The Germans don't approve of the French invasion of the Ruhr. Perhaps they aren't brutal enough. The Germans are hard and you have to "treat 'em rough."

The mayor's race is on. "Come on in, the water is fine." This is a time when only strong men are needed, and although only one can be elected, they will all have their supporters. "Many can run but only one can win."

The suggestion that a case pending in court for a hundred years, be put off two months longer, certainly could not be accused of exceeding the speed limit. Haste makes waste and as the controversy was over a boundary line, there is no need for hurrying—the line will not "move" away.

All roads lead to Wilson today where the Queen of Eastern Carolina will be chosen from representatives of each town belonging to the Chamber of Commerce. Greenville will be present in large numbers to vote for MISS GREENVILLE and it is an assured fact that she will receive her part of attention.

Attorney-General Daugherty is opposed to speeding up Harding's campaign as he is aware of many instances where presidential pre-convention campaigns were started too soon and ran on the rocks because of their early start. If this is a prediction of what will happen if the renomination campaign of Mr. Harding is hurried up, we are afraid that unless Mr. Daugherty gets out of it, that the campaign is already on the rocks. He is one of the big reasons why Harding is going to lose out.

BEAUTIFYING COUNTY

The citizens of Pitt county cannot be commended too highly for their efforts and interest in trying to make their towns, schools, churches, etc., more attractive and beautiful. Nothing adds to a town more than well kept lawns, pretty flowers and clean streets. Mrs. Matherly of the Extension Service of the University has been secured to offer suggestions and submit plans for the beautifying of the towns and as she comes to the county highly recommended it is a settled fact that a wonderful improvement will be made in a short while. While it is customary for the Extension Service to only help the schools, churches and charitable institutions, Mrs. Matherly has kindly consented to submit plans for the

Rotary grounds and for the court house square. Great interest is being manifested in the undertaking.

The German government should know by now that the question of settling with France and stopping the trouble in the Ruhr Valley lies solely between Germany and France. The French will give any offer a consideration providing it comes direct from Germany. They will not accept any offer that they are not sure comes direct from Germany and one that the Germans will stick to. France knows that it is wise to be on the safe side, if Germany is concerned.

Oscar S. Straus, formerly ambassador to Turkey, addressing a gathering of clergymen in New York, said that America should by all means join the League of Nations. This was given as a warning that unless civilization puts an end to war that war will destroy civilization. The country is realizing the same fact. Even to the extent that some of the strongest grandmasters are changing their point of view as regards our relation with foreign countries. President Wilson, who is by far the greatest man of the world today, realized during his administration that the League of Nations was what was needed for a world which is sick of wars. The present administration hasn't defeated the League of Nations, it has only stopped it for a short while. It is something that must come and we predict that its acceptance isn't very far in the future.

Tokio Acts to Relieve Poor.

Tokio, March 21.—(By Associated Press.)—Upon the advice of Dr. C. A. Beard of New York, who is here making suggestions for improving Tokio, a great step forward has been taken in ameliorating the living conditions of the poor of the city.

Besides making an effort to improve the homes and surroundings, the municipal authorities have established dining rooms where breakfast is served for 10 sen (five cents) and dinner and supper for 15 sen each. Technical schools also are being started where boys will be given free instruction in carpentry and other trades.

ENGLAND SCRAPS THE ORION

Plymouth, Mar. 21.—(By Associated Press.)—The British battleship "Orion," which is practically the last of the British warships to be scrapped under the Washington agreement, is now under the hands of shipbreakers.

JAPAN WILL NOT CHANGE HER PRESENT LAND LAWS

Tokio, Mar. 21.—(By Associated Press.)—There is no immediate prospect of the government liberalizing the Japanese land laws, and the suggested purchase of the perpetual leases held by foreigners in Yokohama does not figure in the government program.

"The matter of further liberalizing the land laws of Japan frequently comes up for discussion among foreign office officials," said Mr. Nagai, head of the commercial department of the foreign office, "and there is a desire in the foreign office to see the existing act further enlarged and pro-

mulgated, but many other department of the government are interested, and the complexities of the question continue to delay it.

"As for the purchase of the perpetual leaseholds, the same policy as is now in force will be continued, namely, the buying in of these leaseholds as they come upon the market.

"It may be that the business depression will offer a good chance to secure more of these leaseholds, and perhaps that is the reason some people appear to believe the government is going to make some special effort in the matter. There is, of course, no idea of attempting the condemnation of the leaseholds."

HATCHING SEASON IS SPRING AND SUMMER

More Eggs Fertile Than—Decline With Molting—Other Conditions

By SETH W. SHOEMAKER
Director, The School of Agriculture, International Correspondence Schools, Scranton, Pa.

In poultry the reproductive process is accomplished in two stages. The egg is first produced, developed, fertilized within the body of the hen and laid. Then the egg is subjected to a certain temperature (100° F. or a little higher) for about twenty-one days, during which time the embryo develops and hatches out of the shell as a chick.

The process of developing the embryo within the egg by means of heat is called incubation. When this is carried on by a hen it is known as natural incubation; when incubation is accomplished by means of a machine, oven or other device it is known as artificial incubation.

Man has little control over the reproductive process in its first stages except so far as the selection of the breeders is concerned. In the second stage, however, if artificial incubation is practiced, he can, by his methods of conducting the process greatly influence the development and future well-being of the chick.

When Fertile.
In order that eggs shall be fertile the hen that lays them must have been mated with the male. Hatchable eggs are those that are fertilized and have vitality enough to insure

the production of a living chick. Eggs are usually fertile up to and including those laid the ninth day after the hens are separated from the males. Fertilization is impossible after the sexes have been separated for twelve days or more. Eggs may safely be counted as fertile after the males have been with the hens for nine days or more.

The eggs of all kinds of fowls are more apt to be fertile during the spring and early summer than at any other time. Fertility begins to decline with the commencement of molting, and during the fall and winter the production of fertile eggs is at the minimum. The average production occurs in January or soon after.

WILL HELP EX-SOLDIERS BUY POULTRY FARMS IN DAKOTA

Brookings, S. D., March 9.—(By Associated Press.)—An eighty-acre tract of land adjoining the South Dakota Agricultural College here has been divided into ten-acre farms upon which buildings, poultry houses and barns will be erected to train former service men in poultry raising, in cooperation with the program of the U. S. Veterans Bureau of the Tenth district.

When the farms are completed it is planned to sell them to former soldiers who are taking vocational training in agriculture. Intensive farming is expected to follow poultry, bee and produce raising. A requisite will be that each man who buys a farm be married, taking a poultry course in an agricultural college and have a satisfactory scholastic standing.

Similar to the plan worked out at Veteransville, Minn., the tenants will be given extended time to pay for their farms in a manner that will permit them to use their government allowances to finance the farms until they are income producers.

PHILIPPINE YOUTHS DISPOSED TO GO EARLY TO THE ALTAR

Manila, P. I., March 20.—(By Associated Press.)—The marriage laws of the Philippine Islands face revision. A bill now before the house provides, among other things, that males may not marry before they are

14 and females before they are 12 years of age. Males under 20 and females under 18 must have the consent of their parents.

The bill also would liberalize the divorce laws of the Philippines. Desertion by either party for a period of not less than six years would be a cause for divorce.

Doctors Will Tour Italy.

Rome, March 20.—(By Associated Press.)—Doctors of medicine of all nations to the number of 200 have been invited to join an excursion this summer to the principal thermal resorts of Italy. The journey will last a fortnight, begin in northern Piedmont, and end at Naples. Inter-preters will accompany the medical men, who will have a special train at their disposal and be housed in the best hotels.

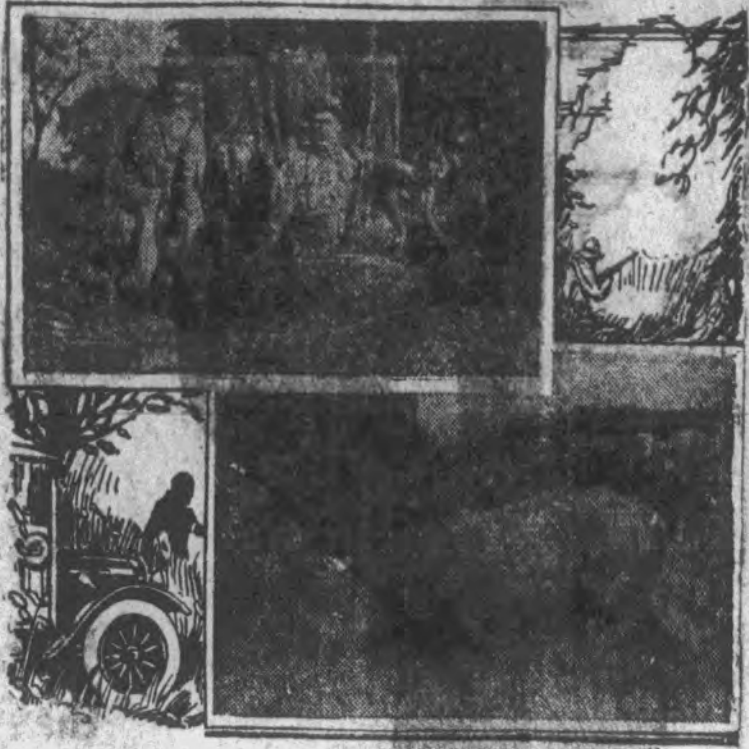
RUSSIA PLANS TO REHABILITATE HER LOST INDUSTRIES

Moscow, Mar. —(By Associated Press.)—Leon Trotsky, the Russian War Minister, may assume a new job that of directing the rehabilitation of Russia's big industries, if plans which are to be presented to the twelfth congress of the Communist Party, meeting in Moscow late this month, are carried out. Trotsky, it is understood, would continue to act as director of the fighting forces of Russia, but will devote most of his time to the heavy task of whipping Russian factories into shape. He already has worked out plans to this end, and will present them to the congress.

Trotsky's ability as an organizer would long ago have been called into play in this particular job had it not been for opposition by some members of the party, who considered that the war minister would enforce military control over the workingmen. It is said that in the beginning Trotsky will close down many factories which are poorly equipped or poorly managed, utilizing their machinery to strengthen the mechanical equipment of the better factories which are to be operated with larger forces to bring about a normal output.

In addition to discussing plans for industrial betterment, the party congress is expected to devise means to bring about a better feeling between the "Nepmen," as the businessmen developed by the new economic policy are called, and the actual proletariat. The "Nepmen" have no votes, but their growing prosperity has greatly alarmed some of the more rabid communists, who see in their extension the danger of a restoration of old-time conditions in Russia. Premier Lenin sounded the keynote of the conference policy in a recent statement in which he declared that the basis of the social reconstruction of Russia rests upon the collaboration of two classes. He has proposed that about 100 of the most honest and best understanding communists be formed into a special department, authorized to inspect the working of all government institutions

Speed Wagon Carries Hunters Into Wilds of S. Africa After Big Game



Suppose that some fine morning, just after the rhinoceros season had opened, your old friend Bill called you on the phone and proposed a little run up into Zululand. Some thrill, eh, what?

The accompanying pictures show how nonchalantly they do it in the South Africa. Recently a party of four men left East London in a Speed Wagon. Their equipment included all the essentials that four husky men, each accustomed to roughing it in African wilds, would require.

Traveling up the coast through Idutywa, Port St. John, Lusitiki, Durban and Ganger they reached Somekele in Zululand on the fifth day. Here they engaged native guides and made trek into the jungle, still driving the rough and ready Speed Wagon.

We haven't the details at hand to tell you how, when that big rhino charged, with the Zulu natives fleeing for cover, that the sturdy, determined looking gentleman who stands

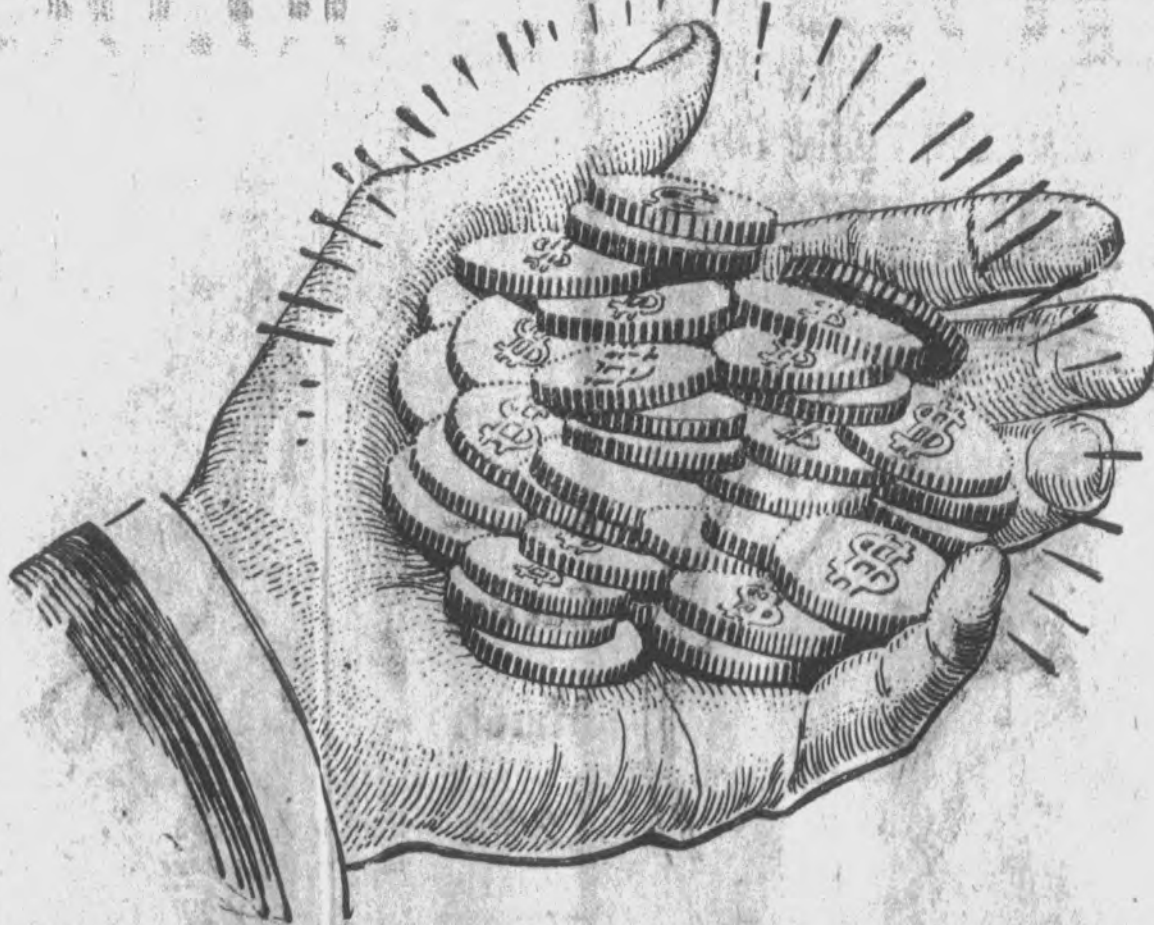
