

JULIUS MOORE IS GIVEN TWENTY YEARS FOR MURDER

Yesterday's and Today's Sessions of Court Featured by Several Important Cases

Yesterday and today's session of Superior court for the trial of criminal cases, which is convening in this city were featured with a number of important cases being disposed of. Judge Grady believed in transacting business as rapidly as possible and is making a great effort to clear the calendar of as many cases as he can during the week.

Julius Moore, colored man, who shot and killed James Grimps in Gorman's warehouse at a Christmas party on December 25th, 1920, was tried in Superior Court yesterday and found guilty of murder in the second degree. He was given twenty years and appealed to Supreme Court.

Ed Ward plead guilty of carrying concealed weapon and was fined \$25.00 and costs.

Ben Bell was found not guilty on the charge of abandonment.

Butler Ward, Herbert Ward, Edward Ward and Holder Langley, assault. The case in regards to Butler Ward, Herbert Ward and Holder Langley was not pressed. Edward Ward plead guilty, judgment being suspended upon payment of costs. Herbert Ward, carrying concealed weapon, not pressed. Ernest Carney, Jr., plead guilty of the charge of carrying concealed weapons was fined \$50 and costs.

Ernest Carney, Jr., disturbing religious services, plead guilty of the charge, judgment being suspended upon payment of costs.

True bills were passed against Olin Hawkins, charged with embezzlement, and Curry Williams for the murder of Mamie Ward on the 27th day of December 1922.

Jack Corey who was found guilty of transporting liquor, in Tuesday's session of court, was given six months on the county roads.

The trial of Julius Moore consumed nearly the entire afternoon session.

The following cases were disposed of today:

Robert Howell, aged 18 years, a young white man of the Grimesland section, who was on trial for the murder of Nan Sneed, plead guilty of the charge and was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. Judge Grady, owing to the age of the young man, who is both fatherless and motherless, was very lenient with him.

John J. McCosson and Dairford Simpkins, of Philadelphia who were on trial for the theft of an automobile belonging to Mr. F. A. Mills, and which they took from the fair grounds last year, were found guilty and given five years each in the penitentiary. Simpkins was called back, after the noon recess, and given seven and one half years, for contempt of court for utterances made while leaving the court room.

Will Fleming, alias Birk Fleming, who three years ago, stole some harness from the John Flanagan Ruggy Co., and who "aired" for parts unknown, returned from Norfolk and surrendered. He submitted to the charge and was given three years in the penitentiary.

Sam Garbis, col., of the Ayden section, was found guilty of forgery and sentenced to three years on the county roads.

Luman Whitehurst, young white man of Bethel, was found guilty of stealing goods from Bullock's store and was given one year on the county roads. Although very young he has been in court several times charged with stealing.

At the reconvening of court this afternoon the case of Eli Brown a 14 year old colored boy of Bethel charged with the killing of Russell Clark, another negro lad of about the same age, was taken up. It was shown from the evidence given, in an effort to have the accused bailed, that both Brown and the dead boy had shot guns in their possessions, when the gun was accidentally fired in the hands of the defendant, resulting in the death of Clark.

PITNEY'S VACANCY TO BE FILLED BY TENNESSEE JUDGE

Harding Nominates Edward T. Sanford for Supreme Court to Succeed Justice Pitney

Washington, Jan. 24.—Edward T. Sanford, United States district judge for the eastern and middle districts of Tennessee since 1908, was nominated today by President Harding to be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, filling the vacancy caused by the retirement of Justice Pitney.

Justice Sanford is a recognized authority in the legal profession, which he entered in 1888 after receiving degrees at the University of Tennessee and Harvard. He is a former vice-president of the American Bar Association and served as an assistant Attorney General of the United States under President Roosevelt. He is a Republican and is fifty-seven years old.

The nomination, if confirmed, will give Tennessee two members of the highest court, and will restore the political balance of six Republicans and three Democrats, which obtained when President Harding took office. The other member from Tennessee is Justice McReynolds, a Democrat, appointed by President Wilson.

Judge Sanford, who is a native of Knoxville, where he now lives, is the fourth member of the court to be named by President Harding. Justice Pitney's retirement, authorized by a special act of congress because of physical disability, became effective January 1, and it was indicated today that Senate leaders would seek action at once on the nomination of Judge Sanford so that the court can proceed to important pending cases with a full bench.

Harding Returns to Desk After Illness of Eight Days

Washington, Jan. 25.—Harding has returned to his desk after being confined to his apartment in the White House for eight days with a severe cold and grippe.

Adjutant General Florida Dies From Pneumonia Today

Daytona, Jan. 25.—Charles Lovell, adjutant general of Florida, died today at St. Augustine from double pneumonia, according to word received.

HONOLULU BEGINS HOME TRADE DRIVE

Honolulu, Jan.—Honolulu merchants regard the "foreign" mail order business of the mainland as so serious a menace to island prosperity that they have backed up their slogan of "island money island made should remain in island trade" with reasons, pictorial and otherwise, descriptive of the superiority of island goods and the advantage of home buying. These reasons are embodied in a catalogue, the first "Honolulu Merchants' Mail Order Catalogue," which in its first week of issuance was sent to 5,000 residents of outlying islands. The first edition is the initial step in a campaign of "constant reminding," which will be directed particularly toward the buying public in remote sections of the island territory to educate them to buy at home instead of sending to the mainland.

Violent Rioting Caused by Departure of Troops Quelled

Washington, Jan. 25.—Violent rioting following the departure of the American army of occupation has been quelled by a handful of American military police which was left behind with a clean up squad.

Rhineland Occupation Bill Will Be Presented to Allies March First

Washington, Jan. 25.—America's bill of occupying the Rhineland totaling two hundred and fifty six millions will be presented to the allies in Paris, March 1st, it has been announced by the state department.

Industrial Plants Damaged by Fires

Chicago, Jan. 25.—Two big fires did a half million dollars damage to industrial plants. The American linseed oil company plant was damaged between two hundred and five hundred thousand dollars. A six story building was also damaged.

GOOD ROAD BILL PASSES THE HOUSE WITH A BIG LEAD

Two Measures Offered by Mr. Brown, of Pitt, Included in Yesterday's Grind

Raleigh, Jan. 25.—Eighty-seven votes for to fourteen against the passage of the Moore road measure in the House yesterday morning after two hours of vigorous debate that culminated in a bitter arraignment of Representative W. H. S. Burgwyn at the hands of Representative T. C. Bowie, of Ashe, when the Northampton representative had completed his speech against adding fifteen million dollars to the State road debt.

Opposition to the pending road measure was led by Mr. Burgwyn, with scattering support from Representative Owens, minority leader, Representative Quickel, of Rutherford, and Bennett, of Anson. Representative Doughton, who resigned as a member of the Highway Commission, to become a member of the House, carried the center of the fight for the measure, supported by Representatives Moore, Murphy and Bowie.

Final reading of the measure in the House will be taken up this morning. Amendments proposed by Mr. Burgwyn, allocating a million dollars additional funds to his district, and another by Mr. Quickel making revenues derived from a district a fourth basis upon which allocation of funds to districts is made are in prospect. Mr. Quickel would make it read "area, population, mileage and income derived from each county."

Consideration of the measure began at 11:15 and the final vote adjournment were announced almost simultaneously at 1:45, making the longest session the House has experienced since the General Assembly convened, three weeks ago yesterday. During the quarrel of an hour devoted to the introduction of bills, new measures got under way, including the Grist bill making it a misdemeanor to employ a person in an improperly heated room.

Two measures favored by the State Department of Insurance and offered by Mr. Brown, of Pitt, were included in the day's grind. The first requires that all new theatres and other places of amusement shall before beginning construction submit to the department plans for fire escapes that must be approved before the building is erected. Double exits for all rooming houses and hotels, either used at present or hereafter erected are required, provided the buildings are above three stories in height.

The second measure is purely definitive of the status of insurance agents or solicitors in the State. The bill draws the distinction between local agents, district agents and general agents, with the requirement that each insurance company doing business in the State must have a general agent with whom the department can deal. Non-resident brokers may secure license by producing a like license from the State of their residence and the payment of a fee.

House bill No. 120, announced first on the second reading calendar, attracted little notice when its title was read, and it was not until Mr. Moore called the attention of the House that there was the fifteen million dollar road bill that either the opponents or proponents of the measure were awake to the fact that battle was in the air.

Lodge took over Couzen's job, who resigned to occupy Truman H. Newberry's seat in the United States Senate. Under the city charter Lodge must call a special election within six months.

Commission Says That Importation of Brides in Hawaii Menace Security of U. S.

Washington, Jan. 25.—Continued importation of picture brides in Hawaii threatens to give the Japanese numerical, political, and commercial control in the territory and menaces the security of the United States, according to a report submitted to Secretary of Labor, Davis by a special commission which just completed the investigation of labor conditions in the islands. An immediate remedial legislation by congress is imperative in interest of national defense the commission said.

London, Jan.—If Dame Fashion has her way Miss 1923 is going to be a "long woman."
Women who wish to be in the fashion this Spring must use every artificial aid, from high-heeled shoes to an elongated corset, to obtain the full street lamp post-like effect.

Every fashion feature has been introduced with the idea of making lady look as long and as thin as possible. Skirts are being made extremely long, flowing right on to the ground and having trains in many cases. Dresses are being designed to be extraordinary tight below the waist and show a pronounced tendency to merge into a long, deep "V." They have long sleeves, or no sleeves at all. Some have one sleeve, and the wearer leaves the other arm entirely bare.
To accentuate this vogue for length earrings are being used, while shoes have long ornaments hanging from them.

COWS ALLOTTED AMONG THE BANKS FOR DISTRIBUTION

Mr. Kimrey of Raleigh Conducted Valuation Work and Pairing Off of Cows

(Auspices Chamber of Commerce.)
The car of milk cows that were purchased by Dr. R. L. Carr of Greenville and Mr. A. C. Kimrey of Raleigh, were allotted among the banks on last Monday at Wingate's stables. The particular cows going to the different banks was arranged by numbering every cow and then arranging in pairs with as nearly equal values as possible. This valuation work and pairing off was conducted by Mr. Kimrey. At the conclusion, the numbers were placed in a hat and drawn out by the banks participating.

Mr. Kimrey, who has spent a large number of years in the study of dairy cows and who is a recognized judge of the subject, said: "these cows, with proper attention, will give good results. There is not a cow in the lot, if she is properly cared for, that will not give three gallons or more per day. Quite likely there will be some who will not be satisfied, but the cause can be traced to poor treatment."

"A good feed mixture," said Mr. Kimrey, is: 220 lbs. corn meal, 100 lbs. cotton-seed meal, 100 lbs. wheat bran, 100 lbs. crushed oats, 1 lbs. salt, or another mixture that is good: 200 lbs. corn meal, 100 lbs. wheat bran, 100 lbs. cotton-seed meal, 3 lbs. salt.

"Water is also important," said Mr. Kimrey. "Normal milk contains 87 per cent water, and in order to obtain a maximum flow a cow must have a liberal supply of clean water of a medium temperature. The average cow should drink from eight to sixteen gallons per day, but if it is very cold she will not drink enough."

The cow must be protected from bad weather by a good warm, well-bedded stall or else she will not produce as she is expected to. A cow that is exposed to cold winds and rain and housed in a wet, dirty stall cannot produce economically.

"Help the cow to keep herself clean and she will help you keep the milk clean. Clean milk is safe milk."

An extract from a letter from Dr. R. L. Carr, who, as above stated, assisted in purchasing this car of cows, is as follows:

"Tell your people that they have got a good car of cows, in fact the best that can be bought in Union (N. C.) county, for the price."

"One cattle dealer said: 'I will give you a good profit on your purchase at Greenville.'"

"Mr. Kimrey proved of untold value in this undertaking. He is a good buyer as well as a good judge of milk cows."

"Your people have a good lot of cows and I trust they will be satisfied."

In speaking of the action of the banks in making this project possible, Mr. J. E. Winslow said: "This should be repeated at least every month in the year. It is a great step in the right direction."

MEN THAT WERE TRUE TO A TRUST.

It is generally understood that
"flu" has a bad after effect, but in
President Harding's case the after
effect will be a good one, if he, after
nearly eleven months of silence, does
a belated bit of justice by giving
back jobs to the twenty-eight men
and women who were dismissed from
the Bureau of Printing and Engraving.
His action which he said was
"for the good of the service," and

American people, has been alluded to

Judge Grady can not be commended

takes in regards to violators of the
law especially the ones who are
caught selling and transporting whis-
key. He believes in meting out
justice to every man and is no respect-
er of persons. The white man who
is convicted of selling whiskey and
the negro are both, according to
Judge Grady's code of ethics, entitled
to the same punishment. In his
charge to the grand jury, a charge
which was short but filled with good,
sound advice, he emphasized the
importance of punishing all viola-
tors of the law in proportion to the
offense.

If the country had more such im-
partial and fair judges it would see
a great step put to this wave of law-
lessness that is sweeping over the
country, namely the making and sell-
ing of blind tiger liquor.

This is Judge Grady's first court in
Pitt county and he has made an in-
delible impression upon every one
with whom he has come in contact.
He will always find a warm welcome
awaiting him and, although, young

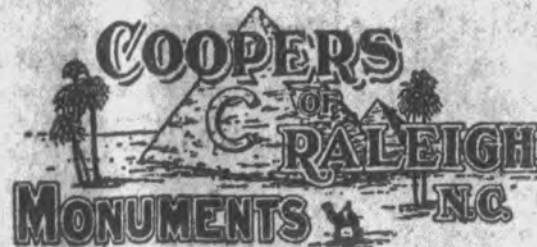

CANADA RULING NO
AID TO RUM TRADE

(By International News.)

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 24 — Rum
smuggling from Canada to the Unit-
ed States will not be facilitated by
Judge J. J. Coughlin's decision in
the Sandwich (Ontario) court that
the Canadian Liquor Carriage ac-

is invalid, W. E. Ramey, Ontario at-
torney general, declares.

bootleggers, however, because pro-

city for several years, but his condi-
tion gradually grew worse, and it
was decided to remove him to the
State hospital here.

Glendinning was arrested so many
times for drunkenness in the springs
that police officials finally gave him
a clerkship at headquarters in an ef-

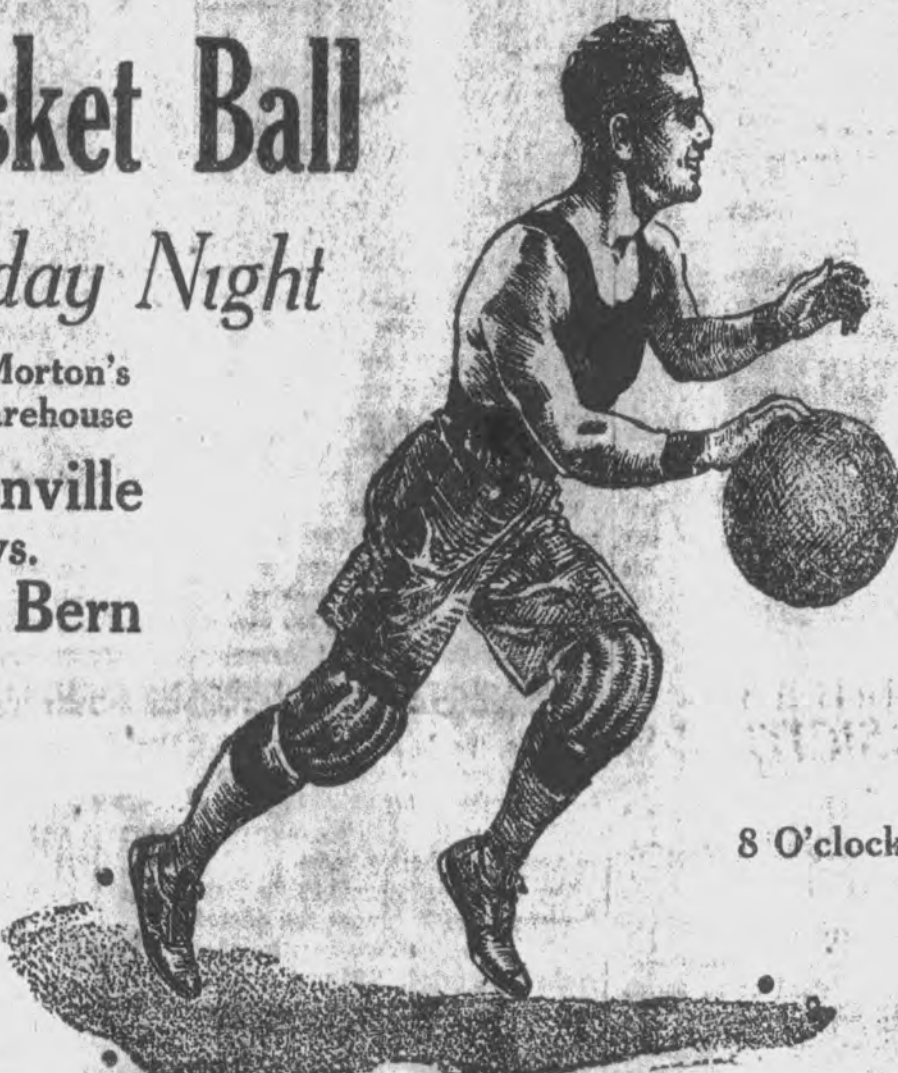

Threatened Invasion Brings Big Laugh; Even Scotland Yard Smiles Broadly

London, Jan. 22.—They just refuse to take the Ku Klux Klan seriously in England. In fact, it has become a common joke.

It might have been thought that the threat of Edward Young Clark to come across and invade the country where liquor is common and comparatively—cheap might have aroused some apprehensions. Not a bit. The garb of the Ku Klux Klan became the favorite costume of fan-

cy dress balls, and the street urchins, doing their best to imitate it with the aid of old newspapers, marched down the Strand and Piccadilly and held solemn conclaves by the wayside.

A venerable looking official of Whitehall was asked what would happen if the Ku Klux Klan made a serious attempt to come to England. "We should insist that their passports be vised," was his reply. "In a climate like this anything likely to make us laugh is to be welcomed. Let 'em all come."

Even Scotland Yard could not be serious. "Wouldn't it amuse the unemployed?" was the comment. "It would save us a lot of trouble. How many can they afford to send?" 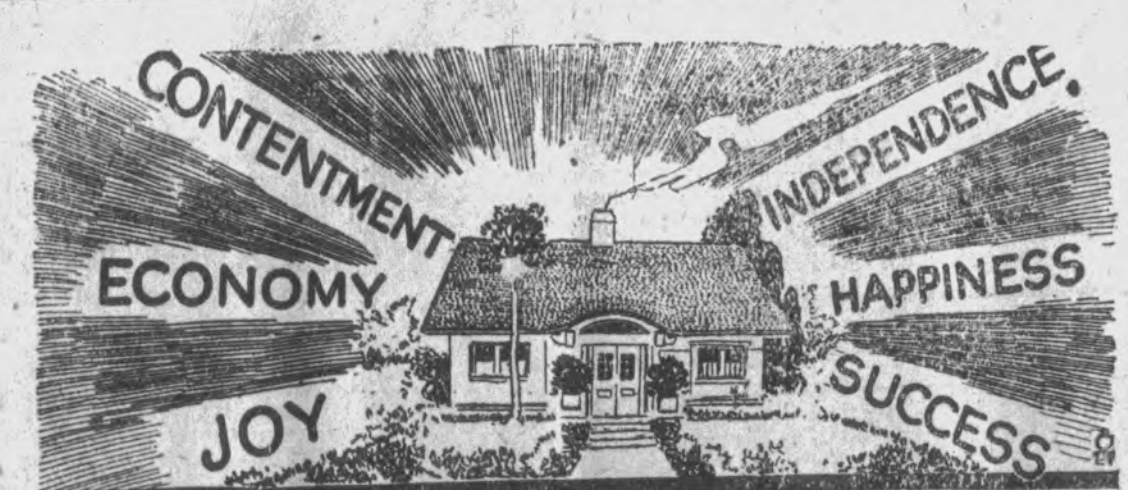

PICRIC ACID WORLD'S SAFEST EXPLOSIVE

Washington, D. C., Jan. 17.—Commenting today on the growing use of government picric acid by farmers, road builders, drainage engineers and others, Dr. Charles E. Munroe, the world's greatest explosive engineer, declared that in cartridge form the picric acid being distributed under an Act of Congress through the Bureau of Public Roads is the safest of all explosives.

"Discovered by Woulff of England as long ago as 1771," Dr. Munroe said, "picric acid is the oldest known high explosive, and from that day to this it has been used constantly and safely in the dyeing of wool and silk, a golden yellow. The fact that it has been so used for 125 years in peace-time pursuits is an assurance that it is the safest of explosives."

Dr. Munroe is the Chairman of the Committee on Explosives Investigations of the National Research Council. He is the Chief Explosive Chemist of the United States Bureau of Mines, and helped to found that Government department fifteen years ago. He has been Consulting Expert to the Torpedo Station, United States Navy, at Newport, R. I., for eighteen years.

"It is a fine thing that the millions of pounds of picric acid which were left over from the war are being turned over to the farmers, road builders, drainage engineers, and others," Dr. Munroe said, "and although there were millions of pounds of this surplus war material at the end of the war, I would be glad to see all the peace-time users of explosives get their requisitions in to the Bureau of Public Roads as soon as possible as the supply cannot of course last forever. There is nothing better or more safe in cartridge form for the farmer to use in blasting out dead tree stumps on cut-over lands, nor for the road builder to use in the quarrying of rock for ballast and the making of small rock to turn into cement for the building of bridges, etc., nor for the removal of boulder from pastures, and so on. It is a fine thing to see this agent of destruction now being put to such wonderful economic use for the benefit of all the people of the United States."

"Picric acid was first proposed for use in shell or cartridge form in 1873—first, by the French, under the name of Mellenite; then by the English, under the name of Lydlite; and then by the Japanese under name of Shimese."

"At the outbreak of the great war, the accepted high explosive for filling all high explosive shells in France and England was picric acid, and a curious feature of that situation was that the chief source from which it is made, namely, carboic acid, was in Germany, at the beginning. But other countries soon made plenty of carboic."

"Its use as a blasting agent for industrial purposes among the farmers, engineers, and contractors, has been developed in this country since the war, in the endeavor to utilize our surplus military supplies in peace-time pursuits. All of this development work was done by the Bureau of Mines, with field demonstrations carried out with the cooperation of the University of Wisconsin, in which state there are so many cut-over lands, and the distribution of the material has since been wholly in the hands of the Bureau of Public Roads."

The picric acid is being distributed to farmers, state highway commissions and their contractors for road building, drainage canal builders, and others, under an Act of Congress. The only charge made for it is seven cents per pound for the cost of cartridge, distribution, etc., plus the freight.

Dr. Munroe said he had been informed that the United States Government had saved \$10,000,000 by utilizing the left-over picric acid on Government engineering projects instead of purchasing new and other forms of explosives.

"More important, perhaps, than that, however," Dr. Munroe said, "is the saving that there has been of untold millions of dollars in states like Wisconsin which have had so many acres of cut-over lands, where the stumps had only to be blasted out, to enhance value, additional untold millions, creating good, tillable farms, for additional taxable purposes."

So far as safety is concerned, he said, picric acid has always for the past 125 years been found on the shelves of every laboratory in the country and is in use commonly in every medical school in the country.

Tremendous Growth of Silk Manufacture in the United States

The silk worm has apparently \$688,000,000 worth of silk goods not heard that the war is over, against \$254,000,000 in 1914, and at least it is a fact that the prices \$107,000,000 in 1900. The total value of silk goods manufactured in the United States in 1919 was four years after the close of the war, are nearly two and one-half times as much per pound as the annual average prior to the war. The latest full month figures of the Department of Commerce, those of August, 1922, show the average import price of the raw silk entering the country in that month at \$7.14 per pound, against an annual average of \$3.15 per pound in 1913.

Curiously, too, the quantity of silk being brought into the country even at these spectacular prices of over \$7 per pound is approximately twice as great as in 1913, when the price was less than half that of today. Silk experts estimate that the quantity of raw silk entering the United States in the full year 1922 exceeds by 25% that of the former high record year, 1921; if so this would bring the 1922 total to 56,000,000 pounds against 28,000,000 in 1913, and 45,000,000 in 1921, when the silk factories of the country turned out

This big increase in the output of our factories means that we are building up a considerable market abroad for the manufactures produced from this imported material. The value of silk manufactures exported from the United States in the calendar year 1920 was approximately \$27,000,000 against a little over \$2,000,000 in the year preceding the war, and while of course the 1922 figures are materially below those of 1920, the total value of silk manufactures exported in the calendar year 1922 is approximately six times as much as in the year preceding the war. Silk goods produced in the factories of the United States now go to over sixty countries and colonies, including considerable quantities sent to the countries from which we draw our raw silk, China and Japan.

The capital invested in the silk manufacturing industry of the United States was reported by the census of 1920 at \$533,000,000, against \$210,000,000 in 1914, and \$81,000,000 in 1900. The sum paid in wages in the silk industry in 1919 was \$108,000,000, against \$47,000,000 in 1914, and \$20,000,000 in 1900.

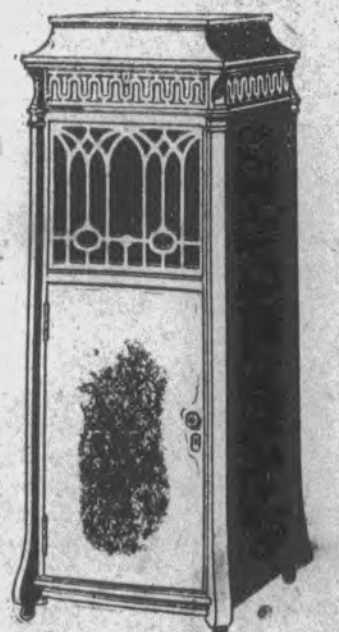
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
