KELLER DECLINES TO TAKE PART IN DAUGHERTY CASE

Congressman Characterizes Hearing by Committee as "Comic Opera Performance"

VOLSTEAD ORDERS KELLER SUBPOENAED TO PRESENT FACTS

Minnesota Man Ordered to Appear Before Committee Today and Give Testimony

Washington, Dec. 14.—Representative Keller, of Minnesota, refused late today to participate further in the hearings before the House Judiciary Committee on the impeachment charges brought by him against Attorney General Daugherty.

Immediately after he announced his withdrawal, the committee in open session and without leaving its place voted to go on with the hearing; to subpoena Mr. Keller as a witness, put him under oath and question him as to the basis for his charges of high crimes and misdemeanors against the Attorney General.

This turn in the proceedings came with dramatic suddenness and was attended by a tumult and uproar seldom witnessed in a congressional committee room.

"I reiterate now," the statement said, "that I am in possession of evidence ample to prove Harry M. Daugherty guilty of all of the high crimes and misdemeanors with which I have charged him."

Mr. Keller came into the committee room after a brief suspension of the hearing, requested by Jackson S. Ralston, counsel for Mr. Keller, so he might confer with the Minnesota Representative.

When Mr. Keller asked to be heard Paul Rowland, counsel for Mr. Daugherty, demanded that the committee proceed with the hearing in the regular order agreed upon unless Mr. Keller desired to give testimony, in which event he could be sworn in.

Announcing that he did not have to be sworn, Mr. Keller said his statement had to do with the "conduct of this hearing" and he demanded the right to read it.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT REFUNDS BILLION ON PUBLIC DEBTS TODAY

Washington, Dec. 15.—The treasury department today refunded a billion dollars of public debt. It was the largest transaction since the war. The government paid \$700,000,000 for 4 3-4 victory bonds and \$200,000,000 for treasury certificates. It also paid a hundred million interest on the public debt.

BANK ROBBERS ESCAPE FROM JAIL IN FLORIDA

West Palm Beach, Fla., Dec. 15.—No trace was found today of Hanford Mobley, Roy Mathers, suspected bank robbers who escaped from the jail at Fort Lauderdale last night. They effected their escape through a skylight and are thought to be hiding in the everglades. The two were being held in connection with the holding of a bank at Stuart when eight thousand dollars was taken. Six thousand dollars was recovered following arrests.

(By International News.) London, Dec. 15.—Secretary Hughes has summoned Ambassador Harvel home to discuss European affairs, it was announced at the United States embassy today.

In response to the message, it was stated that Mr. Harvey would sail for America December 23rd.

British newspapers express belief that the visit will be a forerunner of American intervention in reparations discussion in Europe.

ATTACK LAUNCHED AGAINST KLANSMEN AND PROHIBITION

Dry Laws and Klan Denounced at Annual Conference of State Executives

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Dec. 14.—Prohibition and the Ku Klux Klan were considered prominently at the fourteenth annual conference of Governors at sessions today and tonight.

Governor John M. Parker, of Louisiana, in an address late today, declared prohibition was a flat failure and denounced the Ku Klux Klan. He was joined in his attack on the secret organization by Governor Ben W. Olcott, of Oregon, who referred to the Klan in an address tonight as a national menace.

The Louisiana Governor said he referred to the subject of prohibition because of the intention of President Harding to call the Governors in conference next month "regarding the matter of prohibition enforcement." Declaring that prohibition was almost a farce, he said it was infinitely better to abolish the saloon, permit light wines and beer to be sold and have the government regulate the manufacture and distribution of liquor with penitentiary sentences for those who defied clear and explicit liquor laws.

Both the prohibition question and the Ku Klux Klan, Dr. Parker said, were black clouds threatening law and order. The Klan, he continued, was spreading over the United States and working under the mask and cowl, rising supreme to law and order. He asked that the governors put themselves on record at the conference as advocating that America should be ruled by her judiciary and not by an invisible clan; that no masked men should be allowed to parade the streets; and that federal legislation be enacted requiring secret organization to file semi-monthly with the department of Justice sworn lists of their memberships.

"The boast of the Ku Klux Klan," said the governor, "is a boast of 100 per cent Americanism, but not once has the Klan offered assistance to the department of Justice or tendered information to officers enforcing law and order."

NEW NAVAL PROGRAM OF QUARTER BILLION

Washington, Dec. 14.—As a reason for requesting the president to urge the other powers to limit construction of warships of 10,000 tons or less, Chairman Kelley, of the subcommittee on appropriations, who wrote the request into the naval bill, told the House today the Navy Department had recommended a navy construction program costing \$331,000,000.

"The world must stop up this ten thousand ton hole if it hopes to reap the fruits of the disarmament conference," Mr. Kelley declared in the course of an hour's speech in support of the bill.

EDENTON MAN AND WOMAN ARRESTED HERE YESTERDAY

Couple Returned to Edenton to Face Charges After Registering as Man and Wife Here

W. A. Griffin and Mrs. Florence Hardison, of Edenton, who registered at a local hotel as man and wife were returned to Edenton this morning in custody of Policeman W. C. Moore, of the Edenton police department to face charges of immoral relations. While this is the only charge the woman was held on the man will also face charges of check cashing, abandonment and closing of mortgage goods.

The couple registered at a local hotel as man and wife and would probably have gotten along alright had not someone from Edenton recognized them and wired Edenton authorities of their whereabouts. Local authorities were notified to hold the couple until an officer could be sent for them.

Officer Moore stated that Mrs. Hardison has a husband living at Edenton and would only face one charge following her return home, that of immoral relations. Griffin is also married and has a wife and several children.

The couple was arrested here yesterday afternoon, only a short time after their arrival and as a consequence no charge has been launched against them here.

FORDNEY PREPARES TO SUBMIT PLANS TO SETTLE BONUS

Two New Proposals Will be Presented Harding for Executive Approval in Few Days

(By International News.) Washington, Dec. 15.—Two plans for paying a bonus to four million war veterans will be submitted to President Harding within the next few days for executive approval, Representative Fordney, father of the bonus measure told representatives of the International News today.

The plans will provide for the issuance to each veteran a tax free bond equal his bonus, bearing three percent interest and maturing in twenty years. It will be subject to retirement in five years. The second plan would provide a paid up insurance policy upon the same condition. The maturity of both plans will probably involve the use of interest on foreign debts to insure bonus obligations.

BEAUTY SPECIALIST COMMITS SUICIDE

Chicago, Dec. 15.—Mrs. Lorraine Porter, twenty-year-old beauty specialist was found in a dying condition today as result of mercury poisoning. She had taken two hundred tablets. She died a few moments after being found. A note was at her side, stating that the act was committed because her lover failed to marry her.

KING OF ENGLAND PLEAS FOR UNITY OF THE ALLIES

London, Dec. 15.—A plea for allied unity in face of dangers confronting Europe is seen in the king's speech to parliament. It is believed the plea was directed towards France.

TOBACCO MARKET CLOSES FOR THE HOLIDAYS TODAY

Market Closes Following Completion of Sales to Reopen January 9th

The Greenville tobacco market closed for the holiday season following completion of sales today and will re-open Tuesday, January 9th. A major part of the crop in this section has already been disposed of and sales will be light the remainder of the season.

The year has been a highly successful one for the local market. Farmers from many parts of the country have sold here and to say they were highly pleased would be expressing the matter mildly.

The price situation here has probably been more favorable than on any other market in the state. This proved a great attraction to farmers from afar who visited here for the first time.

FINAL SHOWDOWN OF REPARATIONS VERY IMMINENT

Part Which United States Will Play, However, Has Not Been Determined

(By International News.) Washington, Dec. 25.—A final showdown is imminent in the reparations controversy in which America's voice will play an important part. The exact part which the United States will play has not been determined.

This has formed the subject of cabinet discussions for several weeks and will be uppermost in the minds of President Harding and cabinet when they meet. It is unlikely any plan will be settled upon until the arrival of Ambassador Harvey from London who will be fresh from the conference of allied premiers. The gravity of the situation is shown in the fact that this is the first time Harvey has been summoned home since he was sent abroad.

WOMAN VICTIM OF BRUTAL ASSAULT

Lee County Woman Is Discovered Dead in Her Lonely Home by Neighbors

Sanford, Dec. 14.—The blackest crime ever committed in Lee county was unearthed Wednesday morning when the dead body of Mrs. Laura Waddell was found in her little home about 11 miles from Sanford by two of her neighbors, a Mr. Gunter and a Mr. Spivey, who went there to see if anything was wrong, as she had not been seen since Thursday of last week.

On arriving at the house her body was discovered lying on the floor in a pool of blood, her clothing and underclothing torn away and the contents of the room turned topsyturvy. They at once notified a son-in-law, F. H. Brown, a merchant of Jonesboro, who came to Sanford and reported the matter. Mr. Brown's impression was that she had died a natural death and C. P. Rogers, local undertaker, was instructed to go out and prepare the body for burial. When he arrived at the home he saw that it was a case for the coroner, and notified Sheriff Rogers and Dr. C. L. Scott, coroner, who went to the scene at once.

The congregation understood that the religion of Jesus Christ could bring a quick change in people and it didn't take thousands of years to do it either. Mr. Adams said that when God made man he made him in His own image and He is still the same. People have gone forward in the world of wisdom, but spiritually men have drifted, and many are far from God, but still they are people, he declared.

The call was made last night and a number came forward and accepted Christ and gave bright testimonies of their salvation.

The message tonight will be delivered by Mrs. McAdams on the subject of "Seeking the Lost." This promises to be one of the most inspiring of the revival series and everyone is invited out to hear it.

HERRIN MASSACRE SCENES DEPICTED TO PACKED COURT

Witnesses Tell of Hurrying of Prisoners Through Streets in Preparation for Death

Marion, Ill., Dec. 14.—The march of several hundred armed men driving before them through the streets of Herrin six blood-stained prisoners and the finding later of 20 bodies, was described to the jury by several witnesses today, at the trial of five men held in connection with riots of last June.

Before the tense audience, who packed the sombre court room to the doors and overflowed into the stairway leading to it and the corridors below, witnesses for the State pointed out three of the defendants as men they had seen with weapons in their hands the morning of the tragedy.

Six of the bodies, according to testimony of J. Marshall Lentz, a Herrin real estate dealer, and I. N. Lentz, his brother, who is a blacksmith and a member of the United Mine Workers of America, were bound together with a single rope about their necks. Fourteen other dead or injured victims were found just outside the Herrin City cemetery on the outskirts of the town, they testified.

DOUBTED DEVIL AND IS FIRED BY COLLEGE

Liberty, Mo., Dec. 15.—Dr. A. Wakefield Slaten, head of the Biblical Literature Department of William Jewell College here, announced Wednesday he had been ousted because his recent book, "What Jesus Taught," revealed religious views not in accord with those of Baptists generally in Missouri. They characterized the views as radical.

He was accused of disbelieving in miracles, Satan and demons, and admitted it. He was also in a controversy about the date of the writing of the Book of Daniel, placing it at 167 B. C., while ultra-conservatives said it was in the sixth century B. C.

His most serious fault, in the eyes of the Fundamentalists, lay in viewing the Bible as literature rather than as an inspired work, and calling the story of creation in Genesis an interesting Hebrew folk tale. The study of the Bible as literature, he said, marked an advance from the dogmatic standpoint.

BRITISH PREMIER DECLARES GERMANY NEAR COLLAPSE

Bonar Law Tells House of Commons that Reparations is Still Far From Settled

FRANCE MUST GET RIGHT WITH BRITAIN BEFORE SETTLEMENT

There is No Hope for Solution Unless Two Nations Get Together on Question

London, Dec. 14.—Germany is very near to complete collapse, Prime Minister Bonar Law told the House of Commons today. He declares that this was the only information he could give the House on the subject of reparations.

The Prime Minister said there was almost no hope of a solution of the reparations question unless Great Britain and France acted together.

The British government, he declared, could not look with equanimity upon any action by an ally which would have the effect, not of reducing reparations, but of making it more difficult, if not impossible, to obtain them. This was taken as a reference to the French proposal for occupation of the Ruhr.

The Prime Minister emphatically argued the impossibility of Great Britain paying the American debt while receiving nothing from Germany, France or Italy. He said he was convinced such a policy would reduce the standard of living in this country for generations.

It would be a burden upon Great Britain of which those who suggested the policy to conception, he believed.

The Prime Minister said public opinion abroad "assumes that we are able to meet our obligations and help our friends."

"In reality," he insisted, "we are in no such position. We are paying 100,000,000 pounds yearly to the unemployed."

Threatened Collapse is Borne Out by Reports.

Washington, Dec. 14.—Information reaching the American government through trade channels, it was said today, tends to bear out the statement of Premier Bonar Law that an economic collapse is threatening Germany. In fact, it was declared, Germany appears to be approaching the point where she will be unable to import food in sufficient quantities to feed her people. No estimate was made however, as to when her food supply would be exhausted.

So far as the Allied debt situation was concerned, officials maintained silence. The position of the United States, however, has been repeatedly stated as one holding the debt question to be distinct from reparations.

ANOTHER FIRE AT NEW BERN

Unoccupied Building Destroyed by Blaze Believed of Incendiary Origin

New Bern, Dec. 14.—Fire, believed to have been of incendiary origin, early today destroyed a large unoccupied dwelling house on National avenue within two blocks of the ruins of the Roper lumber mill which was burned two weeks ago. The property which was owned by W. B. Parker was built by W. C. Willett and for many years was one of the most handsome homes in the Riverside section.

The blaze was discovered this morning by Alexander Mann, an invalid who said he had been unable to sleep during the night and got up just before one o'clock to prepare a cup of coffee. He telephoned the alarm to police headquarters, and hurried to the home of F. R. Sutton which adjoined the burning building to rouse the occupants. It was the second time the latter's house which was only recently completed, was threatened during the past two weeks. It escaped without damage again.



U. S. S. IOWA TO END AS NAVY TARGET

(By International News.)
Philadelphia, Dec. — The battleship Iowa, veteran of the Spanish-American War, recently passed down the Delaware from the local navy yard on its way to Hampton Roads, there to be put in final shape for its last voyage to join the twilight fleet of the American Navy—those obsolete battleships which have ended their existence as targets for the guns of their comrades afloat.

The Iowa enjoys the unique distinction of being the only wireless-controlled warship in the world, and has demonstrated its ability to manoeuvre under orders sent by radio from a control ship miles away.

Heretofore the Navy has bombarded stationary ships anchored as targets, but in February, off Panama, the Iowa will provide a moving object to test the gun pointers' skill. In her decks are patches over places where she was hit by dummy bombs of cement hurled from airplanes some time ago in experiments off the Delaware Capes.

Whether the old warship will only last a few minutes under the fire of the navy's superdreadnoughts or will stand the rending smash of the monster shells for a longer period remains to be seen. As planned, there will be intervals between salvos to permit observations of the damage wrought for use in future design of the government's battleships.

The passing of the old ship brings many regrets among naval reservists here who served aboard her during the world war.

TIDAL WAVES GRAND HAWAIIAN SPECTACLE

(By International News.)
Honolulu, Dec. — Tidal waves in most parts of the world are cataclysms. In the Hawaiian Islands, however, they are regarded as spectacles of surpassing sublimity—stage pieces of a nature simultaneously to be feared and admired.

Almost at the same time that the disastrous quake and resultant tidal wave were wreaking havoc in Chile a similar performance, without the tragic aftermath, was being staged in the Pacific, some 6,000 miles to the westward on the Island of Hawaii. It was the second largest city in the Hawaiian island group.

The rise of the waves which swept over parts of Hilo within three hours of each other were so accommodating as to give most of the inhabitants plenty of time to get to elevated positions to enjoy the spectacles. Furthermore, the waves washed ashore immense quantities of fish, which the Hilo children picked a willing to collect. Hawaiian children, native and islandborn alike, are almost amphibious, so that a great tidal wave even that did no damage beyond sweeping a fleet of firm sampans and floating Coconut Island, a small piece of land in Hilo Bay could not be expected to hamper the activities in garaging a lucrative fish harvest.

DRY LAW RUINS TASTY FRENCH-AMERICAN DISH

Paris, Dec. — "What is America without lobster a l'Americaine," writes Pargloss in L'Oeuvre. He feels that one of the essential symbols of the nation is going to disappear through the laws of prohibition. "We owe many thanks to our American friends for great inventions from the Taylor method to the telephone, but one of the most blessed appears to me to be toward a l'Americaine. Since America has become dry it is impossible to cook a good lobster, for this dish demands a drop of wine—very little—but even the little is lacking now."

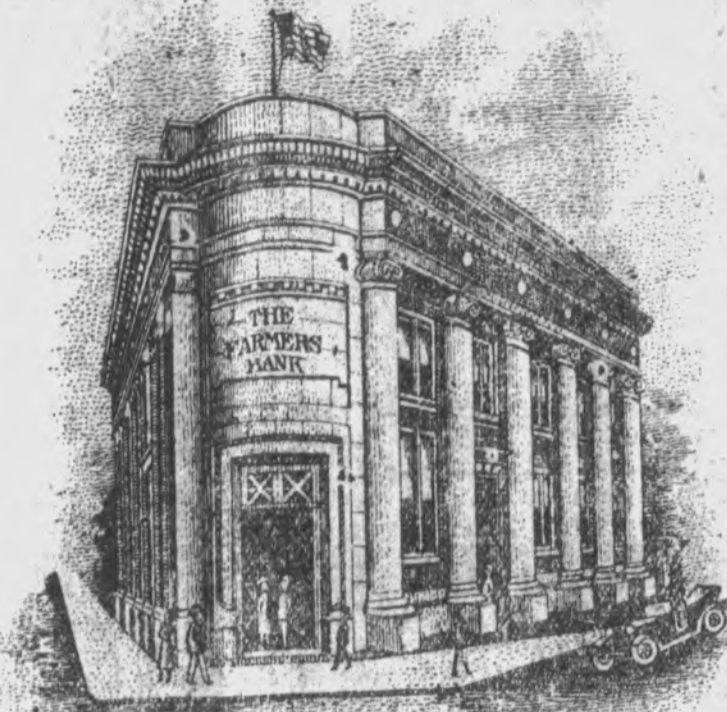

have been handled and the children are now in school taking advantage of the opportunities offered them. No branch of work means as much to the county as this and it is the duty of every appreciative man and woman to support the welfare officer in his effort to improve environment of neglected children.

Clemenceau has ended his mission to the United States and returns to France highly pleased with the spirit of his reception. While he undoub-

edly created a favorable impression in some circles, there is serious doubt as to his principles since the articles written by David Lloyd George. While the Britisher hasn't been in America he has secured a great audience through leading daily papers and will be able to reach as many people

Allied debts have caused the various nations considerable trouble of late. The most of them are trying to find some way out of paying what they owe and the others to collect what its owed thme. The question has become rather pronounced and unless something definite is decided upon there is no telling what the outcome will be. The United States should be more directly concerned than all others, as she has millions of dollars involved. We have enough to run us, however, and are letting the others do the worrying.

Something must be done to protect railroad crossings in and around Greenville before the loss of life becomes greater than it already is. These places are the greatest menace to the public in the city and unless something is done to improve the situation loss of life will become appalling. The railroads should either place a flagman at the dangerous places or erect gates. The general increase in traffic is some parts of the city through which the railroad passes causes the trains to become of greater danger than ever before. Something must be done to bring about an improvement and we trust it will not be delayed much longer.

The United States will ask Great Britain, France, and Japan to assist in reaching an agreement regarding the limitation of small sea crafts and airships. Whether this request will meet with favor remains to be seen. Each nation, however, should be ready to do anything to cut expenses and especially those of Europe. The United States is in far better shape to continue building operations than the majority of nations and unless the request meets with favorable consideration we can continue to build and hold our own. But this will hardly be necessary as it is certain France and Great Britain will be glad to enter such an agreement. If we preserve a state of peace, then we should be able to cut various building programs without fear. The saving will be far greater than the average person imagines and should help the various countries get back on their feet.

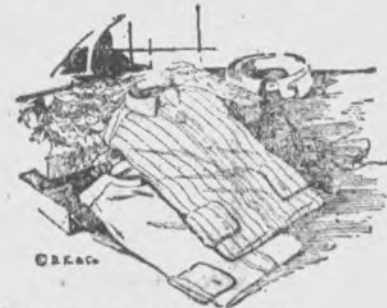

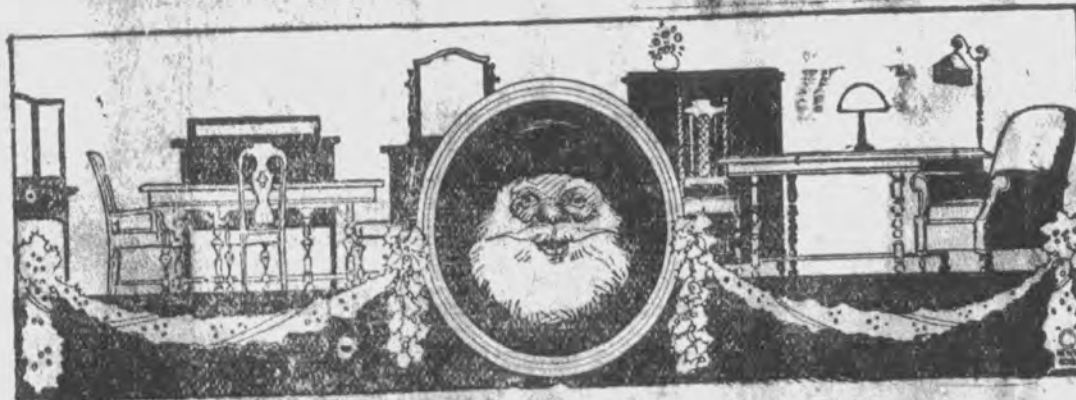

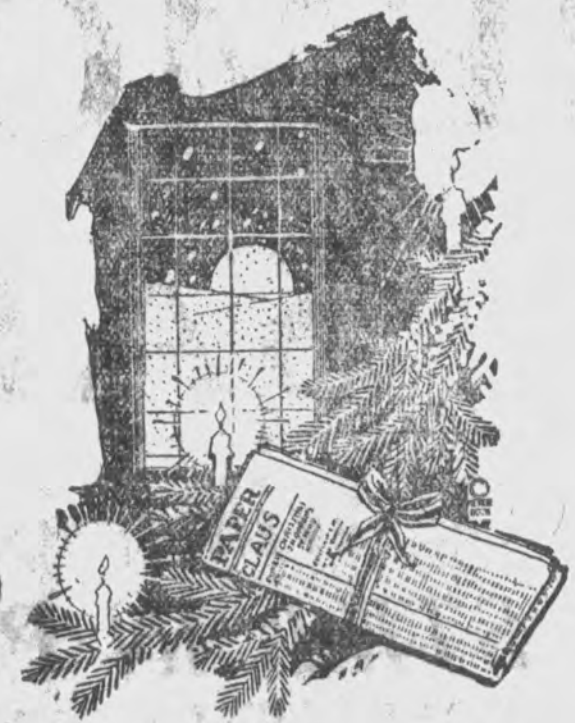

RESERVE OIL NATION IS GREATLY IN NEED

Washington, Dec. 8.—When the flow of that liquid gold known as petroleum gives sign of slackening, and as a consequence the whir and hum of the country's millions of flivvers and motor busses and tractors seem likely to desist for lack of fuel, the far-reaching reserves of oils hale in the United States stands out as the most important resources of substitutes for petroleum oils, states the Bureau of Mines. These shales, veritable reservoirs of oil, underlie enormous areas of the country. Those of the most economic importance occur in Colorado, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming. Great areas of black shale occur, however, in various eastern states, notably Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio. The great economic importance of oil shales is that, when the industry is properly developed, the United States will have a new domestic supply of mineral oils, which cannot be cut off in time of war, and which come what might, will always be ready to help meet the nation's demand for oil, no matter what the world's petroleum situation may be.

The future of the oil shale industry in this country, the Bureau of Mines considers, will depend primarily upon the relative supply of, and demand for petroleum products, particularly in the regions remote from seaboard. There is good reason to believe that in the next several years the domestic production of petroleum will decrease, while the demand for its products will increase, and oil shales can well make up for the deficiency of crude petroleum as a source of refined mineral oil products. Even under the most favorable condition development of an American oil shale must be slow, although this can be hastened by the employment of highly-trained specialists, the proper kind of experimental work, and sincere and mutual helpfulness among the oil shale operators.

Large sums of money will have to be invested before the oil shale in-

dustry becomes one of important commercial consideration. It is probable that the investment necessary for an oil shale restoring and refining plant will approximate \$3,000 per barrel of shale oil daily capacity. The present annual domestic output of petroleum is at the rate of over 400,000,000 barrels, and to replace that production with shale oil would require nearly 1,100 shale restoring plants, each putting through 1,000 tons of shale daily, every day in the year. This is assuming that the shale yields 42 gallons of oil per ton. The total quantity of shale mined would be over 400,000,000 tons, which approaches the annual coal production. The investment of retorts and refineries alone for an industry of this magnitude would be over \$3,000,000,000.
