NEGRO ARRESTED FOR DISTURBING PEACE ON SUNDAY

Two Others Implicated Make
Get-Away While Warrants
Have Been Issued

Erne Evans, a negro hailing from Galloway's Cross roads, was on yesterday arrested for being drunk and disorderly, and placed under a one-hundred dollar bond for his appearance in court tomorrow morning. Warrants were also issued for Willie Jenkins and John Williams, negroes from the same section and who are also charged with being drunk and disorderly.

On Sunday afternoon a telephone message was received by local officers, from Galloway's Cross Roads, stating that the negroes were creating quite a sensation by shooting at cars and raising trouble in general. In response Deputy Sheriff O. F. Clark accompanied by Officer Brewer and Mr. G. R. Lanier, left for the scene of trouble. When they reached the place John Williams had already made his get-away and when the officers went to arrest Willie Jenkins, he took to the woods and although several shots were fired they failed to reach the fugitive. Evans was placed under bond of \$100 for his appearance at trial tomorrow morning. Warrants have been issued for Williams and Jenkins and every effort will be made to locate them.

BOLL WEEVIL HARD HIT BY THE BLIZZARD IN THE COTTON BELT

Washington, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—The February blizzard which overspread most of the cotton belt is believed to have killed off a large proportion of boll weevils which had gone into winter retirement, and it is the opinion of the government's entomologists that in the period of production this year the cotton planters will have a good chance of a bottom crop.

It was pointed out, however, by the Department of Agriculture in a statement today that should weather conditions during the coming season be unusually favorable for weevil multiplication abnormally heavy damage might occur.

PRESIDENT HARDING & PARTY START ON NORTHWARD CRUISE

Palm Beach, Fla., March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—President and Mrs. Harding and their vacation party began the northward cruise that will end Thursday or Friday at Saint Augustine. Fishing tackle and bait were aboard the Pioneer when she left and it was thought probable that the monotony of chugging up the Indian and Halifax rivers might be varied by fishing.

WINTER'S FINAL BLAST WILL OVERSPREAD EAST AND SOUTH TONIGHT; RELIEF WEDNESDAY

Washington, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—The winter's final blast which has been attended by blizzard and near zero temperatures in the middle west will overspread the east and south tonight but relief is promised by Wednesday. The cold wave will rapidly envelope the east and south tonight, the weather bureau says, with freezing temperatures probably as far south as the extreme northern part of Florida and frost as far as Palm Beach.

DR. W. A. PLECKER GIVES FACTS REGARDING DEATHS AND BIRTHS IN VIRGINIA

Richmond, Va., March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—A hundred and fifty two more deaths in Virginia in 1922 than in the year before and nine hundred and fifty-one more in January this year than same month in 1922 according to Dr. W. A. Plecker, state registrar of vital statistics. Births in January were three hundred and sixty-three less than previous low record of January 1921.

FREIGHT TRAINS COLLIDE AND TWO MEN ARE KILLED

Conductor and Flagman Killed
Instantly When Trains Col-
lide in Fog

Tarboro, March 19.—A wreck of two freight trains on the Atlantic Coast Line this morning about four o'clock resulted in the death of two persons and injury to at least two others.

Southern train No. 209 was going north on the Coast Line road and was said to be proceeding at about fifteen miles per hour when Coast Line train No. 257 crashed into it from the rear.

The accident occurred just north of Palmyra in a deep cut where the track comes out of Kehukee Swamp, and it is said that there was a dense fog at the time which prevented the engineer and fireman of the Coast Line train from seeing the train ahead.

The caboose and twelve cars of the Southern train were demolished and R. L. Moore and J. K. Bass, conductor and flagman on this train, were instantly killed.

The engine of the Coast Line train was derailed and the engineer and fireman slightly bruised and scratched. The bodies of Moore and Bass were carried to Weldon on train No. 42 and there turned over to an undertaking establishment to be prepared for burial.

Mr. Bass was a married man with a daughter about sixteen years old, and R. L. Moore was also a man of family.

Both made their home in Portsmouth and the bodies will be taken there for burial.

Trains were detoured via Weldon, the S. A. L. and Kelford until about two o'clock this afternoon when the regular schedules were resumed.

KILLING OF FRENCH SOLDIER AND GERMAN CIVILIAN DEVELOPMENTS OF WEEK-END

Dusseldorf, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—The killing of a French soldier and German civilian, at Essen, and the announcement that German mine owners had been allowed until April 15th to pay forty per cent coal tax were outstanding developments in the Ruhr situation over the week-end. The French announced that the first of penalties recently threatened if the mine owners failed to pay the coal tax had been involved and that in some instances expert licenses were being withheld.

MARVIN BLOUNT ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR MAYOR

Attorney Marvin K. Blount has today announced his candidacy for the office of mayor of this city, subject to the primary to be held in May. In an interview this morning Mr. Blount stated that his own desires and that of his friends has prompted him to make this announcement and that if elected to such an important office he will exert every effort to enforce law and order.

Mr. Blount is a native of this county, being the son of Mr. M. O. Blount, of Bethel. For the past six years he has been a practicing attorney in this city.

QUAKERS IN LONDON MUST SEEK LARGER QUARTERS

London, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Devonshire House, in the City of London, which for 250 years has been the official headquarters of the Society of Friends, is to be sold at auction. This is because the ancient and historic building is too small for the constantly growing activities of the Quakers, most of which take some form of charity.

The Quaker acquired a part of the building for a meeting house in the 17th century. The monthly meetings of the executive committee, called the meetings of sufferings, were held there. A library of all books written by Friends was formed, and the quarters have become the repository of a valuable collection of relics relating to the history and works of the Quakers.

Mystery Surrounds Slaying of Model

Dorothy King, known as Dorothy Kiernan, a beautiful artist's model, upon whom her masculine admirers lavished a fortune in gifts, was found in her elaborate New York apartment, murdered with chloroform, and more than \$30,000 worth of jewels she was known to have possessed were stolen. A man admirer, upon whom she had bestowed many of the presents given her, was detained, though the police admitted they had no evidence against him. An unnamed millionaire, who had been familiar with the girl and with whom she had taken trips out of town, was sought.

BASEBALL LEAGUE ALMOST ASSURED FACT THIS SECTION

Kinston and Greenville Get To-
gether With Two Other
Towns Considering

Kinston, March 19.—At a meeting of the baseball fans of Kinston and Greenville, held here yesterday in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, these two towns were definitely placed in the Eastern Carolina league for the coming season.

With two other dark horses, unknown to the general public, almost sure of entering, and with bad weather preventing the attendance of representatives of several towns, it seems that a Class "D" League for the year 1923 is about assured.

The sentiment at the meeting here was for ball of the organized variety, and both Kinston and Greenville were positive that they would be in the league. Information from two other towns, not represented by representatives actually present, practically clinches the organization of a league of organized ball in three parts this summer.

Another meeting will be called in April by Will B. Harvey, who was put in charge of the work of organizing a league. It is possible, it was stated here yesterday afternoon, that a six-club league may be organized. At present, it seems that a four-club league is all that can be promised.

Baseball fans here are glad to hear that a league is almost sure of organization and that time will tell as to whether six or four clubs will get into action in the summer. The special meeting the first week in April is expected to draw a large amount of interest in the sport and it is conceded that there will be more than at the first meeting held here yesterday. The promoters promised that none of the mistakes of the past would be made this year and that organized ball would be played. New rules will be gotten up and "Class D" is the way the boys will line up when the High Mr. Umps calls "Play ball."

ANOTHER MYSTERY FIGURE IS NAMED IN MURDER CASE

Officers Expect to Take Into
Custody Man Connected
With Murder of Dorothy

New York, Mar. 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Another figure has entered the Dorothy Kiernan murder case with the announcement of acting District Attorney Pecora that the police expect to take into custody a man not hitherto mentioned in connection with the slaying of the young woman in her West Fifty-Seventh Street apartment Thursday. Pecora declined to reveal the identity of a man but declared that he was confident that his detention would go far toward aiding the police to solve the murder.

AMERICA REFUSES TO DEDUCT VALUE OF GERMAN SHIPS FROM BILL FOR REPARATION

Paris, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—The refusal of the United States to accept reduction of its bill for reparations of the American army of occupation by value of German ships seized in American ports has been presented to allied representatives in conference here on reimbursement by Elliot Wadsworth, assistant secretary of the treasury.

BLUE NILE VALLEY IN EGYPT TO HAVE NEW RESERVOIR

Alexandria, Egypt, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Important new irrigation work is about to be undertaken by the Egyptian government on the Blue Nile. The construction of a reservoir at Djebel Auoula will aid Egypt in cultivating almost any quantity of rice; will abolish the rotations concerning cotton, will supply the water necessary for irrigation by ditches, and will improve the uncultivated areas.

Experts in the Egyptian irrigation service believe that the reservoir will prevent the inundation of a large area of land in southern Sudan, and save to the Egyptian government large sums which it has been paying as compensation for damage done in these areas.

The cost of the new undertaking will be about \$15,000,000.

LOCAL KIWANIS PLANNING TO SEND REPRESENTATION

Atlanta, Ga. to Entertain In-
ternational Convention of
Kiwans Beginning May 28th

The Kiwanis Club of Greenville will send a representative delegation to the International Convention of Kiwanis in Atlanta, Georgia, May 28th to 31st, inclusive, if officers of the club may judge from the interest already manifested among the members. It is generally indicated that the Atlanta Convention will be the most largely attended in the history of Kiwanis.

The entertainment feature of the Atlanta Convention is being especially stressed in the invitation extended to Greenville Kiwanians, who are urged to see if "old fashioned Southern hospitality" still lives up to its reputation.

A water carnival on the lake of one of Atlanta's principal country clubs, a Southern fried chicken dinner "with fixins" and a whole chicken for each of the thousands of visitors expected, and an elaborate musical revue, produced especially for the convention and called "Plantation Days" are among the features planned. Kiwanis clubs from all over Georgia, with several from surrounding states, will join the Atlantans as hosts. Headquarters have already been opened in Atlanta by Kiwanis International to look after the details of handling such a large gathering.

RUHR FOUNDERS ORDER IRON ORE FROM SWEDEN

Stockholm, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Sweden's export of iron ore will not be materially disturbed by the Ruhr occupation, as was feared in some quarters, according to reliable information reaching Stockholm. The leading Swedish economic weekly Affarsvarlden (Business World) says it now feels reasonably sure that the large ore-consuming industry in the Ruhr area will be kept going, whether under German or French direction.

The Grangesberg Mining Company has announced the conclusion of long time contracts for continued delivery of Swedish ore to German iron works, and in the same quantities as heretofore. These contracts call for deliveries until 1932. The largest consumers are the Thyssen and Krupp works. During last year the total export of iron ore from Sweden amounted to 5,320,000 tons, which is about one million tons more than during 1921.

A report from Germany published in Swedish papers states that Germany's total requirements now are 20,000,000 tons of iron ore a year, and that under the new contracts about 5,000,000 tons thereof will be supplied by Sweden.

HOW TO DEAL WITH RUM FLEET CAUSES DISCUSSION

Washington, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—How to deal with rum fleets which hover off New York and New Jersey coasts was discussed at a conference between Prohibition Commissioner Haynes and E. C. Yellowry, chief of enforcement squad in Metropolitan districts and New Jersey agents. Haynes conceded that rum fleets were a difficult problem and are likely to continue.

weevil.

it will measure up if not surpass the
expectations of everyone.

The latest in rain makers. Scien-

in a most interesting manner in Fri-

Now that the rat campaign is over
the next campaign to receive the at-
tention of the public should be that
against the tobacco weevil. This lit-
tle worm is causing considerable trou-
ble and the sooner it is exterminated
the better off everyone will be. The
work of the pest has become so seri-
ous that, according to the Tobacco
Association of the United States, buy-
ers of packed tobacco are demanding

guarantees of freedom from the
weevil worms. Farmers should heed
the warning and clean up their barns
and pack houses. Raising tobacco
requires too much work and time to
let something ruin it that could be
avoided.

Attorney-General Daugherty says
that Harding will be renominated and
re-elected, and that the country and
party will demand it. The party may
demand it, and he may be re-elected,
but Mr. Daugherty took in a great
deal of territory when he said "the
country." The democrats are plan-
ning to give Mr. Harding or Mr. any
republican a race for honors in the
next election. Already several
strong and influential men have been
suggested and if the 1922 election
means anything then "another
change" will take place in 1924.

WORK THE PANACEA

With refreshing frankness, Prince
G. Caetani, Italian ambassador to the
United States, declared in an address
at Detroit that all the troubles of the
world are economic in nature and
"hard work is the only cure for
them." In that single condensed
statement, the Italian ambassador
spoke a mouthful of wisdom. The
truth of his observation is finding
significant verification in the atti-
tude his own country has assumed
toward the solution of the troubles
that it has had to face as the after-
math of its huge war sacrifices.

Under the terms of the Versailles
treaty, Italy is as much entitled to its
specified pro rata of reparations to
be collected from the enemy coun-
tries upon which the burden of their
payment was imposed as the other
nations to which they were awarded.
But in all of the discussions about
their payment, Italy has been less in-
sistent upon the employment of forcible
means of collection of the full
amount stipulated than any of its al-
lies. Great Britain possibly excepted.
Instead of depending upon settlement
of the reparations account as a sole
reliance for its speedy economic re-
covery, Italy has shown a tolerant at-
titude toward the debtor nations in
the stress that confronts them, and
has buckled down to the business of
working out its own economic rehabili-
tation.

"Italy," says the Italian ambassa-
dor, "is working as it never worked
before to overcome its ills. It is
setting the example to the remainder
of Europe for earnest effort to bring
about normal conditions and insure
peace to the world. The efficiency of
labor steadily is increasing. Indus-
tries are pickling up despite the pain-
ful European situation and the stag-
nation of international commerce."
In other words, as soon as Italy
found its mind after the terrible war
impact, it sensed the wisdom of the
proverbial saying: "The Lord helps
those who help themselves," and ap-
plied it nationally as a needed tonic.
As soon as Mussolini came into pow-
er, he adopted a vigorous method of
enforcing government policy which
speedily put an end to obstructive
movements designed to hinder the na-
tional purpose of everybody doing his
full share of work in the scheme of
economic upbuilding, and, as the Ital-
ian ambassador has indicated, that
policy has borne rich fruitage.—Rich-
mond Times Dispatch.

CHINESE ARMY DIVISION ADOPTS CHRISTIAN FAITH

Chicago, March 14.—(By Associated Press.)—The Eleventh Division of the Chinese Army, called by some "the Chinese Ironsides," commanded by Major General Feng Yu Hsiang, known as "the Cromwell of China," has become solidly Christian, according to a cablegram received today.

by the board of foreign missions of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The cablegram, which was from the Rev. Edward Kingsley Lowry, a returned missionary to China residing in Peking, told of the conversion of 4,000 soldiers of the Eleventh Division, with General Feng assisting at the ceremony. According to the board of foreign missions there were only about this number of soldiers remaining in General Feng's division who were not Christians so the board infers that this completes the personnel of this fighting group of China.

It was General Feng and his Eleventh Division which swooped down from Shensi Province to the relief of Peking, then being defended by General Wu Pei in the fighting of last summer. General Feng threw his men into the path of the victorious Manchurians and hurled them back in a defeat, which eventually resulted in rout. At that time the Christian soldiers wore arm bands containing the stern military ideals of their leader. They advanced to the fray singing Christian hymns. This division is the only one in the Chinese army in which there is definite welfare work and vocational training for the men, all of which is due to the constructive activity of their leader, the board states.

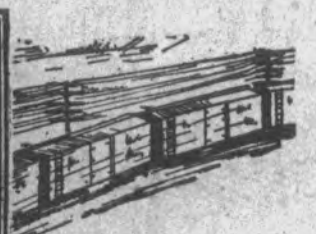
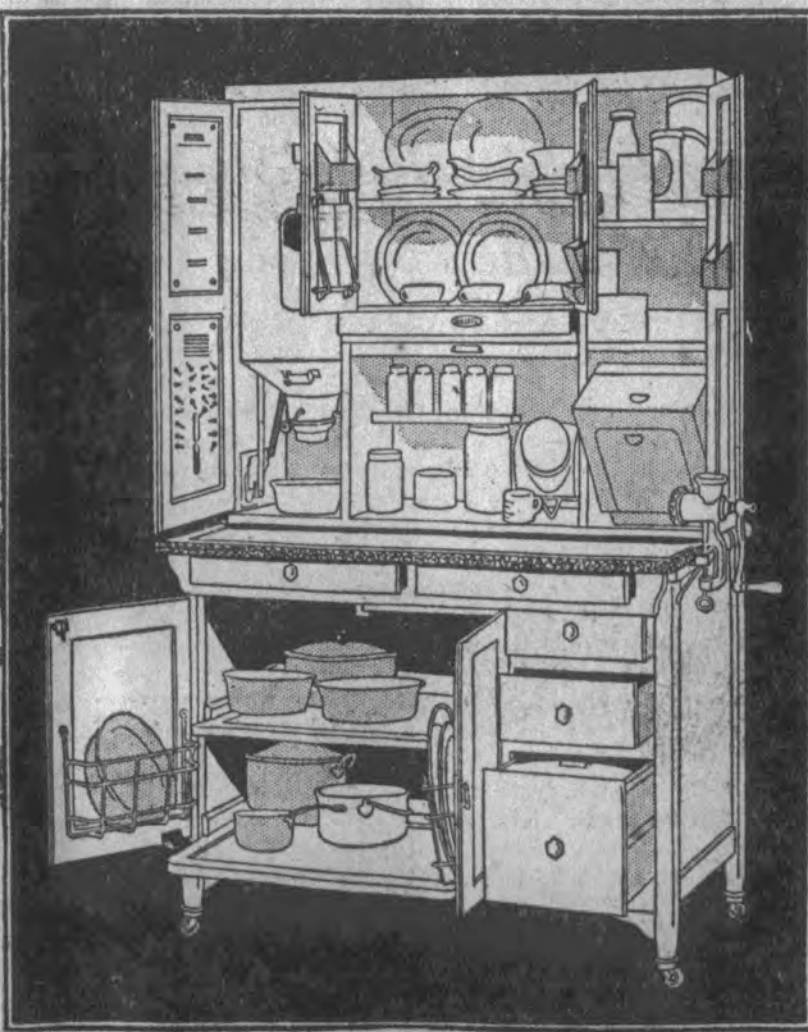
