

BORAH RENEWS HIS PROPOSAL BEFORE THE SENATE BODY

Idaho Senator Insists on International Economic Conference at Call of Harding

Washington, Jan. 30. — Senator Borah renewed in the Senate today his proposal for an international economic conference to be called by President Harding.

The conference proposal, which already has been the center of one Senate storm and is expected to develop another, was submitted this time by the Idaho Senator as a separate resolution, which at his own request immediately was laid aside for consideration after pending farm credit legislation is out of the way.

To prevent any undue delay, however, Mr. Borah indicated that the proper time came he would move to add the resolution as an amendment to some bill already under discussion.

The resolution was almost identical with the Borah naval bill amendment, which Mr. Borah withdrew recently after administration leaders had said it would embarrass State Department negotiations then in progress.

The President, under the resolution, would be requested to invite such governments as he might deem desirable to a conference charged with the duty of considering the economic problems now obtaining throughout the world, with a view of arriving at such adjustments or settlements as seem essential to the restoration of trade and to the establishment of sound financial business conditions.

Another clause would provide for a further conference for limitation of naval armaments and air craft.

It was emphasized at the White House again today that President Harding does not regard the calling of a world economic conference as a practical means of dealing with the European situation.

Had the President any thought that the calling of such a conference could accomplish any good, it was said authoritatively, an invitation from the United States would have been issued long ago.

VETERAN ARRESTED AS DRAFT INVADER

Macon, Ga. — Ernest W. Brown, a veteran of no less than four major engagements in the world war, wondered what it was all about when he was arrested here charged with being a draft evader.

Brown was called in July, 1917, but he wasn't exactly where he could hear the call. He was already a member of the Rainbow Division and right at that time had other things on his mind.

He promptly told the detectives making the arrest he was well on his way to France when Crowder's clarification call sounded throughout the length and breadth of the land.

Brown was released when Major-General David C. Shanks, commanding the Fourth Corps area, paroled him in custody of the Joseph Neel Post of the American Legion until a further investigation could be made.

At the same time, and acting on information obtained from the same circular on which Brown was taken into custody, the local authorities arrested Jess Kennedy, a negro, as a draft evader.

The negro advanced a "fair to middling" reason for not answering the call.

He has a wooden leg that he has had since 1909 he said.

LOCAL YOUNG MAN DIES AT KINSTON LATE YESTERDAY

Robert B. Starr, Prominent Young Banker of This City Dies From Appendicitis

Mr. Robert B. Starr, age 28, of this city, died yesterday afternoon at four o'clock in a Kinston hospital following a recent operation for appendicitis. Mr. Starr underwent an operation last Friday morning and since that time the doctors had entertained very little hope for his recovery. Rev. V. P. Scoville, his pastor, and Mr. Ernest Dudley, of this city, accompanied the remains to Wilkesboro, where interment will take place.

Mr. Starr was born in Wilkesboro, N. C., and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Starr. He received his early education in the schools of his native city after which he was a student at the University of North Carolina. A little over five years ago he came to Greenville accepting a position as assistant cashier of the Farmers Bank and during his stay in this city he gained the confidence and admiration of all with whom he came in contact. He was a member of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church of this city and an active member of the local lodge of Knights of Pythias.

He is survived by his parents, a sister, Miss Eloise Starr and a brother, Mr. W. W. Starr, all of Wilkesboro, who have the heartfelt sympathy of all who knew Bob.

Mr. Bryan was president of the National Bank of New Bern, and has served his city and county in several capacities. He was at one time representative in the state legislature, chairman of the county commissioners, president of the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad, an official of Christ Episcopal church, and interested in everything that pertained to the welfare of his community.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Alice Biddle Bryan, and one son, C. S. Bryan, of New York.

Few citizens have ever lived in New Bern who have been held in higher esteem and whose death is so sincerely mourned.

TOBACCO MARKET WILL CLOSE AFTER SALE NEXT FRIDAY

Season Proves One of Best in the History of the Greenville Market

One of the best seasons in the history of the Greenville tobacco market will come to a close after the sale of Friday February 2. Though the crop was short in this immediate vicinity this year, the final totals will probably show the sale of nearly twenty-two million pounds, and at prices that have been highly satisfactory. The market has drawn from a greater territory this year than ever before and the new fields made are numerous. Such an expansion as the past season has shown is not only good for the market but equally as good for the town.

Manchester, England, Jan. 31.—Ambassador Harvey has informed Premier Law that Britain's interest would be best served by accepting the American terms for funding the British war debt but that Harding would re-open negotiations in 1924 if re-elected, according to a statement in the Manchester Guardian.

Greenville met with stronger opposition than they had anticipated, and as a consequence the visitors started scoring before the locals realized they were facing so fast a team. TWIN-CITY MAN IS MADE MEMBER OF ROAD COMMISSION

Alexander S. Hanes, Tire Manufacturer Is Named by Morrison From 7th District

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—Without waiting for the piling up of endorsement for anybody Governor Morrison yesterday named a successor to R. A. Doughton as a member of the State Highway Commission for the Seventh district, by offering the job to Alexander S. Hanes, well-known tire manufacturer of Winston-Salem and within the hour stood by and looked on while Mr. Doughton assumed the oath of office as State Revenue Commissioner.

It is assumed here that Mr. Hanes will accept. He was suggested to Governor Morrison by many friends, and the appointment is thoroughly acceptable to Mr. Doughton, and to Frank Page, chairman of the Commission. He is president of the Hanes Rubber Company, manufacturers of the well known Hanes tires. He is a nephew of P. H. Hanes, once a figure in the tobacco industry and later head of the great knitting plant that bear his name.

ANGLO-FRENCH ACCORD NEAR BREAKING POINT AT LAUSANNE CONFERENCE

Lausanne, Jan. 30. — Complications suddenly arose among the Allied representatives at the Near East peace conference at a late hour tonight when the French delegation announced that it had decided to remain in Lausanne as long as there was any hope of carrying on successful negotiations with the Turks.

The British delegation considered the decision of the French as a flagrant violation of the understanding reached between the Allies a few days ago that all of them leave Lausanne at the end of the week if the Turks did not sign tomorrow the treaty which has been handed them. All the British delegates announced officially tonight they would adhere to this program whatever the other Allied delegations decided to do. Earl Curzon will start for London Friday.

IOWA SENATOR WILL STRIVE TO OBTAIN RADICAL CHANGES

Washington, Jan. 31. — Senator Brookhart, of Iowa, will shortly introduce a bill repealing the Esch-Cummins transportation act and drastically modifying the railway control of the United States, it has been learned. The supporters of the proposal do not believe that this action will be procured at this session but they want it before the country for discussion so that the change can be forced in the next congress.

SENSATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS EXPECTED IN TENNESSEE CASE

Greenville, Tenn., Jan. 31.—County Attorney, Lovett, has issued a warning to the detectives investigating the death of Dr. Frank Fox, which occurred several weeks ago, "put up or shut up." He demanded either proof or retraction of rumors concerning certain persons. The detectives have denied the responsibility of these rumors and added developments of sensational nature are expected shortly.

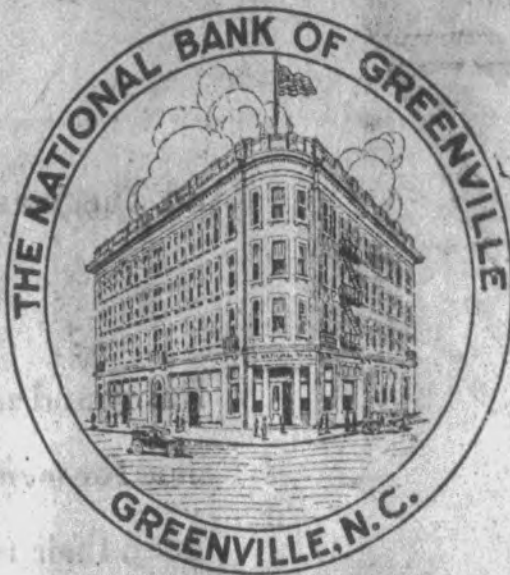

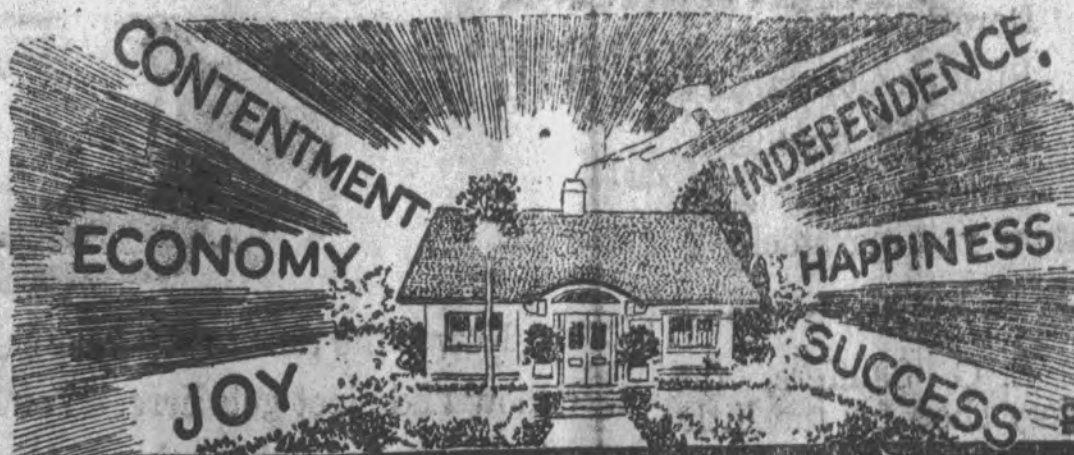

MAKE THE DAIRY COW YOUR PARTNER.

(Auspices Pitt County Chamber of Commerce.)

The surest way for a farmer to become permanently prosperous is to make the dairy cow his partner.

The dairy farmer has something to sell every day in the year, always has ready cash and is not dependent upon one crop which may be a failure or may have to be sold at a low price. The range of prices on which dairy products are produced is the same as the range of prices on which they are sold.

Dairy farmers are always prosperous. Dairy communities are always prosperous communities. Dairy farming means clovers and pastures and these maintain the humus in the soil and build up the fertility of the land.

Dairy farming results in better

farm homes and better farm buildings and equipment. All those things result in increasing the value of farm lands.

Fifty per cent of all the dairy cattle in the United States are owned by the farmers of the twelve Corn Belt states. Since 1910 the number of dairy cows in the Corn Belt has increased 24 per cent and today, according to U. S. census returns the average value per acre of farm land in those states is \$93. The value of farm land in the five leading dairy states of the Corn Belt—Wisconsin, Ohio, Minnesota, Illinois and Iowa—is \$156 per acre.

On the other hand, in the fifteen Southern States, where there are only half as many dairy cattle as there are in the twelve Corn Belt states and where the number has increased only 15 per cent since 1910, the average value of farm land is only \$31 an acre.

North Carolina needs more dairy cattle. Nine of the fifteen Southern states have a larger number.

North Carolina is the fifth state in the Union in the number of farms and only twenty states have more farm acreage. These facts combined with the long growing seasons in the South should make North Carolina one of the leading dairy states and yet twenty-four states have more dairy cattle than has North Carolina.

As stated above, the increase in the number of dairy cattle in the Corn Belt since 1910 was 24 per cent. In the entire United States the increase was 21 per cent. In the Eastern and Southern states it was 15 per cent, and in the western states 45 per cent. In North Carolina it was 18 per cent.

The average number of dairy cattle to the farm in the Eastern states is 6 1-2, in the Corn Belt states 5 3-4, in the western states 4, and in the United States as a whole, 3 3-5. In the Southern states it is 2 and in North Carolina only 1 1-3.

If North Carolina had as many dairy cows to the farm as there are on the average Corn Belt farm, it would be the fifth state in the Union in the number of dairy cows, ranking above both Illinois and Iowa where farm land averages over \$200 an acre.

Exclusive cotton or grain farming has bankrupted many communities. It would have ruined North Carolina if it had been continued. Fortunately, many sections of the state have awakened to the danger that threatened it and have taken up dairy farming and crop rotation.

No matter where he lives, the farmer who is permanently prosperous is he who makes the dairy cow his partner.

Dairy farming always results in crop rotation and diversified farming. To grow nothing but wheat or corn or cotton year after year is the one-crop system of farming.

The cotton crop or the wheat crop or the corn crop is ready for market only once a year, but the dairy cow produces every day in the year and every day in the year her product is ready for market.
