WOMAN DIES FROM WOUND INFLICTED BY AN ORPHAN BOY

Hilton Seares Flees After Shooting Mrs. D. E. Purcell Who Adopted Him

Reidsville, March 9.—Wounds inflicted by Hilton Seares, an orphan adopted in the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. Ernest Purcell of near here, proved fatal to Mrs. Purcell, who died in a Greensboro hospital shortly before 2 o'clock this morning. Mrs. Purcell was shot three times by Seares when she refused to open a safe in her home Tuesday morning.

Young Seares made good his escape and despite the most diligent search by officers of Rockingham and other counties he has not been captured.

Shortly after being wounded Mrs. Purcell was taken to a hospital in Greensboro where for over two days she waged a valiant though futile fight against death.

Three shot and seriously wounded she had from the beginning been weakening in her unequal struggle against death.

Last night hospital attendants describing her condition as "very serious," said the patient showed "no improvement." About midnight all hope of life was despaired of and two hours later she died.

Mrs. Purcell's body was taken to a Greensboro funeral parlor and from there the funeral party left at noon for the Purcell home. Funeral and burial services will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from Fair View church, near Brown Summit, by Rev. Marion S. Huske, assisted by Dr. D. I. Craig, of Reidsville, and Rev. R. Murphy Williams of Greensboro.

CAPPER REVIEWS ACTS OF CONGRESS AFFECTING FARMERS

Declared That There is No Quick and Sure Cure for Troubles of the Farmer

Washington, March 9.—Reviewing acts of the last congress affecting agriculture and forecasting probable legislation in the next congress, Senator Capper, Republican, Kansas, chairman of the Senate "farm bloc," in a statement today declared "there is no quick and sure cure for the troubles of the farmer." Legislation cannot increase the price of farm products, he said, but laws which the 67th congress enacted, in his opinion will be of material assistance to agricultural interests. Congress erred, Senator Capper contended, in failing to accept Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals.

"The country should have the benefit of the peace time operation of this huge enterprise," he said. "Experience has proved that government operations adds heavily to the people's tax burdens. Ford's offer, in my judgment, was fair and should have been accepted. This question must be decided by the next congress."

Declaring the biggest problem before congress was that relating to transportation, the Kansas Senator asserted that "freight rates are too high and must come down."

The 67th congress started agriculture on its way to a lasting prosperity, Senator Capper declared, listing as "farm bloc measures" which it placed on the statute books the cooperative marketing act, the anti-grain gambling act, the packers and stockyards act, the emergency tariff, the act giving farmers representation of the Federal Board, the filled milk measure, the act extending to agriculture aid from the War Finance Corporation and the farm credits act.

The placing of a "dirt farmer" stated, will "insure the American on the Federal Reserve Board, the farmer against ruinous discrimination."

MANY FEATURES ON PROGRAM OF LOCAL CLUB LAST NIGHT

Kiwanians in Regular Session Have Interesting Program That Pleased

PLANS BEING PRESENTED FOR CLUB ATTENDANCE AT ATLANTIC CONFAB

Will Furnish Morning Program for County Commencement Here April 2

The Kiwanis Club met last night in regular session with President Fitzgerald in the executive chair. A good percentage of the membership was present, and a large number of friends were guests of the club. After the usual preliminaries including the reading and approval of minutes of last meeting, Kiwanian C. W. Harvey who was in charge of the principal features of the evening's program was presented.

This part of the entertainment was well planned and proved interesting throughout. At request of Mr. Harvey, Kiwanian M. K. Blount introduced a local orchestra which featured with the rendition of several interesting and beautiful musical numbers. Those composing the musical organization were Mrs. M. K. Blount, Miss Hennie Long, Miss Veneta Bruce, Miss Eleanor Bass and Mr. Charlie White. An instrumental duet by Charlie Forbes and Victor Davis was well received as was manifested by the prolonged applause.

Upon resuming the chair, President Fitzgerald brought to the attention of the club many important matters. First of these was to ascertain the pleasure of the members in reference to the International Convention which convenes in Atlanta, Ga., the latter part of May. The matter was turned over to Kiwanian H. A. White as chairman of the public affairs committee. The president made strong appeal for a large attendance in the southern city.

The attention of the club was called to the County Commencement which will be staged at the Teachers College on Easter Monday, April 2. The morning program which consists almost entirely of treats of a literary nature will be in charge of the Kiwanians, and every member was urged to lend his moral support to the end, that the boys and girls of the county for whom the event was first inaugurated, may receive a great benefit. IMPORTANT TAX IN RUHR IS HURTING AMERICAN FIRMS

Berlin and Paris Embassies Forwarding to Washington Complaints From Americans

Berlin, March 9.—(By Associated Press.)—American commercial (toe) are being trampled on rather freely in the Ruhr occupation and the Berlin and Paris embassies, it is learned, are busy forwarding to Washington complaints from American concerns whose goods are tied up by the export tax the French have imposed, and by the upset in the transportation situation.

Up to date the Washington government has not announced any the American exporters are at sea in the confusion and disorder which has swept over the Ruhr and much of the adjoining industrial territory engulfed in the transportation disorganization. The British, Dutch and Swiss exporters are in the same plight as the Americans and promises by the French that their claims will be investigated offer slight comfort to buyers of reasonable goods which they fear may be indefinitely delayed.

Potash shipments for America have not been affected. Dye stuffs, silks, chemicals, machinery, gloves and manufactured cotton and woolen articles make up most of the delayed shipments. Even goods which were contracted and paid for before the French occupied the Ruhr are being held, it is stated, although in each case the announcement is made that the case will be investigated on its merits and the interests of the American buyers protected. The German manufacturers say they dare not speed the shipments by paying the taxes demanded by the French, as in that case the German government would punish them for treason.

Concerns at Crefeld, the German silk center, have many contracts with Americans for silks, velvets and other specialties which are tied up. At least 40 per cent of Germany's dye-stuffs factories are within the area the French now are holding. The German plants of the International Harvester Company and the National Radiator Company at Neuss are both within the French lines, their operations greatly hindered by the Ruhr occupation.

PASSENGERS ON SUBWAY OVERCOME MY ETHER WHICH ESCAPED FROM A CAR

New York, March 10.—(By Associated Press.)—Sixty passengers on a subway train was overcome by ether escaping from a car carried by Richard Charnorro, a young South American who told the police that he was taking it home for a cold. When the train pulled into the station practically every passenger in one car was snoring and some women hysterical. Two passengers were removed to a hospital. Charnorro was arrested.

CONDITION SAMUEL GOMPERS REPORTED IMPROVED TODAY

New York, March 10.—(By Associated Press.)—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor is seriously ill at Lenox hospital of influenza, is resting more comfortable today and the physician said that if his condition shows the some steady improvement during the next twenty-four hours that it has during the twelve hours past he will be able to announce the patient out of danger. The labor leader was suffering with bronchitis when taken to the hospital several days ago and for the time was threatened with pneumonia.

SMITHFIELD HIGH WINS BASKET BALL HONORS OF EAST

Having Defeated New Bern, Johnston County Boys Will Play Asheville for Title

Chapel Hill, March 9.—By the display of the superior staying powers, the Smithfield High School basketball team tonight wrestled the Eastern High School Championship from the New Bern Bears to the tune of 31 to 22. Tonight's winner will play Asheville, the western title holder, for the State honors in the Bynum Gymnasium here tomorrow night.

In the opening minutes of the second half, Smithfield completely swamped the New Bern team and the Johnston county basketball team gained an advantage that assured them of easy victory.

However, the first half of the game and the closing minutes were packed full of thrills. At no time during the first half was either team able to gain an advantage of more than three points and the lead constantly alternated from the time that Smithfield began the scoring with a foul goal for one point and New Bern followed closely with two points from the floor.

Smithfield began the second half with a slender lead of 11 points to ten but the clever work of Holland and Stephenson, who passed, dribbled and shot with deadly accuracy, caused the Johnstons to forgo to the front for a lead that could not be overcome. Now Bern rallied at the close of the game with three field goals in rapid succession which brought the spectators to their feet, but the damage had been done.

"This job isn't worth a carfare," the porter replied.

It turned out to be literally true. It cost him fifteen thousand marks a month to go to and from his work on the street cars the hotel paid him ten thousand marks.

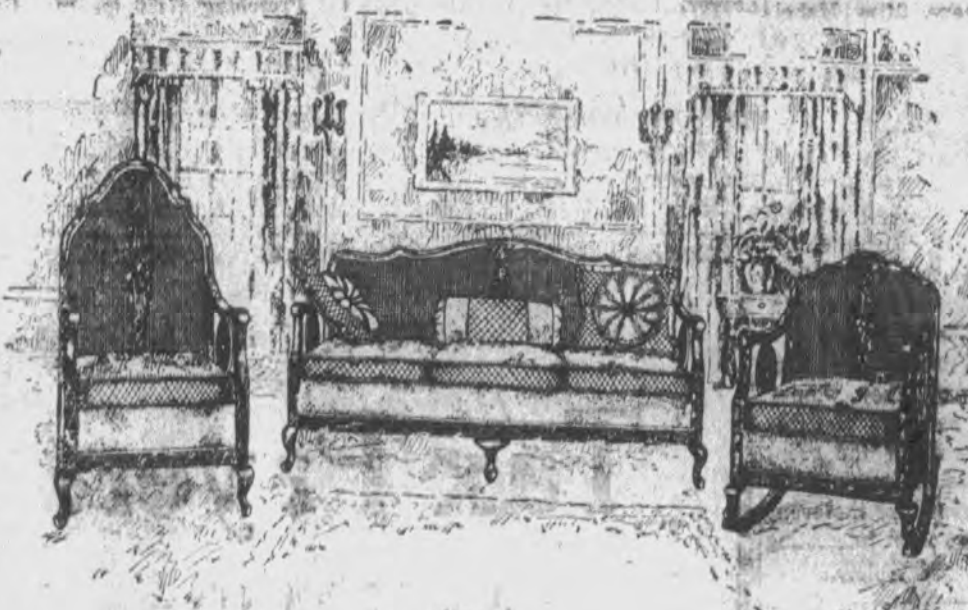

MUSSOLINI CALLS HIMSELF A DAREDEVIL

Rome, March 1.—(By Associated Press.)—"The Fascist government needs 200,000 muskets to keep all the rascals in their places," said Premier Mussolini to a delegation of the Italian Arditi, or "Daredevils," as they are sometimes called, in a recent address.

"I am counting on all the ex-service men, and therefore on the Arditi, who have been our best fighters," continued the Premier. "I am sure almost all of you will join the voluntary militia. We need the regular army to be prepared for the defense of the nation, for this is its purpose; we need a police force in order to protect ourselves against lawbreakers. The Fascist government also has need of 200,000 muskets to keep all the rascals in the places."

"I hope, therefore," continued the Fascist chief, "to see you in the front rank of the Fascist legions, which are a magnificent reserve of courage, of power and of faith, and on which not

only the government, but the whole nation can surely count. I thank you, and beg you to consider me, as head of the government, a daredevil who does not stop before any obstacle and overcomes all obstacles if it be necessary and required by the supreme interests of the nation.

SHERIFF

**TUCKAHOE HONORS THE
HEROES OF REVOLUTION**

Tuckahoe, N. Y., March 9.—(By Associated Press.)—Whitened bones of 195 American heroes of the Revolution, unearthed recently in a sandy trench in the "Y" of the old state cross-roads near here, are to be removed to a memorial plot on the highest knoll in Tuckahoe Hills, to rest under a monument inscribed with the history of their last battle.

One of the 195 already has been taken from the trench and entombed as the "Unknown Soldier of the Revolution" beneath the floor of the Tuckahoe Village Hall. He was placed in the tomb on the 191st anniversary of the birth of his commander-in-chief, George Washington, after exercises similar to those of the "Unknown" of the World War at Arlington Cemetery, were held by the townsfolk.

Village officials have started a fund to purchase the plot of ground in which the 195 patriots, including the "Unknown" entombed February 22, will be reburied next Washington's birthday. They plan also to erect a granite shaft over the graves and it will be unveiled the day of reburial.

This little village of hills and dales which lies some 20 miles from the heart of New York City, was a great skirmishing ground between the Rebel and British forces during the Revolution. General Washington maintained a temporary headquarters in the old Inn at the crossroads. The inn still stands.

Across the road from it, and at the very point of the crossroads, is a spring. Rising back of the spring is a hill, some 200 feet high, and around the hill winds the road.

Village historians say that a party of American irregulars, returning from a foraging expedition into the hills, stopped at the inn to rest and eat. General Washington had been at the inn only several days before.

A heavy force of British regulars surrounded the inn and began an advance upon it, their movement being protected by several pieces of small artillery on the hill behind the spring. The commander of the American outfit, realizing that he had been caught, walked from the inn carrying a white flag and offered, it is recorded, to surrender.

This offer, the town history says, was refused, whereupon the American shot the British officer dead and was himself killed. The British then fired on the Americans, and being greatly superior in numbers, decisively defeated them, killing 195. A few of the Americans escaped. Their dead comrades were stripped of most of their clothing and left where they fell. News of the attack reached General Washington and he sent reinforcements for the irregulars, but they arrived too late.

They buried the 195 patriots in a long sandy trench across the road from the inn, placing their feet toward the east and their arms at their sides, as all fallen warriors are buried. A huge boulder was rolled over the trench to mark the spot.

The trench was discovered by a contractor, excavating for a residence. A few bits of revolutionary army equipment, enough for their identification as Americans, were found. By the bones of one was found an ivory case, and inside it, a slightly faded miniature of a beautiful woman.

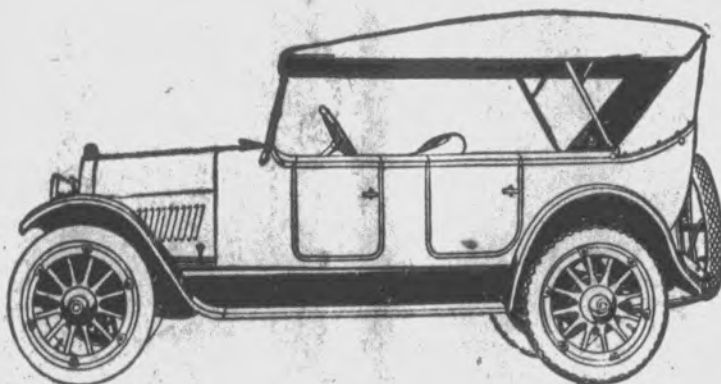

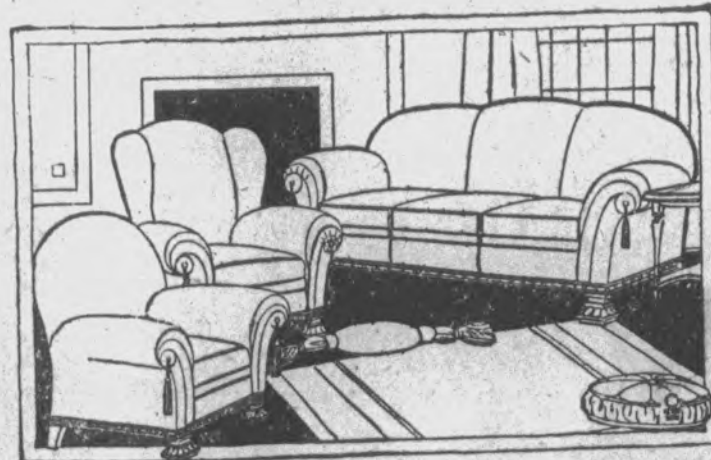
