SIMPLICITY WILL MARK ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION

Woodrow Wilson Again to be
Visited by Delegation of
Admirers—A Quiet Day

Washington, Nov. 10.—Simplicity will characterize the official observance tomorrow of the anniversary of Armistice Day—a day which President Harding, in a message to the American people tonight marked "the victorious culmination of our nation's impressive participation in the affairs of the world."

Compared with that celebration of one year ago, in which the representatives of European rulers and potentates of the world's most powerful nations joined, doing honor to America's dead, a typified in the unknown soldier, a little group will leave the White House early tomorrow morning to lay a wreath symbolizing the nation's armistice day tribute on the tomb in Arlington National cemetery of that unknown hero. It will include the President and the Secretaries of War and Navy and the pilgrimage these three will make is expected to establish a precedent to be followed through the years.

Also simple but more informal will be another event that will mark the day, the visit of a group of friends and admirers to the home in S. street of Woodrow Wilson, the nation's war president. This will be in accord with the custom established last year when several thousand after paying tribute to the unknown soldier, went to the Wilson home, and showed the esteem in which they held the former president. Last year they received a simple greeting and they hope for the same tomorrow.

Observance of the day elsewhere throughout the nation will be varied, in the opinion of the president as voiced in his message, and should make for the appraisal of the nation's relationship to world affairs.

WORLD'S RECORD PLAY TO APPEAR IN CITY NOV. 21ST

"Lightnin," Famous Comedy

HALL-MILLS CASE NOT LIKELY SOON TO SEE REAL END

Deputy Mott Confers With
Foreman of Jury With Un-
satisfactory Results Alleged

New Brunswick, N. J., Nov. 10.—The state will withhold its plea for indictment in the Hall-Mills murder case until November 20, when a new grand jury will be sworn in.

These were the latest advices today. Meanwhile the investigation apparently was in the doldrums.

It was understood that special deputy attorney general Mott after a conference yesterday with the foreman of the Somerset September grand jury had decided to lay his evidence before new jurors.

New Brunswick, Nov. 10. — The Hall-Mills murder remains a mystery today and there seems to be no immediate prospect of it being cleared. No official announcement has been made as the result of the conference in Somerset yesterday between deputy attorney general Mott and the foreman of the grand jury.

Mr. Mott declined to make any statement after the conference but his attitude indicated he had been unable to convince foreman Gibb and other officials that he had enough evidence to warrant the grand jury to order an arrest. Many people here believe the case will never go beyond the investigation stage.

ARMISTICE DAY TO BE OBSERVED IN CITY TODAY

Courthouse and Banks to Close
But Stores Will Remain
Open As Usual

Armistice Day will be observed in Greenville today by closing of the courthouse and the banks and a meeting of the Pitt county post of the American Legion to be held at Forbes & Morton's warehouse at 12 o'clock. There will be no general closing of stores as in recent years because the day falls on Saturday. The meeting of the Legion will be featured by a barbecue dinner and several interesting talks. Members of the woman's auxiliary will take part in the session. No speakers of note have been engaged for the occasion, and only members of the post will speak.

While Armistice Day has been set aside as a legal holiday the postoffice here will not close, or will not observe any special hours. The postmaster has been instructed to act in accordance with plans of the city, and as business houses will remain open the office will do likewise.

MCADAMS TO BEGIN REVIVAL CAMPAIGN IN THIS CITY SUNDAY

Evangelist and Party Already
Here Preparing for Begin-
ning of Meeting

(By McADAMS PARTY.)

The McAdams Evangelistic Party is now in Greenville and will begin a campaign for souls under large tent on vacant lot back of the postoffice.

"We," Hiram and Lizzie McAdams have come to your town to begin a campaign for souls. This campaign may seem strange to some as we have quietly entered your town. For a number of years we have been in revival work and it is many times like the great revival John held in Nineveh. The Lord often leads us to places where we have never been invited and these places always prove to be where we have our greatest meetings. We have been in your state four years, with the exception of a few months we were absent from the U. S. A. on a missionary trip to Barbados, British West Indies. Since our return we have held revivals in a number of your towns. When we reach a place we visit all the ministers and if they have a ministerial association we meet with that and lay our plans before the good factors of the town and solicit their co-operation. When we first reach a place we hold night services for the first few weeks. Mr. McAdams visits the business men and talks with them, our young ladies visit in the homes, we pray and talk with the good women and many times we meet various church members with their membership in other places. We report these cases to the different pastors. We also meet many unsaved and give them a special invitation to visit the tent meeting. We call this a partial religious revival. We don't always find all at home. After this survey has been made we then ask the business men to open their places of business for prayer, and we hold these meetings at 10 o'clock every morning and at 3 o'clock every afternoon. We hold them in the homes. These prayer meetings prove a great power and many are saved before ever reaching the tent. We get the people to Jesus and then turn them over to the different pastors we have a splendid card system we use after the individual is thoroughly conscious of the fact they are converted. These cards are handed to the pastors, all along during the meeting. We don't hold any services Sunday mornings under the tent, we visit the different churches of the town and many times we are invited to preach at the different churches. We hold every Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock and every night in the week. At the last of the meeting we give a family bible to the man and woman that brings the largest number of children and each child gets a testament. We don't ask any one to stand behind us financially. We take our incidental offerings till all the expenses are met, and then stop, and at the close of the meeting. If our work has been a blessing to the town and they feel led to take a free will offering for us we accept it and feel very thankful for this kindness. We also invite all the good singers to come and help us and we find many souls now through song. We would also appreciate some of the good Christian people with the different musical instruments to come and play. We ask all Christians that read this to pray for a great revival in Greenville and come and see for yourself. We have two splendid personal workers, Misses Sullivan and Taylor.

Exposition to be Brought to

FOOTBALL GAME WILL BE PLAYED THIS AFTERNOON ALSO

Thousands Expected to Throng
the Grounds Today and To-
night to Witness Closing

The third annual P.M. county fair will be brought to a conclusion today and tonight under the most favorable of conditions. The closing day will witness the largest crowds of the week as considerable interest is centered around the automobile races and football game afternoon and the battle of the Argonne to be staged with fireworks tonight. Never before has a closing day featured such an interesting program and for this reason it is believed the fair grounds will be thronged with thousands all day long.

The automobile races will begin this afternoon promptly at two o'clock. Some of the fastest cars in the country have been entered for each event and promoters are confident the throngs will be thrilled as they speed around the half-mile track at an unbelievable rate. This is the first time automobiles have raced on the local track and those who have watched horse races the first part of the week will consider the change a great diversion.

At three o'clock Greenville and Vanceboro will battle for honors in the only football game of the week. This event has been entered as one of the feature attractions of the day and it is expected hundreds will be attracted by the game alone.

Large crowds continued to pass through the gates yesterday and last night. Midway again presented a scene of life and activity such as probably never before featured the fair. The thousands again found keen enjoyment in the hundreds of exhibits of the farm and home and these places were filled to their capacity. The fine animals on display in the live stock department attracted as much attention as any day of the week. Everyone appeared carried away with the blue ribbon winning animals and to say they commended the owners would be expressing the matter mildly.

The fair will be brought to a close tonight with the final fireworks display in the form of the battle of the Argonne. While fireworks have been presented every night only on one or two occasions has the battle been presented. It is expected this feature alone will draw additional hundreds to the grounds to witness the closing event.

Exhibits of live stock at the Pitt county fair this year were all that could be expected. We have attended much larger fairs, but never before have we had the pleasure of witnessing such a splendid display of hogs, poultry and live stock. While the display last year was good it was nothing compared to this year. The fair management certainly secured the best to be had, and deserve to be commended by the appreciative public. Such splendid exhibits inspire everyone to raise things equally as good, and in the course of a few years the great good resulting from the fair will be plainly in evidence.

It is rumored that former President Woodrow Wilson may yet come to the front to lead the leaderless Democratic party. That this would be received with interest on all sides cannot be questioned.
