Talks Are Features of the
Evening's Program

Though last night was the regular business meeting of the Greenville Rotary club the meeting was featured by one of the best programs of any recently given and all those attending thoroughly enjoyed it and derived great deal of benefit as well.

The meeting was presided over by President Jasper E. Winslow and following grace by Rev. George N. Matthis, of Clinton, guest of the club, the regular supper was served. After supper came the reading of the minutes and reports of the various committees. It was the unanimous vote of the club that the Boys' Work committee be instructed to begin immediately making preparations for a Pitt county track meet similar to the one held here last year. The meet last year was one of the biggest events ever held in this county and the committee is determined to make the one this season even greater.

Following the report of the committee in charge of arrangements for the attendance of the local club at the district conference to be held in Petersburg on March 6th and 7th an invitation to the club to be in charge of the program at one of the model luncheons at the conference was accepted and no doubt Greenville will be proud of the position made by her club. Special pullmans will be chartered by the club and it is expected that no less than one hundred per cent of the membership will attend the conference.

MECHANIC FOUND DEAD IN AUTO IN HEART NEW BERN

Absence of Powder Burns on
Body of Dead Man Dispels
Theory of Suicide

New Bern, Jan. 29.—Mystery shrouds the death of Roger Parrker, an automobile mechanic, who was found dead in his Ford touring car in front of the Athens Theatre, in the very heart of this city tonight. Clutched in the dead man's hand was a .38 revolver, with four chambers freshly discharged, while a bullet had crashed through his right temple making a clean hole and leaving his head through the left temple tearing away a portion of the skull. The fatal bullet was located in the cap of the dead man.

Although the automobile in which the dead man was found was located in the very heart of New Bern, there were no witnesses of the shooting who could be found, and the operator of the moving picture show in front of which the car was parked, stated that he heard no shots. Absence of powder burns on the temple of the dead man dispelled the idea of suicide. The still warm body was found crumpled up on the front seat of the car by Albert Ballard about ten o'clock last night. A coroner's jury was immediately summoned and an inquest was being held over the body at a late hour tonight. Indications were that the jury would render a verdict that the deceased came to his death at the hands of unidentified parties.

Parker was an automobile mechanic, who ran a small garage in Bridgeton, across the Neuse River from New Bern. He leaves a wife and three small children under four years of age.

Subject "Capital Punishment"
is Heard by Large Crowd in
Services Last Night

BALANCED BUDGET IS EXPECTED AT END OF FISCAL YEAR

Lower Taxes May Result From
Big Cuts in Government Expenditures

Washington, Jan. 30.—Big cuts in expenditures and larger revenues than expected from income taxes and customs collections will enable the government to end the present fiscal year with a surplus instead of a deficit of a quarter of a million dollars. Officials predict a possible reduction in taxes as the forecast if the rigid economy program as mapped out by the president and entrusted to the budget director for execution is carried out.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Representatives of the government's "business organization," assembled for consideration of budget problems, were told today in a message from President Harding that for the first time since the fiscal year 1916, the nation's income and outgo probably would balance at the end of the current fiscal year on June 30. The President's message, delivered by Vice President Coolidge, announced that instead of a deficit of \$698,000,000, estimated at the beginning of the fiscal year, the economy drive had ten days ago forced a reduction to \$92,000,000.

Mr. Harding urged a continuation of the efforts at curtailing expenditures and eliminating waste, declaring that by such continued attention would the balance budget be realized on January 30. Kinston, Jan. 30.—Rev. C. K. Proctor, pastor of Queen Street Methodist Church, today announced that the damage from fire in that edifice the night of January 22, had been estimated at \$5,000. First estimates placed the damage at \$2,000 more or less. Walls, carpet and organ were damaged by the flames, which were discovered near the heating plant in the basement during a reception to Pastor Proctor and his wife.

IMPORTANT BILLS SCHEDULED FOR DISPOSAL TODAY

Legislature to Take Action
During Today's Session on
Increased Road Bonds

Raleigh, Jan. 29.—The Senate last night unanimously confirmed without discussion the appointment of R. A. Doughton of Allegheny, as Commissioner of Revenue; deferred until today consideration of the highway bill increasing the amount of road bonds from \$50,000,000 to \$65,000,000 and increasing the tax on gasoline from one cent to three cents a gallon at the request of Senator A. F. Sams, of Forsyth, chairman of the committee; and consumed most of its session of an hour and thirty minutes in discussion of the bill affecting speeding in Buncombe and Madison counties. The House had a session even more closely devoted to routine.

The speeding bill as originally steered through the House by Representative Nettles, of Buncombe, provided that any violation of the State law limiting traffic on public highways 30 miles an hour should be punishable in Buncombe and Madison counties by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500. The bill struck its first snag in the Senate in the committee on counties, cities and towns, where an amendment was inserted providing that the drastic penalty should apply only to speeding at a rate greater than 35 miles an hour. After the bill had passed its second reading in the Senate on a divided vote it was referred to the committee on public roads for burial but Senator Ebbs, of Buncombe secured a favorable report, with another proviso to the effect that persons bound over to superior court under the act should not be required to give bond in excess of the sum of \$50. Senator Woltz last night began a debate which became general with a plea for a statewide system of laws regulating traffic on the state system of highways. However, senatorial courtesy and local self-government won out, the bill passing its third reading by a vote of 26 to 13.

GOVERNOR ACCEPTS THE RESIGNATION OF COLONEL A. D. WATTS

Result of Raid on Commissioner
of Revenue's Room in
Which Negress Was Found

WATTS WRITES ONLY
TEN WORDS WHEN HE
SENDS IN RESIGNATION

Senate Confirms Appointment
of Doughton, Who Has Had
a Brilliant Career in State

Raleigh, Jan. 29.—Governor Cameron Morrison today received and accepted the resignation of Col. A. D. Watts, state commissioner of revenue and appointed Representative Robert A. Doughton, of Allegheny county to succeed to the office, it was announced at the governor's office late today.

The announcement of the resignation to become effective immediately following the issuance of a warrant this afternoon by local police authorities, charging him with aiding and abetting immoral conduct. A negro man and two women also were cited to appear in court next Saturday to answer to charges out of the case. The negroes were arrested last night and were released without bond.

Aside from the bare announcement that Colonel Watts had resigned and that Mr. Doughton had been appointed to succeed him, no other statement was given out at the governor's office late today.

Col. Watt's resignation was contained in a letter of only ten words reading:

"I herewith hand you my resignation to become effective immediately. The governor is said to have acted on the resignation a short time after it was received.

Mr. Watts, known throughout the state in political circles, was appointed to the position of commissioner of revenue by Governor Cameron Morrison when the latter came into office two years ago. He and Governor Morrison are said to have been long personal and political friends.

Mr. Doughton has served in the General Assembly for more than 25 years at one time or another. He is recognized as majority leader in the House and was one of the strongest supporters of road building measures.

BASEBALL FEVER GAINING IMPETUS

Talking with some of the baseball enthusiasts of the city, who steered the national pastime since its first organization here several years ago, we are inclined to think there will be. Or rather these gentlemen assert that Greenville is ready to entertain any proposition that will bring baseball here for the coming summer.

Because of the exceedingly high salaries paid the players last year, the local team was a losing proposition to the promoters. Some of which were forced to pony up several hundred dollars at the close of the season in order to cancel all obligations for which the directors were responsible. This deficit caused the interested ones to become disinterested at that time. But as the season approaches these individuals are the strongest advocates for a team. These facts should encourage those who wonder, to the belief that there will be a league, and that Greenville will, as always, be represented at any and all preceding conferences that usually come just prior to organization.

Not much baseball dope has been heard from the other cities constituting last year's league. But a word here and there leads many to believe that the larger towns are ready to be listed as entrants. The smaller towns have already served notice that they would not be interested. This of course means the taking in of more territory should the league be represented in as many places as last year.

It is thought that a large majority of last season's players are available should they be wanted in a local uniform. Beall, last year's pitching star has been reinstated by the baseball commission, and purchased from the Norfolk club of the Virginia League by Rochester of the International class.

There are yet several weeks to talk baseball before the opening of the season, and the agitation of any question usually brings results.

TRANS-OCEANIC RADIO PHONE IS FRUIT OF YEARS

(By HARRY S. DENLINGER, International News Service Staff Correspondent.)

New York—Tales of experiments extending over a score of years to determine the possibilities of trans-oceanic radiophone communication which culminated recently in the successful transmission of spoken messages from New York City to England were told by General John J. Carty, vice-president and chief engineer of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company, in an interview granted to International News Service.

While Carty declared that there are still difficulties to be overcome before the "transatlantic telephone" would become a commercially accomplished fact, he appeared certain that this would ultimately be achieved.

"Somehow or another we are bound to have it," he said vehemently.

Better in Winter.
"We have discovered through this series of experiments that talking 'gets through' better in winter than in summer, in daylight than in darkness and on some days than on others."

"When we know absolutely why these things are true, then we will be able to predict accurately the future of trans-oceanic radio."

The American Telephone & Telegraph has been conducting experiments in radio telephony for a score of years, Carty said, and has been working on the series of tests which resulted in communication with England in conjunction with the American Radio Corporation for some time prior to the experiment.

"We first met with success in our attempts in 1915," he said. "In that year we succeeded in getting through to France, where our messages were received by observers at

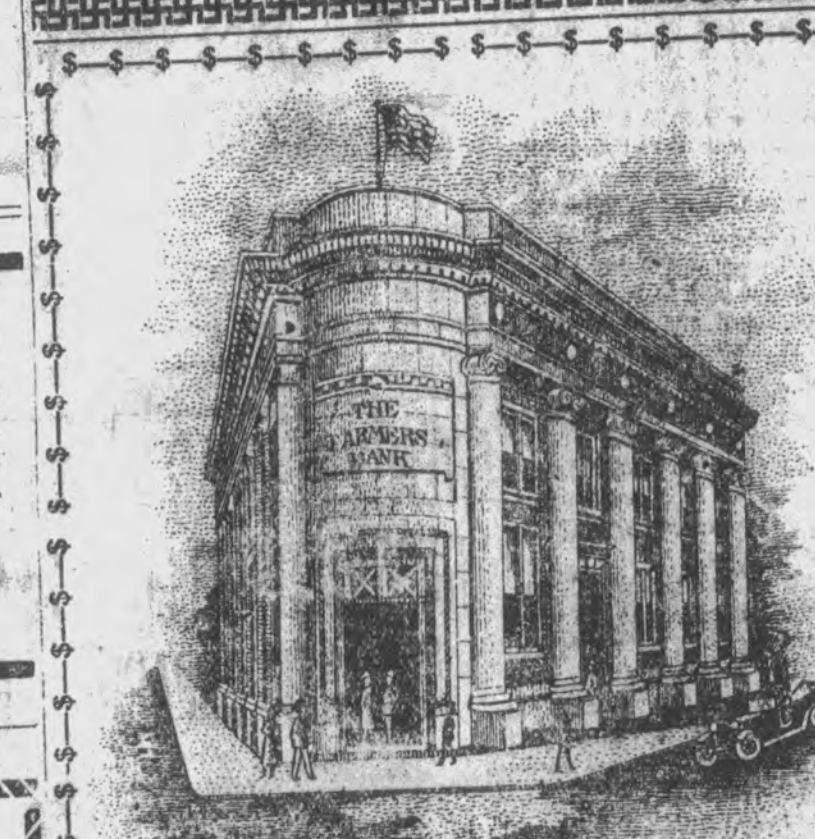

U. S. TRACTORS
PLANT THE GRAIN
FOR RUSSIANS

(By International News.)

Moscow, Jan.—American tractors, operated by American engineers, have tilled the soil of 4,000 Russian acres and planted enough grain to feed 5,000 Russian miners for a year.

Next season, it is expected, the American farmer will have under cultivation more than 10,000 acres.

The American tractor unit, as it is known, was sent over last summer by the friends of Soviet Russia in the United States. It was assigned to the Kiesel mine area in Perm, where the Russian peasants had been unable to grow sufficient food to supply the men who operate the mine. The miners had been granted a tract of 14,000 acres by the government, but had succeeded

with hand sickles because of lack of equipment. Due to these handicaps many miners had left the district, and many of the peasants were starving.

With their first summer's work completed, about half of the American unit have returned home. The remaining members have "dug in" for the winter and are spending the long, cold months in overhauling their equipment and preparing for spring

planting. "We cannot speak too warmly of the help given us by the local peasants," said Harold Ware, leader of the unit. "They are energetic workers, naturally intelligent and needing only the opportunity to acquire and learn to use machinery." About 40 peasants have been trained in the use of tractors by the American unit, and many others are undergoing tutelage.

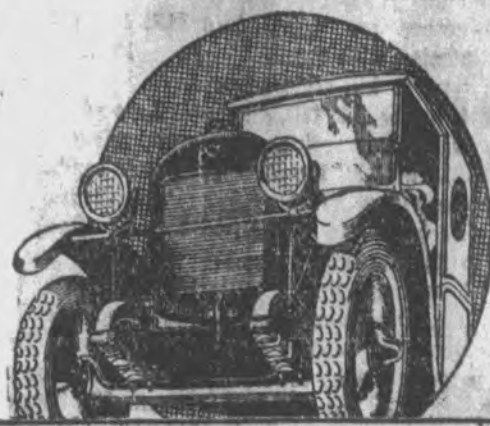

TOBACCO ALL SOLD

Association Disposes of Entire Amount of Weed Received.

Lexington, Ky., Jan. 28. — Sales of burley tobacco of the 1922 crop by the Burley Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association to date total between 100,000,000 and 25,000,000 pounds, President and General Manager James C. Stone said today. Practically all the tobacco delivered to the association by the growers has been taken or now is being delivered to the purchasers, and deliveries of the remainder to the manufacturers will be made as rapidly as the tobacco is brought by the growers to the co-operative receiving plants.

Every pound of the 1922 tobacco sold to date has been sold at the associations' prices and on its grade. All the tobacco that had been redried by the association and which was included among the deliveries to the manufacturers brought the green price plus all the cost of redrying and handling, it was said.

Every extra calculator and clerk available has been put to work by Secretary and Treasurer H. Leo Earley preparing the checks for the third and final payment to the members on their 1922 crops, which will mean the distribution in the burley district of approximately \$5,000,000, in addition to the advances made to the growers on the 1922 crop so far delivered.—Winston-Salem Tobacco Journal.

WINTER MONTHS IS LOGICAL TIME KILL FRUIT TREE INSECTS

(Auspices Pitt County Chamber of Commerce.)

During the winter months, particularly January and February, we should examine our fruit trees and berry bushes to see if there are any scale insects on the twigs or small branches.

During the winter the insects are in an inactive or dormant state and appear like small scales lying snug and flat against the back of the plant. They can be dislodged by scraping the twig, and this is the best way to determine whether our trees and bushes are infested with them.

The best time to kill scale insects by spraying is in the late fall, during the winter, or in early spring. During that period all the insects that can survive the winter will be found on the tree or bush and this makes it possible to kill the largest number of them with one spraying.

At that time, also, a stronger solution of the spraying mixture can be used and the work can be done when other farm work is not demanding our attention.

Winter spraying, however, can be done only on warm days when the sun is shining, so that the liquid shining, so that the liquid spray will not freeze before it comes in contact with the insects. The best mixture for winter spraying is lime and sulphur. This can be made on the farm by using 15 pound of stone lime, 15 pounds of flour of sulphur, 15 pounds of common salt and 50 gallons of hot water.

The lime is slacked with the hot water and the sulphur is added, just enough water being used to dissolve both the lime and the sulphur. The mixture is then boiled for about an hour, or until the liquid turns to the color of yellow amber and is fairly clear.

The salt is then added and the

mixture boiled for another 15 minutes or until all the salt is dissolved. The mixture should then be strained and diluted with enough hot water to make 50 gallons. It should be applied while warm, through a coarse nozzle.

The lime-sulphur mixture, already prepared, can be purchased in either liquid or powder form, and it should be as good as the home-made mixture.

In spraying we must bear in mind that to be entirely effective the mixture must come in contact with every scale insect. For his reason the work must be thoroughly done.

Tail Lights For British Airplanes Undergoes Opera

London, Jan. 30.—All British aeroplanes, military and civil, will in future, when flying at night, have to carry white rear lights on each wing tip and on the tail, according to a new British Air Ministry regulation. "Lighting up time" will be half an hour before sunset.
