CHECK UP SHOWS THOUSAND HOMES WRECKED BY FIRE

New Bern Conflagration More Serious Than at First Described

FORTY CITY BLOCKS COMPLETELY WIPED OUT BY THE FLAMES

Relief Work Makes Great Headway Under Red Cross Relief Workers

Friday's fire covered an area of 40 blocks and destroyed 1000 buildings, including homes, stores, warehouses and other structures.

For the first time today it was possible to obtain some estimate of the total damage done in Friday's great conflagration.

It was stated by one of the insurance men today that in his opinion about one-third of the total loss would be covered by insurance.

Relief Work Progressing Operating along wonderful systematic and orderly lines, the relief work in behalf of New Bern's fire victims is progressing splendidly.

The court house is the distributing point. Persons who have garments of any kind that they can spare, are urged to take them to the court house at once.

Efforts are being made by Captain Fisher, of the revenue cutter, Pamlico, to secure 100 knock-down houses from Camp Glenn.

Much clothing and supplies of various kinds are being received from neighboring cities.

Wilmington is making a huge shipment which will be received here tomorrow morning.

500 tents have come from Morehead City and 100 from Goldsboro.

One thousand mattresses and a like number of blankets will arrive on a special car, attached to the regular train, tomorrow morning.

Aged Colored Woman Meets Death in Fire

One person, a colored woman, lost her life in the fire which swept a portion of the city of New Bern Friday.

This woman, whom neighbors said was 105 years old, resided on Cedar street, near George and when onswinging flames reached that section of the city she was evidently forgotten by those about her and left her to her fate, being burned to death before she could reach a place of safety.

After the flames had swept that section the charred body of the victim was found. Coroner Harrisfield was notified of the finding of the corpse and went to the scene to investigate.

The woman's name or whether she had any relatives, could not be learned at the time.

CONFERENCE AT LUSANNE NEARS DANGER POINT

Question of Capitulations Will Make or Break Negotiations, It Is Said

Lausanne, Dec. 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—A review of the second week of the Near Eastern conference shows clearly that the negotiations have reached a point of danger.

Everybody realizes the extreme delicacy and danger of the negotiations or capitulations. The Turks have rejected all suggestions of the powers, including the United States that the special privileges enjoyed by foreigners in the past shall be retained, more especially any attempt to have foreign consular courts try cases involving foreign residents or foreign property.

Both Ismet Pasha and Dr. Riza Nur, plenipotentiaries from Angora, informed the correspondent of the Associated Press today that they would resist any attempt to place Turkey on a lower international standing than "smaller and less important states, like Greece and Mexico."

Same Only Different "We hear that the powers, including the United States, are thinking of substituting jurisdictional guarantees for the hateful expression 'capitulations'."

The leading European powers have received important help from Japan in their struggle to keep the foreign courts in Turkey. Japan herself suffered the same humiliation as Turkey and sympathizes with the Turkish attitude.

FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR THE NEW DAM MUSCLE SHOALS

General Beach in Annual Report Explains Work to Be Done at an Early Date

Washington, Dec. 4.—A total expenditure of \$16,557,087.00 was made for Muscle Shoals nitrate plants, of which \$275,927,000 was for maintenance due to cessation of work.

With funds now available it is proposed to construct dam number two. It is expected funds for this purpose will be available about September, 1923.

LOCAL RED CROSS COUNTY OFFICIALS TO AID SUFFERING NEW BERN PEOPLE OFFICES HERE TODAY

Public Asked to Give all Available Clothing for This Purpose at Once

The Pitt county chapter of the American Red Cross received the following telegram from Mayor Clark of New Bern in response to the offer of help which was sent the day of the disaster:

The need for clothing is intense and boxes will be sent from our Pitt county Red Cross at once. Everyone is urged to go through their wardrobes tonight and see if there's not suitable clothing or extra blankets which can be spared for poor families, both colored and white who are homeless.

EPIDEMIC OF FLU HITS PITT COUNTY

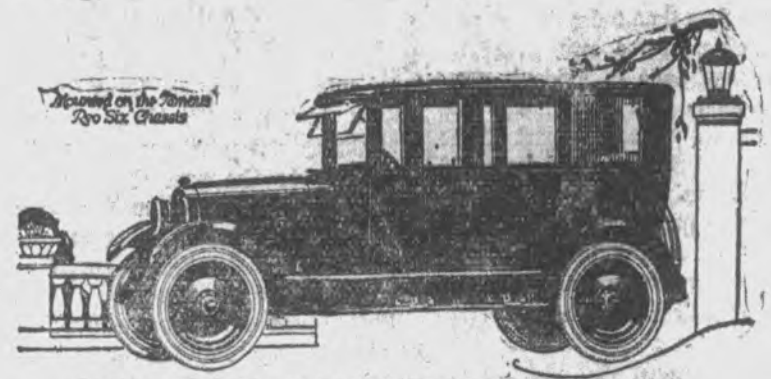

Several Greenville People went to New Bern yesterday to see the destruction wrought by the fire last Friday. They say that early reports failed to describe the real seriousness of the situation. In fact, forty city blocks were destroyed and from a thousand to twelve hundred people are homeless. Relief work has made considerable progress and practically all homeless people were temporarily housed Sunday night. The situation is in charge of Red Cross relief workers at this time and the next few days will see quite an improvement in conditions. While every city in the state has offered financial assistance to the stricken city, Mayor Clark graciously refused, stating that funds at his disposal at this time were sufficient to care for the situation.
