

# STATE FEDERATION WOMEN'S CLUBS TO MEET IN THIS CITY

Will Hold Their 1924 Session  
in This City; Washington  
Meeting Largely Attended

Washington, April 13.—The convention of the State Federation of Women's Clubs which convened here yesterday morning concluded their session yesterday afternoon.

At 11:30 o'clock in the New Theatre the convention was called to order by the district president, Miss Annie Perkins, of Farmville. Mrs. Stephen Bragaw, as chairman of the local clubs and representing the Adisco Book Club as hostess introduced the speakers. After the invocation by Rev. Stephen Gardner of St. Peter's Episcopal church, and the singing of the "Old North State," Mrs. Claude Carrow of the Cresceto Club, in a short speech graciously welcomed the visiting ladies. Mrs. J. H. Bynum of Belhaven, representing one of the youngest clubs in the district responded in a charming manner.

The chief features of the meeting were the addresses of Mrs. Sydney Cooper of Henderson, president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, and the address of Mrs. John Gilmer of Winston-Salem, State Chairman of districts. Both women were most pleasing in their words of appreciation of Eastern Carolina, this being Mrs. Gilmer's first visit to this section of the state.

Reports were presented from the clubs of the district, beginning with that of Mrs. W. H. Hooker of the Aurora Club. Their chief work has been the donation of books to the public library. Next came that of the Farmville Magazine Club with donations to the Sallie Southall Cotton Loan Fund, and other objects fostered by the club. The float prepared by this club won the second prize at the Eastern Carolina Exposition at Wilson. The Round Table Club of Greenville had as its chief work the helping of the public library. The woman's club of Greenville of which Mrs. Cotton is an honorary member, has been giving a course in citizenship with a different public speaker, a specialist in his or her line, for each month. This club has started a fund for a club building. A lovely work has been the planting of 100 crepe myrtle trees along the highways of the county. The Woman's Betterment Association of Pantego, this county reported more money raised than any other club, except the Parent-Teachers of Farmville, \$450, made by entertainments and in other ways. They have given an encyclopedia costing \$100 to the school.

Mrs. Frank Rollins made the report for the Adisco Club of Washington, the oldest literary club of the city. Believing that music is a human need and that its influence might help all America maintain its balance, this club has made a study of the great operas this year. They have contributed to the object fostered by the federation. Miss Adeline Mayo made the report for the Cresceto Club of Washington. This club contributes to the Graham Memorial and other causes and objects clubs are interested. The report for the O'Henry club of this city was read by Miss Lida Rodman in the place of the secretary, Mrs. Clary who was absent from the city. This club has a miscellaneous program and contributes to all club activities. Mrs. Ficklen of Greenville reported for a new literary club of that city, the End of the Century Club. They have raised \$100 on a building fund. The Parent-Teachers' Association of Farmville an affiliated club, has raised \$1100 for equipping the stage of the school auditorium. They are now working for equipment for a playground and for the primary grades.

After the reports the meeting adjourned to the ladies parlors of the Presbyterian church where a lovely luncheon prepared by Circle No. 1 of the church, with Mrs. Mack Waters, as chairman, was served to about a hundred visiting and home club women. At luncheon a charming feature was the presentation of a silver vase to the retiring district president, Miss Anne Perkins of Farmville, by the club women of the district. Mrs. John Gilmer of Winston-Salem, made with them next year.

# NORTH CAROLINA PLANNING TO HAVE SOCIAL REGISTER

Will be Donated Exclusively to  
the Representative People  
in the State

North Carolina is to have a Social Register similar to those now in use in almost all northern states and cities.

North Carolina in the past has perhaps had no need for a social directory, but of late years her best people have inter-married so freely with Western and Northern people that it is almost impossible for one to remember the new family connections.

The Social Register of North Carolina will be devoted exclusively to the representative people in the state. Committees of ladies are being formed in each city to help gather the data for this work.

The Register will keep a record of correct names, maiden names, clubs and husbands' clubs, organizations, children's names and complete war record and also correct addresses, thereby making it North Carolina's standard guide to her best people.

Upon completion of North Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky Georgia and South Carolina will be taken up in order named until the entire South has a Social Register state by state.

Blanks will be mailed shortly to those in this city who have been chosen by the committees.

Dillon persists in his desire to be sent to the State's prison, and resents intimations that he may have been insane when he shot O'Neil as he sat at the dinner table, Thursday evening. There was no indication that sanity inquiry would be asked by his attorney.

Fantasy of Mirth and Music

# INVESTIGATION OF SUGAR PRICES TO BE MADE NEAR FUTURE

President and Cabinet Hear  
the Report of Acting  
Attorney General Seymour

Washington, April 13.—Developments in the near future in the Department of Justice investigation into the sugar price situation were indicated at today's cabinet meeting, at which Acting Attorney-General Seymour, presented a report.

The situation was discussed by President Harding and his advisers almost entirely from the legal standpoint at the meeting inasmuch as the tariff commission had found itself unable to complete its preliminary report dealing with the effect of the tariff on sugar prices. Information from the commission was that the report might become completed tomorrow and at the White House it was said that the president expected to confer with the full commission next week.

With respect to the tariff phase of the situation, however, the president was represented as absolutely convinced that the duties on sugar were in no wise responsible for the almost steady advance in the price of the commodity since early in February.

Acting Attorney General Seymour laid before Mr. Harding and the cabinet a complete summary of the results to date of his department's inquiry as ascertained from department report and from conferences yesterday in New York, with U. S. District Attorney Hayward. The nature of the department's findings were withheld but it was said by a high administration official that developments might be expected shortly.

Although all department of justice officials have been hesitant in disclosing the lines being followed, in the inquiry it has been the general assumption that the investigation has been directed toward ascertaining whether the price increase resulted from collusion or conspiracy in violation of the law.

The early part of the department's study is known to have been devoted to search of the statute books for acts which might be used as the basis of criminal prosecutions, and it has been intimated by some officials that the basis having been found, the activities of the department now were turned to the collection of evidence of possible law violations.

Among the Churches Here

Mr. Jas. F. Entzinger, advance man for the Entzinger-Butler Evangelistic party, arrived yesterday from Greenville, South Carolina.

The coming of Mr. Entzinger is for the purpose of conducting a religious census here among the several churches of the city; the organizing of the forces; Sunday school building, etc., all of which will lead to the beginning of an evangelistic campaign for Greenville and adjacent territory, which is under the auspices of the two Missionary Baptist churches.

At the eleven o'clock hour tomorrow morning, Mr. Entzinger will speak to the congregations of the Memorial and Immanuel Baptist churches at Forbes & Morton warehouse, where all of the services will be held. At this time a message will be delivered setting forth, in general the campaign.

At 1:30 o'clock, promptly, census takers from the several churches will gather at Forbes & Morton warehouse for the purpose of having the matter explained, in detail, as to just how the work will be done. Mr. Entzinger, having made a specialty of this work is in position to give specific and definite information before undertaking the work. To make the success of this religious census, it is absolutely necessary, that all of workers meet for this period of instruction. Enough workers have been promised to enable the work to be completed in two hours.

In order to facilitate the work of this census, the pastors request that all of the people remain in their homes tomorrow afternoon until the workers can complete their task.

Mr. Entzinger will speak to the Immanuel Baptist Sunday School at the opening hour tomorrow morning and at the Memorial Baptist at the closing period. He will also speak at the B. Y. P. U. of the Memorial Baptist at the beginning of their meeting tomorrow evening at 7:00 o'clock and at the Immanuel B. Y. P. U. at the closing session of their program. A full attendance of both Sunday schools and the B. Y. P. U.'s is much desired.

Rev. V. P. Scoville, after a conference with evangelist, C. M. Dunaway, announced their usual meeting on tomorrow afternoon had been called off, so that the largest success could come from the census.

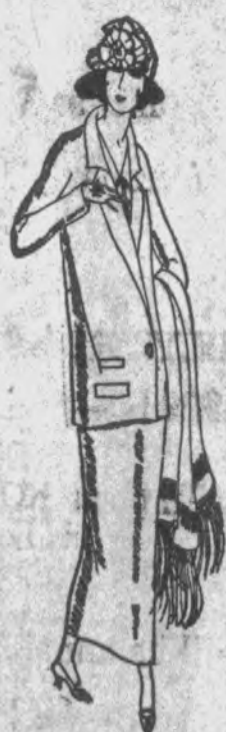

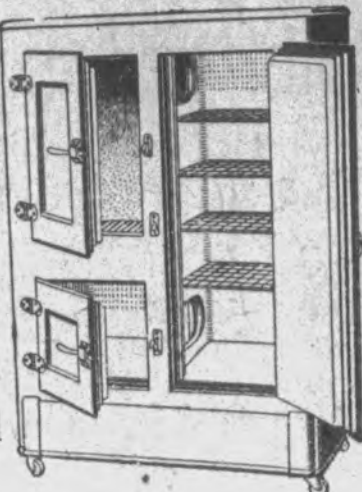
