PLAYGROUNDS FOR THE CHILDREN WAS PRINCIPAL TOPIC DISCUSSED AT LAST NIGHT'S SESSION OF KIWANIS CLUB

The People's Long Dreamed of Institution is Receiving Additional Endorsements Which is Believed Means Its Establishment in the Very Near Future

Last night's session of the Kiwanis Club was one of the most interesting for many months, and the attendance was unusually good with several visitors present. After the usual preliminaries over which President Fitzgerald presided, Kiwanian H. A. White, in charge of the feature part of the evening's program was presented.

The principal topic for discussion was "Playgrounds for the Children," which project has received much attention of late in many of the organizations of the city. For many years the subject has been given some expressions of endorsement by individuals and clubs only to be numbered among the deferred matters. Last fall the project was given new life in the Kiwanis club when presented to its members by that body's former president, J. B. James. Immediately a committee was appointed to confer with the Board of Aldermen with an idea to ascertain their pleasure relative to the proposition. The Kiwanians were favorably received by the City Fathers and a like committee from that body was named by Mayor Clark to lend what co-operation possible to bring this long time dream of the people to a realization. Of the aldermanic committee Closs Hearne was made chairman, and to him is due most credit for the present standing of the project, for he has worked untiringly in an effort to get connected up the various features necessary to present the question before aldermen, Kiwanis Club and other interested organizations of the city.

Being a guest of the club at last night's session chairman White called on Mr. Hearne to give those present an idea of what had been accomplished in bringing the proposition to a happy conclusion. Mr. Hearne spoke in a very enthusiastic manner and was interrupted by much applause when he advised the club that the property owners adjacent to the city's lands had agreed to give the parcel necessary to make playgrounds the desired size. He also presented some figures as to the cost of putting the grounds in condition, including the culverting which the aldermen have agreed to do in the event that the citizens of the city contract to place on the grounds such equipment as will be a credit not only to the city, but which will compare favorably with other playgrounds in the south. In conclusion Mr. Hearne stated that all that was left to be done was the co-operation of the people in allowing the necessary funds for the equipment.

Mayor Clark being present was next called on for some expressions as head of the city's government. He spoke briefly of the great good that would come from such an institution that would carry with it a lasting impression on the many generations to come. During his remarks he added that while Greenville was amply supplied with institutions to take care of the soul and mind of the children, the preservation of their bodies had been neglected. He tendered the project the endorsement and co-operation of the city officials, and closed by wishing the interested ones God speed in their endeavors.

Kiwanian W. E. Hooker, in a few words, presented the "Playgrounds as a Practical Idea," and brought out many interesting facts that proved that the establishment of a playground was a practical idea for any community.

Dr. Chas. O'H. Laughinghouse spoke several minutes as to the benefits the children would derive from the playgrounds from a standpoint of health. He presented his thoughts in a forceful manner to the extent that those present were convinced that something should and must be done to preserve

TRUSTEES ASK FOR MONEY TO ERECT A MEDICAL COLLEGE

Many Cities Made Bids for Proposed College; Location Left to General Assembly

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 10.—After devoting more than five hours to the hearing of various plans proposed by delegations from Charlotte, Greensboro, Durham and Raleigh for the proposed four year medical college, the Board of Trustees of the University of North Carolina, in executive session late yesterday, adopted a resolution asking the General Assembly for an appropriation of \$350,000, for hospitals and buildings and \$150,000 maintenance funds for the institutions, and also to decide upon location.

The resolutions adopted brought to a close insofar as the Trustees were immediately concerned a question which has been hanging fire for more than a month and which has been the subject of discussion in several meetings of a special sub-committee and in the regular session and an adjourned session of the Trustees.

The various delegations who appeared here yesterday laid before Trustees plans which involved donations of hospitals, hospital sites, clinical facilities and maintenance funds.

The Charlotte delegation presenting various speakers, including T. LeRoy Kirkpatrick of the chamber of commerce, and Dr. L. W. Faison, told of the clinical and hospital facilities that city offered and asked that Charlotte be considered for the college with the idea of linking up the Queen City with other cities having state institutions. Durham speakers pointed to the fact that their city lay between the shadow of the campus of Chapel Hill, site of the University, and contended that the college should be, if possible, placed in that city in order that it might be more directly connected with the University.

The Greensboro delegation touched upon the facilities that city offered in hospitals, surgeons, specialists and other features and Raleigh speakers told of the accessibility of state institutions for clinical studies, citing the Hospital for the Insane and the Tubercular Sanatorium.

WITHDRAWAL OF NOMINATION OF JAMES McNARY EXPECTED AT AN EARLY DATE, IS SAID

Washington, Feb. 10.—Withdrawal by the president of the nomination of James McNary, of New Mexico, as Comptroller of Currency is expected soon. The president, it is said, is convinced that the Senate Sub-Committee will refuse favorable action. It is reported that the withdrawal will be in the nature of a compromise and that McNary will be renominated Assistant Secretary of the Treasury.

The Young Men's class was minus its regular teacher, Mr. J. B. James who was sick. The class was taught by Mr. Scoville. At the conclusion of the lesson the class took up the matter of electing a successor to its beloved former president, Bob Starr. There was one natural selection for the place. All agreed at the same time that there was only one man for the place. Therefore, Ex-Sheriff Dudley was given this important post in the work of the class. The class is expecting a great deal from this tender of theirs.

The 10a class, one of the schools' finest classes taught by Mrs. J. B. Kittrell had 20 present out of an enrollment of 27. The most of the absentees in this class were girls who live out of town, and who could not come on account of the inclement weather.

MEMORIAL BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL IS MAKING PROGRESS

Present Total Enrollment is 361; A Gain of 44 Was Made During January

The Memorial Baptist Sunday school is rapidly coming to the front and in this statement a large number will readily concur.

The monthly report of the Sunday school, as recently given at a business meeting of the church, showed the enrollment for the main school for the month of December to be 266. The total enrollment for the month of January was 300 for the main school, showing a gain of 44. Including the Cradle Roll and Home Department, the present total enrollment is 361.

That the school may care for the steady growth that is now such a joy, after a recent recommendation by the Board of Deacons, the church decided to build a Primary department. A committee composed of J. N. Gorman, Mrs. J. L. Fleming and W. M. Moore, were appointed to go into details and submit complete plans to the church at an early date. It is now expected that work will commence on this addition in the immediate future.

At a recent meeting of the teachers and officers of the school among the steps projected for the advancement and progress were the following: Six-Point Record System, Graded Literature for all of the classes through the Junior department and the adoption of the Standard of Excellence. With the exception of two or three points, which a little faithful work will bring about, the school is now a standard one.

The Baraca class is composed of a fine body of men of between 60 and 75. President P. L. Clodfelter, with Dr. C. J. Ellen as teacher, and the various other officers and committees are constantly on the job for the progress of the class. A unique record system is in vogue, the base ball score. It is a great sight to see the Baraca class play ball each Sunday. The many base ball markings represent the different points on which a record is desired. This class has as its slogan 100 men. With the present momentum, it will be quickly reached.

The Glad Girls Bible Class has long since made a record of which any school might be justly proud. With an enrollment of between 75 and 100, they are forging to the front. The untiring efforts of the teacher, Miss Ward Moore, the assistant teacher, Miss Louise Fleming and the President, Mrs. W. W. Lee together with the splendid co-operation of the various committees and the entire class, the splendid "Esprit de Corps" has been a natural consequence.

He was presiding justice of the old United States Commerce Court and later circuit judge of the fourth district, comprising Maryland, West Virginia, North and South Carolina.

DEMONSTRATION IN SALADS GIVEN TO THE WOMAN'S CLUB

Given at College Miss Reaves Teacher of Domestic Science and Mrs. Ned Laughinghouse

The Woman's Club of Greenville, is deeply indebted to Mrs. Ned Laughinghouse, chairman of the Home Economics committee of the Woman's Club, and to Miss Reaves teacher of domestic science at the East Carolina Teachers College, for the splendid demonstration in salads, given for its benefit Wednesday afternoon.

The demonstration was given in the new domestic science room that has just been completed and is fully equipped to do this line of work to the best advantage.

Of course the program for the afternoon had been planned by Miss Reaves, but the actual work was done very efficiently by four young lady pupils.

These young ladies while dextrously mixing ingredients, told each step to be taken in bringing the salad in hand to perfection.

The salads demonstrated may be placed under three heads, meat, vegetable, and fruit. Several of each were made and the dressing that accompanied them.

When finished the salads beautiful and appetizing with pretty garnishing were passed to the ladies. Cheese balls and cheese straws, were a part of this delicious salad course.

The attendance was very good considering the inclemency of the weather and it is the hope of the Woman's Club, that this is the first of many food demonstrations to be given them by Miss Reaves and her pupils, as the salad lesson proved both enjoyable and profitable.

CALENDAR CLEARED IN SENATE ON FRIDAY AFTER LONG SESSION

Prolonged Debate Encountered When the Gill Farm Loan Bill Was Brought Up

Raleigh, Feb. 10.—Sharp attacks upon Senator Giles' farm loan bill, adoption of the committee substitute appointing a board of directors for the State Sanatorium in lieu of the House resolution directing a legislative investigation of the institution and passage of bills creating a sinking fund for State bonds and abolishing the dangerous insane department of the State prison featured a long session of the Senate yesterday.

The calendar war practically cleared during the session of over two hours. The only important bills to go over were the age of consent bill, set for a special order next Tuesday, experts in the State and then on motion of Senator Giles referred the bill to a special committee composed of Senators Armfield, Varner and the Long bill, forbidding corporations to plead usury, which has already passed its second reading and was held at the request of the author; the bill increasing the number of trustees of State College from 10 to 60 and providing for their election by the General Assembly, which went (Continued on page 4)

LOCALS VICTIM OF "WHIRLWIND" FIVE OF CAPITAL CITY

Greenville Highs Lose Pretty Basket Ball Game to the Fast Raleigh Quint

The basket ball team of the Greenville High School suffered their first defeat on the home court last night before the "Whirlwind" quint of the Raleigh High School by a 27 to 16 score.

The capital city boys made a quick get-away at the very first toss of the ball, and began their scoring during the first sixty seconds of play, and it required even the reserve defense of the locals to hold and keep them within reaching distance. Had Greenville presented its usual work in the offensive, in all probability the final outcome would have been at least put the locals within a few points of victory honors. The Raleigh boys expended quite a bit of trouble in completing successfully hard passes, and several times especially in the last half were forced to resort to short passing.

Members of both teams were victims of hard luck throughout the game in goal throwing, several times when to miss the basket seemed almost impossible, it was a common occurrence to have the ball strike within the downward course of the goal only to roll slowly on the outside.

In many respects Greenville made a creditable showing against the visitors, who are out for the championship honors of the Eastern part of the State. In a large measure the locals can attribute their defeat to their failure to follow the ball up in both passing and goal throwing. Too many times by slow work they allowed the opponents to block what appeared to be an easy score.

The remaining twelve points made by Greenville were three field counters by Brown, one by Satterthwaite, and Gaskins tossed for one field goal and caged two foul throws out of four attempts.

Young and Crinkley for Raleigh carried off the scoring honors of the contest. They being the only members of the visiting five making a point. The former is credited with seven clean field goals, while Young caged three from the court and threw seven fouls out of a possible nine.

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To Enlist Millions of Young Americans in Game of Health Planned by Noted Specialists



Once they buried health teaching in the dust of dry anatomical data, but at last it has come to life smiling. It comes in the shape of a milk bottle surrounded by a goodly crew of common garden vegetables.

Have you ever met a girl who didn't want a clear complexion or a boy who didn't crave a strong arm? Have you ever told either that carrots mean clean blood, that milk is the master-builder of sturdy bodies, and known them refuse such food at table? It is on such a practical commonsense basis that the American Child Health Association, with Herbert Hoover at its head, in which is merged the Child Health Organization, means to build its program for the promotion of good health. Health, it has shown, even in the schoolroom, may be made a matter for laughter, not tears. It is not taught with a rod, but as a game. Six of the twenty-two million children in American school rooms

today are suffering from malnutrition. Malnutrition is not synonymous with lack of food. It more often means wrong food and bad food habits—the substitution of pastry for potatoes, dill pickles for green vegetables, coffee for clean milk. Or it may be due to the presence of some physical defect that prevents proper digestion. To correct it medical attention is required and the constant testing of young physiques by means of measuring child and secure equal advantages for the unborn baby, the infant in arms, the toddling pre-school child, the work done for thirteen years, by the other incorporated organization, the American Child Hygiene Association.

To attain its object the American Child Health Association will maintain a clearing house of information on child health activities, as to assist in the solution of every community's local problems.

National headquarters for the American Child Health Association are at 522 17th Street, Washington, D. C. Its treasurer is Mr. Corcoran Thoms, and it will include Dr. Livingston Farrand, President of Cornell University and former Chairman of the American Red Cross, and other such distinguished men in the medical profession as Dr. Philip Van Ingen, Dr. L. Emmett Holt, Dr. Thos. D. Wood of Columbia University, Dr. William Palmer of California, Dr. Rorden S. of St. Louis, Dr. Clifford S. of Chicago, Dr. L. T. Royce of Norfolk, Va.; Dr. J. H. Mahan, Johns Hopkins, Baltimore, and other of the prominent nationally known physicians.

TAMPA MAY SPEND BIG SUM FOR WATER SUPPLY

Tampa, Fla., Feb.—The freeholders of this city will vote on March 6 on a proposition to bond the city for \$2,650,000 to purchase the plant of the Tampa Water Works Company and to provide a new and more adequate supply of soft water. H. L. Hodges, white, charged with speeding on Pitt street. Mr. Hodges pleaded guilty to speeding, stating that he was at the time in somewhat of a hurry, but when the fine of ten dollars and cost was announced, he said that he did not think that he was in that big a hurry.

John Brown, colored, charged with not having sufficient lights on auto-allowed to pay cost of action.

John Murphy, Sr., white, charged with selling barbecue on streets and not having city license so to do. Defendant not being present in court, capias issued and case continued.

Alfred Wiggins, colored, charged with being drunk and committing acts of disorderly conduct, also charged with assaulting his wife, by way of threats to do her bodily harm. Evidence developed that this Alfred Wiggins was a very dangerous character, having been once sentenced to 20 years in the state penitentiary for murder, and once to the roads for assault with a deadly weapon. Also threats that he was going to kill several of the police officers. As these cases were in the mayor's jurisdiction the defendant was given 30 days in each case.

The mayor announced that the new city jail built just in the rear of the court room, had been completed. That it was fire proof and thoroughly sanitary, and second to none in the state in this respect, and that in behalf of the town he extended a cordial invitation to prison reformers, welfare workers and any and all other organizations or individuals to visit this new, modern hotel detainer on a tour of inspection, so that they could see for themselves that the unfortunate without bondsmen present were given comfortable quarters, and also that it was quite a nice sanatorium to sober up in, for those who could not afford Keeley. The public will be welcome and shown through the jail by any of the police officers, at any time any one may see fit to come.

over because of the absence of Senators Squires and Harris of Wake. The Senate adopted the substitute for the Giles bill worked out by the author and a number of agricultural Castellote for redrafting. The original Giles bill provided for a bond issue of \$2,500,000 to be used in loaning money for purchases of homes to tenant farmers in the State. The substitute does away with the county boards provided for in the original board and increases the State board from five to eleven. However, an amendment offered yesterday by Senator Giles reduces that number to seven, the new board consisting of the economist of the university, now Dr. Branson; the economist of State College, now Dr. Taylor, and a representative of the Department of Agriculture as ex-officio members and four members appointed by the Governor.
