HARDING BACKS UP A PERMANENT COURT FOR WORLD

Sets Forth Reason in a Speech at Associated Press Luncheon Yesterday

New York, April 24.—Harding today committed himself and his administration without equivocation to American membership in the permanent court of international justice.

Speaking at the annual luncheon of members of the Associated Press, Mr. Harding set forth the reason which impelled him to recommend to the senate shortly before the adjournment of congress the adoption of the United States to the world court protocol as drafted under the league of nations outlined the advantages he believed would accrue from adoption of the recommendation and presented for the first time answers to the argument of opponents of the administration plan.

In doing so the chief executive asserted his conviction that American membership in the court would be "in harmony with party platform, pledges, senatorial promises and American aspirations." It would not be and could never be construed as being indirect entrance into the league of nations, he declared with emphasis.

The address made before a thousand of the nation's leading newspaper editors and publishers was generally considered as the beginning of the presentation which the president plans to make during the spring and summer of the principle policies to be pursued during the next year. Political leaders throughout the country, admittedly in disagreement as to wisdom of the world court recommendations, awaited with intense interest the address and tonight were watching for the country's reaction.

Whatever reception it might be accorded by the American people, the president indicated clearly that he stood firmly behind his recommendation.

The address was the principle feature of the executive's visit to New York, the first in a year and a half.

Except for a brief preface in which he spoke as an editor to editors and for a reference to relations among the nations of the Western hemisphere, Mr. Harding followed his prepared address closely. In course of latter digression he declared that "the government has been instrumental in wiping out the various causes of conflict in the western world and has today but one difficult solution left and that with Mexico is nearing its solution."

BODY OF INDIAN WARRIOR RESTS IN ROCK COVERED GRAVE IN MOUNTAINS

Salt Lake City, Utah, April 25.—(By Associated Press.)—The body of Old Posey, leader of the vanquished renegade tribe of the Piute Indians which went on warpath in southeastern Utah last month rest in a rock covered grave somewhere in the mountains near Blanding where he was slain last month in a skirmish with white settlers. The aged chieftain, reputed to be a hundred years old, made his last stand with a handful of braves near Combawh, March 28, and died alone while white possemen routed his small band. News of Old Posey's death was brought in by United States Marshall Ward who was led to the spot where the warrior was slain, by four captive Piutes.

MORRISON ALLOWS NOBLES A RESPITE ELECTRIC CHAIR

Church Workers Appeal to Governor Who Grants Respite Before Execution

Raleigh, April 24.—Dan Milton Nobles, who escaped the electric chair at state prison this morning on a respite of 60 days granted by Governor Morrison in a last minute appeal from three local churches, this afternoon slowly spelled out the words of a telegram to Warden S. J. Busbee, directing the disposition of his remains.

Within thirty minutes of the time set for execution while three score or more men were crowding about the prison gates awaiting the spectacle of death, word came that Governor Morrison had allowed the respite in order that he may further look into the case.

While protesting his innocence Monday afternoon Nobles received a letter from his wife telling him of her prayers and of a dream of his mother that he would be reprieved and finally saved from death for the crime which he alleges that he did not commit.

The news of the respite was received with rejoicing in death row and a negro prisoner who had next to no hopes for himself sentenced to die for murder, stated between hallelujahs that he had spent nights in prayer for Nobles.

Announcement of the respite of Nobles, who was convicted largely on the testimony of the eight year old daughter of his cousin for whose death he was held responsible, brought joy to many.

The fact that Nobles maintained his innocence in face of death so impressed Rev. Sylvester Betts, J. H. Weathers and Loomis Goodwin, prominent local churchmen that they went to the governor's mansion this morning, saw the governor in his bedroom and prevailed upon him to grant respite.

AMERICAN CRAFT FIRED ON BY CANADIAN PATROL

Vancouver, B. C., April 25.—(By Associated Press.)—The American fishing schooner, Siloam, of Seattle suspected of poaching in solader bay and captured last night by Canadian fisheries patrol boat, Malaspina, after the schooner had been struck broadside by volley of shots from the patrol has been scuttled by crew that fled leaving one wounded, who was taken prisoner. It is believed that this is the first time a Canadian patrol has fired on an American craft in Canadian waters.

SUTTON MUST PAY \$1,000 TO FAMILY PHILLIP JEFFERSON

Compromise Agreed Upon By State and Counsel Before Reaching Jury

With a few minor cases to be heard this afternoon, it now appears that Pitt county docket of criminal actions will be cleared today and bring to a close one of the most successful seasons of the local courts for many months. The cases given hearing during the two weeks have been of a varied nature, but the illicit liquor element predominated, and with a few exceptions the defendants connected with whiskey violators were found guilty, and by Judge Grady being a bitter enemy to this illicit trade gave each person or persons the limit provided by law.

Today's court opened with the consideration and disposal of the Guy Sutton case, who was charged with running down and killing with his automobile young Phillip Jefferson. Before being presented to a jury a compromise was agreed upon by the State and counsel for the defense by which Mr. Sutton is to pay to the family of the deceased \$1,000 and all the costs connected with the case.

Hattie Keys, a negress in the city was found guilty of receiving liquor and sentenced to twelve months at the county home.

Marion Tripp, a white man of the county was adjudged guilty by a jury of having liquor for sale. The twelve men asked for the leniency of the court in this case, and the defendant was sentenced to six months on the county road. When the judgment was announced, counsel for Tripp gave notice of appeal, but when the presiding judge changed the sentence to a eighteen months term the defendant decided to accept the six months. Owing to the fact that he was in the midst of the planting of his crop Tripp was permitted to give \$1000 bond to begin serving his time in November.

Ben Little and Iris Joyner found guilty a few days ago of receiving chickens they knew to have been stolen, were each fined \$100.00 and one half of the costs each.

The case of Hazard Craft who appealed from the judgment of the Mayor's court of a \$25.00 fine for disorderly conduct, violation of the traffic ordinances and resisting arrest was being deliberated by the jury when court recessed at noon.

TEXAS TOWN VISITED BY A WIND STORM

Gale Blowing at Rate of Fifty Miles Does Considerable Damage in Henrietta

Henrietta, Texas, April 25.—(By Associated Press.)—Virtually every building in Henrietta was damaged and five residences and six oil derricks at Burk Burnett, thirty miles north were blown to bits by a terrific wind storm last night. A fifty mile wind drove a large hail stone through every window of Henrietta, and blew down the roofs of Saint Elmo Hotel, several business buildings and a dozen residences. Hail was piled up nearly a foot deep in the streets.

FORGET NOTES EVIDENCE OF DEFALCATION AGAINST EMPLOYEES OF BANK

York, Penn., April 25.—(By Associated Press.)—Forced notes constitute the evidence of defalcation against Thomas Baird, cashier, and William Boll, assistant cashier of the City Bank of York, according to state banking officials is who closed the doors of the institution yesterday after they discovered a shortage estimated at nearly one million dollars. Baird and Boll, charged with embezzling, placed same in a cell in default of a hundred thousand dollar bail each. The directors were unable to say whether the bank would be able to survive the loss, admitting that the outlook was dubious.

GARDEN WEEK TO BE OBSERVED BY WOMEN'S CLUBS

Local Club Will Cooperate With General Federation of Clubs to Make Great Success

The Woman's Club, of Greenville, co-operating with the General Federation of Women's Clubs, will this week observe National Garden Week.

The Garden Movement means a great deal more than getting a little plot of land where the child or the grown-ups can raise a few sweet peas or radishes. It means that contact with the vitality and reliability and serenity of nature, of purpose and fulfillment, of human life as related to forces infinitely greater than itself. For this reason the club women are backing Garden Week. They believe in the kind of activity that links itself with ordered purpose that sees the day as a part of eternity.

A most interesting program has been arranged for the week. Talks will be made on Gardening, The Home Garden for Health and Pleasure; Community Gardens; Transforming the waste places; Parks and Playgrounds; Our Friends, the Trees; Gardens for Orphan Asylum; the school garden and home gardens under school supervision; Gardening as promoted by the Home Extension Service, Department of Agriculture and preservation of Wild Flowers. Saturday, the last day, will be known as Children's Day and various phases such as Pageants, Plays, Exercises, The Garden in the "Movies," will be discussed.

The clubs will also encourage competitive activities along lines of vegetable gardens, flower gardens, mixed gardens, window boxes, lawns, and landscaping home grounds. The local club is very anxious for the week to be a success and appeals to the public to help in every way possible to help beautify the town.

SCHOOL CHILDREN TAKING PART NEAR EAST RELIEF DRIVE

Warm Clothing in Which There is Still Some Wear Desired by Committee

Many school children of Pitt County are taking part in the Near East Relief campaign for old clothing which is being held in Greenville and the county this week and next with Mr. W. H. Woolard of Greenville as county chairman.

Dr. E. C. Brooks, state superintendent of public instruction is State Clothing chairman and in addition to appealing to everyone in North Carolina to send their cast off clothing to this great humanitarian organization, has asked each school teacher to organize her class or school into a canvassing committee.

Mr. Woolard has designated May 1st as his "Bundle Day" along with the regular state clothing campaign climax and has asked all in Greenville and other parts of the county to send their cast off garments, either to Near East Relief warehouse, Raleigh, N. C., or to the Greenville "Bundle Depot" at the High School building, Fifth street. It is hoped to get as many garments as possible before May 1st, but clothing sent any time soon after will be very acceptable.

The climate of Armenia closely approximates that of our New England states. Many were found frozen to death last winter, others suffering from frozen limbs, pneumonia and acute rheumatism, simply from lack of clothing. Our cast off garments, which we may never wear again, will save these lives.

Only warm clothing in which there is still some wear is desired as there is no room on ships for summer clothing, palm beach suits and straw hats.

OFFICERS CAPTURE ANOTHER ILLICIT STILL IN COUNTY

Liquor still hunting has been quite a popular sport with the Sheriff and his deputies, especially during the past few days, and each hunt resulted in much game. To capture two stills within two successive days is a very unusual occurrence. Not being contented with the find of Monday, Sheriff Jackson with deputies Whitehurst and Cox late yesterday afternoon visited the same neighborhood of the previous day, and about one mile from the Chicod and Greenville townships live on the later's territory they found securely wrapped in an underground sixty gallon steam still, together with one barrel of beer. There were several empty mash containers but no "hooch." The still was properly punctured and brought to the county depository in the basement of the courthouse.

JURY DRAWN FOR TRIAL OF MORSE IN CONSPIRACY CASE

Charles W. Morse and Three Sons With Four Other Persons Under Indictment

Washington, April 24.—Completion of the jury and the beginning of the oral presentation of the government's case by District Attorney Gordon marked the trial today in the District of Columbia Supreme Court of Charles W. Morse, his three sons and four others. They are charged in indictments returned more than a year ago with a conspiracy to defraud the Federal government in connection with ship construction and in operating contracts awarded during and after the war.

With eleven men in the box when court convened, little difficulty was had in selecting the twelfth juror, only one talesman being examined. The jury is composed of seven salesmen, two cashiers, one hotel proprietor, one clerk and one collector. The jury was not locked up, but was given the customary warning by Justice Stafford against discussing the case with outsiders or reading newspaper accounts of it.

District Attorney Gordon had not completed an explanation of the indictments at the adjournment of court and will resume that task tomorrow. It may be that the actual taking of testimony will not be started before Thursday although the government witnesses in court today were directed to report tomorrow.

Approximately \$40,000,000 was involved in the four ship construction and two ship operating contracts awarded by the Emergency Fleet Corporation and the Shipping Board to the Groton Iron works, of Groton, Conn.; the Virginia Shipbuilding Corporation and the United States Transport Company, Inc. The government will undertake to establish by means of several hundred witnesses that the defendants conspired together to defraud the government out of "large sums of money and material," through false statements as to the conditions of these companies and other methods.

On the other hand, the defendants will seek to show through high present and former government officials and others that there was no attempt to defraud the government through a conspiracy or any other means. Their counsel also has indicated that there would be an effort to establish that any court action by the government should have been confined to a civil suit seeking an accounting as between the three corporations and the Shipping Board and the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

Besides Charles W. Morse, defendants in the case are Benjamin W. Morse, Erwin A. Morse and Harry F. Morse, and N. H. Campbell, of New York, assistant treasurer of the Transport Company; Rupert M. Much, of Augusta, Maine, assistant treasurer of the Virginia Shipbuilding Corporation; Phillip Reinhardt, former auditor at Alexandria, Va., of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, and Robert O. White, of New York, president of the Transport Company, and assistant treasurer of the Groton Iron Works.

WOMAN KILLED IN CRASH AT OXFORD

Oxford, April 24.—Mrs. J. J. Chapman, of Keokuk, Ia., 45, was instantly killed this afternoon about four o'clock at Bullock, on the national highway ten miles from Oxford and her husband, J. J. Chapman, a prominent western banker, was dangerously injured, when the car in which they were riding and operated by Mrs. Chapman plunged into an embankment. It is believed that Mrs. Chapman lost control of the automobile and was unable to right it before the crash came.

The woman was dead when reached, with her skull crushed and serious internal injuries. Mr. Chapman was found to have serious injuries about the head in addition to numerous cuts and bruises. He is now resting in Brantwood Hospital at Oxford and is expected to recover. Mrs. Chapman's body is in an undertaking establishment and will be forwarded to Iowa tomorrow.

Dwindle as Fall
Encampment Nears

Des Moines, April 25.—The staunch
blue line of Civil War veterans, sur-
vivors of the historic internecine con-
flict of more than 60 years ago, is
rapidly being decimated from year to
year, according to figures on file at
the headquarters of the Grand Army
of the Republic here.

In 1922 the number of G. A. R. vet-
erans, dwindled by 14,322, a decrease
from an enrollment of 85,618 in 1921
to an enrollment of 71,296 at the be-
ginning of 1923, according to figures
in the hands of National Command-
er H. W. Willett here. During that
time the number of active posts in
the country decreased from 4,218 to
3,650, indicating the abandonment of
550 camps.

One by one the white haired vet-
erans of Shiloh, Lookout Mountain,
Gettysburg and Chickamauga are
answering the call of taps which
sounded for so many of their com-
rades on the field of battle from '61
to '65.

Five Factors in Complex Problem
Vital to Entire Greek Population;
American Red Cross is Active

Here are five living factors in the
problem that three capable gentle-
men are trying to solve. The chil-
dren do not know that they are fac-
tors or problems. They probably
think of themselves as just plain
kids. The gentlemen, Col. William
N. Haskell, American Red Cross
Commissioner to Europe, Dr. A.
Doxiades, the Greek Minister of Pub-
lic Assistance and Major Edmund L.
Dailey, Colonel Haskell's deputy,
realize that there are some 999,995
factors and that the problem pre-
sented is as serious as the faces of
the children themselves.

The children are typical of the
million refugees who were trans-
ported to Greece with little warning
as an outcome of the Greco-Turkish
war. Colonel Haskell and Major
Dailey represent the organization
which since the emergency arose has
been caring for, feeding, bathing,
vaccinating, clothing and delousing
the neediest of the refugees, as an
emergency measure to alleviate the
suffering which such a mass move-
ment of population is bound to entail
and to check the threatened epidem-
ics which menaced all Greece.

The work accomplished was effec-
tive. Half a million of the dependent

refugees were fed daily by the
American Red Cross. Before the
end of March more than \$2,600,000
of American Red Cross funds had
been expended to provide the food
and medicines, the doctors and the
nurses and to meet the other ex-
penses of the operation. Judge John
Barton Payne, Chairman of the
American Red Cross says "American
charity has prevented the refugees
and the population which received
them from experiencing disaster in

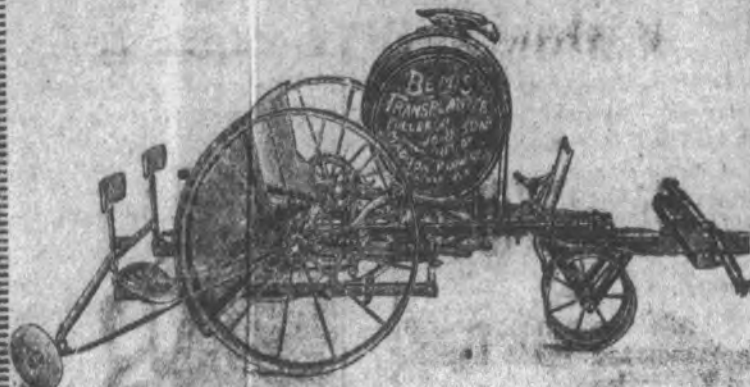

The simplest way is to cut limbs of last year's growth and plant them. These may be eight to fifteen inches long or longer, and should be cut with a long slanting knife-stroke for four to six inches or more. Bury them deep, leaving only the top buds out. Pack the dirt firmly about the base of each cutting. These cuttings should be made before the buds swell.

If sprouts come out from the base of a crepe myrtle tree, these may also be rooted by simply mounding and packing earth about their bases. When propagated in this way, they will root quicker and better if the roots are kept moist by keeping them covered with a thick mulch.

Peruvain Women Unite To Win Civil Rights

Lima, Peru, April 25.—For the first time in the history of Peru a representative group of women has formed a permanent organization to further the feminist movement in the republic.

Lima has been entertaining Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt the well-known American suffrage leader. In a series of lectures, one of which was given in the historic University of San Marcos, she has been able to reach a large part of the intelligent women of the different social classes. As a result of these meetings there has been organized a body to be known as the "National Council of Women" which draws its membership from the higher and middle classes of society.

Little definite progress had been made in the woman's movement in Peru prior to Mrs. Catt's arrival. Several clubs existed among Peruvian women, social, charitable and other wise, but only one to further woman's suffrage. No general organization similar to the National Council of Women, however, had been attempted, as women are not organized for campaign purposes in South America.

No immediate effort will be made to obtain the vote for Peruvian women, a goal which is believed to be many years in the future. The newly organized council will work first to secure civil rights for women, such as have been conceded in the more progressive countries of the world. Leaders of the movement in Peru recognize that the two great obstacles to success are the natural timidity of the average Latin American woman, and the marked cleavage between the social classes. Until social lines are less emphasized, it will be difficult for the women as a whole to work in harmony, and progress in the suffrage movement will be less rapid as a consequence.

SIBERIAN-JAPANESE TRADE INJURED BY NEW SOVIET LAWS

Tokio, April. — (By Associated

Press)—Trade between Japan and Siberia has come to a standstill owing to the heavy duties and other restrictions on imports imposed by the Vladivostok authorities. Passenger traffic also is at a low ebb owing to the Soviet authorities insisting that passports must be used by Soviet representatives, of whom there are none so far in Japan, and also because of a tax imposed on both incoming and outgoing passengers. Recently a Japanese liner was not allowed to dock, as none of her passengers had their passports vised.

One Japanese steamship company, however, is maintaining a service under a subsidy from the Japanese government in the hope that conditions will improve.

ARTISTS OF SWEDEN WILL RECEIVE GOVERNMENT AID

Stockholm, April.—(By Associated Press.)—Artists in Sweden who happen to be in narrow circumstance have suddenly been cheered by the news that the government stands ready to spend 270,000 kronor, about \$72,000, in the purchase of their pictures.

The Swedish scheme for coming to the rescue of needy artists is peculiarly favorable to all parties concerned. The government raises the money through a lottery. It acquires valuable paintings and sculptures in return for the money granted to the artists. This art is then to be placed in schools, sanatoriums, and other government institution, where it will prove a pleasure to the public, and at the same time help the artist by giving him added publicity for his work. The investment of funds and the

purchase of art is to be in the hands of a committee of artists and others under the chairmanship of the famous landscape painter, Prince Eugene, a brother of the King of Sweden. The committee will inspect paintings and statues, and have authority to purchase works in current exhibitions where the artist is in need of money.

Olof Olsson, minister of the Ecclesiastical department, under whom the appropriation has been obtained, says that only the highest class of painting and statues will be purchased by the government. Thus the movement can be utilized to instill in a larger public an appreciation of good works of art.

No particular schools or tendencies in modern art will be favored by the committee, and none will be discriminated against.

SPECIAL CEILING TO MAKE COMPOSING ROOM SILENT

New York, April 25.—A perforated ceiling for the composing room in the new home of the New York Tribune, just installed, will do away with the traditional separate room for proof-readers, and enable them to read "copy" and proofs in the midst of the typesetting machines, according to the expectations of acoustical experts.

Clifford M. Swan, consulting engineer for the company which installed the acoustical correction, explained that a ceiling of perforated oil cloth, over a thick layer of felt, will absorb the short wave-lengths sound, which produce the high pitches, and will completely do away with annoying reverberation. The effect will be the same, he said, as if the composing room were to be set up in the open air.

This is believed to be the first time in newspaper history that any attempt has been made to silence a composing room by the aid of acoustical science.

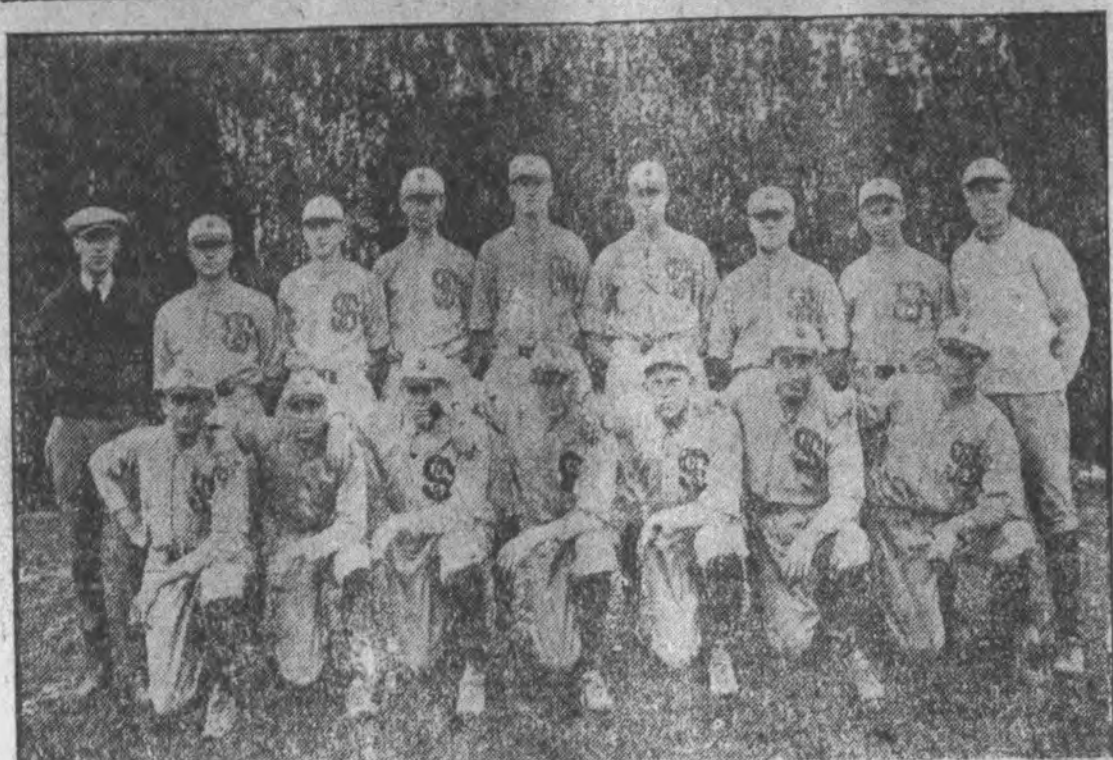

London, April.—(By Associated Press.)—That leprosy can be effectively cured by the injection of certain oils, including cod liver and soybean oil, was claimed by Sir Leonard Rogers in a paper read before a recent meeting of the Royal Society of Arts.

Sir Leonard declared that experi-

ments made in various parts of the world had led physicians to the belief that the disease could be cured within the space of a few years through the use of these oils.

There would appear to be numerous cases of leprosy in London, particularly among army men who have returned from Eastern countries, which are unrecognized.

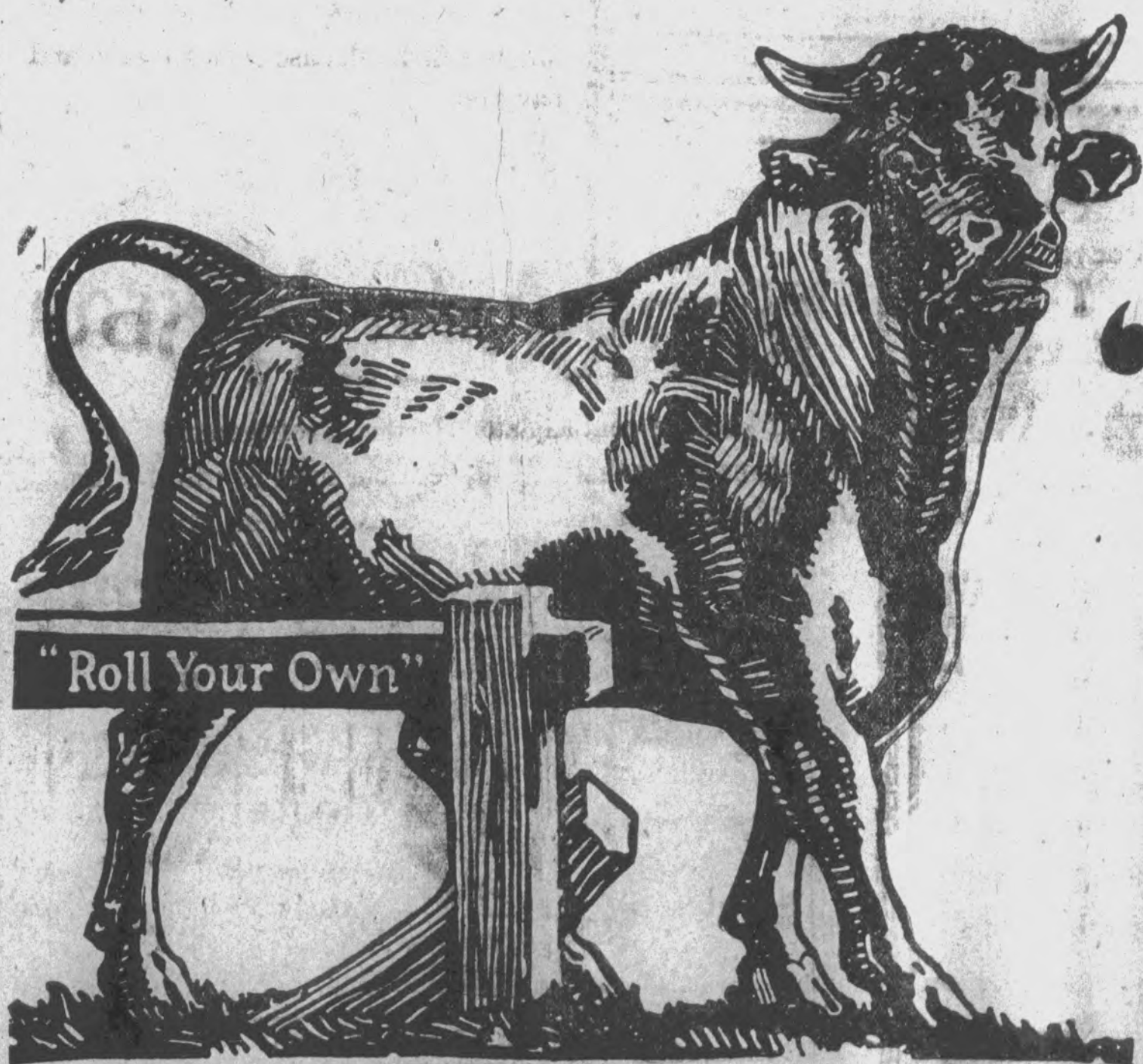

American Red Cross Refugee Aid In Greece Helps One Million Homeless; Emergency Program Nears Completion



A mud settlement in Athens is shown in the pictures above. The Acropolis is seen in the background. It is in this and other historic sections of Greece that the American Red Cross is completing its big task of aiding thousands of refugees. Portable spray tanks are being used by the American Red Cross workers in Greece to expedite this campaign of the organization to check and prevent epidemics. By use of these tanks, the heads of refugees are sprayed with a disinfecting solution to kill disease-spreading vermin. The American Red Cross plans to withdraw its forces from Greece and terminate its emergency disaster relief program for the Asia Minor refugees on June 30th. Col. William N. Haskell, Red Cross Commissioner in Greece has been cabled to notify the Greek government of the Red Cross' intention to arrange transfer to local authorities and charities of the work now conducted and financed by the Red Cross.

Judge John Barton Payne, National chairman of the Red Cross, in discussing the situation, said: "The American Red Cross in materials already shipped and in other expenses incurred to date, has expended \$2,594,448.21 from its disaster emergency relief funds to succor 1,000,000 refugees who were transhipped to Greece with little warning as an incident of the Greco-Turkish war. A daily feeding program is now reaching 500,000 of the most needy of these refugees. A sanitary and medical effort of wide scope and intensive nature has warded off epidemics which threatened. American charity has prevented the refugees and the population which received them from experiencing disaster in the fullest sense of the word."

The Red Cross has been operating in Greece for six months and Col. Haskell's reports from the field agree that the situation cannot attain permanent solution through outside charity. The situation is no longer regarded as an emergency by Red Cross officials and ample time is being given the Greek government to decide for itself how it will arrange for the permanent care of the refugees.

This highest Greek officials have praised the work of the American Red Cross in Greece. King George of Greece said: "It was a great work, well carried out in an admirably organized manner."

SHANGHAI GERMANS RAISE FUND FOR RUHR SUFFERERS

Shanghai, April.—(By Associated Press.)—Dispatches received recently from Berlin conveyed heartfelt thanks to the small German community of Shanghai for a fund of five hundred million marks that had been forwarded from this port for Ruhr region sufferers. This was the first information to the general public here that such a fund had been collected in Shanghai.

The first remittance was approximately 70,000 gold marks, or roughly \$17,000.

LONDON COUNTS FEW FOREIGNERS

London, April.—(By Associated Press.)—In all London there are less than 30,000 Russians at the present time, and they form the largest alien colony in the city. This is an increase of nearly 5,000 over the figures for 1911. London counts today 27,000 Poles, 11,000 Frenchmen, and 5,750 Germans. The American colony is under 1,000.

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320 CRIPPLED CHILDREN RIDE COMFORTABLY IN SPEED WAGON BUSES

Many are the unusual problems which confront municipalities and other various departments but one of the most knotty and perplexing has been solved by the department of Motor Transportation of the city of Detroit.

The matter of transporting 320 crippled children to and from their special schools each day was the task put up to the city of Detroit with the result that twelve Reo Speed Wagons equipped with bus bodies were purchased after a careful study and survey of the various motor vehicles which were adaptable for use in this capacity.

In the selection of the transportation units it was necessary to take two vital factors into consideration. First the children, naturally delicate, would have to ride protected from the jars and jolts of ordinary bus travel. Second, the power plant in any bus to

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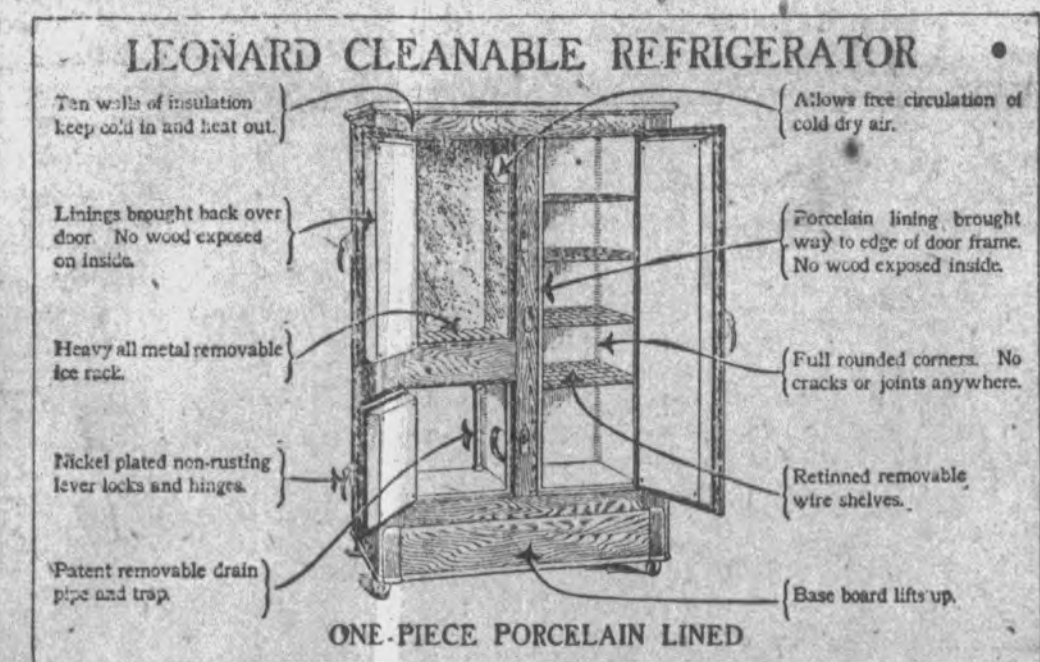


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
