WESTERN HORSES WILL BE SEEN IN RACES HERE DURING PITT COUNTY FAIR

Dail, Jr., manager of the Pitt county Fair which opens on Tuesday morning of next week was in receipt of a telegram yesterday from one of the foremost race horse promoters of the west asking that the local management reserve space for 15 horses. These same horses followed the grand circuit during the summer months, and the exceptionally large purses offered on the local tracks have attracted the owners here. The class of horse racing as will be seen here this year will be the best shown in the state, as some of the best horses of the east and west will appear on the local tracks.

CHECK FLASHERS RUNNING RAMPANT

Greensboro, Nov. 1.—That North Carolina is the playground of the check flasher, and that the next General Assembly should take some measures to put teeth in a law that would protect the merchants of the State, is the opinion of J. H. Towles of the Towles Detective Agency here.

The case of F. H. Mock on charges of victimizing Winston-Salem business men was the subject of a sermon delivered by Mr. Towles today. Mock, it is charged, forged the name of J. H. Neese, owner of a granite and marble business here, to four checks and passed them in Winston-Salem, buying articles in the stores and never calling for them. What he wanted and what he got was the money on the checks excess of the cost of the articles. He is still at large.

So bold have the passers become, it is said, that they work the same town well before they leave, cashing as many as five checks before they skip out.

The most brazen case of the kind known here is one where the flasher deposited \$14.13 with a bank and shortly afterward drew out the \$14, and on the 13 cents left gave checks, worthless, for more than \$2,200. He had some money in the bank, the 13 cents, and the persons victimized were just about helpless.

The Merchants Association of the State will demand some legislation that will curb the bad check practice.

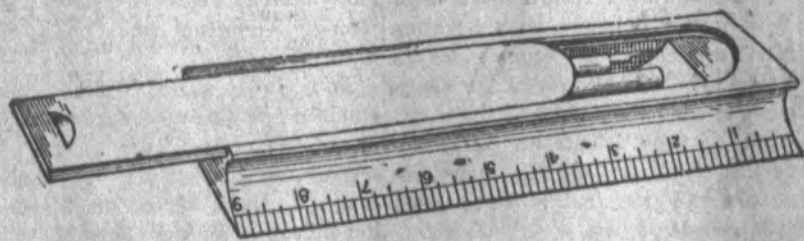
