If the gallant ship can be preserved, the Spanish War Veterans plan to refit it as a memorial to shelter the trophies awarded to Admiral Dewey, the ship, and the members of the crew after the Spanish flotilla was defeated.

Harlan, Ky., March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—County officers and a posse of men have returned from the mouth of Beech Creek in the hills of Leslie county with an account of desperate last of the "Strong's," in a battle in which three men and one woman were killed Wednesday. ## DAUGHERTY'S SON IN MYSTERY.

Major Draper M. Daugherty, only son of Attorney General of the United States Harry M. Daugherty, has been revealed as a close personal friend of Dorothy Keenan King, murdered New York butterfly, upon whom J. K. Mitchell, son-in-law of E. T. Stotesburk, lavished gems and money. Major Daugherty, in a straightforward statement, admitted his acquaintance with the girl, adding he believed blackmailers intended trying to extort money from him. The theory of the police now is that the girl was murdered by blackmailers because she refused to aid in their plots against the fortunes of wealthy men. Major Daugherty, a former army officer, is an engineer by profession.

A person who knows about and lives the godly life has the freshness, the joy of fruitfulness, the joy of fulfillment of the promises of life, and the joy of prosperity.

## DEBATERS READY FOR CONTEST WITH KINSTON HIGHS

Two Debates Scheduled for Friday; One in Greenville, Another in Kinston

Greenville High School debaters have put the finishing touches on their debates and are now ready to face Kinston High on tomorrow night when the two schools meet in the high school auditorium.

The Greenville-Kinston debate is only one of the debates being staged by the University of North Carolina as on Friday night the high schools of the entire state are to debate on the question; RESOLVED that Congress should provide for the enforcement of the railway labor board decisions.

Greenville High is represented on the affirmative side of the question by two Juniors, Justus Everett and Henry Fleming, and on the negative side by two seniors, Mavis Lee Oakley and William Evans.

The affirmative team will meet their opponents in Greenville while the negative team, under the direction of Miss Greene of the High School faculty, will journey to Kinston.

The people of Greenville are urged to attend the debate and encourage the local team by their presence and interest. The High School orchestra, with Miss Bass directing, will play before the debate. The program will begin at 8:00 o'clock sharp.

### PEACE NEGOTIATIONS WILL BE RESUMED AT LAUSANNE BETWEEN APRIL 15-20th

Geneva, March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—Peace negotiations between the allies and Turkey will be resumed at Lausanne between April fifteenth and twentieth, the Secretariat which powers left at Lausanne at the conclusion of recent conference has announced.

## DAUGHERTY GIVES FACTS CONCERNING KEENAN MURDER

Gives Name of Alleged Black Mailer But District Attorney Keeps it Secret

New York, March 28.—(By Associated Press.)—The limelight of public interest, which was shifted from character to character in the Dorothy Keenan murder case, tonight was focused on the identity of the man who called on Major Daugherty, son of the United States Attorney General, and threatened to blackmail him because of his acquaintance with the model unless he got him a job with the Department of Justice. Daugherty appearing voluntarily before Acting District Attorney Pecora, discussed at length with him is acquaintance with the slain girl and then, avoiding reporters, vanished after giving the Prosecutor the name of the alleged blackmailer.

This name Mr. Pecora kept to himself. The only hint that he would give newspapers was that the man in question already had been questioned by the police in connection with another matter.

Reports encountered the same difficulty interviewing Daugherty as they did when the mysterious "Mr. Marshall," the girl's elderly admirer, later revealed as J. Keasley Mitchell, Philadelphia capitalist and clubman, was the central figure in the drama.

Mr. Pecora, who for nine days shielded Mitchell from the press, today took the same precaution to see that Daugherty's wishes to avoid interviews were fulfilled. The latest witness was whisked in and out of the criminal courts building and his meeting with Mr. Pecora held in the office of another prosecutor.

## CONGREGATIONS AT LOCAL CHURCH ARE INCREASING DAILY

Special Revival Services in Progress at Christian Church Are Growing in Interest.

The congregation in attendance at the special revival services now in progress at the Christian church continues to increase in number each evening, and last night's number included several from out of the city.

Dr. W. P. Shamhart, the pastor, who is doing the preaching based his theme last night on the parable of the Ten Virgins, five of which were wise and five foolish. He likened the foolish to people who continued in life with no thought of spiritual things until too late. He said that some people apparently in their own hearts were prepared for the coming of the bridegroom, but if their positions were brought to test they would be found in the same predicament as that of the foolish virgins. The speaker impressed his hearers with the thought that all should be prepared for the coming of the bridegroom, for we knew not the day nor the hour when the Son of Man cometh. The sermon carried with it a powerful message which was entirely different from the usual discussion founded on this scripture.

The musical part of each night's service is a feature and the congregation is joining in the singing of the good old gospel hymns.

### GUIMARES HELD UNDER BOND CARRYING CONCEALED WEAPON WITHOUT PERMIT

New York, March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—Albert E. Guimares a close friend of Miss Dorothy Keenan who was arrested the day after her murder charged with carrying weapons without permit is held under a twenty-five hundred dollar bail for examination April 1st. The pistol was found in his satchel at his hotel. Guimares has denied knowledge of the crime although admitting he was on friendly terms with the model who had given him costly presents, including a fur coat.

## PUBLIC LIBRARY HIGHLY HONORED

Mrs. E. B. Ficklen Appointed Delegate to Attend 45th Annual Conference

Mrs. E. B. Ficklen, of this city, has received a commission from the executive department of the State of North Carolina to go as a delegate to the Forty-fifth Annual Conference of the American Library Association which meets in Hot Springs, Ark., April 23-28.

In appointing the delegate, to represent the local library and also the State, the committee made a splendid selection in Mrs. Ficklen. ## GERMANY WILLING FOR BUSINESS MEN TO BE MEDIATORS

Say They Are Willing to Pay Reparations as Determined by Such Commission

Berlin, March 28.—(By Associated Press.)—The German government is willing to do everything possible to insure payment of its reparations obligations as they might be determined by an international business men's commission. Foreign Minister von Rosenberg has informed the foreign relations committee of the Reichstag.

The minister said that the government had communicated to the European powers, with the exception of those directly interested in the Ruhr occupation, its belief that the proposals contained in Secretary Hughes' New Haven speech constituted a feasible means of settling the reparations problems. He reiterated, however, that the occupied region must be unconditionally evacuated before there could be any negotiations for a settlement of the controversy.

Submission of the reparation issue to an international group on which Germany has equal representation, would find the German government ready to take steps towards obtaining an international loan Baron von Rosenberg said. The proceeds would be given to the Allies immediately as an advance cash payment.

### APPEAL FOR CLEMENCY OF PRELATES AND PRIESTS WILL BE CONSIDERED

Moscow, March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—Appeal for clemency of Catholic prelates and priests sentenced last Monday will be considered at the first meeting of the central executive committee of the governments. Amnesty Department has announced. Meanwhile temporary stay of sentence is applicable and they will remain in prison.

### BRITISH SPINNERS WAR ON THE DYERS

Manchester, March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—A protest has been made to the Master Cotton Spinners Association by British dyers against the action of the spinners in sending their goods to Belgium to be dyed. The trade has been affected seriously in Lancashire. The manufacturers claim they are able to send the goods to Belgium to be dyed and then send them back to England at less cost than to have the work done here, and refuse to change their plans unless the price is decreased.

Open to Any Town in Eastern Part of the State Which Puts Up Proper Guarantee

Wilson, March 28.—The question of who will get the Eastern Carolina Exposition next year will be decided in a few weeks. It is open to any town in the eastern part of the State which puts up the proper guarantee. Sealed proposals will be sent out, and the matter will be decided in two weeks, according to Manager Bartlett.

The Wilson directors are determined to have it if possible and these have the backing of the business men and citizens of Wilson who have not only had a good time in a social way but the exposition has advertised Wilson and brought her attractions and resources close to the folks in the eastern part of the State.

### WASHINGTON RELIC GIVEN TO RESIDENT OF ILLINOIS

Belleville, Ill., March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—A snuff box said to have been given George Washington while he was President is now the property of Henry Williams, Jr., of this city. The box, besides being a receptacle for snuff, contains a drawer and compartments for a quill and ink, and is said to have been made from a branch of an oak tree centuries ago.

It is said to have been sent to Washington by the Earl of Buchan. It was carried in the Battle of Falkirk, in Scotland, July, 1298, it is related.

Washington returned it to the Earl, it is stated, but ultimately it came into the possession of a naval commodore, who gave it to a Miss Clark of Delaware. Miss Clark later married and became the mother of Volney L. Williams, a pioneer settler here.

## SOUTH CAROLINA SELLS 12,586,756 POUNDS 1922 CROP

Columbia, S. C., March 29.—The South Carolina 1922 tobacco crop totaled 42,586,756 pounds, according to the final statement of the State department of Agriculture, just issued. The average price received by the grower was 20.53 a pound. Independent warehouses handled 27,219,067 pounds, which brought \$5,588,788, and co-operative warehouses handled 15,356,949 pounds. The total price paid for tobacco handled by the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association was not made public.

The Lake City market, the largest in the state, handled a total of 8,220,608 pounds, with Mullins second, with 7,095,617 pounds. — Southern Tobacco Journal.

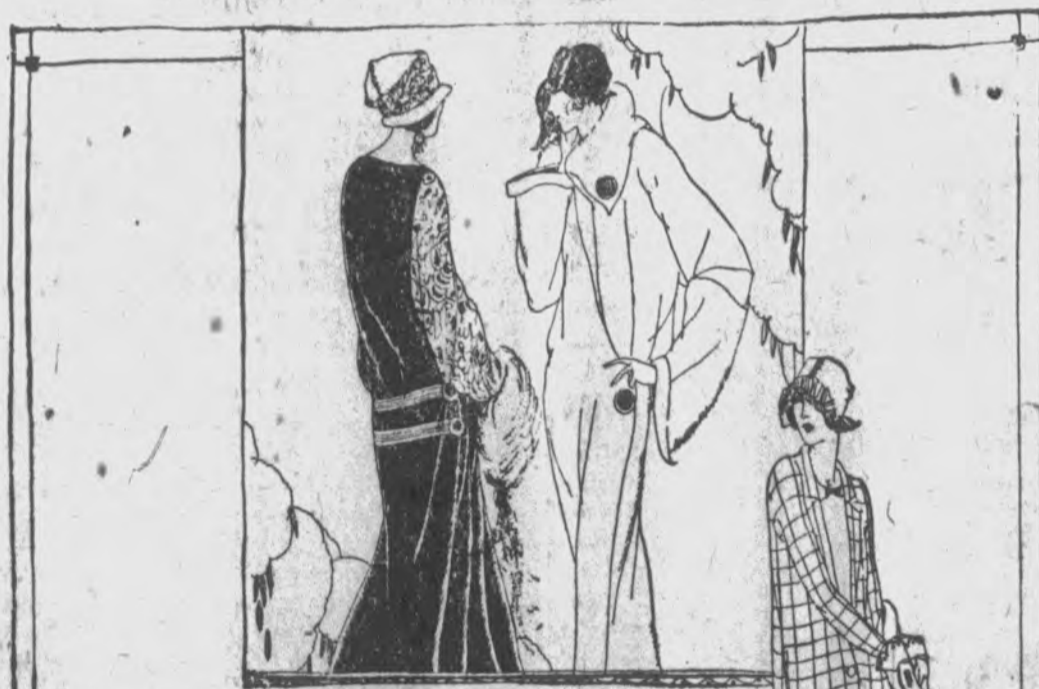

**HEN STILL HAS MERIT FOR INCUBATING EGGS**

Fanciers Champion Natural Method for Hatching vs. Artificial

(By Seth W. Shoemaker)

In spite of many improvements in the artificial incubation of eggs there are still many poultrymen who prefer the natural method. Artificial incubation is particularly adapted to quantity production.

Chicks hatched and reared artificially will do better during the cold weather than chicks hatched and reared naturally. However, as chicks with the mother will do very well.

On farms where few chicks are hatched and where there is no necessity for hatching natural incubation does well enough and is less troublesome than artificial incubation. Many farmers claim that chicks hatched by natural incubation and brooding will be more vigorous than those hatched artificially.

Because of their belief that brooding induces greater growth in the chicks many fanciers who try for honors at the large shows hatch and rear their chicks naturally. One of the most ardent fanciers says that fanciers unquestionably produce their best specimens by natural incubation. He also says that artificial incubation has absorbed the attention of investigators and others to such an extent that little is written or taught of the old-fashioned or trustworthy natural method.

**Natural Hatching**

In view of the fact that there are so many poultry raisers some information bearing on this particular method should be widely disseminated. To hatch eggs successfully it is well to follow the following precepts:

Select a quiet hen; discard one that uses her voice constantly.

Have the nest ready before removing her from the laying coop.

Set the hen in such a manner that she may walk on the nest and not be obligated to jump up or down to reach the eggs, for such a procedure means broken eggs or crushed chicks.

Before setting and between hatches paint all the woodwork with kerosene. This is particularly important in warm weather.

Dust the hen thoroughly with insect or lice powder before placing her on the nest. Repeat this four days before hatching time.

Natural incubation and brooding might well be considered by all those who rear only a few chicks, perhaps by some of those who rear several hundred. Many poultrymen claim that it is always well to hatch part of your chicks and rear them with the mother hen.

**GREENVILLE CLUB**  
**KIWANIS**  
"WE BUILD"

(By FRED R. MARVIN.)

(For over twenty-five years the writer of this article has been gathering inside data on this vital subject. He has carried on a tremendous work in his attempt to counteract forces which tend to undermine our American government. The following article is timely and will be read, beyond a doubt, by every Kiwanian with intense interest. It is interesting to note that the Boston Transcript assigned Mr. Marvin to the recent trials of a large group of radicals at St. Joseph, Michigan.)

Many eminent chemists, doctors, professors and prohibition officers have occupied much space in the press to inform the public that drinking moonshine hooch is a mighty dangerous business; that said moonshine hooch is rank poison that deafness, blindness, insanity and death follow in its wake. But men will not be guided by the advice of those who know, and insist on drinking moonshine only to experience deafness, blindness, insanity and death. But bad as all this is, there is another character to rank poison being freely supplied the American people against the distribution of which there appears to be no law.

It's nothing more or less than "mind poison." Those who deal in this are called radicals, "liberal-minded" or theorists, while some apply such terms as syndicalist, communist, bolshevik, socialist and I. W. W. But whether of the "liberal-minded" group of mind poison peddlers, or of the most pronounced group such as the communist, they all get their goods from the same moonshine still, and the operator of that still is one Lenine. The still is located at Moscow, Russia. As yet the alienists have not found a name that can be properly applied to all the peddlers of mind poison hooch, but we opine when the name is coined it will be "bolshiphobia."

The fact of the matter is, there is in this nation a large, well-managed, skillfully-directed, and sufficiently-financed movement that has for its purpose the overthrow of this government and the destruction of its industries, by a bloody revolution, if necessary, in order that there may be erected on the ruins a purely communist form of government and of business, which would take from the individual all hope, aspiration, efficiency and initiative, would confiscate all existing wealth, would abolish private property rights and so, necessarily, the home; would crush in the human heart every spark of religious sentiment; yes, in the final analysis would go a great deal farther than all this—it would abandon the family relations and nationalize women and children.

This is not fiction. It is a fact. It is well-known to the proper officials of this government, but the minute they attempt to expose the movement through the press, for that is about all they can do under our laws, they are at once attacked from every side, these attacks coming from the headquarters of the Lenine Mind Poisoners' International Union, manufacturers of and dealers in moonshine doctrines. And those who are directing this movement do not deny it. They come frankly into the open boasting of it. Hundreds of lecturers every day and night are telling of the wonderful economic curative qualities of Herr Lenine's hooch. In this nation they are circulating over 600 publications proclaiming the virtues of bolshevistic moonshine—and of these papers over 500 of them are printed in foreign language in this country, or printed in foreign countries and shipped to the United States for circulation.

This movement is commonly referred to, at this time, as communism. Former Secretary of Labor Wilson, it will be recalled, declared the communist party of the United States an illegal organization because it openly pledged its members to engage in armed insurrection to overthrow the government of this country. Then the communist party went underground and set up, on the surface, a large number of organizations, most prominent among them being the Workers' party and the Trade Union Educational League. These, in turn, have formed many other organizations or absorbed existing organizations, many of which come with their objects concealed by a cloak of respectability, but all having the same purpose—create a form of unrest, distrust, ill-feeling and class hatred in the minds of the people that will speedily produce a "revolutionary spirit." In other words the moonshine mind poison hooch will take effect and produce deafness to fairness, blindness to the truth, a form of insanity that is dangerous to the nation, and finally death to government

of any kind. Many of these organizations have acquired sufficient respectability to get their speakers before schools, colleges, churches and in many instances even noon-day luncheon clubs, where their bootleg brand of mind poison is doled out in liberal doses yet camouflaged with the revenue stamp of purity and age.

This movement is not new. Under one form or another it has been operating in the United States for many years, and back of it here and in other nations is a well-arranged conspiracy. Authorities differ as to the source and age of this conspiracy, but all agree that it exists, and has existed, for many years. In the United States we have been inclined to call the whole movement socialism. Many high-minded, and loyal persons have given it their aid under this name, but when we were plunged into the World War, and they discovered the real purpose of this socialism, they left the movement and denounced it.

The same movement, with the same forces and influences behind it, overthrew the government of Russia and established what is called the workers' republic. If the idea inspiring those who changed this government was to better the conditions of the Russian people and establish there a better a real republic, we naturally ask, why it is these same leaders today are devoting their time, their energies and the money they stole from the old government and the people of wealth, in seeking to destroy the United States and other nations? Why, ask those who stop to reason, do they not devote their time, their energies and this illegally acquired wealth, to actually aiding the people of Russia, instead of denying them all forms of freedom and starving them to death by the millions? As a matter of fact, are those back of the Russian government, now seeking desperately to corrupt the balance of the world, merely concealing their real purpose—the overthrow of civilization and Christianity—behind a smoke-screen of idealistic statement?

Lenine and Trotsky no sooner placed their hands on the wealth of Russia than they started the movement to acquire, in the same easy manner, the wealth of the United States. A certain political party in this country became the Communist party, taking taking orders direct from Moscow. Its declaration of purposes and principles are treasonable. Hence, it became an illegal movement. At once there appeared in the office of the Worker's party, organized, guided and owned by the leaders in the illegal Communist party. It appears legal under our laws because while proposing exactly the same thing as the Communist party—that is the overthrow of this government by force—instead of using the term, "insurrection," it uses the term, "mass action," both carrying the same meaning. Then this legal organization began annexing existing movements that were frothy with a desire to abolish the "capitalist state," and began the formation of many others, each having its special work to perform. For instance, some to work among the women; some to work in the schools and colleges; some to "bore from within" the labor unions; some to branch out and glorify the product of the Lenine moonshine still to the so-called middle classes, and still others to peddle the same product to the farmers. Today its forces are in the South preaching the "revolutionary spirit" among the Negroes. Its agents are in many branches of government service. Its lecturers are found on public forums. Its ministers thunder forth every time opportunity is found, soviet doctrines caught in proper ministerial language. Farmers are approached daily by agents of this movement. Clever propaganda agents get their mind poison moonshine laudatory notices in the daily and weekly press of the nation. Insidiously and persistently, through these and many other agencies, the leaders of this movement have been engineering unrest, distrust, ill-feeling and class hatred in the minds of the American people.

By concealing truth or through deliberate and barefaced falsehoods, it has caused millions who are naturally inclined to magnify their financial and economic ills, to believe the cause of these ills, whether real or fancied, is found in the unfair, unjust and hypocritical control of the government by the "capitalist class," that the workers—and here they put farmers, small tradesmen, and many others in the workers' group—are denied their rights under the constitution; that the only possible relief lies in the organization of all such "workers" in one great fighting, militant body and wrest from those who have, that which they have acquired. And when

they find their recruits have become sufficiently deaf, blind and insane through drinking mind poison from the Lenine still, they point to Russia a sad example of what a real workers' republic can do for the common people. You must understand that to all such recruits, wonderful pictures are painted of Russia under the Lenine administration.

Strangely enough so cleverly is this character of bootleg doctrine doled out to the people of the United States that it is gaining great power and strength, and if any one doubts this power and strength which spells disaster unless checked, has but to look around him today and see what is going on in political, economic and industrial circles.

In September, 1922, a secret conference of the Communist party being held at Bridgman, Michigan, was raided by state and federal officers. A number of delegates were arrested and are now awaiting trial. Here the government secured a mass of incriminating documents, the contents and purport of which will all come out at the trial, no doubt. These documents show the many ramifications of the movement in the United States, ramifications which it is difficult to make the average loyal citizen believe could exist. One of the documents thus secured is exceedingly interesting in the light of certain recent political events. It has been given to the press. It was formulated in Moscow, Russia, and sent by a special messenger to be delivered to the leaders at the Bridgman gathering, as their guide for all future activities in the United States—guide until Lenine felt like sending another set of directions. It is headed, "Next task of the Communist party in America." It tells how to organize those who are not in sympathy with the movement, yet are easily persuaded. It urges, what it calls, the agrarian movement, and on this subject says:

"Mass organizations, which are not only not communistic but are not proletarian in composition, must be utilized by communist strategy for the benefit of the proletarian class struggle." As, for instance, "the existing mass movement of small farmers and even movements of the middle class farmers under some circumstances."

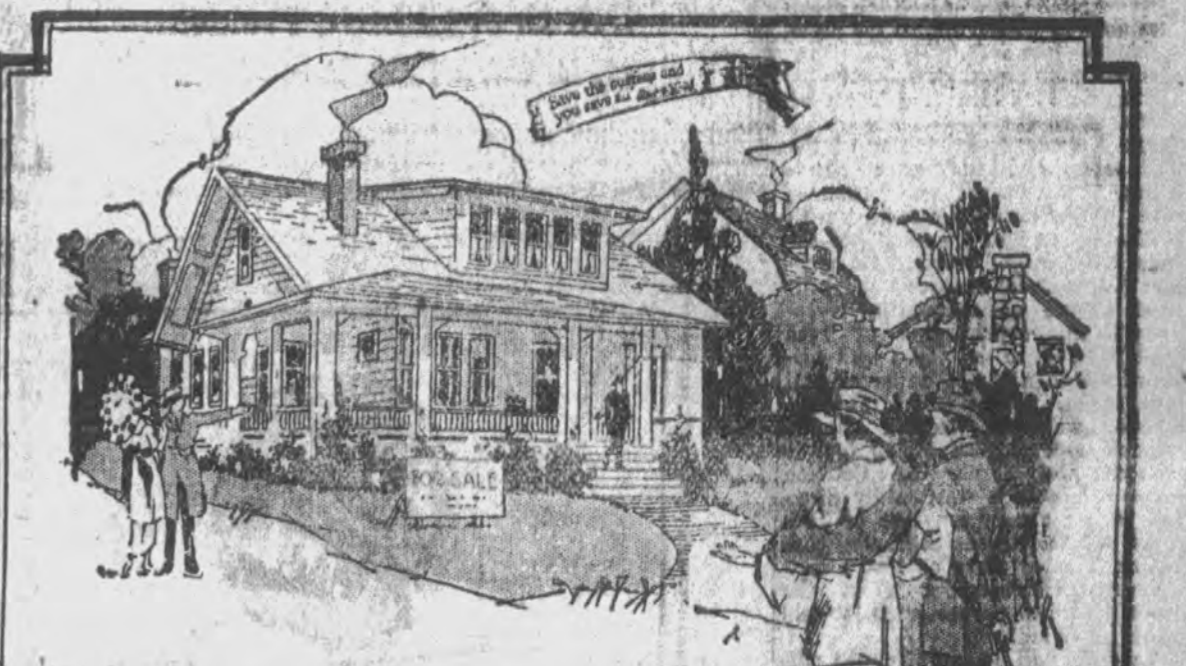

**HOLSTEINS MAKE NEW PRODUCTION RECORDS**

Chicago, Mar. 24.—(By Associated Press.)—The 1922 leaders in the seven classes of different ages of pure-bred Holstein cows produced an average of 29,055 pounds of milk and 1,250 pounds of butter in one year. In the full age and senior four year classes previous records were broken, according to a report of the national headquarters of the Holstein-Friesian Association.

During the year, 18,000 cows were tested for production and since the establishment of the official test 95,000 cows have passed the production required for their age, the report stated. All tests are supervised by state colleges of agriculture. Last year, 113,772 Holsteins were registered with the association.

In the full age class, May Walker Ollie Homestead, owned by the Minnesota Holstein Company at Austin, displaced Duchess Skylark Ormsby, a Washington state cow, with a production of 31,610 pounds milk and 1,523 pounds butter. Grubmohm Colantha Pauline Segis, a Minnesota cow, displaced another Minnesota cow in the senior four-year class with a record of 34,291 pounds milk and 1,426 pounds butter.

In the junior four-year class, Mamsell Johanna, owned by C. L. Spaulding of Warren, Minnesota, stood highest for the year with a record of 31,515 pounds milk and 1,317 pounds butter. Countess Matador Segis, the senior three-year champion from Washington, produced 25,817 pounds milk and 1,150 pounds butter. Junior three-year champion, Princess Makla Veeman, owned by Earl Graham of Compton, California, produced 29,029 pounds milk and 1,154 pounds butter. Colony Greteggna Valdessa, senior two-year champion, produced 28,371 pounds milk and 1,095 pounds butter. She is owned by Colony farm Escondale, B. C. In the junior two-year class, Daley Aaggie Ormsby, owned by John Erickson of Waupaca, Wisconsin, was high cow for the year. She produced 22,151 pounds milk and 1,088 pounds butter.

**THE AMERICAN CAPITAL TO REBUILD ANGORA**

Constantinople, March 29.—(By Associated Press.)—British commercial interests are giving much attention to the efforts of American business houses to obtain concessions from the Kemal government. The Federation of British Industries, in a letter to its members, points out the growing activities of American capitalists at Angor, and urges them not to overlook this economic invasion of Asia Minor.

The federation mentions the so-called Chester project for the construction of Angora as a modern capital, and says the plan calls for the building of an entirely new town, quite independent of the old capital. The city is to be constructed on wholly modern lines, embodying electric supply, telephones, broad skyscrapers, modern drainage and water supply and new government buildings.

Another American concern, it is stated, has made a proposal for the erection in different places in Anatolia of special workshops for the manufacture and repair of agricultural implements. To put this scheme into operation it is proposed to float a Turkish company, 90 per cent of whose capital would be supplied by Americans and the remainder by Turks, while the personal of the fac-

ories would be recruited from native labor. This proposal, it is said, has already been adopted in principle by the Ministry of National Economy.

Santo Domingo, Mar. 28.—(By Associated Press.)—The movement to erect on the island of Santo Domingo, in the West Indies, a powerful light-house as a memorial to Christopher Columbus, is to be furthered by the presence at the Pan-American Conference at Santiago this month of a special representative of the Dominican government. He is Tulio M. Cestero, author and diplomat, and he will formally present the project to the conference.
