## CAPITAL PUNISHMENT WILL STILL CONTINUE AS LAW IN THIS STATE, IS RULING OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

**Seduction Bill Will be Bitterly Fought Within the Next Few Days**

**NUMBER OF CHANGES IN HOUSE RULE ARE BEING CONSIDERED**

**Morrison's Ship Bill is Still in Its Infancy, But Liable to Sprout Wings**

Raleigh, N. C. Jan. 4.—Defeat of the bill, introduced in the North Carolina legislature today by Representative T. E. Owen, of Sampson county, which would provide for the abolition of capital punishment in the state of North Carolina, was predicted to-night by Democratic members of the House of Representatives.

Many surprises within the next few weeks on important bills and proposals was also forecast by Democrats in both houses. Much opposition is expected to be stirred up, according to several House members, from the bill, which was introduced today, which would provide for the conviction of a man accused of seduction on the unsupported testimony of a woman plaintiff. This bill was offered in the form of a repeal of the present statute.

Important changes in the House rules were also under discussion to-night. Prominent among these was a rule which would provide that each member who introduces a bill would place it in a box provided for that purpose, instead of standing for recognition of the speaker, which is now the case. Another rule would attach to the speaker the authority to designate which committee would receive the bill. It has been the custom for representatives to designate the committee upon presentation of the bill.

No committee meetings in either house were scheduled over the weekend unless unforeseen incidents might necessitate a call meeting.

The fate of Governor Morrison's ship proposal was still being discussed tonight. In a general sense legislators are not inclined to express a definite opinion of the matter. They are not inclined to meet the direct question as to their attitude with the reply that they wish to know more about it. Just what form the Governor will use to present his project will not be known generally until next Tuesday when he is expected to deliver his address to the legislature.

The rules committee will report to the House tomorrow, after which further bills will be brought before the body, while the senate will resume its reception of measures and may entertain discussions.

**BERGDOLL BELIEVED TO BE ABOARD SHIP BOUND FOR WILMINGTON**

Wilmington, N. C., Jan. 3.—Hunt Bergdoll, slacker who escaped from a military guard at Philadelphia two years ago, is still of the coast. Authorities believe he is aboard the steamer Aquarius, from Bremen to Wilmington. A coast guard cutter will attempt to intercept the ship. The legion is patrolling the shores to prevent the slacker from landing in a small boat.

## SCHOOL BUILDING PROGRAM TO COST \$25,000,000, SAID

**Dr. E. C. Brooks Makes Statement Regarding Program Now in Progress**

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—The state school building program begun in 1921 will cost when completed about \$25,000,000 according to Dr. E. C. Brooks in his biennial report now being printed for distribution among the members of the General Assembly. The State loan fund of \$5,000,000 authorized by the General Assembly of 1921 will go into buildings, generally located in rural and small towns, which when completed will cost approximately \$9,000,000.

In his discussion of the equalizing fund of the State, Dr. Brooks stresses the importance of divorcing the public school system from the revaluation of property.

"Charges in property values due to natural causes or to the arbitrary action of officials has caused the amount of the equalizing appropriation to individual counties to vary considerably. It is very desirable, therefore, since the State levies no ad valorem tax and since it is disposed to leave the determination of the values of the property of the several counties to the local officials, that the equalizing fund shall be apportioned on such a basis as to make it impossible for reductions in property values in a county, except from extraordinary causes, to affect the amount to be apportioned from the State. In other words, we should divorce the State equalizing fund so far as possible from the revaluation of property. This can be done if we will determine in advance of the levying of taxes and the opening of schools, the amount of money that shall be apportioned from the State equalizing fund to the several counties."

## DEBT COMMISSION FROM BRITAIN IS IN UNITED STATES

**Commission Reaches Washington for Negotiations With President**

Washington, Jan. 4.—The British Debt Commission, headed by Stanley Baldwin Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Montague C. Norman, Governor of the Bank of England, arrived in Washington tonight prepared to take up with the American Debt Commission the subject of funding Great Britain's war-time debt of more than four billion dollars.

Members of the American commission said today they were ready to enter into negotiations but would have no proffers to make beyond the limitations established by law. They had no information, they declared, as to the British proposal and declined to discuss in advance of their receipt the reported British plans. A denial was made today by Treasury officials of any thought being given to changes in the debt refunding act to give the American commission more attitude in the negotiations. Some members of the commission, however, including Secretary Hughes and Representative Burton, Republican, Ohio have taken the view that certain changes should be made. Questions concerning suggested changes, however, were put to American commissioners today, were met generally with the statement that nothing could be said, or should be said in advance of the actual presentation by the British of any proposition they have to make.

It was believed formal discussion of the funding question would be delayed until early next week, although members of the commission are expected to make calls of courtesy on government officials and members of the commission with which they will deal in advance of that time.

## TWO WHITE MEN KILLED IN RIOT AT SUMNER, FLORIDA

**Several Negroes Also Reported Dead as Result of Assault on White Woman**

(By International News.)

Sumner, Fla. Jan. 5.—The bodies of Henry Andrews and Boly Wilkerson are lying dead where they fell last night in race rioting at Rosewood where two white men and numerous negroes were slain.

Reports that the trouble is not over. White men are waiting for reinforcements before renewing their attack on the house where more than twenty negroes are besieged.

The rioting grew out of an assault upon a young white woman by a negro who is still at large but who is believed to be in the building besieged.

It is estimated that a score or more of negroes were killed in the riot. Twenty-five are reported to have surrendered at the house besieged by more than a hundred white men. Further rioting is expected to break out hourly. The situation is serious and it is probable troops may be called out.

## FICKLEN DENIES HE WAS ASHAMED OF OLD CAROLINA

**Local Man Denies Reported Interview Recently Carried by News and Observer**

E. B. Ficklen, prominent tobaccoist and member of the state prison board who lately returned from Europe, issued a statement today denying a reported interview with him at Raleigh as recently carried by the News and Observer. The story gave Mr. Ficklen credit for saying that he was ashamed of North Carolina as result of recent electrocutions at the state penitentiary. "The soil of North Carolina is too sacred to be ashamed of, Mr. Ficklen says, in disclaiming the statement, "and I never have had cause to be ashamed of her."

The statement to The Reflector follows:

January 5th, 1923.  
"From your paper of Wednesday I see that you have copied from the News and Observer the report of statements I made in Raleigh concerning electrocutions at the State penitentiary. The whole reported interview is about as inaccurate as the inaccuracy in reporting my name. The only correct statement attributed to me is that stating that I am in favor of capital punishment."

I do not care to engage in a newspaper controversy. I have neither the time nor the inclination. But I do ask you to correct the following statement: "The story, he says, created considerable commotion in Paris, and it was with shame that he admitted that he is a resident of the State." I desire to say that the soil of the State of North Carolina is too sacred to me to ever be ashamed of her. My statement was, and I reiterate, that I was ashamed of the report sent out from my State. Our country and State stands among the nations of the world in the first class for civilization and Christianity, and with the weak, doubtful and tottering nations of Europe looking to us for light and guidance, such report as was sent out by the News and Observer to the New York Herald, and published in the European edition of same, is not calculated to improve the moral standing of those nations now standing on the brink of despair.

Concerning the Raleigh Times criticism, they say, "We wonder if he has ever attended an electrocution." I give the Times my answer and I am sure that they stand for fair play and will publish my reply. No, I have never seen an electrocution, and

## TO BEGIN FIGHT AGAINST K. K. K. IN STATE TODAY

**Senator Baggett Says He Will Introduce Unmasking Measure Before House**

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—The first gun in the expected legislative war against the Ku Klux Klan in North Carolina will be fired today, according to an announcement by Senator J. R. Baggett, of Harpeth, who expects to introduce his bill making it a crime to appear in public masked when the Senate convenes today. Senator Baggett has other measures in mind, including one prompted by the undebated report that Judge Henry A. Grady, of Clinton, is a high officer of the secret organization. However, the Harpeth legislator has chosen his unmasking bill as a means of ascertaining the temper of the General Assembly toward the "Klackers."

Since he announced several weeks ago that he would make active warfare on the Klan when the legislature got into session, Senator Baggett has received hundreds of letters on the subject, most of them commendatory but some of them going so far the other way as to be downright abusive.

One letter, which Senator Baggett says is typical of a score of anonymous communications he has received ranges all way to negro blood in its ridiculous charges is signed "I. John" and dated at Salisbury on December 11. The envelope in which it was mailed was postmarked at Salisbury on December 15th and Senator Baggett infers from the discrepancy in the dates that the letter was written elsewhere and sent to Salisbury to be mailed.

The letter, which begins "Dishonorable Sir," and grows vituperative as it goes along, follows:

"You are tearing your shirt unnecessary about the K. K. K. All because you can't get into it I suppose. Although I am not one myself I know nothing about it. For that reason I do not talk about them—for I do not know when I would be talking to one."

## TAXI DRIVER IS HELD IN MURDER CASE IN NORFOLK

**Percy Page Released on Charge of Killing Wealthy Automobile Dealer**

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 4.—In police court today Justice R. B. Spindle refused to accept without investigation a professional bondsman as surety for A. Ruffin Lambert, taxi chauffeur, held for manslaughter in connection with the death of Harry Gale Williams, Jr., yesterday morning.

H. Saunders, a professional bondsman, offered himself as surety for Lambert and Thomas S. Hogue, another chauffeur, held as a material witness.

Lambert is accused of pushing Williams from a taxicab in front of the latter's home on Spotswood avenue, as a result of which Williams fell out and fractured his skull. Bond of \$1,000 was asked for Lambert and \$500 for Hogue.

Justice Spindle required Saunders to furnish a list of bonds on which he is surety before accepting him as a bondsman for the two chauffeurs.

Percy A. Page was released from custody. He had been arrested yesterday on a charge of murder and was at liberty on \$10,000 bond with his father, H. L. Page, as surety. Police are convinced he had nothing to do with Williams' death.

The case against Lambert was continued until January 10, and witnesses have been summoned to appear before a coroner's jury Saturday afternoon.

**Delegates Leave in Friendly Mood, Despite Divergent Views in Evidence**

**BRITISH DECLARE THEY WILL RETURN AT LATER DATE**

**German Reparations Tangle is No Nearer Settled Than When First Started**

Paris, Jan. 4.—Alliance between France, Great Britain, Italy and Belgium remained loosely grouped together on that subject, while England, although separating from them, expects to co-operate and especially with France on other questions.

The conference of the Premiers which has been in progress here since January 2nd, ended with friendly words.

The conference of Allied leaders, which has been endeavoring for the past three days to find common plan for solution of the German reparations problem, was amicably dissolved late today with British delegation in disagreement with the representatives of France, Italy and Belgium on the question of how to deal with Germany in this connection.

The British delegation will leave for London tomorrow. The representatives of France and Belgium will continue to exchange views as to what measures should be taken jointly and will issue a collective note at the conclusion of their deliberations.

A former statement of Prime Minister Bonar Law just before the conference broke up, stated the British considered the French proposal, if put into effect, would likely bring disastrous results to Europe's economic life. At the same time France was assured that the British government, and it was believed the British people, remained unchanged in their feeling of friendship for France.

Poincare, in reply, stated a long study of the British proposal had increased the French conviction that they meant over throw of the treaty of Versailles, as well as a considerable education of the debt due to France, and France could not accept them. M. Poincare accepted thanks for the friendly statement of the British and declared the feeling of France and her people towards Great Britain remains unchangingly cordial.

## FIRST CHAPTER OF LOUISIANA MOODED MURDER IS PENDING

Bastrop, La., Jan. 5.—The first chapter of the revolting tale of modern crucifixion will be published today when the state of Louisiana launches an open hearing on the infamous hooded mob murders at the Moore House parish.

This legal step is provided by the old Spanish custom marks the opening shot in the state's first effort to punish the slayers of Watt Daniels and Thomas Richards, who were tortured to death last August. The state blames the Klan for the crime. A veil of secrecy surrounds the intended legal movement but it has been ascertained that the state intends to show as few cards as possible.

## VERNON SPRATLEY APPOINTED JUDGE

Richmond, Va., Jan. 4.—C. Vernon Spratley, of Hampton, was appointed by Governor E. L. Trinkle today as judge of the Eleventh Virginia circuit to succeed the late Judge Clarence W. Robinson. The circuit embraces Elizabeth City county and the circuit court of Newport News. Judge Spratley's term of office will expire at the beginning of the next regular session of the general assembly.

## BRITISH ASK AMERICA TO CONSIDER REPARATIONS

London, Jan. 5.—It was authoritatively reported in Berlin that the British have requested the United States to call an international conference next week to consider the reparations deadlock, said a Central News dispatch.

Flat failure of the conference at Lausanne is predicted at this time. This information will be received with genuine regret on all sides, as it was hoped some plan of settlement might be decided upon. The allies have done right in holding Turkey down. As long as they are able to do this thing will run along smoothly. Turkey is considering her interest entirely and will go any length to accomplish this end. The allies have a hard battle to fight before things are settled, but determination to defeat purpose of the Turkish government eventually will accomplish something.

Speeding automobiles are still a great menace to anyone traveling along the hard surfaced roads of the county and unless something is done they will become even a greater danger. While considerable money would be necessary to maintain two or three officers on the principal roads of the county, it would nevertheless prove a paying proposition in the long run. Fines alone would pay the officer. In fact, some man could make a handsome salary by policing the main roads, and the county should swear such a man in and give the plan a trial. Something must be done to bring about an improvement and the sooner it is the better everyone will feel about it.

If the average boy knew that a day in school means exactly \$12.50 him the schools would be the busiest places in town. Most boys, however, think going to school is the greatest burden that could be imposed on them and do everything possible to get out of studying as they should. The national board of education has compiled statistics showing that every day a school means exactly \$12.50 to the average boy. If this fact could be placed before every child there wouldn't be quite so many skipping school and doing everything possible not to take advantage of the opportunities presented them.

North Carolina is one of the greatest states in the Union, agriculturally and otherwise. Years ago we had a mighty low rank in an educational way, but since that time we have been climbing until we are pushing some of the others mighty hard for first place. We rank sixth in the production of crops. If this isn't a record to be proud of, then we can't understand exactly what is wanted. The next two or three years conditions will improve as much as in past years. We have just awakened to our great resources and the awakening has meant something to every branch of industry. Eastern North Carolina has done its part in helping the state establish its great record and will continue to until the end of time.

Pitt county farmers should not fail to take advantage of the mammoth incubator recently purchased in Pitt county as it opens up a way of the realization of greater revenues. No farmer should try to operate a farm without sufficient chickens to keep his family well provided with eggs, and also have some to sell to town people. But how many do so. The great trouble with Pitt county is because we have never given enough attention to the production of things we consume ourselves. When it comes to tobacco and cotton, nothing we can do is too great. But when things we need ourselves are considered they get very little attention. This condition must be improved before things become better and the earlier it is realized the sooner Pitt county will forge to the front as the greatest county in North Carolina.

## PROTECTED CROSSINGS NECESSARY.

Unprotected railway crossings constitute the greatest danger which the public of Pitt county is confronted by, and it does look like something

could be done to protect such places. Why other cities can have protected crossings and Greenville cannot is something we have never been able to understand. If the railroads are responsible for providing this protection the town commissioners should pass some law making them do so.

If the town and county are responsible, then they should take the necessary action. While only a few lives have been lost in the past as result of the places, the danger con-

## SPEEDING MUST STOP.

Placards, warning automobile drivers to go slowly have been placed along principal streets of Greenville and should be seriously considered by those prone to drive at a high rate of speed despite the danger of doing so.

Those guilty of violating the speed law after they are confronted by warnings every few yards should be severely prosecuted. The placards say "You may be guilty of manslaughter by reckless driving."

The truth of this statement is realized by very few, except those who have run down and seriously injured someone. Traffic laws must become more drastic as good road mileage continues to increase in Pitt county. Unless this is done deaths will be far more frequent than they have ever been before.

It is to be hoped our courts will meet with the same effect as road stop dealing out fines. They do not sentences, and the latter is certainly more advisable. Speeding must be reduced at any cost and it would be much better to send a few fellows to the roads than for several persons to lose their lives as result of reckless driving.

Two or three eggs and toast for breakfast is about all the average business man wants anyhow, but how many get them. They eat something else in preference to eating cold storage eggs. And who can blame them. One never knows what he gets when buying cold storage stuff and it is much better to buy something we know is fresh.
