AUTOMOBILE KILLS 2 WOMEN AND ONE MAN AS THEY ALIGHT FROM TROLLEY

Philadelphia, March 2.—(By Associated Press.)—Two women and one man were killed by an automobile as they alighted from a trolley. The driver increased his speed and rushed away as his victims were hurled fifty feet. Henry G. Brock, banker and clubman was later arrested when found four blocks away standing beside the blood-spattered motor car which was wrecked against a pole. A fur neck piece worn by one of the women was found on the car. Brock was charged with reckless driving, but insisted that he was not guilty of the accident.

KLAN VICTORIOUS IN UNMASKING FIGHT IN SENATE

Milliken Bill Which Passed the House Was Defeated in the Senate by Vote of 36 to 11

The Ku Klux Klan, defeated in its opposition to unmasking legislation in the House emerging victorious in the Senate yesterday. Following an impassioned appeal by Senator Johnson, of Duplin, in behalf of "twenty-five thousand red blooded North Carolinians who are members of the Ku Klux Klan," the Senate passed an anti-unmasking bill that has been officially endorsed by members of the Klan, refusing by a record vote of 36 to 12 to accept the Milliken bill, which passed the House over the protest of the "Invisible Empire."

The issue was drawn in no unmistakable terms by both sides in the Senate yesterday. Senators Long and Sams, who led the forlorn fight for the Milliken bill pointed out that the lateness of his session made it necessary to accept that bill or nothing and stated that the one and only issue involved is whether an organization which conceals the identity of its members and operates in masks and hoods shall be allowed to exist in North Carolina.

Sensors Armfield and Johnson, of Duplin, were equally clear in their statements.

"We will stand until the last vote against legislation that will require members of these organizations to register their names," declared Senator Armfield.

"Invisibility is the force of the Empire," declared Senator Johnson, in the course of his extended speech. At the beginning of the session, anti-Ku Klux Klan legislation was proposed in each branch of the General Assembly. Senator Baggett introducing a bill making it a misdemeanor to appear in public disguised while Representative Milliken offered a bill requiring registration of members of all secret organizations.

After a turbulent career in the House, the Milliken bill was finally passed by the House, after the provisions of the Baggett bill had been added and the measure restricted so as to apply only to organizations which keep their membership secret.

All secret organization legislation was referred by the Senate to a special committee composed of Senators Varser, chairman; Armfield Baggett, Hicks, Walker, Harrison, Heath, Johnson of Duplin; Hargett and Tapp.

This committee reported out the Armfield substitute, with Senator Heath casting the only dissenting vote. Yesterday, Senator Baggett joined the proponents of the Milliken bill, but the rest of the committee stood firm and carried the bulk of the Senate with them.

WASHINGTON PLANS WOMAN'S CLUB FOR CEREMONIAL TO BE HELD NEXT MAY

Display of Fireworks Will be Put on From Large Floats Anchored in Mid Stream

Washington, N. C., March 2.—Preparations for the big Shrine Ceremonial of Sudan Temple to be held here on May 17th next, are going ahead with the greatest amount of enthusiasm among the committees in charge of the work of entertaining the visitors. In addition to the Ceremonial to be staged in the afternoon, water events including a special boat trip for the visiting ladies, will be one of the attractions. The committee will serve luncheon to the ladies during the trip and a splendid orchestra will provide music which will help to make this feature of the day's entertainment a pleasant event for the fair sex. Other boat trips are being arranged for the Shriners who desire to see the beautiful Pamlico river. In the evening a grand spectacular display of fireworks will be put on from large floats anchored in mid-stream. We are told that this latter event will be the best of its kind ever attempted in North Carolina.

EVERETT WITHDRAWS BILL FOR EXTENSION CORPORATE LIMITS

On Account of Some Opposition Mayor Clark Requests Senator to Withdraw Bill

Mayor Clark, who on Wednesday of this week, went to Raleigh for the purpose of petitioning the legislature to extend the corporate limits of the city of Greenville, wired The Reflector today as follows:

"In view of development of some opposition by Greenville citizens to extension of corporate limits and amendments of charter, I have requested Senator Everett to withdraw bill as it is a matter on which opposition should be heard and time is too short to permit this. We did not think anyone opposed."

The measure as presented besides being for the extension of the corporate limits of Greenville included amendments giving power of recorder to the mayor and asking for minor changes in the city primaries and elections.

SIX MEMBERS OF KLAN SERVE ON FEDERAL GRAND JURY

(By Associated Press.) Houston, Tex., March 2.—Six members of the Ku Klux Klan are serving on the federal grand jury which vindicated E. Y. Clark, former acting Imperial Wizard of the Klan, on the charge of violating the Mann act. Prior to the swearing of the jury Judge Hutcheson questioned each man as to his possible connection with the Klan and the six said that they were Klansmen but denied that such membership would affect their judgment in the cases where evidence of guilt was presented.

PRESIDENT HARDING MAKES THREE APPOINTMENTS



President Harding has nominated Postmaster General Hubert Work, of Colorado, to be Secretary of the Interior, succeeding Secretary Albert B. Fall, who resigned. To succeed Mr. Work in the post office post he has named ex-United States Senator Harry S. New, defeated by Alfred J. Beveridge, in Indiana. At the same time Mr. Harding appointed Brigadier-General Frank T. Hines, of Salt Lake City, Utah, to be Director of the United States Veterans' Bureau, succeeding Colonel Charles R. Forbes, who resigned. General Hines was former chief of transportation of the A. E. F., in France.

W. BURKE COCHRAN HOUSE'S GREATEST ORATOR IS DEAD

Dies Suddenly Following an Old-Fashioned Birthday Party; Was Remarkable Man

Washington, March 1.—Death today stilled the voice of W. Bourke Cochran, conceded one of the most eloquent orators who ever spoke from the floor of congress.

The famous speaker, a Democratic Representative from New York, who had matched his powers with many of the greatest of his time, died at 7:10 o'clock this morning from a stroke of apoplexy. Last night he delivered a vigorous denunciation of the farm credits legislation pending in the House and later he celebrated his 69th anniversary with an old-fashioned birthday party.

Apparently in the best of health, Mr. Cochran entered into the spirit of the occasion with all his heart. He repeatedly remarked to those about him that he "never had felt better." After his guests had departed and while he was chatting with Mrs. Cochran, he was stricken with a headache and soon lapsed into unconsciousness. Last rites of the Roman Catholic church were administered shortly before he died.

News of Mr. Cochran's death stunned his colleagues in congress, and throughout the day at the Capitol, wherever groups of men gathered, stories were told of his remarkable facility of expression.

There were many high lights in the life of Mr. Cochran, but those which have stood out in great relief were his oratorical efforts at Democratic national conventions. And of those perhaps the one most remembered by the present generation was the crossing of swords with William J. Bryan at the 1920 party gathering in San Francisco. There he met the "Commoner" himself and made himself famous by a convention speech in a memorable battle over the proposal to put a dry plank in the platform.

Mr. Cochran placed in nomination for President Governor Alfred E. Smith, of New York, and when he concluded he received one of the most remarkable ovations in American political history.

With his massive head covered with snow white hair, Mr. Cochran was a picturesque figure. And with the powers of argument and wonder which he possessed, he was well-nigh invincible in debate. Recently, however, he took little part in the running exchanges on the floor

CITY FATHERS IN REGULAR MONTHLY MEET LAST NIGHT

Ordinance Passed Regarding Parking of Automobiles in Business Section

The Board of Aldermen met on March 1st in its regular monthly session with mayor protem C. W. Hearne, presiding.

Several petitions were presented asking for paved streets. These were ordered filed and were recorded. Also more sewer extensions were considered.

An ordinance was passed requiring all automobiles to park, straight on east side of Evans street, between Second and Third streets, during the month of March. Beginning on April the first all automobiles are to be shifted to the west side of Evans street: from Five Points to Second street and shift side. On the first day of each month thereafter. On April the first cars parked on Fifth street between Five Points and Washington streets are to be shifted and parked straight into curb. For the month of April they will be parked on the north side and shift on the first day of each month.

The ordinance committee was instructed to look into the matter for a one side parking ordinance on Third street between Evans and Washington.

At the request of Alderman Hall the board donated \$25 to the anti-rat campaign for the elimination of rats in Greenville and vicinity.

After the reading of the officers reports and regular routine business had been disposed of the meeting adjourned.

GOV MORRISON'S PROGRAM ENACTED OR BEING TAKEN UP

Indications Point to Enactment of Proposal to Provide \$500,000 to Improve N. C.

Raleigh, N. C., March 1.—With the North Carolina General Assembly now in the closing days of the present session, the major part of Governor Cameron Morrison's legislative program, with changes affected in some instances, either has been enacted or is up for consideration.

By far the most important section of the governor's recommendations, in his opinion, was his advocacy of a state owned shipping line, to be established through an appropriation of \$2,000,000. In his message, he declared that "our freight rates, are nearly all based on rates to the Virginia cities plus the rates from the Virginia cities to our towns. He added that there are no basic freight joints in North Carolina and that the state always would be discriminated against until water transportation was established.

After a brisk and heated battle before a committee, especially appointed to consider the proposal, the governor reached a compromise with his opponents. Instead of a ship and port commission being created, as he had recommended, a board of nine members was established and given \$25,000 with which to investigate the proposition and to report to the next session of the assembly.

Opponents to this part of the governor's program took the position that the chief executive in urging immediate establishment of the board time was proceeding too rapidly, without proper consideration and that passage of the measure would result in a reduction in freight rates in this state.

With very little opposition being voiced in either house, the \$15,000,000 highway bond measure, advocated by the chief executive and others to continue the extensive road construction program of the state was passed. Through the use of these funds, the highway department expects to complete the larger part of its chain of improved roads, after which North Carolina, it is stated, will have one of the best highway systems in the country.

The governor's suggestion that the state's indebtedness be limited to 5 percent of the assessed value of North Carolina's property also has been passed in the form of a constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters at the next general election. His recommendation that sinking funds be created to retire the state's indebtedness was accepted but several changes were made.

Governor Morrison asserted that a bond issue of \$6,700,000 would enable particular the institutions for defective and for higher education to promote their programs, and for the retirement of this particular indebtedness, he urged a sinking fund of \$62,599 annually, which the sum of \$125,198 annually he asserted, would redeem both new and old issues for the institutions. An appropriation of \$500,000 a year to retire \$85,300,000 in highway bonds, was urged by the governor.

The Varser measure which was passed, provided \$100,000 annually as a sinking fund for \$19,500,000 highway bonds already issued and \$400,000 a year for road bonds to be issued while \$40,000 annually was to be annual sum for educational and charitable institutions' bonds.

Observers express the opinion that the governor's proposal for a state department of commerce and industry was placed before the assembly in the form of a bill too late to receive consideration at this session. His suggestion that a department of banking with a commissioner at its head has not been introduced. Indications are that his proposal to provide \$500,000 to improve North Carolina fisheries will be enacted.

POULTRY MEETING LARGELY ATTENDED IN CITY YESTERDAY

Takes Important Steps Which Will Prove of Value in the Developing of Industry

A very interesting session of the Pitt County County Poultry Association was the regular monthly meeting in the Chamber of Commerce room: on yesterday afternoon.

It was decided to make the Southern Poultry Journal, which is published at Montgomery, Ala., the official organ of the Association. Dr. Kaupp of the North Carolina State College of Agriculture, and an experienced poultryman, is an associate editor of the Journal.

In order that the poultry development in Pitt county may assume the proportions that many say it must, a very important decision was reached by yesterday's meeting. It was decided to work through the boys and girls clubs by leading setting of standardized eggs to those willing same, with the understanding that a certain number of eggs be returned at a given period of the year after which the eggs would go to some other boy or girl. The association feels that this will be one of the very best pieces of work it can undertake and will prove of great value in developing the poultry industry in Pitt county.

W. B. Pace, county agent, said he would have 45 eggs from single comb Rhode Island Reds that he would be glad to furnish on the above basis; J. J. Jenkins said he could furnish 60 single comb Rhode Island Red and 45 barred Plymouth rocks; J. B. Tucker said he could supply 100 single comb white leghorns; W. C. Vincent said he could furnish 30 Rose comb Rhode Island Reds, there all to be in readiness during the month of March.

No doubt there are other members of the association who could and who would be glad to furnish eggs to the boys and girls on a similar basis. Every one who would like to have a part in this work is cordially requested to confer with county agent W. B. Pace, stating to him the number, breed and time of delivery.

Any boy or girl of the county who would like to do real club work and to have eggs on the plan above described, are asked to write county agent, W. B. Pace who will be glad to take this up with the interested parties at once.

In an added incentive to make the boys and girls put forth the very best effort possible, it was decided that the association would offer several prizes in connection with the Pitt county fair this fall—these prizes to be in addition to the general prizes offered annually. No doubt there will be a large number to compete for first places in this feature of the work.

LOCAL CITIZENS ATTEND BOLL WEEVIL MEETING FLORENCE

Secured First Hand Information Relative to Producing Cotton Now

On February 15th a delegation of twenty-six bankers, merchants and farmers of Kinston, Greenville and other nearby points went to Florence, S. C., for purpose of securing first-hand information relative to producing cotton under boll weevil conditions. Upon our arrival at Florence on Monday morning we were taken charge of by the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce at that city and taken to the director's room of one of their banks, at which time was a gathering of local bankers, merchants, farmers, county agricultural agent and others who had dressed up on this important subject. They were all thoroughly familiar with the matter, and many had dropped from a week of forty-day hounded boll weevils to five or six and back to 100%. They advised us as based upon their experience in sheet was as follows:

They advised that all dirt, weeds and hedge rows be thoroughly tumbled and burned.

That the land to be planted in cotton be thoroughly and tilled and well prepared before planting.

Early varieties of cotton seed such as Cleveland Big Boll, Wampanoag, etc., be used for planting seed.

They advised heavy fertilization at time of planting and that fertilizer used to contain at least 10 per cent phosphoric acid, with the recommendation that no side dressing be done.

They also recommend that when the bud begins to appear in the top of the little stalk, which later forms a square, that an application of

arsenate be made, either wet or dry. One of our delegates asked the speaker about some of the advertised mixtures. His reply was that they had been right extensively used in that section, and saying further the same poisoning could be produced right on the farm by mixing one gallon of cheap molasses and one gallon of water with one pound of calcium of arsenate at about one-third the cost to the price asked for patented preparations. This opinion was confirmed subsequently by quite a number of farmers. They advise that three or four applications be made during the growth of the crop. They also advise that squares that have fallen off be gathered up at least once a week and taken out to the ends of the rows and burned. Intensive cultivation, that is plowing at least twice a week is also strongly recommended. We were advised to confine our

increase to from three to five acres to the one-acre crop, depending upon the size of the family, or number of laborers, so that the above program can be thoroughly carried out. We were told that after all of these things have been done, and we would be favored with a normal season, that we should be able to make a good crop of cotton, but on the contrary, if we should have an excessively wet spring and summer, we would be liable to suffer some loss any way, as excess rains are always conducive to the progress of the boll weevil. We would, therefore, recommend that none of us permit ourselves to feel that there is any known remedy for poisoning boll weevils that will insure us to make a crop a wet year, but we do feel that if the above program is carried out that we stand a chance to make a fair crop of cotton this year.

EGG FLAVOR DEPENDS ON FEEDS GIVEN HEN

Fowls Forced to Forage Eat Foods That Taint the Eggs They Lay

By SETH W. SHOEMAKER, Director, The School of Agriculture, International Correspondence Schools, Scranton, Pa.

Most people believe that if an egg is reasonably fresh it will be perfectly satisfactory. Although freshness is a cardinal virtue in an egg, the quality of taste is almost equally important.

Fowls that are fed upon clean, wholesome food will seldom lay ill-flavored eggs.

Eggs from hens that are compelled

to forage over the farm and are supplied with very little grain are likely to be flat in flavor, except during the time of year when there is an abundance of green stuff. It is different when hens are kept in yards and have their feed supplied to them.

Eggs become tainted when hens get their feed from manure heaps, or their drinking water from cow yards. Odors and flavors in an egg may even be caused by dirt that has gotten on the shell. For this reason, cleanliness in the nest and houses is essential.

Flavoring comes from feeds that contain volatile oils such as onions, garlic, leeks, turnips, rape, etc. Onions, for instance, are a healthful feed for fowls, but if fed regularly and in large quantities they give the eggs an onion flavor.

Prime, clean food and an abundance of pure, fresh water will almost always insure eggs of good flavor, if the fowls are healthy.

TELEGRAPH DEVICE IMPROVES SERVICE

(By International News.) Berlin, Jan.—A long stride in improving European international communications, which the war so fundamentally disturbed, has been made, according to experts by the installation of the new Siemens automatic telegraph machine in the Berlin and respect wireless stations, for service between the two cities. The Siemens instrument operates at normal speed of approximately 40 words a minute, whereas the manual sending in the United States, where the art of telegraphy has been brought to its highest point, is said to average only 30 words a minute on the fastest wires.
