MOTHERS' AID BILL FEATURED OFFERING IN SENATE TUESDAY

Bill Provides for Appropriation of \$50,000 to be Used in Support of Needy Children

Raleigh, Jan. 24.—A bill making an annual state appropriation of \$50,000 a year to be used in matching appropriations from the several counties for the support of needy children who have worthy mothers but have been deprived of the support of their fathers and the general education bill introduced simultaneously in both branches of the General Assembly, featured the new offerings of legislation in the Senate yesterday.

The mothers' aid bill, which is similar to laws already in force in forty-two states, has the support of the State Board of Welfare, all the fraternal and civil organizations in the State and the State Press Association.

The act makes the county juvenile court the unit for the administration of the law, with supervisory powers lodged in the State Board of Welfare. Any board of county commissioners may make appropriation for any case recommended by the county juvenile court where the recommendation is approved by the State Board of Welfare and the State will bear one-half of the expense up to the limit of the appropriation, with the fund of \$50,000 apportioned among the counties on a per capita basis as far as practicable. Support under the act is limited to needy mothers of children under fourteen who are morally and physically fitted to care for their children. The allowance is limited to \$15 a month for the first child, \$10 a month for the second child and \$5 a month for each additional child.

The Senate yesterday committed the bill authorizing the county board of commissioners to establish county orphanages, which passed its second reading Monday night, to the committee on public welfare to be considered in connection with the mothers' bill. Senator Charles U. Harris of Wake, made the motion to commit the bill and stated that Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, commissioner of Public Welfare wished to be heard by the committee in opposition to the bill.

The county orphanage bill was the only State-wide measure reached yesterday, but a mild fight was precipitated by Senator LeLaney's attack upon the bill incorporating the town of Blittmore Forest, a suburban development of Asheville which is a part of the Vanderbilt estate. Senator LeLaney expressed dislike to oppose a local bill but thought the measure clearly unconstitutional. Senator Ebbs, the author, asked for passage and Senator Varner thought the constitutionality all right and the bill went through by an overwhelming vote.

Two measures carrying appropriations and two bills relating to court procedure were also included in yesterday's list. Senator Heath stood sponsor for the bill advocated by Admiral A. O. Wright making an appropriation of \$1,000 to preserve records of Confederate sailors and Senator Graham introduced, by request, a bill increasing the appropriation for cattle killed for glanders from \$5 to \$20.

Senator W. L. Long, of Halifax, yesterday introduced a measure increasing the number of cases in which the State may appeal to five by providing that the Solicitor may take the case to the Supreme Court whenever the Superior Court judge enters a non-suit or a demurrer to the evidence by the defendant. The measure relating to the courts simply strikes out the proviso in the civil procedure act of the special session of 1921 which required that no regulations made by the Supreme Court governing civil procedure should be in violation of the consolidated Statutes of 1919 or the public laws of 1921. The bill was sponsored by Senators Armfield, Verser, DeLaney, Parker and Squires.

TRAINING SCHOOL INCREASE INTEREST AT EACH SESSION

Dr. Spilman Forced to Return Home on Account Illness; Two Classes Carry on Work

The Baptist Training School for Sunday School workers, which is being held in this city this week, met for its second night's session in the Immanuel Baptist church last night with a large number of Sunday school workers and those interested in religious work in attendance.

The class which was taking the course "What Baptists Believe," and which was being taught by Dr. B. W. Spilman was disbanded on account of Dr. Spilman being ill, and the members divided in to two parts going to classes taught by Mr. Middleton and Mrs. Hilliard. Dr. Spilman returned to his home in Kinston, yesterday, having suffered another nervous chill the second in a week. He will not return.

Mr. Middleton and Mrs. Hilliard handled their increased enrollment with the greatest of ease and both proved a great aid and inspiration to those taking the work. Sunday school work, in all its phases is most interesting and those who fail to take the course will certainly lose something worth while.

Between the two study periods, the ladies of the church served a tempting salad course with hot coffee and tea. An half hour was spent in a happy get-together meeting.

After the second study period the workers assembled in the auditorium where they heard Mr. Middleton speak on the importance of every teacher having the attention of his pupils. He stated that attention was the focusing of consciousness. In order to have the attention of the child the following things are absolutely essential; first the body must be in the right surroundings. The room must be of exactly the right temperature, and all other things that would tend to effect the body must be trained; second, the eyes must be for the teacher; third, the mind must be on the subject; fourth, the will must be bent. Fifth, the reason must be appealed to, and lastly the heart must be receptive. The Sunday school teacher has as her direct aim the teaching of the word of God and unless she has the child's attention, her words fall on deaf ears.

On tomorrow night, classes will assemble again at 6 o'clock. Every Sunday school worker is invited to attend. It is a Baptist Training school, but members of other Sunday schools are not excluded. They are invited to attend.

AYDEN DEFEATED BY LOCAL QUINT IN FAST CONTEST

Next Game Will be Staged on Friday Night With New Bern on Local Court

The Greenville High School basketball team added another victory to their string last night by defeating Ayden in an interesting game by the score of 35 to 19.

The Ayden boys realized from the very beginning of the contest that they were outclassed by the locals in every position, but they never gave up and fought hard all the way through to the last blow of the time whistle. It required real honest to goodness basket ball on the part of the Greenville quint to defeat their opponents.

In the first half, the locals almost thrilled the score of Ayden, but this did not lessen the visitors' efforts to win. It only increased their determination to put up an even stronger struggle in the later half of the game. This they did, and only fell behind the scoring of Greenville in the last half by one point.

It is true, Coach Duncan started the second team in the opening of the last period of play, and did use some of the third string boys, but before the close it was found necessary to replace the first team to stop the visitors scoring who were gaining point by point.

Gaskins for Greenville lead the locals in scoring with twelve points, and these were all made in the first half. In the second the best he could do, was to "come close." Zeno Brown, who always stands at the top or second place in the score making for Greenville, came in second with eight points. Satterwhite and Williams followed with two field goals each. Mayo landed for one each field and foul goals, Harvey and Perkins landed for one from the field. Other locals who were given an opportunity to show their ability at goal tossing, but failed, were West, Hardee, Forbes, Harrington and Winslow.

Hooks and Tumage starred for Ayden at scoring, while Baldree displayed more speed in blocking the efforts of the Greenville boys. E. Worthington, captain of the visiting quint also deserves mention for the part he played especially in the first half.

There were six personal fouls called on Greenville while Ayden was credited with half that number.

One of the best games of the entire season to be seen on the local court will be that of Friday night of this week when New Bern will appear against the locals. This game should attract a large number of loyal fans to boost the home boys in one of the strongest fights of the year.

MR. CAREY J. HUNTER DIES AT HOME IN RALEIGH

Funeral arrangements had not been perfected last night, though it was stated that the burial will take place Thursday.

SENATOR SIMMONS IS REPORTED IMPROVED

New Bern, Jan. 24.—Senator F. M. Simmons' condition tonight was very much better, according to a statement by Dr. J. F. Patterson, his son-in-law who is attending him.

The Senator arrived here yesterday morning from Asheville, suffering from a severe case of lagrippe, and went to bed immediately. He was very sick at this time but during the day improved in an encouraging manner, Dr. Patterson said. He is not expected to be able to be out for at least a week, probably two weeks, it was said.

KINSTON CHURCH PARTY BROKEN UP AS RESULT OF FIRE

Members Had Gathered to Welcome New Pastor When Fire Was Discovered

Kinston, Jan. 24.—Fire which broke out at 9:20 last night in the Queen Street Methodist church, did about \$2,000 damage to the fine structure and was confined to the coal bin and adjoining rooms in the basement by quick and efficient work by the two fire companies of the city. Both trucks arrived on the scene in record time and two streams of water were soon pouring on the burning coal, whose dense fumes and smoke filled the church and drove the large number of people, assembled there to meet and become better acquainted with the new pastor, Rev. C. K. Proctor, formerly of Raleigh. The fire had quite a start before anyone noticed its presence, when smoke began to percolate to all parts of the building. The only possible damage to the inside of the church proper may result from a coloration of the walls from the coal smoke.

The janitor stated last night that this is the third time in a few weeks that the wooden air intake to the furnace has caught on fire. Last time this occurred, some few days ago, he put it out with a bucket of water before the fire got any headway. Last night, the furnace was evidently heated more than usual and the fire burned to the coal and started a bad blaze.

GREEN RESOLUTION TAX EXEMPT BILL PASSES IN HOUSE

Passage of Resolution Requires a Two-Thirds Vote and Roll Call Stood 223 to 101

Washington, Jan. 23.—The Green resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution which would prohibit further issuance of tax exempt securities was adopted tonight by the House.

The proposal, which had been urged by President Harding and Secretary Mellon, was put through after an unusually bitter all-day wrangle by a margin of seven votes. Passage of the resolution required a two-thirds vote and the roll call stood 223 to 101.

Republicans opposing it and Democrats supporting it split about even, 3 Democrats joining administration leaders while 24 republicans broke away from party lines and voted against it. The measure now goes to the Senate, but some House leaders privately expressed the opinion that there was not much chance of its enactment at this session.

Representative Green, of Iowa, ranking republican of the ways and means committee, who drafted the proposal, and Representative Garner of Texas, ranking democratic committee man, took charge of the fight for the two sides.

The argument swung around by off-repeated statements that the measure was designed to prevent the rich man seeking a tax free haven, and that it was an invasion of the right of the states to control their own credit.

Representative Moore, democrat, Virginia, tried to get in an amendment making the law inoperative unless ratified within five years, and Representative London, Socialist, New York, one which would make it effective, if ratified in 1945. Both were rejected.

The principal fight was over Mr. Garner's amendment, which he explained was designed to prevent the evading of a prohibitive tax on state bonds or the imposition of a higher tax on income from state bonds than levied on income from other sources. Without discussion the House refused to exempt Federal Farm Loan and Joint Stock Land Bank bonds.

In the "Auto Building Contest" which appeared in our issue of last Friday, several interesting facts developed as to the assembling of cars from the nearly a hundred contestants that tried for the three cash prizes offered. The efforts of some were really amusing. Several tried hard to change the model as outlined in the original, and many were quite successful in doing so. One contestant by taking from and adding to converted the large seven-passenger touring car into a nifty semi-coupe which was somewhat front heavy with parts. The rear wheel with a perfectly good set of chains was several times placed in front.

One of the newest types of automobiles was shown in one of the copies submitted. Instead of placing the front bumper in its proper place it was found protecting the wind shield. This contestant evidently had come in contact with some of the city's speeders and realized the need of such a protection.

MILLER DECLARES NOT GUILTY FIRST DEGREE MURDER

Appeared Hopelessly Lost When Arraigned in Lenoir Court Yesterday

Kinston, Jan. 24.—Jim Miller, colored, slayer of John Sutton, prominent white farmer of this section, will go on trial for his life on a first degree murder charge Thursday morning at 9:30 in Superior Court here before Judge Thomas H. Calvert, after pleading "not guilty" yesterday morning in court to the charge against him, and resting "his case on a self-defense basis. Miller, who is being held in the Lenoir county jail here after being brought from New Bern where he was held for one week or more after the Baltimore confession and whose whereabouts till Monday evening was a mystery to the public and guarded secret of some few officers, appeared weak and disconsolate when arraigned yesterday. He pleaded "not guilty" but it was with a weak voice and half-heartedly that the prisoner, guarded heavily by a number of special deputies, ushered into duty by Sheriff Arden W. Taylor, for that specific purpose, fought back against the threat of the electric chair at Raleigh.

A special venire of 125 men have been summoned for the trial.

GRAND JURY FINDS TRUE BILLS THREE MURDER CHARGES

Tuesday's Session of Superior Court Featured Many Cases; Several Disposed of

Yesterday session of Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases which is being held here this week was featured by true bills being returned against Robert Howell, who on the 20th day of December 1922, killed Non Sneed; Ellis Brown, who on the 19th day of January 1923, killed Russell Clark; and Guy Sutton who killed Phillip Jefferson in this city three years ago. All three cases will probably be tried in the next term of criminal court.

True bills were also returned against Jesse Mills, charged with larceny; A. Roy Brown, larceny; William Pope, rape; Geo. Washington Brown, carrying concealed weapon and assault with deadly weapon with intent to kill; R. Hill, embezzlement; Samuel Garrison alias Doc Fornes, forgery; and John McCosington and Balford D. Simpkins, charged with larceny and receiving.

The following cases were disposed of: David James, charged with selling liquor was found guilty and sentenced to twelve months on county roads.

Neal Nobles, charged with receiving stolen goods, was found guilty. Judgment suspended; Sallis Beverly, was found guilty of having liquor for sale and was assigned to work in the county home for a period of one year.

Henry Baker, charged with receiving and selling liquor, was found not guilty; Jack Corey who was tried on the same charge was found not guilty of having whiskey, but was found guilty of transporting whiskey. One or two cases were not pressed and a few continued.

Quite an amusing incident occurred yesterday. A colored man by the name of Lee Hunter was being tried for selling whiskey. He was under a bond of \$400 and had secured the services of Col. Albion Dunn. After all evidence was in and everything moving smoothly court adjourned for dinner. When it reconvened, Col. Dunn was forced to get a searching party to help find his client, but to no avail, he "had went" without even a parting farewell. Solicitor Davis announced that Hunter was "taking no thought for tomorrow," but some one else stated that he was "taking thought for eighteen months." It does seem that such a handsome Judge, lawyers, clerk of court and solicitor could make court attractive enough to hold a prisoner until he could hear his sentence. Now Col. Dunn says that he won his case and his bondsmen are also wearing a broad grin. The whereabouts of Hunter are still unknown.

WINS ELECTION TO CONGRESS FROM PARLOR CAMPAIGN

San Francisco, Jan. 24.—A woman has gone President Harding one better. Mrs. Mircede Noan taking note of the president's front porch campaign won election to congress in a front parlor campaign. The woman succeeds her late husband and is California's first woman representative winning over field of six men.

That Elon College is appreciated throughout the State is evidenced by the way people are responding to help reconstruct the destroyed building.

Durham people are always on the job. They have already named committees to look after the rebuilding of the Trinity Methodist church which was destroyed by fire last Sunday.

The American soldiers will leave Germany tomorrow. Their being allowed to remain there since America withdrew from all European controversy is only another question the answer to which can be found in the present administration.

Seven is marital ties in one day—Reading. It seems to be almost as easy to get unmarried as it does to get tied up, and if all the present bills regarding marriage should happen to be passed, it will be easier.

The Germans evidently think that in order to entertain their French guests in a most courteous manner they must make as little noise as possible, therefore the determination that they shall not be annoyed with running trains and shoveling coal.

Senator Borah sounded a great truth when he said that "it was American principles announced by President Wilson upon which the Armistice was signed and it was upon these principles that Germany laid down her arms." It is a great pity that Borah has just waked up, having slept since 1919, to insist upon the carrying out of principles as laid down by Wilson—nevertheless it is better late than never, and now it seems that he like all other men of wisdom realizing that Wilson's policy in 1919 was right, is reaching the same conclusions pointed out at that time.

The word Germany and the name of Stinnes are almost synonymous. When speaking of the wealth of Germany one naturally thinks of Stinnes. The prospect that financially he will either be ruined or seriously crippled by the French invasion is causing comment from all sides. For the past few years he has been a great power of Central Europe. As a war profiteer he had no equal. When everything else failed around him this great man went on succeeding. Because of these facts the world as large is awaiting the final effect of the present invasion as regards this man of wealth and power.

The result of the November election seems to have left President Harding in a "neary state of mind." In fact he is accused by politicians as being afraid to do this and to do that. Now it is declared that he is afraid to call an extra session of congress, because of the progressive spirit that is said to exist among the new members of congress. Such men as Bryan and McAdoo see a great Democratic advantage in an extra session, because the Senate is the forum in which Democrats can best keep before the public the issues of the 1924 presidential fight. There is a possibility however, that President Harding may have to call an extra session even if it is against his will.

THE ROTARY CODE OF ETHICS

(By Chesley R. Perry, in January Rotarian)

Probably there is no one thing in all Rotary literature in which Rotarians have taken a greater interest and for that matter in which the public has taken a greater interest than the Rotary Code of Ethics for business men of all lines, adopted at the 1915 Rotary convention.

In the July 1921 issue of The Rotarian, Past International President, Glenn C. Mead presented an analysis of the Rotary Code of Ethics wherein he set forth that it is not a code of ethics at all, but rather a confession of faith or creed. I have no desire to take issue with Glenn, and in fact find it easy to agree with him in part, but it seems to me that a careful study of the Rotary Code warrants me in saying that it is a Code of Ethics containing both a creed and a set of standards of practice. To prove my point, I submit the following edition of our code divided into two sections—a creed and standards of practice. Nothing has been added, nothing has been subtracted. All that follows here will be found in the present Code or in its introduction.

The Creed
As a Rotarian I believe:
That my vocation is a worthy one, affording me a distinct opportunity to serve society.

That it is my duty to improve myself, increase my efficiency, and enlarge my faith in the fundamental principle of Rotary—that He Profits Most Who Serves Best;

That it is my duty to realize that I am a business man with a worthy ambition to succeed but that I am first an ethical man and wish no success that is not founded on the highest justice and morality;

That the exchange of my goods, my service, and my ideas for profit is legitimate and ethical, provided that all parties in the exchange are benefited thereby;

That one of the greatest assets of a professional or business man is his friends and that any advantage gained by reason of friendship is eminently ethical and proper;

That true friends demand nothing of one another and that any abuse of the confidence of friendship for profit is foreign to the spirit of Rotary and in violation of its ethics;

That the genius of Rotary is not

in competition but in co-operation; that provincialism can never have a place in an institution like Rotary; that Human Rights are not confined to Rotary clubs but are as deep and as broad as the human race itself; and that for these high purposes Rotary exists;

That there is universality to the Golden Rule, All Things Whatsoever Ye Would That Men Should Do Unto You, Do Ye Even So Unto Them, and that Society best holds together when equal opportunity is accorded all men in the natural resources of our planet.

The Standards of Practice

As a Rotarian I promise:

That my business standards shall have in them a note of sympathy for our common humanity;

That my business dealings, ambitions, and relations shall always cause me to take into consideration my highest duties as a member of society;

That in every position in business life, in every responsibility that comes before me, my chief thought shall be to fill that responsibility and discharge my duty so that when I have ended each of them, I shall have lifted the level of human morals and achievements a little higher than I found it;

That I will use my best endeavors to elevate the standards of the vocation in which I am engaged and so to conduct my affairs that others in my vocation shall find it wise, profitable and conducive to happiness to emulate my example;

That I will conduct my business in such a manner to give it a perfect service equal to or even better than my competitors, and, when in doubt, to give added service beyond the strict measure of duty or obligation;

That I will consider no personal success legitimate or ethical which is secured by taking unfair advantage of certain opportunities in the social order that are absolutely denied to others, and that I will not take advantage of opportunities to achieve material success that others will not take because of the questionable morality involved;

That I will not be more obligated to a Brother Rotarian than I am to every other man in human society. (Anspection Publicity Department of Greenville Rotary Club.)

ENGLISH MOVIE MAN SAYS FILMS TOO HIGH

I. N. S. Staff Correspondent
London, Jan. 16.—"People who have made great fortunes in the motion picture industry, people like Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks, owe it to the industry that made them, and which they helped make and cannot wish to destroy, to see that exhibitors get their films at the lowest reasonable price, not the highest possible price. Their help is needed by the industry in these hard times."

Sir Oswald Stoll, head of the Stoll Film Company, the largest picture producing concern in Great Britain, voiced in the words quoted the protest of British motion picture exhibitors against "extortionate prices," which they claim, they are being forced to pay for the "really good" American films. American producers, they contend, must cut the price of their product and improve the general quality of their pictures if they are to continue to reap profits from the British motion picture field.

"The lowest profit on which exhibitors can live must be more than sufficient to compensate the occasional losses to which every exhibitor is hard times is exposed," Sir Oswald continued. "These stars of the screen who draw the public have it in their power to insure their profit by limiting the price that an exhibitor can be charged and by insisting on the exhibition of their pictures at the orthodox picture theatres only. It is these who are the jobbers in pictures, who exploit them unfairly to the detriment of the whole industry would have to change their methods."

The business methods of many American producers were roundly scored by Sir Oswald. He predicted that unless these methods were changed Americans not only would lose the foothold in the film industry that they have gained in Europe but would strangle their own business in the United States.

The exhibition of foreign films," Sir Oswald said, "adds to the interest of the cinema, but the good films are not allowed to reach the orthodox exhibitor, except at extortionate prices. The mediocre foreign films he is allowed to have at so-called reasonable prices. Most of these pictures are not worthy of being shown by the general exhibitor at any price."

"If the foreign films are to be shown in this country the good films, as well as the bad, should be at the disposal of the general exhibitor at prices that will enable him to make a profit. If foreign producers and their financial backers do not recognize this they will kill the picture industry."

To controvert the activities of American producers, who now almost monopolize the British picture field, it is planned to hold a "British Film Week," Sir Oswald revealed. British picture theatres are to be asked to show during one week in 1923 only films that have been produced in England.

"British pictures are more remunerative to the exhibitor than some seem to believe," Sir Oswald continued. "In our own business last year a comparison was made between the number of weeks in which British pictures were shown and the average profit for the whole year. The average for the British pictures was the higher of the two by a substantial amount."

The British film magnate was outspoken in his condemnation of the "methods of a few astute American speculators whose sole activities are a huge gamble performed to a loud and continuous advertising scream." He charged that the American motion picture industry is being strangled by a "producing ring."

Sir Oswald deplored film censorship.

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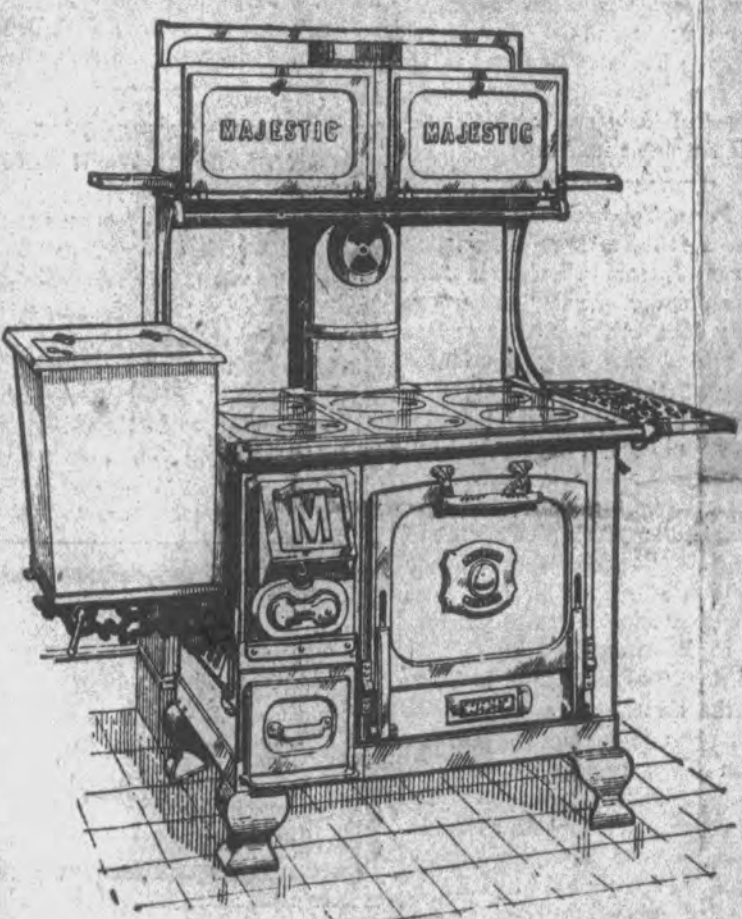
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
