Washington, April 9.—(By Associated Press.)—President Harding is back at his desk invigorated by five weeks vacation in the south and is ready to shoulder again the accumulation of official business. The President and Mrs. Harding arrived in Washington shortly after noon yesterday, the latter showing only the slightest evidence of fatigue from the sixteen hour journey. Her improved health was further shown by the fact that she walked through the station to the automobile at the entrance, where as on leaving here she was driven direct to her private car in the railroad yards.

NATIONAL HOSPITAL DAY ENDORSED BY PRESIDENT HARDING

Will be Observed Throughout the United States and Canada May 12th.

Chicago, April 9.—(By Associated Press.)—President Harding has indicated a lively interest in the efforts of the hospitals of the United States and Canada, to make the public better acquainted with their service and importance in their communities. He has endorsed the educational movement culminating in the observance of National Hospital Day, May 12.

"I most heartily extend my good wishes for the most useful results from your efforts," wrote Mr. Harding to Matthew O. Foley, Chicago, executive secretary of the National Hospital Day committee, which has general direction of the international program. "It is especially a pleasure to express my interest in the work of National Hospital Day, which seeks to arouse the largest possible public interest in the work of the country's hospitals and similar institutions. You have most properly chosen May 12, the anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, as National Hospital Day."

"One of the finest and most humane products of our civilization is the hospital," continues President Harding's endorsement, "and every activity which aims to assure its advantages to an increasing number of people deserves all possible encouragement."

E. S. Gilmore, superintendent, Wesley Memorial Hospital, Chicago, general chairman of the National Hospital Day committee, and Dr. M. T. MacEachern, Ottawa, president-elect of the American Hospital Association and National Hospital day chairman for Canada, expect a majority of all the hospitals of North America to have a program May 12, which will attract more than 1,000,000 people to the institutions.

TENDER YEARS OF DEFENDANT SAVES HIM OF LONG TERM

Claude Mills Receives Mercy of Court in His Violation of the New Liquor Laws

There were but a few cases docketed in County Court for this morning's session, and adjournment was taken before the noon hour. The carrying of fighting irons and offenses brought about by the use of common liquor were the principals this morning.

Claude Mills, a young white boy of Chicod township who was arrested last week in Ayden with a small bottle of liquor on his person which is in violation of the recently enacted liquor law, pleaded guilty and because of tender years Judge Cooper rendered judgment that defendant be hired out to his mother for a period of twelve months. And prayer is continued for a period of two years for his good behavior.

Ernest Henderson pleaded guilty to carrying concealed weapon. WOMAN REPROVES MEN FOR TAX LAWS

Contents That Women Are Equally Competent With Men for Legislative Service

Indianapolis, Ind., April 9.—(By Associated Press.)—Miss Elizabeth Rainey, Indiana's only woman member of the general assembly which recently closed, says that after attending a party caucus she told one of the caucus members that "Now I have more respect for the Ladies Aid Societies."

"Of course, one cannot tell what occurred in the caucus. It was my first, and it was one of the real thrills I got out of the session," Miss Rainey added.

In describing her experiences as a legislator Miss Rainey said she took her seat with the feeling that she was the only representative who knew nothing about the workings of the legislature, but it did not take her long to discover that about 75 per cent of the members were in the same fix. "During the first half of the session," she continued, "virtually all the activity was carried on by six or seven members, but by the end of the session it sometimes seemed that every member was demanding recognition at the same moment."

Miss Rainey was unfavorably impressed by the scant attention the representatives were able to give the various bills. Some of them were so long, she declared, that the legislators had to take the word of the author as to what the bill proposed to do.

Women are equally competent with men for legislative service, Miss Rainey contended. She expressed amusement at what she termed the antics of the men on the last day of the session, when many verbal combats took place and physical encounters were narrowly averted. "I have had some amusement trying to figure out what would be said of a group of women which behaved as did the members of the House on the last night," said Miss Rainey. "No excuse, I am sure, could have been found for them."

Miss Rainey declared it was her opinion that there were not enough lawyers in the legislature. She does not care for a second term.

THE COUNTY OF PITT

One of the 32 Counties Still
Existing Which Were Formed
Before 1776

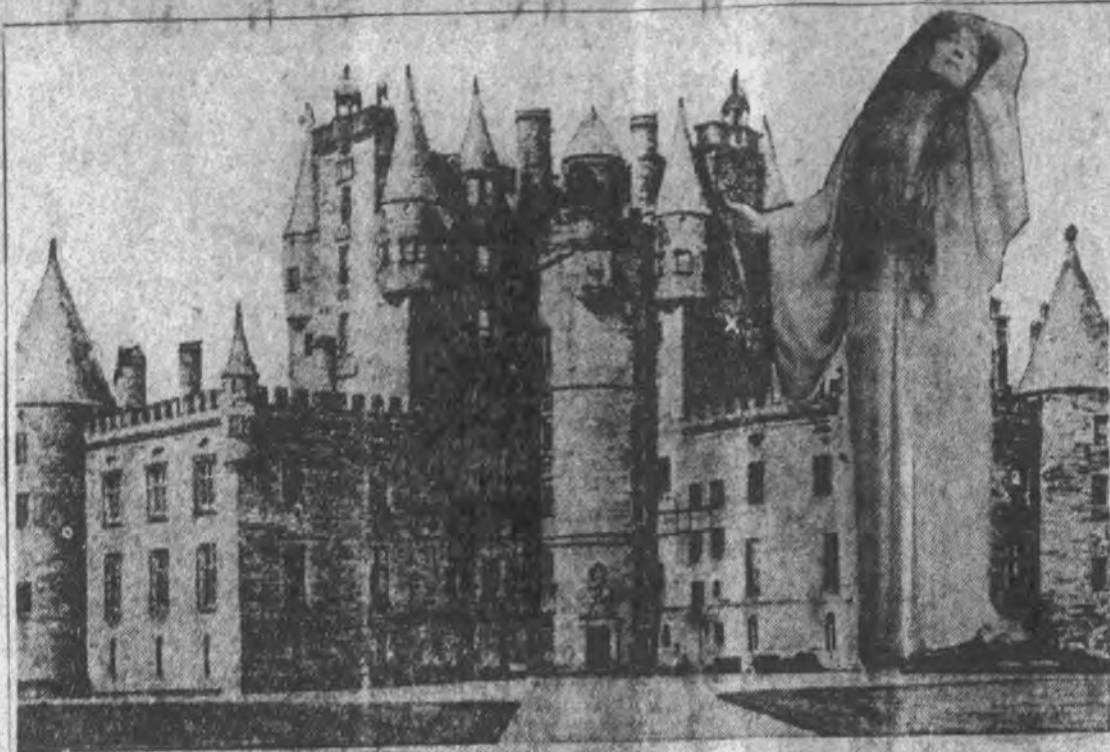

The following history of Pitt county
taken from The Orphans' Friend
and Masonic Journal and compiled by
Col. Fred A. Olds will be of interest
to people throughout the county.

"In the lower house of the General
Assembly, in session at Wilmington
November 24, 1760, a bill was intro-
duced 'for erecting the upper part
of Beaufort county into the county
of Pitt and the parish of St. Michael
and for adjoining the court of
Beaufort county from the court house
on the lands of Michael Bonner to
the court house at Bath Town.' The
bill became a law with the signature
Gov. Dobbs December 3rd. It provid-
ed that after January 1, 1761, the
court of Pitt should be constantly
held in Bath Town. John Hardy,
John Simpson, William Spier, George
May and Isaac Buck were appointed
by the act commissioners to build a
suitable court house and prison, at
the house of John Hardy, on the
south side of Tar river, near the chap-
el known by the name of Hardy's
chapel, until a court house was built.
The freeholders were ordered to meet
at John Hardy's house on Easter in
May, 1761, and elect 12 vestry-
men of the parish.

The county was named for William
Pitt, the Earl of Clarendon, who was
greatly beloved by the people of North
Carolina, who knew him to be their
friend. For him the county of son
Chatham and its county town, Pitts-
boro, were also named.

house, in 1764 provided for in-
spection-places and landings for re-
ceiving the commodities to be ship-
ped. Those places were William
Spier's, Salter's, Redbanks, and Ty-
con's, all river landings. A return
of taxables, etc., to the Governor in
1765 said there were 750 taxable
white men and 429 negroes; total
1,179. Governor William Tryon in
1767 said there were 775 white tax-
ables, that Pitt was "a small county,
but willing to make provision for a
minister."

The following year when the jus-
tices of Pitt met to hold the county
court (the court of pleas and quar-
ter sessions) some of them openly
declared that they want a court held
and the list of taxables returned to
it, because in such a case nobody
would serve as sheriff "on account of
the difficulty and hazard which at-
tend the collection of taxes." So no
court was held, owing to this state-
ment made by John Simpson and two
other prominent justices; Simpson
being also a member of the Assem-
bly. The latter body was informed
of the matter by William Moore, who
heard Simpson make the declaration.
Investigated and found the facts as
stated. Simpson was found "guilty of
a high misdemeanor and his conduct
in preventing a sitting of the inferior
court greatly injurious to the public
and detestable to this House and he
is commanded to appear at the bar of
this House and there receive a severe
censure and reprimand by the speak-
er." Simpson had no defense and on
his knees, "before the bar" received
the punishment as required in such
cases.

The Pitt regiment of militia was
called out December 5th, 1770, to
rendezvous at the Pitt Court House
under Col. Simpson, to march to New
Bern which was threatened by the up-
country "Regulators," and 358 men
attended.

The General Assembly in 1771
passed an act stating that upon the
consent of Richard Evans, who own-
ed the land, the town of Martinbor-
ough be laid off, 100 acres, the lots
to be sold at 50 shillings each, the
subscribers to "draw lots" for them.
But Evans in his lifetime did not
consent to the sale, so the matter
remained until 1774, when the General
Assembly in another act said his wi-
dow had conveyed the land to the com-
missioners. Martinborough was de-
clared to be the county seat and
the Charles Forbes, Henry Ellis, Ben-
jamin May, George Evans and William
Armstrong were directed to build the
court house, jail, etc. The freehold-
ers of the town were directed to meet
at John Hardy's house on Easter in
May, 1775, and elect town com-
missioners. The town was named for
Josiah Martin, the last of the Royal
Governors.

Part of Dobbs county was added
to Pitt in 1771. In 1772 Edward
Salter was clerk of court, John Simp-
son, George May, and Richard Blount
trustees, but it was not a "seminary
of learning as named in the Consti-
tution." The same act changed the
name of Martinsboro to Greenville.
(It is spelled Greenville in the act.)
It was named in honor of General
Nathaniel Greene of the Revolution-
ary army.

gave Pitt 1,461 free white males over

The county has furnished a govern-
or, Thomas J. Jarvis. The members
of the Provincial House of Commons,
1762-1775, were John Hardy, William
Spier, George Moye, John Simpson,
John Spier, Richard Evans, Alexander
Stewart, George Evans, Edward Sal-
ter. The county furnished the fol-
lowing Councillors of State, 1776-
1868: John Simpson, James Arm-
strong, Fenner B. Satterthwaite,
Superior court judge, Harry W. Whe-
bee. Members of the first legislature

and legislation flow." It was also re-
solved that John Simpson and Ed-
ward Salter "attend the general con-
vention of this Province at New Bern
August 25 and there exert their ut-
most abilities in preventing the grow-
ing system of Ministerial Despotism
which now threatens the destruction
of America, and that you our depu-
ties may be acquainted with the sen-
timents of the people of this county
it is their opinion that you proceed
to choose proper persons to represent
this Province in a General Congress
of America; that these delegates be
instructed to a declaration of Ameri-
can rights setting forth that British
America and all its inhabitants shall
be and remain in due subjection to
the Crown of England and to the il-
lustrious family on the throne; sub-
mitting by their own voluntary act
and enjoying all their free chartered
rights and liberties as British free
subjects. That it is the first law of
legislation and of the British Consti-
tution that no man be taxed but by
his own consent, expressed by him-
self or by his legal representatives.

Another strong declaration for li-
berty was made by this committee of
Safety at Martinborough July 1, 1775,
John Simpson presiding; and over
100 men signed it. County patrols
were formed. No person was allowed
to serve in any public capacity with-
out taking the committee's oath. The
Provincial congress appointed John
Simpson Colonel, Robert Salter P.
col., George Evans and Jarvis Arm-
strong majors of the Pitt militia. The
county imported from abroad a
quantity of gunpowder for the use
of the Province, and also brought in
salt, which it "sold at 5 shillings a
bushel to each family, according to
their necessities." A company of
troops were sent to Gen. John Ashe's
brigade defending Wilmington; John
Salter its captain, and in 1778 the
county sent 35 men to fill the Con-
tinental battalions. In 1780 a Pitt
company, 100 men, was at Kinston,
on its way to join Gen. Richard Cas-
well. John Simpson was at that
date brigadier general. In 1781
Gen. Lillington had 150 Pitt men
with him in his brigade which was
fighting British and Tories from Wil-
mington.

SWEDISH SYSTEM HELPS
PAY RENT AND TAXES

Stockholm, April 7. — (By Associated Press.)—In Sweden a man does not have to remember to pay his rent, his income tax, or his insurance premiums, nor suffer the penalty of forgetting, if he joins the General Installment Fund and Payment Bureau, a co-operative service institution which announces the completion of his organization in Stockholm.

This unique bureau is organized for the purpose of relieving its members of all personal worry and inconvenience in making payments of all monthly, quarterly, semi-annual, or other periodic dues, and general to encourage thrift and financial preparedness for meeting such personal obligations.

The operation of the bureau is as follows: Membership is secured by paying an admission fee of three crowns, or about 75 cents, and membership dues of 2.50 crowns. The member then instructs his employer to deduct weekly or monthly allotments from his pay. These are sent direct to the bureau, and must be large enough so that the sums accrued will cover the payments of rent, light bills, insurance premiums, taxes, and other recurring dues which the bureau meets on account of the member. There are even loan funds at the disposal of members who are in arrears upon entrance.

Besides the handling of general installments for the interest of its members a saving department is maintained, as well as a department for the writing of insurance policies.

A leader in the fight on the common barberry bush and the black stem rust of wheat for the United States Department of Agriculture, as well as the university, Dr. Stakman toured all the countries of western Europe last year in his investigations to determine the connection of the bush and the destructive rust.

The Pan-Pacific Scientific Congress meets every three years, and is an organization for the consideration by scientists of various problems of peculiar interest to the islands of the Pacific.

PACKING INTERESTS BENEFITED BY NEW ACT SAYS WALLACE

Washington, April 8.—After many months of antagonism, and the delay caused by the test of its constitutionality, the Packers and Stockyards Act is now established on a solid basis and its administration is contributing directly and effectively to the good of the live stock industry, Secretary Wallace of the Department of Agriculture announced in a statement just made public. Some noteworthy achievements have been recorded and leaders in the live stock and meat industry declare the act has brought about friendly and better contacts between the packers, producers, exchanges, cooperatives, and stockyards companies.

One of the most striking developments is the informal and promptly effective manner in which most complaints are being settled. Last phase of the work of the Packers and Stockyards Administration, Mr. Wallace says, is the reason, for as well as indicative of, the confidence placed in its men by the various interest concerned.

The law, in operation since August 15, 1921, is designed to prevent and correct irregularities and abuses such as unfair, discriminatory, or deceptive practices, the control of prices, and unjust rates or charges in the live stock and meat industry of the country. Under the direction of Chester Morris, assistant to the Secretary of Agriculture, the Packers and Stockyards Administration has been built up as a separate unit of the Department of Agriculture with divisions handling trade practices; rates, charges and registrations; audits and accounts, economics, and law. Live stock market supervisors are maintained at 19 principal stockyards. These supervisors visit others of the 60 stockyards under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of Agriculture. Approximately 5,000 dealers, commission firms, and other market agencies at these yards are supervised by the Administration's men. They are available every market day, handling complaints right on the ground and

anticipating them as far as possible. Nineteen formal complaints, the last being the Armour-Morris merger for which hearing was set for April 2, had been docketed up to March 1. Final decisions have been handed down in six of these cases, and other decisions will be announced soon.

RICE DEARER IN JAPAN
Tokio, April 9. — (By Associated Press.)—Despite last year's bumper crop the price of rice in February was yen 30 a koku, having risen yen 5 since the beginning of the year. This compares with an average price of yen 19.18 in 1917 and yen 38.29 in 1919.

The purchase by the government of a million koku of last year's crop, with a view of stabilizing the market, is held by some to be responsible for the present comparatively high price.

OPEN PUBLIC FORUM

Ancient Pillars Support Flapping Refugee Rags; American Red Cross Aids



Between the pillars of the Temple of Theseus, in Athens, said to be the most perfectly preserved of all the beautiful edifices erected by the ancients, Greek and Armenian refugees cook and wash and hang their clothes to dry. All Greece today presents strange contrasts of glorious relics and modern misery. More than 1,000,000 homeless, jobless refugees have inundated the port towns of Greece.

The American Red Cross has accepted full responsibility on behalf of American charity for aiding in the refugee emergency. Out of its disaster emergency fund the organization has purchased \$2,600,000 worth of food, medicine, blankets and other supplies and sent them to Greece.

A staff of experienced American executives is handling the distribution of America's gift through the Red Cross to the stricken refugees. American doctors, using Red Cross supplies, have thrown a sanitary cordon around the port towns and have successfully ward off the invasion of cholera, typhus and smallpox that menaced all Greece. Judge John Barton Payne, Chairman of the American Red Cross, has put the entire Greek program under the direction of Colonel William N. Haskell, who gained a world reputation for efficient administration of the American Relief Administration program in Russia and other great American charitable efforts.

Colonel Haskell and his associates in the field report that all of the needy among the refugees are



being aided, that actual suffering has therefore been virtually obliterated and that the problem will rapidly resolve itself into one of permanent solution rather than charity. When the summer harvest comes in, Colonel Haskell believes, duty so far as emergency help is concerned, and international authorities must find the way to end what remains, a need due to the presence of 1,000,000 unassimilated additions to the population of a nation whose government frankly pleads inability to absorb the influx.

WOMEN STUDENTS EXCEL

London, April 6.—(By Associated Press.)—The answer to the question of whether women have a higher moral sense than men will be found in the affirmative if the experience of the Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland is taken as a deciding factor. The Trust undertakes to provide funds for students wishing to enter colleges, and though they are under no obligation, they are expected to repay what money they can.

Sir David Prain, at a recent meeting of the trustees, said that the number of women students who repaid their fees during 1922 was considerably larger than the number of men. Last year 39 former students repaid \$1,387 to the fund, making the total amount repaid \$12,500, or one and a third percent of the money advanced.

It was brought out at the committee meeting that pre-war conditions had so far returned as to justify the committee in reducing the value of the annual scholarships from \$200 to \$150.

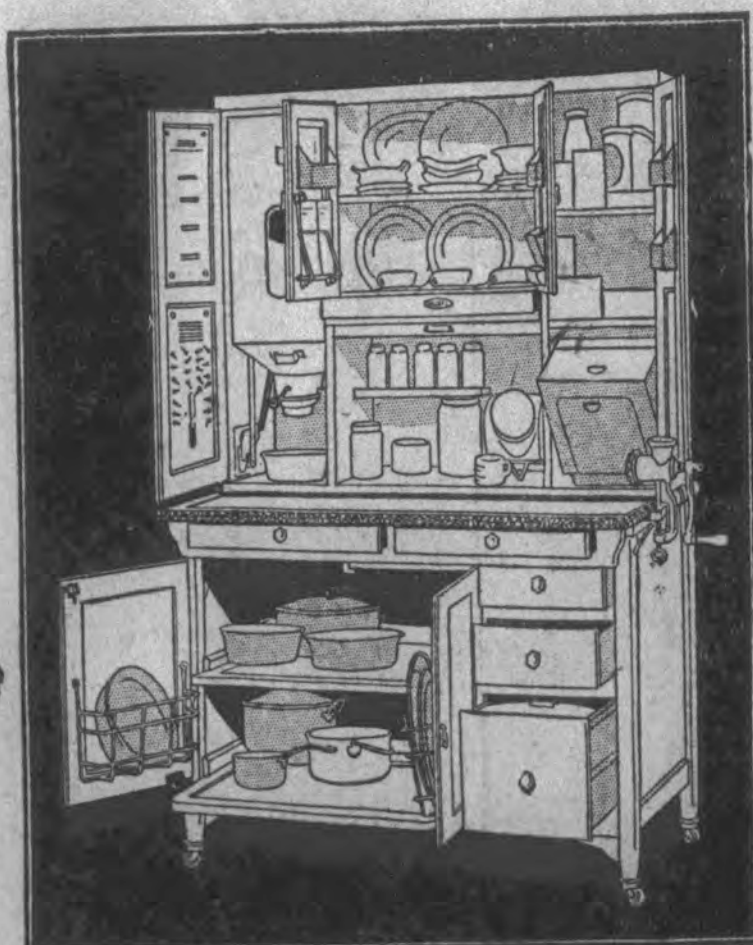
