DUDDING AGAIN AFTER OFFICIALS OF STATE PRISON

Writes Letter Making Serious Charges as Regards Treatment of Prisoners

Washington, April 12.—E. E. Dudding, of Washington, head of Prisoners' Relief Society, which has its national headquarters in this city is again on warpath against the North Carolina State Prison, in a letter under date of today sent to James A. Leak, of Wadesboro, chairman of the Board of Directors of the State Prison, makes serious charges as to treatment of prisoners, that they are flogged, clubbed, locked in dungeons for days without food or water with half of the guards drunk while on duty. He threatens grand jury investigation, saying that his information comes from convicts now in the penitentiary at Raleigh and that the letter itself reaching the mail proves that there is no discipline maintained.

Mr. Dudding has from time to time made assaults on the state prisons of various states and not so long ago when it was said that some Ku Klux Klan members had sought information at his office he asserted that great numbers of the K. K. K. were convicts, and that he could or would organize a band of convicts himself and do up the Klan. Here is a copy of the letter that Mr. Dudding sent Chairman Leak:

"I received today a letter signed by twenty-five white convicts from the penitentiary at Raleigh written on the printed letterhead from which I got your name. For your inspection I clip the top of the letter—head so you can see that it comes from the prison. To start with, it is proven that there is no discipline at the prison or else the letter never would have reached the mail.

"The letter states that men are being flogged, clubbed and kicked worse than dogs are also being locked in a dungeon for days without food or water; that guards, half of them, are often drunk while on duty.

One man from the District of Columbia serving time that he was in the war over in France and that he was a prisoner in a German prison camp and that the food over in that prison was better than the food served to the convicts in the State Prison at Raleigh. This is not pleasant talk. However, the Prisoners' Relief Society does not for its mission seek to run prisons, but it does seek to have the fellows treated at least as well as they were treated in the German camps. Unless the condition is at once remedied I shall seek to have the prison board and the entire prison management to answer charges from the grand jury in the county where the prison is located. The brutality to convicts in the state of North Carolina is of long standing and has been called to the attention of the public time and again.

"I have myself visited your State Prison and the road camps and they are bad. We have been active in several Southern states lately and now we are beginning to get results. The grand jury will stop the inhuman treatment and that you may be sure of and just as sure as the sunset brings darkness, so sure will we have this matter of inhuman treatment stopped. You can like it or not."

EVANGELIST CALLS UPON MEN TO GIVE UP SIN AND REPENT

"Signs or Fruits of Repentance" Was Theme of Stirring Challenge

A great crowd of over a thousand people last night attended the Methodist Revival services that are being held in the McAdams tent just back of the post office, and heard Rev. Mr. Dunaway, the gifted Georgia evangelist, call upon men and women to repent of their sins and be saved. "Signs or fruits of repentance" was the theme to which he tied a stirring challenge for repentance and atonement for past misdeeds, so far as possible. Repentance is not easy, but hard, he said, for the devil is a great counterfeiter and manufacturers many spurious repentances.

Among the signs or fruits of repentance the speaker named the forsaking of sin, the confessing of sins, and the cleaning up of the past. He made a fervent appeal for men and women to give up their sinful habits, and to confess them before men and to get right with Jesus. "It is not so much a question of your accepting Jesus," he said "as it is a question of Jesus accepting you." And no one can truly repent who does not go back over his or her past life and rectify the wrongs done then, and pay his debts, but won't, so more comble. The speaker characterized the dead-beat and the man who could pay his debts but won't as more contemptible than the highwayman, and affirmed that he would be called on to pay to the last cent at the judgment bar of God the debts that he could have paid here, but would not. It was a great sermon, full of human incidents and anecdotes of men and women who had repented and gone out and straightened up their back lives and paid their honest debts.

Tonight's sermon will be upon the subject "Man's fatal indifference, or the devil's greatest desire." Mr. Dunaway in giving out the subject stated that he didn't usually do that in advance, for it would give the devil warning, but that sometimes it was a good thing to give him warning and have him prancing around so all could see him. Interest is increasing day by day in this great revival, which is rapidly gaining in force and power. Everybody is urged and invited to attend both the morning and the evening services.

ASSISTANT PASTOR KILLS HIS SUPERIOR

Father Charles Dillon Shoots Henry O'Neill When Ordered From House

Kalamazoo, Mich., April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Four bullets from a revolver brought tragedy to the priest house of Saint Augustine's Parish last night when Father Charles Dillon, assistant pastor, shot and killed his superior father Henry O'Neill, pastor, who had ordered him from the house. The killing culminated from what Dillon told the police, was "thirteen months of ill treatment" during which he said O'Neill "treated me like a little boy and assumed toward me the attitude of a Czar." Dillon is being held by the police.

WINTERVILLE WILL RECEIVE ITS FIRST JUICE TOMORROW

Electric Current Service From the Greenville Plant Will be Turned on Saturday Night

Work which has been in progress for several weeks placing the necessary poles and wires from this city to Winterville for the connecting of the latter place with the local power plant has been completed, and according to a statement made today by Superintendent Williams of the Water & Light Commission, the neighboring little city will receive its first lights from Greenville tomorrow night.

Winterville has been electrically lighted for some years from a plant of small capacity, and the installing of the new system will present a great improvement over the former means of securing lights. This will not only be an improved convenience for the people of that point, but those living on the highway between Greenville and Winterville will be able to connect their homes or business places at a very small cost.

During the past few months Winterville has been undergoing much building and other improvements which was found necessary to correspond with the rapid growth of population.

VETERANS PARADE IN NEW ORLEANS

Heavy Rain Fell Throughout Morning and Old Soldiers Rode in Automobiles

New Orleans, April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Today was the day and despite the fact that it was Friday the 13th and a heavy rain which began falling early in the morning and threatened to continue throughout the day, Confederate Veterans, who have been at the annual reunion here since Wednesday, have looked upon it as ultimate goal of gathering for it is time for the annual parade and they were up with the sun brushing gray uniforms, knocking dents out of old campaign hats and polishing brass buttons in preparation for the event. Most of the veterans rode in automobiles along the four mile route.

LOCAL PYTHIANS DECIDE TO PRESENT MINSTREL IN FALL

Proceeds of Which Will be Given for Construction of the Proposed Playgrounds

The proposed playground for the children of Greenville and vicinity received another boost at last night's regular meeting of the Knights of Pythias when by unanimous vote of the large number present it was decided to stage in the early fall a minstrel, the proceeds to go as the lodge's initial contribution to the project.

While the Pythian members have for some time been entertaining thoughts relative to the body having a part in the playgrounds for Greenville, it was not until their session of last evening that anything definite was determined.

It is understood that committees from the various organizations interested in the project are only awaiting the report of the landscape engineer to wage their campaign for the early construction of the playgrounds. And the local Pythians manifested their interest by their decision of last night.

There were several other matters presented before the Pythians other than initiation work in the second and third ranks. Among these was the selection of a representative at the summer meeting of the Grand Lodge in Morganton during the early part of June. Only past chancellor commanders being eligible to serve as representative to the State session, Knight J. S. Brown was the unanimous choice of the lodge, and he acknowledged his acceptance with a brief speech of appreciation for the honors.

TORNADO VISITS LOUISIANA TOWN

GEN. HALDERMAN SUCCEEDS CARR AS HEAD OF VETERANS

The 1924 Re-Union of Confederate Veterans Will be Held in Memphis, Tennessee

New Orleans, April 12.—(By Associated Press.)—General William B. Halderman of Louisville, Ky., was elected Commander-in-Chief of the Confederate Veterans at the closing business session of the annual reunion here late today, and Memphis, Tenn., was selected as the 1924 reunion city.

Three names were offered for the post of Commander-in-Chief when nominations were called for those of Gen. Halderman, Gen. Wm. A. Collier, of Memphis, and General E. W. Kirkpatrick, of McKinney, Texas. The name of Gen. Collier was withdrawn before the voting began, leaving the field to the Kentuckian and the Texan. General Halderman polled 771 and General Kirkpatrick 368 votes.

Only Memphis and Dallas were in the contest for the next reunion, and the Memphis speakers were reinforced with a petition more than 100 yards in length and bearing the signatures of thousands of Memphians asking that the veterans come there. The document contained the names of 16,000 school children alone. It was a nip and tuck race between the two as the balloting progressed but Memphis always kept a jump in the lead and when the roll call had been completed, had polled 629 votes to 512 for Dallas. A number of the veterans had argued that the reunions, because of the age of the delegates, always should be held in a central city of the South in order that the journey might not be too hard on those residing in the more distant States.

Dr. George T. Harding, of Marion, O., father of President Harding spoke to the veterans twice today. He declared he considered Robert E. Lee the greatest of American generals and Jefferson Davis one of the country's greatest statesmen. He said he felt very kindly toward the South, inasmuch as his grandmother was a cousin of the mother of Jefferson Davis.

After thanking the veterans for the manner in which he had been received he added:

"I want to thank the Southern people, too, for the kindness with which they have treated my son. The South never had a better friend than Warren G. Harding."

UNTAPPED WEALTH OF SOUTHERN SOIL LURE TO PIONEERS

Looking for New Fields to Conquer, the Hardy Pioneer Turns His Sight Southward

Chicago, April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Casting about for new fields to conquer, the hardy pioneer of the west and middle west has turned his sight southward, and the tide of pioneer migration is in that direction, according to a survey just completed and announced by the bureau of development of the Illinois Central Railroad.

"With approximately one-third of the arable and grazing territory developed at the present time, the trade and wealth of these southern states, Kentucky, Tennessee and Louisiana today exceed that of Holland, Belgium and Denmark," says the report.

"The riches that are yet untapped in these states, when brought into full productivity, will make the part of the country one of the opulent empires of the world."

"The south has awakened from its ancient languor," continues the report. "It is eager to enter the arena of the busy world and strive for the rewards of commercial achievement. The industrial development of the Mississippi Valley has been backward. Less than 50 years ago the first lumberman penetrated the hardwood forests of the lower Mississippi. Drainage was one of the early problems. But it has been within the last decade that the development of the wonderful resources of this section began in earnest."

The report then goes on to point out the advantages of the section, where it says, the most fertile soil in the world is to be found, even more fertile than the valley of the Nile.

"With the climate ranging from mile temperate to subtropical, an abundance of rainfall and long growing seasons, the possibilities for agriculture and stock raising are unequalled," the report adds. "Practically every kind of soil is found in this region."

"Mississippi is one of the great cotton-producing districts of the world, but it has few textile mills. Kentucky is notable for the quantity and quality of its wool production, but only a small part of this raw material is used within the state. There are vast deposits of fine clays suitable for the manufacture of white porcelain and many kinds of tiles and pottery to be found in different parts of this section, but most of this product is shipped north to be made up in the factories there. Vegetables and fruits are grown, and may be more extensively grown to better advantage in these states than elsewhere in the land, yet there are comparatively few large canneries and preserving plants in the south. Sugar cane is one of the native crops, but syrup factories are few."

METHODIST PUBLICATION UPHOLDS CONDEMNED PRELATES AND PRIESTS

New York, April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Roman Catholic prelates and priests condemned by the Russian Soviet government, one of whom was executed, are acclaimed by the Christian Advocate, a recognized Methodist publication, "It is not for any protestant to lessen the glory of these martyrs by saying that they were obedient to Rome rather than to God." An editorial says, "They have been bred in the belief that the voice that speaks through the church is the voice of God and in defiance of that Soviet law which offends dictator of conscience they have displayed heroism that links them with all who through the ages have said we know we ought to obey God rather than man."

GERMANY HAS PAID ALLIES 20 MILLIONS

Washington, April 12.—Germany has paid the Allies in cash, ships, lands and materials of various kinds a total of one hundred billion marks—equivalent to about twenty billion American dollars according to figures prepared by the German treasury department and transmitted to Washington.

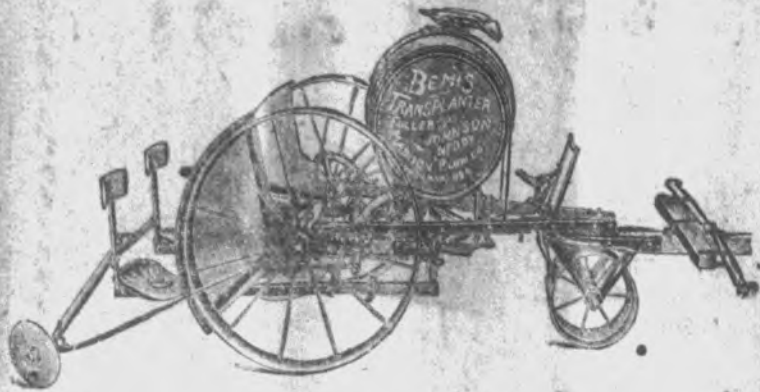

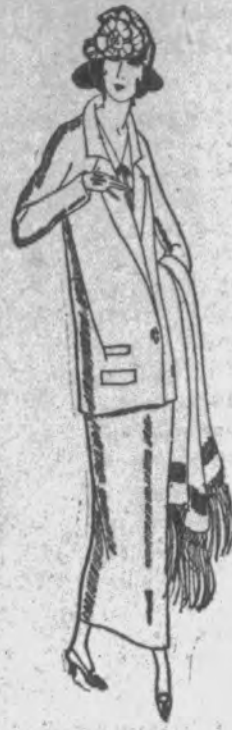

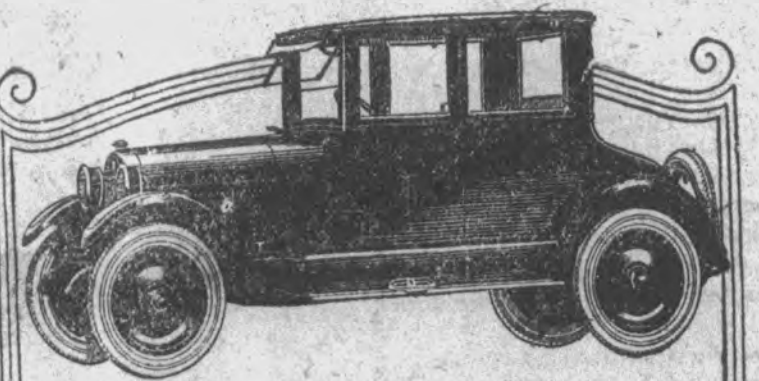

PRAGUE POLICE BY ADROIT WORK SAVE DIPLOMAT

Prague, April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—During the joyous days of the recent carnival in Prague there was a clever piece of detective work on the part of the local police which resulted in the restoring to a distracted diplomat of certain papers which to him were of the greatest importance. The police worked quietly and with a keen insight into the night life of the city, and such was their success that before the night was over the city jail had two new tenants and a young man was speeding out of Prague to the foreign office of his government, expressing heartfelt thanks to the local inspector of police who, in this narrative can be referred to only as Mr. D.—

Mr. D.—, seated one afternoon in his office behind a pile of papers, was interrupted suddenly by a young diplomat representing one of the great powers of Europe, who declared his business to be most urgent. He related that a wallet containing documents of great value had been stolen. He had left it for a few moments on his writing table to go to another room in the legation, and when he returned it was gone. Furthermore, there were jewels in the wallet, his personal property, but their abstraction did not disturb the young foreigner half as much as the loss of the papers.

"I must leave Prague by the night train," he explained to the inspector, "and I will be ruined for life if these documents cannot be recovered."

Mr. D.— drove to the legation and looked over the wallet substituted for that of the diplomat. It contained a Prague newspaper from which a clipping had been made. The inspector secured an intact copy of this paper, and was thus able to read the clipping cut out by the thief. Also Mr. D.— found traces of face powder between the leaves of the wallet.

The clipping announced that there was to be a masked ball that evening at a well-known hall in the city. With this as his main clue the inspector assured the diplomat that he would restore the papers, and, after assigning a detective to watch the palace, he hurried away to don a fancy costume. He was going to the ball.

The only costume he could find was his old full dress Austrian uniform, a souvenir of the days when Prague was a part of the Austrian Empire. As he was leaving his house the detective at the legation telephoned him that the daughter of the janitor of the legation had just left her apartments in the costume of Carmen.

It did not take the inspector long to locate Carmen at the ball. She was seeking a man who eventually appeared in the uniform of a Hungarian magnate, and wearing the customary black mask. The pair withdrew discreetly into a quiet room and the inspector waited at the only exit.

Soon they came out, the girl wearing an expensive necklace she had not had on before. The inspector approached Carmen and the Hungarian magnate and spoke a few quiet but well-chosen words. There was no protest and no scene. They proceeded to a taxicab, and on the way to the railroad station the inspector stopped at police headquarters. Expert hands searched the pair, and the inspector quietly took possession of the diplomat's portfolio, the necklace and other pieces of jewelry.

Mr. D.— drove on alone, and arrived at the railroad station after gates for the night train had been closed. On the platform he found the young diplomat with watch in hand trying to overtake the train crew to delay departure for a few moments.

Mr. D.— made good his promise. He handed the diplomat his portfolio and in it were the missing documents and the jewels.

JAPANESE BUSINESS MEN PLAN VISIT TO AMERICA

Tokio, April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Raita Fujiwara, vice-president of the Tokio Chamber of Commerce, will leave Japan for America and Europe on March 20 by the Tomyo Maru. He will be accompanied by Fuyusaburo Kanazawa, director of the Japan Sugar Refining Company, and has for his object an inspection of the general economic situation in the western world.

They will land at San Francisco, and later visit New York. After three months' stay in America, they will leave for European countries, and are expected to return to Japan towards the end of September.

NATION WIDE MOVEMENT BEING MADE TO PURCHASE THOMAS JEFFERSON'S HOME

Charlottesville, Va., April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Nation-wide movement to raise a million dollars for the purchase and preservation of Monticello the home of Thomas Jefferson, started on the hundred and eightieth anniversary of the birth of the author of the Declaration of Independence was preceded by exercises at the University of Virginia, which Jefferson founded and served. Scores of persons from throughout the east and south heard Dr. Marion Leroy Burton, president of the University of Michigan pay tribute to Jefferson as one who was leader in education and whose ideals were the inspiration upon which the University of Michigan had been founded.

HONOR FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS CLAIMED BY BRITISH OFFICER

London, April 12.—(By Associated Press.)—The latest attempt to take glory from men credited with high

honors is that of a British Yeomanry officer, Lieut.-Col. Frank Hilder, who declares he formulated the plan of the League of Nations long before the idea was thought of by Woodrow Wilson.

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THREE VOWS ARE KEPT BY WOMAN LEGISLATOR

Jefferson City, Mo., April 12.—
(By Associated Press.)—Mrs. Mel-
cene Smith, of University City, one
of the first women to be elected to
the Missouri legislature, came to the
sessions this year with three resolves,
all of which she kept.

"One was that I would not miss a
session," she said; "another that I
would not mrr the desks in the house
by placing my feet thereon, and the
third that I would not expectorate to-
bacco juice on the floor."

At the close of her first session,
Mrs. Smith observed that there is no
reason why the average woman, with
some little experience in public af-
fairs should not be as efficient as a
legislator as the average man. She
is convinced that the election of a
considerable number of women law-
makers would be a distinct advantage
to the state. The new member, Mrs.
Smith contends, should not be harg-
ed with sponsoring too many meas-
ures.

Mrs. Smith states that she was im-
pressed with the fact that the men do
not resent the coming of women to
the legislature. "I supposed women
would be regarded with good natured
tolerance, but such was not the case,
at least with the really worth while
man. (I wish to acknowledge the help-
ful and generous direction and assist-
ance from the more experienced legis-
lators," she added.

Mrs. Smith has an ambition to be-
come sheriff of her county. She be-
lieves she could put all law violators
to flight and make the county "a
modern Sahara" as far as the en-
forcement of the eighteen amendment
is concerned.

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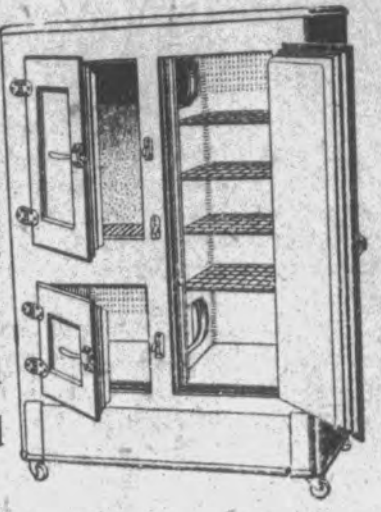
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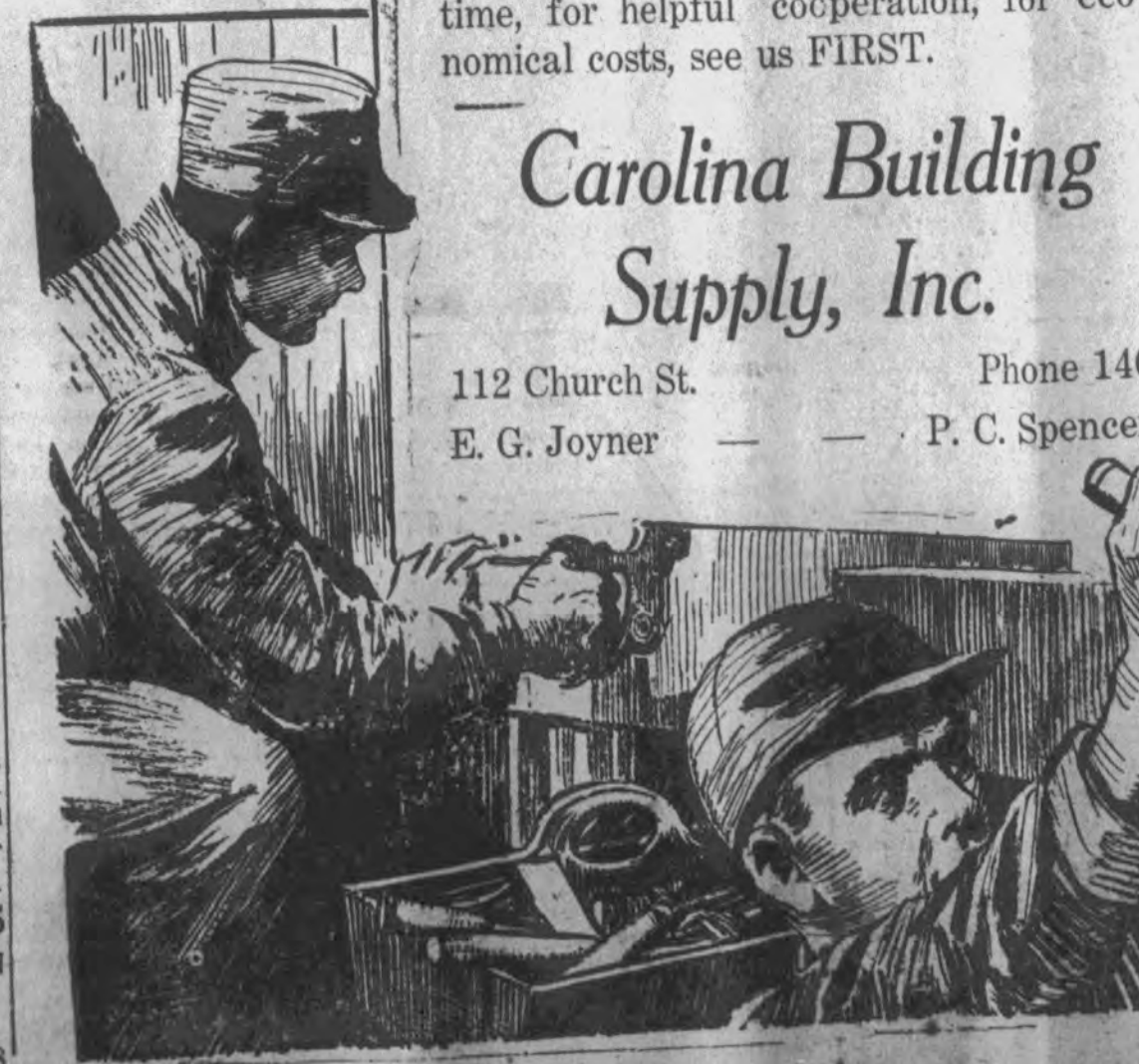
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
