HIGGS SPEAKS ON BUSINESS METHODS BEFORE ROTARIANS

Chairman of Business Methods Committee Spoke at Meeting of Club Last Week

Following is an address delivered by E. B. Higgs, chairman of business methods committee, at a recent session of the Rotary club.

The address follows: President Jasper and Fellow Rotarians:

International Rotary is asking that every Rotary Club in the world during March 1923 hold another meeting given to the consideration of Business Methods.

Tonight there will be a few talks on how the spirit of Rotary may shine through the daily lives in the ordinary conduct of our business; or in other words the practical application of our code of ethics in whatever business we may be engaged.

Luncheon Hall has already told you that there is nothing new about Rotary. He has told you that it is as old as the hills; that it has been taught by such great leaders and teachers as Buddha, Mahomet, Confucius, and the lowly Nazarine who trod the hills of Galilee, and Lunce as usual is everlastingly right, there is nothing new about Rotary, but there is something new in the application of the spirit of Rotary as taught by these great teachers.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR JOHN SCOVILLE HELD HERE TODAY

Remains of Son of Rev. and Mrs. V. P. Scoville Interred at Cherry Hill Cemetery

John Scoville, the fourteen year old son of Rev. and Mrs. V. P. Scoville died at the Wilson sanatorium yesterday afternoon at 7:45. The young fellow had been ill only a few days, having been carried to Wilson to undergo an operation for appendicitis. He was operated upon immediately after reaching the hospital but peritonitis set in and all efforts to prevent fatal results proved futile.

The body was brought to Greenville this morning on the Norfolk Southern train. Funeral services were conducted from the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church this afternoon at three o'clock by Rev. J. M. Wright, pastor of the Methodist church of Ayden, assisted by Dr. T. H. Plemmons, Rev. L. W. Smith of Greenville and Rev. S. A. Coppin, presiding elder of the Washington district of the Methodist Episcopal church. Interment followed at Cherry Hill cemetery.

Telegrams expressing the regret of the many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Scoville were received from many sections of the country today, and the floral tribute expressed in a mute way the high esteem in which the splendid young man was held.

John was one of the most popular members of the high school student body. He was in the ninth grade and considered one of the most faithful students in school. He was a leader among his many young associates and wielded a great influence in his boyish way. He had a genial and kindly disposition that made his a general favorite among everyone with whom he came in contact.

The young fellow lingered between life and death all day Sunday, but yesterday morning his condition was reported improved, although still precariously ill. Later in the day, however, physicians who had entertained strong hope of his recovery, gave up all hope. He was conscious when he passed away.

The deceased is survived by a father and mother, three sisters and two brothers.

Mr. Scoville is pastor of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church and has hundreds of friends who will condole with him in this moment of sorrow.

GOVERNOR CALLS ON EVERYONE TO AID NEAR EAST

Says Red Cross is Overtaxed and Needs Every Assistance Possible at This Time

Current news events and information given by reliable Americans, indicate that Christian civilization is confronted with a very serious emergency. Over 800,000 refugees of the Turkish victory and massacre at Smyrna, have been thrown on the hands of the Near East Relief and Red Cross in Thrace and Greece respectively.

The Near East Relief is already overtaxed to take care of the 110,000 little orphans, Christian martyrs of Armenia war heroes, whom they are saving from the Turk and building into a new Armenian nation.

The President of the United States recently appealed for funds to take care of the emergency created by these refugees from Smyrna. I am informed that the response has been altogether inadequate. It would seem that the people of North Carolina and the United States, have not readily grasped the magnitude and pathos of the situation involving the absolute destitution and near starvation of the women, children and old men.

I therefore make this additional appeal, at this season of Thanksgiving, for God's blessings to us, for the Christians in the stricken area, whose plight is a result of their loyalty to Christ. Unless we respond immediately, I am informed, thousands of these unfortunate refugees from Smyrna, will be dead before Christmas.

I request the Mayors, Woman's Clubs, Business Men's Clubs, philanthropic organizations and all other citizens of North Carolina to hold this tragedy in minds during Thanksgiving week, and I appeal to you again to make your responses equal to the emergency and worthy of the generous heart and humanitarian Christian spirit of our great state of North Carolina.

That this may be organized and definite, I hereby designate Sunday, December 3 as a special day of mass-meetings in our communities and the date on which those who are able to help, may send their contributions either to the Near East Relief in Raleigh or to their local county chairmen for this work, the climax of this appeal extraordinary.

It has become apparent that every congressman favoring the bill will be needed to prevent adoption of amendments that would kill it. Several amendments are needed to be voted upon.

Annual Business Meeting to be Featured by Discussion of Many Matters of Importance

The annual business meeting of the Greenville Kiwanis club will be held Friday evening at 6:30 o'clock at the Rotary home. The most important matter to be taken up during the evening will be regular annual election of officers. It is customary that officers only serve one term in Kiwanis and an entire change will take place.

As this will be the most important meeting of the year President James today urged that every member be present. This will be a strictly business meeting and no visitors will be entertained.

The Kiwanis club has made remarkable progress the past year and the final meeting, it is expected, will be one of the most eventful in months.

NEXT SUNDAY TO CLOSE CAMPAIGN OF THE BAPTISTS

Campaign to Raise Half Million Dollars the Most Strenuous in Many Months

Next Sunday, December 3rd, will close one of the most strenuous campaigns ever engaged in by the Baptists of this State. The issues of the campaign are still uncertain. If the Baptists of North Carolina succeed in raising the half million dollars which was due on their pledges to 75 million campaign two weeks ago, they will accomplish a feat that will astonish the world. But will they do it? That remains to be seen. They can do it, if they will.

The Baptist people, many of them at least, are no longer poor. It is estimated that the annual income of Southern Baptists is a billion dollars. If that be true, then North Carolina Baptists have an annual income of \$100,000,000. If they were to give only a tithe of their income to benevolent objects, they would give this year \$10,000,000. So far they have not yet reached one million, but another half million this week will put them well beyond the million mark. This is not one cent more than is needed to meet the barest necessities and save from disaster the seven objects sharing in the proceeds of the campaign, namely: State, Home and Foreign Missions, Thomasville Orphanage, Christian Education, Old Ministers' Relief and hospitals.

In every nook and corner of North Carolina this week, and all over the south, the faithful pastors, the laymen, the elect ladies and zealous young people of the Baptist churches are doing their best to carry their people "Over the Top." In most cases they are well organized and trained for this task.

Every Baptist in North Carolina is asked to give the money equivalent of at least one day's work to the Orphanage at Thomasville as a thank-offering during the Thanksgiving season. This should be sent direct to Treasurer F. B. Hamrick, Thomasville, by the church treasurers. This offering will doubtless help beyond \$100,000 and greatly help the ultimate result of the campaign.

FIVE GREEK MINISTERS AND ONE GENERAL ARE SENTENCED TO DEATH

Athens, Greece, Nov. 28.—In the face of a formal protest by Great Britain five former Greek ministers and one general was sentenced to death for contributing responsibility in the Greek defeat in Asia Minor by the Turks. The British, in a formal note, to Greece, threatened to break diplomatic relations if the ministers were given capital punishment.

TIGER OF FRANCE STILL UNDER FIRE OF THE SENATORS

Utterances of Clemenceau Subject of Conflicting Debate of Hitchcock and Others

Washington, Nov. 27.—The Tiger of France again came under fire in the Senate today when his utterances on his tour of the United States were the subject of a conflicting debate which was enlivened by an interruption from the galleries by a negro soldier.

Senator Hitchcock, Democrat, Nebraska, former chairman of the foreign relations committee, led off in the debate with an attack on M. Clemenceau and the French policies and was joined in the criticism by other Senators while Senator Myers, Democrat, Montana, came to the defense of the aged French statesman. Senator Owen, Democrat, Oklahoma, also expressed sympathy with M. Clemenceau's mission to America but criticized French policies.

It was during Mr. Hitchcock's attack upon the war time Premier in connection with alleged atrocities of Black French colonialists in Germany that the negro soldier who later gave his name as Lucius Jones, a patient at a government hospital near here, rose in the gallery and sought to question the Senator. Vice President Coolidge banded the gavel and Senator and attendants rushed forward and restrained the negro, so that the question was never asked but excitement prevailed in the Senate.

The negro soon left the gallery but returned for the rest of the debate while Senator Hoffin, Democrat, Alabama, incensed at what he termed an "insult" to the Senate, demanded the man's expulsion. There had been discrimination, the Alabama Senator shouted, declaring that in the past white women had been ejected from the galleries of both the Senate and House for interrupting debate while this time the disturber was permitted to remain.

Senator Curtis, Republican, Kansas and Hitchcock, however, expressed the belief that the negro had acted through ignorance and no action was taken in the case.

Senator Hitchcock, especially, criticized the statements of M. Clemenceau in reference to the quartering of French "black troops" on the Rhine, declaring that the former Premier's denials of the use of these troops had been disproved. He also attacked the French reparations demand on Germany.

TROUBLE BREWING AGAIN IN SECTION OF THE NEAR EAST

Hope of Establishing Permanent Peace Begins to Swindle Conference

(By International News.) Lausanne, Nov. 28.—Hope of establishing permanent peace in the Near East began to dwindle today and serious trouble is expected from the Turk and Russians as result of decision of the allies to reject the demand for full membership to the conference.

Many delegates have about given up hope that the parley will be a success, except as a means of patching up the temporary truce between the Turks and Greeks.

SLAYER OF FIVE TO BE GIVEN HEARING

Bristol, Tenn., Nov. 28.—Ben Burchfield, accused of slaying five members of one family, will be given preliminary hearing this afternoon. Police claim positive evidence which it is believed will bring about conviction. Violence is not anticipated four armed guards will attend the hearing.

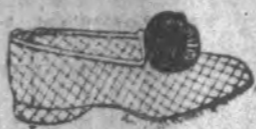

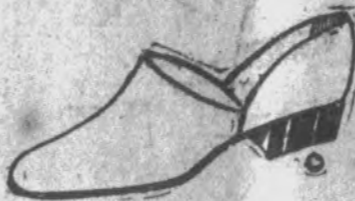

STRIKING COAL MINERS FIND CONSOLATION IN HUNTING AND FISHING

Charleston, W. Va., Nov. 25.—Resident and non-resident hunters paid into the treasury of West Virginia \$64,748 between January 1 and Oct. 1 of the present year in fees for hunters' licenses, reports of County Clerks for the nine months show. A total of 64,938 resident and 308 non-resident licenses were issued.

During the same period a total of 230 persons were arrested on charges of violating fish game laws. Convictions numbered 218. The majority of the alleged violations had to do with the dynamiting of fish. With sixty-two persons arrested and fifty-six convictions, Kanawha County led all other counties in arrests and convictions. The total of fines collected for violations of the game and fish laws was \$3,595.

According to officials of the Fish and Game Commission, the large increase in the number of licenses issued was due to the coal strike. During their period of idleness many of the miners sought relaxation in hunting.

HAWAIIAN UNIVERSITY IS SWAMPED WITH ENTRIES IN EGG-LAYING CONTEST

Honolulu, Nov. 27.—The University of Hawaii has many entries to its

egg laying contest, which opens November 1 and closes October 31, next year.

Each contestant is allowed a pen of five hens of uniform breed and age. Virtually every poultry fancier in the territory has entered at least one breed of fowl, and the committee in charge is at a loss to find means of correctly judging results.

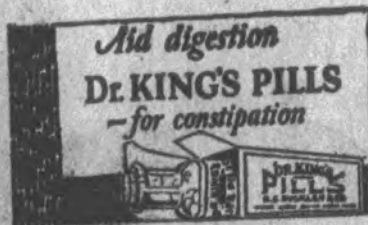

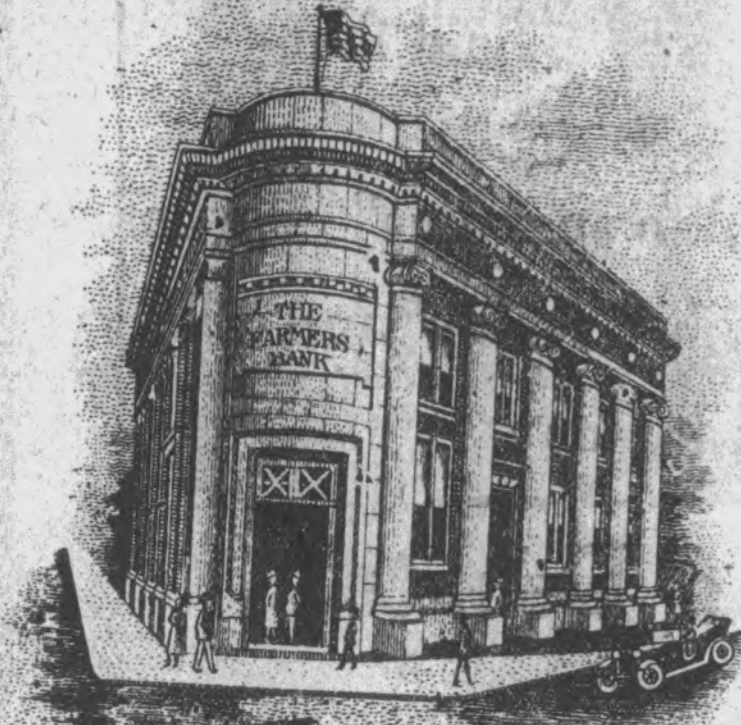

Hettie Green, who was said at her death to have been the richest woman in the world, had the reputation of being scrupulously honest. She cared only for gold and gave her life to acquiring it. Dying, a millionaire fifty times over, it is said that at her grave not a tear was shed. Rich. Not a pauper. Who is so poor as the person who holds no place in a human heart?

The practice of the spirit of Rotary does not mean that any business that is worthy of the name will suffer financial loss; it means more profits because the practice of the spirit of Rotary on the part of a business man will surely bring him the confidence of the public, and trade follows confidence.

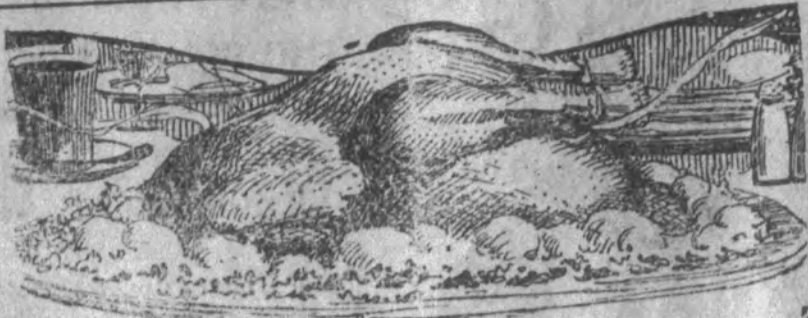
