Airmen Set New Record Non-Stop Continental Flight

SAN DIEGO, CALIF., May 4. —More than 20 years after the strange machine guided by Orville Wright arose faltering at Kitty Hawk, N. C., and spent a few minutes in the air groaning and creaking, there stands in the hangar at Rockwell field the lineal descendant of that "contraption," which only day before yesterday was at Hempstead, N. Y., more than 2,500 miles away.

The machine traversed the continent in air under its own power, and without stop in 26 hours, 45 minutes and 48 seconds. The men who flew the big monoplane are Lieut. Oakley Kelly and John MacCready, who between them already hold seven records for speed, duration of flight and weight taken into air on a single airplane.

IMMIGRATION LAW DEFENDED BY CHIEF

WASHINGTON, May 4.—W. W. Husband, United States commissioner of immigration, says that in spite of the fact that it is conceded in Washington that the Dillingham quota law of 1921 has been an unqualified success, amendments will probably be made in it.

One of the probable changes would raise the quota of immigrants yearly admitted to 5 per cent, computed not on the census of 1900, but on that of 1890, admitting not 155,000, as at present, from south and east Europe, but only 50,000; but 400,000 from the countries of north and west Europe instead of the present 200,000.

"At any time," Husband said, "business men and manufacturers want more labor, I think they can have it, only providing it comes from countries whose citizens readily become assimilated here."

The best class of immigrants has come to America this year in its history. The British quota is going to be filled, the Swiss and Belgian quotas are already used up, the Swedish will be in June, the French will perhaps be about 75 per cent used, and the Dutch quota will be filled with a new emigration of farmers. In this connection attention is called to 234 Norwegians and Swedes who came to America in our ships last week. They showed customs inspectors cash, notes and letters of credit, totaling about \$1,000,000. Some rode first-class, second, and others steerage.

Woman Gets Chance to Clear Name In Farrar's Divorce Suit

NEW YORK, May 4.—Geraldine Farrar's divorce suit against Lou Tellegen, her husband-actor, which had been nearly completed before a referee, must be retired before a jury, the appellate division of supreme court ruled today. The ruling was made in order that Miss Vella Larimore, one of the correspondents named by the diva may have an opportunity to clear her name in public.

SANDWICH, ENG., May 4.—Francis Quimet, Boston, won the Royal St. George champion grand challenge golf trophy by defeating by one stroke Dr. O. P. Willing, Portland, Ore., in play-offs yesterday's tie.

Quimet took strokes 77 for 18 holes, while Willing took 78.

Jefferson Case Settlement Regular, Attorneys Were Informed, Judge Says; James, Dunn Offer Versions

COUNSEL FOR MRS. JEFFERSON REPLY TO JUDGE GRADY

First Told of Settlement by Solicitor Davis, They Say

Attorneys James and Son and Col. Albion Dunn, in connection with the communication of Judge Grady, made this signed statement.

Our attention has been invited to the statement of Judge Grady. We do not desire to enter into any newspaper controversy, and neither is it our purpose or desire to take issue with Judge Grady, for whom we have the highest respect. But with reference to the Guy Sutton case, which was settled at the last term of court, we feel that in view of the statement of the trial judge, a statement from us is demanded.

In the first place there was never any conference between counsel for the private prosecution and counsel for defense, and we were not advised that a settlement had been reached until we were informed of that fact by the Solicitor upon the convening of court Wednesday morning, April 26, and both of us informed the Solicitor that such a settlement would not be satisfactory to Mrs. Jefferson, and the Solicitor stated that he would inform Mrs. Jefferson of the settlement and would accept the responsibility for same, and according to Mrs. Jefferson, the Solicitor advised her to that effect.

At the same term of court a similar case against J. Kelly Hedgepeth was settled upon terms satisfactory to all parties, and about which both of us conferred with the Judge, and we can but feel that the two cases have been confused.

After the Solicitor announced the settlement, Mr. Dunn drew an order, which the court signed, directing payment of the One Thousand Dollars to Mrs. Jefferson and the costs, which order was drawn after Mrs. Jefferson had been apprised of the course the case had taken.

That we fully believe that the Solicitor in making such disposition of the case as was made, acted from the purest of motives and in accordance with what he thought was to the best interest of the State and the private prosecution.

Motion Pictures Step Into School Rooms

WASHINGTON, May 4.—During the convention of the National Education association, in Boston, Will H. Hays, head of the motion picture industry, asked the teachers to appoint a committee to draw up a program of instruction which might be carried out by means of the movies, and offered the assistance of the best technical motion picture men of the country to perfect the film course.

As a result of this offer Dr. Charles H. Judd, chairman of the educators' committee, supervised the preparation of an elaborate program for co-operation between educators and producers of educational films as part of certain courses of instruction in public schools.

Hon. Henry A. Grady, judge fifth judicial district, in a communication to The Reflector today, written from Bayboro, discusses the settlement of the Jefferson case. The judge says that he read the published statement of Mrs. Ella Jefferson, in which she criticized the compromise procedure, also the editorial in The Reflector.

Judge Grady explains that he does not desire to get into any controversy about the case, but feels that Solicitor Davis, "has been wrongfully accused of neglect in this particular case," and, "I want to state the facts as they were made to appear to me."

Dunn, that if the settlement referred to was acceptable to all parties, concerned, it would be better to have Mrs. Jefferson qualify as administratrix upon the estate of her deceased son in order that the settlement might be final and conclusive."

Packing and forwarding the boxes will begin next Monday. It is desired to make the shipment as large as possible. To this end every one is asked to make some sort of contribution of wearing apparel or other articles that can be utilized for the benefit of a needy people.

CHARGES GRAFT IN HIGHWAY WORK

RALEIGH, May 4.—"County and city paving work has been the largest source of graft in North Carolina—not graft by any county or city officers but by the contractors," declared Highway Commissioner Frank Page to the North Carolina Good Roads association in session here. "Counties and cities have just simply been paying for something they have not got."

"Not that I mean that contractors are more dishonest than other people, but they are human enough not to put any more quality into a road than they have to put into it, and in many instances county commissioners and municipal authorities have not known how to compel them to put it there," the Commissioner added before he went on to outline the inspection work done by the State road forces.

That brief thrust by the commissioner was the outstanding feature of a rather drab session of what was once one of the State's great quasi-public organizations.

11 EXECUTED IN RUSSIA

MOSCOW, May 4.—Eleven members of the Moscow housing commission convicted of bribery and corruption have been executed by shooting, it was learned today.

"In your issue of Thursday, April 26, I notice a letter from Mrs. Ella Jefferson in regard to the case of State vs. Sutton which was disposed of during the last week of Pitt Superior Court. I also notice your editorial of Friday, April 27 in regard to the same matter.

Wants Facts Known.

"I do not want to get into any controversy about matters that have been disposed of by me; but as I feel that the Solicitor has been wrongfully accused of neglect in this particular case, I want to state the facts as they were made to appear to me at the time.

"Mrs. Ella Jefferson was represented in this case, and the Solicitor was assisted by Col. Albion Dunn and the law firm of F. G. James & Son. The defendant was represented by Skinner & Whedbee and Julius Brown. Several conferences were had between opposing counsel in respect to a settlement upon a money basis, and the Solicitor came to me and asked me if I would consider a settlement of this kind in case the same was satisfactory to the private prosecution. I was informed by Judge Whedbee that at the time of the accident there were two young men in the car and that each one of these boys was going to testify that the other was driving the car. I was also informed that Mrs. Jefferson was a lady of moderate means, and her attorneys stated to me that a settlement upon a basis of one thousand dollars in cash and the costs of the criminal action would be acceptable to them.

"It is very difficult to get a jury to convict a young man of manslaughter in cases of this kind; and realizing this fact, I suggested to Col. Dunn that if the settlement above-referred to was acceptable to all of the parties concerned, it would be better to have Mrs. Jefferson to qualify as administratrix upon the estate of her deceased son in order that the settlement might be final and conclusive. This was done and Mrs. Jefferson, as her counsel informed me, signed the receipt after she had qualified as above stated.

Nothing Was Concealed.

"There was nothing concealed about the matter; it was all done in open court with my full knowledge and consent and Mr. Davis, the Solicitor, was simply acting under the advice of counsel for the private prosecution and with my full knowledge and consent.

"A deep injustice has been done Mr. Davis, and I am only writing this letter for the purpose of showing to the public that he is not to blame and that any criticism of his conduct in this particular case is absolutely unfounded. If there is any blame whatever on account of this settlement, then I am as much subject to censure as is the solicitor, for we both did what we thought was the best thing to do under all of the facts and circumstances made known to us.

"I am writing this letter without any solicitation whatever from Mr. Davis."

TAX PAYERS WHO DON'T GET FIRE PROTECTION

Urgent* need of extending adequate fire protection to every section within the corporate limits of Greenville was strikingly emphasized when the colored graded school was completely destroyed by fire early yesterday morning.

It was only a fortunate combination of circumstances that prevented serious property and possibly loss of life. As it was, the wind just happened to be blowing from the northeast and carried the flames beyond the zone of nearby dwellings. Had the conditions been reversed with the wind coming from the opposite direction, no human agency could have averted severe catastrophe.

The best fire department in the world—and Greenville has one of which it is justly proud—cannot combat flames without the first requisite—WATER. It is asserted that the nearest fire plug to the scene of the school fire is anywhere between one thousand and two thousand feet!

There is no dodging this TRUTH. Residents of this city are all entitled to proper fire protection. They pay taxes that help to maintain the municipal government. Should their homes be threatened they can only stand idly by and witness the sacrifice of their property because no provision is made for the safeguards which they pay for and have EVERY RIGHT TO EXACT.

It must be remembered that great disaster to entire communities has resulted from the cause mentioned. Some means to provide sufficient water connections to meet any emergency should be immediately undertaken.

REACTION OF LABOR COMPETITION

At present there is tendency among thousands of country folks to desert farming to participate in the inflated higher-wage inducement offered in the industrial centers. Answering this call a number of farm laborers have left Eastern Carolina to swallow the bait cast by labor agents. In this connection it should not be forgotten that wherever better financial return is offered beyond the figure of an independent living, it will be found that the cost of maintenance will quickly consume the difference.

From first hand knowledge, it can be stated without reservation of any sort, that living conditions for the wage earner in mill, factory or other manufacturing plants in the cities or towns of the north and middle west are intolerable at best. There is no separation of this declaration from the truth.

We make no arguments against the legitimacy of wage increases, or the right of the wage earners to make the most of every opportunity to better their condition. That right is unchallenged; the only question that can arise is as to what is the best policy, judged from their own standpoint.

There is no gainsaying that the compliant about instability of industry, with economic losses and human suffering that result from virtually over-night depression is well founded.

The prosperity of the great manufacturing plants last only while a state of shortage is being made up. The hysterical reports influencing thousands to leave a certain living on the farm to join the ranks of tremendous earning power is largely mythical. It will prove that considerable of the work is temporary. With the result that thousands will find themselves not only without employment, but have paid a high price for the experience.

Wide publicity given to the activities of the steel interests in the Pittsburgh district convey just the idea intended—that boom times

are on. The best and most successful business interests know that booms must be prevented and that can be accomplished only along slow and stable lines.

While there is no doubt but that this condition will arrive, but the process of coming so quickly out of a period of serious depression should not be over stated at the expense of farm labor.

DISSENSION AMONG REPUBLICANS ACUTE

With practical politicians and leading officials of the republican organization ranging themselves against President Harding, it appears that his defeat for the renomination is inevitable—if he does not withdraw before the next national convention convenes. Those whose business it is to read political portents and signs are fully agreed that the prediction will be fulfilled.

This new and powerful combination against Mr. Harding reinforces the opposition of the progressives and radicals who are resolved that he shall not continue in the presidency.

Leaders of this faction—all seasoned politicians—would prefer to furnish Mr. Harding with an excuse and an occasion to eliminate himself, but this can be put down as certain—if he declines to step aside gracefully they will bowl him over.

The fact is that a large faction of the republican party is convinced of Harding's "unavailability" and are determined to substitute someone else to make the race in 1924.

Increasing antagonism is constantly growing against the President in Pennsylvania, Indiana, Illinois and other eastern and mid-west states. It is openly admitted in some these states that Harding would be badly beaten in a primary contest by even an obscure candidate.

"LEADING BRIDES TO THE ALTAR WITH GUNS STRAPPED TO THEIR WAISTS"

Chief Magistrate McAduo, addressing the convention of police chiefs of the country the other day in New York, declared that the time was rapidly approaching unless there was a radical change, when brides would be led to the "altar with guns strapped to their waists."

As one means to correct the practice of carrying concealed weapons the magistrate urged the enactment of a federal law which would put virtually a prohibitive tax on the manufacture and importation of revolvers and pistols.

Commenting on the suggestion the New York Times, has this to say:

The object, it appears, is to keep criminals from getting such weapons. The incidental effect, admittedly, will be to keep honest citizens from having means of protection against criminals beyond that furnished by the police. Judge McAduo, speaking from long experience and respected authority, says that it is a delusion that the armed citizen is safer, in a burglary or hold-up, than the one who carries no gun. The danger is that the criminal will take his gun away from him and beat him with it. Let him go unarmed and be thankful that he escapes with the loss of his valuables.

This is the doctrine that robbery ought to be endured in fear of felonious assault if resistance is, in the long run, considerable. And Judge McAduo's assumption that honest men who have guns in the house will neither know how to use them nor have the chance to do so seems unwarranted.

The criminals will go on getting guns, despite such laws. They get them now. The Sullivan law, ineffective as a preventive, has considerable usefulness in enabling the police to hold suspicious characters pending investigation of other crimes. It could be made more effective by amendment. Without similar buttressing laws in other states it will never be very effective; but neither license laws nor prohibition of manufacture will stop the manufacture of guns for criminals and their use by criminals. As to the comparative safety of the armed and unarmed citizen, a man who knows how to use his gun is not likely to be ruined by the opportunity of resistance.

There is, or used to be, something in the Constitution to the effect that the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. We abolished liquor because some people misused it, and the Eighteenth Amendment is slowly but steadily wiping out the Fourth. Because some people misused firearms, nobody must be allowed to have them. People who misused liquor still get it under prohibition; it is the moderate drinkers who have been inconvenienced. People who misuse firearms will still get them if this new law is passed; the honest citizen will be delivered into their hands.

Full Grown Leopard Invades Burma Town People Panic Stricken

MANDALAY, Burma. — Widespread excitement has been created among Mandalay residents by the discovery of a full-grown leopard hiding under a house in one of the most crowded quarters. The beast ranged at large for a short time, but was shot by an officer of the Irrawaddy Flotilla Company before doing any damage.

How this leopard found its way into the city is not definitely known. Some thought it came from the neighborhood of Amarapura where there is a large area of tick jungle. Another theory was that it boarded one of the Irrawaddy fuel steamers which tie up alongside the bank at night, and was thus carried to Mandalay.

It had been more than 10 years since a leopard penetrated into Man-

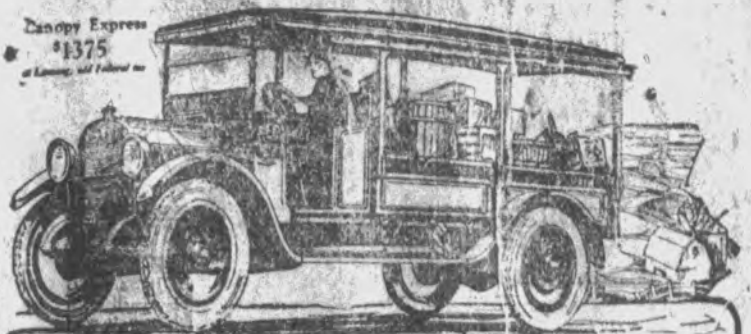

SAVINGS OF SCHOOL CHILDREN TOTALS NEARLY 14 MILLION

NEW YORK.—Growth of membership in public school savings bank systems of the country from 802,000 in June, 1921, to 1,543,406 on February 1, 1923, and a grand bank balance of \$14,144,716 on the same date, are shown in the reports just made public by the American Bankers' Association.

The total savings during the school year ending January 31 amounted to \$4,457,000. The grand balance of more than 14 millions is twice as large as the balance reported last June. Four hundred and one savings systems in as many cities are included in the reports.

The A. B. A. honor roll, bearing the names and records of villages and towns in which at least 75 per cent of the official school enrollment are participating as savers, includes 207 towns this year, as compared to 102 last June and 87 in January, 1922. The 1,543,406 school children participating in the savings systems represent a total school enrollment of \$3,445,629.

In the Class A Division of the honor roll, for systems of enrollments over 10,000, 28 cities are listed, led by Canton, Ohio, with 98 per cent, or 13,789 to the total enrollment of the city's schools participating in the savings. The total savings for the school year were \$36,163 and the average net individual deposit \$2.54.

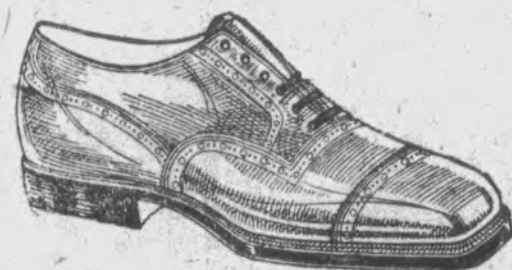

He will appear here in international races to be held June 30 and July 1. Hungarian and Austrian swimmers also are expected to compete.

Negotiations are under way to have Weissmuller give an exhibition later in Berlin, together with the Swedish swimmer, Arne Borg, of Stockholm. Borg competed in a 400-meter race here last month and won the event in four seconds better than the time at which Heinrich of Leipzig, who took second place, established a new German record.

Murder Mystery Solved By Empty Eye Sockets

SHANGHAI. — Why two Chinese policemen were murdered under singular circumstances recently in what is called the Kiangwan district, Shanghai, remained a puzzle until, by chance, two days after the crime, it was ascertained that the eyes of both victims had been gouged out. This discovery cleared up the mystery for the Chinese authorities, who recognized an ancient criminal practice.

The two police had been bludgeoned to death at different times in the night and their bodies, one a half mile from the other, had been left near the Shanghai-Woosung railway line. They had not been robbed and their carbines were found with the bodies. A foreign inquirer, questioning a Chinese police official about the murders, was answered briefly.

"Police see to much," the official said.

DARKNESS REVIVES INSTINCT OF CHASE IN CAGED ANIMALS

LONDON.—Wild animals in captivity live at night an imaginative life entirely different from their dull day hours when the curious file by in front of their cages, according to R. T. Pocock, superintendent of the Zoological Gardens of London who is about to retire after many years of service. At night the inborn habits of the jungles show themselves in striking fashion, and the beasts throw off the sleepy veneer of indifference they seem to adopt when humans stand in front of their enclosures and speculate upon what might happen were the animals suddenly given their liberty.

Speaking of the difference he has noticed in the behaviour of wild beasts by day and night, Mr. Pocock says:

"If you go into the lions' house during the day you are nearly always impressed by the peaceful way in which the animals regard you. But visit them in the darkness and instantly you are aware of the change."

"As if by magic their instincts to hunt and to kill have returned. Nothing is more weird than to walk past the cage of a lion or a tiger and then to turn around. To your astonishment you see that the animal, as you went by, has been stalking you, just as if he were still living in natural surroundings. On the instant you turn your head he drops flat on the floor of the cage. His great, like body remains perfectly still as he lies there intently watching you. I do not think wild animals like these ever lose their instincts, no matter how long they are kept in captivity. And at night, when all is still and there are none of the distractions of the daylight, they can live again in the world from which we have brought them."

Would Popularize Fish.

BOULOGNE.—A "Fish Week" will be held in Boulogne next September, when a fishing exposition will be opened in this seaport. There will be demonstrations of various ways of cooking fish, and visitors will be served free with fish dishes they have never before tasted.

British Henpecked Club Enjoys Outing

YORKSHIRE, May 4.—The members of the famous Yorkshire organization known as the "Henpecked Club" had their "once a year outing" recently.

To an isolated hamlet, miles to the west of Halifax, the president of the club invited his "fellow bondsmen of the scrubbing brush and pail" to gather, and as every member was loyal to his pledge of secrecy, the "henpecked" were not disturbed by the "henpeckers."

The club is counted as the oldest in existence, Adam being claimed as the first member. Every year new members are enrolled, but applicants have to pass a severe test providing absolute proof that on every day in the year, except the day of their outing they are "slaves of the apron strings and domestic drudgery."

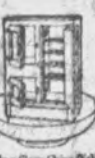
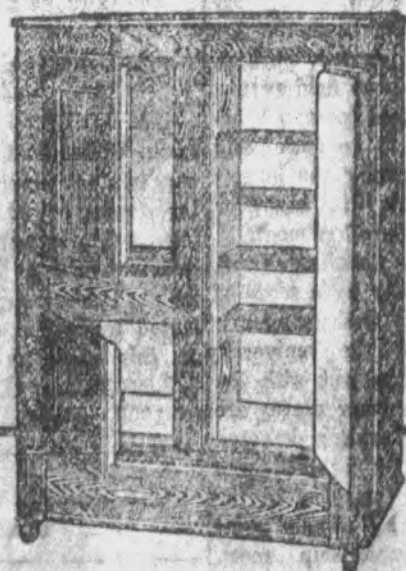

STATE SEEKS DATA ON SALT SOURCES

CHAPEL HILL, May 4.—That there was once a sizable famine in North Carolina is a fact long since forgotten in the recurring worries of housewives over the scarcity or high cost of sugar. In the Civil War era, however, every veteran and person of knowledge at the time will recall how the lack of the most essential mineral was brought home in a very forcible manner by the stoppage of shipments from the beds and mines, and how this lack was met in a partial manner by evaporation of what was commonly supposed to be sea-water. The operations from which this emergency supply of salt was obtained were confined almost entirely to Currituck county, state state.

Recent suggestions have made more reliable information as to this ancient recourse of much contemporary interest, and the North Carolina geological and economic survey is anxious to sift them through investigation. Just how was this salt obtained and what and where were the sources of the supply? If the brine was obtained from shallow wells and was decidedly different from sea-water, the fact might have very important bearing on the geological structure of the region. The survey particularly wishes to get definite information as to these old works and the methods that were followed, and is seeking to get in communication with anyone who remembers or has information concerning them.

Carolina Track Meet Is Under Way Today

CHAPEL HILL, May 4.—The annual North Carolina inter-collegiate track meet is getting under way here this afternoon with preliminaries being held in all the dashes, hurdles, middle distances and the field events. The finals will be held tomorrow afternoon, starting at 3 o'clock and Chapel Hill is expecting the largest crowd for the events that has ever witnessed a North Carolina meet.

Supporters of the Carolina team, which defeated Trinity by a score of 85 to 41 and State College by a 78 mark, believe that the university squad will again come out with the championship, but former scores are not always proof. Carolina defeated State College in a dual meet here two years ago and then lost to the West Raleigh boys by a half point margin in the championship meet. The Techs, it is thought, will be strong contenders again and Trinity will have a good chance at high scoring honors.

ISLAND POST OFFICE ORIENTAL GRADE BAG

HONOLULU.—That the spirit and smells of the Far East hover over the Honolulu post office as one of the prime evidences of the city's cosmopolitan position at "the crossroads of the Pacific," is revealed any day on which a vessel arrives from the Orient.

Dead snakes, mah-jongg sets, Filipino smoking tobacco strong enough to knock a man down, strange musical instruments, pork, betel nuts, dried fish, herbs for medicine, jade mandarin coats, silks, fans, ancient eggs, porcelain, kimono, idols and material for soups—this is a typical list of items that may be found in any mail from Japan, China and the Philippines according to Postmaster D. H. MacAdam.

The miscellaneous packages also bring with them a tremendous amount of detail work, for at least 50 per cent of all the letters and packages in a mail from the Orient are addressed solely in the language of their origin, which must be translated into English before they can be distributed. For instance, out of a recent mail containing 12,000 letters, 6,000 were addressed only in Japanese characters. This necessitates the employment of Japanese, Filipino, Chinese and Korean clerks.

Esperanto Congress Meets.

NUERNBERG.—Thirty-five different countries are represented by the 2,500 delegates so far registered for the international Esperanto congress which will be held here August 2 to 8. A number of governments, as well as international organizations, have indicated they will send representatives. A feature of the week's program will be the presentation in Esperanto of Lessing's "Nathan the Wise" and a vocal selection from Mozart, also in Esperanto.

400,000 Used Cars in Stock.

ST. LOUIS.—Automobile dealers in the United States had 400,000 used cars in stock March 15, with a capital investment of \$152,206,340, according to figures announced at headquarters here of the National Automobile Dealers' association. The estimated losses the dealers will absorb on this stock and investment total \$23,591,932 for the first three months of 1923, it was added.
