

MILLIKEN BILL TO BE CHANGED AND PRESENTED AGAIN

Secret Order Measure Has Been Recalled to Action; To be Presented Tuesday

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 7.—Postponed action in the Senate on the Administration ship line proposal and recall from the dead list of the Milliken secret order revaluation bill in the House featured an active day in the General Assembly here today.

The ship line bill, after argument for and against it, occupied the entire session of the upper House as a special order of business, and went over until after the expiration of the morning hour tomorrow when it again will come forward under special order and at which time members of the Senate hope to reach a vote. The first vote will come on the substitute offered today by Senator Brown, of Columbus, which differs from the original bill in that the commission which the bill would create will conduct the investigation of the proposed water line and report back to a special or regular session of the General Assembly.

The revival of the Milliken bill in the House was the outgrowth of promised amendments which it was stated would serve to take from the measure certain features which opposing members said were objectionable. Representative Brown, of Durham county, who was active yesterday in opposing the bill when it was defeated 53 to 50 on its second reading prepared the amendments with the help of several other members and these will be presented when the bill comes up for passage under special order on next Tuesday night.

Motion of Representative Whitaker who found against the bill yesterday to reconsider the vote by which it was defeated on its second reading brought a counter motion by opponents of the bill to table the vote to reconsider. The Speakers ruled that the motion was out of order until Mr. Whitaker saw fit to call the initial motion to reconsider.

Parliamentary confusions arose over the question of how long Mr. Whitaker might hold his motion in abeyance after serving the notice that he would ask the House to reconsider. The House had no rule on the matter. After a conference of the leaders supporting the bill it was determined to call it up immediately, whereupon Representative Ray, of Macon, moved to table the Whitaker motion and on that motion the House voted 70 to 38 against tabling. The bill was brought back without a record vote.

Included in the new House legislation today was a bill which would provide for acceptance by the State of certain lands in Raleigh for the purpose of establishing a State fair ground and for use by the North Carolina State College of agriculture.

This matter will come up before the House committee on propositions and grievances early next week when several persons will be heard in behalf and in opposition to the bill.

The House committee on health considering the Quicquel bill to provide for restoration of the State Hospital Association on the Board of Examiners for nurses reported the measure unfavorably with unanimous vote after representatives of the State Nurses' Association stated that the bill would defeat the nurses of control over applicants and throw the balance of power to the physicians.

FAMOUS GERMAN RACING TRAINER IS MOURNED

Berlin, Feb. 7.—German racing men are mourning the death of G. Johnson, dean of German trainers, who, in a fit of despondency, committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver.

Johnson, who was 73 years old, celebrated his 50th anniversary as a trainer last year. For years before the war he had been the dean of German trainers. Impulsive, trained by him won the German Derby in 1895; Troilhetta, in 1896, and Tuki, in 1901. He had managed the stables of Prince von Urstenberg, Count Thiele-Winkler, Count Henckel and Baron von Falkenhausen.

The Memorial Baptist Sunday school has outgrown its present quarters and class rooms are absolutely necessary in order to meet the demands of the school.

The new building will be known as the Primary Department and will be modern in every respect. The superintendent of the Sunday school, officers and teachers of the primary classes will work with the committee in drawing the plans and making arrangements. Work on the building will begin just as soon as the plans are passed on.

ULTIMATUM ORDERING ALLIED WORSHIPS TO WITHDRAW WILL EXPIRE AT SUNSET TODAY

Smyrna, Feb. 8.—Turkish military leaders have extended the twenty-four hours limit to the ultimatum ordering the allied warships to withdraw from the harbor. It expires at sunset. A new limit is set pending orders from Ankara, it is said.

WAY CLEARED FOR BUILDING NICARAGUAN CANAL BETWEEN ATLANTIC AND PACIFIC OCEANS

Washington, Feb. 8.—The way is cleared for building the Nicaraguan Canal at some future time between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. The announcement was made by the State department signing the protocol with Costa Rica with definitely removed obstacles.

FORSYTHE COUNTY STARTS DRIVE TO CLEAN UP THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Cummings, Ga. Feb. 8.—Forsythe county has started a drive to clean up the liquor traffic said to have been flowing through it enroute to distribution centers following the kidnapping of three bailiffs by forty armed men. A posse is patrolling roads to Atlanta. Roy Wingo, identified as a member of the liquor caravan, is under arrest. A warrant is out for Glenn Westbrook.

AUCTION SALE OF POLAND CHINA HOGS TO BE CONDUCTED

Sale Will Take Place in Smithfield on February 15th; Hogs Are Pure Bred

(Auspices Pitt County Chamber of Commerce.)

On February 15th, at Smithfield, there will be an auction sale of pure bred spotted Poland China hogs. The hogs offered at this sale will come from one of Georgia's and from one of the South's leading hog farms, Elmwood Stock Farm of Dublin, Ga.

COUNTY CITIZEN DIES FOLLOWING BRIEF ILLNESS

Mr. Bryant H. Hardee, of Simpson Section, Succumbs to Bronchial Pneumonia

Mr. Bryant H. Hardee, residing five miles from Greenville in the Simpson section of the county, died Tuesday afternoon following an illness of three weeks from bronchial pneumonia, which developed after an attack of influenza. Funeral was held yesterday conducted by Rev. Leland W. Smith, in the absence of his pastor, Rev. V. P. Scoville of the Methodist Church, and interment was made in the family burying grounds near his late residence. The pall bearers were: Messrs. W. E. Hooker, J. C. Galloway, John Murphy, Jethro Mills, Harvey Elks, John Elks, G. S. Porter and Charlie Mills.

Mr. Hardee was a life-time resident of Pitt county and had but recently passed his seventieth birthday. Although his advanced age, together with ill health for the past two or three years had prevented his being as active as he wished to be, the deceased was always recognized as one of our leading citizens. He was held in high esteem by those who were so fortunate as to know the real character that he was, and even in declining days he stood ready to lend to those who most needed the aid of human hands and minds. Mr. Hardee had for more than a half a century led a consecrated Christian life, being a member of the Simpson Methodist Church, and his passing means one of the greatest losses that could have come to the religious element of that section.

Besides his wife, the deceased is survived by four sons and one daughter, all of whom live in the county. They are: Messrs. J. B. L. T. Arthur, J. C. F., and Mrs. J. Lonnie Tucker, believe that the Turks are bluffing.

Mr. White is not only secretary of the North Carolina Cotton Seed Crushers' Association, but has for the past several years conducted an insurance agency through which he has been in close touch with fire insurance problems. He is held in the same high regard among fire insurance officials and among his comrades in the oil milling circles. His appointment is indeed fitting and a better man couldn't have been selected.

BLAIR TO SPEAK ON HOW TO MAKE PROFITS FROM SOIL

Will Visit Pitt County During Week of Feb. 12 and Speak on Important Subject

Mr. E. C. Blair agronomist of the State Extension Division will spend the week beginning Feb 12th in Pitt county, and will speak on the subject of "How to make greater profits from the soil."

The business of the farmer is to produce the various food materials and those from which the clothing is made. These materials are of both animal and vegetable origin; but since all agricultural animals must depend on vegetation for their food the growth of farm crops forms the basis of agriculture.

The farmer knows that everything depends upon the soil for a living, and if our soils were more fertile they would produce greater profits to the owners. SAVANNAH GIVES RETURNED BOYS WELCOME STATES

Officials, Members of Congress and American Legions Heads Present Welcome to Soldiers

Savannah, Ga., Feb. 7.—America's "last thousand" came home from Europe today, signaling the nation's closing action in its participation of the world war. From the deck of the U. S. Army Transport St. Mihiel the soldiers who kept watch on the Rhine gained their first glimpse of their homeland after an absence of five years. With them were French (Belgian and German) wives and children, who saw for the first time the land they are to call home.

Savannah turned out to a man to welcome home in behalf of America the returning troops and to greet the women and children from the countries, former allies and enemy nations. The reception began shortly after 11 o'clock this morning when the Yamacraw and the tug McCauley met the transport beyond Tybee Bar. A party of Congressmen, Governor Thos. W. Hardwick, of Georgia, Mayor P. E. Seabrook and other state and local officials and army officials boarded the St. Mihiel from the Cutter Yamacraw.

As the transport neared Savannah she was greeted by a salute from two historical cannons, presented to the Chatham Artillery by George Washington and from a battery of French 75's, trophies of the world war. The soldiers answered each blast with cheers. Bells, whistles and sirens throughout the city and on the river craft took up the cry.

Spectators scattered along a mile and a half water front, kept pace with the transport as she progressed upon the river. They stormed the docks overpowered police guards. Fire hose were brought into play to clear the crowd from about the ship. The streams of water, struck members of the official congressional reception committee just as the body boarded the transport. The congressional committee including Senators Harris and Robinson and Congressman Johnson, Linberger Scott, Conley and Bulwinkle were met aboard ship by Col. Walter T. Bates, of the 8th Infantry in command of the troops.

Debarcation followed the formal welcome in behalf of the nation. The married soldiers stayed aboard with their families while their comrades formed to parade through the city. They were reviewed by Major General Farnsworth and Major General Shank. After the parade the enlisted men were guests at a barbecue arranged by the local American Legion.

A dance for the enlisted men and a banquet for the officers kept the arrivals occupied tonight.

It is a pity that the ones who sell the whiskey can't be made to pay half of it. The man who sells whiskey is just as guilty as the drunkard who is found in the gutter. They consider themselves "higher up," but sooner or later they will come down from their lofty perch. Greenville's board of Aldermen are to be congratulated upon the efforts which they are putting forth in order to make Greenville a better place in which to live.

GREENVILLE CLUB
KIWANIS
"WE BUILD"

(By Kiwanian Frank Harrington.)

Bearing ever in mind the fundamental constructive thought evidenced by our slogan, "We Build," we should consider that the coming days hold for us either success or failure, depending on how we build.

Kiwanis can fail. Rather let it be said that Kiwanis cannot fail. But a misinterpretation of Kiwanis, a misquoting of false principles under the name of Kiwanis, an hypocritical Kiwanis, the letter without the spirit—these hold naught save failure. The elements of failure are readily discernable. They comprise a low grade personnel a narrow policy, lack of plan, want of participation and absence of that spontaneous vital element pep. It is a wise provision which limits the selection of prospective Kiwanians to those men who are owners and proprietors, partners, executives, manager branch managers or skilled specialists. This requirement secures a membership of trained men. Men who have traveled the path of life and have at least arrived at some of the stations along the main line. It establishes a body of men accustomed to think to arrive at decisions and act upon them—there is thus obtained a group whose many sidedness qualifies it to pass upon practically all questions which may be presented to it or at least whose experience enables it to judge what proportions require expert opinion and it may be trusted to know where to find that opinion and sufficiently broad gauge to utilize it. Such a combination of men will look any issue squarely in the face and ask "Who says so?"

Given such a start a Kiwanis Club will be headed toward success, so long as the individuals chosen are those who are four-square. Those men whose character and business dealing will stand the sunlight, who have a community sense, who pay their bills, and whose children love them. Men who know how to smile, or are willing to be taught, men who are glad to be boys again. Men who have confidence in their fellowmen and faith in God.

But how great would be the failure of such an enterprise were it to be but a luncheon club. If it concerned itself only with the better and more intimate acquaintance of its members it would indeed serve a useful purpose, but what a small one. There is more to be had than the mere breaking of bread together the substitution of the informal Tom or Jack for the more reserved Mister—these are good, but such a club in only a place where men gather to eat together, because man does not like to eat alone in solitude. Such an organization serves no higher purpose than selfishly to feed upon its selfishness.

Nothing is ever built without a plan, except it be a chicken-coop, and the fact of using the thing at hand instead of erecting an idea is what makes it a chicken-coop and not a poultry house. That club cannot but fail, which does not early lay down certain basic principles of action—be they written or unwritten—and which does not conscientiously and persistently work toward certain definite aims.

Be the personnel of strength, its viewpoint large and the plan never so fine, of what use are these elements without active enthusiastic participations by the membership. The negative or dormant, never builds. Progress comes only through translating thought into action.

What then are elements of success? They may be found in that club which is made up of representative men, pursuing a broad view, committed to a carefully considered course of action in the doing of which each takes his share and part—that club in which things are done quickly, actively and with enthusiasm.

There can be no question of obtaining the proper personnel so long as the strict requirements of our By-Laws are followed—that the man

shall be of the grade indicated, that additions to the group be limited to one man from any single concern, corporation or partnership, and that the institution seek out the man. Let there be no place in KIWANIS for the man who desires simply to belong or for that man whose only recommendations are the possession of the entrance fees and the ability to spend money. Let none entertain the idea that here is any man in any community who is necessarily, or by reasons of expediency, sought for membership in KIWANIS.

None are there so powerful, so great, so omniscient but KIWANIS can give them more than they can possibly contribute to it and least of all does KIWANIS need any man's influence or his money, primarily, and as such.

Better, classification after classification unrepresented and empty than a mass of men who are members only and not KIWANIS. It is necessary that this personnel have a broad view but withal a proper one. No club can accomplish much which spends its time chasing the mirage of popularity. Broad and tolerant, it must hold to those things which are true, to those things which are of good report, and stand as a mountain of strength for those things which are right. Steadfastly, unalterably its course must be set toward progress—progress in the individual, progress in the affairs of the business represented in it and progress for the community which it serves.

Certain things all require careful planning—that sort of planning which seeks to secure the greatest good and progressive effort for the club and for the community. This plan laid down in general terms rather than hard and fast red-tape-bound regulations, may well embrace such phases as the question of water supply, of co-operation with the Chamber of Commerce, and the sponsoring of such movements as a play ground and curb marketing, now under construction. It will include the education of the community in the appreciation of the credit privilege, the enlightenment of the merchant as to the wisdom of good collections rather than doubtful accounts, and the plan will also provide for recognition of such activities as the Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls.

All of which brings us to the question of individual participation. No club is ever hastily committed to any procedure. Some group or committee has first tackled the problem, studied it, and has made its recommendations. From that point onward to its accomplishment somebody has a job. The KIWANIS way is to do it. Precedent may be against it, financial groups may not like it, political cliques may not approve it, but if it is right—KIWANIS will do it.

KIWANIS may be trusted to do it, do it efficiently and differently. It's participation will not be that kind so often met which says "That's a good idea, you start and we'll stand behind you." For that analyzed means—do it alone and we shall stand as far off as we can. Rather does KIWANIS say "That's fine we are with you. What can we do," or possibly—KIWANIS answers, "Come on, we're ahead of you already."

In conclusion, let us consider the spirit of KIWANIS. You are all more or less familiar with that figure—the dedication to service—the upturned face—the outstretched arms. These somehow seem passive—and KIWANIS is neither passive nor neutral—rather it is active and positive. The secret of KIWANIS lies in the fact that each interpret it according to his idea, unhampered by dogma, ritual, ceremony or useless regulation, yet some how they flow into a common stream of unity, service and progress. When one seeks to interpret KIWANIS there comes to mind a virile figure, with one hand stretched out to his fellowmen and the other outstretched to meet his God—that's KIWANIS.

FIRST WEEK OF POOL WRECKS MARKET AVERAGE

LOW PRICES PLAY MAJOR WITH BIG SALES, AS BUSINESS STAGNATES AND MONEY DISAPPEARS

(From Robertson County Times.)

Springfield, Tenn., Jan. 24.—The prices offered by the Association during the first week of its functioning have been so low that the loose-floor market is practically disrupted, and the foreign buyers have quit the auction sales almost completely, as the good prices have tumbled to the level set by Sapiro farmer-officials. Business is practically at a standstill, with no money circulating and several firms in a decidedly shaky condition, due to the stagnation of the past few weeks.

Members are pointing out that they were pacified thru the Christmas holidays (along with the merchants) by the promise that the big money would start rolling out as soon as the machinery could get to work. Privation and doing without has been endured on the strength of these promises so long that the patience of the people is well-nigh worn to a frazzle.

It is a well-known fact all over the county that The Times made a hard fight against the Association because it was able to predict just the things that are taking place. But we lay all pride aside and, if need be, we will get on our knees to those who control this monster machine and beg them to raise the prices in order that our county might be saved. We will pay all costs of a long-distance

message to the officials at Hopkinsville or the fares of local men, if they will go to headquarters and plead our cause with those who perhaps unwittingly, are ruining our people and stifling agriculture by their management.

It is all too late now to reeminate certain ex-lenders; they will be remembered a long time by some of our merchants. Thing to do is to get relief. It is being recalled on the streets that many promises were made that have been broken. Most especially will be remembered that promises were made to banks in the county. These banks have carried the farmers of the county for years and years, seen him through periods of adversity, advanced them money for supplies, renewed their notes when they were hard up. These banks were invited to assist in the financing of the Sapiro pool. They accepted. If the Orinda Bank and the Cedar Hill Bank and the Adams Bank or a Springfield bank advances money to the Association, it is sent out of Tennessee to Kentucky. The interest on this money even for one week would mean much to this county. We are assured that all members are being paid with checks on a Paducah, Ky., bank. We ask in all seriousness where we can find so much as an honorable tinge to such procedure, if it is as it is said to be.

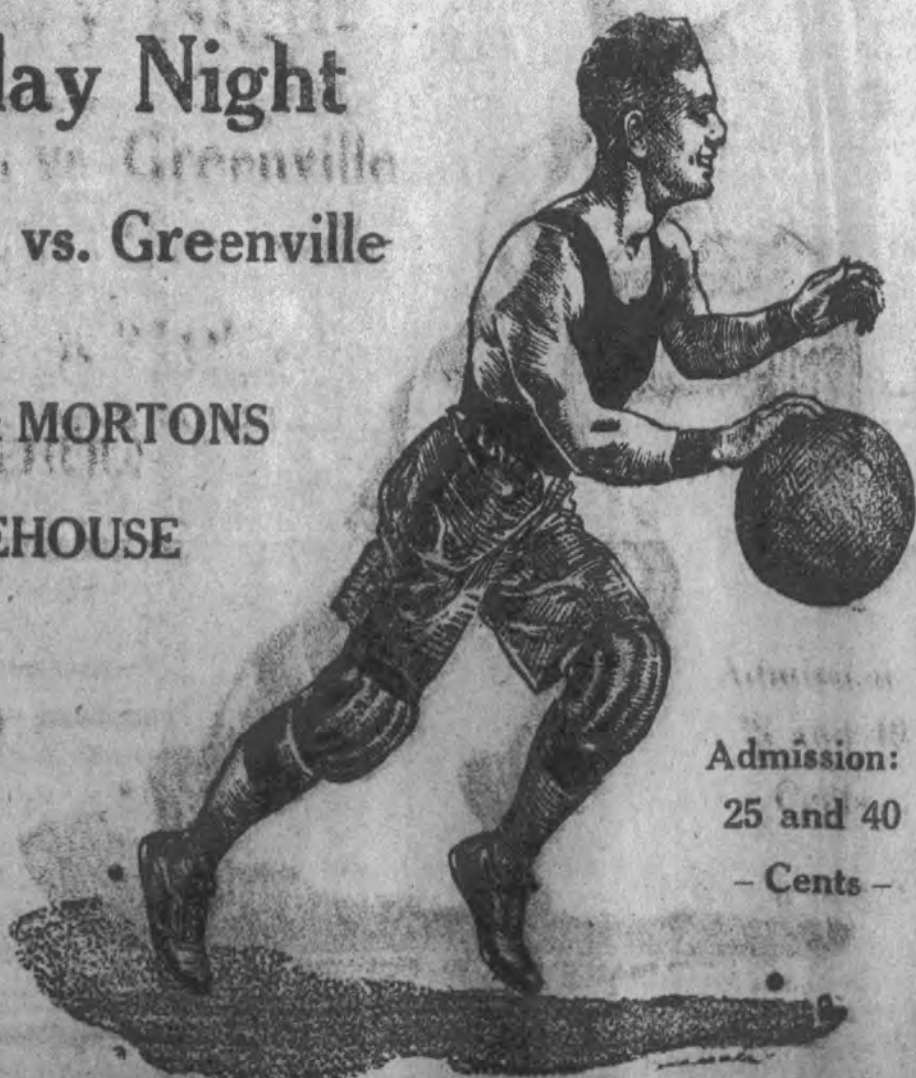
