KU KLUX ISSUE NOT TO BE DISCUSSED AT SOLDIERS' REUNION

General Carr Declares Empathically He is Against Question Being Broached

New Orleans, April 10.—(By Associated Press.)—Just when it seemed that the Ku Klux Klan was going to break the United Confederate Veterans asunder, General Julian S. Carr, of Durham, N. C., Commander-in-Chief of the Reunion, declared emphatically that he was against the question of the Klan being broached at the reunion and that he would stop any attempt to bring up on the floor of the convention.

It was said that members of the Ku Klux in the organization would withdraw if Governor John M. Parker was allowed to address the convention Wednesday. General Carr admitted that he was a member of the Klan but would stand for no Klan domination as a Kluxer and a friend of Governor Parker. Louisiana's executive will address the audience, but "we fear no breach" General Carr announced. Governor Parker will not talk on the Klan, however.

The North Carolina delegations here are quartered at the Greenwald St. Charles and De Soto hotels and they have come determined to make themselves heard. It is said that a great battle will be waged to again name General Carr head of this organization although he has said that he will decline the honor again.

Lieutenant Colonel P. P. Zimmerman of Charlotte, North Carolina, is busy here looking up old friends, B. V. Holcomb, of Roanoke, Va., but who served with the Twenty-eighth North Carolina Infantry, has been about the North Carolina headquarters most of the day looking after the boys he fought with.

The North Carolina veterans are taking New Orleans by storm. Union county has the largest number of veterans, they are bringing with them a brass band of 20 pieces, Alamance county has the second largest delegation of veterans. Granville county sent Dr. W. N. Thomas with their veterans. The Franklin county veterans have with them "Uncle John" Thomas, over 90 years old, who went with his master, C. H. Thomas, of Louisiana, all during the war.

Many social affairs have been given in honor of the North Carolina sponsor, Miss Mary Louise Everett, and her maids Misses Margaret Roney Hadley Woodard, Martha Fairly and the Matron of Honor, Mrs. James H. Cordon. Among the functions was a delightful trip given by Col. S. S. Nash and a tea by Mrs. Henry Money, of New Orleans, at Le Patio Royale.

SIV ARE INJURED WHEN DRIVER LOSE CONTROL OF FORD CAR

Whiteville April 10.—Mrs. Henry Bullard was seriously hurt and her five companions more or less seriously shaken up when she lost control of a Ford on the Chadbourne road yesterday. The Ford evidently being driven at a high rate of speed ran off a five foot embankment striking the front of the car against the ground and cut a complete somersault landing on its side with no more damage than a demolished top and broken windshields.

Mrs. Bullard is understood to have received several ugly cuts and internal injuries. It is generally understood that a tire bursting was the cause of the accident.

OWSLEY SPEAKS AT VETERANS REUNION

Declares That Corrupt Exploitation of Veterans' Bureau Must End

New Orleans, La., April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—There must be an end to the corrupt exploitations of the Veterans' Bureau, Alvin Owsley, National Commander of the American Legion, declared before the annual reunion here of the United Confederate Veterans, adding that the legion favors an immediate investigation of that department. Owsley extended greetings on behalf of the legion and paid glowing tribute to the warriors of the South and in explaining the spirit actuating the legion and what it hoped to accomplish, he launched into a bitter attack upon what he termed political inefficiency of the bureau.

FOUR PRISONERS ESCAPED FROM STATE HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE LAST NIGHT

Mattawan, N. LAW ELIMINATING PULLMAN CHARGES FOUGHT BY ROADS

Claim That Law Cancelling Pullman Surcharge is Discriminatory

Washington, April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—The railroads of North Carolina are now fighting the State of North Carolina as to the cancellation of the Pullman sleeping and parlor car surcharges which was ordered by the recent session of the North Carolina General Assembly as to intrastate travel, and have taken the matter to Interstate Commerce Commission, filing a petition declaring that undue and unreasonable preference and advantage is given intrastate commerce to the disadvantage of interstate commerce and to discriminate against it. The commission has upon this petition ordered an investigation as to this charge and as to what fare should be charged by the railroads, subject to the jurisdiction of the Interstate Commerce Commission operating within North Carolina being made parties to the proceedings. The formal announcement of the commission as to this matter affecting surcharges for transportation of passengers in sleeping or parlor cars between points in the State of North Carolina is as follows:

"It appearing that by virtue of increased rates in 1920, carriers operating within the State of North Carolina were permitted to establish a surcharge upon passengers traveling interstate in sleeping and parlor cars amounting to fifty per cent of the charge for space in such cars.

"It further appearing that a petition has been filed on behalf of all steam railroads operating in the State of N. C. averring that the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, by act ratified March 3, 1923, required the cancellation of the said surcharge for the transportation of passengers in sleeping or parlor cars between points within the State of North Carolina, resulting in charges for intrastate traffic which are less than those permitted by this commission for intrastate traffic, as set forth in the preceding paragraph—

"It further appearing that said petitioners allege that the observance by themselves of said act of the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina will cause and result in undue and unreasonable preference and advantage to intrastate commerce, to the undue and unreasonable prejudice and disadvantage of interstate commerce and will result in unjust and unreasonable discrimination against interstate commerce

"And it further appearing that by the said petition there have been brought in issue charges imposed by the authority of the State of North Carolina.

COUNSEL PREDICTS THAT INVESTIGATION BUREAU WILL REVEAL DISHONESTY

Washington, April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—Prediction that "dishonesty on a pretty big scale" will be revealed "here and there" by the Senate investigation of the Veterans Bureau has been made by John O'Ryan, special counsel for the investigating committee, on a basis of information gathered by him in a preliminary survey of conditions.

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DRAINAGE ASSO. TO MEET IN NEW BERN NEXT WEDNESDAY

Interesting Program Has Been Arranged and Large Attendance is Desired

The North Carolina Drainage Association will meet in New Bern on Wednesday, April 18th. A large attendance is desired and a most interesting program has been arranged.

Every intelligent owner of land appreciates the relation of efficient drainage to cross production to public health and to the construction of public roads. A large proportion of our lands in Eastern North Carolina require drainage and consist of some of our most fertile soils. Many farms, some of which have been cultivated for generations, have never been effectively drained, with the result that crops production is frequently impaired with occasional total destruction.

This movement can only be carried forward successfully by co-operative efforts of intelligent citizens and for this reason the Drainage Association is planning for the meeting to be held in New Bern. Great things are expected to result from it.

ITALIAN QUEEN PREPARES TO ENTERTAIN BRITISH RULERS

Rome, April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—Queen Helena of Italy has been dividing her time between preparations for the wedding of her daughter, Yolanda, and the preparations for the visit of the king and queen of Great Britain, which is to take place next May.

The royal visitors are to be the guests of the Italian sovereign and will occupy the entire south wing of the Quirinal palace.

As the queen of England has never visited Italy before, not even as a princess, special arrangements are planned to make her stay here interesting and enjoyable. Queen Mary's desire to have two or three days entirely devoted to sightseeing will be respected.

CONVICT GANG BOSS UNDER INDICTMENT ON CHARGES BEATING MEN CRUELLY

McClenny, Fla., April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—John Rodenbury, convict gang boss at the Baker county turpentine camp of State Senator Knabb is under indictment by the county grand jury on charges of treating convicts cruelly. The charges were made by Paul Bevere, seventeen-year-old white Washington youth, who claimed he was flogged unmercifully as often as twice daily while serving a sentence for vagrancy. He was leased to Knabb by the county.

HARDING THINKS IT IS TOO EARLY TO DISCUSS POLITICS

Has a Work to Perform and Duty to Fulfill Unhampered by Politics

Washington, April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—President Harding took occasion today to let it be known emphatically that he regards the present political discussion relative to his candidacy in 1924 as most premature and furthermore, that he will forego his contemplated western trip rather than make it as a political leader.

Mr. Harding, it was said at the White House, as insistently adhered to the proposition that the present is not the time to discuss a possible candidacy in 1924 and that the president has a work to perform and a duty to fulfill unhampered by political discussions and predictions.

But in another way, it was asserted at Mr. Harding regarded it as unfortunate that a president could not for at least the first three years of his administration proceed without having to divert a portion of his time and energy to political matters.

The disclosure of the proposed trip brought out that the chief executive felt that his visit to Panama prior to his inauguration has aided him greatly in dealing with matters relating to the Canal Zone, and was extremely anxious to get first hand information as to conditions in Alaska. The first half of Mr. Harding's administration, it was said demonstrated the need of this information in the solution of problems involving conflicts of jurisdiction.

To make this information available to those directly concerned with the administration of Alaskan affairs, the president it was said, proposed to take several members of the cabinet with him. The White House spokesmen did not say what cabinet members would accompany the executive, but Secretary Work of the Interior Department recently made the statement that he and Secretary Wallace of the Agricultural Department probably would visit Alaska during the summer and it was officially intimated today that Secretary Hoover of the Department of Commerce would be a member of the presidential party.

These three departments are most intimately connected with the administration of Alaskan affairs, the civil government of the territory being under the interior department, the forest service being in the department of agriculture and the bureau of fisheries, another of the government agencies interested in Alaska being a component part of the department of commerce.

MERCHANT ROBBED AND IS BEATEN TO DEATH

Elizabeth City, April 10.—Nehemiah D. Pendleton, a Weaverville merchant, died in a hospital here today from the effects of a blow delivered when he was robbed last night. He was found lying in a pool of blood between his store and boarding house and presumably was robbed of cash he was taking home after closing the store.

He was brought here last night for treatment while in an unconscious condition.

There is no clue as to the identity of Mr. Pendleton's assailant, but it is thought that he must have been attacked by some one who saw him count his money, put it in his pocket and lock up to go home.

Mr. Pendleton was unmarried. He is survived by a brother, H. D. Pendleton, of this city, ticket agent of the Norfolk Southern Railway.

surrender of the Confederate Army.
Only one member of his staff is now
living and he is expected to attend
the re-union in New Orleans. He
will no doubt, be given a cordial wel-
come and treated with the honor due
him. Major Giles Backner Cooke
was not only a brave soldier, but a
great man and served on General
Lee's staff as inspector general from
1864 until the end of the war.

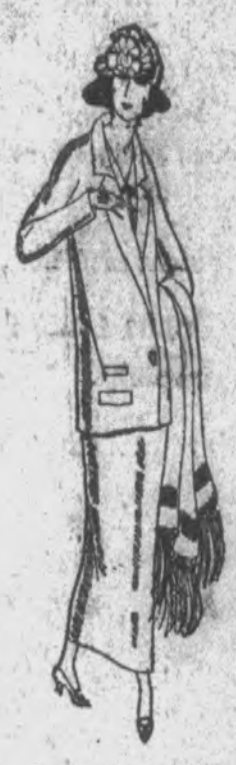

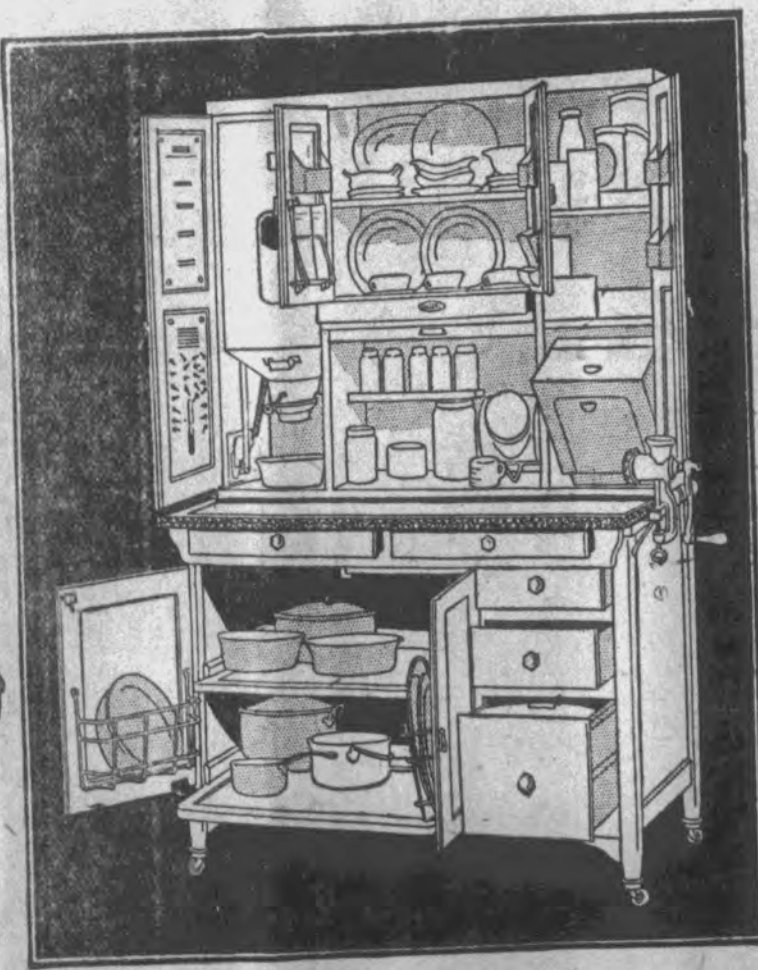
