"GREATEST MOTHER" KIWANIS CLUB IN APPEALS TO PEOPLE FOR ASSISTANCE NOW

Funds Being Sought During Annual Red Cross Roll Call, November 11 to 30

Far up among the fastnesses of the Cumberland Mountains a loyal, patient hill woman watched her husband slowly die from tuberculosis, brought on by his being gassed in the Argonne offensive. A heavy cold caught during the trip home and cold, damp and malnutrition were speeding him toward the grave aiding the ravages of tuberculosis.

Ignorant of the impending tragedy, three young children and a baby had only a sack of coffee and some corn between them and starvation. The husband could do nothing save lie on a ragged blanket all day and watch the sunbeams play about the peaks of his beloved mountains. The nearest humans were at the village store, five miles across the mountains. Not even the mail man came to see the little family.

The mountain mind has a certain grand simplicity almost unknown in this day when everything has its price. It never occurred to the ex-service man to ask his government for assistance. His country had called him in the time of need and he had gone. Comrades had given their all in the trenches and on the sea. He was making the final sacrifice at home. In the end it was all the same. A bit hard on his mountain mate and the kids. But women and children always had the worst of it in war. Thus he reflected through the long days and nights as he lay on the shabby blanket by the cabin door.

But now travels, even in the final moments of his life, the tale of the family's plight came eventually to a Red Cross worker in a town a score of miles away. She promptly saddled her horse, loaded the saddle bags with flour, fruits, vegetables and rode over the mountain to the humble cabin which was home to the man and his family.

Holding the tiny skeleton victim of malnutrition in her arms, the troubled woman met the Red Cross worker at the door. The other children were too weak to rise and greet the newcomer, the first visitor since their daddy had come back from over the sea. Only the dying husband mustered a smile because of the Red Cross on her uniform, which he had learned to recognize through the weary trials of the war.

The Red Cross worker spent the night, soothing and ministering to the patient. The children were given a wholesome meal, their first in days and weeks. She comforted the worried and heart-sick little wife and lent her money for groceries.

She learned that the man had filed no claim for compensation. He didn't know he was rated. But he was right glad, on account of his wife. The next morning the worker rode back along the mountain trail to send the claim papers she had filled out to Washington. They went and eventually compensation came back. Sixteen hundred and fifty dollars back pay for total disability.

But it was too late. The humble mountaineer who had given his all cheerfully for his country was resting in fifteen feet of mountain earth. The gentle ministrations of the Red Cross worker had only made the way a little easier. Back went the checks, for not even the government can pay out money to the dead.

But the Red Cross was not through. A home was found for the three older children and the mother and baby sent to a hospital for a few weeks. The worker then found a job for her, at which she could earn enough to support herself and the baby.

This was but one of more than 150,000 instances in which wives and children of ex-service men, and men themselves of course, were aided by the Red Cross through its chapters in the Southern Division during the first seven months of 1922. Many lives have been put back on the right track by timely assistance from the

PITT COUNTY FAIR TO OPEN ON NEXT TUESDAY, NOV. 7

Everything in Readiness for Opening of Third Annual County Fair

Everything is ready for the grand opening of the Third annual Pitt county fair and exposition. The city is already full of strangers, and each train bringing more, and by Monday night the exhibits will all be located. Agricultural exhibits and live stock promises to be more varied than ever before. The banks of the county through the chamber of commerce and the county agent have ordered a car load of fine bred cows to be sold to the farmers, and these cows will be on exhibition at the fair grounds. The swine building has been enlarged also the poultry show. There are more than a hundred horses at the fair among them are several well known grand circuit horses that have never been south before. Grace, direct, Betina, Little Peter, Lillian T., Parker Boy, Simboj S. Forrest, all high class horses are at the fair. The automobile races will also be a feature that no other fair in this part of the state has had. The fireworks people have been on the grounds for several days. Mr. Ryno the vice president of the Schenectady Fireworks Company is here, in person, to supervise the battle of Argonne which will be reproduced in fireworks at the fair on Wednesday night. Mr. Ryno says that the program for the Pitt county fair is as good as produced by this company at any county fair this year.

The merchants and manufacturers exhibits will play an important part, and the main building will resemble a mammoth food show, and the made in Carolina exposition. The amusements will all be in by Monday and the concert band from the Zeelman and Polle Exposition, under the direction of Prof. John Fingerhut, will give a concert down town Monday evening. This band is composed of all American musicians and comes here from the larger fairs of the south and west. Tuesday will be children's day and it is hoped that every school child in the county will be here to enjoy the day as several educational features have been especially arranged for children's day. The races on Tuesday will be as good as any day during the week. The fair will be for the people of eastern North Carolina and it is hoped that Pitt county people will have something well worth while to show the rest of the state.

GRAND JURY REPORT ROAD SENTENCES CONVICT CAMP IN GOOD CONDITION

Report As Whole One of Best Made by Grand Jury for Several Terms

We, the grand jury, beg to submit the following report:

1. That we have visited the county jail and find the same well kept. The prisoners advising that they received very good food, with no complaints as to general treatment. We did find that the jail at present is without heat on account of a burst boiler, but that another boiler was expected at any time to replace the old one.

2. That a committee of six men visited one convict camp and we find the same in excellent condition. The camp is clean, the bedding clean, and the convicts had no complaint to offer us as to the treatment received by them.

3. That a committee of six visited the second convict camp and we find it in good condition, with no complaints from any of the convicts.

4. That a committee visited the county home, and we find conditions there very satisfactory. Everything is as neat and clean as possible to be kept, the cooking for the inmates and dining of them being done in a very neat and cleanly manner. The bedding in the rooms as well as other furnishings, appear to be clean and convenient. We had no complaint from any of the inmates of this home and wish to commend the keeper thereof for the manner in which he carries out the plans of the home.

We suggest and recommend however, that the plastering in the dining room and kitchen, of both the white and colored inmates, be repaired as it is falling off and is in a position to injure some one should it fall on the head. Further than this we found the buildings and grounds in good condition.

5. We have visited the Sheriff's office, the county treasurer's office, the auditor's office, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the register of deeds office, the county clerk's office, making a close inspection of the general manner in which the records are being kept, the manner in which they are gotten up etc., and we find that in each and all of these offices that the officers and assistants are keeping everything in first class condition. The court house and grounds have the presence of receiving the proper attention and we

ROAD SENTENCES FEATURE FRIDAY'S SESSION OF COURT

Large Number of Cases Disposed of During Week and Much Interest Manifested

Yesterday's session of the Pitt county superior court for the trial of criminal cases, which is in progress in this city, was again featured by a number of road sentences. A large number of cases were disposed of as on previous days, and the session as a whole was one of the most successful of the entire week. Judge Brock the presiding judge, kept things moving and it is expected that at the close of this afternoon's session the calendar will have been cleared of a large number of cases.

The following were given a hearing yesterday: Dennis Wilson, found guilty of forcible trespass judgment continued for term of two years upon payment of costs.

John Bridgers, charged with assault, was found guilty and fined \$25.00 and costs.

The case against Sam Sumerlin charged with abandonment was continued. Ashley Harper, charged with selling whiskey, defendant and judgment nisi set fa capias and continued. He was placed under bond of \$300.

George Eaton, charged with carrying concealed weapon and assault with deadly weapon. In both cases he was given six months in jail to be assigned to public roads. Judgment was suspended for a term of two years upon good behavior.

Joe Peyton, found guilty of assault, was fined \$25.00 and costs. Stanley Moore and Almata Worthington, charged with prostitution, were found not guilty. On account of insufficient evidence the case against P. T. Atkinson, charged with violating section 4309, was dismissed. Jarvis Nobles, found guilty of vagrancy and given 30 days in jail, judgment was suspended for period of two years upon good behavior. Defendant paid costs. Sylvester Johnson was found guilty of vagrancy.

In the case of Tom Roberson, charged with manufacturing whiskey, judgment was suspended for a term of two years upon payment of costs.

John Ivey Speight was found guilty of larceny and sentenced to six months in jail to be assigned to work on public roads. Term to begin at expiration of term which he is now serving. James Holloway, charged with assault with deadly weapon, was given a sentence of 12 months in jail to be assigned to public roads. He was found guilty a few days ago of selling whiskey and given a sentence of twelve months on the county roads. The sentence given for assault with deadly weapon is to run concurrent with this sentence. He was also found guilty of carrying concealed weapon and sentenced to six months in county jail to be assigned to county roads. Term to begin at the expiration of the previous sentence.

The Ayden Community Fair was by far one of the most successful occasions of its kind ever held in Pitt county. It was well prepared for from beginning to end and it was an activity to which the whole community responded with a oneness of purpose and organization. Every phase of the life of Ayden was represented, not only past, in the antique booth, but present by the splendid display of products, and future by the spirit of good will which permeated the whole affair.

The Fair Association was very fortunate in having their officers R. W. Smith, president; and R. C. Baggett, secretary and treasurer, and on their executive committee C. V. Cannon, W. M. Edwards and W. H. Dixon. All were untiring in their efforts to make the day a success in every way and they had been able committees with the following chairmen as their assistants: J. C. Andrews, advertising committee, Mrs. Helen Turnage, entertainment, B. G. Taylor, field crops; L. O. Turnage, Orchard and Garden; Mrs. W. S. Lancaster Home Products and Pantry supplies; Mrs. E. W. One interesting part of the parade was the "Little Old Ladies" planned out by Mrs. Church Moore, following this came the Junior Red Cross and all of the student body of Ayden and the surrounding community schools. Mr. W. G. Sawyer, superintendent of Ayden schools and all members of the faculty had been splendid in their co-operation and the children marched beautifully.

The parade ended in front of the warehouse where a stage for the speakers had been arranged. President Smith introduced Mayor Worthington who welcomed every one to the fair and Ayden. Mr. W. B. Pace who has been working very hard on the fair had procured the farm agent from Beaufort county who made a beneficial and educational talk to every one on the standardization of farm products, and the educational and recreational advantages of a Community Fair. The speaker of the day was G. T. Gardner from Grifton. President Smith introduced Mr. Gardner who made a splendid talk on community spirit and co-operation. All of the churches had attractive booths and served dinner. In the afternoon Mr. W. L. Long took charge of different field day contest in which the young people entered, and in the evening a crowd of the children came back to play games by the light of a bonfire to use up some of the energy stored up while standing at attention and listening to the different talks.

The arts antiques, and relics booth was splendid. There were interesting displays of old fashioned clothing, furniture, laces, papers, books and jewelry. Two dear little ladies carded and spun cotton at an old fashioned spinning wheel and the booth was so crowded around that it was impossible to get near until late in the evening.

TUBERCULOSIS IS ON THE IN- CREASE IN PITT COUNTY.

The records from the state as a
whole show a saving of 300 lives last
year over the year previous, but our
county has not kept pace with the
rest of the State in this particular
field.

Fifteen out of every hundred who
died last year were farmers. In
actual numbers there were 388 who
died of this disease. This is, per-
haps, not startling to a great many
people who believe that, like the poor,
we must always have tuberculosis with
us. The fact is, however, that each
and every one of these deaths was
preventable and such an enormous
loss among our farmers should stir
us to action.

Another significant fact is that
more deaths occurred among the farm-
ers than occurred among those who
are engaged in indoor work, such as
teachers, stenographers, bookkeep-
ers, clerks mill workers, etc. the num-
ber of deaths among those engaged
in such occupations being 210.

It would seem that the farmer is
not as vigilant in regard to his health
as he should be. A periodic medical
examination is not a cure-all, but it
would have been a life-saver in a
great many of these cases.

The North Carolina Tuberculosis
Association, an organization which
is supported by the sale of tubercu-
losis Christmas Seals, continues to
hold free tuberculosis diagnostic
clinics and will gladly send a specialist
to any point in North Carolina where
the people are interested in finding the
causes of tuberculosis in their com-
munity. Finding the cause is, of
course, the first step. Then if the
people really mean business, arrange-
ments should be made to give proper
treatment to those cases which are
curable.

"Greatest Mother."
In the hospitals of the veterans' bureau scattered through the eight
states comprising the Southern Divi-
sion, Florida, Alabama, Georgia,
Louisiana, Mississippi, North and
South Carolina, there are several
thousands of disabled ex-service men
whose otherwise monotonous lives of
pain are brightened by Red Cross
medical social workers and the activi-
ties. Nearly \$200,000 is being spent
this year by the American Red Cross
in veterans' hospitals of the South
for the comfort of the men and their
families.

The need of this fund is clearly to
be seen. A man's wife may come to
the hospital to see him, having no
money for the return journey. Some-
times she has no means to pay her ex-
penses while in the hospital town.
Here is where the Red Cross steps
in with its medical social service. The
government authorities at the hospi-
tal cannot make a loan to the man's
family. The Red Cross can and does,
taking the man's note without interest
of course, to be repaid from his com-
pensation check. Thus suffering and
humiliation to the man and his wife
are averted.

This work must go on. Not only
in the mountains, but in the little
settlements back from the railroads
of your and my Southland are fami-
lies of men and men themselves who
were disabled in service, who need
treatment and who are rightfully en-
titled to compensation from the gov-
ernment. The Red Cross has been
commissioned by the government to
carry on in this work. Funds for
this work are being sought during the
Annual Bazaar, November 11 to 30,
when every citizen will be asked to
join the organization.

COLLEGE HEADS ATTACK BETS ON GAMES

(By International News)

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. — Deball games as a vicious attack on intercollegiate athletics. Michigan University authorities have started a crusade to stamp out the practice. In statements issued to the press both President Marion Burton and Fielding H. Yost, director of intercollegiate athletics, severely criticized the evil.

"There is no occasion for discussing the morals of betting. It is an attempt to get something for nothing and in the long run the world is not made up that way," said President Burton. "There is occasion for pointing out from an intensely practical point of view that betting is shortsighted and a vicious attack on intercollegiate athletics."

"The student who bets on his team, thinking that thereby he is giving genuine loyalty to his university, is deceiving himself. Betting breeds unjust criticism of the team, tends to shatter student morals and substitutes commercialism for sportsmanship. Let us play the game for the game's sake."

"Students have no right to bet dad's hard earned money and then have to explain things to dad," said "Hurry up" Yost.

"Usually they are not betting their own money and if they are they can't afford to lose it," said Yost. "As a result if they lose they find themselves having to explain to Dad or having to go without things they should have. Before they know it they are finding fault with the team, the coaches and everything from the waterboy to the president. And at of this because they lost a few dollars which they had no business bet-

ting. "When players know that there are huge sums of money at stake they are apt to lose sight of the greater ideals for which they are playing. As a result the game suffers."
