

THE PLAY MAKERS WILL COME HERE THURSDAY, FEB. 8

Carolina Play Makers to Come to White's Theatre Under Auspices Woman's Club

The Carolina Playmakers, the new Dramatic Organization at the University of North Carolina that has recently been attracting such favorable national attention will be here Thursday, February 8th, under the auspices of Woman's Club with three original Folk Plays of North Carolina, at White's Theatre.

For the past four years Professor Koch has been teaching the students to write plays of their own State life, preferably of their own community and has met with remarkable success. English 21, the University course in Dramatic Composition, has turned out over 25 twenty-five successful one act plays that have been produced by The Playmakers in Chapel Hill, and during the past two years several of them have been taken on tours throughout the State playing in more than twenty North Carolina towns. This will be The Playmakers Fourth State Tour which takes place February 5-14. The itinerary includes Raleigh, Goldsboro, Wilson, Rocky Mount, Greenville, New Bern, Wilmington, Fayetteville and Durham.

It is noteworthy that this organization, devoted to exclusively to putting into dramatic form the life and traditions of North Carolina, should produce plays of such universal appeal. Editors of many of our leading national periodicals and newspapers are pointing with pride to the work of Professor Koch in developing a native American drama in North Carolina. The New York Times (Magazine section, December 31, 1922, illustrated remarks that, "they produce things of real dramatic merit, and when they go on tour they are well received." The whole state knows about them and watches their work, waits eagerly for their new performances, compares, suggests, criticizes." The World's Work of December carries a splendid editorial article on the work of the Playmakers which it says, "promises to be as instructive as it is popular." Augustus Thomas, after reading the first volume of Folk-Plays published remarks in the New York Review (December 23) "I have read them and consider them equal to any of the Irish plays produced by the Abbey Company under Lady Gregory's direction." (Two of the plays in this volume, the last of the Lowries, and Off Nag's Head will be produced here by the Playmakers on their February tour.) Such comments as these are appearing from all parts of the country.

North Carolinians are beginning to feel a new pride in this product of their own State and more requests for the Playmakers come to them than they are able to fill. Wherever they have played before they have been cordially received and generally welcomed with large houses. The playwrights and players are all University students and will be the guest of University Alumni (for the sponsoring organization) while they are in the city February 8th.

DR. CHAS. MADDRY CONDUCTS SERVICES TEACHERS COLLEGE

Dr. Maddry Who Delivered First Graduating Address at College Receives Welcome

On Sunday evening January the 28th the Y. W. C. A. services were led by Dr. Maddry corresponding secretary of the Baptist State convention. Dr. Maddry was a very welcome guest of the institution as it felt that an old friend had returned. He made his first visit in the spring of 1911, when he came to deliver the commencement address to the first graduating class of the institution.

Dr. Maddry read from the scripture the 25th of St. Matthew, but used as his text a phrase taken from the 14th verse of the 4th chapter of James, which reads, "For What is Your Life?"

In the beginning Dr. Maddry stated that it was a serious thing to live. He mentioned the fact that the sermons of today had changed a great deal from they were several years ago when they were almost wholly based on getting ready to die. The speaker declared that this was still true but, today there is more emphasis laid on life, for if a person lives right he will also die right.

Dr. Maddry gave several reasons why it is such a great and serious thing to live. The first of these was that it is a great thing to be trusted with a life, a gift of God. We should be careful as to the way we live these lives of ours. Another reason why it is a great thing to live is because our lives are in such close relationship with those of our fellowmen. The third reason was that it is a great thing to live this life on account of his divine possibilities of this life. The mightiest factor in the world after God is a human being and human personality. In developing this point he used as illustrations: Moses, Luther, Moody, and Truitt. God plans a human life can accomplish wonders. Again it is a great thing to live because of the time in which we are living for we are heirs of all ages. He stated that we had lived a century during the last eight years. Lo, it is a great thing to live because we are living now, and this life continues into eternity.

Dr. Maddry emphasized the importance of linking our lives with God because His purpose is eternal. Everyone present enjoyed the services and is looking forward to Dr. Maddry's return.

UNBROKEN CHAIN EVIDENCE IN HANDS OF DEPARTMENT

Evidence in Murder Probe Will be Used in Grand Jury Hearing in March

New Orleans, Jan. 29.—An unbroken chain of circumstantial evidence indicating that the mutilated bodies of Watt Daniel and Thomas Richards were tossed into Lake La Fourche is in hands of the department of justice agents. The evidence which will not be used until the grand jury hearing in March showed that the bodies were weighted with great pieces of iron. Negroes will be used to corroborate the testimony of Leon Jones, the state's surprise witness. They saw the junk on the shores of the lake one day.

ONE FUNERAL SERVICE TO BE HELD FOR THE THREE VICTIMS OF AN EXPLOSION

West Palm Beach, Jan. 29.—One funeral service will be held for the three victims who met their death by an accidental explosion of dynamite last Sunday, Lawrence Hayworth, Robert Lincoln and Martin Ferns. The funeral will be held in the open air on account of the large crowd expected. Word from the hospital states that four others who were injured passed a good night. The explosion was caused when a boy fired a pistol into sack containing dynamite.

TEEGRESTROM REAPPEARS AFTER MONTH'S ABSENCE

Bastrop, Jan. 29.—Harold Tegrestrom has been found. He is the missing witness for whom authorities have been searching for more than a month and he appeared on the streets here today as if nothing had happened. No excitement marked his reappearance and Tegrestrom refused to say where he had been. His arrest is expected on a warrant issued during the open hearings, but bail will be arranged at once and he will return to work on the Carton plant.

JIM MILLER'S CASE WILL BE APPEALED TO SUPREME COURT

Appeal Being Made on Basis of Pauper Unable to Give "Appeal Bond"

Kinston, Jan. 28.—The decision in the case of Jim Miller, negro, convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to die on March 9th at Raleigh by electrocution, will be appealed to the Supreme Court, it was learned here today. John R. Denton, attorney who defended the negro, who admitted killing John Sutton, prominent planter, but who claimed in a statement to the court after the verdict was brought in, "Judge, Your Honor, if I ever told the truth in my life, I told it when I said I killed that man when he jumped on my wagon and grabbed me," filed notice of appeal Friday, soon after the verdict.

The Miller case will be appealed on the basis of an appeal by a pauper, unable to give "appeal bond." Judge Thomas H. Calvert, presiding over Superior Court here, agreed to signing the document to allow the appeal on the pauper basis.

The appeal itself will include the whole testimony of the case, typewritten, and will be sent to the Supreme Court at Raleigh. This has to be done within seven days of the execution date set by Judge Calvert. It is understood by attorneys here. The Supreme Court then has the right to investigate and set the execution date later, so as to have time to look into the matter. When an appeal is sent to the Supreme Court, that authority takes the right to put off execution till the facts of the lower court are looked into and affirmed or disagreed to.

The appeal is now being worked on and will be sent to Raleigh in plenty of time and within the legal limit of the statutes governing such appeals.

POINCARÉ WIRE KEMEL URGING HIM TO SIGN TREATY

Paris, Jan. 29.—Poincaré has intervened personally in the near east crisis and is said to have telegraphed Kemal urging him to sign the Lausanne treaty.

FRENCH TAKE OVER SECTION OCCUPIED AMERICAN TROOPS

German Railway Workers Strike When French Take Over Railway Lines

Coblentz, Jan. 28.—Two battalions of French engineers have taken over the railways and one through train to Paris was sent out tonight. The French state they will be able to operate the railway for military purpose, but not for civilians.

The tracks, bridges, switches and depot are heavily guarded. The railroad workers declared tonight they would not return to work until the French troops have left the Coblentz and other stations. There today, Friedrich Kelt, headed it was an official strike, notwithstanding the fact that the men knocked off five minutes after Major General Allen handed over command of the line to the French.

Düsseldorf, Jan. 28.—The telegraph and telephone central stations went on strike at 7 o'clock this evening. They took this action in protest against the presence of French soldiers.

London, Jan. 28.—John St. Leo Strachey, editor and proprietor of the Spectator, writes to the Times suggesting that France should be asked to accept American arbitration in the question of the Ruhr and reparations.

Paris, Jan. 28.—Tonight there is little chance that the subject of the occupation of the Ruhr district will be discussed by the Council of the League of Nations, which will meet tomorrow at the residence of Leon Bourgeois-Hjalmar Branting, the Swedish Premier, who announced before leaving home that he would bring up the question today that after a talk with Premier Poincaré, he did not think the question would be broached in the council.

"I shall not bring it up," said Mr. Branting, "I after consulting my colleagues on the council I find it would be disagreeable to any of the countries. I hope, however, that the Council will accept the mission to arbitrate the Mosul dispute, notwithstanding the great difficulties involved."

M. Branting was reticent regarding the talk with Premier Poincaré, but the French Prime Minister made it clear that the Ruhr question was not considered by the French government, a proper subject for discussion for the Council of the League of Nations.

The French government does not consider the reparations question generally now to be in such shape that league intervention could be useful; and M. Poincaré holds that under the resolution adopted by the Assembly of the League September 27, regarding the eventual discussion of reparations by the Council of the League, it was expressly stated that intervention by the Council could fully take place only on request of the powers directly interested in the question.

One of the first things that will be placed before the council tomorrow will be Lord Curzon's letter to Sir Eric Drummond, Secretary General to the League of Nations, calling the Council's attention to the Mosul dispute.

COL. R. R. COTTEN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF STATE FOREST ASSOCIATION

The North Carolina Forest Association held a most interesting meeting at Pinehurst last week. It was largely attended and much interest manifested.

Col. R. R. Cotten, of this county, was elected president and Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt, vice president, for the ensuing year.

The next meeting will be held in Washington, N. C., and Col. Cotten stated today that they are very anxious for the women of the state to become interested in the work of the association.

TWO SERMONS WERE DELIVERED IN COURT HOUSE HERE SUNDAY

Evangelist Will Preach Tonight on the Subject of "Capital Punishment"

Another splendid service was held at the court house last night. Mrs. McAdams preached a strong sermon on "Foreordination and Predestination." The Bible text was as it is written, Jacob have I loved, but Esau have I hated? God has always loved righteousness and hated sin, and in the case of Jacob and Esau he takes their finished lives to illustrate the carnal and spiritual nature. Esau represents the carnal nature and Jacob the spiritual, just as God teaches us in the fourth chapter of God, Abraham had two sons one by a bond woman the other by a free woman. These represent the two covenants. The subject of Foreordination and Predestination is what we want our congregation to hear tonight. The great plan of salvation was foreordained and predestination, before the foundation of the world! So says the apostle Peter in one of his epistles, and we are a chosen people to salvation through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth. We hear so much about election and God's elect. When a man runs for an office and gets in power by the vote of the people he is elected, so it is with us when we accept Christ, we are elected and become God's elect. By way of illustration an old colored brother once said to another as they were talking on election he says, "you see the election is going on all the time; God is voting for you and the devil against you and depends the way you vote how the election goes. So we see truth in the old man's statement. If people were predestinated and fore-ordained for heaven or hell the coming of Jesus wouldn't have changed their doom or happiness. John three sixteen tells us, "That God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life." That "Whoever" means every one. Jesus said to his disciples go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. Paul when he went to Mars Hill and preached that wonderful sermon to the heathen people said there has been a time that God winked at such ignorance, but now commandeth all men every where to repent, and Jesus said come unto me all ye, that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest. God is giving every lost soul a chance, so if you go to hell it will be through choice. The call was made and a number come forward. The subject tonight will be "Capital Punishment."

Expect McAdoo Will Speak at Exposition

Kinston, Jan. 28.—William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, will speak at the Eastern Carolina exposition at Wilson Tuesday, March 20, if possible "to arrange a hearing of a case in Augusta during the week of the exposition."

Mr. McAdoo has wired N. G. Bartlett, secretary of the Eastern Carolina chamber of commerce, that if legal business in Georgia calls him to the southeast about that time he will "certainly drop off" at the big show the commercial organization is promoting. This announcement was made by Bartlett today following a meeting here of the exposition committee. Mr. Bartlett considered the chances for the Presidential possibility's visit to be good.

Anna Case and Governor Cameron Morrison will be other headlines at the exposition, said Bartlett in announcing the nearly completed program. Miss Case will sing during the afternoon and evening of opening day, Monday, March 19th.

POLICE RAID KNOX A. D. WATTS FINDS NEGRO WOMAN

Police State That Commissioner Pledged Vigorously for Suppression of the Affair

Raleigh, Jan. 28.—A police raid on the living quarters of A. D. Watts, commissioner of Revenue for North Carolina, on the second floor of the Shepherd Building on Fayetteville Street, last night revealed the commissioner in his underwear and Grace Grantham, mulatto, who said her home was in Statesville, under the bed. Grace Grantham was charged with prostitution, while Nina Bailey, another negro woman and Robert McDuffie, negro man, who, police alleged, carried the Grantham woman to the commissioner's room, was charged with soliciting. They were released by Sergeant L. H. Woodall of the police department upon verbal orders of Judge W. C. Harris who went to the Watt's apartment after the arrest of the negroes. Watts was not carried to the police station.

"I will investigate the matter in the morning," Judge W. C. Harris stated last night. "I was assured by the gentleman who telephoned me that any required bond would be furnished and I know he is good for it."

The two women and the negro man were cited to appear in city court Saturday having been released, according to Judge Harris, upon their own recognizance.

The raid was carried out by plain clothes men Jesse Wyatt, W. F. Danielli and Patrolman Bailey. According to police statements, the uniformed men first went to the third floor with an occupant of the building who was disturbed at the presence of the policemen and then returned to the second floor. Detective Danielli knocked on the door and Commissioner Watts responded. The officer informed him that he had reports of women in the room and wanted to investigate. Watts assured him that there were no women in the room and turned back into the room. The detective followed. Grace Grantham was found under one of the two beds in the room.

According to police statements, the Commissioner pledged vigorously for suppression, stating that the news of the affair would ruin him.

McDuffie was taken into custody when he came back into the building while Nina Bailey was arrested on the street. Detective Wyatt and Patrolman Bailey went to the police station with their prisoners, leaving Detective Danielli and Commissioner Watts in the room.

It was shortly after the departure of the officers and their prisoners from the building that Judge Harris, accompanied by a friend, came to the Shepherd building in a closed car. Judge Harris went to the Watts apartment.

What went on there Judge Harris last night would not discuss. He stated frankly that if there were any way to save a man in that predicament his first impulse was to save him.

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"More is at stake than Colonel Watts," Judge Harris stated.

"I directed Captain Woodall to release the negro man and the two women on their own recognizance. I was assured by the gentleman who called me to Colonel Watt's rooms, that any required bond would be furnished and I know he is good for it."

"I am going to investigate the matter in the morning. Of course, I am not a prosecuting officer. That duty belongs to Solicitor Beckwith." Solicitor Beckwith stated last night that he had no report on the case but would draw any necessary warrants if the evidence justified."

THE AMERICAN FAREWELL

There is no doubt that, whatever the Americans thought of it, the sailing of the St. Mihiel, while the bands played the national airs, was fraught with sadness for the Belgians and for the little groups of French and British on the docks at Antwerp. The last tie that bound the Allies together seemed to have been severed. It was farewell to America. Onlookers could not but contrast the gallant bearing and the high hopes of the soldiers in khaki who arrived in France to win the war and "save civilization" with this recall and departure. The soldiers had done their work well, but the statesmen had undone much of it. Every honest Englishman and every loyal Frenchman who read of the ceremony of the flag coming down at Ehrenbreitstein forgot for the moment the mistakes of public men and thought only of what the Allies owed the American army that fought so splendidly at Cantigny, Chateau-Thierry, Soissons, in the St. Mihiel advance, and through the nest of machine guns, the Argonne Forest.

The achievement and the glory are for all time. History will say that the American invasion decided the war, and the controversies about who won it will die down. Nothing could be finer than this nation's intervention. It was a crusade for liberty. America was ready to stake her all, the lives of her sons, the accumulation of her treasure. That moment of exaltation and sacrifice will never be erased from human memory, though there be many on both sides of the Atlantic who think of it coldly now. The truest thing said about the departure of the Americans from Coblenz was uttered by Colonel Repington. It was for France and Italy as well as for England that he spoke:

KING'S SON TO WED EARL'S DAUGHTER

The Duke of York, second son of the British rulers, will wed a commoner, rather than marry outside the British Isles. His bride, it is officially announced in London, will be Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, daughter of the rather poor Earl of Strathmore, of the Scottish peerage. It is an unusual coincidence that no member of the British royalty in the past 150 years has married save in the Scottish peerage, unless the bride happened to be a foreign princess. Lady Elizabeth, who is 22, was bridesmaid to Princess Mary, the Duke's sister. The Duke of York is 27. He proposed three times—once while dancing, once while golfing and the third and last time while horseback riding.

ELABORATE PLANS FOR SUMMER CAMP NOW IN PROGRESS

Word has been received from Capt. Doxoyan Yeuell, U. S. A., acting C. M. T. C. officer of the Fourth Corps Area, which includes the states of Georgia, Alabama, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee that elaborate plans are now under way for the continuance of the government summer camps for young men which proved so popular last summer and the summer before.

Nearly three thousand young men received an outing at government expense last year, some at Fort Barrancas, Fla., on the Gulf of Mexico, and some at Camp McClellan, in the rolling, wooded hills, near Anniston, Ala. The following is a typical example of many letters being received from last year's students.

"I attended Camp McClellan the summer of 1922. I can testify for your benefit as well as others, that this month of training did me more good than any other training that I have so far received."

According to present plans, camps are to be held this year at Camp McClellan, Ala., Fort Barrancas Fla., and Fort Bragg N. C. The branches of instruction offered may be slightly

All who desire applications should state their date of birth, and former military service of any kind.

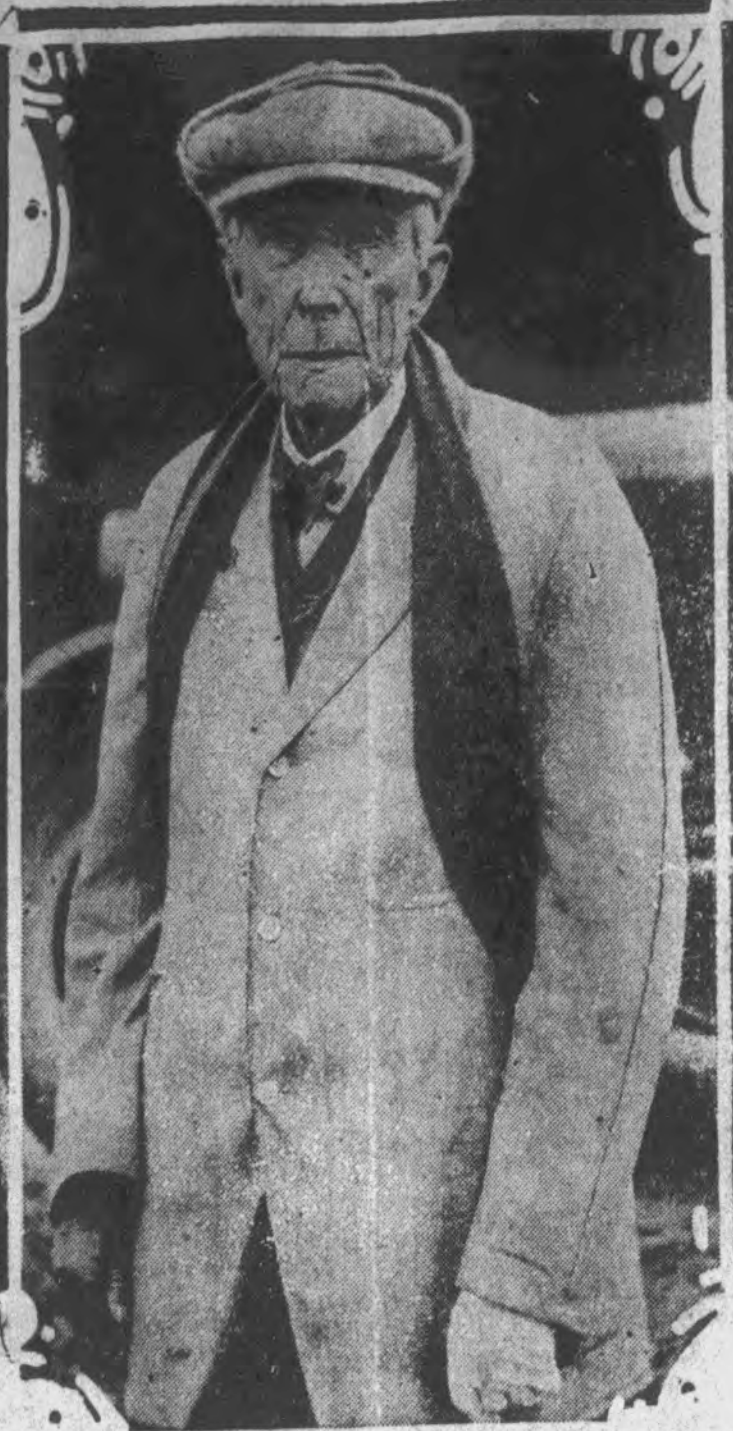

GIRL WHO "DID TIME"

BANDITRY COLLAPSES AS

SUSPICION POINTS AGAIN

24-year old
Denver girl
who served
prison term
for bandit
gang activi-
ties and col-
lapsed after
grillings

Denver, Jan.—Three years' confine-
ment in the Colorado penitentiary at
Cannon City, followed by numerous
severe grillings by Denver police short-
ly after her release from that insti-
tution, has left Eva Lewis, 24-year-
old "bandit queen," a physical wreck.
Miss Lewis is a victim of aphasia,
and lies pale and emaciated at the
home of her mother on the outskirts
of Denver.

Despite her physical debility and
complete loss of speech, the girl re-
tains much of the charm that caused
Denver Criminal Court attaches four
years ago to declare that she was the
"prettiest woman who ever was on
trial here."

Sentenced to from five to seven
years in the state penitentiary for
her activities with the famous Lewis-
Jones bandit gang, Miss Lewis was
paroled and came to Denver about 10
days before the sensational hold-up
of a Federal Reserve bank truck in
front of the Denver Mint, when \$200,-
000 in currency was stolen and one
guard fatally shot.

Immediately police started a search
for the pretty ex-convict. In the be-
lief that she might be able to throw
light on the identity of the partici-
pants in the daring robbery.

The former "bandit queen" was
subjected to hours of questioning,
and her movements were closely
watched for several days. She de-
nied all knowledge of the hold-up,
declaring that it was too deliberately
conceived for a woman to take part
in. The grilling by police soon ag-
gravated her already weakened phys-
ical condition, and a few days later
she suddenly fell unconscious on the
floor in her mother's home.

When she was revived it was dis-

covered that the girl had lost all
power of speech and apparently was
helpless. Doctors declared it was a
hysterical stupor resulting from con-
stant worry and fear as the result
of the police examinations.

Lying like a graven image, the
girl has failed to regain normal sen-
sitive faculties, although physicians
express the belief that she may even-
tually recover her voice and, with
proper care, be restored to health.

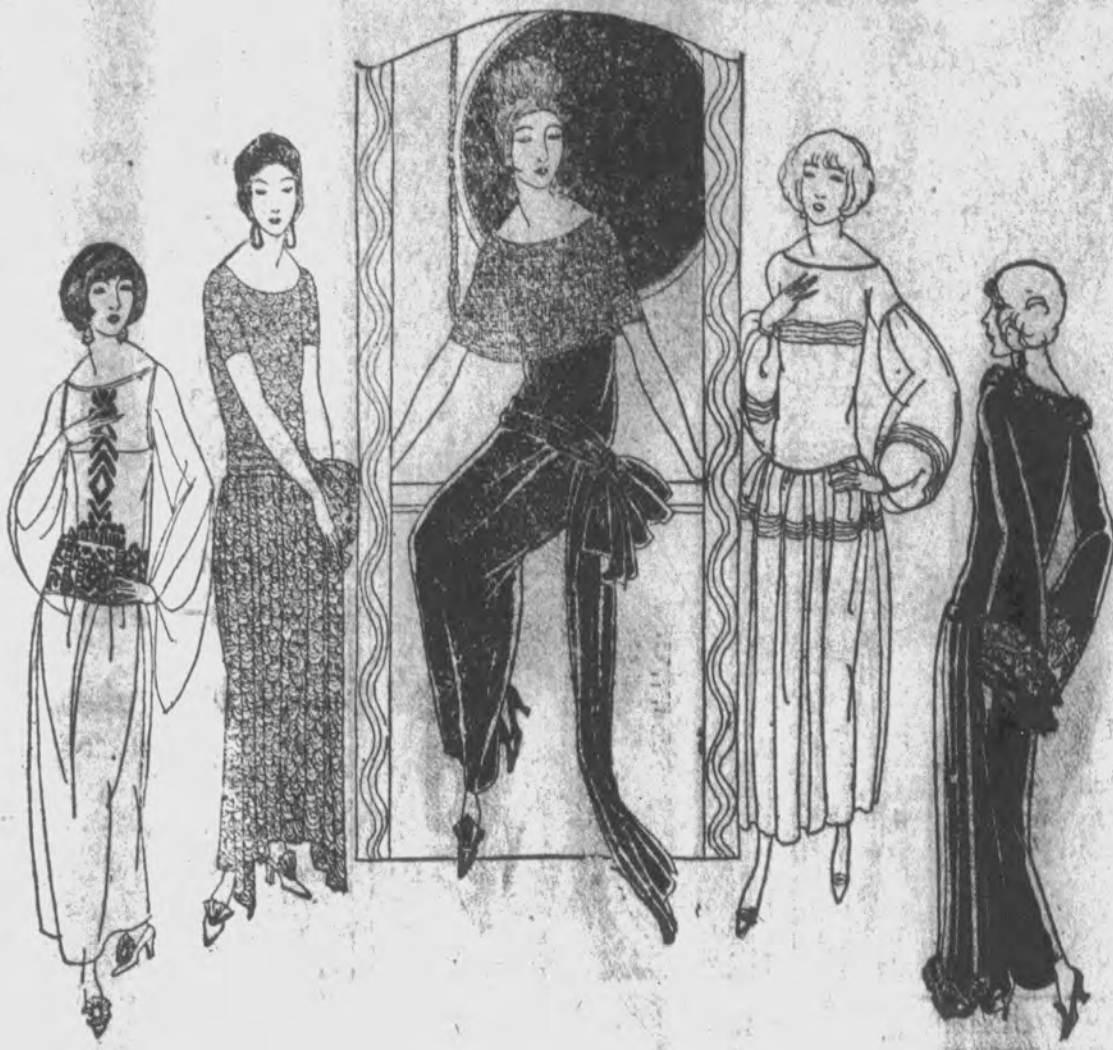
The youthful, vivacious "bandit
queen" was convicted of complicity
in the reign of terror spread by the
"Lewis-Jones bandit gang" in this
city and Colorado Springs in Septem-
ber, 1918. The gang engaged in a
gun battle in the streets of Colorado
Springs with police on the afternoon
of Friday, September 18, in which
Detective John Rowan was killed and
another officer wounded.

At 8 o'clock the same night the
gang staged another gun battle with
nine Denver officers in this city,
wounding two detectives. An hour
later they held up an automobile
party in the fashionable Country Club
district, drove the machine several
miles from the city and threw the
occupants out. Returning to Denver
in the stolen car, the gang, at 1:30
the following morning, attacked and
shot two policemen who were guard-
ing a house the gang had been oc-
cupying.

Miss Lewis was arrested shortly af-
terwards. She declared at that time
that she had "committed no wrong,"
but had merely gotten into "bad com-
pany," declaring that she had be-
come associated with the gang in an
effort to protect her brother who was
believed to be a member of the out-
law troupe.

TAMPA ROWS OVER NEW VAGRANT LAW

(By International News.)

Tampa, Fla.—An appeal to the
supreme court of Florida has been
taken by the city of Tampa in an ef-
fort to continue the operation of the
present ordinance against vagrants,
which was declared unconstitutional
recently by Circuit Judge F. M.
Robles on the ground that the or-
dinance places the burden of proof
upon the defendants instead of upon
the city.

In getting permission from the
City commissioners to take the ap-
peal, City Attorney H. S. Hampton
stated that the wording of the city
ordinance here is similar to that in
successful operation in nearly every
city in the country and to have it re-
pealed would seriously handicap the
police department. In case the de-
cision of the circuit court holds when
the case is brought to the supreme
court, a new ordinance will be pass-
ed, worded differently.

The police department, it is de-
clared, has a hard time even as it
is to enforce the laws against the
idle class and just now is engaged
in waging a war against the "high-
er up" class of vagrants, who in
many cases are reported to be heads
of bootlegging, moonshining, Chinese
smuggling and automobile stealing
gangs. The decision of the circuit
court will affect a number of these
cases now pending.

During the winter months pro-
fessional crooks from the larger
cities of the north often come to this
section to fleece tourists through
various confidence games, and the
police have to deal with this class,
in addition to the regular crop of
offenders.

BOY ON TRIAL FOR HERMIT'S SLAYING

(By International News.)

Binghamton, N. Y., Jan.—Elmer
Warbourn, fourteen-year-old Brush-
ville, Pa., schoolboy, goes on trial
for his life at Montrose, Pa., just
over the State line from this city.

Warbourn, who faces the death
sentence if convicted, is charged
with the cold-blooded slaying of Cy-
rus Payne, 75-year-old hermit, that
he might steal the hoarded hundreds
of the aged miser.

Warbourn, taken from his seat in
school by State troopers from Wyom-
ing Barracks and faced with facts
regarding the killing of the aged
man, is alleged to have confessed
committing the crime.

He told the troopers that when the
aged recluse displayed bills of large
denominations before him, the total
of which exceeded \$2,400, tempta-
tion proved too much and he plan-
ned to get the money for himself.

The boy, in the habit of doing
chores and preparing meals for the
man, is alleged to have gone to his
cabin, a lonely hut on the back fields
of a farm, on the morning of the
murder, prepared some pancakes for
him, and while his back was turned
beat the old man on the head with
the barrel of a rifle, killing him al-
most instantly.

Carefully covering his tracks, the
boy is said to have boldly stepped
into the limelight two days later,
when the body of the man was found.
This act, arousing the suspicions of
the State trooper investigating the
case, caused his downfall.

BOULDER PLANS BIG \$12,000,000 ELECTRIC PLANT

(By International News.)

Boulder, Col., Jan. — Plans are progressing here for the construction of the largest steam electric generating plant ever built on an artificial body of water in the United States.

The huge project, when complete, will involve an expenditure of approximately \$12,000,000. It will develop 250,000 horsepower and supply electric current and power to Denver, Loveland, Fort Collins, Greeley and Boulder, as well as a score of smaller towns in northern Colorado. It is also expected the plant will furnish electric power for the Moffat tunnel equipment when that bore is drilled through the Continental Divide.

The plant will be erected on the

South Boulder Ditch, a stream that supplies water to Boulder Lake and Weisenhorn Lake. Its location is within easy access of cheap powdered fuel mines at Louisville, Lafayette and Frederick, and the plant will have an underground storage capacity of 50,000 tons of coal, while it is expected 125,000 tons will be consumed annually.

Transmission lines, supported by huge steel towers, will carry 100,000 volts of electrical current throughout the territory to be served.

A radical departure from precedent in construction of the plant is the fact it will be built on a "still" water stream instead of a "flowing" stream.

After innumerable experiments and demonstrations, the Government announced the discovery of a method of poisoning with calcium arsenate, which, if properly done, will control the weevil and make cotton growing profitable in badly infested sections.
