OPponents MAKING EFFORTS TO KILL THE SHIPPING SUBSIDY

MUCH INTEREST IS MANIFESTED IN THE QUEEN'S CONTEST

Efforts to Kill Bill Through Filibuster Already Begun in Senate

Misses Hannah Dixon, Helen Joyner and Lillian Hooker Are Three Leading Now

Washington, Feb. 19.—Efforts of opponents of the administration shipping bill to kill it through a filibuster were actively begun tonight in the Senate and brought on Senator Jones, Republican, Washington, in charge of the measure, a notice that he would endeavor to hold the Senate in session all night tomorrow night.

Since the opening of the "Queen Contest" last Friday there have been over twenty nominations and around three hundred votes cast. According to the count at noon yesterday Miss Hannah Dixon was in the lead with Miss Helen Joyner, second and Miss Lillian Hooker third. The purpose of this contest is to select one of Greenville's most beautiful women to represent this city at the Eastern Carolina Exposition in Wilson to compete with the beauties from other cities in this part of the state. The winner in Wilson will be crowned queen of the exposition and presented with a \$500 diamond ring.

The filibuster as started tonight—and ship bill opponents made no effort to have it described as other than a filibuster—took the form of an address of three hours and a half by Senator Sheppard, Democrat, Texas, on the operations of the League of Nations since its organization. The Texas Senator still was going strong when Senator Curtis, of Kansas, the Republican whip, shortly after 10 o'clock moved that the Senate go into executive session. This was followed by a recess until 11 o'clock tomorrow, when ship bill opponents promise to resume their tactics.

Every man, woman and child in Greenville is entitled to cast one vote for their favorite. Nominations will be open until Saturday night after which time votes will be accepted only for those nominated. The final voting will close Thursday night March 8 and the names of the three leading candidates will be turned over to a committee composed of one representative from each civic organization in this city and this committee will select one of the three to be Miss Greenville at the exposition. The successful candidate will have all her expenses paid to Wilson and return and a committee will be appointed to see that her visit to the exposition is a pleasant and happy one.

Senator Sheppard began speaking before seven o'clock making a prepared address containing a digest of every action taken by the League of Nations through its assembly, its Council and its various commissions since it began functioning. He made no announcement at the outset of his address as to the length of time he was prepared to speak, but some of his associates said he had a seven-hour speech.

The following is the standing of the contestants at noon yesterday:

The Democratic Senators who joined with Republican opponents of the shipping bill in the filibuster did so over the wishes of Senator Underwood, of Alabama, the retiring Democratic leader. Senator Underwood earlier in the session had advised against killing the shipping bill through indirect action, declaring he favored allowing it to come to a vote, ever though he was opposed to it.

After the tactics of ship bill opponents had become apparent and after Senator Jones had made his announcement of an all-night session tomorrow, Senator Curtis told many Republican proponents to go home and get plenty of sleep in preparation for tomorrow night's session. He said that cots and blankets would be brought in so that Senators might be as comfortable as possible.

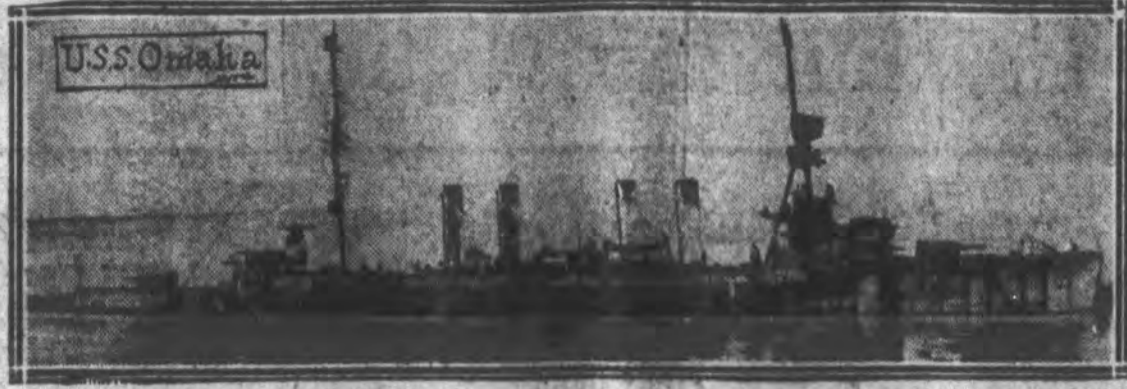
GERMANY TURNING TO AMERICA FOR FOOD

LLOYD GEORGE SAYS AMERICA NEEDED IN SOLUTION PROBLEM

Entreats the Government to Take Initiative by Approaching the United States

London, Feb. 19.—Former Prime Minister Lloyd George during debate in the House of Commons today, declared the French action in the Ruhr was a repetition of the psychological blunder the Germans made in 1914. He asserted it was essential that America should participate in the solution. Mr. Lloyd George contended that what really mattered was to get America in, with or without League of Nations action. He did not believe that France, however obsessed, could refuse an offer made by the two greatest powers on earth that had saved her from being in the position Germany was occupying today. "I entreat the government," concluded Mr. Lloyd George, "to take the initiative first by approaching the United States and then with them approaching France. Then I believe, both together will be able to surmount the difficulty. In the course of his speech the former Prime Minister said it was impossible for the reparations and restoration program to succeed without America. The Americans, he commented, had the world's gold locked in their chests and were suffering from indigestion and surfeit. They had a moral responsibility, he contended. They had shamed in the war, and helped to break up Germany. Their President had signed the peace treaty, and although the Senate had rejected it, that action was not on the ground of reparations, but because it was unable to accept the League of Nations. The Americans had morally accepted the whole position, he argued.

MR. H. E. AUSTIN SPEAKS TO COLLEGE GIRLS ON SUNDAY

Speaks on How to Bring Out the Best in a Life or in a People

Mr. Austin gave to the students a very helpful talk Sunday evening. The speaker selected what is to him one of the most wonderful chapters in the Bible, the 11th chapter of Hebrews which emphasizes the need of faith. He talked from the subject, "How to bring out the best in a life or in a people." His topic was developed in a very pleasing manner and was exceedingly appropriate for the occasion. Mr. Austin described this period as a time of doubt. He stated that whatever builds up our faith leads to development and whatever tends to destroy our faith leads to barbarism. We should have faith in our teachers, institutions, the ideals of our fathers mothers, and by all means have faith in ourselves. The critical attitude of the present day is a serious one for destructive criticism and the spirit that animates it do not make for progress. In other words if we lose faith, we lose prosperity. As illustrations of this, he spoke of the Pilgrims, Lincoln, and Washington. She speaks frankly stated that it was time for us to turn our eyes not to the weakness of our companions but to the strength. We should turn our attention from those who criticize to those whom we can trust, and dwell on perfection rather than imperfection. We should look at the advantages we have instead of the disadvantages. Our faith in the homely simple things of life and virtues around the American people should be renewed. The questions were asked, "What brings out the best in you? Is it criticism or is it faith and the knowledge that someone cares and is looking for the good in you?" The last suggestion was, "Let that faith be the clarion call that will stimulate you to do your best." The special music for the evening was a selection by the choir and a vocal duet by Hazel Kennedy and Lucretia Tuttle.

Now that the contest is well under way and Greenville is really to have a queen at the Eastern Carolina Exposition let us all begin to make our arrangements to be on hand at the exposition and see that MISS GREENVILLE gets the diamond ring.

It is a strange, not knowing in what corner of the country he was, had visited the court room yesterday morning he would have, in all probability, thought that he was in Reno. Five divorces granted while you wait, certainly exceeded the speed limit.

Money is certainly the root of all evil. Distance lends enchantment. Evidently North Carolina feels that way about Nevada. As it is trying to imitate her as near as possible when it comes to the divorce question. Although the ship subsidy bill is back on the calendar, judging from the predictions which it has received it certainly must bear scars. It has been going down hill at such a rapid rate of speed that it finds itself today almost where it was when it started in December. The poor thing has had to give away to the farm credit bill, it was knocked out by the unfinished business before the senate, and related to the calendar by the British leading debt bill. It is a pity for the president to see his pet hobby going backward instead of forward. If he had only given all this valuable time to the great issue, world peace, he would certainly have been happier and has made millions of people happier. The world is craving peace as never before and some power must see the light and help find the world out of this great and horrible tragedy.

However, the president is determined to get to the end in getting the bill through.

AUTOMOBILE DRIVING

It is to be hoped that congress will see fit to enact legislation adopting a uniform code of traffic signals to be used by automobile drivers in every state in the Union. As it now stands there are many different systems in use and failure to readily grasp what the other fellow means by his signaling is the cause of many accidents today.

If all drivers were to use the same set of signals misunderstandings would be minimized. A standardized hand signal system of some sort merits serious consideration by those who have charge of the uniform traffic code proposal.

The California system which seems to be one of the best, owing to its simplicity and the effectiveness with which it has been used in that state may be described, as follows:

- 1-When signaling from the right side: (a) For a right turn, signal right hand horizontally with index finger pointing right. (b) For a left turn, bend right arm at right angle, pointing straight up with lower arm and index finger. (c) For slow down or stop signal, let right arm drop toward running board with index finger pointing toward ground. 2-When signaling from left side of car: (a) For right turn, bend left arm at right angle, pointing straight up with lower arm and index finger. (b) For left turn, extend left arm horizontally with index finger pointing straight left. (c) For slow down or stop signal,

let left arm drop toward running board, with index finger pointing to ground.

The signals from the right hand side of the car will seldom be used because nearly all modern cars are left drive.

These signals are simple and employ natural movements and positions of the arm. There are only three and these may be made to serve all purposes. For example the stop signal, combined with proper care, will enable a driver to back up in safety.

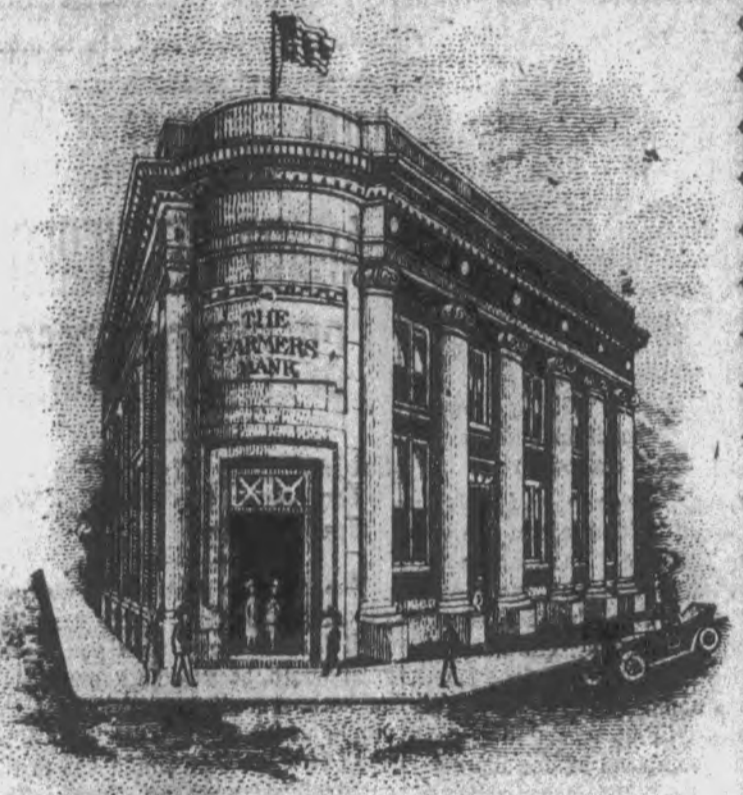
JUDGE GRADY'S RETURN

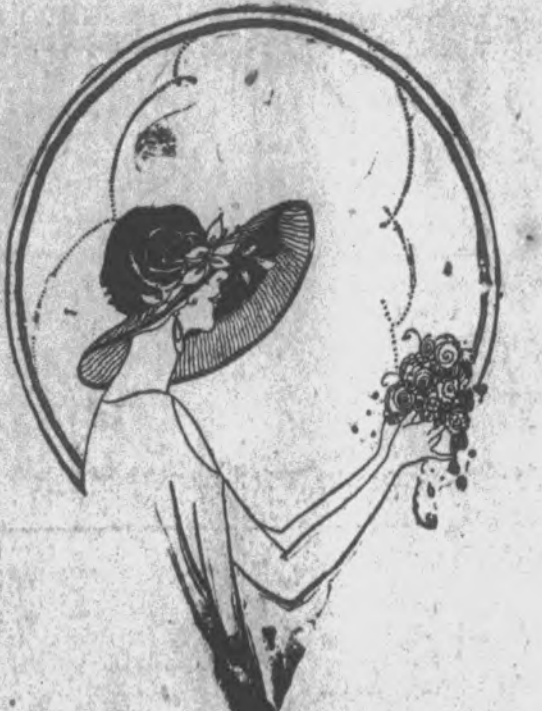

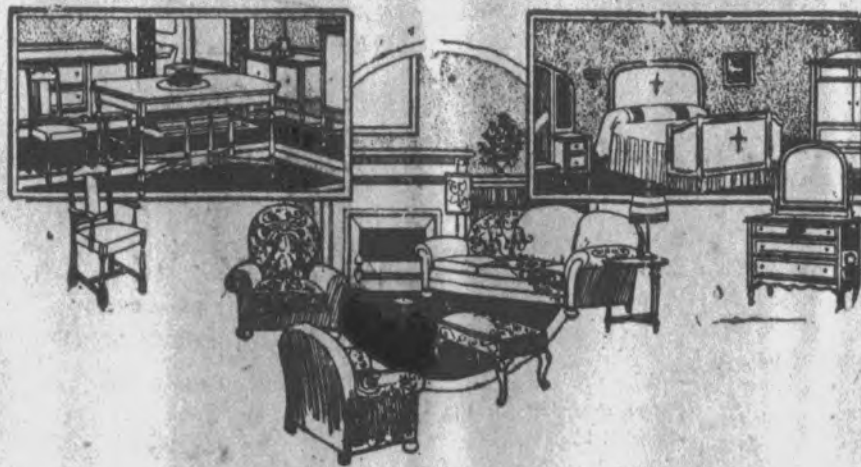
