That is no argument, and no progressive, sensible tax payer would raise the slightest objection to paying his small pro rata for such a service.

When the board meets next Monday, it is suggested that some time and thought be given to this highly practical plan of giving Pitt County efficient guaranty against reckless driving.

DR. DAWSON TELLS KIWANIS CLUB OF COUNTY PROJECTS

School System Expansion, Paved Roads, Others-Recounted

Last evening's session of the regular semi-monthly meeting of the Kiwanis Club observed as "Farmers Night" without exception was one of the most interesting programs in the history of local Kiwanis. Representatives from practically every township of the county were guests of the club, together with several local persons.

President Fitzgerald following the usual preliminaries introduced as the first number Mr. Charles Butler, a member of the Entzinger evangelistic party who with songs, humor and serious thoughts entertained about ten minutes. He complimented the club for what it stood in the building of the characters of men, which was recognized as the first step in the fulfillment of their motto "We Build."

For the benefit of those not familiar with Kiwanis, President Fitzgerald outlined briefly the purpose of the organization. Need More Feed Crops. County Agent Reeves, recently chosen to succeed W. B. Pace as chief of the farm demonstration work of the county was presented. Being a former resident of Georgia, the State in which the boll weevil has run rampant for several years, gave briefly the history of the pest and what methods the growers used in combating the weevil in the cracker state. He stated that diversified farming was the best course for the farmers of Pitt county to pursue just now in the early stages of the arrival in our midst of the cotton boll destroyer.

He added that the farmers should give more attention to raising food crops for self and stock, because approximately \$400,000,000 was being sent out of the county each year for hay and various other crops that could be grown on our own soil. Dr. Dawson Speaks.

One of the principal features of the evening was an address by Dr. W. W. Dawson, chairman of the county commissioners who was chosen to acquaint the assembly with the county's government. Introducing Dr. Dawson, President Fitzgerald took occasion to refer to him as one of the biggest individuals in the community, and a man that had sacrificed a great deal because of the intense interest he had in the welfare of our county and its people. The speaker based his remarks on the various organized bodies of the county that function with the commissioners in serving the people. These included the board of education, highway commission and a great number of other departments coming under the head of the county government. Dr. Dawson said that a regular tax collector was one of the first and most important present needs of the county just now. He dwelt at length on the capabilities of the men that filled the offices, especially calling attention to what had been attained by the board of education and the highway commission. He said according to information furnished by the educational board that it was their intention as rapidly as possible to organize the entire county into school districts which would eventually bring the children to centrally located school buildings that would give every child the same educational advantages, which they deserve.

Kiwanians Will Help. He called the Kiwanians attention to the fact that they had a part in this great program as a club and as individuals, and hoped that they would exert their utmost in seeing that the board's program is brought to an early conclusion.

LAUSANNE PEACE MEETING MAY FAIL, GET U. S. INTO SPLIT

Foreign Advisers Question Threatens Collapse of Parley

LAUSANNE, May 5.—The United States has been dragged into a controversy that threatens to cause the collapse of the second Near East peace conference. The delegates are desperately seeking a solution of the situation to prevent the rupture feared in consequence of radical differences between the Turks and Allies and the Americans over the special legal guarantees to be accorded to foreigners in the place of the former consular courts abolished by Turkey as part of the capitulations.

The controversy hinges on the authority to be granted the foreign legal advisers Turkey agreed to employ, and also upon the possible obligations incurred by the Allies to their feverish activities at the last conference, when the French and Italians, aided by the American representative, intervened at the last minute in an unsuccessful attempt to prevent the collapse of the conference.

Ismet Pasha again today offered to sign the Italian formula which was accepted then, but which the Allies have now withdrawn, the British never having ratified it. Ismet declared today during the proceedings that the Americans had distinctly approved the Italian draft.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 5.—Repeal of the state prohibition enforcement law and the passage of a bill directed at the Klu Klux Klan, marked the work of the legislature which concluded its annual session today. Governor Smith, is expected to sign both bills.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Coming in the midst of renewed effort to cut off New York's liquor supply at sea, the action of the New York legislature in repealing the state enforcement laws which heretofore has aided federal enforcement within the borders of the state, is looked upon here as increasing many fold the difficulties of federal prohibition forces assigned to that territory.

PINEHURST, May 5.—The committee on resolutions of the North Carolina Bankers' association, of which Joseph B. Ramsey, president of the First National Bank, of Rocky Mount, is chairman, at the conclusion of the session this morning announced that a resolution putting the question on record as opposed to the extension of branch banks in North Carolina would be introduced from the floor at the business session today, either by the committee or by an individual. This move bringing the question to the floor is expected to precipitate one of the warmest battles in the history of the association.

THIRTY EIGHT HURT IN VIENNA STREET RIOTS

VIENNA, May 5.—Violent rioting occurred in the streets here throughout last night. The trouble started when police attempted to protect meeting of reactionaries. Officers charged that the crowd of workmen were armed with clubs, stones and knives, and they used their weapons to protect themselves. Thirty-eight police and more than 40 civilians were hurt, many seriously.

Liquor Ruling Is Protested by France

PARIS, May 5.—The foreign office has prepared a note for transmission to Washington reflecting the settlements of French steamship operators against the American ruling making illegal the transportation of liquor in the territorial waters of the United States.

The note, it is reported, expresses surprise at the interpretation of the law as made by the United States Supreme Court and indicates that if all the nations applied their local laws to foreign vessels, ocean navigation would soon cease.

Meanwhile, Minister Ralberti is conducting a research into the ancient laws of France governing shipping, which it is understood may form the basis of reprisals in applying restrictions on American ships in French waters.

An international conference of steamship owners is forecast here as a means of reaching a settlement of the question.

FARMER MUST GET BETTER PRICES

C. E. Brooks, president of the North Carolina Bankers' association, at the annual convention of the organization at Pinehurst yesterday spoke real words of wisdom and prophecy. Among other things he declared: "The present wave of prosperity or recovery from post-war deflation, is not well balanced, because the farmers are not getting a fair share of the profits."

Mr. Brooks is very correct. It is poor logic and will not work out economically that this nation can get on a stable basis of prosperity unless agriculture receives its just proportion of money distribution. To attain any degree of permanency the underlying industry of our life must be first protected. Farmers must receive a fair return for their products not only in order to live, but to insure future production.

During the period of depression from which the nation is now emerging the farmer was the first hit and the hardest. He is now paying almost as much for his farming supplies and equipment as he did during the peak of high prices. On the other hand, it is being proved every day, that he is not receiving anything like a fair price for what he produces, commodities that are absolutely necessary to sustain life.

Those who are accepted as students of the agricultural situation and speak with authority do not see any relief until the Ruhr crisis is settled, which it is believed will stabilize the European markets and create a demand for American agricultural products that will give the farmer a fair profit.

It is further contended that unless the conditions in Europe are quickly adjusted, the present boom in the large commercial and industrial centers will either slow down or blow itself out.

The farming situation is just as bad in the great grain growing belts of the middle west and northwest as it is in the south among cotton and tobacco planters.

Agriculture must be first recognized as the greatest of all industries in the matter of well balanced profits for production, before this country can feel secure in the knowledge

that genuine and lasting prosperity has arrived.

THEIR LOSS WILL NOT BE FELT

Thirty-five miners sailed from New York this week for Russia, bound for the Kuzbas mines in Siberia. If they find the same experience that others have met from this country who answered the call of "Big Bill" Haywood, convicted leader of a conspiracy band, who jumped his appeal bond and is an exile, they will soon regret their going. However, extended their stay may be they will not be at all missed.

Men who raise the Soviet flag in expression of the beliefs and hopes with which they depart obviously are not of the material out of which American citizens can be made. Their self deportation becomes them better than anything else they are likely to do.

What is going to happen to them after they get under the rule for which they profess such admiration—that is their own affair. They have been forwarded by the terrible experience of other pilgrims with like ideas that Russia is something less than a paradise for workers who have been in this country and received here a sort of treatment and a degree of liberty, which, however, inadequate to their opinion it was, still is remembered with regret when contrasted with a "dictatorship of the proletariat" as exemplified under Lenin, Trotsky & Co.

The members of that firm are not easy bosses, and in nothing have they been less successful than in realizing the hopes of American sympathizers who have crossed the sea to test the beauties and joys of communism.

THE SACRED COW OF DIPLOMACY

The Monroe doctrine has long been one of the sacred cows of diplomacy. President Wilson was roundly berated by Americans for permitting the description of the doctrine in the league covenant as a "regional understanding." Whenever any one high in authority has spoken of it as subject to new interpretation, he has forthwith been accused of sacrilege by all true believers. This may explain the anxiety of an American diplomat to prevent the doctrine from being profaned by contact with the rest of the world. The suggestion was recently made that it might be well for the Latin-American states to adopt the principles of the doctrine. The idea was dismissed with the reply that it was "a unilateral national policy of the United States."

It is difficult to imagine that the adoption of the principle of the Monroe doctrine by the Latin-American countries would either weaken or accept this policy in form, even for the most part they abode by its spirit.

It may be recalled by some, that the old German Chancellor Bismarck looked upon it as an impertinence to Europe, and that other European statesmen, both before and since his time, have resented its very existence. If now it could become in form and in fact a doctrine of all the Americans, it would carry greater weight than ever.

The Monroe doctrine has ceased to be purely unilateral. Even those "progressive" senators who have so jealously guarded its sanctity should not object to extending its cult among people who will add to its spirit.
