THE PLAY MAKERS AS TURKS BEGIN TO PRESENT FOLK-PLAYS BACK DOWN ALLIES TO LARGE AUDIENCE DO NOT FEAR WAR

One of the Best Shows Ever
Seen on the Local Stage and
Enjoyed by Capacity House

The Folk-Plays of the Carolina Playmakers were presented in White's Theatre last night under the auspices of the Woman's Club and thoroughly enjoyed by a capacity house. The program presented consisted of three one act plays, "Agatha," "Off Nag's Head," and "Wilbur's Cousin." The acting was some of the best ever seen on the local stage, each character playing their part in a manner which deserves the highest of praise.

Each of the plays were drawn from our own North Carolina traditions and from the observation of the lives of our people.

The first "Agatha," by Jane Toy, carried the large audience back fifty years ago. The scene was laid in Hillsboro. Agatha, played by Miss Nancy Battle, with her two sisters, Amabel, played by Miss Carrille Sanders, and Angela, played by Miss Katherine Batts were the three daughters of the old house. Their father, Colonel Joseph Pettway, Mr. George V. Denny, was a true Southern gentleman and loyal to the Confederate cause and its generals. His acting could not be improved upon. He was determined to change his daughters names to those of his favorite generals and would have succeeded if Miss Agatha had not upset his plans, when, after being sent to her room for rebelling against her name, fell (purposely) from the window. Thinking she was really hurt the old man agreed to do anything she asked and granted her request not to change her name. There was some romance interwoven when a childhood friend returned. The acting throughout the entire play was splendid and pictured the genuine Southern styles and doings following the war. Others taking part worthy of mention were Shaderrick, the negro butler, Mr. Joe Powell; Major Benjamin Batty, Mr. Owen Woodside, and Miss Mamie Pettway, played by Miss Kitty Lee Frazier.

The second play, "Off Nag's Head" was entirely different from the romance of the old South, as it was a tragedy of the North Carolina Coast. It was quite remarkable how the characters could change so quickly from the romantic to the tragic acting, but they did with the greatest of talent and ease. The plot of the play was woven around a lost portrait of Theodosia Burr, which disappeared with its owner when she started on a boat to see her father in New York. The old fisherman played by Owen Woodside, was one of the best characters seen here in a long time. His acting was so real that one really felt as if they were living in the time of "Pirates" and "bankers."

He with his wife, played by Miss Nancy Battle, and his daughter, Miss Sue Byrd Thompson, lived in a little hut. With them lived a demented woman, Miss Katherine Batts. Fifty years after the boat with Theodosia Burr had been reported missing, a doctor, Mr. George V. Denny, called to see the fisherman's wife, and the climax was reached when he discovered that the demented woman was the missing Theodosia Burr and the fisherman had been a land pirate. The ringing of the bells, the winds and flashing lights were almost perfect.

The last play "Wilbur's Cousin," was a comedy of college life. It was short and full of pep. Romance, mistakes and love reigned supreme. After being kissed by a girl (Miss Sue Byrd Thompson) who took him for her cousin, and after falling in love with her, Wilbur, played by Spencer Murphy, succeeding in getting out alive. The girl's father was mistaken for a butler, and his acting kept the audience in a continual uproar of laughter. The other characters were Jelly Beans Jones, Mr. Owen Woodside, George Williams, the real cousin, J. E. Powell, and the mother, Miss Kitty Lee Frazier.

Official Advices Show That
Turks Did Not Include De-
stroyer Edsall in Order

Constantinople, Feb. 9.—The possibility of a war between Turkey and the Allies died down rapidly as the Turks continued to back down. The Turkish military authorities explained that the note ordering foreign ships to depart from Smyrna was not an ultimatum but a note explaining that in the future it would be the policy of the Turkish government to forbid the entrance of all foreign war craft of more than a thousand tons from entering the port.

Washington, Feb. 8.—Official advices today showed that Turkish authorities at Smyrna did not include the American destroyer Edsall as among foreign war craft ordered out of that port. The Turkish commander elected to construe orders from his government closing the port to foreign warships of more than 1,000 tons burden as not applying to the American craft, although as a matter of official record the ship does slightly exceed that size.

It was assumed by officials here that the action of the Turkish military authorities in Smyrna in exempting the Edsall from the order was taken on the tonnage ground for the purpose of avoiding the necessity of passing upon the more delicate question of American neutrality. In any event the question which Allied nations have had to face in connection with the Smyrna order is not before the United States government. The Edsall or some other destroyer will remain at Smyrna to look out for American interests.

Published explanations of the Turkish reasons for ordering foreign war craft out of Smyrna harbor would indicate it was not intended by the Ankara government to include American or any other neutral craft in this prohibition. It has been stated that the Ankara government views the presence of Allied warships at Smyrna as a possible source of danger to the Turkish army in the event of further hostilities between Turkish and Greek forces, as the ships of the allies of Greece might screen the landing of Greek troops there were they could strike at the railroad of the Turkish army.

Since the United States is not an ally of Greece against Turkey and is not or has not been at war with Turkey, the same argument could not apply to American ships in Smyrna harbor, a condition which the action of the Turkish military commander there probably recognized in holding that the exclusion order did not apply to the Edsall.

In view of the reported Turkish purpose to close Smyrna harbor by laying mines, it is to be assumed that American vessels stationed in Turkish waters will move in or out of Smyrna only when urgent errands require and then with the complete co-operation of Turkish authorities, who would naturally furnish pilots. The closure of the harbor was expected to become effective today.

During the summer recess Robinson will likely remain to work with the Democratic national chairman on the selected program to complete the sixtieth congress.

CHANGES DATES FOR
TEN COUNTY FAIR

Kinston, Feb. 8.—Dates for the annual 10-county fair here have been changed from the latter part of October to the 6th, 10th, 11th and 12th of that month, it was announced today. The new dates, it was stated by association officers, suit the fair management better. The annual fair here claiming a patronage in Lenoir, Greene, Wayne, Pitt, Pender, Jones, Duplin, Onslow, Craven and Carteret counties, has been held for years during the early part of October. Only one fair has been attended by bad weather. Improvements to the plan, already one of the largest in North Carolina east of Raleigh, will be made during the spring and summer, it is understood.

Simmons, who has been very ill at his home here with an attack of grip, was able to leave the sick room for a few hours today for the first time since he was taken ill three weeks ago. The Senator has been steadily improving during the past week but so far he has made no plans for returning to Washington.

NEGRO PLUNGES THROUGH WINDOW ESCAPES SHERIFF

Charged With Complicity in
the Breaking Into Store of
Kinston Merchant

Kinston, Feb. 9.—Sam Slade, negro charged with complicity in the breaking into the store of Charles Waters here some months ago, located in Durham and delivered over to Sheriff Arden W. Taylor there Wednesday, escaped the High Sheriff by plunging headfirst through the glass window of a toilet on the Southern train shortly after the train left Durham and while it was making a speed of at least 35 miles an hour. The story of the escape was brought back to the city by Sheriff Taylor Wednesday night late. The conductor of the train was an eye witness to the escape.

To Sheriff Taylor's request to stop the train, the conductor replied: "No use, he is a dead nigger; you can go back any old time and find him on the tracks."

But the Sheriff insisted and went on back up the tracks and on into Durham. He obtained cars and searched the immediate territory but found no trace of the negro. He disappeared completely and evidently escaped almost certain death. How and why, no one can figure out.

Slade was handcuffed with his hands in front of him. When he took his plunge he simply put his hands in front of him, stooped down and "let 'er rip." Glass shattered in every direction. No one saw whether Slade picked himself up or not.

He was wanted for his connection in the robbery of the Waters store, the concealing of the loot in a truck back of the store and was believed to be the leader and brains of the whole gang of negroes who were arrested for the crime.

His Statement That State
Shows Deficit of \$5,000,000
Precipitates Inquiry

Raleigh, Feb. 8.—The sub-committee of the Finance and Appropriation committees of the House and Senate which is investigating the financial condition of the State under a joint resolution passed last Friday will confer for the first time this afternoon with Corporation Commissioner A. J. Maxwell, whose published statements precipitated the inquiry, it became known last night.

Following Mr. Maxwell's statement that the revenues and expenditures of the State for the period between December 1, 1920 and December 31, 1922, showed a deficit of \$5,000,000, further developments occurred with startling rapidity. However, statements from all quarters seem to have subsided pending a report by the investigating committee and that body has indicated its purpose of going exhaustively into the subject before it prior to the expression of any opinion.

Within an hour after the General Assembly convened on Friday, Governor Morrison was before it with a vehement denunciation of Mr. Maxwell, reiterating the position of himself and the Budget Commission that taxes levied but uncollected would produce a surplus of approximately \$2,500,000. Immediately after the Governor's speech the investigation he demanded was authorized by a formal resolution and that night the chairmen of the Finance and Appropriation committees in the two Houses appointed a sub-committee of ten to represent the four full committees in the investigation. The investigating committee organized Monday by electing Senator W. Lunsford long chairman and got down to work on Wednesday with the appointment of Senators Long and Heath and Representative Parker as a special committee to go over the treasurer's books with auditors. The special committee has since been at work on the books continuously with frequent conferences with the full committee.

RESCUE PARTIES CONTINUE TO
SEARCH FOR MEN ENTOMBED
BY THE MINE EXPLOSION

Vancouver, Feb. 9.—Rescue parties are continuing to search for fifteen men entombed by an explosion in a tunnel of the Cumberland coal mines on the Vancouver Island. Twenty-five bodies have been removed. Gas makes the rescue work difficult.

SECRETARY MELLON TO
EXPLAIN TERM OF DEBT
AGREEMENT DECIDED UPON

Washington, Feb. 9.—Secretary Mellon will be called before the Senate Finance committee to explain the terms of the Anglo-American debt agreement decided upon. Following his testimony it is expected that the bill will be favorably reported to the senate where it will await the House's action.

MER ROUGE AND MASTROP
PARLEYING FOR PEACE NOW

Bastrop, Feb. 9.—Mer Rouge and Bastrop are parleying for peace. Citizens of the towns are exerting every effort to establish friendly relations after the bitter fight which has been in progress since the murder of Daniels and Richards.

HOPES FOR PASSAGE
BONUS BILL REVIVED

Washington, Feb. 9.—Hopes for the passage of the soldiers' bonus measure at the present session of Congress was revived today when the military affairs committee of the senate took up the Bursum adjusted compensation bill. The measure would grant all veterans twenty dollars per month and a refund of all allotments.

Senator Overman Announced
Withdrawal Stating it to be
On Account of Health

Washington, Feb. 8.—Withdrawal of Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, from the race with Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, for democratic leadership in the next senate, when Senator Underwood, of Alabama, the present democratic leader, will retire, was announced today by Senator Overman, of North Carolina, on behalf of his colleague.

The announcement by Senator Overman was regarded as assuring the election of Senator Robinson. Senator Simmons, authorized the announcement from his sick bed at his home at New Bern, N. C.

Senator Overman's statement follows:

"My colleague, Senator Simmons, from his sick bed at New Bern has asked me to make public request that his name shall no longer be considered for the post of democratic leader in the senate. Notwithstanding the fact that more than half the members of the present senate are supporting him and he has other assurances justifying him in feeling most hopeful of success, Senator Simmons feels that he must take this action in part upon consideration of his health and in part for reason of party harmony. My colleague's physicians have advised him that he must take the best care of himself for several months to come and they strongly warned him against undertaking any new burdens until he shall have fully recovered his strength."

"It is well known here that Senator Simmons in the beginning consented to the use of his name for the democratic leadership only upon what seemed to be the understanding that there would be no considerable opposition. He stated that he would not under any circumstances enter into a scramble for the place. Since Senator Robinson, for whom Senator Simmons feels high esteem and friendship, was offered as a candidate, Senator Simmons has refrained from withdrawing his own name only because he has felt that loyalty to his own friends and supporters would not permit it."

"My colleague now feels, however in view of his health, and of the fact that the contest, between his friends and those of Senator Robinson, has grown so close and promises to be so long drawn-out with the consequent neglect of that necessary consecration by Democratic senators, of mind and effort on party and national affairs, all through this year that the highest national and party considerations demand that the contest shall proceed no further. Senator Simmons, therefore, has asked and obtained the consent of his friends, to leave the field clear to Senator Robinson, whose leadership my colleague believes will be in every respect able and satisfactory."

"Senator Simmons wishes me to express for him his deep and grateful appreciation of the loyal support given him and of the splendid zeal and generalship his friends have experienced in his behalf. He appreciates no less, too, this kind solicitude and regard for him, and his present state of health has prompted his friends in the senate to yield without hard feeling to his desire to take himself out of consideration and bring the contest to an end."

America Stands Between Refugees and Death While Greece Adjusts Herself to Post-War Conditions



Whatever the ultimate decision
may be as to the settlement of
the conflict between Greece
and Turkey, for the present at
least American charity organized
by the American Red Cross, is the
sole hope of life for more than a
million refugees in Greece. These
people have fled before Turkish oc-
cupation in Greece, and have turn-
ing a problem that is too great
for the Greek Government. Wave
after wave of homeless women,
children and old men—the Turks de-
stroying men of military age—reach
the quays of Saloniki, Piraeus,
and the ports on the many islands
of the Aegean Sea, have faced a
situation which is the concern of na-
tions. And with the earlier arri-
vals of A. Ross Hill, vice-chair-
man in charge of foreign opera-
tions of the American Red Cross,

brought the resources of the Amer-
ican Red Cross to bear, more than
\$2,000,000 having been already
spent from the disaster emergency
funds, to supply American medicine,
food, blankets and overcoats to the
sufferers.

Now Dr. Hill is about to return
to America and resume his regular
duties and Judge John Barton
Payne, chairman of the American
Red Cross, has borrowed Col. William
N. Haskell from the American Relief
Administration to direct the work
in Greece. Col. Haskell's services
in Russia during the famine period
are well known, and he has had fur-
ther experience in relief work, hav-
ing been head of an American mis-
sion in Armenia. Colonel Haskell
and staff will execute a mobile pro-
gram, meeting the need where it is
the worst, and the medical men will
coordinate and expand the work of

camp sanitation, the establishing of
mobile hospitals for epidemics, open
ambulances, and furnish further aid
to the infants and sick. The need
for the latter phase of the work is
keen, as the hardships of the flight
and lack of living quarters and of
proper sanitary arrangements have
developed a distinct menace from
epidemics and other diseases.

Distribution of American milk has
been the only salvation for huge
numbers of children, while food of
other sorts bought by the Red Cross
and distributed under its supervision
has meant life to adults.

America, Colonel Haskell explain-
ed, just before sailing for his new
field of operations, is not bound to
a continuing responsibility to care
for the refugees, but will carry on
while the permanent solution of the
problem is being decided by the
Greek Government.

proved—this is the sum of the mes-
sage proper. The commission's re-

that test. The matter presents no
legitimate or safe opportunity for
playing politics or for indulging in

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ROTARY TO TEACH BETTER CITIZENSHIP

(By International News.)

Chicago, Feb.—With presidents,
prime ministers, chief justices and
heads of national legislative bodies
throughout the world contributing
brief statements of their ideas of
the responsibilities of the individual
citizen for the kind of government
he gets, 90,000 members of Rotary
International have launched a world-
wide campaign for better understand-
ing of these responsibilities as part
of the celebration of the eighteenth
anniversary of the founding of the
first Rotary Club on February 23.

President Harding, Speaker F. H.
Gillett of the House of Representa-
tives and Attorney-General Daugherty
have contributed the texts of the
citizenship messages which the
Rotarians are broadcasting in the
United States.

President Harding in his statement
outlined the responsibilities of the
individual citizen for the execution
of the laws and declared that no
citizen can consider himself a good
citizen who does not do all in his
power to make careful selection from
among the candidates for office and
then vote for the person he has de-
liberately selected. This, the Presi-
dent remarks parenthetically, several
millions of the citizens of the United
States regularly fail to do by fail-
ing to vote at all.

Speaker Gillett in his statement
pleaded also for careful selection of
the candidates for legislative office
and stated that the quick and the
demagogue belong in the same cate-
gory, in that they arouse sympathy
by telling the victim of his real
troubles and then offer their own
remedy as the only panacea for the
trouble.

Attorney-General Daugherty's
statement declared that constitutional
government is not possible unless the
individual citizen first acquaints him-
self with and obeys the law himself.

The three basic statements of the
principles of citizenship being used
in the United States are duplicated
in similar measures from the heads
of the main branches of government
in most of the twenty-four countries
in which rotary clubs have been es-
tablished. Rotary Club officials an-
nounced. The Rotarians are care-
fully excluding partisan politics, they
declare.

The text messages are being used
in addresses to schools, industrial

The first rotary club was organized
in Chicago February 23, 1905. There

in twenty-seven countries.

The local girls have been put through unusual hard practice each evening of this week, and they should be able to hold the girls of the capital city in check.

EVERY FARM SHOULD HAVE A GARDEN.

Every farm should have a fruit and vegetable garden. It is profitable because it helps us to feed ourselves; saves what we otherwise would be obliged to pay for this food.

It is healthy because it means more fruit and vegetables, less beef and pork on our table all the year round. If we don't grow our fruit and vegetables we won't have any—we will just eat meat and bread.

It means a real farm home, where the boy will love to stay, where the children will love to invite their friends, because they have something to give them—strawberries, raspberries, cherries or apples.

Don't say, "Oh, I'm too busy to plant a garden. I'll grow corn and wheat and hogs and cattle and buy fruit and vegetables." We don't buy them; we won't have them. We'll just go on eating pork and more pork, wondering why our family is unhealthy, why our children want to move to town. If we don't have a real garden with some strawberries or other berries and some fruit trees, we won't have a real home.

We have often planned to have a real garden. If we don't plant one now, if we keep putting it off, we never will have one.

Don't crowd your garden into a little patch near the house with little, short, stinky rows close together, "so it will be handy for mother to gather the vegetables." Handy for mother? Not on your life. That isn't the reason you put the garden near the house. It is so that mother will pull the weeds and do the hoeing. But mother has many things to do—the garden is poorly cultivated; the chickens get most of the stuff.

Grow a real garden, not just some lettuce and a few radishes and some beets and potatoes. Grow a garden that will supply you with fruit as well as vegetables all season and provide a surplus for canning or drying or storing for winter use. Fruit is like heaven. It is universally desired, but few get it.

Put your garden where it will be easy for you to use a horse cultivator. Plant it in long straight rows with the rows as far apart as you plant your corn. Then when you are using your horse cultivator run it through the garden a few times. It will take only a few minutes and mother won't need to break her back pulling weeds; and your boy won't have to stay home on Saturday afternoon and hoe it when he wants to go fishing. Besides it will be better cultivated. It will be a garden worth while.

If you took a trip of six or eight miles in any direction from your home, on what per cent of the farms would you find gardens having a few fruit trees, strawberries and other berries as well as rhubarb, tomatoes, cucumbers, asparagus and other vegetables?

What per cent would be represented if you omitted fruit trees but included small fruits and the vegetables mentioned?

What per cent would have cold frames for growing early vegetables, starting tomato plants, etc? What per cent would be without gardens, the combined more that just such things as radishes, onions, lettuce, beets, etc? How many farmers would you find that had no gardens of any kind?—Auspices Chamber of Commerce.

COUE "OLD STUFF," SAYS EX-DOCTOR

Los Angeles, Feb.—The auto-suggestion theory of Dr. Emile Coue is "old stuff," says George B. Kemp, Hawthorne resident. Kemp makes the emphatic assertion that the learned Parisian is presenting nothing less than the old-time mesmerism and self-hypnotism in unfamiliar raiment and that beneath the surface of the fundamentals of auto-suggestion and mesmerism will be found.

Auto-suggestion was old stuff when I was engaged as a medical practitioner years ago and I made a deep study of it," says Kemp. "What Dr. Coue is teaching today was well-known to myself and thousands upon thousands of others back as far as 1880.

"Look at me," he cited. "I'm 61 years old and never have suffered a slight illness simply because since I was a young man I have practiced auto-suggestion long the same line as Dr. Coue is now teaching."

Although Kemp attributed his good health to the "day by day in every way I'm getting better and better" formula, he refused to look upon it as being more than old-fashioned mesmerism in new garb.

"Knotted strings, the Coue sort or any other variety, are not necessary at all in mental treatment," he said. "They are used only for the purpose of being tangible to concentrate the mind on when it shows inclination to wander."

Shortly after he graduated from a medical college and returned to his home in Louisville, Ky., Kemp performed a serious operation before 175 physicians and students with the patient hypnotized instead of being placed under an anesthetic, he said. "The art of auto-suggestion was known, perhaps unconsciously years ago to most leading physicians and others," Kemp said. He named former President Roosevelt, Senator Hiram Johnson, of California and others as examples.

"Through auto-suggestion I expect to live to be 100 years old," he said. "In fact, I know I feel younger today than I did yesterday, and I know that I felt more youthful then than I did the day before."

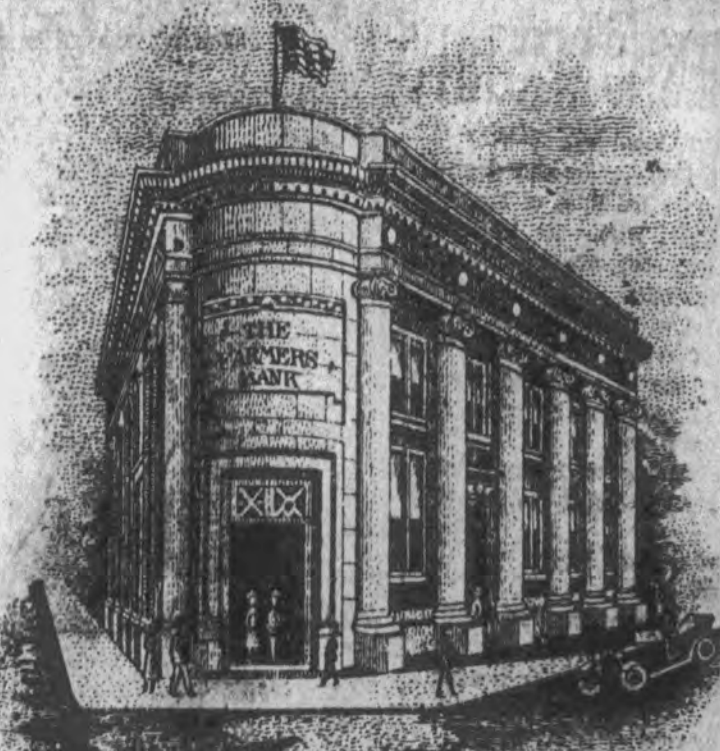

She makes a round hole in the mud

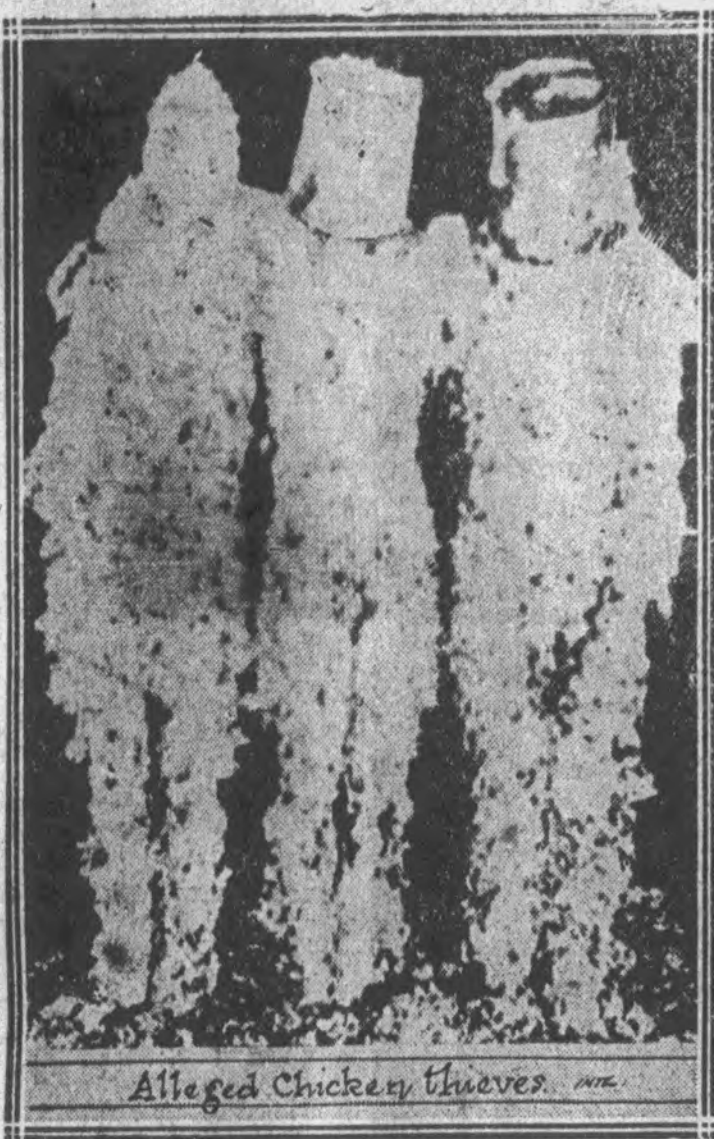
as she goes;

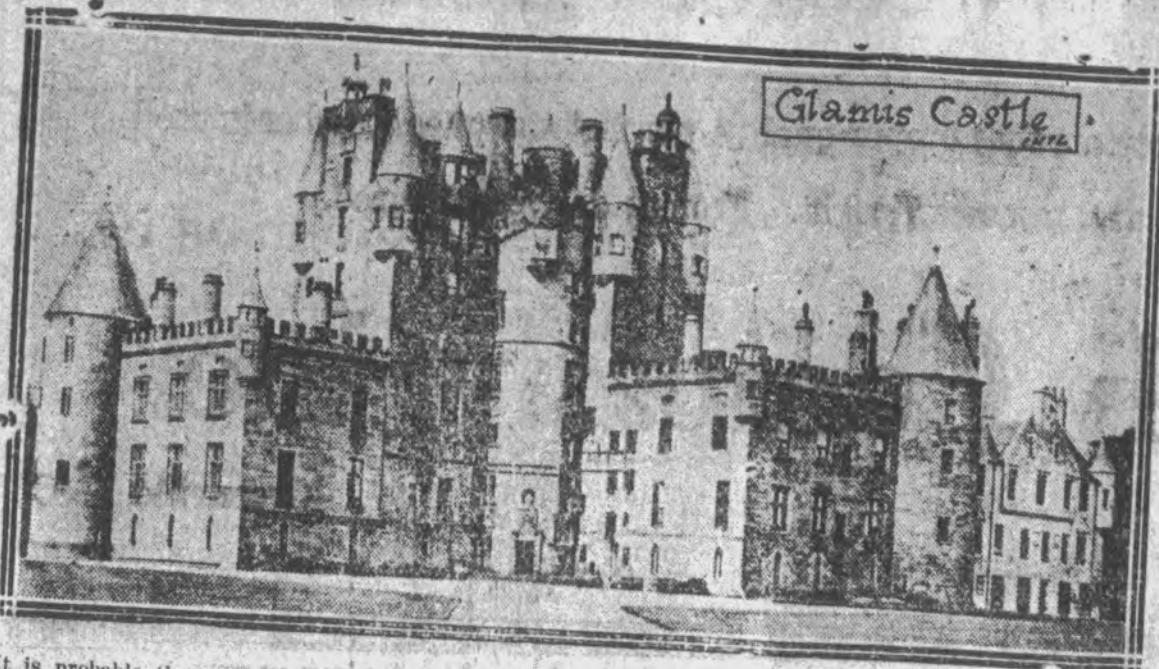

BEAVERS BECOMING PESTS IN NEBRASKA

Streams have been dammed and thousands of acres of meadowland flooded and ruined by beaver. The resolutions declare: The stockmen ask the right legally to hunt beaver from November 1 to December 1.

America Writes New Chapter in Relief of Emergency Which Threatens to Overwhelm Greece

America has once more been called to aid in an emergency of the first magnitude, and the American Red Cross has thrown its resources into the breach. The influx into Greece of more than a million persons exiled from Turkish-occupied territory and forced to seek refuge in a country scarcely larger than Ohio and with a population smaller than that of New York City almost overwhelmed the Greek nation.

Steamer after steamer has for weeks disgorged human freight in the harbors of the mainland of Greece as well as on the many islands of the Aegean Sea—in some cases the number of refugees equaling the population of the ports where they debarked. To give the women, children and old men—the Turks had had men of military age—shelter is a problem for Greece. But to furnish food, medical attention, blankets and clothes has been a task which Dr. A. Ross Hill, Vice Chairman of Foreign Operations of the American Red Cross, organized in person. And already more than

\$2,000,000 has been spent for food-stuffs, blankets, clothing and medical supplies, and more will be necessary.

On Dr. Hill's request to be allowed to return to his duties here, Judge John Barton Payne, Chairman of the American Red Cross, secured Col. William N. Haskell, who directed American Relief Administration feeding of 10,000,000 persons in Russia, to conduct the work in Greece along a mobile basis according to the needs. Colonel Haskell and a picked staff sailed early in January for Athens, among them Dr. Herschel C. Walker, an Ohio physician who organized a model medical work in Petrograd and environs, and Maj. Edmund L. Daley, who was Colonel Haskell's deputy in Russia. In discussing his mission, Colonel Haskell declared that the permanent solution of caring for the exiles was the duty of Greece, but that while this matter is being considered the American Red Cross is virtually standing between the refugees and death.

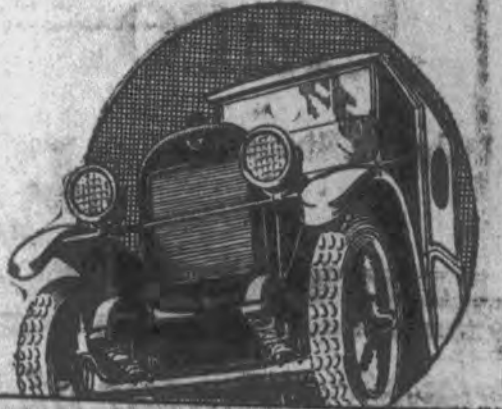

Russian Women Make Clothing from Strange Materials in Effort To Keep Alive; America's Aid Sought



Russian women have given up every other occupation for sewing this winter. They have become a nation of tailors, and the clothing shortage has taught them to make boots as well as shirts and trousers. Every spare moment is used in converting some incongruous material, leather, rope, newspaper, excelsior, fish net and sack cloth into clothing for the children. The price of clothing is so high on the market that it is out of reach. There is no other clothing to be had and thousands of children throughout the little northern villages are unable to leave their homes because they have nothing to wear.

These Russian folks have sold all their furniture for food during the famine, their live stock has succumbed to starvation and there is nothing in the peasant huts but bare, empty rooms, and in some cases an old stove full of dead ashes. Cold as are the huts, the vast lonely steppes where the icy wind screams and rages are colder still. The children cannot be forced out of doors into this cruel wind even to go to the American Relief Administration food kitchens where they get their one meal a day. They would rather stay at home and starve.

To meet these tragic conditions and to save more than a million adults and children from dying of exposure the American Relief Administration has inaugurated a system of clothing remittance packages which may be purchased at the A. R. A. headquarters, 42 Broadway, New York City, or at a local bank. Each package contains enough material to clothe a small family and by special arrangement with the Soviet Government they will be delivered free of duty and at the greatest possible speed to any designated individual in Russia. The contents of each package include nearly five yards of dark, warm wool cloth, enough to make one suit of clothing for a man or woman or two for a child; four yards of garment for a child; four yards of lining; sixteen yards of muslin sufficient for four suits of underwear; eight yards of flannel; enough for two men's shirts or women's shirt waists and buttons and thread to make up these garments.

NEBRASKA DOCTORS' LICENSES IN PERIL

Lincoln, Neb., Jan.—Nebraska physicians and surgeons, licensed within the last three and one-half years, are watching court records with considerable anxiety. Every license issued since the passage of the Code bill in 1919, it has been discovered, may be

declared illegal should the issue be carried to court.

This discovery was made by the new Governor, Charles W. Bryan, in examining the 1919 Code bill with a view to repeal of several of its provisions. Governor Bryan found that the Code law nullified the act creating the State Medical Advisory Board and that the body which issues medical licenses has been serving for nearly four years without legal authority.

When the board is again legalized

by an act to be presented at the present session of the state legislature it is planned to issue a blanket order setting young physicians and surgeons at their ease. Meanwhile the new M. D.'s will keep a weather eye on opponents of their profession—and the court dockets.
