THIRD ANNIVERSARY SERVICE CHRISTIAN CHURCH TOMORROW

Dr. Shanhart Begins Fourth Year as Pastor of Church; Wonderful Progress Made

Dr. Shanhart begins his fourth year of service as the pastor of the Christian church on Sunday. The morning sermon will be the anniversary address.

Dr. Shanhart is the dean of the pastors of Greenville. All of the other churches have changed pastors at least once since he came. He came here from Petersburg, Va., having served as the minister of the Washington Street church there. During the same time he served the Red Triangle Y. M. C. A. work in the educational department in Camp Lee.

The Bible School has grown, since his pastorate began over four hundred per cent in average attendance. The young people's work in the Christian Endeavor now ranks with the best in the state.

During his ministry, the church has raised and paid out more than forty thousand dollars. A new pipe organ has been placed and paid for. A pastor's home has been purchased at 412 East Eighth Street, where he now resides. New opera chairs have been placed in the balcony and have been paid for. A complete new equipment has been placed in the Church kitchen and dining room.

The Bible school has not only grown, but it has been graded and a director of Christian education has been secured; and efficiency is the word in all departments of the school's program. Professor J. L. Leggett has this in charge and although he has only been handling it a few months all departments are feeling the touch of his leadership. The church lawn has been beautified until now it is one of the most attractive in the city. Twenty-three years ago this church was organized and according to the annual reports made in January the present holdings of the church have a conservative valuation exceeding ninety thousand dollars with a total indebtedness of about five percent. The growth of the church has been most remarkable.

We are informed that the church will be dedicated free from all indebtedness in April.

The church just now, from January first until Easter is joining with all the others among the Disciples of Christ in a Million additional members in five years "campaign."

ONLY FEW CASES GIVEN HEARING IN CITY COURT TODAY

This Morning's Session Featured With Minor Cases Which Were Quickly Disposed of

Only a few cases came up before Mayor D. M. Clark for hearing in city court this morning.

The cases disposed of were as follows:

Willie Daniels, colored, charged with entering the home of W. G. Craft, given hearing and bound over to Superior court under \$2,000 bond. Being unable to give bond he was placed in the county jail.

Johnnie Jenkins, negro boy; implicated by Daniels as having a part in entering the house was found not guilty and dismissed.

James Blackheart, colored, found guilty of assault and paid a fine of \$5 and costs.

Charlie Smith, colored, paid \$10 and costs for disorderly conduct.

Ferdinand Johnson, colored, riding bicycle on sidewalk, paid costs.

C. L. Perkins, of Burr Filling Station was charged with adding to frame building in fire district without permit from State Insurance Department. After hearing a portion of the evidence the case was continued until Wednesday morning for the purpose of obtaining testimony of State Inspector Brockwell, of Raleigh.

PARKER BILL FOR SERVICE OF WOMEN ON JURIES KILLED

Reports Favorable on the Milliken Bill for Regulation of Secret Orders

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—The hearing on the bill to repeal the charter of the Carolina-Tennessee Power Company in Cherokee county came to an end late today before House Judiciary committee No. 1 with the unfavorable report which also was concurred in by the Senate committee on corporations, acting jointly. The House committee also reported unfavorably the Parker bill to provide compulsory service of women on juries and reported favorable the Milliken bill for the regulation of secret orders.

The power charter, which committee members charged was an attempt to settle a law-suit through the legislature, centered around a bill introduced by Representative Dillard, of Cherokee county, which would repeal the entire charter granted the company in 1909 and place it on an equal basis with like companies whose charters are now received through the secretary of state.

The Milliken bill to provide that secret orders list with county and state authorities membership lists and lists of officers came in for heated discussion and members and officers of various organizations were given a hearing. After the committee had been in session nearly four hours the bill was reported favorably for the second time since its introduction.

Several women were heard on the jury service measure and expressed the desire that since the vote was granted to their sex they should have an equal right with men to serve on juries. Representative Townsend, of Hargett, told the women that while he advocated suffrage he thought the jury box was he last place the women should want to be and then moved unfavorably the report which carried with six members opposing.

INVESTIGATION OF KLAN ASSUMES WIDE PROPORTIONS

Result of Investigation of Crimes May be Basis of Federal Court Action

Washington, Feb. 3.—The governmental investigation of the Ku Klux Klan which has been begun in Louisiana as result of the recent murders there has assumed national wide proportions. It has been learned that army department justice agents invaded a dozen states to investigate the charges that the Klan has committed crimes. The result may be the basis of Federal court action. The alleged political participation also will be investigated.

NATIONAL GUARDSMEN PATROL KENTUCKY CITY

Corbin, Ky., Feb. 3.—National guardsmen have arrived to patrol the city, following requests by the mayor and sheriff to Governor Morrow. This is a direct result of the dynamiting of a local hotel and a street battle a few days ago, during which two men were killed. Twenty-five men from Company B, of London, are already on duty here and others are held in the London armory in readiness should their services be needed.

WEATHER BUREAU PREDICTS COLD WAVE NEXT 24 HOURS

Washington, Feb. 3.—A cold wave from the northwest will overspread Tennessee, interior east gulf states and Atlantic states within the next twenty-four hours, the weather bureau announced today. The cold wave will reach far into north Georgia and South Carolina and the weather will be much colder in Florida.

GOV. DENOUNCES MAXWELL IN SPEECH BEFORE ASSEMBLY

Maxwell Contends State Faces Deficit; Governor Says it Has a Surplus

Raleigh, Feb. 3.—"The charge is that last year, under the evil influence of your Governor, you appropriated five million dollars more money than you levied taxes to pay. It is not the truth, and I demand that this man Maxwell be exposed in this slander of the State whose bread he eats!"

With these two sentences, thundered out over the chamber with all the power of his great voice, Governor Morrison addressing a joint session of the General Assembly last noon yesterday summed up his defiance and denunciation of A. J. Maxwell, member of the Corporation Commission who charges a deficit of \$5,000,000 against the administration.

Half an hour later the Senate had passed and the House had concurred in a resolution calling for a full investigation of the State's finances to determine whether there is a balance of two and a half million in the treasury, as the Governor claims, or a deficit of five million, as is contended by Mr. Maxwell.

The investigation, a duty charged to the Senate and House Finance and Appropriations committees will devolve upon a sub-committee appointed yesterday afternoon and composed of Senators Sams, Long of Halifax, Harris of Wake, and Heath and Representatives Connor, Murphy, Neal, Ross of Moore, Coffey of Watauga, and Parker of Alamance. The committee will hold its first meeting Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

Within an hour the General Assembly had witnessed an event that is without parallel in the annals of the General Assembly when the Governor, or appearing almost without warning before the body in a hastily called joint session, denounced in a bitter speech another high State official and demanded that he be subjected to a legislative investigation.

"I regret that an important question of impersonal fact has been made the subject of passionate discussion," said Mr. Maxwell last night. "The General Assembly has very properly provided for an investigation of the financial condition of the State, and this investigation should settle the controversy as to fact."

"Every figure used in my deficit statement is taken from the printed report of the State Treasurer for 19 months and the treasurer's statement for the last six months. If the treasury figures are wrong I am wrong."

Consternation settled upon the General Assembly with the reading of the Maxwell analysis of the State's financial status in the New and Observer yesterday morning and hardly had it begun to recover when the whisper went about the lobbies that the Governor had asked for a joint session to hear his reply. A quarter of an hour later he was before the body.

Pandemonium is a loose in the General Assembly, and yesterday afternoon there began to develop serious talk of an adjournment for thirty days until the investigating committee can bring something of order out of the chaotic situation. The suggestion of a resolution to adjourn Monday night until March 5th was made on the basis of auditors' statements that it will require a month to make a thorough study of the situation.

The Governor came without waiting for the preparation of a formal address, and spoke extemporaneously with a battery of stenographers to handle his address. Copies of his address, substantially as delivered, were issued from his office in the late afternoon and will become the official record for the journals of the House and Senate.

REPORTS STATE THAT GERMAN RESISTANCE IN RUHR IS BROKEN

Paris, Feb. 3.—German resistance in the Rhineland and Ruhr is broken, France has won a bloodless victory in its first magnitude, according to officials and the press.

Progress can now be spelled with good roads. When our present highway plans are completed this state can boast of one of the best road systems in the country.

German rail strike over—Headlines such as this were an announcement of cessation of war activities. "Peace" is a wonderful word and one for which the whole world craves.

From reports received from all over the state concerning the building activities, it is plainly seen that there is no sign of an abatement of the building wave. Greenville has been building rapidly to the past few months and more houses are still needed. No city can grow unless people desiring to move in, can find houses.

Every man is entitled to what is due him. Born, even if he was criticized for changing his position on the foreign policy, should be given credit for being man enough to change when he found that he was in the wrong. So many of us are not willing to acknowledge that we are wrong no matter how many times we are convinced of the fact.

The "Bally Day" which is to be staged in the local Presbyterian church tomorrow will be a great event. It shows a wonderful spirit of co-operation when city and county come together to work along religious lines. No doubt it will be an incentive to other Sunday Schools to follow in the same path blazed by the Presbyterians.

The Nettles bill now before the General Assembly regarding the increase of the fine for driving an automobile while in an intoxicated condition is certainly a step in the right direction. No one should be allowed to drive a car while under the influence of whiskey. In the first place he endangers his own life, and in the second place the lives of his fellowmen. The fine should be large enough to make a man careful. Whiskey and gasoline will not mix. It has been tried too often already and in each instance found to be a failure.

GOOD ROADS AND GAS BILLS

Assertions made by Frank A. Page, North Carolina's State Highway Commissioner, before the Virginia Good Roads Association in Roanoke, tends to show that the automobile owners of that state actually make money by paying a tax on gasoline. In 1920 there were shipped into the state 73,671,322 gallons of motor fuel, and in that year 142,234 cars were licensed. In 1921, a year of business depression, the shipments of gasoline had fallen to 72,442,963 gallons, while the number of cars had increased to 149,991. Last year, 1922, the respective figures were 82,235,208 gallons and 181,955 cars.

The gist of these figures is that in 1922 each car consumed an average of 322 gallons of gasoline; in 1921, 499 gallons; in 1922 this had been reduced to 400 gallons.

This was made possible by the building of good roads in 1921 and 1922.

financed by a bond issue of \$50,000,000. Since each car owner saved an average of \$11.75 a year in his gas bill, it follows that he made money by paying a gasoline tax in 1922 of \$1.03, or 1 cent a gallon on his average consumption.

In order to provide sufficient funds to utilize the facilities of the Highway Department in 1923, the North Carolina Legislature has already passed a bill authorizing an additional bond issue of \$15,000,000. The automobile owner can pay a tax up to 21.2 cents a gallon in North Carolina and still be better off on his annual gasoline bill than before the road-building program started in 1921, not to mention further sums he saves on oil, tires and general repairs, because he can drive over modern highways.

Mr. Page further asserted that in Roanoke this week, the price of gasoline was 25 cents a gallon, with no tax, while on the same day in Raleigh, N. C. with a 1 cent a gallon tax, it was 20 to 21 cents, and in Winston-Salem 20 to 22 cents. The moral seems to be that the price is fixed on Broadway, New York, for wide areas. It costs more to distribute motor fuel in Virginia because of poor roads.

It seems, therefore, that to the mud tax we in Virginia must add the gasoline and oil and tire tax, because of the condition of our highways, and we pay it in such a way that the roads get nothing from that source.—Richmond Times.

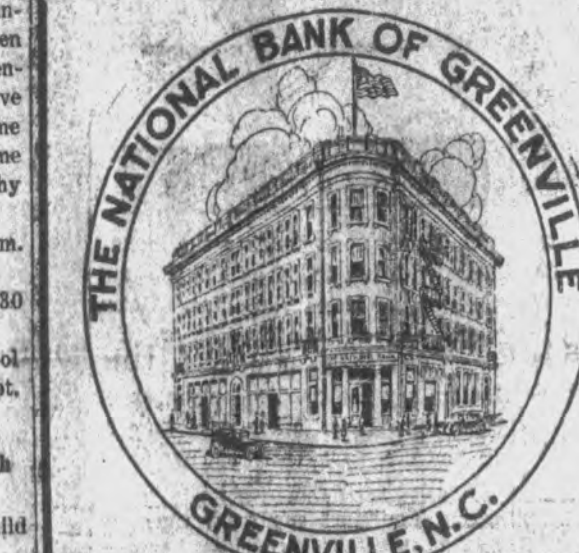

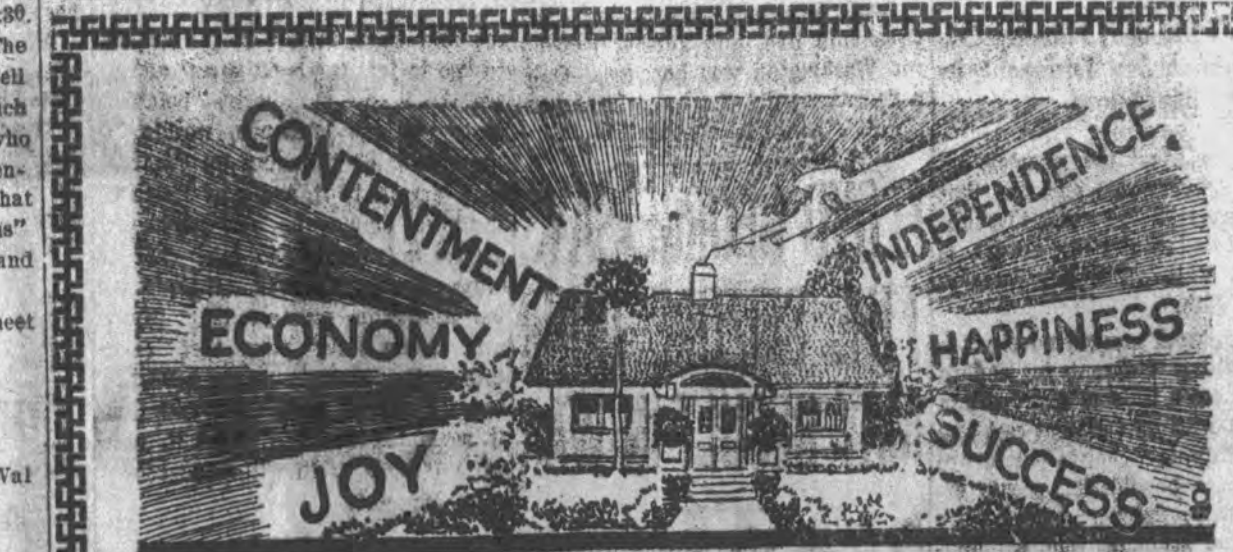
