GRAND JURY FINDS TRUE BILL AGAINST GUY SUTTON TODAY

Defendant Placed Under \$5,000 Bond for Appearance at the April Term of Court

The grand jury today returned a true bill in the case of the state vs. Guy Sutton on the charge of manslaughter for the killing of Phillip Jefferson. Sutton was placed under a five thousand dollar bond for his appearance at the next term of criminal court which will convene in this city on April 16.

The following is the evidence verbatim given in the preliminary hearing which took place here last Saturday afternoon and on which the grand jury based its action.

Preliminary hearing of Guy Sutton, in the matter of the killing of Phillip Jefferson.

Pete Cross, direct examination.

Q. Where do you live and what do you do?

A. I live in Chicago, been living there past twelve years engaged in oil business. Was in Greenville on January 10th, 1920. Had known Phillip Jefferson about 12 years. Was with him that night on 10th. Was on our way from work. We worked with Sam Turnage.

Q. When did the accident occur?

A. We were on our way home. We got about Duke's and Willard & Smith places. We were about to cross the street from near Matt Duke's on Dickinson Avenue. I saw an automobile approaching with bright lights. It was about one block away, when I first noticed it. Jefferson and I stepped from the curb to the street. We had not made but a few steps when suddenly automobile appeared. The car seemed to me to come at about 35 miles an hour, when it passed and struck Jefferson. It struck Jefferson with the front of the car. Did not notice what kind of car it was.

Q. You say it struck him, what did it do to him?

A. It carried him about fifty feet and threw him several feet into the air. The man that drove this car had to dodge another car that was standing on the side of the curbing, and this threw Phillip Jefferson off and slid him against the curbing. When the car passed me I barely had time to turn around. I fell over from the shock and turned around to see the car, and did not notice any lights for a few seconds when he was about 100 yards away, I saw red light on back come on.

Q. Where was Phillip Jefferson after the car passed, where did you find him?

A. Lying on the street.
Q. Did you pick him up?
A. Yes.
Q. Was he conscious?
A. No.
Q. What did you do with his body?
A. I picked him up and put him on a wagon then I got Dr. Green, and then I went on home.
Q. How long did he live?
A. About an hour.
Q. He died that night?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you recognize anybody in the car?
A. No sir.
Q. Did you recognize what kind of car it was?

Cross Examination

Q. What were you doing in Greenville?

A. I was down here with Mr. Jefferson and I had been employed by Samuel Turnage and J. R. Starkey to work here as an electrician.

Q. Was Jefferson likewise employed as an electrician?

A. Yes sir.

Q. Where had you been working that day?

A. In Falkland.

Q. Where was Jefferson working that day?

A. In Greenville.

Q. Where did you meet Jefferson?

A. At home.
Q. Whose home?
A. Mr. Jefferson's.
Q. Were you stopping with Jefferson?
A. Yes sir, I lived with them all the time I was here.
Q. Where did he live, what portion

COMMISSIONER OF REVENUE STATES FACTS INCOME TAX

Deputy Commissioners to Visit Towns to Assist Taxpayers With Returns

A. D. Watts, State Commissioner of Revenue said today:

"The law requires every single person who had in the calendar year 1922, a net income of \$1,000 or more, and every married person who had \$2,000 or more, and all corporations whether they had net income or not, to make a return on or before March 15th. Net income is gross income less the deductions, but before the personal exemption is taken off."

"The deputy commissioners will visit one or more towns in each county to assist taxpayers with their returns. Itineraries will soon be prepared and posted in all the counties. These deputies will also furnish the newspapers with the dates in their localities and it is hoped that the newspapers will find these announcements of sufficient interest to their readers to publish them. The Commissioner has no authority to pay for such publication."

The law prescribes penalties for failure to file returns, and for failure to file them in the time prescribed by law.

If an individual is in doubt whether a return is required under the law or not, this office or a deputy commissioner should be consulted.

The state taxes the salaries of all state, county, municipal officers and employees, including school officers and teachers and road engineers and other employees, but does not tax the salaries of United States officers and employees. Of course, if these officers and employees, state, federal, county and municipal, had income other than their salaries, such income should be included in their returns.

All individuals, partnerships and corporations are required to report the names of persons to whom they paid \$1,000 or more during the year 1922; all partnerships are required to file a return for information.

It is hoped that all individuals required to make returns under the law, and all corporations and partnerships will make the returns and reports required on or before March 15th, and avoid penalties.

If blanks have not been received, they can be had at the office of each Register of Deeds, from any deputy commissioner, or from this office."

FRANCE TO COMBAT ENEMY'S INFLUENCE IN OCCUPIED AREA

Foreign Office Reports Menace of a General Strike is Not Entirely Removed

Paris, Jan. 23.—France has set out to combat Berlin's influence in the occupied areas of the Rhineland and the Ruhr valley and to fight their passive resistance. The cabinet has decided that these moves will first increase the difficulty of communication between Berlin and the Ruhr, second, it will make the financial reprisals by the issuing of paper money to the occupied zones if Berlin continues to refuse to supply the Ruhr banks with German marks. The foreign office says that the menace of a general strike is not entirely removed though the tendency of German labor is to work.

JIM MILLER WILL BE TRIED IN KINSTON NEXT THURSDAY

Confessed Murderer of John Sutton, Prominent Farmer, Will be Tried for His Life

Kinston, Jan. 23.—Captain Ed. Belgiana, of the New Bern police department, and Deputy Sheriff James Bryan of Craven county brought Jim Miller, confessed murderer of John Sutton, white farmer, here last night from Craven county jail, where Miller has been confined for the past week. Miller will be arraigned this morning on a charge of first degree murder. A special venire of more than 100 men have been summoned to try Miller, whose trial will be held Thursday. No trouble is anticipated, but Sheriff Taylor and Deputy Sheriff Conway have sworn in a score of special deputies to protect the accused man.

Jim Miller, colored, charged with the murder of John Sutton, prominent farmer, and confessed murderer, will be tried Thursday morning at 9:30. Judge Thomas H. Calvert, presiding. This decision was reached yesterday morning shortly after Superior court convened here under the Raleigh Judge's charge.

Miller will be brought here from jail in some other county and a fair trial, without any thought of violence, is certain. Miller claims self-defense, it is understood, but the state will charge murder in first degree, which carries with it a sentence to the electric chair. Miller killed Sutton in the fall and was caught in Baltimore recently, where he confessed. Sheriff Arden W. Taylor and Deputy Sheriff Thomas Conway brought him back from Maryland and had him others.

Bastrop, Jan. 23.—The two bodies found in Lake LaFourche, identified as Watt Daniel and Thomas Richards, victims of the hooded mob will be branded as fakes in defense of the men charged with their murder, it has been learned. That attorneys for der arrest on first degree murder Dr. McKoin and Jeff Burnett, now on charges, will attack the identification of the bodies, the ascribed manner of death, and every allegation that Daniels and Richards are dead, has been revealed by Judge William Barnette, chief defense of counsel, who said he would issue a formal statement soon as the hearing is closed.

WHEREABOUTS OF MISSING WITNESS REMAINS MYSTERY

Rumor Persists That Toagerstrom Has Met Same Fate as Daniels and Richards

Bastrop, Jan. 23.—The web of circumstantial evidence has unmeshed two more alleged members of the mob which executed Daniels and Richards, Jap Jones and Jim Harp, employees of the Southern Carbon Company are the men. Both were seen alighting from an automobile in front of their homes in Bonita at three o'clock on the morning of the murders. Both testified that they were at home asleep at that hour. The testimony of K. C. Carter, nightwatchman, involved them.

Bastrop, La., Jan. 23.—The spectacular search for Toagerstrom, the missing government witness has overshadowed the outrages in Moore House Parish. Rumors persist that he met the same fate of Daniels and Richards at the hands of the mob but the state has redoubled its efforts to find him dead or alive. A midnight dash of the state cavalry to the home of Henry Jones, a friend of Toagerstrom, after a tip had been received, revealed no trace of the missing witness. The state has announced that there will be a two weeks lull between the hearing and taking the case before the grand jury for the purpose of getting the testimony of the hearings in shape. In case no indictments are returned bills of information will be filed against the known members of the hooded mob and prosecutions will proceed.

OF SAILORS DURING THE WAR

The following letter has been received by Supt. Fitzgerald and in order for it to be clearly understood we are carrying the letter as written by Mr. Brooks. Any information regarding the matter will be greatly appreciated by the interested parties:

To County and City Superintendents, Admiral A. O. Wright, U. C. V., has recently paid me a visit and expressed his great interest in preserving the history of the Confederate veterans who served in the Confederate Navy. The veterans who served in the army have their records preserved by the State. The records of the sailors who served in the Confederacy were destroyed when Richmond was evacuated. Therefore, there is little information at hand to tell the story of those sailors who rendered such gallant service during the war.

I am very much interested in Admiral Wright's efforts to preserve the history of this class of our gallant heroes. I am requesting you to make inquiry among the patrons of your school and through the newspapers of any veteran in your community who served in the Confederate Navy. If he is living, give us his name and address and such other information as you may secure from him. If he is not living, secure as much reliable information as you can from his nearest relatives. We are especially interested in any documents pertaining to these heroes. I sincerely hope you will interest your pupils and friends in this matter and whatever information you secure please forward it to me here at Raleigh and it will reach the proper parties in order that this record may be preserved.

BORAH DENOUNCES FRENCH POLICY IN THE RUHR VALLEY

Says it is "Ruthless Militarism"
and Violation of Armistice
Terms

Washington, Jan. 22.—French pol-
icy in the Ruhr was attacked as "ruth-
less militarism," a violation of the
armistice terms and the treaty of
Versailles and an "offense against
humanity" in a statement issued to-
night by Senator Borah, of Idaho,
a Republican member of the Senate
foreign relations committee. Senator
Borah also criticized the State De-
partment for what he said was its
policy of silence and inactivity and
declared the United States should
at least declare its attitude by for-
mally protesting against the French
policy.

"This is a situation," said Senator
Borah, "in which the United States
cannot with honor remain silent. The
first duty of a nation is to protect
its life when assailed and its highest
honor and glory in victory is to be
just to a fallen foe. It is the rule
which distinguishes the savage from
the civilized nations.

Wilson's Principles.
"It was American principles an-
nounced by President Wilson upon
which the armistice was signed and
it was upon these principles that
Germany laid down her arms.

"It was our soldiers that made pos-
sible the defeat and disarming of
Germany. According to these an-
nouncements of principles, we de-
clared officially and many times that
with the German people, as a peo-
ple, we had no quarrel, but a feeling
of sympathy and friendship. In
other words we furnished the sol-
diers, the principles upon which the
armistice was based, which resulted
in disarming and rendering Germany
helpless, and we also made definite
and certain pledges as to the treat-
ment of Germany. After all that
takes place, and at a time when Ger-
many had been disarmed, and ren-
dered powerless, her territory is in-
vaded, military rules is established,
all of which will bring in its wake
indescribable suffering and untold
misery to the German people, as a
people, and in addition to that great
financial and economic loss to our
own people.

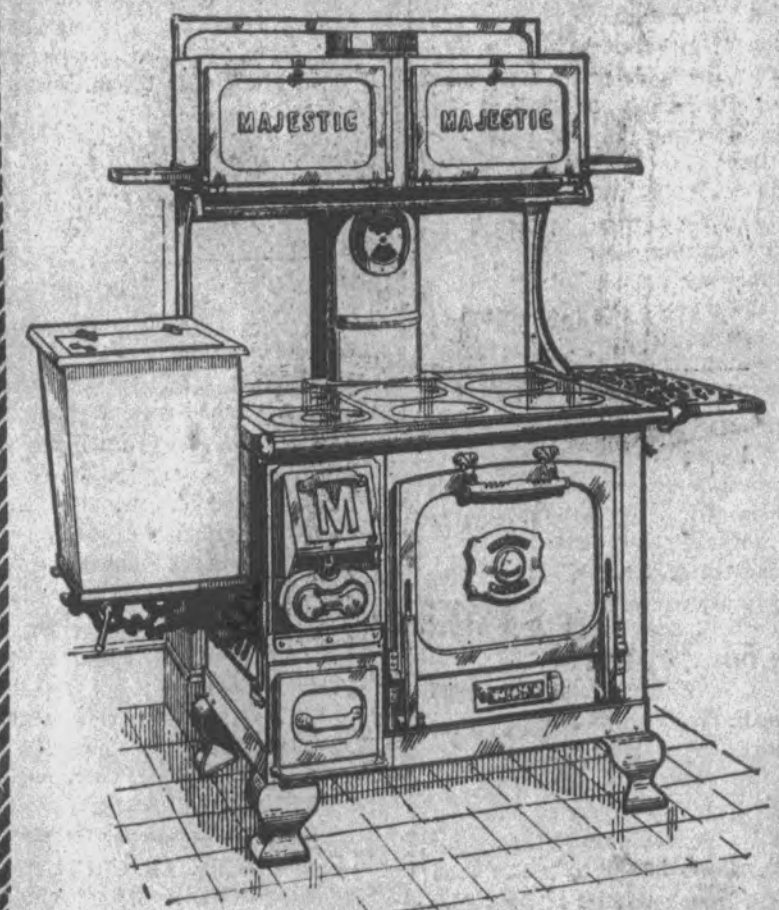
