Pitt County, when finally awakened to the importance and necessity of improved roads lost no time in pushing the development of its

program. When the primary and secondary projects are connected, this county will have more than 100 miles of splendid highways. It will lead the counties of the state in similar improvement. Other far-sighted projects can be DONE the same way.

Chinese Robbers Ask Million For Captives Release

PEKING, May 8. — With 19 foreigners, most of them Americans, still held by Chinese bandits who seized the Shanghai express Sunday, according to the latest report received here was that a ransom of \$1,000,000 had been demanded for the release of the captives.

It is declared that the desperadoes are holding out for their own portions. Bandits are using the captures as shields against bullets fired by pursuing troops.

Guardian Neglected Child Is Fined For Violation School Law

J. R. Strickland of the Arthur community was arraigned before Justice Peace B. F. Tyson Saturday morning for violation of the school law. Evidence was offered showing this man was guardian of a child and through neglect on his part the child had not been given proper school advantages, not only during this school year but during the past five years. Justice Tyson took occasion to call attention to the seriousness of neglecting the children by not giving them proper school advantages. This being the first offense a small fine of \$10 with costs was imposed with instructions to have the child given proper medical attention preparatory to the opening of school in the fall.

HELD FOR WRITING WORTHLESS CHECKS

Jesse Hathaway, white, resident of the Bethel section of the county, who seemingly has a mania for passing bogus or worthless checks on local business houses was yesterday placed behind the bars of the county jail for such alleged practices.

The accused came to Greenville some time ago and issued checks to W. L. Best, A. G. Waters, Burton Jewelry Co., McKay, Washington & Co., and others to which he signed various signatures among them being A. Andrews and B. S. Hathaway, both residing near Bethel. The first of the checks presented here was to McKay, Washington & Co., in the amount of \$41.50. It was this firm that caused his arrest yesterday. A man by the name of Bullock by whom Hathaway was employed went on his bond and made good the amount of the check. But when the case was called before Magistrate Tyson this morning the other gentlemen who were victims of the check flashing came forward and requested that the accused be re-arrested, which was done.

Although identified by some member of each of the above firms, Hathaway still insists that he is innocent of all charges with the exception of the first named check. Because of the fact that he has a family of a wife and two small children it has been intimated that the charges may be withdrawn upon the payment of the bad checks, and cost attached to the court action.

SAYS CURB MARKET EARNS READY CASH

Discussing the prospects of the curb market for Pitt county to be opened in Greenville, Saturday morning of this week in Forbes and Morton's warehouse, Secretary Bartlett of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, had this to say here today:

By N. G. Bartlett.

"I am delighted to learn that Pitt county is going to furnish an outlet for the surplus produce raised on the farms, through the curb market. It is one of the best means of getting the consumer and the producer together on a proposition that will be mutually beneficial. The farmers of this community should take advantage of this opportunity to dispose of their surplus produce.

The housewife should give this new venture a fair trial. Scores of farmers do not want to peddle out their produce and will not go to this extra trouble. But with the curb market they can come and will come, and dispose of all their surplus produce at the market price.

It will add to the individual wealth of the community because it will help to turn this extra produce into cash. It is a good plan and we hope it will get the support that it deserves."

Irish Irregulars Being Hard Pushed

DUBLIN, May 8.—Round up of the Irish irregular is progressing in the mountain, near Blessington county, Wicklow, where large numbers are reported to be hiding, according to reports received today.

Heavy firing has been heard in the vicinity of Blessington, and later more than a dozen prisoners were brought into town.

British Chancellor to Give Reparation View

LONDON, May 8.—Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of the exchequer, stated in the house of commons today, that he regretted the precipitancy of the French-Belgian reply to the German reparation note. He declared he would state his own view in a separate reply without delay. Stanley added there was reason to have Italy in accord with Britain and he contemplated such procedure.

JARVIS METHODIST CHURCH TO OCCUPY NEW HOME SUNDAY

Church and Sunday School to Combine First Service

On next Sunday, May 13, the Jarvis Methodist Sunday school will move into its handsome new building. The officers and teachers of the Sunday school and the church are planning to make a great day of it. The Sunday school and church services will be combined in one. There will be one service beginning at 10 o'clock and running until about 12 o'clock; not one minute of it will be allowed to drag. Things will be done and said that will keep the interest at fever heat throughout. Mr. Patton, former pastor, who worked hard to start the building will be present.

The Sunday school has been holding its services in the high school building for the past six months. In spite of the fact that they have been holding it away from the church the Sunday school has been able to maintain an average attendance of around 500. From now on friends of the Sunday school expect to see it grow by leaps and bounds. Jarvis Memorial church now has a membership of over 800, and the Sunday school authorities are planning to have a Sunday school attendance equal to the church membership.

The program Sunday will give special attention to the fact that it is Mothers' Day. Part of the program will be devoted to them. There will be flowers and special music for them. Mr. Burt James' class will act as an automobile committee, which will go out and bring to Sunday school all the oldest members of the church, and there will also be maintained a nursery. This nursery will be under the direction of Miss Julia Harris' class, and the babies will be taken care of while the mothers attend Sunday school.

Definite announcement as to detailed program will be made later.

Out-Door Girls From Many States Holding Meeting in Chicago

CHICAGO, May 8.—The all round outdoor girl from almost every state in the union will be at the National Travel and Outdoor Life Exposition to be held here beginning today. A contest whose entrants will be outdoor girls has been arranged, and is expected to rival in interest the beauty contests that have been so popular in recent years.

The rules provide that each outdoor girl entrant must be typical of the region she represents in traits, dress appearance and physical accomplishments. She must know something about riding a horse, fishing, swimming, golfing, or any other of the numerous out-of-door sports.

The exposition itself, which has been organized to sell America to Americans, will include exhibits picturing the recreational features of various regions. Deer, moose, and different kinds of fish and game will be on exhibition with native guides to instruct where each may be found.

Italian Says Mexican Police Murdered Six

LAREDO, TEX., May 7.—Viavano Larraro, an Italian—seriously wounded, made his way to Columbia, New Mexico and today reported that his brothers Nicoli and Sitto and four compatriots had been shot and killed by Mexican policemen and several companions who guided them to a lonely spot on the Rio Grande river, under the guise of aiding them to enter the United States. Larraro declared that the group of Italians had paid the policemen to smuggle them across the river.

County officers raided a store near Parker's Chapel, five miles from the city, and found a five gallon still. Simon House and Jake Plennmons, both colored, were arrested and lodged in jail.

Plennmons, a cripple, when arraigned before Judge Cooper, in county court, was sentenced to eight months on the roads. The court, however, taking into consideration Clemons' affliction suspended sentence, provided he leave the state. This he promised to do, and would lose no time in crossing the state line. According to the testimony House had only one half-pint of liquor and judgment was suspended for six months pending good behavior.

French Wage Earners Denounce Food Cost

PARIS.—The employees of the department stores of Paris are today making loud demands for more pay. They say the cost of living has advanced three-fold since 1919. Their main complaint is in the matter of food, and the government has intervened by trying to regulate the price of bread.

The department stores had a lesson not long ago when they advanced the price of clothing. French women simply did not buy dresses when prices soared beyond their reach. The store proprietors began to lose money, and thus were compelled to scale down their prices.

Cotton on Hand In U. S. 6,39,000,000

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Stocks of American cotton on hand April 1, according to the department of commerce today, is estimated at 6,39,000 bales while the total world stocks amounted to 12,10,000,000 bales.

200 Killed By Italians In Tripoli Operation

ROME, May 8.—Fifteen hundred rebels defeated and 200 killed by Italians in the latest operation in Tripoli, according to official statements issued here today. Nineteen native soldiers were killed and 19 wounded, the reports say.

ARMY VESSEL SAFE.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., May 8.—The army vessel Q-15, which was reported lost at sea since May 5, dropped anchor in Bayboro harbor here last night, following a rough time on high seas.

HIGH GLEE CLUB HAVE CONCERT THURSDAY

The annual concert of the Glee Club of the Greenville High School will be given Thursday evening of this week at the high school auditorium at 8:00 o'clock.

The Glee Club this year is under the direction of Prof. Mullberger and Miss Bass of the music department. These two working together have achieved some wonderful results. Their program on Thursday evening lasts for about an hour, and will be one of such a nature as to appeal to every one. There will be no admission charge for this program. It is simply an effort on the part of the school administration to show the friends of the school what can and ought to be done in a musical way in the public schools. The Greenville schools have one of the strongest music departments of any school in this state. They believe that music is one of the biggest factors to the success of any school.

In addition to the Glee Club the school has an orchestra which has developed under the direction of Miss Bass. This orchestra is a credit to the school and the town.

Will Revise Fire Protection Scope

CHICAGO.—Important revisions of present standards of fire protection to keep steps with changes in industrial progress will be submitted to the delegates of the twenty-seventh annual convention of the National Fire Protection association who will assemble here tomorrow for a three day conference.

Regulations adopted in former years by the association, which heretofore have been of interest only to underwriters and valuable to them in estimating hazards, are now becoming popular and in common use as a guide by municipal and state bodies having jurisdiction over fire protection and prevention, according to a statement issued by officials of the national association here.

Interest in the primary was the greatest ever manifested in a city election. This was intensified because of the large vote polled by the women. It is the first time in a similar primary that more than 75 per cent of the total registration voted.

At times during the day supporters of the two major candidates claimed victory. Clark and Blount were both active at the polls meeting friends and supporters, while workers for the candidates literally thronged the approach to the polling place in the court house. However, absence of rancor and personal feeling was notable. Regardless of partisan choice there was nothing injected into the activities of supporters to create the slightest tinge of bitterness. It was merely a matter of choice, and no open attempt was made to influence a voter from his or her preference.

The outstanding feature of the primary was the unalterable fact that the women of Greenville are greatly interested in local politics. This realization proved a genuine surprise to many old time politicians who have been prone to regard the vote of women as negligible. They are responsible for the large percentage of the total vote cast, and it is believed that they voted in greater proportion to registration than men.

The activity and interest of Greenville women clearly developed that they may be expected hereafter to take an increasing interest in national state and local politics.

The result is accepted virtually among every class in Greenville as it should be as representing the will of the majority vote, and any feeling that might have been created during the campaign between the supporters of the candidates will quickly disappear and be forgotten.

Mayor Clark and other successful members of the ticket are receiving felicitations from many quarters today.

MINISTERS COUNCIL TO URGE CAPTIVES RELEASED

WASHINGTON, May 8. — The council of ministers in Peking has decided to make urgent representations to the Chinese government and recommend that punitive measures be taken by it to obtain the release of foreigners held captives by Chinese bandits.

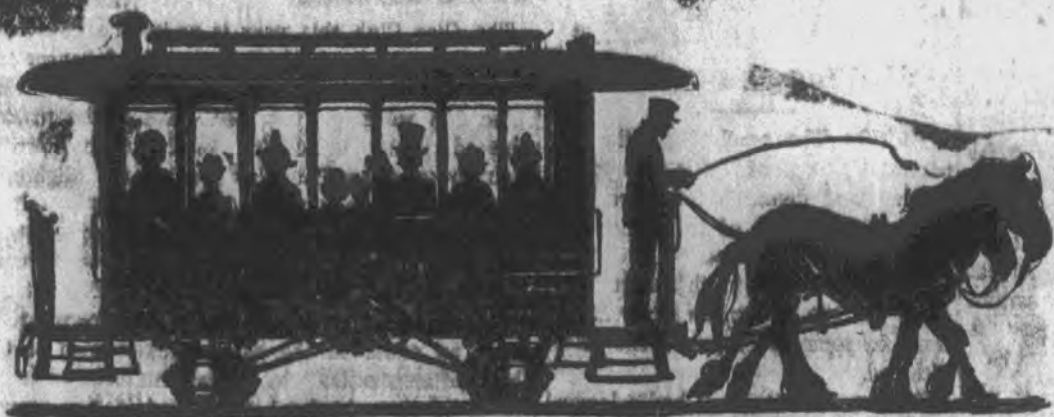

PEACE ANNIVERSARY FINDS EUROPE STILL BADLY UNSETTLED

ESSEN, Germany.—The fourth anniversary of the signing of the Versailles peace treaty to the German delegates in France will be on May 7. Also it was on the fourth anniversary of the sinking of the Lusitania that Clemenceau, representing the allied and associated powers, delivered the peace document to Count Brockdorff-Rantzau with the remark that the Germans would have 15 days in which to make written observations on the document.

The document was actually signed by the Germans and allied and associated powers on June 28, 1919, after 52 days of bickering which has been continued without cessation in conferences without number until a French army finally moved into the Ruhr and other parts of the Rhineland, and industrial Germany is in upheaval which bears little resemblance to peace.

Peace seemed near on that bright seventh of May four years ago when thousands lined the roadways at Versailles and watched the silk-hatted German delegation enter the Trianon Palace to face representatives of the powers which had defeated Germany at arms. Bismarck's work was being undone, according to the French press, and France was finally getting justice.

Clemenceau, Wilson, Orlando, Lloyd-George and most of the other leaders who participated in the ceremony at the Trianon Palace have re-

fired from office. Brockdorff-Rantzau after a somewhat stormy political career, has come back into public life as German ambassador to Russia and is struggling in Moscow to make the Rapallo treaty between Russia and Germany effective.

U. S. TEACHERS HAVE EDUCATED PEOPLE OF MANY LANDS

CAIRO.—America's influence is exerted in Europe, Asia and Africa through her educational, missionary and humanitarian institutions. In almost every country of the eastern hemisphere may be found an American school, college hospital, mission, or relief station. The activities of these institutions in France, England, Germany, Italy, Czechoslovakia and other European countries are well known, but the splendid work of American scholastic enterprises in Constantinople, Athens, Monastir (Jugo-Slavia), Samokov (Bulgaria), Beirut, Jerusalem, Cairo, and other more distant places sometimes goes unheralded.

All of these organizations may be considered as outposts of American ideals and culture. Situated in the heart of countries containing varying racial elements and sheltering groups with divergent political and religious views, they inculcate among the heterogeneous population American standards of ethics and morality, and institute a respect for the United States and the American people enjoyed by few other countries. Educational

facilities in many of these lands are rudimentary, and in many cases the American schools are the only sources of modern education.

In far-off Luxor, 450 miles up the Nile river and within the shadow of Tutankhamun's tomb, is a school presided over by American teachers where the native boys and girls are given instruction in their native tongue and in English. In Cairo is another splendid institution, under the direction of Dr. Charles R. Watson, where many Egyptians have obtained their first idea of American life and American aims and cultural standards. Indeed, there is scarcely any habi-

table part of the eastern continents from North Cape to Cape Town, where the torch of American education and enlightenment has not blazed the way for a better life and a higher standard of human achievement among minority races who have never tasted the fruits of democracy and universal education as practiced in the United States.
