THE FUNDING OF BRITAIN'S DEBT UP TO CONGRESS

British Ambassador and American Commission Have Reached Virtual Agreement

Washington, Feb. 1.—The American Debt Funding Commission reached a virtual agreement late today with Six Auland Gedds, the British ambassador, acting for his government, on the program for funding Great Britain's war-time debt to the United States. Only the working details of the program, accepted "in principle" yesterday by the British cabinet, remained to be disposed of tonight and official spokesmen for the American commission emphasized that disposition of those details undoubtedly would be completed at a meeting of the committee with the British ambassador tomorrow. The hope was expressed that final action would be taken and the commission's recommendations submitted to the President Saturday, so that he, in turn, would be ready early next week to transmit them to congress for the action which would convert the tentative settlement into an accomplished fact and mark the first adjustment of any of the world war international debts.

Members of the commission declined to discuss more than briefly the procedure likely to be asked of congress in ratifying the agreement, but indications appeared strongly to favor action by congress on legislation specifically embodying the British terms and omitting further changes in the foreign debt funding act.

Meanwhile, obstacles already have begun to loom for the measure designed to ratify the settlement, whatever its form. The soldier bonus advocates have begun to discuss tacking a bonus amendment to the debt settlement bill or resolution and, it was said, have gone so far as to count noses in the House to determine whether they could override the Speaker if he should rule that such an amendment was out of order. Representative Fish, Republican, New York, has made known that he intends to offer such an amendment and was said to be prepared to wage a fight on the floor of the House if necessary.

In the Senate, Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, voiced the belief that the debt funding settlement legislation would have rough sailing in congress, declaring that it would be "some time" before congress would agree to the arrangement. In the course of debate that became general he declared propaganda was being sent out to influence congress, described the settlement plan as a subsidy to Great Britain and demanded that the British government made to pay as much as this government is obligated to pay on its own securities.

Treasury officials whose attention was called to the Tennessee Senator's remarks, reiterated that it had been the position of the American commission throughout the negotiations to reach an agreement by which this government would receive in interest from the British government in amounts that would virtually offset its own interest charges on like amounts of borrowed capital. Congressional leaders have begun to lay plans to meet the gathering storm and half a dozen of them have conferred with the President on the situation. The President has been informed of the status in each House and it was indicated in high administration circles the debt commission and the President will work out recommendations putting the settlement plan on a basis as nearly as "bomb proof" as possible.

GERMAN LABOR IS LOOKING AMERICA TO SAVE EUROPE

Declares That American Labor Can Save Europe and the World From Disaster

Berlin, Feb. 1.—Organized German labor, speaking for more than half of the population of the German republic, views the American congress as the logical tribunal to which to address an appeal, declaring that "American honor asserted at this time can save Europe and the world from inevitable disaster."

This is the keynote of a message which was forwarded to Washington this afternoon, carrying the signatures of the chairmen of the executive board of the General Federation of Trade Unions, and Federation of Christian Labor Unions, the League of Clerical Employees and the Independent Federation of Liberal Trade Unions, which embrace a registered membership of twelve million male and female workers.

Labor's action is the direct outcome of apprehensions with which the situation growing out of the occupation of the Ruhr is viewed by the federation leaders, regardless of their political affiliations, and the telegraphic appeal to both Houses of congress is a briefly and informally worded message recalling the German workmen's willingness to submit to complete disarmament and their prompt readiness to adopt a democratic constitution in return for the American promise that right and justice should prevail in the post-war adjustments.

The labor leaders assert that their action was undertaken independent of an influence from official sources, which it was stated, would first learn of the appeal to the American Congress in case it was reported back from Washington. Neither has the German press been apprised of this unique procedure.

FRENCH SOLDIERS FIRE ON GERMAN TRAIS AT ESSEN

London, Feb. 2.—French soldiers fired on trains today which failed to stop at Essen says the Central News Dispatch. Berlin also said that orders had been issued by the Germans to the Ruhr railway directors and workers not to obey French orders and to maintain train service to and from occupied areas.

Essen, Feb. 2.—One German miner is reported shot by a French soldier near Brechten because the Germans refused to sign a pledge presented to them binding them to help the French work the German mines to get coal out of the Ruhr.

NO RECONCILIATION BETWEEN GERALDINE FARRAR HUSBAND

Atlanta, Feb. 2.—There will be no home reconciliation between Geraldine Farrar and Lou Tellegan, according to Thomas Mahoney, referee in the proceedings who is Atlanta to observe the proceedings of the Federal Trade Commission. He will return to New York where on Monday Farrar will give testimony in the case.

Men and Whiskey Come to Grief When Boat is Captured

New York Feb. 2.—Three men and three thousand and thirty bottles of whiskey came to grief when the police boat, Blue Boy, was captured running a sloop propose after a stern chase in the lower bay.

ANOTHER NEGRO CONNECTED WITH ENTERING HOME

Willie Daniels Implicates Johnnie Jenkins as Having Part in Burglarizing Home

Willie Daniels, the negro boothblack arrested yesterday for attempting to enter Wednesday night the residence of Mr. W. G. Craft, on Greene street and who later submitted to the charge, now implicates Johnnie Jenkins, another negro boy as an accomplice. Jenkins was immediately arrested and like Daniels is behind the bars of the local prison awaiting a preliminary hearing.

It is difficult to get heads or tails from Daniels admission in which connection he implicates the Jenkins boy. His statement, that the boy stood watch while he attempted to enter the house prompted officers to make the second arrest. Since then Daniels says that Jenkins is in no way connected with the burglary charge. But later he tells that his first story is correct.

There are three degrees of burglary. The first is the breaking into a home in which the inmates are asleep; the second is the entering a dwelling at night which is not occupied, and the third for breaking into during the day. The first named is the charge on which the accused must answer, and the maximum punishment is the death chamber.

After a hearing tomorrow morning, Daniels will in all probability be removed to the county jail for his hearing in superior court which will take place at the regular April term.

Reinstine to Prosecute Men Arrested in the Anti-Booze Campaign

Miami, Feb. 2.—Harris Reinstine, of Jacksonville, assistant district attorney has arrived to prosecute the cases of several men arrested in the recent anti-booze campaign. The first cases will be those of the men arrested at the Inn on Ta Miami trail a few nights ago.

FINAL FIGURES GIVEN ON S. C. TOBACCO CROP

Columbia, S. C., Feb. 1.—The South Carolina 1922 tobacco crop tallied 42586,756 pounds, according to the final statement of the State department of Agriculture issued here today. The average price received by the grower was 20.53 cents a pound.

Independent warehouses handled 27,29,607 pounds, which brought \$5,588.78 and co-operative warehouses handled 15,356,949 pounds. The total price paid for tobacco handled by the Tobacco Growers' Association was not divulged.

The Lake City market, the largest in the State, handled a total of 8,220,608 pounds with Mullins second, with 7,095,617 pounds.

PAPER SOLD AT FAYETTEVILLE

New Yorker Becomes Owner of North Carolina's Oldest Daily Paper.

Fayetteville, Feb. 2.—With today's issue the Fayetteville Observer, said to be North Carolina's oldest newspaper, became the property of Alfred B. de Mesquita, of New York, who purchased the paper from David B. Lindsay, publisher and owner since May 13, 1921.

Mr. de Mesquita has been in newspaper work for several years, but this is his first venture as a publisher and owner of a daily newspaper.

He recently held the position of promotion manager of the New York American. Prior to that, he was advertising manager of The Syracuse Herald; assistant business manager and foreign advertising manager of the Rochester American and advertising manager of a safety razor concern.

Mr. de Mesquita announced there will be few changes in the present staff of the Observer and that the policy of the paper will remain the same as it has been under Mr. Lindsay's administration.

Cotton Mill Employee Shot by Boy When He Fired Into Crowd

Birmingham, Feb. 2.—Ed. McFarland, fifty, cotton mill employee, died at the hospital here today from wounds received Monday when Sheldene Johnson, a youth fired into a crowd of boys who were stoning him. McFarland was hit accidentally.

SAYS RESERVE BANKS MAKE TOO MUCH MONEY

Washington, Feb. 2.—Asserting that the Federal Reserve banks were making "fabulous" and "excessive profits" Chairman Madden, of the appropriations committee, urged today in the House an amendment to existing law limiting the amount of the earnings of such banks. He was discussing the bill which would permit the banks to erect branch buildings to cost not in excess of \$250,000, exclusive of vaults, permanent fixtures and furnishings. Decreased earnings, he said, would mean loans at lower rates of interest with a resulting benefit to business and the public generally.

BODY OF JONES WILL BE EXHUMED FOR THE MISSING JEWELS

Coffin Believed to Contain Crown Jewels of the Russian Royal Family

Washington, Feb. 2.—Assistant secretary of the treasury Clifford, has announced that he has issued an order authorizing customs officials to exhume the body of Sailor Jones who was buried in the National Cemetery in Brooklyn. His coffin is said to contain crown jewels of the Russian Royal family. Jones died in August 1921, on board a shipping vessel on which smugglers were traveling from Vladivostok who are alleged to have secreted jewels in the sailor's coffin, intending to recover them after reaching New York. The plans were frustrated by military authorities.

Little Rock, Feb. 2.—Four murderers went to the electric chair today, Ben Richardson, Duncan Richardson, brothers, F. Bullen and Will Debard. The brothers and Bullen were convicted of killing a recluse named Culp. Debard for killing Mr. and Mrs. W. Silsby.

GOOD ROAD BILL PASSES THE SENATE AND BECOMES LAW

Measure Provides for Issuance of \$15,000,000 to Continue State's Highway Program

Raleigh, Feb. 1.—Final passage in the North Carolina senate today of the measure to provide for issuance of \$15,000,000 in bonds to continue the state's highway program, attacks and defense in committee on the Turlington garnishment bill and introduction of a bill by Representative Bowie of Ashe to put in motion legislation for providing a trunk line railroad "into the lost provinces of North Carolina," marked today's session of the Assembly.

The good roads bond bill already had passed the house and needs only signature of the presiding officer to become law as the Governor's signature is not required.

Predictions were made by many assemblymen opposed to the garnishment measure that it would never be reported to the house. Before the house constitutional amendment committee today it was attacked by labor leaders, led by Representative Rideout, of Rowan. He asserted that the democratic party stood pledged not to foster such legislation.

Representatives of the merchants of the state pleaded for the measure. Only a bare quorum was present and the committee voted to defer action until more members could be present.

The Turlington bill, introduced by request would provide a vote by the people on the question of amending the constitution of the state to permit the legislature to pass a law which would subject any person whose wages, salary or income amounts to more than \$10 (the bill does not specify whether it be by month, week or year) to garnishment of ten per cent of their pay for failure to pay debts and would further provide that personal property be placed on the same basis as real estate for lien and seizure in the operation of the proposed law.

J. Paul Leonard, secretary of the Merchant's Association, answered the opposition by stating that the bill was not only presented by the merchants but had the support of the business interests.

Legislation to provide machinery and operation of a state game law, introduced in the senate by Senator Parker, of Wayne county, also went over for a further meeting set for February 14th.

ENGINEER KILLED AND FIVE PASSENGERS SLIGHTLY INJURED

Raleigh, Feb. 1.—One person was killed and five slightly injured today when Seaboard Air Line train No. 1 from New York to Jacksonville, crashed into the rear of train No. 301, near Hagood, Va., according to announcement by officials of the railroad here.

J. H. Felds, Raleigh, engineer of No. 1 was killed and his fireman, T. Feltz was injured slightly. The others hurt were passengers cut by flying glass, it was stated.

The cause of the wreck appeared to be due to "mislanding of the block at Lacrosse, by a telegraph operator, officials stated, but it was added that the investigation had not been completed. Train No. 301 was enroute from Washington to Hamlet, N. C.

Blind "Pool" Returns Two Cents on Dollar.—Headline. 4,087 persons are reported to have taken stock in the "Wildcat" concern of Baltimore referred to above, yet many say that Barnum was not right.

"Where There is a Will, There is a Way," is correct in most cases, but just at present the lack of something to fight with is preventing the striking miners in the Ruhr, whom press reports say are willing and ready to fight, from having much effect on the French determination to carry out its plan for the collection of the German reparations.

According to press reports, the British have been promised that negotiations for the settlement of Great Britain's war debt will be reopened by Harding after 1924 if he goes back into the White House. That is some "if" all right, and if that is the ground on which they finally decided to accept the American terms we must say that somebody is likely to be disappointed.

Advocates of the soldiers' bonus declare that the way is open for congress to act on the bonus bill now that the British have accepted the American funding plan. Just what attitude congress will take toward such a statement we do not know but if there is anything to the saying, "Keeping Everlastingly At It Brings Success" sooner or later the boys will wake up one morning to find themselves having another pay day from their "Uncle."

It is not much more than was expected that the legislature should turn down the bill which would require every vehicle traveling the public roads at night to carry a light. No doubt they considered the vote of those few who were opposed to the measure, from the standpoint of spending a few dollars for lanterns, to be of greater value than the safety of all those who travel our highways. Though the legislators saw fit to take such an attitude, we hope that the sensible farmers of our state are humane enough to realize the importance of such a measure for their own safety as well as others and begin to carry lights on their vehicles regardless of whether it is required by law or not.

WHAT OF THE PLAYGROUNDS?

As the spring weather approaches we are reminded of the playground project which some months ago received its initial endorsement at a regular meeting of the Greenville Kiwanis Club. A committee was named to place the proposition before the city aldermen, which was done shortly afterwards. Committees from the two organizations have held several meetings, but nothing definite has been accomplished on account of one property owner not releasing a small strip of land which is needed to carry out the plan as first intended.

In presenting the project for the consideration of the City Fathers, the local Kiwanis pledged themselves that in the event the playgrounds

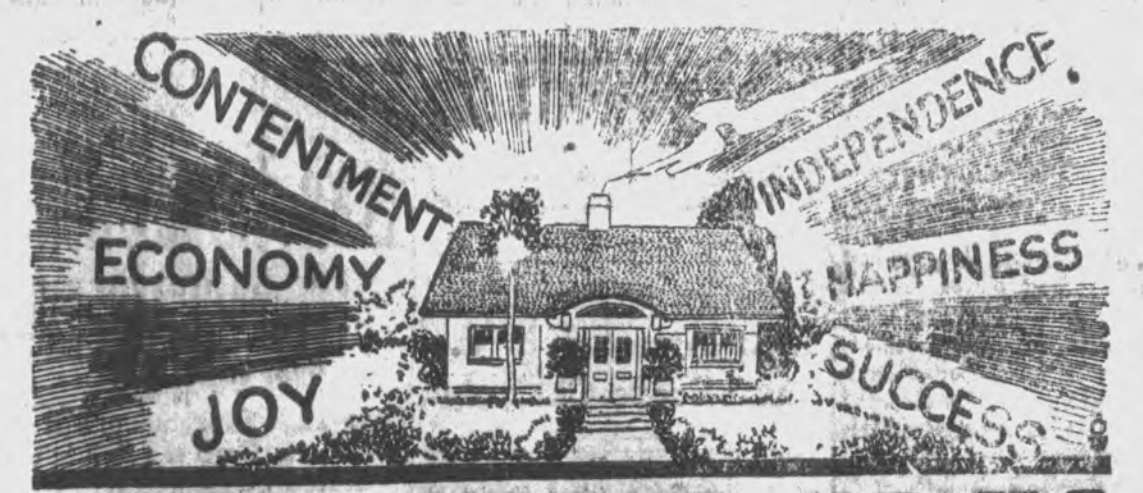

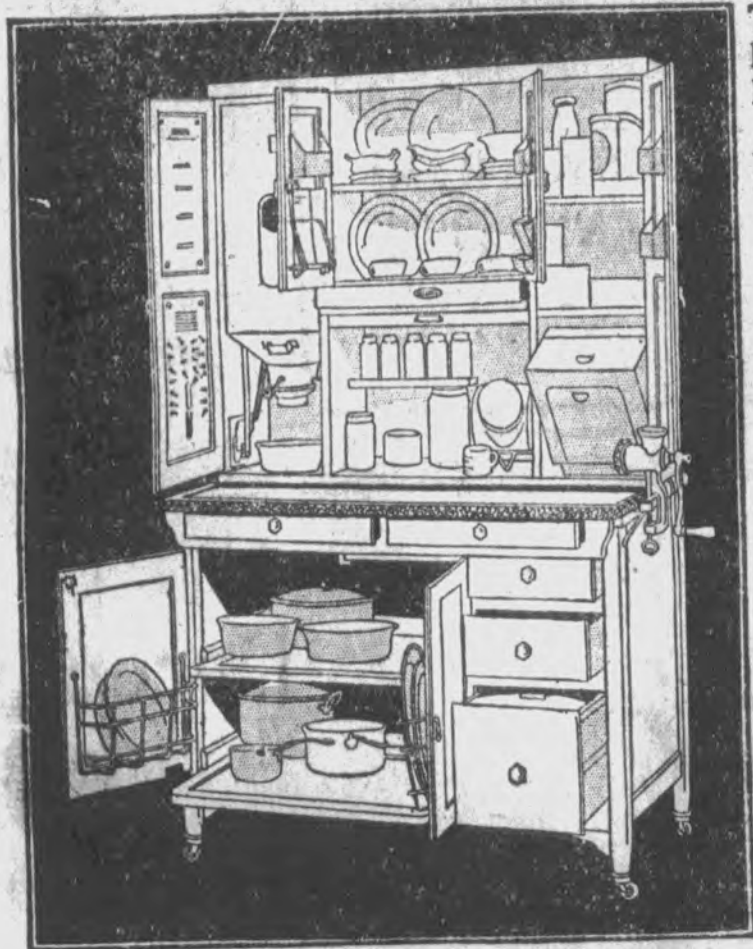

WEATHER WARNINGS RADIOED OVER LAND, SEA, AND AIR NOW

The marvelous advance in radiotelephony which makes it possible for any one to receive messages in spoken words, without having to learn a telegraphic code, has enormously increased the broadcasting of weather information, during the past year not only to farmers all over the interior of the United States, but to aviators and ships at sea, both on the ocean, the Gulf of Mexico and on the Great Lakes.

Radio Reaches Farm Homes Directly
To receive radiotelephone message requires only a limited equipment simple and inexpensive. Thousands of farmers have installed receiving apparatus recently, with the result that the isolated rural home is brought instantly in touch with the many kinds of information, instruction and information that are being broadcast continually.

Weather information thus reaches the farmer as promptly and effectively as any urban business man. Farm operations are absolutely dependent for success upon a knowledge of weather conditions, and the protection of crops from disaster due to frost, drought, storms and other weather phenomena is only possible if adequate warnings are received in time. Heretofore a large number of the farmers of the country were so located that they could not be supplied by newspapers or telegraph with the daily forecasts and warnings of the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture in time to be of service to them. Radio telephony has changed all this. Also the number of broadcasting stations has increased to meet the needs of those equipped to receive the messages. A year ago daily State forecasts were being broadcast from 11 radio stations in only 7 states, and chiefly by radiotelegraphy, which few were able to take advantage of. Last July there were 98 stations in 31 states broadcasting daily weather forecasts and warnings by radiotelephone. Weekly reports on the effect of weather on crops and highways, and other information issued by Weather Bureau are also disseminated by these stations.

Bureau Owns No Wireless Equipment
The Weather Bureau does not own or operate any wireless equipment. The radio distribution work is accomplished through plants operated by other Government agencies, by corporations and by private individuals, and without expense to the Weather Bureau. An exclusive wavelength of 485 meters has been assigned by the Bureau of Navigation, Department of Commerce, for the broadcasting of weather forecasts and mark wave length unless specifically licensed reports. No station can use this wavelength to do so. To avoid unnecessary crowding of the air and interference with schedules only 2 stations are licensed to broadcast in any city or community. This limits the number that would otherwise gladly cooperate in the work. There are at present about 400 licensed broadcasting stations in the United States.

Forecasts Broadcast Twice Daily
An important accomplishment in radio work during the past year was the arrangement in June, 1922, for broadcasting twice daily, including Sundays and holidays, the cold wave, frost and other warnings and information of the States in the Washington and Chicago forecast districts. These disseminations are made from the naval radio station at Arlington, Va., and Great Lakes, Ill. Radiotelegraphy and high wave

lengths are utilized for these long range transmissions. Local radiophone broadcasting stations in these districts take up the messages and broadcast them by radiophone.

This program is an immediate adaptation by the Weather Bureau of plans approved by the interdepartmental radio committee, which contemplates the use of a few high-powered Government radio stations for broadcasting official information by radiotelegraphy for the entire country. The stations in the San Francisco forecast district were included in a similar service about September 1, and it is hoped that the remaining districts will have one within a few months.

Radio Service for Ships and Aviators
Material extensions were made last year in the radio bulletin service for the special benefit of marine and aviation interests. A major bulletin was broadcast, beginning March 15, 1922, from Goat Island, near San Francisco, and localized bulletins were sent from Tatoosh Island, Wash., N. lead, Wash., Eureka, Calif., San Pedro, Calif., and Dutch Harbor, Alaska. In April, service of the same character was inaugurated for the Great Lakes regions, the localized bulletins being sent from Alpena, Mich., Buffalo, N. Y., Chicago, Ill., Cleveland, O. and Duluth, Minn., replacing a limited broadcasting service previously conducted at those points. This new broadcasting work is on the same basis as that on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts. In all of this work the Weather Bureau is indebted to the Director of the Office of Communications of the Navy Department for cordial efficient cooperation.

To aid aviators special up-to-air forecasts are broadcast from 11 naval radio stations in 14 zones, except two. Army, navy and post office officials and flying fields receive daily telegraphic forecasts. Special and more detailed forecasts are issued twice daily at the request of the air Service of the Army for the three air routes from Washington to Norfolk, Va., Long Island, N. Y., and Dayton O. Every effort is made to cooperate with the Army and Navy to make weather information of the greatest possible benefit to fliers.

Other Uses for Radio

In connection with hurricane warnings wireless communication is of inestimable value. One of the worst storms of last year was traced for five days over water areas and its center, direction of movement, intensity and rate of progress determined by wireless reports from vessels. Warnings were radioed our times daily to vessels in the Atlantic, the Gulf of Mexico, and the Caribbean Sea, enabling them to turn back or change their routes to avoid the hurricane. Only one ship was lost and property amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars was saved as a result of the timeliness and accuracy of the warnings.

A commercial company which does a large fruit business in Central and South American countries, operates several radio plants in those countries, and has arranged with the Weather Bureau to broadcast special weather bulletins twice daily for the benefit of Caribbean shipping.

A daily radiogram is sent to the French meteorological service, containing observations taken about 40 stations in the United States and a similar message will be sent soon to be Philippines and Japan. The reports sent to France are broadcast over Europe from the Eiffel Tower. The United States Weather Bureau receives radio reports from European countries in exchange.

It is the plan of the American polar expedition which started from Seattle, June 1, 1922 for a three-year trip, to maintain radio communications with the United States Signal Corps, at Nome, Alaska for nearly two years. Twice daily weather observations will be taken during the expedition and transmitted to the Weather Bureau.

The future usefulness of radiotele-

graphy and telephony in dissemination to radio stations which cannot bring weather information cannot be present be included in the system, and estimated. When funds are available for additional employees which would be for telegraphing or telephoning be required, the service can be made forecasts, warnings and information even more far-reaching and valuable.
