EVANGELIST WAGES MILLION DOLLAR SIXTY-MINUTE FIGHT AGAINST SIN AT TENT

**Evangelist Dunaway Says the
Greatest Peril to Civilization
is Menace of Immorality**

Preaching to a crowd that almost
taxed the capacity of the big Mc-
Adams tent, the Rev. Mr. Dunaway
last night delivered his sermon on
"Sin." It was a scathing indictment
of present day morals and customs,
and hit home among the hundreds of
people who had come from far and
wide to hear his preaching.

Mr. and Miss Eden again conduct-
ed the song service, which included
mass singing and duets by themselves.
Seldom have the people of this com-
munity had the pleasure of listening to
such inspired singers as they are.

Just before Rev. Mr. Dunaway be-
gan his sermon, Rev. Mr. Scoville an-
nounced that instead of passing the
plate every night to secure funds to
defray incidental expenses, it had been
decided to raise the entire amount of
\$250 by subscriptions voluntarily
made, and asked for contributions.
Therewith was immediate, and in a
few minutes more than the amount
was raised.

"The greatest peril to our civiliza-
tion today is the menace of immorali-
ty" was the opening sentence of Mr.
Dunaway as he began his sixty min-
ute assault upon the contributing
factors to present day immorality.
Citing other nations that have been
and passed and gone because of the
vice of immorality, he showed that
this nation was headed in the same
direction, and would come to the same
end unless we called a halt and made
an about face towards the Gospel
of the Bible. The late world war was
the result of the greatest wave of im-
morality that has ever swept the
world, he said, and it is still sweep-
ing religion and Christianity aside,
and destroying home life in the na-
tion. "The purity of woman is the
rampart of civilization, and when
you break that down you have paved
the road to hell," he exclaimed at the
conclusion of a terrific arraignment
of the modern day pleasures that
point that way. Dirty shows, motion
pictures and dancing he characterized
as the greatest elements of evil that
ever came out of hell.

He called on all Christians to take
a stand now against these things be-
fore it is too late, and to combat
with all their force and power these
devilish forces of evils that are gnaw-
ing at the vitals of our civilization.
There will be services tonight at the
usual hour, and with interest in the
meeting rapidly mounting, it is ex-
pected that the crowds will fill the
tent.

SENATOR HANNA'S YACHT DRAFTED BY CHINESE NAVY

Manila, P. I., April 11.—(By Asso-
ciated Press.)—The yacht El Aguilas,
formerly owned by the late Senator
Mark Hanna, of Ohio, is soon to be
seen in action as a Chinese gunboat
on the Yangtze river, according to
Chau Chiao, a local Chinese firm
which has just purchased the craft
from the Philippine department of
the United States army for \$6,025.
The yacht was built in 1892 and
was named the "Commanche." It was
taken over by the navy during the
war and the named changed to the
"Frolic." Later it passed to the
army, and again became El Aguilas.

JOHN E. HUGHES PLANT RUNNING AT FULL CAPACITY

**Employing Three Hundred
Colored Hands, Totalling
Around 15 Hours Per Day**

Though it is now the time for an
off season in the tobacco world of
this city a visit to the John E. Hughes
and Company plant will cause one
to change their opinion regarding the
running at full capacity employing
about three hundred colored hands
working in shifts totalling around
fifteen hours per day with a weekly
payroll of around two thousand dol-
lars.

The Greenville branch of the firm is
known as their main eastern plant
and according to a statement from
Mr. H. A. Bost, manager of the local
branch, the present activities are
made possible by the ever growing
demand for Camel cigarettes for
which this tobacco is to be used. Ac-
cording to an article recently appear-
ing in one of the tobacco journals it
was estimated that if the yearly out-
put of these cigarettes was placed end
to end that the long line would en-
circle the globe approximately forty-
times, a distance of a million miles.
Besides representing R. J. Reynolds
Company on the local market, the
firm buys independently for both
domestic and foreign trade. The to-
bacco now being worked over at the
plant, however, was purchased for
Reynolds on other markets in North
and South Carolina and shipped here
for handling.

GOLF EXPERT VISITS THE LOCAL COUNTRY CLUB SITE

Mr. Pack Redmond, golf expert
and professional player at the Caro-
lin Country Club, Raleigh, was here
yesterday looking over the property
recently purchased by the Greenville
Country Club, with the view of lay-
ing out and the construction of the
golf course here.

Mr. Redmond was unstinted in
his praise of the beautiful site and
said that it compared favorably with
some of the most famous clubs in the
country. It is rumored that after
several other experts have been con-
sulted that construction of the local
links will begin.

TORNADO INJURES SEVERAL PERSONS

books for each ward and all regis-
tration will be according to the wards.
The schedule can be found in this
issue under the heading of "Regis-
tar's Notice."

Twenty days will be given to this
and every citizen who has not regis-
tered and who desires to vote in the
May primary should not fail to re-
gister, if so he forfeits his right to
vote.

EGYPTIAN COTTON CONTRACT RENEWED

**Transportation Agreement Be-
tween United Kingdom and
America Renewed**

London, April 12.—(By Associat-
ed Press.)—A dispatch to the Times
from Cairo says that it is understood
that the agreement between the
United States Shipping Board and the
Liverpool Conference Lines re-
garding transportation of the Egypt-
ian cotton crop to the United King-
dom and America is automatically
renewed for another year owing to
neither side having denounced the
agreement.

HOLLAND TO CELEBRATE 25 YEARS OF WILHELMINA

The Hague, April 12.—(By Asso-
ciated Press.)—To celebrate the 25th
anniversary of the beginning of the
reign of Queen Wilhelmina, festivals
will be held this summer and fall
throughout Holland.

The attachment of the Dutch people
to the house of Orange and the per-
sonal devotion of the nation to the
queen is expected to result in an en-
thusiastic display of love and loyalty.
The celebrations will depict not only
the present prosperity of the land, but
the past welfare of Holland under
the House of Orange will be set forth
by pageants, historical processions,
etc.

The festivals will present a picture
of whatever is most characteristic of
the various provinces of Holland. The
costumes of the peasants, the picture-
que backgrounds afforded by the cities
themselves, the quaint old-fashioned
sports, such as tilting at the ring etc.
will show the charm of Holland in a
novel way. Not only are the more
important cities of Amsterdam, Rot-
terdam, The Hague, etc., planning
festivities on a large scale, but even
the smaller towns and villages will
vie with one another in doing all they
can to make the celebrations a suc-
cess.

TOBACCO GROWERS WIN DECISION OF SUPREME COURT

**Hands Down Opinion Holding
Co Operative Statute Consti-
tutional; Contracts Valid**

Raleigh, N. C., April 12.—The To-
bacco Growers Co-operative Associa-
tion yesterday won from the Supreme
Court, in affirmation of Judge Frank
Daniels, in Nash court, a decision that
puts the stamp of constitutionality
upon the statute under which it was
organized, approves its machinery of
operation, and endorses it as "the
most hopeful movement ever inaugu-
rated to obtain justice for and im-
prove the financial condition of farm-
ers and laborers."

The opinion in the case, entitled
"Tobacco Growers Co-operative Asso-
ciation vs. W. T. Jones," was written
by Chief Justice Walter Clark, and
is an elaborate recital not only of the
contentions in the action brought by
the Association against a member for
violation of the co-operative contract,
but of the history of the co-operative
movement.

The defendant, W. T. Jones, of
Nash, notwithstanding his co-opera-
tive contract, according to the facts in
the case, sold part of his 1922 crop
of tobacco on the warehouse floor and
announced that he would not deliver
any more of his tobacco to the Asso-
ciation. The action was brought by
the Association for liquidated dam-
ages covering the tobacco already
sold and for an injunction to prevent
further breach of contract, and the
defendant, appealed from the order
for an injunction issued by Judge
Frank Daniels in Nash county in
October, 1922.

The defendant contended that the
co-operative marketing act is uncon-
stitutional and void and that the con-
tract between the plaintiff and the
defendant is invalid because in re-
straint of interstate and intra-State
commerce and, therefore, that the
injunction was improvidently granted.

The plaintiff Association contended
that the co-operative marketing Act
is constitutional and that a co-opera-
tive marketing association organized
for the handling of its members' pro-
ducts only is entitled to an injunction
against the grower member who
threatens to breach his marketing
agreement; that the marketing con-
tract is not in restraint of inter-
State commerce or violative of any
Federal anti-trust law or law against
monopolies and does not violate the
statutes, public policy or constitution
of North Carolina.

The case was handled for the
plaintiff in the lower court by Aaron
Sapiro, nationally known co-opera-
tive expert and attorney, Lawrence
R. Levy, his associate, Burgess & Joy-
ner, James H. Pou and Stephen C.
Bragaw. In the higher courts Law-
rence R. Levy and James H. Pou
appeared. Attorneys for the defense
included L. V. Bassett, F. S. Spruill,
and Joseph H. Ramsey.

Approximately one hundred and
sixty cases were brought by the co-
operatives against members who, it
was alleged, violated their contracts.
Of all these actions started in Wase
Superior court, thirty have been settled
by judgment by default and inquiry,
twenty by other methods, leaving more
than a hundred still pending.

TRADITION LEADS TO FINDING SUBMERGED UNCHARTED ROCK

Honolulu, T. H., April 11.—(By
Associated Press.)—A tale handed
down from generation to generation
of Hawaiians has led to the discovery
off the coast of the island of Kauai
of a sunken rock, previously un-
charted, by Lieutenant Commander
H. C. Hamlet, U. S. C. G. S., captain
of the cutter Mojave.

The tradition concerning the rock
was that years ago the inhabitants of
Lanai and the island of Miihau ob-
tained food by diving down to the
rock and taking shellfish from its sur-
face. Its location was forgotten with
the passing years. Recently residents
of the island requested the United
States lighthouse service to investi-
gate the report.

WHO OWNS RALEIGH?
Does Greenville know to whom she
belongs? Raleigh thought she knew
whose property she was until a few

days ago, and now she is in doubt.
The trouble was caused by a letter
which was received by the cashier of
the Citizens National Bank. The fol-
lowing editorial from the News and
Observer headed, Who Owns Ra-
leigh? shows that we can never tell
who is going to lay claim to our
property:

"Some years ago when Bishop Dun-
can visited this city, a young Miss
drove him over the city, pointing out
the beautiful residences. Afterwards
he said he had found out who owned
Raleigh. 'My guide,' he said, 'in
pointing out the oldest residences in
your city would invariably say 'That
home belongs to Mrs. A. B. C.' as the case would be.
I therefore learned that the women

owned Raleigh."
Yesterday Mr. Graham Andrews
cashier of the Citizens National Bank
received a letter which raised the
question in a very different way as
to who owns the city of Raleigh. His
bank received a letter from the cas-
hier of a bank in Mountain View, Mo.,
stating that he had been advised that
the land on which Raleigh was built
had been granted by the U. S. Gov-
ernment to David M. Shaw 'in pay-
ment for his services as soldier in
the Revolutionary war, and that Mr.
Shaw leased his land for a period of
ninety nine years.'

"Raleigh property owners may be
inclined to look up their deeds and
see whether they have fee simple
title or leases for ninety nine years.

The News and Observer yesterday
caused the records in the State De-
partment, the Wake County Court
House and the city archives to be ex-
amined, but no record of any David
M. Shaw ever having title to the
property on which Raleigh is built
could be found. Joel Lane's title
seems to be perfect, and no Raleigh
householder need fear to be evicted
from his or her premises."
