THE WOMAN'S CLUB CONFERENCE ENDS HELD INTERESTING WHEN TURKS REFUSE MEETING LAST WEEK TO SIGN THE TREATY

Mrs. Herring Delivered Splendid Address on Subject of City Government

After a brief meeting of the executive board Thursday afternoon, the Woman's club went into regular session at the appointed hour 3:30 o'clock.

At the conclusion of the opening of the meeting by the reading of the minutes and roll call, the secretary read a number of letters that required the attention of the club, these were discussed and decision rendered as to their importance.

The treasurer reported ninety dollars paid out for different purposes during the past month, this speaks well for the activity of the club.

The ways and means committees for January and February reported fifty dollars made by them and turned in to the treasurer. This was a splendid report and if the committee for each month does as well, the Woman's club building will not be so very long in materializing as it was voted later in the meeting to let all the money raised by the ways and means, be invested in building and loan for that purpose.

The home economics committee has arranged for a demonstration of salads at the Teachers College, February the sixth. This demonstration is to be given by Miss Reeves, the domestic science teacher at the college, who has so kindly consented to give her services to the women of the city, and it is to be hoped, that the club members will turn out in full force to show their appreciation, of her gift of time and thought, and to increase their knowledge of salads and how to make them.

The health department brought before the club a letter from Mr. Futrell asking help for a patient who is now at the state sanatorium and in need of financial aid to enable her to stay longer for treatment.

The club voted to donate their part of the proceeds paid into the treasury from the sale of Christmas seals to this worthy cause, the amount being one hundred and fifty dollars.

Mrs. Herring and Mrs. Rivers made a few remarks concerning the parent-teachers association of the Model and Evans street school respectively.

The club wishing to show their respect and appreciation to Mr. R. R. Cotten for the honor that has recently been bestowed upon him in his election as president of the Forestry association, gave a rising vote in his behalf and assured him through Mrs. Cotten of their loyal support.

Mrs. E. B. Ficklen for the program on Citizenship had secured the services of Mrs. Luther Herring one of the brightest club members, to talk on the subject of city government. Mrs. Herring of course needed no introduction.

She opened her subject by saying that the concentration of people into towns and cities made certain laws for them necessary and that the charter making Greenville a real town was granted by the first state legislature.

There are says Mrs. Herring three different forms of city government, namely the commission form, the city manager who is elected by a board of alderman, and the aldermanic in which a mayor and eight men called aldermen govern the city, this as we know is Greenville's present form of government.

The mayor is of course the chief officer of the City. He holds court three times a week and tries all offenders of the city's ordinances. Cases that are not satisfactorily settled in the mayor's court may be appealed to the county court.

The mayor issues all warrants and has full charge of the police of the city. He has no vote in the meetings of the aldermen except in the case of a tie.

The aldermen are elected by the people in the wards in which they reside. There are five wards in the city of Greenville. The aldermen meet once a month, they make the financial budget for the city fix privilege taxes, pass city ordinances and look

Greek Commanders Are Ordered to be on Guard Against Turkish Attacks

Athens, Feb. 5.—The Greek army commanders of western Thrace have been ordered to be on guard against Turkish attacks now that the Lausanne conference has been ruptured. Approximately seventy thousand Greek soldiers are massed against about fifteen thousand Turks. The Greeks said that the Turks must make the first hostile move. The belief still exists that Turkey is bluffing.

Lausanne, Feb. 5.—The European statesmen have failed to restore peace in the Near East and the conference called for this purpose definitely collapsed tonight after desperate efforts to save it—efforts which were continued up to the very moment Lord Curzon's train left.

Never in the history of political conferences were such amazing scenes witnessed as marked today's tragic ending of the negotiations, which extended over almost three months. Practically the whole diplomatic world ran after Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, trying to induce him to sign the treaty, but Mustafa Kemal's favorite general, with a gentle smile, was immovable. He said "no" to all—Americans, British, French and Italians.

The American representative, Ambassador Child, Joseph C. Grew and Rear Admiral Bristol, called upon him after the break in an endeavor to save the conference and Lord Curzon delayed his departure for half an hour in the hope that Ismet Pasha would change his mind, but all in vain.

The conference failed because the Turks refused to accept the clauses concerning the future economic regime in Turkey, and to some extent because they would not accept the allied formula dealing with judicial guarantees for foreigners, which were to replace the existing extra territorial privileges.

Briefly, the Turks wanted to strike from the treaty all clauses binding them to recognize contracts and concessions granted by the old Ottoman empire. They maintained that they should be left free to study these questions, and, if necessary, re-open negotiations concerning them with the interested countries and peoples.

They could not, they said, accept the economic burden imposed upon the new Ankara government by the old Turkish regime, which had handed out concessions right and left in the form of capitalizations; they insisted that vast concessions have been granted without fair return and they wanted the right to revise all of them.

The Turks agreed to a formula whereby foreign legal advisers would be appointed to re-frame the legal code and be empowered to receive complaints from foreigners that the law was unjustly administered, but insisted that the advisers be selected not by The Hague permanent court of international justice, but by neutral countries which had not participated in the great war. They absolutely declined to give the advisers control over all arrests of foreigners or domiciliary searches, maintaining this was a violation of their sovereignty.

Further concessions as to both economic and judicial affairs were submitted to Ismet Pasha at the last moment by the Allies, but he remained obdurate and declared that Turkey would not sign such a peace.

ATLANTA IS IN TOILS OF A COLD WAVE

Atlanta, Feb. 5.—Southeast north and west of Atlanta is in the toils of a cold wave which has been freezing in the north.

Meridian, Feb. 5.—For the first time in four years the streets are covered with ice. The temperature was twenty-six this morning.

Ruhr Coal Barons Before French Court



Here are the first pictures to reach America of Herr Franz Thyssen, son of the German coal baron, and his colleagues on trial before a French general court martial in Mayence, on the charge of refusing to obey the French orders to deliver coal to the invaders of the Ruhr. Instead of sending to prison the men who are now heroes in German eyes, the French imposed nominal fines, which, however, have not been paid.

MR. VICTOR DAVIS CONDUCTS SERVICE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Made a Most Interesting Talk on 5th Chapter of St. Mark From Words "Fear Not"

On Sunday evening of the 4th Mr. Davis, principal of the High School was a very welcome visitor at the college.

Mr. Davis read a part of the 5th chapter of St. Mark and talked from the words, "Fear Not."

In the beginning Mr. Davis stated that he was going to talk to us about what we fear, why we fear, and what to do when we fear. He also stated that it is important that we do not fear for if we put fear and distress into our lives, we will receive the same, likewise if our lives are filled with joy and happiness we will also receive them.

Mr. Davis discussed some of the numerous things that we fear. The first of these was the fear of many people fear the past probably on account of some hidden sin in their lives or probably because of so many lost opportunities. Here we can find comfort in God's word for he assures us of forgiveness and opportunities from day to day. The second one of the things we fear is the present.

Many people are in doubt and fear as to whether or not they will make good. In connections with this Mr. Davis told the story of a very interesting mountain boy, named Turkey, whom he happened to know while teaching in the Cumberland mountains. We also dread or fear death. Here Mr. Davis referred to Tennyson's and Whittier's attitude toward death, and last we fear the unknown future. To show the folly of all this he cited Christ's attitude toward life, death, and the hereafter. No one of us will ever have the trials and hardships in life nor death that confronted Him. His resurrection has determined the hereafter. We should not fear for it is an insult to God; and if one is a Christian he will not fear.

In conclusion the speaker told what we are to do with fears. The first thing he suggested was to read God's word and it will give you faith. The next thing was prayers. Prayer is one of the cures for fear.

The special music for the evening was a violin solo by Miss Garrett and a selection by the choir.

MARKET REACHED TWENTY MILLION FOR THE SEASON

Exact Receipts of Greenville Auction Warehouses Were 20,858,706 Pounds

With the sales of last Friday, the Greenville auction warehouses closed for the season 1922-23, which, considering various obstacles proved one of the most successful for many years. The total receipts for the season were 20,858,706 pounds for an average of \$28.48 per hundred pounds.

The showing made this season can be considered nothing short of remarkable because of the extreme crop shortage, which was prevalent throughout the bright tobacco belt of Eastern North Carolina. Soon after the opening of the season just closed, many who were in position to know, estimated that the local market's receipts would be several million less than the pounds actually reached.

The reputation of the Greenville market has been established over a larger territory this year than ever before. Prior to the opening the warehousemen covered the field well from which they were likely to draw business. They rewarded the growers with prices equalled by few if any other markets of the state. Throughout the season the local market's average showed larger than that published from other towns, and this attracted many farmers here that during previous seasons had sold elsewhere.

A large majority of the markets in the eastern part of the state are remaining open through this week, and have advertised as closing on next Friday.

AFTER LONG SEARCH FINDS SON WITH HIS MOTHER IN NEVADA

Mr. W. H. Manning of Bethel Fails to Secure Custody of Child After He Locates Him

Bethel, Feb. 3.—After a search extending across the continent and lasting over a period of several weeks, W. H. Manning, of this town, was enabled for the first time in over two months to see his five-year old son, Harvey Davis Manning, when the child was taken into court at Reno, Nevada, recently on a writ of habeas corpus in an effort by the father to obtain custody of the child, who has been with his mother, the daughter of M. O. Blount, wealthy merchant of Bethel since their departure from here on November 14.

At the hearing set for a decision upon the matter by Judge George A. Bartlett last Wednesday, the child was awarded to his mother, but both father and mother were restrained from taking him from out of the jurisdiction of the court, and it was provided that the father could visit young Harvey in the presence of the court bailiff.

According to accounts appearing in the Reno papers, Manning immediately secured the services of Attorney John Robb Clarke, who instituted the habeas corpus proceedings in district court, whereupon his wife, Mrs. Marian Velma Manning, secured the services of Judge John S. Orr.

The writ recited that W. H. Manning, as the guardian, and on behalf of Harvey Davis Manning, a minor prays the release of the boy from his confinement and restraint in Reno in that it is wholly illegal, it being alleged that on November 14, 1922, Marian Velma Manning did without the knowledge of W. H. Manning, secretly and clandestinely remove and carry the boy from his home at the town of Bethel, N. C., and that she brought him to Reno.

TEMPERANCE BOARD SUGGESTS SOLUTION LIQUOR SMUGGLING

Operations of Rum-Runners Described as Impudent Warfare Against United States

Washington, Feb. 5.—Put United States destroyers off the eastern coast to torpedo rum smugglers and arm seagoing with sixteen inch rifles that will drive the whiskey fleet thirty miles off, is the way the board of temperance of the Methodist church says that the liquor smuggling problem will be solved. William Bryan has endorsed the recommendation, adding that foreign ships with liquor aboard shouldn't be permitted to enter the harbors under any circumstances. Operations of rum runners have been described as impudent warfare against the United States.

FOLK-PLAYS OF CAROLINA WILL BE PRESENTED HERE

Will Appear Here on Thursday, February 8th, Under Auspices Woman's Club

The Carolina Playmakers will appear in this city on Thursday evening, Feb. 8th at 8:30 o'clock at White's Theatre under the auspices of the Woman's Club.

The aim of the Carolina Playmakers is the creation of a native drama in North Carolina. The stories and the characters are drawn by the writers from our own traditions, and from their observation of the lives of our own people.

The plays are written in the University course in Dramatic Composition. The productions are home-made. The portable stage-equipment, the lighting, settings, and costumes are designed and executed by The Playmakers at Chapel Hill.

Agatha, by Jane Toy, takes us back to the North Carolina of fifty years ago. The scene is laid in our neighbor village, Hillsboro, in the days of trial at the University at the close of the War between the States. It portrays not the bitterness of reconstruction, but the continuing spirit of romance which not even the shadow of the devastating war could dispel from the hearts of our people. The charm of Agatha is its atmosphere—the atmosphere of crinolines, crystal chandeliers, and sweeping curtains, things far removed from our nimble and giddy-paced life of today—the precious heritage of our old southern plantation days.

Off Nags Head, by Douglass MacMillan, is a tragedy of the Carolina coast based on the story of the finding of the lost portrait of Theodosia Burr.

The treacherous sand-banks off the North Carolina coast a hundred years ago were almost completely cut off from contact with the mainland, and many of the "bankers" became "land pirates" who lured vessels to the banks by means of false lights, and then murdered the crew and plundered the ships as the pirates at sea had done before them.

In December of 1812, Theodosia Burr sailed on a small boat, the Patriot, from Georgetown, South Carolina, intending to visit her father, Aaron Burr, in New York. The Patriot was lost somewhere on this voyage, nor was any trace of either ship or crew ever found.

About fifty years later a doctor, called in to see a sick woman on one of the sand-banks near Nags Head, was surprised to find the portrait of a beautiful young woman hanging in the rude hut of the "banker," and obtained possession of it. The fisherman explained that it had been found on a derelict, a pilot boat, which had drifted on the dune. The portrait was recognized later as one supposed to have been with Theodosia Burr or the Patriot when it left Georgetown on its course along the North Carolina coast. Its finding re-awakened interest in this mystery which historically has never been solved.

In Wilbur's Cousin, Ernest Thompson has caught not a little of the spirit of the fun-loving college boy of Chapel Hill today. The plot was derived by the author from a week-end experience of one of his classmates. Mr. Thompson has in mind other interesting dramatic situations of life on "The Hill," in which he hopes to utilize the picturesque vernacular of some of his most notorious contemporaries.

PROMINENT EASTERN CAROLINA CITIZEN LEFT \$250,000

New Bern, Feb. 3.—The will of the late Col. James A. Bryan, bank president and prominent citizen, disposing of his estate which was estimated at \$250,000 was offered for probate at the office of the clerk of the court here late yesterday. Mrs. Alice H. Bryan widow of Col. Bryan, has qualified as executrix.

The bulk of the personal property of the estate goes to Mrs. Bryan, and a life estate in the real property is also bequeathed to her. At her death the lands and the handsome colonial mansion and grounds here in New Bern will go to Col. Charles S. Bryan, Col. Bryan's only son, and three grandchildren. Cash bequeathals totalling approximately \$25,000 were made to relatives and servants.

Mrs. Bryan gets outright 501 shares of capital stock in the National Bank of New Bern, 100 shares in the First National Bank of Durham, also capital stock in the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad and the U. S. Steel Corporation the amount of which was not designated in the will. She also receives the furniture in the mansion, and rentals from James City property now used by the Craven Chemical Company.

To other devisees named in the will Col. Bryan bequeathed cash as follows: to Washington Bryan, his brother, \$10,000; to his niece, Miss Laura Hughes, \$5,000; to the wardens and vestry of Christ Episcopal church

\$5,000; to his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Annie McW. Bryan, \$2,500; and to each of his three servants \$100.

The will empowers the executrix to dispose of "timber and trees" to pay off any indebtedness against the estate, it being stated specifically that all debts are to be charged against the country lands of the estate. The mansion is located in the heart of the city and with the gardens and grounds occupies half a block. It is one of the points of interest to visitors as a model of the old colonial type. Among the many notables of colonial days to have visited the place was George Washington, and among other interesting heirlooms to be found there is a wine set from which he was said to have been served.

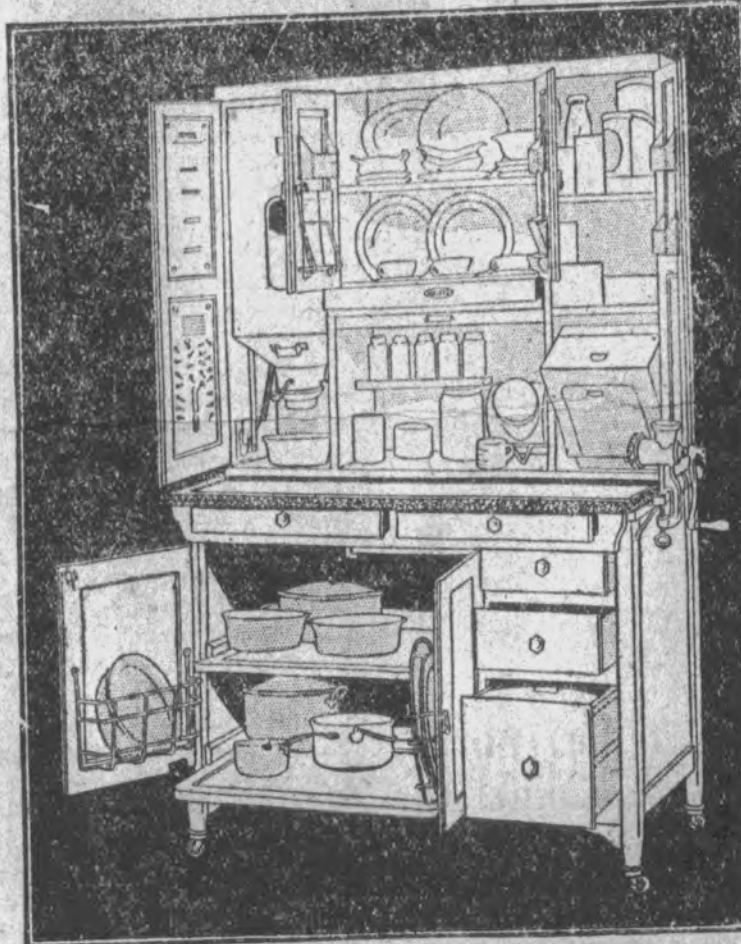
