SECOND ANNUAL TRACK MEET OF COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS WILL BE HELD AT THE FAIR GROUNDS ON EASTER MONDAY, APRIL 2ND

Various Organizations in Co-operation With the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs Planning to Make This Year's Event the Biggest Day in County's History

Easter Monday, April 2nd, is going to be a big day for Pitt county. On that date will be held the Second Annual Public School Track Meet, sponsored by the Greenville Rotary Club and also the Second Annual Literary Contest sponsored by the Greenville Kiwanis Club. These two organizations with the help of the City and County School Administration are going to put over the biggest day that the county has ever had. Taken altogether the two meets will form a very excellent county commencement. The idea was tried out for the first time last year and proved to be a big success in every way. The boys work committee of the Rotary Club will have charge of the track meet. This committee is composed of the following: Chairman, J. H. Rose, Sam T. White, Haywood Dail, E. B. Higgs, P. T. Anthony, and P. J. Chester. The track meet will be held at the Fair Grounds again through the generosity of Rotarian Haywood Dail. The cup for the winners in the track meet was awarded to the Greenville High School last year. The Greenville Schools entered the meet as separate buildings. This was done in order to prevent the Greenville schools from having too big an advantage over the other schools of the county. They will enter the meet this year in the same manner. The Greenville schools were not allowed to enter the Literary Contest last year. However, the winners of this contest have been changed this year and the Evans Street School and the Model School buildings will enter the contest as separate buildings. The Farmville School won the Literary Contest Cup last year. The Literary Contest will cover the first seven grades, and the tests will be given in Phonics, Writing, Arithmetic, Oral and Written Composition, Geography and History. These contests will begin at ten o'clock and will be held in classrooms at the East Carolina Teachers College.

In the track meet the boys and girls will be divided into two classes. Those 4 feet 10 inches and under, and those over 4 feet 10 inches. There are 13 events for boys and 6 events for girls.

The schools of the county are divided into a certain number of Group Centers. All of these Group Centers will hold the contests before March 26. From these Group Center Contests the winners will be picked to represent the various schools the final contest at Greenville on Easter Monday.

In the track meet the silver loving cup will be awarded to the school making the largest number of points. Also prizes will be awarded to all winners of first places, while ribbons will be given to the winners of all second places. The prizes will be given by the various merchants of the city. These firms were very liberal last year and their generosity was highly appreciated.

The various schools have already begun practicing in preparation for the event and the contest this year will prove far more exciting than the one last year. Joe Taft won by reason of his small stature was able to enter the small boys class last year, and who won so many first places for Greenville, has grown so much that he will have to enter the large boys class this year. This means that the meet will be closer this year than ever before because Joe was the main point winner in the small boys class last year.

Further announcements will be made through this paper from time to time.

HENDERSON CASTLE OFFERED BY OWNER FOR VICE-PRESIDENT

Congress, However, is Hesitant About Accepting Mrs. J. B. Henderson's Offer

Washington, Feb. 6.—Pity the poor vice-presidents of the United States! The job, take it from "Tom" Marshall and "Cal" Coolidge isn't what it's cracked up to be.

It pays only \$12,000 a year, which considering the entertaining that goes with it, makes it almost a total loss so far as financial betterment is concerned. No vice-president yet has ever lived on his salary, it is said.

Now comes a wealthy, philanthropic matron of Washington society, Mrs. John B. Henderson, widow of the late Senator Henderson, of Missouri, and offers to donate outright, with no strings attached, a palatial mansion in Washington where the V. P.'s may live for ever more without seeing the rent collector once a month. Mrs. Henderson proposes to establish a home for the vice president, an official residence and congress is getting excited about it and threatening to stop any such proceeding.

The house Mrs. Henderson proposes to give the government has just been completed. It is one of the most palatial and costly mansions in the capital, built of marble, containing many rooms. It is situated on Sixteenth street, in the heart of the fashionable residential section of the capital. It cost in the neighborhood of half a million dollars. Mrs. Henderson desires it to be a memorial to her husband and to her son, John B. Henderson II, who died recently.

She sets forth that it has long been somewhat of a disgrace that the vice president of the United States should be homeless in the nation's capital, at a salary of \$12,000 a year. Quarters appropriate with the dignity and scope of such an office cost almost that much alone in these days of high rent. And if congress will accept the gift, she sets out, vice-presidents for all time to come will be spared the indignity of joining the army of house hunters in Washington and at the same time will be assured of quarters commensurate with the dignity of their job.

Congress, however, is hesitant about accepting. There are many who believe it would establish a dangerous precedent for the government to accept such a gift.

Also, it is pointed out by opponents of Mrs. Henderson's plans, it would take more than \$12,000 annually to maintain such a place as the new Henderson castle. No single cook and maid-of-all-work could ever hope to care for its forty-odd rooms. There would have to be butlers, first maids, second maids, footmen and whatnot, and congress has secretly always rather enjoyed having the vice-president "one of the folks."

If Mrs. Henderson's castle is accepted, it is pointed out, a poor man will be forever barred from taking the job, because he would have to live in the castle, and no one could do it on \$12,000 a year.

On the other hand those in favor of accepting the gift declare Mrs. Henderson should be paid the compliment and be given the thanks of congress for having thus solved a problem that has been troubling vice-presidents since John Adams—where will the V. P. live and how?

In recent years the vice-presidents have usually lived at a downtown hotel in the winter months and escaped from Washington whenever congress was not in session.

TURKEY WILL NOT SIGN THE ALLIED TREATY AT PRESENT

All Mediation Has Definitely Failed; Ismet Says Next Move is up to Allies

Lausanne, Feb. 6.—All mediation has definitely failed; Turkey will not sign the Allied treaty at the present time, even with the latest concessions proposed, and within a few hours Ismet Pasha will leave for Ankara to consult with his government.

So far as its object was to conclude a speedy peace the Near East conference has failed. Count Mas-sigli, as secretary-general, in behalf of the powers, urged Ismet Pasha to remain and continue the negotiations. At the same time he asked for a clear statement of the points Turkey insisted upon in the treaty. Ismet replied that the next move was up to the Allies, for Turkey stood by her note of February 4th, namely, that she would sign now about 80 per cent of the clauses of the treaty, but desired that the others, including the financial and economic clauses, should be postponed for later negotiation.

Ismet added that he needed to consult with his own government, but was ready to resume the negotiations when the Allies suggested. As the conference had not officially broken down, the armistice would continue, and he promised to do everything humanly possible to prevent an outbreak of hostilities.

SAYS SYMPATHY OF LEGION WITH FRANCE

New York, Feb. 6.—The American Legion does not hesitate to declare its sympathy with France in its occupation of the Ruhr, Alvin Owsley, National Commander of the Legion, said here at a luncheon meeting of a New York post.

Commander Owsley declared that some of the Legion posts in New York were "too lukewarm" in the statement of Legion purposes and aims.

"The Legion," he said, "is an all-American organization, untouched by any political party, creed or faith. Let there be one organization that will rise above party opinions and do things all-American."

"The Legion rises above the ambition of any man or group of men. There isn't power enough in all this nation to stay the power of this organization when we stand together."

MRS. M. D. HIGGS DIED LAST NIGHT SHANGHAI, CHINA

Remains Will Reach This City for Interment About the Fifteenth of March

A cablegram was received today by Mrs. J. B. Harding, of this city, announcing the death of her mother, Mrs. M. D. Higgs, which occurred last night in Shanghai, China, where she was visiting at the home of her other daughter, Mrs. H. W. Winstead. The remains will be brought to this city for interment and it is expected that they will arrive about the middle of March. Mr. and Mrs. Winstead will accompany the remains.

Mrs. Higgs was born in this city 66 years ago and before her marriage was Miss Mary Dorcas Blow. She was one of Greenville's oldest and most beloved ladies and had a host of friends throughout the county. She possessed a lovely Christian character and was a loyal member of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church, of this city. She had been in China for nearly a year during which time she has apparently enjoyed the best of health and was to have sailed for home during the coming May. The news of her death will be received with genuine regret by everyone whose privilege it was to have known her.

Mrs. Higgs is survived by two daughters, Mesdames J. B. Harding, of this city, and H. W. Winstead, of Shanghai, and one son, Mr. J. Benjamin Higgs, of New Orleans. She is also survived by one granddaughter, little Miss Mary Dorcas Harding and a large number of relatives.

ONLY TWO CASES IN TODAY'S SESSION OF POLICE COURT

One Defendant Receives Fine of \$50 Under New Law for Being Drunk and Disorderly

Only two cases were brought before Mayor Clark for hearing in this morning's session of court.

The case against C. L. Perkins, of Barr Filling Station, for adding to frame building in the fire district was dismissed. This case was the outcome of a misunderstanding between Mr. Perkins and the state and city building inspectors. The case was dismissed on condition that the small wooden shed adjoining the stock room on the Dickinson Avenue side be removed while the metal covered roof over the drives and gas tanks will remain as they now stand.

The other case disposed of was that of C. L. Griffin, white man, charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct. He was fined \$50 and the costs. This is the first case of its kind brought before the mayor since the enactment of the new ordinance increasing the penalty for such offenses.

GREAT BRITAIN DOES NOT CONSIDER ACTION UNFRIENDLY

London, Feb. 7.—Turkey's order that foreign warships leave Smyrna is not considered an unfriendly act by Great Britain, it has been announced by the Admiralty. It is reported that Turkey is calling all males between the ages of 19 and 47 for military service and it is reported that they are concentrating military stores in eastern Thrace.

COAST GUARD CUTTER GOES TO RELIEF OF SCHOONER

Norfolk, Feb. 7.—Coast Guard Cutter Manning has gone to the relief of an unidentified schooner ashore seven miles South of Cobb Island. Cape May observer reports the vessel in a precarious condition.

PRESIDENT ASK CONGRESS TO APPROVE DEBT SETTLEMENT

Washington, Feb. 7.—President Harding has asked congress to approve settlement of the British debt of four billion, six hundred million dollars, and he pleads for action on the ship subsidy now facing defeat by inaction in the senate. Coupled with a plea for speedy action was a warning against riders seeking to dispose of the money received in the annual payment. This in effect is a warning to advocates of the soldiers bonus bill against tying up funds, which the president says are already pledged for the retirement of Liberty bonds.

SAVANNAH PLANS TO GIVE DOUGHBOYS A REAL WELCOME

After Five Years' Stay in Europe Last of A. E. F. is About to Reach Georgia Port

Savannah, Feb. 7.—Back from years of service in a foreign land the last of the soldiers of the American Army of Occupation in Germany entered the Savannah harbor aboard the transport Saint Mihiel this morning. Savannah in a holiday mood waited at the dock to welcome the soldiers and military leaders with civilian authority. The Hearts party from Congress was on hand to welcome the returning soldiers.

Board American Transport St. Mihiel, 8 p. m., Feb. 6.—Members of the army of occupation, returning from their watch on the Rhine aboard the transport St. Mihiel are impatiently waiting the first glimpse in five years of the United States. Preparations have been made for the reception planned upon arrival of the ship at Savannah at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Twenty four German war brides aboard the ship are very excited.

Savannah, Ga., Feb. 6.—Although without definite information regarding the exact hour of arrival of the U. S. Army Transport St. Mihiel tomorrow, Savannah tonight rehearsed plans for what is regarded as its greatest celebration—welcoming home the last of the American forces who participated in the world war.

Basing the conclusions on radio messages received from the transport, saying the St. Mihiel at noon today was still 265 miles off Savannah. Marine men argued the ship could not reach Tybee bar much before one o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Evidences that the St. Mihiel is fighting through heavy seas and had weather was seen by marine men in radio message intercepted here today in which the transport asked radio stations in South Carolina to give her radio compass bearings.

Regardless of the time of arrival of the St. Mihiel, however, the citizens committee directing the celebration has timed its program to start with the appearance of the transport in the Savannah river off Colonial Park Bluff, where two brass cannons captured at Yorktown from the British and presented in 1790 by George Washington to the Chatham Artillery will fire a salute. Conveying the St. Mihiel from the bar will be the Cutter Yamacraw with the official reception committee aboard accompanied by a tug boat bearing a committee of the American Legion and newspaper men.

MILLIKEN BILL TO REGULATE SECRET ORDERS DEFEATED

Regulation of Secret Orders and Filing of Names of Officers Defeated on Second Reading

Raleigh, Feb. 6.—Defeat on second reading in the House of the Milliken bill to regulate secret orders and fraternities, passage of an act to adjust computation of a widow's dower in the sale of land for debt, bills sponsored by the State Insurance department for adjustments of the fire escape law, and classification of certain fire insurance agents and adjusters, featured the long session of the House today.

The Senate in a shorter sitting passed on a third reading the bill which provided an amendment of the state law governing licensing of optometrists and the regulation and practice of the profession that temporarily broke passage of the Long bill which would prohibit corporations from peddling usury. The public welfare committee of the upper House later in the day favorably reported the mother's aid bill which will provide extension of aid to children in their mother's care.

The afternoon and evening were occupied with committee meetings ranging from consideration of local agricultural bills up to the investigation of the priting deparmen and he consideration of he general educational measure.

The Milliken bill, which would provide that all lodges, orders or fraternities "of whatsoever name known" be required to register with the proper State authorities full list of memberships within the state and the names of the principal officers of the State lodge and all subordinate lodges, went down to defeat after Sumner Burdwin, Representative of Northampton county delivered what members termed the greatest speech of his legislative career in support of the measure.

The Northampton member pleading for passage of the bill, charged that the time had come in the state when the General Assembly had to face the facts and determine if any organization should constitute itself "judge, jury and executioner."

In like manner with dramatic appeal, Representative Everett, of Durham county, also supported the bill. Mr. Everett told the House that as late as last Saturday he had been "warned" by W. H. Austin, in Durham to fight passage of the proposed law. He declared Mr. Austin said he represented 800 members of the Ku Klux Klan. Mr. Everett said that at first he was inclined to disfavor the bill, but when a man who purported to be a member of the Klan had "warned him as how to act he could not do other than vote for the legislation.

Mr. Everett cited a parade of hooded men in Raleigh two years ago and said that when as he sat in the House of Representatives and saw "that hooded band claiming organization for the preservation of law and order, I decided that the time was ripe for this great body, the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina to assert just what they constituted law makers of the State."

REPUBLICAN IRREGULARS HAVE ATTACKED CORK

Dublin, Feb. 7.—Republican irregulars attacked Cork, but casualties were slight. One civilian was wounded. Telephone and telegraph wires are cut. Four irregulars were captured at Glouge.

MRS. V. P. SCOVILLE UNDERGOES OPERATION FOR APPENDICITIS

WHY REFUSE TO LIGHT BRIDGE?

Should there be lights on the county bridge across Tar river? The County Commissioners voted "no" in regular session here Monday when they refused to grant the request made in the form of a petition over the signature of several citizens of Pitt County. While nothing has been done heretofore regarding the installation of such lights, we are bound to admit that the placing of electric lights would be a great convenience especially to the people residing on the north side of the river.

The County Commissioners are recognized as broad minded men, and no doubt their refusal is based on some justified reason. But some of the voters whose names appeared on the petition have been heard to wonder why the request did not meet with the approval of the county executives.

GERMANY PUZZLED AGAIN

German inability to read the mind of other nations, so amply demonstrated before and during the war, apparently persists. The editor of Vorwärts expressed his amazement yesterday at the indifference of "the outside world" to what is going on in the Ruhr. Germany, he says, had pinned special hope on America. He seems to have thought that our troops taken away from the Rhine would have been ordered to march on Paris. In that or some other way the United States, with England, was counted upon to show a sudden and overwhelming love for Germany, and to resent and resist every impairment of her sovereignty by the action of France. But nothing of the kind happened, and the grieving editor of Vorwärts is left wondering how it is that America "can now complacently look on as the young German Republic is being made the victim of the greatest injustice."

These laments recall the time when Germany was equally puzzled because the United States did not fly to her support in the great war, and did not regard the Kaiser as the delight of the human race. But it is wrong to represent Americans as today callous to the plight of Germany. The tone of the American press is not that of special animosity to Germany, but simply of urging that she face the hard facts of her situation as they are, and seek to make known her determination to do everything in her power to meet her obligations to France. The French Government has just repeated its desire to come to terms with Germany. Any reasonable offer from Berlin, M. Poincaré declares that he will not refuse to consider. If the German Republic is, indeed, in peril, here lies the way of safety open before it.

France is ready to make a stable settlement; she is willing to grant a moratorium to Germany of two years or so; but she insists upon a definite and binding agreement with satisfactory guarantees. Instead of puzzling themselves about the astonishing indifference of foreigners, the Germans would be wise to study attentively the French attitude, and the strength of the French position, and to come to an arrangement at the earliest possible date. — New York Times.

Refugees Thronging Greek Ports, Tax Nation's Resources; American Red Cross Helps



American Red Cross traditions are again being lived up to—this time in helping to meet a problem that for a time threatened to engulf Greece, and which arose from the pouring into that country of more than a million refugees from Turkish-occupied territory. When the influx began last fall, Dr. A. Ross Hill, Vice Chairman in charge of Foreign Operations, went to Greece. He purchased American and Australian flour and other food with which to feed the thousands of helpless women, children and old men—for the Turks had held all men of military age. These homeless wanderers had been left at various ports on the mainland and on islands in the Aegean Sea and their plight was aggravated by the fact that they had no adequate

shelter. They were obliged to sleep in public buildings of every sort and some even remained on the quays where they had debarked; many lived in the streets, cooking such food as they had there. And the lack of sanitary measures brought disease to add to the hopelessness of exile. Then the American Red Cross brought food and medical supplies, spending already more than \$2,000,000 from its disaster emergency fund.

Now Judge John Barton Payne, Chairman of the American Red Cross, has "borrowed" Col. William N. Haskell who has been directing the feeding of 10,000,000 famine victims in Russia. And Col. Haskell and a staff of experts who served with him in Russia and Armenia will continue the work begun by Dr. Hill along the lines which the

latter began. While America is not undertaking permanent care of these refugees, Colonel Haskell stated on the eve of sailing, "that being a problem which is for Greece to carry on—the American Red Cross will meet the need where it is worst, and on a basis of disaster emergency relief."

To coordinate the many medical agencies now working in Greece, Colonel Haskell is taking with him Dr. Herschel C. Walker of Chillicothe, Ohio, who formed in Petrograd and environs an organization which was a model for the care of babies and the sick. And as his deputy, Colonel Haskell is accompanied by Maj. Edmund L. Daley, U. S. A., who served in a similar position in the Russian relief when more than ten million persons were being fed daily.

PARENTS SEND SON TO PRISON FOR FORGERY

Kansas City, Mo.,—They stood in the almost deserted courtroom—the four members of a little family—while one of the strangest scenes that ever took place within the walls of a courthouse was enacted. For a father and mother were sending their boy to the penitentiary—"for his own salvation," they told the court.

Clarie Branson, 19 years old, today is behind the grim walls of the Missouri penitentiary, serving a two-year sentence for forging his father's name to two checks.

Law Invoked.

Over and over again he visualizes the scene in the Jackson county criminal court, when his father and mother turned him over to the law. On one side of him stood his father, sad-faced and with downcast eyes; on the other his gray-haired mother, the wells of her faded eyes dried up after years of weeping over the waywardness of her "baby." Behind him as he faced the judge, was an older brother, who had spent many sleepless nights searching for the prodigal who would not remain at home.

"Here is our boy, to whom we cannot be father and mother. He is our youngest, and we have failed. Take him," the parents said to the law. And the law took him. Almost from infancy Clarie had been willful and headstrong. When he grew toward manhood time and again he forged the name of his father to check after check. He got into other trouble and preferred the companionship of criminals and dissolute characters to the society of his parents and the comfortable home they provided for him. Again and again the father reasoned with the boy, while the mother, red eyed from weeping, plead with

him into abandon his evil associations. The youth turned a deaf ear to all pleas. Finally, again he forged his father's name to two checks totalling \$20.

Parents Helpless.
In the quiet of their home, while the boy ran the streets, the parents communed together and decided that to save him from himself and break the influence that was about him they would send him to prison.

"We've done the best we could for him," the mother said. "We feel that he can't have any worse associates where he is going than he has had."

So the father swore out a warrant against his own son, and he was arrested. Defiantly the boy pleaded guilty when arraigned and was sentenced to the "gray, grim walls."

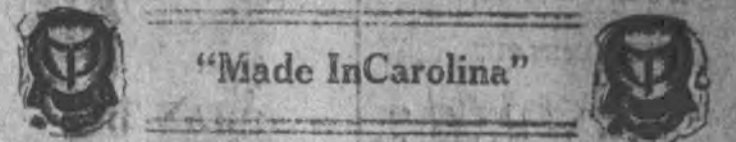

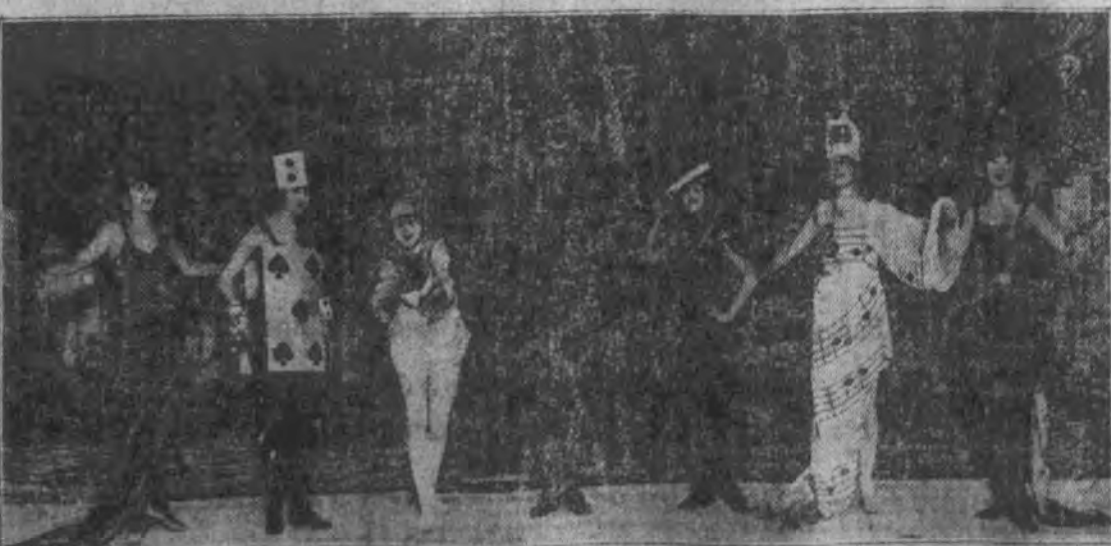

Among them were references to Secretary of the Navy, Denby, who was to have taken the stump for Senator Poinexter but failed to do so. One of Mrs. Poinexter's remarks in her letter was: "I suppose there is much real work in any of these offices (of Cabinet secretaries), but if I were choosing I think I should ask to be made Secretary of the Navy, because there seems to be much that goes with it. "An automobile with a driver, the use of those fine small boats that go about in the waters near here, and the opportunity to take one's family on wonderful trips, such as the one that Secretary Denby and his family took to the Orient last summer; and besides all these things, when the Secretary's wife has her 'days' at home she can have a band to furnish the music for her functions."

RALEIGH HIGH SCHOOL BASKET BALL TEAM TO TOUR EASTERN CAROLINA

The basket ball team of the Raleigh High School, is this week making a tour of several of the important towns of the eastern part of the State staging a game with the quint of the schools of the respective towns. Greenville has been defeated but twice this season out of a total number of seven games played, and both of these defeats were administered on foreign courts. 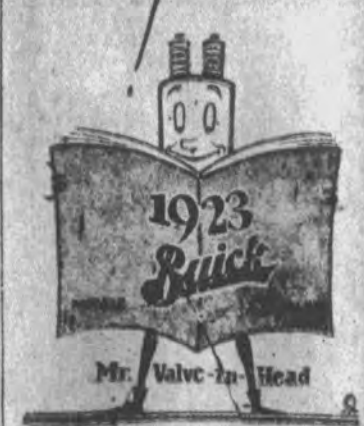

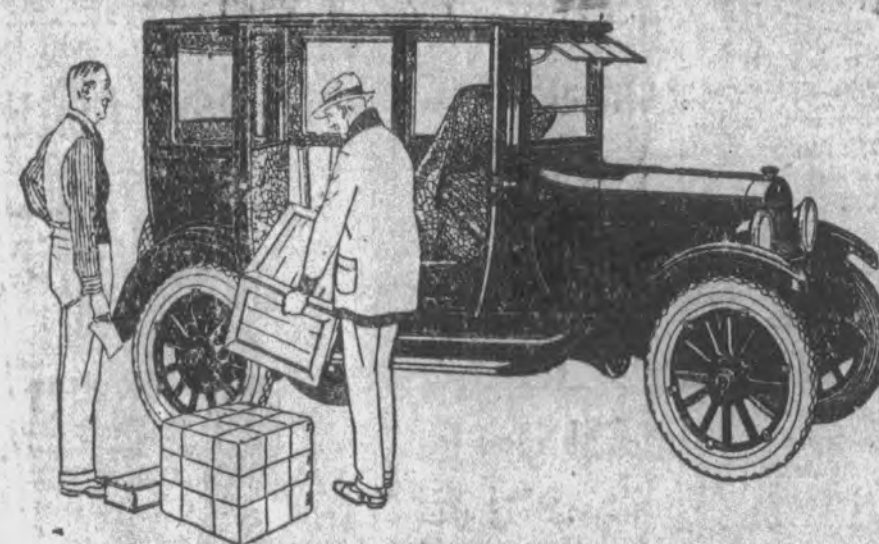
