METHODISTS MAKE SPLENDID REPORT FOR LAST SUNDAY

Sunday School in High School Was Attended by 539 Last Sunday

Jarvis Memorial Methodist Sunday School at its meeting in the High School building last Sunday morning had the best attendance it has had since moving into the High School building. There were 539 present. Enthusiasm reached a high mark, and every indication points to the fact that the steady growth of the Sunday school for the past three Sundays will be continued.

Class 2a, taught by Mrs. Zahniser, was the banner class for the day, having an attendance of 15 out of an enrollment of 15.

The following classes had the next best records:

2a, taught by Miss Martha Tyson, had 13 present out of an enrollment of 14. All members on time.

4b, taught by Miss Lill Wilson, had 7 present out of an enrollment of 8. All members on time.

10b, taught by Mr. M. K. Blount, 11 present out of an enrollment of 12. All members on time.

8b, taught by Mr. J. H. Blount, 10 present out of an enrollment of 11. All members on time.

12b, taught by Mr. K. T. Futrell, 21 present out of an enrollment of 22. All members on time, one visitor.

This is a class of boys the age that usually drop out of Sunday school. Under the teaching of Mr. Futrell it is constantly growing, and is doing a good piece of work.

7a, taught by Miss Ross, had 12 present out of an enrollment of 13.

8a, taught by Mr. J. H. Rose, had 8 present out of an enrollment of 7.

4t, taught by Miss Novella Moye, had 13 present out of an enrollment of 14.

Philathea 1 class, taught by Mrs. Luther Herring, had 50 members present. This class is composed for the most part of housekeepers. The fact that 50 of them got to the High School building by Sunday school time is one of the best evidences of the working spirit of the school.

The Junior Philathea class taught by Mrs. W. E. Hooker, out of an enrollment of 41 had 39 present, two new members and one visitor. This was by far the best record of any adult class in Sunday school for the past two or three Sundays. This class led by Mrs. Hooker is a source of pride to the Sunday school.

Down in the beginners' department Mrs. Wiley Brown, out of an enrollment of 28 had 23 members present, one new member, four visitors. A most excellent record.

Miss Dora Coates in the same department had only two absent. The young men's class taught by Mr. Burt James had 24 present, 13 new members. This class has taken on new life, and is working hard now.

Philathea No. 2 and Philathea No. 3 classes, composed exclusively of college girls, had a very small attendance Sunday due to the fact that a number of the girls had just been vaccinated. These classes are expected to make a high mark tomorrow.

The Baraca class taught by Mr. Wright had 72 present. The stability and regularity of this class is a thing to marvel at. Sunday after Sunday without any undue boosting there are from 60 to 80 men present. In Mr. Wright they have a great teacher.

One member of the Young Men's class, Mr. Eason, spent his last Sunday with the Sunday school last Sunday because he left yesterday for the Brevard school at Brevard to take up his studies for the purpose of entering the ministry. This is the second member of the Sunday school that has joined the ministry in the past six months. The other member being Mr. Adrian Brown. The Sunday school is proud that two representatives have gone out.

The music last Sunday was a feature again. There were two pianos, four violins and a horn. The orchestra gave one special number. The orchestra will be on hand again tomorrow with a program. Singing and instrumental music will feature the program.

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NEW BERN QUINT IS DOWNED HERE IN FAST CONTEST

Greenville High's Victorious in One of the Prettiest Games of Many Seasons

The most interesting and probably the hottest contested basketball game played on the local court since this popular sport was first inaugurated locally, was that of last night, when the Greenville High's defeated New Bern by the close margin of 16 to 13.

The overwhelming defeat administered Greenville just one week ago by New Bern caused the home boys to enter last night's struggle with the one idea in view and that to win, and this they did, before the largest and most enthusiastic crowd of fans yet witnessing a single contest on the local court.

When the signal play was given, Greenville entered the game showing that their systems were filled with the kind of fighting spirit that was bound to bring them out of the conflict victorious. At no time did they allow their opponents to gain a point without meeting the most stubborn opposition. Several times did the New Bernites make a close and distant stab at the basket only to be blocked in their efforts by some individual of the local five. At the close of the initial half Greenville had scored eight points to the visitors nine.

This lead of one point did not balance well on the minds of the Greenville High's, and as a consequence, they started the last half even stronger than the pep displayed in the preceding period of play, and through their determined efforts they were able to double New Bern's scoring in the last half, which brought them out in the end conquerors.

While each of the Greenville boys deserve special mention for the manner in which they played their respective positions, Claude Gaskins was the outstanding star of the contest. This little goal fiend when given half a chance at the coveted basket, seldom failed to make his efforts count for one or two points. And in one instance, while being almost smothered by his heavy opponent, twelve or fifteen feet from the goal he tossed with one hand over his left shoulder for a clean field count. Of the total sixteen points made by Greenville during the entire contest, Gaskins is credited with twelve. The only other local boy scoring was the ever hard fighting left forward, Zeno Brown, who threw for two field goals. The offensive and defensive work of the local Highs can be termed in no other way than superb. Their blocking was even more than could have been expected when opposed by a quint that would average from 15 to 20 pounds heavier to the man.

The New Bern boys played an excellent game, but some of them were fouled because of their inclination to run with the ball. Simpson and Dill again featured for the visitors in both floor work and scoring.

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SUPERIOR COURT CLOSES SUCCESSFUL TERM HERE TODAY

Calendar Cleared of Number of Cases of Long Standing; Judge Grady Presided

Pitt county Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases which has been in progress in Greenville for the past weeks was brought to a close today at noon. The term proved one of the best ever held here and the calendar was cleared of a number of cases of long standing. Judge Henry A. Grady, of Clinton, who appeared on the bench, for the first time in Pitt county, proved himself a most capable judge and if he had remained two weeks longer, it is feared that they would have to build an annex to the penitentiary. He certainly decreases the population when he enters a court room, but he is fair and impartial dealing out sentences in proportion to the offense.

The trial of J. M. Christman charged with embezzlement, consumed all Thursday afternoon and yesterday's session. He was found guilty of the charge and given four years in the penitentiary, judgment being suspended until the April term of criminal court at which time a final judgment will be passed.

Two cases were disposed of today. May Neal, colored, charged with selling whiskey was found not guilty.

Will Brown white, charged with larceny was found not guilty.

In the case of Jack Corey who a few days ago was sentenced to the county roads for a period of six months for transporting liquor, his sentence was reduced to 30 days on the county roads and was placed under a bond of \$500 for good behavior.

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KIWANIANS HOLD INTERESTING MEET ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Year's Program as Recommended by Directors is Presented to Club By President

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the Greenville Kiwanis Club was held last night at the Rotary building with President R. G. Fitzgerald in the chair. After the invocation by E. W. Griffin, and the naming of J. A. Applewhite as sheriff, the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A special international anniversary program had been planned for this particular meeting, but due to the absence from town of some of principal member speakers, it was found necessary to defer a part of the night's program until some future date.

The attendance was especially good, with some prominent out of town guest present. Among these were Judge H. A. Grady, of Clinton, N. C., who has presided over the January term of Pitt Superior Court.

In response to his introduction to the club, Judge Grady gave some interesting as well as instructive facts relative to the enforcement of the laws of the State. He closed by saying that no organization with a motto such as that of the Kiwanis club could do more for the good of the public at large, than to lend its aid to the officers of the law in seeing that the statutes are enforced.

Dr. Heinie, who is visiting Eastern North Carolina in the interest of tick eradication was also a guest of the club, and spoke very briefly as to the work to be undertaken in Pitt county.

President Fitzgerald presented to the club the program for the year as outlined and recommended at the recent meeting of the directors. Included are several very important matters that will be of special interest and benefit to both the citizens of Greenville and the county people at large.

The question of having the open links of paving between the city streets and the county highways connected, was one feature of the year's work. President Fitzgerald also mentioned the question of taxes of the county, which are regarded by many as exceedingly high. He stated that these taxes would become higher and higher until such organizations as the Kiwanis Club, Rotary, Chamber of Commerce and others put forth some effort by which large corporations could be induced to come to our section.

Claiming that the revenues from such concerns would materially lower the present rate of taxation.

Mr. Fitzgerald acknowledged to the club the receipt of a letter from the former Kiwanis president of Raleigh requesting the local club's support to the Mothers' Aid Law now before the legislature. A committee was appointed to investigate and report on the object of the proposed law.

Upon report of the recently appointed library committee the club voted to furnish the Greenville library with the long list of books which were furnished by the library secretary upon request of the club.

Luther Herring who visited Kiwanian Jim Starkey in a Wilson hospital yesterday reported that Mr. Starkey was doing very nicely, and requested him to state to the club "that should any member desire financial aid that Mack had the combination and keys to his safe." A committee was named to send flowers and expressions of good wishes to the sick member of the club.

If there is no organization the boy will find an outlet elsewhere—on the street, "with the gang" or possibly in some kind of mischief dear to the young heart. —Bama Vista News.

"Justice to every man," has been the slogan of Pitt county superior court for the trial of criminal cases this week. If a man violates the law, he shall be punished and Judge Grady, knowing his duty and realizing that he must keep the trust imposed on him by the people of this state, has endeavored as far as possible to see that every man be given a fair trial and a just sentence. He has made a splendid record and won many friends.

Every day we hear about law enforcement and of the general disregard for law that exists. When we think of the law as regards Dr. Peacock's escape we can't help but feel that there is a weak link in the chain. The legislature would do well to thoroughly investigate those who are responsible for the safe keeping of prisoners, especially such men as Peacock. His escape has always been a mystery to the people of this State. Never did a trial cause more comment and then after being convicted and placed in safe keeping, five sheets are given to him and he makes his escape. It was certainly a reflection on the State of North Carolina and one which should never be allowed to occur again.

The last chapter of America's part in the world war was closed yesterday when the soldiers of occupation sailed for home. Their departure was viewed with both regret and apprehension by the European countries. The German had come to look upon the Stars and Stripes as an active symbol of America's interest in Europe's problems. They realized that the flag and uniforms symbolized the interest of the greatest country in the world. The recall of the soldiers, just as this critical time, has caused the foreign countries to wonder if this is America's "farewell forever."

DANGER SIGNALS.

"Perseverance, thou art a jewel." We are still advocating the placing of danger signals at the intersection of streets. Every week or two, we hear of an accident of a minor nature, but if the signals are neglected longer we are going to have an accident that may prove fatal. It is to be hoped that an untimely death by accident is not going to happen before the town takes some action in regard to this matter. Only yesterday, in Atlanta, a man was hit by an automobile, and killed, because the driver of the car said that there were no danger signals. Don't let's wait for it to come home to us.

WOMEN AND JURIES.

Of course if the women of the State desire to serve on juries there is no objection that we know of, but the bill before the legislature demanding the names of women be placed in the jury box and they be required to serve as jurors the same as men is in our opinion stretching it too far. The women of the South as a rule did not desire the franchise and if they want to do jury duty it is well enough that they should be given that right but to force them to do this in the face of the fact that he great majority of them did not want the right to vote, they should not be compelled to do jury just because they can vote.

The legislature is hammering at the tax question again. There is one thing certain the Representative who increases the tax burden will stand a mighty good chance to never go to the legislature again.—Washington Progress.

HOG PEN FARMERS BIGGEST CASH INCOME

From January to July the hog pen is the farmer's biggest income producer. The sale of fat hogs during these months of seeding and cultivation produces money with which to pay for farm labor, meet the first half of taxes, buy twine for the harvest, pay the threshing bill, buy summer clothing for the family and meets all other current bills. For this very reason the hog has become noted over the country not only as a mortgage lifter but also as the farmer's greatest ready cash producer.

A recent report issued by one of the largest live stock markets of the country showed that during the last half of last year the American farmer received over half a billion dollars for fat hogs. The fat hog sale is largely different from the sale of many other farm products. It is cash in hand on date of delivery, a draft issued in favor of the farmer on the day and date his shipment arrives at the market.

"The hog is the farmer's surest support," said W. H. Austin, who is in charge of the management of the sale scheduled for Smithfield on Feb. 15th, at which time the Elmwood Stock Farm of Dublin, Ga., will offer the finest type of Spotted Poland China hogs ever developed in the south.

"There is no other line of industry on the farm that offers anywhere near the returns in ready cash." It is a quick turn of money and a ready cash sale. 'IRON MAN' BEALL IS PURCHASED BY ROCHESTER CLUB

Former Greenville Pitching Ace Is Reinstated and Purchased International Team

Walter E. Beall, pitcher for Greenville last season, has been signed by the Rochester Club of New York State. Under the caption, carried on the first page of the sport section of the Rochester Herald, with a streamer across the page, "Tribe beats majors to purchase of minor league pitching ace—Beall, Eastern Carolina League star hurler bought before big league scouts give him chance. Recent reinstatement by national board of arbitration makes closing of deal possible.—Won 22 games and lost 6 with 9 shutouts to his credit," a long article follows.

The story in full follows: "Marse George Stallings trips thru the sticks last season weren't in vain

it developed yesterday when announcement was made that the Tribe had secured by purchase Walter E. Beall, right hand pitcher, from the Norfolk Club of the Virginia League.

"The Tribe's chief spotted Beall pitching for the Greenville club of the Eastern Carolina League on his first jaunt and immediately made an offer for his services to find that he was the property of Norfolk which and declared him ineligible. Marse George hiked up to Norfolk and secured an option on him. At the Louisville meeting the National board of Arbitration re-instated him, Business Manager Walter E. Hapgood presenting his case to the board.

"Announcement that Beall had been reinstated recently brought three offers to Norfolk by major league clubs. When it was learned that the Tribe had first claim upon him, one club offered Chief Stallings \$10,000 besides the original purchase price for his services.

"The newest addition to the Tribe's hurling staff is 25 years old and lives in Washington, D. C. His record with Greenville was impressive enough to make him stand out as one of the best hurlers in the minors and led Chief Stallings to make the statement at the New York meetings of the International League that he was the nearest approach to Christy Mathewson in his early days of any twirl he had ever seen. He is around six feet tall and a well built chap.

A Strike Out King.
"He won 21 games with Greenville last season and lost six. Of the 21 games won, nine were shut outs and in five he held the opposition to one run. In one game he struck out 17, in another 14, and in three he fanned an even dozen. Along with Ralph Judd, the Mint League hurler, he is expected to take a regular turn in the box next season.

Baseball Law Peculiar.
"Beall's reinstatement reflects an interesting side light on baseball law. According to the ineligible code of the national pastime, a player is judged guilty until he is declared innocent by the National Board.

"Beall jumped the Norfolk club in mid-summer on account of the illness of his wife and when he returned the Norfolk club declared him ineligible. He returned to Washington and played no ball until August, 1921, nearly a year after he had been declared ineligible to play by Norfolk.

"Hapgood's presentation of the case was thorough and the National Board

voted for his reinstatement. It was then that the Tribe closed the deal for his release by Norfolk."

He stated that the United States should join the other powers in guaranteeing France against invasion, on condition that France not invade.

BRITIAN TO BUILD BIG TROOP PLANE

London, Jan.—During the year it
is the intention of the British Air
Ministry to lay down a new giant
military airplane capable of convey-
ing fifty infantry men, fully armed,
through the skies at a speed of more
than a hundred miles per hour.
The craft is to be constructed en-
tirely of steel, mainly as a safeguard
from ariel and anti-aircraft gunfire.
The cabin of the airplane, as plan-
ned, will be exceptionally roomy and
will carry fifty men in comfort. When
not in use the seats fold back against
the sides of the fuselage, so that the
machine can be used for civic or
other purposes when not required for
the transport of troops.
Four oil-driven semi-Diesel engines
will provide the motive power for
this giant, which probably will be
taken out to Mesopotamia and used
in connection with the protection and
governing of the country by the Brit-
ish Air Force.
