GREENVILLE WILL HAVE REPRESENTATIVE IN "QUEEN CONTEST" AT WILSON DURING EASTERN CAROLINA EXPOSITION IN MARCH

RUHR SITUATION BECOMES ACUTE AS RESULT BOYCOTT

MENTIONED IN WRECKING FARRAR-TELLEGEN ROMANCE

City's Prettiest Girl Will be Chosen by People With Ballot. Clip Coupon and Cast Nomination of Your Choice at Reflector Office

At a meeting of committees from the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs and the Chamber of Commerce held this morning in the Chamber of Commerce rooms it was unanimously decided that Greenville should have a "Queen" to compete for honors in the contest to be held in Wilson, March 22nd during the Eastern Carolina Exposition. She will be supposed to attend the program for Thursday afternoon and Thursday night of the exposition. Ballots will be distributed and each person on the inside of the exposition building will be entitled to vote one time for his choice. The same procedure will be followed at the evening program and the voting will close at 9 o'clock Thursday night. The ballots will be collected and the tellers will retire and bring back the winner of the exposition, who will be awarded a \$500 diamond ring.

Here's a chance for some young lady from Greenville to win a diamond ring and the following is the plan adopted for the selection of the one to be Miss Greenville at the exposition. Any unmarried lady of this city 16 years of age or over is eligible for entry into the contest. MILLIKEN BILL PASSES HOUSE AND GOES TO SENATE

Bitter Debate Featured Passage of Bill After Amendment Was Tacked to it

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 14.—Final passage of a resolution introduced in the House by Speaker Dawson and concurred in by the Senate to provide that the special committee now charged with investigation of the State's financial condition, continue at its work until the auditors which have been hired are ready to report, passage of the amended Milliken bill to regulate secret orders by the House on third reading, 63 to 44, and final senate action on the House bill to raise the "age of consent in the case of females to 16 years," featured the day in the General Assembly and tonight the Milliken bill stood ready for action in the upper house.

After what members have termed the bitterest debate in years, the Milliken bill was passed with an amendment which would make the provisions of the act applicable only to such organizations whose members resorted to masks or other disguise in their regalia. The main provision of the bill would require such orders to register a roster of their state and local memberships with the authorized officials.

Hot debate also featured the senate tonight on the "age of consent law" and it also failed to escape amendments before it finally passed. The amendments would provide that violation would be termed a misdemeanor instead of a felony, as originally provided, that marriage of the defendant would be a bar to further prosecution and that all defendants under 16 years of age would be in the jurisdiction of the juvenile court. Because of the long sittings which the House has held on the secret order legislation, just before adjournment, Representative Burgwyn, of Northampton county, one of the leading proponents, moved that the vote by which the bill passed its third reading be reconsidered. Representative Connor, of Wilson, immediately moved to table the Burgwyn motion and the motion to table carried unanimously. The vote was taken to finally dispose of the measure as far as the House was concerned.

TUSCAN PRINCE AND SANARITA SEND OUT S. O. S. CALLS TODAY

Ship Which Goes to Aid of Sanarita is Also Reported Missing; 60 Aboard Tuscan

San Francisco, Feb. 15.—The freighter Tuscan wireless states that it is ashore and breaking up badly. It has been in a terrific grip of a two-days' storm. The message was broken abruptly and it is feared that the crew was forced to abandon her. It is thought that there was a crew of sixty aboard the ship.

An hour after the Tuscan Prince went ashore S. O. S. calls, started from the Sanarita, stating that it had gone on the wicks and was sinking rapidly. The condition was indicated by nine S. O. S. calls in less than half an hour. Tugs are searching for the steamship Nika which it was reported by mid night had been driven rudderless before the storm when it rushed to assist the Sanarita.

Allies Seize Two of the Largest Hotels in Essen, as Result of Controversy

Essen, Feb. 14.—The boycott battle between the Franco-Belgian occupation forces and the Germans is daily becoming more acute in the Ruhr, particularly in Essen. The most noticeable features are the failure of co-operation by the German police and the refusal of hotels and merchants to serve the French and Belgians.

In retaliations, the Allies seized two of the largest hotels in Essen, but this was met by further active opposition by the Germans. Yesterday the Germans severed the electric light current supplying the Kaiserhof Hotel, where the Allied engineering commission was quartered.

The French countered with an ultimatum that unless the lights were restored by 6 o'clock last evening the entire lighting system of the city would be shut down. At that hour the Kaiserhof was still without electricity, just the city lights continued to blaze forth. The Germans said a detail of troops was sent to the municipal lighting plant to cut the power, but had to leave without achieving its purpose because the doors were tightly barred. Vice Burgomaster Schaefer was arrested this morning in connection with this incident.

Figures on the child population and milk supply of Essen are announced in German quarters in substantiation of the claim that the occupation is causing acute distress. The city, according to these figures, has 22,000 children under two years of age, approximately 45,000 under six years and 82,000 children of school age. The daily milk supply thus far this month has been 5,800 to 6,000 liters, as compared with 35,000 liters for the same period in January and February of last year.

The present supply permits of about one-quarter of a liter each for children under two years and it is asserted that many of the children are being given sugar and water instead of milk.

SECURITY BENEFIT ASSOCIATION IS ORGANIZED IN CITY

Charter Will be Left Open for Two Weeks for New Members to Join

District Manager W. A. Wingate, of the Security Benefit Association was in this city last night and organized Greenville Council No. 3672 with 65 charter members. The following officers of the council were elected: H. T. Bozeman, president; Sebron T. Cox, vice president; Mrs. Neta Mae Godwin, second vice president; Laura S. Cox, secretary; Carl C. Bergeron, financier; Miss Viola Manning, prelate; Mrs. H. T. Bozeman and Mrs. Esther G. Wingate, conductors; James Vandiford, guard; and William Brickhouse, sentinel.

It was agreed that the charter be left open for a period of two weeks in order that the present members would have sufficient time to get their friends in without the cost of initiation. Jesse A. Wingate, Posey H. Little and Leon Brickhouse were appointed trustees for the council. The council adjourned to meet every Wednesday night at 7:30 o'clock in the M. W. A. hall.

PITTSBURG HIT BY COLD WAVE; PLANTS AND HOMES SUFFER FROM GAS SHORTAGE THERE

Pittsburg, Feb. 15.—The cold wave hit this city hard. Thermometer is at zero and still going down. All plants are handicapped, by a gas shortage which is also responsible for suffering in many homes.

SEVENTEEN FIRED EMPLOYEES WILL BE GIVEN JOBS BACK

Were Fired From Bureau of Printing and Engraving After Years of Service

Washington, Feb. 14.—An executive order restoring the civil service rights of 17 of the employees of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing who were removed nearly a year ago after an investigation, was issued today from the White House.

The order set forth that the 17 individuals who were separated from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing would be eligible to re-enter any part of the government's classified service "in appropriate positions for a period of five years from March 31st, 1923, on certificate of the civil service commission."

Six additional former members were declared by the order to be not eligible for re-entrance since they had been retired upon annuity.

FIRE VISITS ARMOUR PLANT DAMAGE IS ESTIMATED AT TWO MILLION DOLLARS

Omaha, Feb. 15.—Fire, burning for twenty-four hours in the Armour plant, broke out at ten o'clock this morning, after it was thought to be under control. Officials state that the loss will be two million. Thousands are out of employment.

LEADERS PLANNING FORCE HENRY FORD OFFER BEFORE HOUSE

Democrats, Led by Garrett, Planning to Take Action Tomorrow on Muscle Shoals

Washington, Feb. 15.—House democratic leaders expect to take action tomorrow to force Henry Ford's Muscle Shoals offer before the House. Legislation to be brought up by Republicans providing the government purchase at eleven and half million dollars of Cape Cod Canal will be backed by the New Englanders. Ford advocates are planning to link the two proposals by attaching special order for consideration of Muscle Shoals bill. The fight will be led by minority leader, Garrett. The democrats expect assistance from Cape Cod advocates should they be able to join his propositions and make one dependent upon the other.

BUILD MODEL SANTA MAIRA

London, Feb.—An exact copy of the famous caravel Santa Maria, in which Columbus discovered the American continent, is to be presented by the Spanish Government to Great Britain for exhibition purposes. The model is now being completed in Madrid, and it is understood will shortly be sent to London.

Advices Coach Duncan That Basket Ball Team Would Not Appear Here Friday Night

Greenville High School basket ball team wins the first game of the elimination series, towards the Eastern Carolina championship goal by way of a forfeiture on the part of Scotland Neck. The school quint of that city was according to the schedule arranged in Raleigh Tuesday night slated to play the local high here on tomorrow night, but a telegram from the coach of the Halifax boys advises that they would not appear here. By this procedure of course the game is forfeited to Greenville, and the locals are credited with winning. In telephone conversation with Mr. Duncan the Scotland Neck coach further stated they realized that their chances with the other strong teams whom they were scheduled to meet was very poor, and for this reason they would probably withdraw now and not contend further in the elimination series.

There remains but two more victories for Greenville to attain in order to be counted in the schedule to be arranged with winners of the seven groups. Their next contest will be on Tuesday night with either Belhaven or Elizabeth City on the local court. Should Greenville be victors in this game, then the winners of the Washington and Aurora game will appear here on Friday night.

This does not mean that there will be no game here tomorrow night because the girls' team of the local school will have as their guests the girls from the Raleigh school which quint handed the Greenville five defeat on Friday night of last week. That defeat has no bearing whatever on the outcome of the game for tomorrow, as the locals have been undergoing some real practice skirmishes this week, and are expecting to give the girls of the capital city an interesting time for the laurels of the occasion.

In addition to the above game, there will be a spirited contest between the boys of the first and second teams. The latter quint comprises some excellent basket ball material and the outcome will no doubt be close.

NORTHWEST IS IN GRIP MOST SEVERE WEATHER IN YEARS

Chicago Reports Coldest Wave Since 1917, and Indianapolis Since 1872

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Death demoralized transportation services and revived as severe as cold tightened. The mercury here is five below zero, the coldest since nineteen seventeen. Indianapolis reported coldest wave since eighteen eighty-two. Northwestern states are in a grip of a blizzard. Ocean traffic is tied up and industry at a stand still. Seven deaths are reported in the Northwest and ten in Winnipeg. Prince Albert, Alberta has lowest temperature, it being forty-five below zero.

BAMBINO TRIES OUT NEW YANKEE STADIUM

New York, Feb. 15.—Babe Ruth is satisfied that the New Yankee baseball club stadium holds no terrors for him. He swung his favorite out there for a few minutes yesterday, knocking several balls over the outfield stands.

He will leave today for Hot Springs, Arkansas, to take the baths before joining the club March 7, at New Orleans for the spring workout. Wally Schang, veteran catcher and all pitchers of the Yankees also will leave today for Hot Springs.

Much Mystery Surrounds the Case; Party Was Evidently a "Booze Party"

(Kinston Daily News)
Kinston, Feb. 15.—"Cleveland Waters came to his death at the hand of unknown parties" was substance of verdict of coroner's jury that probed the mysterious killing of Waters at the home of Sam Stocks, 41 years old white farmer of the Hugo, at a hearing presided over by Coroner Eugene Wood last night and attended by Ray Cox, Osble and Vaughn Justice, all three of this city, and on the scene at the Stocks home Tuesday night when the killing occurred. Ever since the murder was reported in Kinston, developments have taken a most peculiar turn. Many here, including the officers of the law, have doubts as to the alleged guilt of Stocks. Mr. Wood returned here last night.

As a result of the coroner's verdict Stocks will be allowed bond, it is believed here. Talk in the city yesterday was to the effect that the three Kinston men might know more than they had already told, that Ray Cox, in particular, seemed to have been scared and might possibly know more than what he had told. It was also stated that another party might have committed the murder and left the scene immediately. Tracks were reported as leading from the Stocks home across a newly plowed field while the bulk of the people in the Hugo section do not believe Stocks did the killing or knew anything about it, actually.

Opinion here was to the effect that all three Kinston men were guilty without a doubt, but that they might possibly know of other parties connected with the "party" which had been in full blast at the Stocks home. Whiskey was said to have played a large part in an oyster roast.

Stocks, who was sober yesterday, stated that he had been asked by Waters to "fix up some oysters for him." He had told Waters to go ahead and do it himself, as he didn't eat them and didn't know how to cook them. He further stated that he was not on the scene when the gun went off, that he had been at the barn nearby and didn't know who did the killing. He claimed total innocence. His story appeared reasonable.

Evidently, from all accounts available, the whole "works" had been pretty well drunk. A fight had been going on also, it was stated.

At the inquest, nothing further of great material bearing on the situation was brought out, other than what had already been learned. To date no one has said definitely that they saw the murder committed or that he knows who or anything definitely about who he thinks did the killing. The matter will be more fully investigated by authorities of this county in an effort to bring whoever the guilty party is to justice.

The three Kinston boys told a straight story last night at the inquest. They left here, they stated, the three of them, theoretically to collect some money, it was stated, and took part in the oyster party and so forth. They were sorry that they could not throw any further light on the affair but none of them knew anything definite and convincing.

The French have evidently come into the Ruhr Valley on strictly a business visit. Things look serious and a clash appears imminent.

Judging by the action of the Turks and the sinking of a French destroyer yesterday, it seems that the former "Sick Man of Europe" must be practicing Coupsism and is trying to prove to the world that he is getting in better and better shape every day.

If the French soldiers are entertained in the Ruhr it will be with shot and shell as the Germans societies and clubs are opposed to the German women having anything to do with them socially.

Harold F. McCormick and his bride, Miss Walska, should be splendid navigators on the sea of matrimony, as this is his third adventure and her fifth.

ANTI-RAT CAMPAIGN

War has been declared in Pitt county against a most terrible enemy—rats. It will be waged until every one of the enemies are killed, except those who are fortunate enough to escape, and an armistice will not be signed. They are a great menace and should be destroyed. Pitt county people, with the aid of the Red Cross, have undertaken this great project and it is a most commendable step. Rats cause a great deal of damage and also prove very expensive nuisance as they are no respecter of property and destroy that which happens to fall in their way. Every success is predicated for the battle which begins in March and it is an assured fact that "rat tails" will play a most important part in the life of the children during the week of the campaign.

SURRENDER THE SUBSIDY

President Harding must realize by this time that he must either accept the Democratic compromise on subsidy legislation or else sacrifice his bill entirely, so far as action at this session of Congress is concerned. There is not a chance, from all reports, that he can pass the measure in its present form.

Practically all the entire Democratic side of the Senate is opposed to the bill. A group of resourceful Republican Senators is opposing it. The support on the art of administration Senators is perfunctory, for the most part. There is no powerful public opinion on the outside to force an unwilling Congress to act. There is only the demand of the administration that the bill be brought to a vote, to keep it from being thrown into the discard.

Mr. Harding also is interested in the British debt settlement. His program to that end already has run the gauntlet of the House. It has escaped the soldier bonus amendment

in that body, and, having moved safely thus far, it would be almost a calamity if it should be wrecked in between a Senate filibuster against ship subsidies and adjournment, meeting a violent death in the jam.

There is only one possibility, it appears, that subsidy legislation may be enacted. This is, by an acceptance on the part of the administration of the Madden amendment which the House rejected. This amendment, it will be recalled, provided that Congress, each year should make a fresh appropriation out of which the subsidy might be paid. This amendment, in the judgment of the President and his advisers, would nullify the legislation. If Congress should refuse to commit itself to a permanent subsidy policy, thereby assuring shipowners that they might receive payment year after year, then shipowners would not take the government tonnage off the hands of the Shipping Board. This is the view of the board and of the shipping interests with which the board has conferred in formulating the subsidy policy.

Nor is this an unreasonable view, from the standpoint of shipping men. They will naturally expect the subsidy to continue as long as it may be required. If they are told that Congress will engage in the same fight year after year, and that no ship company will know until each successive Congress has acted whether the subsidy fund will be made available, they would run risks that few of them would be bold enough to assume.

Democratic leaders have given informal notice that they will stand aside and permit a vote on the Lusk program, provided the Madden amendment, which administration leaders killed in the House, is restored. The President's friends in the Senate have rejected this compromise and the deadlock continues hard and fast.

The President holds the whip hand in this situation. He may keep his bill before the Senate even if he can-

not force it to a vote. But in the effort to drive it through he may sacrifice all other pending legislation and permit an adjournment with nothing accomplished either on the side of subsidies or the British debt—Richmond Times Dispatch.

SQUEAKY CLARINET SOUGHT BY POLICE

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 15.—How any man could harbor sufficient regard for clarinet music to steal an instrument that could be guilty of turning out whines and squeaks, such as those of which this instrument is sometimes guilty, is a question that is puzzling local police.

C. J. Cochran, 18, is being held by the authorities on suspicion of having been connected with the alleged disappearance of a \$75 clarinet, the property of R. F. Chestnut. Cochran denies any connection with the disappearance of the clarinet, but the fact remains that Chestnut gave a very close description of

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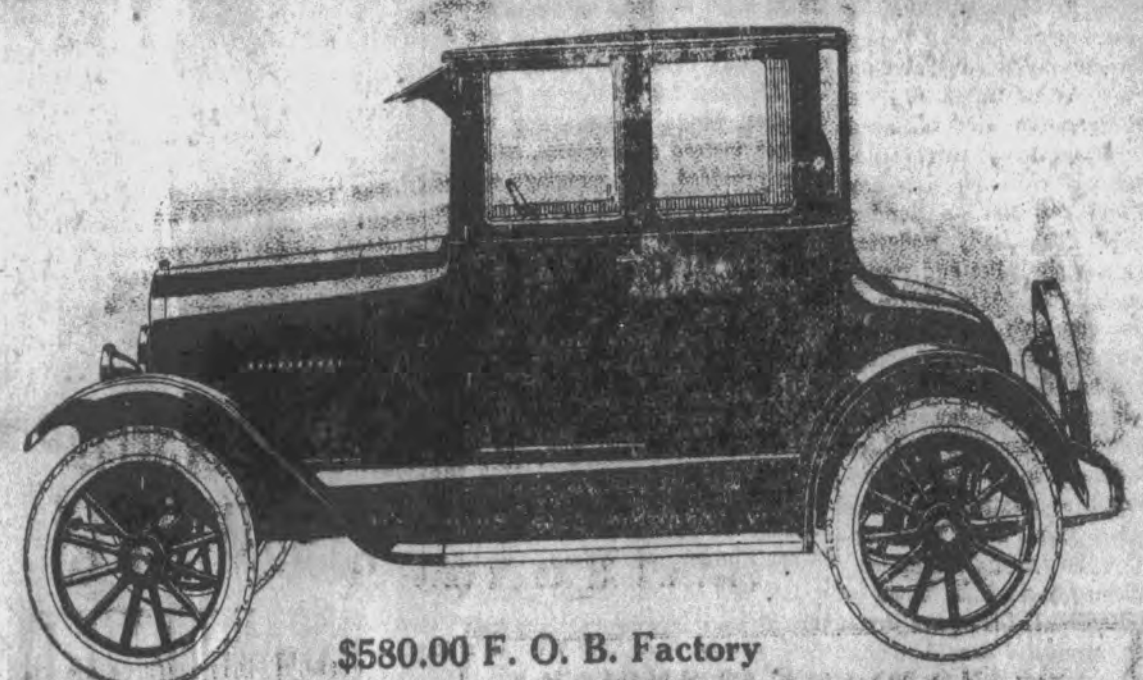

PROSPERITY FOLLOWS TICK ERADICATION IN OKLAHOMA SAYS AGRICULTURAL WORKER

(Auspices Chamber of Commerce.)

At the annual meeting of the Southern Agricultural Workers of Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 6 to 8, some of the good results that have followed the eradication of the cattle tick in the State of Oklahoma, were told by Dr. L. J. Allen, inspector in charge of the tick eradication work of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of Agriculture, in that State.

Dr. Allen stated that some of the finest pure bred herds in the world are now to be found in Oklahoma in the area where but a few years ago there were only scrubs shingled over with ticks.

In the freed area of Oklahoma there have been established 8 creameries, 7 pasteurization plants, 16 combination plants, 4 ice-cream factories, 374 cream stations. In this same area there are 155 beef and dairy herds on the accredited tuberculosis free list and 278 more herds are in the process of becoming accredited. In the more than the 5000 square miles in the State still under Federal Quarantine there is but one cream station and a total of only six herds under the process of accreditation, and they are as a result of the tick eradication work in progress.

Dr. Allen also pointed out that the fever tick is one of America's insect pests against which substantial eradication progress has been made.
