Birmingham, Engg., March 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Interesting deductions are made from an experiment conducted here recently in feeding under nourished children. A pint of milk, in sealed bottles, supplied daily to 30 children in one of the public schools has had almost a miraculous effect on the physique of the youngsters from the sums, aged from seven to ten years.

NINE DEAD AND EIGHTY REPORTED INJURED RESULT OF VICIOUS WIND STORM

Louisville, March 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Nine persons are dead and more than eighty others reported injured and the estimated property loss over a wide area close to a million dollars stood as the toll of a violent windstorm which swept Kentucky Sunday night and Monday.

FRENCH TO REMAIN IN THE RUHR UNTIL TEUTONS BEGIN PAY

French and Belgians Convinced That They Have Dealt Blow to German Propaganda

Brussels, Mar. 13.—(By Associated Press.)—The French and Belgians by declaring this afternoon that they are ready, when Germany begins payment, to evacuate the Ruhr and the territory recently occupied the right bank of the Rhine, believed they have dealt a big blow to German propaganda, entirely countering the German statement that they were ousted purely by political motives in occupying the district.

The formal declaration was given out in the form of a communique following today's conference of Premiers Poincare and Theunis.

It was noted in some quarters that no mention was made of the Rhine-land in the statement. As regards the evacuation, it is pointed out that the same principle is applied as when the Germans evacuated French territory after the Franco-Prussian war, the troop withdrawal being carried out progressively as the French paid the indemnity.

"That we want now from Germany is action, not promises."

With this political aspect of the conference settled, the rest of the meeting was devoted to the immediate aspect of the situation, especially to obtaining coal for Belgium and coke for France from the Ruhr. Stipulations were made that any German workman helping to load coal at the mines would not be allowed to become objects of German reprisals when the Ruhr is evacuated.

The French believe that the surrender of Germany is merely a question of time and that the hour is approaching when France and Belgium must decide how they are to use their victory and what part Great Britain will play in the settlement.

Meanwhile the question of further penalties in the Ruhr has been brought prominently to the fore through the killing of Buer of a French officer and a civilian. The shooting led Premier Poincare to remark that he would consider with General De Gontaut, whom he plans to meet on his trip to Brussels, whether all repressive measures against the German nationalist groups have been taken.

The opinion has prevailed here for some time that France desires to have a definite program ready for the day when Germany will begin negotiations for a settlement. This day, it is believed in political circles, will be within three months.

Premier Poincare, in an interview with the correspondent, answering Germany's contention that the occupation is illegal, asserted that after the Franco-Prussian war Germany desired to reinforce her army of occupation as a safeguard against any possible filure of France to meet her obligations. He added that France today was merely acting in a similar manner with, however, the great difference that French measures are plainly authorized by the treaty of Versailles.

FARMERS WILL BE GREATLY AIDED BY FARM LOAN PLAN

Board is Busy Getting Regulations Ready Which Will Aid Farmers

Washington, March 12.—(By Associated Press.)—The Federal Farm Loan Board, charged with administration of the new government financial intermediate credit banks, completed today the regulations which are to serve as the guide for the systems operated in aid of the farmer.

The \$60,000,000 capital authorized by the law creating the new banks automatically has been credited to the farm loan board by the Treasury and indications were given following a conference today between Commission Lobdell, of the board and Secretary Mellon that \$1,000,000 will be turned over to each of the 12 banks immediately upon the issuing of charters. Additional funds up to the aggregate of \$60,000,000 will be supplied as needs arise.

The board plans temporarily at least to hold loans made under the new law to the face of nine months maturity. Mr. Lobdell explained, however, that this would be done only because no one knew the exact to which the system would be called upon to aid in agricultural financing.

The first few months, or perhaps a year, he said would be regarded as a period of experimentation. A construction of the law's provision made public by the Commissioner, was agreed upon in the three-day conference last week by the board.

Direct loans cannot be made to individuals. Direct advances may be made to co-operative marketing associations, or live stock associations, secured by warehouse receipts or staple agricultural products or by chattel mortgage on live stock.

"No such loan may exceed 85 per cent of the market value of the agricultural product or live stock. "Loans may be rediscouted at national or state banks, savings banks, trust companies, agricultural credit corporations and incorporated live stock companies.

"No paper can be rediscouted upon which the borrower has been charged a rate more than 1 1/2 per cent in excess of the discount rate of the intermediate credit bank of the district.

"Making advance on warehouse receipts, the credit banks can accept only receipts from bonded government warehouses or satisfactorily bonded warehouses operating under satisfactory state provision. This should lead to proper interest and greater activity in the development of warehouse facilities and proper regulation."

SEVERE STORM HITS CITY CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE IS RESULT

Small Houses Blown From Foundation and Other Property Damaged

MANY TREES UPROOTED AND RESIDENCES WERE GIVEN GENERAL SHAKE

Wind Lasted Only Short While But the Rain Continued for Several Hours

A terrific storm that did quite a bit of damage and caused the greatest unusual excitement in Greenville today about one o'clock. About noon clouds began to gather in the north and within a short while they were black and thick. Lightning and thunder could be seen and heard at a distance, but this did not cause any unnecessary alarm as such disruption in the elements are almost daily occurrence at this season of the year.

Just preceding the down pour of rain which continued for a long while, the wind blew at such a gale that dwellings and business houses trembled, many houses were unroofed, small building blown down, trees were uprooted, window blinds and eaves were torn from the residences, large board signs were completely wrecked, several horses were known to run away, automobiles were moved and considerable other damage was done. The wind entered town from a north westerly direction, and the damage which followed was confined to a rather narrow area.

Several people were blown from their feet and suffered major injuries. Just what havoc the storm played in other sections of the county could not be learned at the time of going to press this afternoon.

GREENVILLE WILL HAVE A COUNTRY CLUB VERY SOON

Thirty-Five Representative Citizens Attend Enthusiastic Meeting

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE IS WORKING TO SECURE 65 ADDITIONAL MEMBERS

Club Will Begin Operations as Soon as Hundred Charter Members Secured

The meeting held in the city hall last night attended by a representative body of Greenville citizens it was decided that Greenville will have a country club. The club will begin operations with a hundred charter members and will cost approximately \$25,000.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. H. A. White who after calling order, stated the purpose of the meeting and called for a thorough discussion of the matter which was entered into with spirit by the thirty-five citizens present. A tentative organization was formed with H. A. White chairman and James S. Picklen, secretary, and everyone present made application for charter membership. Blount, E. G. Flanagan and W. H. 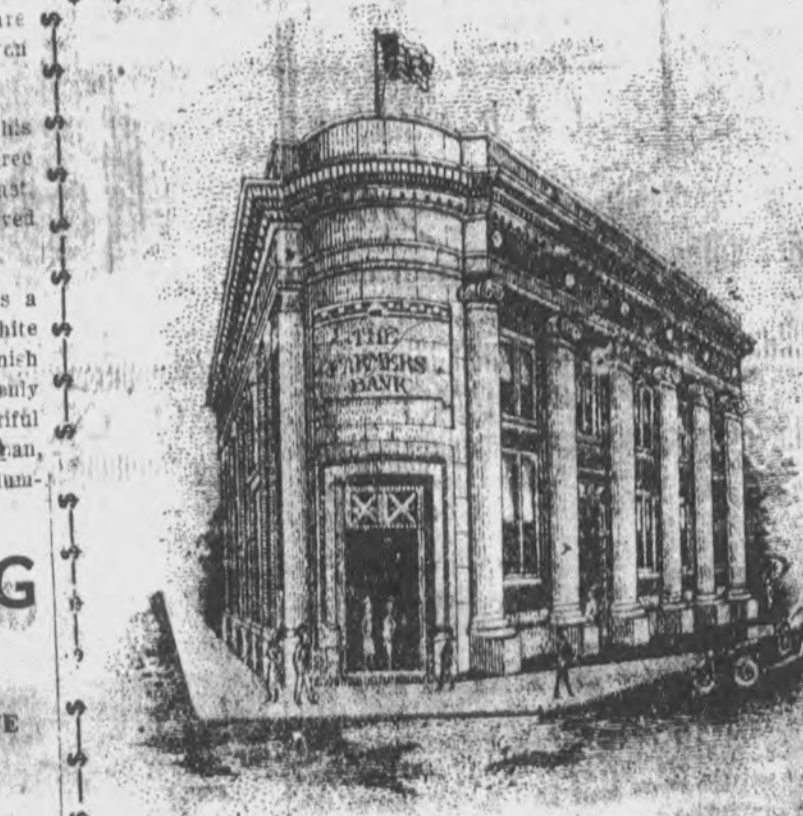

The federal authorities are looking into the case. Copeland will in all likelihood move from the "little rock" maintained by the State to the "big rock" operated by Uncle Sam, they say.

VALUABLE MINERALS STOLEN

Petrograd, Mar. 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Four pounds of pure iridium and four pounds of osmium, two of the most valuable and rarest of precious minerals, were recently stolen from the Petrograd Metallurgical Institute. The robbers also succeeded in getting away with six pounds of platinum. All of the metals had been at the institute's laboratory specimens for many years.

AMERICAN JEWS DISTRIBUTE \$9,000,000 EUROPEAN RELIEF

New York, March 13.—(By Associated Press.)—More than \$5,700,000 has been contributed by American Jews toward non-sectarian relief in Russia, and a further \$3,300,000 mostly for their own people through the American Relief Administration during the year 1922, according to a report of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

The report was made by Felix M. Warburg, James N. Rosenberg and Lewis L. Strauss, the three representatives of the committee who in August 1921 concluded the agreement on the combined work in Russia with Secretary Hoover, chairman of the American Relief Administration.

About \$4,000,000 of the \$5,700,000 was directly contributed toward Russian relief from the organization's own funds, while the remainder was made up of the 25 per cent deducted by the American Relief Administration for general relief from approximately \$7,000,000 in food packages sent by American Jews to Russia.

Most of the funds expended by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, according to the report, are now being used for construction rather than for relief, such as furnishing farmers with feed, cattle and implements, and providing capital to numerous small co-operative loan banks.

The total amount contributed by the committee from its own funds during the past year for relief work

WOMEN MAY BECOME SEA CAPTAINS NOW

London, Mar. 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Women are eligible for sea captains' certificates, is the ruling of the Board of Trade in reply to a question through the American Relief Administration on the subject from the Imperial Merchants Service Guide. The Board says it would not refuse to examine a candidate for a certificate of competency on the ground of sex if the conditions as to service and testimonials laid down in their regulations, were complied with.

The question arose through the case of a Miss Drummond, who recently went to sea as an engineer, and the guide wished to have it made clear if women could go further in the profession.

FACISTI ARE NOW UNITED WITH NATIONALISTS

Rome, March 13.—(By Associated Press.)—The factional strife between the militant and vigorous Fascist party, which now rules Italy, and the Nationalists, the moderate organization which sought to realize its aims by parliamentary methods, has come to an end. The political purposes of both parties long have been similar; they differed only in way of accomplishment.

An executive committee composed of six Fascisti and three Nationalists and presided over by Premier Mussolini, has been formed for the purpose of uniting the activities of the two parties.
