping to alleviate the suffering which remains after the great famine is through the Food Remittance system. Money sent to the American Relief Administration at Washington will be applied to general relief or will be made available in the form of food to any designated persons or group in Russia. Doctors, nurses, teachers, preachers and writers are among those who are surest to suffer throughout the winter.

There is some talk of oil wells sprouting up over night around New Bern, but from what we have seen of the section we believe the people would be more happy and contented

by pursuing agriculture and business than exploring for oil. It may be the geologists have found indications of oil, but will the flow prove as lucrative as the general flow of business

and other forms of industry that have made the section what it is today. We shall watch developments with interest, and if oil wells should become an activity, we would like to place our order for two or three.

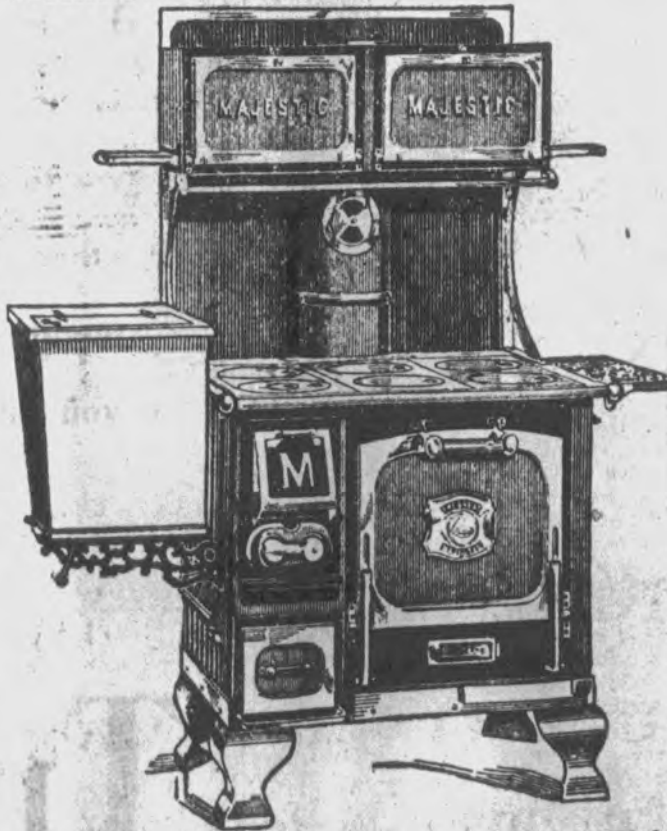

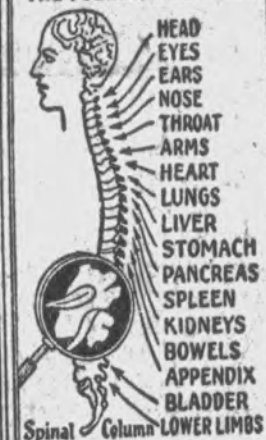

TAXES BECOMING HEAVY BURDEN WITH ENGLISH: BLAMED FOR EVERYTHING

London, Oct.—It used to be the war that bore the burden of blame for everything wrong in Great Britain, now they are blaming the taxes.

High taxes are causing a long continued and growing howl of protest and whenever anything goes awry, the answer always is: "Well, look at our tax rate."

Lord Decies gives an excellent example of this willingness to blame everything on taxation. "We are becoming a shabby generation," said Lord Decies, "but I would venture to suggest that the reason we are becoming a shabby generation is an economic reason—the tax gatherer is at the door."

Several Dukes and Lords and titled persons have remained in London during the shooting season and have openly told their friends that high taxation makes it impossible for them to afford their former sports.

From canny Scotland comes a wail that the Scotch whiskey tared is falling off due to the high taxes upon spirits. The distillers claim that drinkers are not taking to Scotch whiskey any more, but are ordering small quantities of cheap wines which they "jazz up" with methylated spirits. It is reported that during the first six months of this year there was a decrease of 900,000 quarts in the consumption of whiskey.

The tax question is getting to be a touchy point with the British and it's bound to cause some trouble for the politicians when the next general election comes this winter.

It looks as though Jack Dempsey will have slim picking if he comes to England this winter to stage a few fights. The announcement of Jack Kearns that he is bringing Dempsey to England to fight Beckett and Carpenter has been greeted by English sporting writers with the query: "Why doesn't Dempsey stay at home and fight Wills?" There is unanimity on the part of the English sporting writers in warning their readers that there is no one in Europe who can give Dempsey a good battle, and they are frank to state that any fight Dempsey may arrange over here will hardly be worth the price.

The English boxing fraternity is getting pretty cold on heavyweight bouts, and unless the prices are made very reasonable they won't pay to see Dempsey fight a "set up."

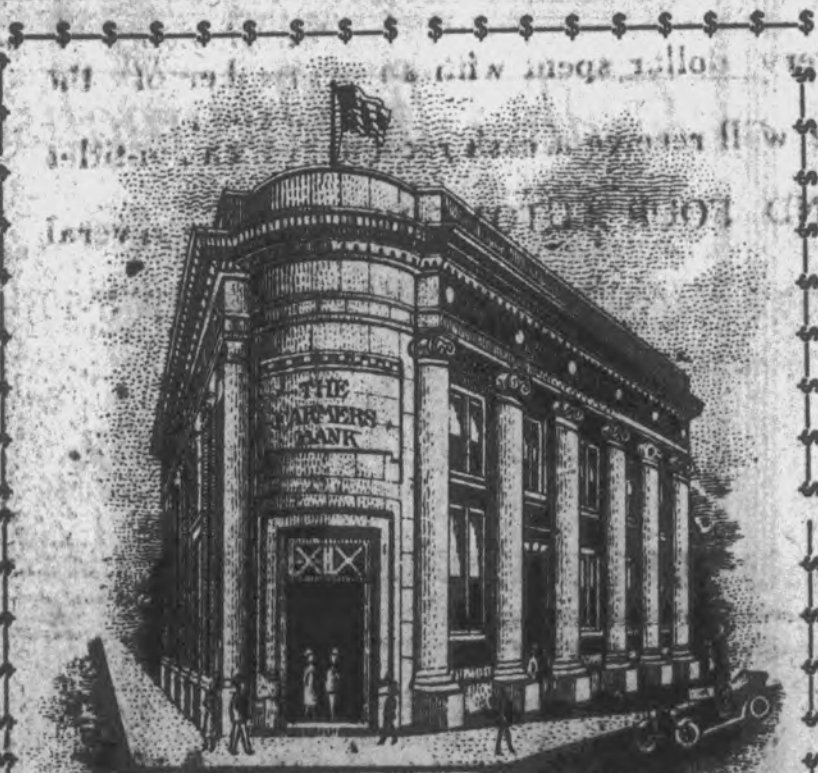

Sweeping Medical Campaign Under Way To Check Disease Epidemics in Russia; A. R. A. Feeding of Children Continues



The inoculation of more than 10,000,000 Russian children and adults against cholera, typhoid and small-pox by the American Relief Administration—a step made necessary by disease epidemics following in the wake of famine—is one phase of the sweeping medical "clean-up" campaign that has been launched by the Russian unit of this relief organization. The young women pictured above are employees in the Petrograd offices of the A. R. A. and were among the first to receive the treatment. Relief officials state that while the famine has been conquered the aftermath, bringing as it does pestilence to the weakened and undernourished, must be guarded against in those millions

that have been rescued from starvation are to be saved from disease. To this end the medical division of the A. R. A. is now distributing nearly \$8,000,000 worth of American Red Cross and Army medical stores to hospitals, clinics, dispensaries and orphanages throughout Russia. Sanitary trains loaded with such necessities as drugs, medicines, disinfectants, surgical instruments, soap, towels, sheets and blankets make regular trips into the interior. Twenty-four American physicians are directing the entire operation with the help of thousands of Russia's most able medical men.

In addition to precautionary and sanitative measures against dis-

ease which even include the filtration and chlorinating of water supplies in larger cities and rehabilitation of unused buildings so as to insure adequate housing facilities for the great mass of refugees, the American Relief Administration, having closed its famine program of feeding 10,500,000 persons a day, has undertaken the feeding of 1,250,000 children through the coming winter. At least 1,000,000 adults are likely to be seriously affected from the after-effects of famine; and the A. R. A., through the now world famous Food Relief system, is receiving gifts for general relief or designated beneficiaries at 42 Broadway, New York headquarters.

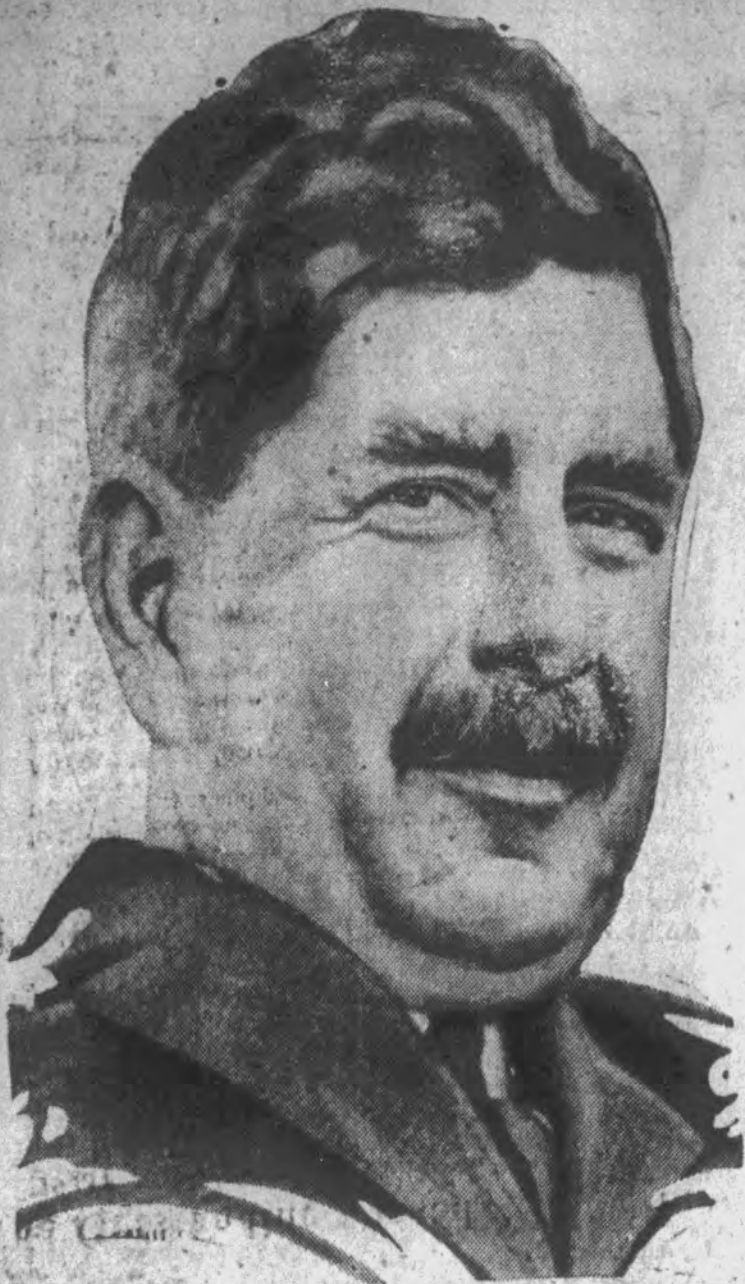
