SHERIFF HOWARD IS SHOT BY NEGRO AT WILSON, N. C.

Officer Slightly Wounded While Leading Posse in the Quest of Desperado

Wilson, Nov. 26.—While attempting to arrest Oscar Melvin, outlawed negro desperado wanted for the murder of Patrolman Jack Sykes here November 20 Sheriff B. E. Howard received a load of squirrel shot in his breast, Deputy Williams Bunn had his cap punctured by shots a negro witness from Mt. Olive was badly wounded and an unknown negro was shot to death by a member of the posse accompanying Sheriff Howard. The sheriff's wounds are reported as slight.

The shooting took place near Bowden a saw mill town in Duplin county where the sheriff and his posse had gone in quest of Melvin, who was reported to be there at the home of his sisters early Saturday afternoon.

After searching the home of the outlaw's sisters and failing to locate Melvin, the officers, proceeding up the road, saw two negroes and flashed their pocket lights in their faces. Both negroes opened fire, and made for a shack near by. They barricaded the doors, extinguished the lights and refused to come out firing a fusillade of shots into the posse, wounding Howard, and the negro witness picked up at Mt. Olive for the purpose of identifying Melvin.

A negro seen taking deliberate aim at Charles Beland, of Wilson, was killed by a member of the posse.

The party of officers finally managed to break into the house, and a search revealed a negro, thought to be one of the two seen in the road who was taken into custody by the sheriff of Duplin county, a negro preacher, and two negro women, Melvin, if he was in the house, made his getaway.

The Mt. Olive negro, accompanying Sheriff Howard, broke and ran when he perceived the extent of his injuries, and has not been heard from since.

REVOLT THREATENED BY HARDUP FARMERS IN THE MIDDLE WEST

Growers Practically Penniless, Planning Desperate Measures to Get Attention

(By International News.)

Washington, Nov. 27.—A general revolt is being planned by farmers in the middle west against starving conditions in agriculture, according to reports in congressional circles here today.

The threatened outbreak, it is said, may assume proportions equal to the Ghandi revolt in India. Large groups of farmers practically penniless are reported to be planning desperate measures to focus attention of the nation on their plight.

One faction has already advocated a tax strike. The farmers would refuse to pay taxes or permit the seizure of their farms and to repudiate debts. They plan to throw themselves on the mercy of their communities.

Dublin, Nov. 27.—Mary McSweeney on her 27th day of hunger striking, suffered frequent fainting spells. Her sister Annie is on her eleventh day of hunger strike at the gate of Mount Joy prison and was reported to be very weak.

Barcelona, Nov. 27.—Many were lost when an excursion boat capsized off the Spanish coast, according to reports reaching here today. Ten bodies were recovered and seventy others are reported to be missing, will interfere at their peril.

EVANGELIST GIVES LECTURE ON VISIT THRU WEST INDIES

Mrs. McAdams Also Delivers Stirring Sermon at Services Last Night at Tent

At night Mrs. McAdams delivered a powerful sermon on the subject of "A Consecrated Life." She went back to Isaiah, 11:22 and took the prophet as he spoke of Jesus, and then she used the third chapter of Matthew where the spirit came on the son of God and how he was led into the wilderness.

She said that was just what the church members needed was the Holy Spirit to guide them into all truth. She told her hearers too many men were satisfied to stay on milk when they ought to be eating meat. She also hit the gossiping devil a lick. So many are ready to believe everything going. She used for her text "The Spirit of Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of fear of the Lord."

Mrs. McAdams will tonight preach on the subject of "Fire from Heaven." This will be an intensely gripping sermon and everyone is urged to come out and hear it.

TRAIN DEMOLISHES AUTOMOBILE TRUCK IN COLLISION HERE

Bill Smith, Ficklen Truck Driver, Has Narrow Escape From Death

Bill Smith, driver of an automobile truck for the E. B. Ficklen Tobacco Company, had a narrow escape from death or serious injury when the truck which he was driving was hit and almost completely demolished by a Norfolk Southern passenger train as it backed into the station here Saturday afternoon. The accident occurred at the crossing near the Export Tobacco Company and was witnessed by several persons engaged in loading trucks with hogsheads. While Smith suffered a few bruises he escaped without further injury.

Smith didn't see the train approaching in time to stop, so he shot the gas to the car and attempted to cross the track in safety. The train was approaching faster than he expected and struck the truck almost in the center. The driver stuck to his wheel and was hurled several feet.

The impact was so great the steps of the rear coach of the train were torn off and the coach partially derailed.

Another truck was standing a short distance from where the accident occurred and this would have probably been wrecked had not the train stopped in time.

ROAD SENTENCES PREDOMINATE IN MONDAY'S COURT

Several Minor Actions Disposed of By Judge Louis G. Cooper This Morning

A comparatively light docket was disposed of by Judge Louis G. Cooper in this morning's session of county court and work was completed long before the noon hour. There were two or three road sentences, but the remainder of cases were dismissed on payment of fines.

Moses Boyd drew eighteen months on the county roads on a charge of larceny.

ONLY FEW CASES IN POLICE COURT DURING MORNING

Again Play Prominent Part in Mayor's Court, Whiskey and Autos Today.

The Mayor stated this morning that as there had been several scares recently due to prowlers in back yards and about town late at night and that as there had been some petty larcenies such as chicken thievery going on, he had given orders to the police to require every person found on the streets after 12 o'clock at night to give a strict account of themselves and failing in this they should be held in jail on the charge of vagrancy, pending an investigation next morning.

He also stated that there were too many cars being left on the paved streets between 1 and 5 a. m. which is in violation of the town ordinance which requires all cars to be off the paved streets between said hours, so that the streets can be swept and kept clean. That in the future no excuse would be accepted, such as not being able to start the car, out of gas, etc. unless same was reported to the police at phone No. 1 at the time car was left out due to failure to start. That while it is natural during cold weather to have car trouble late at night and when no help can be gotten it is at the same time a mighty easy thing to do to call the police and report same, in which case an explanation will be considered, otherwise owners will be held strictly accountable for cars left on paved streets between said hours. WILLIAMSTON MAN IS INJURED WHEN CAR TURNS TURTLE

Eugene Price Suffers Fractured Ribs When Car Turns Down Embankment Near River

Eugene Price of Williamston, is confined in the Skinner-Smith emergency hospital today suffering from injuries sustained in an automobile accident at the end of Tar river bridge Saturday night about nine o'clock. There were two other men in the Ford roadster with Mr. Price when the accident occurred but they escaped without injuries. Price suffered several fractured ribs and abrasions but no internal injuries.

The accident occurred at the north end of the bridge on the embankment near the detour to Bethel. The car was making the turn into the main road, but ran too close to the edge and turned turtle down the ten or twelve foot embankment. It is considered short of a miracle how the other two men escaped without injuries.

The car was undamaged with exception of a shattered windshield and one or two broken wheels.

Price was rushed immediately to the hospital where he received medical aid. It was thought he was seriously injured at first but examination revealed nothing more serious than the fractured ribs.

MAN CUT TO DEATH AT SEVEN SPRINGS SATURDAY EVENING

Authorities Seeking David Wiggins Charged With Killing Clyde Moye

Kinston, Nov. 26.—Local police advised by telephone last night to be on the lookout for David Wiggins, 40 years of age, who is alleged to have murdered Clyde Moye, 20 years old young man at Seven Springs at 8 o'clock last night. Wiggins is declared by witnesses to have slashed Moye's throat apparently without provocation as the later, with several other men were sitting around an open fireplace. Wiggins is declared to be a man of bad reputation. Both are white men. A telephone message this morning from Goldsboro stated that Sheriff Grant of Wayne county and several deputies were in the Seven Springs section trying to apprehend Wiggins, who escaped immediately after the killing.

According to witnesses to the deed, Moye staggered from the room after he was cut and declared that he did not know there was any trouble.

AMERICA OPPOSES SECRET TREATIES CHILD DECLARES

Spokesman at Lusanne Conference Says Public Opinion is Against Secrecy

Washington, Nov. 26.—Ambassador Child's position of the Lausanne conference today of the American open door policy as applying to Turkey with the position consistently maintained by the Washington government. While official comment was lacking pending formal advice, there is warrant for the statement that Mr. Child's presentation has the full approval of the government.

It is noted here that in addition to reading the brief expression of the open door policy obtained in the recent American memorandum to the allied powers, Mr. Child declared it to be the American conception that universal adherence to that policy would go far toward promoting world peace. In so doing, the ambassador stated it can be said on authority the thought that has been uppermost on the minds of government officials here in their approach to the Mesopotamia oil question, the adjustment of Far Eastern problems at the Washington conference and similar diplomatic exchanges.

LIGHT SALES ON LOCAL MARKET THE PAST WEEK

Total of 761,816 Pounds Sold for \$235,600.77 at an Average of \$30.92

According to a report made public this morning by H. A. Bost, secretary of the Greenville Tobacco board of trade the local market last week sold 761,816 pounds of tobacco for \$235,600.77 at an average of \$30.92. For the entire season the market has sold a total of 18,001,458 pounds for \$5,487,764.65 at an average of \$28.88.

Sales were light the past week and it isn't expected there will be any noticeable improvement between now and the holiday season. Most of the crop has already been disposed of and sales will be light the remainder of the season.

GOVERNOR MAKES APPEAL FOR AID IN TURKISH ZONE

Every Citizen Asked to Observe Sunday, December 3 on Thanksgiving Day

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 27.—An appeal to all North Carolina to remember, during the season of Thanksgiving, the refugee victims of the Turkish advance on and massacre at Smyrna was made today by Governor Cameron Morrison in connection with the attempt of the Near East Relief and the Red Cross to succor the victims of this terrible disaster overseas.

Governor Morrison sets Sunday, December 3rd, as the specific day on which he asks all residents of this commonwealth to go a little deeper into their pocketbooks to aid the destitute who are now scattered over Thrace and Greece, their homes destroyed, exiles from their native land, with no food and only the clothes on their backs.

The Near East Relief has been hard put to take care of the 110,000 little motherless and fatherless children whom they are building into the new Armenian nation the Turks all but having exterminated the old one. Along on this comes the sudden throwing on their hands of over 800,000 women, children and old men, who fled from the Turks and thereby escaped the fate of 150,000 who were murdered in cold blood by the Turkish conquerors of Smyrna.

A recent appeal by President Harding and Will Hays' committee has brought an inadequate response, it is reported. In Governor Morrison's appeal he states that it would seem the people of North Carolina, as well as the rest of America, have not readily grasped the magnitude and pathos of the situation involving the absolute known destitution and near starvation of nearly a million women, children and old men.

Supplementing this appeal, Col. Geo. H. Bellamy, state chairman of the Near East Relief asks that checks and contributions at this time either be turned over to local county chairman for this great humanitarian organization or be sent to him or Robert A. Brown, State treasurer, 910 Citizens Bank Building, Raleigh.

TENNESSEE MAN KILLS FIVE OF HIS OWN FAMILY

Bristol Today Recovering From Most Heinous Crime in History of City

(By International News.)

Bristol, Tenn., Nov. 27.—Tennessee is recovering from the most heinous crime in history of the Appalachians. Bristol was quiet today and authorities settled to the task of getting evidence against a man whom they say slew five members of his family.

Ben Burchfield is being held without bond, charged with the killing of his father-in-law, mother-in-law, wife, sister-in-law and his own little son, then setting fire to their little home. Firemen discovered the bodies after the house had been burned to the ground.

ENGLAND WINS VICTORY AT NEAR EAST CONFERENCE

One month to Christmas. Do your shopping early as numbers of stores have already placed their stocks on display and are ready to serve the public. The busy housewife should begin shopping many days before the holiday season sets in as she will be enabled to get the pick of the stocks and at the same time avoid the holiday rush.

It is gratifying to note the value of milk is to be presented to public school children within the next several days. There is nothing in which the public is so greatly interested at this time, but it cannot mean what it should unless the children are impressed with the importance of it. Milk is the best food for growing children. If they are given plenty of it conditions should be much better than ever before. The campaign should be continued until every child is thoroughly impressed with the food value of milk.

Ayden has joined Farmville and Greenville in promoting the curb market movement and when the next summer comes it will find each town with a place where the farmer may sell his products and the housewife by them. This will be a great improvement over recent years, and women won't have to worry about where they will buy their next meal. The chamber of commerce is pushing the issue as much as possible and everything will be completed by time for the market to open. There is no question about the future of the market. It has proven a paying proposition to other cities and there is no reason in the world why it should not in Greenville, Farmville, and Ayden. The one thing necessary is for the farmer to bring his products here. If this is done the thing is bound to be a great success.

The appointment of Pierce Butler, Minnesota Democrat, to fill the unexpired term of supreme court Justice Day will be received with interest in all parts of the country. President Harding could not have made a better choice and will receive much commendation for the action. It is probably well that he has seen fit to give a few offices to democrats. The public was getting tired of everything going to republicans, even though this is a republican administration. There are strong men in both parties and if it ever becomes so they can work together harmoniously as they did during the war this will indeed be a great nation. Too much politics spells ruin even for the best of nations, and the United States is no exception particularly.

Democrats have centered their attack on the ship subsidy and the outcome of the fight will be watched with interest. This subsidy, it will be remembered, is President Harding's pet legislation and if it fails to receive favorable action it will be a severe blow to the chief executive. Much opposition has developed the last several days and indications at the time point to an extremely bitter fight. There is considerable doubt as to the advisability of the bill and this has resulted in such pronounced opposition.

Pierce Butler has signified his intention of accepting the appointment to the supreme court bench, but whether he will be confirmed, seems to be a matter of much doubt at this time. Senator LaFollette and others of his kind are opposed to the confirmation of Butler because of his opposition to railroad labor during the strike. With opposition developing among labor organizations it is extremely doubtful as to whether the senate will confirm the nomination.

Democrats have opened fire on the ship subsidy and before they let up the thing may not stand such good chance of getting through. President Harding has thrown his entire weight behind the measure and if that counts for anything it will be successful. The people, however, are growing tired of subsidies and tariffs and it is more than likely representatives from a majority of states will be instructed to vote against it. The country is in such shape that it will pay to go slow. If the subsidy can improve conditions to any extent, then everyone would favor it. But there isn't much chance it would do so and the best thing to do is to let it remain idle for awhile. This is the first time the president has taken definite stand in any issue except the bonus, but he won't meet with as great success this time.

Senators Hitchcock and Borah have attacked Georges Clemenceau, former premier of France, declaring his mission of no good to the United States. This kind of opposition is uncalled for and it would be better if the senators should keep quiet and discuss

the visit of the Tiger among themselves. There can be no doubt about the sincerity of his visit to America. He came to do exactly what he has said and if there is any chance of relieving conditions in Europe America should help him in every way possible. It is true we have given the foreign countries every assistance possible in a financial way, but still we haven't shown enough interest other ways. The old Tiger has spoken plainly regarding this matter and there is no use of anyone taking offense. He means it for the best of civilization and could certainly have no further object. Such criticism as Hitchcock and Borah have made is not of the constructive kind and will only embitter one who is trying to do his part by the world.

EXECUTION OF CHILDERS.

The execution of Erskine Childers, chief lieutenant of De Valera, for carrying a pistol in violation of Free State laws, has shocked practically every civilized country of the world. How any people can carry their animosity and hate so far is hard to understand.

The execution can mean but one thing, and that is a continuance of the bloody strife which has corrupted every branch of industry in Ireland. The irregulars will certainly seek revenge, and in doing so will disregard every law the Free State has seen fit to enact.

It is indeed a pity the life of Childers should have been taken for a crime of such insignificance. And more so because so many of his comrades have paid the price he has paid, only in different ways. The Free State government was not justified in going to the extreme in this case and would have done much towards pouring oil on the disturbed waters by following the man.

Ireland is in a bad plight and can't expect to improve as long as persecution of the rebels continues. It would be far better were irregulars placed in jail and held until the last sentenced. They would then have a chance of becoming useful citizens, a chance that should not be denied anyone.

The outcome of the execution will be watched with interest by other countries, and while it is hoped an improvement will take place, no one hopes for anything but continued bloodshed until the new government becomes more humane in its dealings with the enemy.
