OFFICER RIDDLED WITH BULLETS BY WHISKEY THIEVES

Bandits Make Away With \$10,000 Worth of Liquor at Kentucky Distillery

Bardstown, Ky., Dec. 21.—Keeping three guards cornered in the office by laying down a barrage of pistol fire, bandits attacked the T. W. Samuels' Distillery, near here before dawn today, broke locks and escaped with 88 cases of bonded liquor in a motor truck. It is thought a dozen men participated. The liquor was valued at between \$10,000 and \$16,000.

First warning of the attack came to the guards when a fusillade of shots shattered windows and punctured doors in the office of the plant, where the watchman stayed between rounds. The guards laid flat on the floor and maintained that position for nearly an hour while frequent bursts of firing crashed through the windows.

All telephone wire near the distillery were cut by the bandits. The guards, harassed by the sporadic bursts of fire, were unable to return the shots or even see the attackers. Only when the work of looting the warehouse had been completed and the shooting subsided did they venture out to summon aid.

The office was literally riddled with bullets, windows were broken and woodwork splintered.

The bandit was wounded and his co-operators were captured and one escaped during a battle with police today when the later encountered the robbers as they were carrying liquor from the quarters of a sacramental wine and chemical firm to a motor truck outside.

After the fight in which nearly 30 shots were fired, the proprietors were found locked in a washroom. The robbers had carried out fifty cases of champagne, said to have been valued at \$140 a case when the police squad appeared.

Peoria, Ill., Dec. 21.—An attempt to loot the Woolner Distillery was frustrated early today by guards who fought off a gang of ten men after a gun fight. An automobile and a truck used by the raiders aroused the suspicion of the guards.

When the guards asked the men their business, the raiders opened fire, which was immediately returned. One man was seen to stagger back as if hit. The bandits in their car and truck.

The Woolner distillery was recently looted of thousands of gallons of bonded whiskey by thieves who dug a tunnel to the warehouse and drained the barrels by means of a garden hose syphon.

WEDDING DAY TRAGEDY

GRIPS IN "SMILIN' THROUGH"

The killing of a bride on her wedding day provides just one of a score of big dramatic moments in Norma Talmadge's remarkable first National starring vehicle, "Smilin' Through," which comes to the theatre on Christmas night.

REINSTATEMENT OF ROSCOE ARBUCKLE CAUSES BIG STIR

Action of Will Hayes in Permitting Comedian to Re-enter Industry Causes Sensation

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 21.—Roscoe C. Arbuckle, comedian, was making ready today for his re-entry into pictures Jan. 1st, while members of the Los Angeles District Federation of Women's Clubs announced that they "could not recede from their opposition to his plans."

After Will H. Hayes, head of the motion picture industry, announced here yesterday Arbuckle might have another "chance" to make good, the Los Angeles District Federation advised a resolution confirming a previous one, opposing his re-appearance in pictures.

Mrs. J. C. Urquhart, president of the District stated that although Arbuckle at his third trial had been acquitted of causing the death of Virginia Rappe, screen actress, the testimony was of such a character as to bar him forever from appearing before a decent, self-respecting public.

Livingston, Mont., Dec. 21.—Clergymen here informed that Roscoe Arbuckle had been given a chance to come back in filmdom, said: "Give Fatty a chance."

Rev. S. R. McCarthy, president of the Livingston Ministerial Association, added that the organization would not ask motion picture theatres to bar new Arbuckle productions.

LUSANNE PARLEY ABRUPTLY CLOSED BY ALTERCATIONS

Delegates in Excited State of Mind as Conference Closes, It is Said

Lausanne, Dec. 21.—A wordy altercation between ex-Premier Venizelos of Greece, and Riza Nur Bey, Turkish nationalist delegate, caused Signor Montagna, president of the Near East conference commission on minorities to abruptly end this morning's session of the commission.

The dispute was over the question of liberty of emigration, M. Venizelos bitterly attacked the Ankara government and protested against the alleged deportation of Greeks by the thousand from Anatolia.

Mr. Anderson also stated that the government would bring suit against the Bridgeport Brass Company unless there was an agreement for settlement of the war claim of the government against that company at a conference to be held next month.

Riza Nur replied in the same vein, charging Venizelos with being responsible for the Turco-Greek war and its consequences.

The voices of the two delegates rose to a high pitch, both speaking at the same time and refusing to heed the pleadings of the president that they calm down. In view of this Signor Montagna declared the session adjourned amid confusion.

SEVERE WEATHER REPORTED AS FAR SOUTH AS FLORIDA

Rain, Sleet and Snow Grips Many Parts of the South Now

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 21.—With one section covered with sleet and ice, with forecast for snow, and another section slushing through rain with temperatures slightly above freezing, the South early today is in the grip of its first blast this winter. Miami and points on the Florida peninsula, however, continued to be bathed in sunshine, with average temperatures of 70 degrees.

Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina are reported covered with ice, following storms during yesterday. Indications for North Carolina today show little relief, with rain on the coast and probably rain or snow in the interior.

Virginia is also slated to have snow in the interior with rain on the coast.

Rain is the forecast for the eastern section of South Carolina.

Georgia shivered early yesterday, then later became soaked with rain. The thermometer in the northern section registered at the freezing point, rising only five degrees during the day. Cloudy weather is the forecast today, while fair and warmer is scheduled for tomorrow.

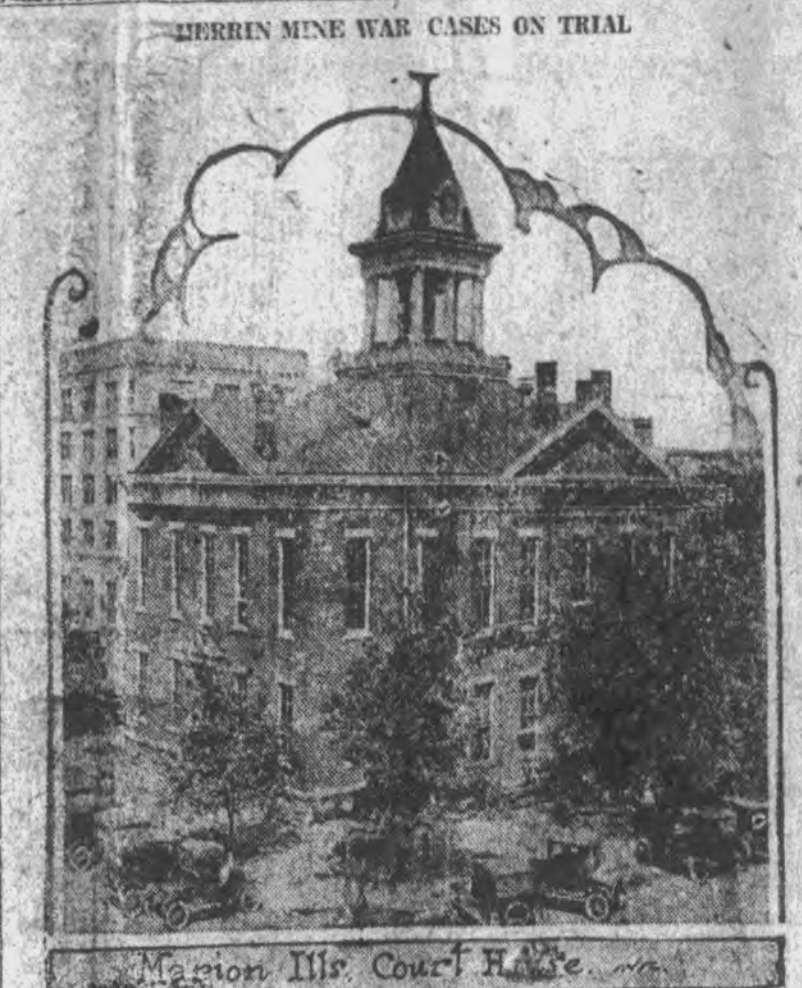

SEVERAL INJURED IN SPECTACULAR FIRE IN NEW YORK

More Than Thousand Persons Driven From Home in Panic as Homes Crash in

(By International News.)
New York, Dec. 22.—More than a thousand persons were driven from their homes in panic and between fifty and sixty were injured, including thirteen firemen, in a spectacular fire which swept a block of old frame dwellings in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn this morning.

Dutty Fire Chief Chana was removed to a hospital with a broken neck. He was caught under wreckage when a roof of one of the buildings collapsed. Neighbors were thrown into a panic and people rushed screaming from their homes, carrying children and valuables with them. Many were in their night clothing and suffered severely in the cold.

He will also have a model poultry house on exhibition at every meeting point, and show every farmer how the flock should be housed and cared for. He will also talk of the different feed mixtures for making hens lay, and how to grade and pack the eggs for market.

With the necessary changes which will be made in our farming program in the next few years, poultry will play a much more important part in the future. Every farmer, and every farmer's wife and children should be intensely interested in learning these practical things about poultry, and not only farmers, but those people in town who keep backyard poultry should hear Mr. Oliver when he comes to Pitt county. The dates and places of meetings will be announced later.

SEARCH CONTINUES FOR MISSING MEN IN LOUISIANA LAKE

Divers From Saint Louis Search Lake for Bodies of Kidnapped Men

(By International News.)
Metairie, La., Dec. 22.—Search is being made today for the bodies of two men and James Richardson, who was kidnapped August 24th and has not been seen since.

Divers searched the bottom of Lake Cooper, and state troops guarded all lakes last night to prevent the bodies from being moved, in case they were thrown into the lakes. Almost all men in the parish volunteered their services to aid in the search.

Divers arrived yesterday from Saint Louis to start work in the lake which at some points is thirty feet deep. Citizens are armed to the teeth and are taking every precaution to guard themselves.

Those in charge of the search have said nothing regarding their operations. Sheriff Carpenter stated that he would place his forces at the disposal of federal authorities. He is believed to be watching several suspected of taking part in the kidnapping.

BRITISH ASKED NOT TO PUT CREDENCE IN AMERICAN MEDIATION

London, Dec. 22.—Leading British newspapers have warned people not to put much credence in the report that the American commission will attempt to mediate the reparations crisis. This news is regarded as semi-official and was circulated by the British as denial. Most newspapers ridiculed it editorially.

FIRE DESTROYS ONE OF LARGEST CHURCHES IN QUEBEC, IT IS SAID

Quebec, Dec. 22.—Fire damage estimated at a million dollars was sustained when one of the largest churches of the city was destroyed. Authorities believe to fire to be of an incendiary origin and suspect religious maniacs. The chief of detectives stated that he had received letters saying that the church would be burned December 28th.

POINCARÉ BELIEVES AMERICAN ISOLATION POLICY WILL HOLD
Paris, Dec. 22.—Premier Poincaré, central figure in German reparations negotiations, told members of the International News Service today that he believed the reports of possible American intervention in the reparation situation to be false. He said he believed the American policy of isolation would remain intact.

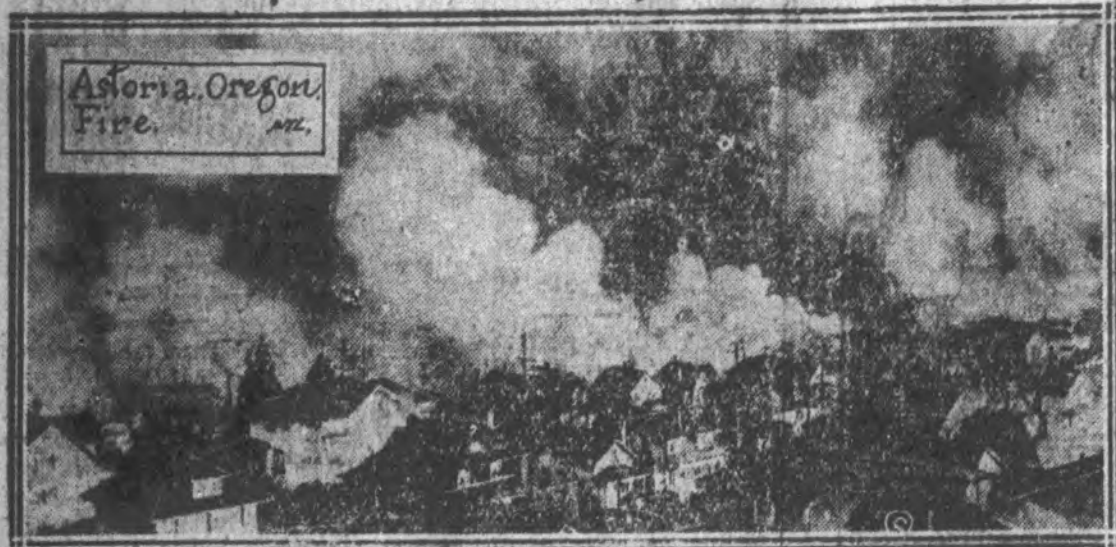

BIG BEAR WRECKS GLACIER PARK HUNT

Bruin's Second Trip to Get
More Results in Downfall
Recently

(By International News.)
Helena, Mont., Dec. — How a giant silver-tipped bear wrecked the interior of the Many Glaciers Hotel in Glacier National Park recently is told in stories brought out by belated tourists who remained after the regular season had closed and all places had been shut down.
This bear had apparently tired of a herbaceous diet and started out for a change. Finding the hotel closed and no obsequious porter on hand to take his baggage, he tore off a heavy storm door and threw his weight against the inner door, breaking it from its hinges.
Then he started to give the place the once over. In doing so he pulled

down shelves on which provisions had been stored. Glass jars were broken and their contents scattered around. Cans, saucers, plates and other dishes all suffered the same way. Flour, bacon and other articles of food were damaged at random.

In the pantry Bruin found some jars of honey. From these he evidently ate his fill, without being able to consume it all, and he left the rest for another visit. That subsequent visit was his undoing. Curly McGill, watchman of the place, discovered the wreck when he came back from a trip to another part of the park. So he struck around.

Lured by the taste of the honey, the bear came back for more. McGill was waiting for him and finished him with one well-directed shot.

The bear measured five feet nine inches from tip to tip. When shot, the big fellow dropped onto a large packing case, in which some of the hotel stores were kept. His immense weight crushed the box.

Estimate of the damage done place the figures close to \$5,000. The damage consisted of broken dishes, ruined provisions, smashed furniture

and broken windows, through which the bear had thrown things apparently not to his liking.

WHOOPIING CRANE, NEARLY EXTINCT SPECIES, KEPT IN COLD STORAGE 5 YEARS

Lincoln, N. Y., Dec. — Five years ago a whooping crane, now almost extinct, although plentiful enough in the days of the buffalo, was shot near Lincoln, Nebraska.

Today the bird, just as fresh as the day it was killed, is in the possession of Louis A. Fuertes, ornithologist, of this city. Since the day of its death, until it was shipped eastward, the bird was kept in the cold storage plant of a Lincoln ice cream company. It is a record for cold storage preservation.

So rare is the whooping crane that two years ago, when the American Museum of Natural History desired to mount a group, it was impossible to locate a specimen.

Fashionable Bootleggers Arrested in Washington

Jerusalem, Dec. 21. — Christmas Day in Bethlehem will be marked this year by an unusual pilgrimage of children to the Little Church of the Nativity. Five hundred Armenian

boys and girls from the American Near East Relief orphanages in Jerusalem will march to Bethlehem with gifts made by them in their industrial school, which they will place in the Grotto where tradition says Christ was born. The gifts are of wood and metal.

In fact, the popular three-year-old division had no real champion for the first time in many seasons, although a dozen or more horses flocked up from time to time as possible candidates. Out of an uncommonly inconsistent lot, Lucky Hour was possibly the best.

Other leading three-year-olds were Kai-Sang, a staunch contender against Lucky Hour for whatever honors there were; Whiskaway, Pillory, Hen, Snell 2nd, Rintine, Rodanster and Oceanic.

Of the two-year-olds Willis Sharpe Felmey's Sallie Alley earned the title of champion, particularly by his splendid racing during the late stages of the campaign.

Morvich, unbeaten two-year-old of the 1921 season, began by winning the famous Kentucky Derby of a mile and a quarter at Churchill Downs, but suffered a startling form reversal thereafter and never won another

race. He is now retired, after losing to Whiskaway at Aqueduct and upon all subsequent starts.

Pillory won the Peakness by a head from Hen, but neither ran well thereafter. Snell 2nd was a great sprinter for a brief interval but flopped badly later.

HOMESTEADERS HASTEN TO TAKE UP 10,000 ACRES OF FARM LAND

(By International News.)

Los Angeles, Dec. 22.—Resembling the "Gold Rush Days of '49," approximately 400 persons jostled and milled together recently about the offices of the Federal Land Receiver in an effort to file homestead claims on 10,000 acres of choice Southern California farming land which have been within the confines of the famous Irvine Ranch, near Santa Ana, for more than fifty years.

Most of those who appeared at the land office sought leave to file on

the full 100-acre quota allowed under the Government Homestead laws. However, there were others who asked for but forty-acre plots. The land on which the files were made was supposed to have been contained on the original Mexican land grant, but the filers, who are disputing the claim, stated the owners of the ranch included within its boundaries 10,000 acres of land not a part of the original plot.

plan probably, but suppose the other
side gets tired of talking and calls
for a vote?

The community Christmas tree to
be given at the Cotton Mill Christ-
mas day should contain hundreds of
presents from the thoughtful people
of Greenville. There are many little
fellows here who will get very little
this year unless the public comes to
their rescue and we trust the com-
munity spirit will be general in this
effort to make this year's tree the
great success it should be.

Tomorrow will be the last shop-
ping day before Christmas and the
rush will be terrific at all stores. The
purchaser can help the tired, worn
out clerks greatly by shopping as
early as possible so the last minute
rush will not be so heavy. All
stores and business houses will re-
main open until a late hour at night
to take care of the belated shopper
and there is no reason why everyone
shouldn't be able to get exactly what
they want.

The Welfare department has found
several families of Greenville in great
need and the public is asked to give
as liberally as possible to them.
Christmas for these people will hold
little joy and gladness unless the
liberal hearted people of the com-

ment provide for them. Sufficient funds
should be raised to make them com-

provide for those in need. It is an
occasion that everyone should give to
those unable to provide for them-
selves, and it is hoped Greenville peo-
ple will not be slow in responding to
the call of the welfare department.

Don't forget to let those last min-
ute letters and packages contain Red
Cross tuberculosis Christmas seals.
You will not only be accomplishing
one purpose but doing something to
help suffering humanity. Christmas
seal funds will be devoted to the re-
lief of those suffering from the dread
disease, and the more seals sold the
more money the Red Cross will have
for this purpose. The cause is one
of the greatest the public has had
an opportunity of helping and it is
hoped everyone will do what they can.

Congressman Upshaw, of Georgia,
one of the greatest supporters of
the prohibition enforcement legisla-
tion in America, in a speech before
the House, declared that American
people should emulate Marshall Foch,
who refused to touch intoxicants
while in America out of respect for
prohibition laws. He declared our
people should do nothing tending to
trample the constitution under foot,
such as violation of liquor laws
represents. This is splendid advice
and it is to be hoped the American
people will do their best to live up
to it. Congressman Upshaw is one
of the best known statesmen in the
country. He is well informed on all
subjects, and whatever he may say
regarding prohibition enforcement
may be considered authoritative. He
realizes the great evil resulting from
bootlegging, such as the government
is trying to cope with now, and is us-
ing his every influence to down the
traffic. If every other statesman
was as sincere the time would not
be far distant when conditions would
be considerably better.

Fatty Arbuckle will be given an-
other chance in the motion picture
industry, according to a ruling of
Will Hays, head of the picture busi-
ness. Whether the public will attend
theatres producing Arbuckle pictures
remains to be seen, but it will be in-
teresting to learn that the king of
fun is back in the game after being
connected with one of the greatest
scandals the country has ever known.
That many years will pass before
public confidence is restored in the
great comedian cannot be questioned
and for this reason there is much
doubt entertained regarding his fu-
ture appearance on the screen. Cer-
tainly the employment of such a
character will have no good upon
the morals of the country and the
public reception will be watched with
interest in all parts of the country,
and especially by people who one time
found so much pleasure in seeing
Arbuckle act the part of a funny
man.

Cotton storage warehouses are re-
ceiving considerable attention among
farmers in all parts of the country
at present time and the next cotton
planting season no doubt will find
many new houses constructed to
house the crop. The saving the
farmer will realize through improved
storage facilities will pay for the
houses in comparatively short time.
The same applies to the potato stor-
age warehouse, which is probably
even more important than that for
cotton. Pitt county alone loses
thousands of dollars annually as re-
sult of rotten potatoes and there is

no way of avoiding continued loss
unless storage houses are erected.
Pitt county already has one or two
cotton houses, but conditions will
never be what they should unless each
community has one or more. The
next few months should see increased
activity on part of the thrifty grower
as this is one of the most direct
ways which his industry will become
ever greater than it is at the present.

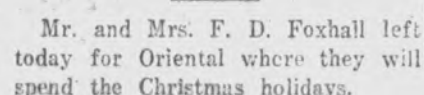

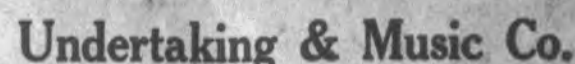

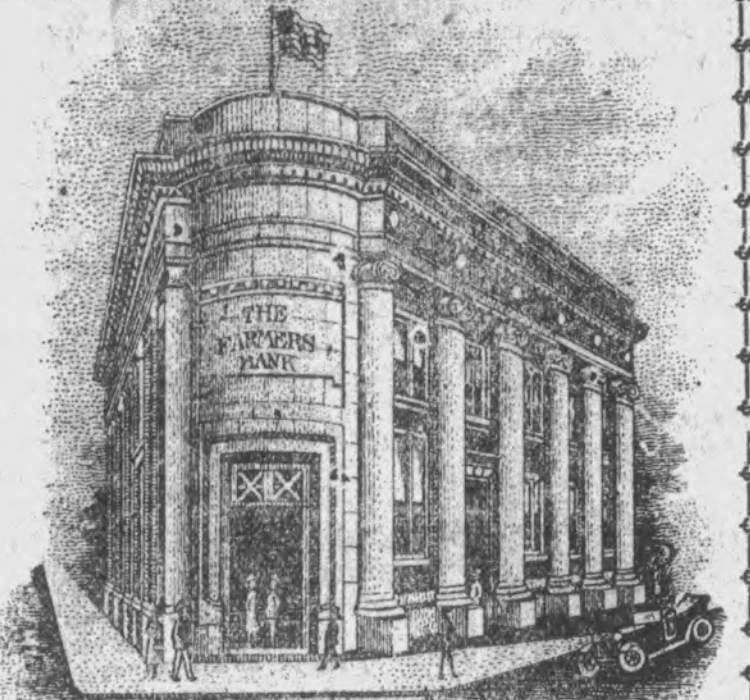

WOMEN ABROAD ARE PUZZLED OVER NATIONALITY NOW

U. S. Gives Them Right to Retain Citizenship, Though Wed to Foreigner

(International News)

London, Dec. 22.—"The Women Without a Country" is the theme of a doleful song that is heard all over London these days whenever American women gather to sip tea and chatter.

Since the passing of the United States law, giving American women the right to retain their American citizenship even though they marry a foreigner, there has been great discussion here as to choice of citizenship.

London is full of American women who became British subjects when they married British men. Now they don't know whether they are British or American, nor whether they have dual nationality, American nationality in America and British nationality in Great Britain.

Lady Astor may sail for home and vote in America and then return to England to take up her seat in the House of Commons, according to one interpretation of this new American law, which hasn't been received with reciprocal recognition from Great Britain.

"What am I?"

"Can anybody tell me what I am?" cries out Crystal Eastman, sister of Max Eastman, a woman who is well known throughout the United States. "Year and years ago I started life as an American citizen, and I have in America all my life," she explains. "But in 1916, by marrying an Englishman, I became willy-nilly a British subject."

"When I left New York I carried a British passport. On September 22, however, while I was on the high seas President Harding signed the Equal Citizenship bill, which gives an American woman the right to retain her citizenship, no matter who she marries. And I became an American once more! So far so good. I have enjoyed being a British subject, but I cannot deny that I was happy to be taken back into Uncle Sam's family once more."

"Now, again all is confusion. So long as I stayed at sea on an American ship I knew that I was. But at the end of ten days I was put off at Tilbury Docks—I stood on the soil of a country which has not recognized this new right of married women, where the wife of a British subject is perforce a British subject, no matter where she was born. So am I not once more a faithful subject of King George?"

"All sorts of questions arise: Shall I register as an alien or trust to luck that I am what my passport says I am? When I get ready to go back shall I go to the British Home office or to the American consul? Will both offices refuse me a passport? (If I shall I get two passports, one to get out and one to get in, on?)

"On the whole, I think I shall let the lawyers worry over this problem of dual citizenship. I am busy enough rejoicing at the genuine feminist achievement involved."

It is small wonder that when American women meet in London they ask: "What are you today—British or American?" Attorney General Daugherty ought to speak up and stop this discussion.
