HISTORY TOLD BY SCHOOL PUPILS IN SPLENDID PAGEANT

Historical Events Portrayed before big Audience

Last night at the college auditorium the model school pupils of the Greenville schools gave one of the best school pageants that it has ever been staged. The auditorium seating nearly one thousand people could not care for the audience. Standing room was at a premium. That every number of the pageant was a success of the first order was proved by the prolonged applause that greeted the children in their work. The pageant entitled "America Yesterday and Today," was historical as well as prophetic of the future, treating the present also.

The pageant was divided into three episodes. Episode I portrayed vividly Indian life. The spirit of Indian days spoke to the audience through Mary Wall Bost. Home life, the arrival of another tribe, and the smoking of the peace pipe were well carried out.

Episode II. The Spirit of the Wilderness, spoke through Rebecca Scoville. Trees, roses, daisies, poppies all put in their appearance in order and made a hit with the audience. Then came the portrayal of animal life, particularly the birds. This was followed by the pioneers who overcome the forests and established homes in the wilderness.

Episode III. The Spirit of Patriotism, spoke through Mittie Smith. She introduced the Spirit of State, the Little Town Spirit, the Big Town Spirit, then the Big Town Interests; Christianity education, community spirit, music, art, public welfare, play and forest preservation. As a climax representatives of France, England, Holland, Belgium, Sweden, and Scotland pledged their allegiance to the American flag. These representatives in turn introduced groups of children in costumes of their native land. Each group also gave a dance characteristic of their particular country.

The grand finale and ensemble was a riot of color and presented an inspiring and thrilling scene. The program was concluded with the singing of America The Beautiful, by the whole group.

Between the first and second episode the seventh grades gave a dance. Miss Gorrell of the college faculty played several violin numbers accompanied by Miss Bertolotto. These numbers were greatly enjoyed. Superintendent Rose presented to the audience the boys and girls who had a part in

Pactolus "Shooting Up" Charges Passed To the County Court

Following a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Harrington, yesterday a group of colored men were held for the action of the county on assault charges growing out of the alleged "shooting up" of Pactolus, last Sunday. Those held are: Willie Lewis, Raymond Bullock, Isam Baker, Ezra Daniel, Robert, Roland Clemons, Lewis Williams, Stephen Sheppard, James Hyman, all of Pactolus neighborhood.

It was brought out that an automobile driven by Clifton Werthington, was struck by bullets alleged to have been fired by some of the defendants while he was passing through Pactolus. Officers claimed that the trouble arose from an over indulgence in moonshine liquor and the assumption that insults had been offered "their women." It was apparent that the participants in the free-for-all shooting were not particular for a target and fired promiscuously at anything and anybody in sight.

The defendants disclaimed all connection with the affair, hence, Magistrate Harrington decided to allow the county court to pass on the case.

Huge Stack at the Waterworks Plant Is Being Removed

The 95-foot three ton steel smoke stack at the waterworks plant is being removed by veteran stevedores. The work is tedious and hazardous but the big funnel is coming down under the experienced guidance of Charles S. McFarland, Durham, and Richard Dickerson, Florence, S. C.

Early Bible Text Starts Controversy

An ancient Spanish manuscript, known as the "Codex Huntingtonianus Palimpsestus" to a few scholars who have seen it in the vaults of the Hispanic Society of America, in New York City, is the subject of a controversy between Biblical scholars, who either affirm or deny the manuscript is the earliest version of the Bible and that it differs radically from the general accepted versions. The manuscript was brought here in 1907, having been stolen from a monastery in Spain. After poring over it for weeks, Dr. E. S. Buchanan, decipherer of many old manuscripts for the British Museum, now a teacher in Ardley Towers Prep School, announced that he had discovered the Bible text embedded with a steel pen in the vellum, from which the ink had been erased.

CURB MARKET TO MAINTAIN TWICE A WEEK SERVICE

DR. WRIGHT TELLS KIWANIANS PLANS TEACHERS COLLEGE

Closs Hearn Sees Recreation Center a Reality

A large percentage of the Kiwanis membership was present last night at the regular semi-monthly session of the club, when plenty of "pep" was manifested in the handling of all matters brought to its attention.

The meeting opened in the usual manner, and at the conclusion of supper the minutes of the previous session were read and approved. President Fitzgerald turned the program over to Kiwanian Henry Rivers who presented Dr. R. H. Wright, president of the Teachers College.

He told of the progress the college had made since its first session of 1909. In this connection Dr. Wright emphasized the fact that he had long ago realized that this institution was bound to make good with the backing that had been given it by the people of Greenville and vicinity. That the spirit of helpfulness to the student body, his co-workers and himself had been a great factor in putting the college where it is today.

The speaker outlined briefly the building program which has recently been decided upon. Dr. Wright said that there was a definite scheme in connection with erection of the additional buildings, and that was to place the entire school in one unit.

Big Building Program.

He covered the approximate cost and location of the new dormitories, gymnasium, library and the homes to be erected for the members of the faculty. At the completion of the present program which covers a period of two years, the institution will be able to take care of 712 students, but there is still another program said Dr. Wright. It is his belief and also that of those closely connected with the college that two years hence, that the legislature will appropriate another million which will also be used to complete the program already outlined.

When this is done the student body would number more than twelve hundred. Dr. Wright in his concluding remarks stated that he would not be satisfied until the college was large enough to meet the needs of the public schools of State, which would give every child an equal educational advantage.

Kiwanian Victor Davis rendered very impressively to the tune of we know not what, a very pathetic little "bullet" of the parody nature in which he included several members of the club. Norfolk Southern Train is Ditched, 2 of Crew Missing

NORFOLK, VA., May 19.—Search is being made today for W. A. Grant, conductor, and Jesse Gould, colored fireman, of a Norfolk Southern freight train the engine and one car of which went through Perquimans river bridge between Eden and Elizabeth City, N. C., last night.

It was believed at the general offices of the railroad here that the two men are probably buried beneath the wreckage. Rescue parties are at work in an effort to find the missing men.

According to word received here by the local agent of the Norfolk Southern the bodies of Grant, the Conductor and Gould, colored firemen were recovered today buried beneath the wreckage in the river. It was said one brakeman was injured, and the engineer had a narrow escape. Traffic was tied up for nine hours. All trains on the main line of the railroad are being detoured by the Suffolk-Edenton branch, until repairs to the bridge are completed.

Dublin.—Ireland, long noted for the longevity of its people, has probably produced no rarer specimen of hardihood and "youth" than Harry Beasley, one of its leading jockeys, who is now 72.

DEATH LIST NOW PLACED AT 75 IN CAMDEN, S. C. FIRE

Sixty Unidentified Bodies Buried in Single Grave.

CAMDEN, S. C., May 19.—The death list in the Cleveland school house fire Thursday night has been definitely fixed at 75. Thomas Humphries, died of injuries at a hospital here last night.

Approximately 60 bodies of unidentified dead were buried here yesterday afternoon in a single grave in Beulah church yard, within a few hundred yards of the scene of the fire. Most of the identified dead were interred today.

"Sometime with fearless eyes we'll see and sometime we'll understand," the choir, composed of the best voices from the churches in Camden and other parts of the county sang.

Tears stood in the eyes of many. Strong men wept, many holding in their arms little tots orphaned by the fire, some of them sleeping.

Impressive Services.

Banked high with flowers, the freshly made grave, forty by twelve feet in dimension, abeyed its solemn beauty the quiet peace of those who a scant twenty-four hours before were planning with joyous anticipation the visit to the little school house to see the comedy played, "Miss Topsey-Turvy," presented as part of the commencement exercises of the Cleveland.

MAKING PITT COUNTY SCHOOLS SAFE
FOR CHILDREN

The terrible disaster near Camden, S. C.,
in which scores of children and others lost
their lives in a clapnet country school build-
ing, should bring home with force the neces-
sity for better country school buildings in this
county.

In an era of what we are pleased to call
progressive civilization it is shocking to be-
lieve that any community would permit the
possibility of such wanton sacrifice of human
life.

More than two hundred persons were pack-
ed into that frail shell of a building radiant
in the thought of attending the closing exer-
cises of a township school. In a few seconds

the event was turned into panic caused by an
overturned lamp. Children were crushed,
mothers with babes in their arms were
trampled to death, while rescuers were
caught in the fury of the blaze. They paid
for their heroism by sacrificing their lives.

What was a happy crowd was turned into
deepest grief and shambles.

Repetition of such a tragedy is liable any
time where such buildings are maintained for
school children without any thought of life
protection. There are several shack-type
structures in Pitt County. They should be
discarded for school purposes. Children of
the country as well as those of towns and
cities are entitled to every protection against
disaster.

Taxpayers who would raise objection to
spending money for better buildings and to
encourage higher education are shamelessly
derelict in parental and public duty.

Let Pitt County profit by the horror of the
South Carolina tragedy and push to comple-
tion a program of building that will at least
modify such dangers to the children of the
county.

It is a duty that every taxpayer owes him-
self and family. It is a duty that will be
cheerfully executed by county officials, if the
means are provided.

Delay should not be considered in eliminat-
ing such a hazard to children upon whom
our future depends.

Their precious lives should not be placed
in deliberate jeopardy.

MORE FIRE PLUGS URGENTLY NEEDED

F. J. Forbes, head of the fire department
committee, in an interview pays highly de-
served tribute to the personnel of the Green-
ville Fire company. It is gratifying informa-
tion to know that the work of the firemen
has been strengthened by the addition of a
number of young men of the city. It is val-
uable to realize that the equipment is apace
of the needs of the city; that new fire alarm
boxes are to be installed, and instructions
given to the ladies of Greenville in their op-
eration.

So far as personnel, efficiency, and equip-
ment is concerned Greenville is proud of its
fire protection service.

Irrespective of the training of a fire fight-
ing body or how willing it is to serve the pub-
lic and how efficient its apparatus is, fire can-
not be fought without adequate water sup-
ply. Happily water plugs are well and ad-
vantageously located in many sections of the
city. However, within other parts of the
corporate limits of Greenville, residents are
without fire protection.

This condition is not only unsafe, but un-
fair to taxpayers. They are certainly entitl-
ed to consideration in this vital need, and
should have it. City officials should get busy
and devise some arrangement whereby such
residents obtain service which is only reason-
able for them to expect.

It must be remembered that Greenville is
rapidly outgrowing its swaddling clothes and
with its advancement the municipal govern-
ment should see that the outlying sections are
given the improvements and service for which
they pay taxes into the city treasury for its
maintenance.

OUTLINES HEALTH PROMOTION WORK TO SOCIAL GROUP

Dr. W. S. Rankin Explains Need Before National Body

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Dr. Watson S. Rankin, secretary, North Carolina State Board of Health, and former president of the American Public Health association, whose investigations of the hook worm disease in the South attracted nation-wide interest, addressed the National Conference of Social Work here on "Unoccupied Fields in Health Promotion and Disease Prevention."

"Pregnancy receives only 20 per cent of 25 per cent of the medical attention which the condition calls for," said Dr. Rankin. "From 30 to 35 per cent of births are not attended by physicians, and the lying-in state in all probability receives less than one-third the medical care which it should have."

"Infancy, while a normal state of being is an enfeebled state, always in danger of disease from undeveloped adjustment to the ordinary conditions of life and high susceptibility to infections and a condition of being that requires scientific medical supervision and guidance not only for the sick, but for the well. The needs of infancy for medical services are not one-fifth supplied under present conditions."

"The age of childhood, with from 10 to 20 per cent of its population malnourished, 20 per cent with defects of vision, five per cent with diseased tonsils and adenoids, 75 per cent in need of dental treatment, and the entire group made more susceptible and less resistant to the common infections on account of these conditions that impair vitality, needs not less than five times the medical service which this age group now receives."

"The period of adolescence, with the temptations of sex abnormalities and venereal disease, presents an enormous problem physically and psychologically, with medical service inadequate and certainly not more than one-fifth supplied."

Trade Hurt By Style Changes

CHICAGO.—An attempt will be made by American jewelers this summer to imitate the jewelry styles of

the future, according to P. J. Coffey, of Newark, N. J. who was recently chosen president of the National Jewelry association.

"Jewelry styles have no authoritative source," said Coffey. "They are largely accidental. A reigning Parisian actress whose ears are not pretty hides them with her hair; the feminine world buries its ears under a new coiffure, and long pendant ear-rings are the vogue."

A man of fashion wears a jade stick pin to match a new scarf and everybody affects jade stickpins. The accidental discovery of an old pharaoh's tomb set going a craze for Egyptian jewelry. When this old king, from his throne of 3,500 years ago can dictate jewelry styles for America it is time for jewelers to take concerted action to regulate styles which too long have been dominated by caprice and accident."

Socialist Congress To Discuss Plans

VIENNA.—A comprehensive plan for the reorganization of the Socialist International has been drafted by the executive committee of that organization, a two day session at Bregenz Austria, and has been forwarded to Hamburg for consideration at the Socialist International to be held there next month.

The main points of reorganization are set forth as follows:

"In the Socialist Workmen's International there shall be united those socialist workmen's parties who aim to substitute the socialistic for the capitalistic mode of production and who regard class warfare as a means to the emancipation of the working classes."

"The S. W. I. assumes the task of unifying the activities of affiliated parties and combining the same in united action."

"The parties allied to the S. W. I. bind themselves not to belong to any federation outside of this existing political international association."

"The S. W. I. is only in such meas-

ure a living reality as its resolutions in all international questions may be binding upon all its parts. Every resolution of the international organization therefore means a self-sought curtailment of the autonomy of the party in the various countries."

"The S. W. I. is to be an institution not only for the solution of problems in time of peace, but also an indispensable instrument in time of war."

FAIRBANKS IN 'THE THREE MUSKETEERS' COMING TO WHITE'S THEATRE MONDAY

To satisfy in a measure this curiosity we have made a celluloid reproduction of The Three Musketeers, and we have crammed into it everything that is dramatic, instructive, human amusing and entertaining. We have tried to twang every emotion in the human system, just as D'Artagnan did in his memoirs and as Dumas did in his great novel."

The best talent procurable has been called upon to help transcribe this great story to the aluminium sheet. Edward Knoblock, one of the greatest of contemporary playwrights, is responsible for adaptation, research and costumes, while to Fred Niblo goes the honor of directing the piece. Niblo, a born adventurer, has won distinction as a master in guiding the destinies of this type of play; he is said to have no peer. Arthur Edeson, rated as a genuine lens artist is credited with the photography and is said to have achieved some effects which hitherto have been considered impossible.

In the face of the business readjustment that the country has been facing, Fairbanks has spent more money on this production than on any picture he ever before undertook, all because he has confidence in the vehicle and in the amusement-seeking public. "The Three Musketeers" is said to be the greatest picture of its kind ever made. It is ten reels in length and cost a million dollars. United Artists Corporation is releasing the film.

German Towns Seek To Tax Bachelors

COLOGNE.—How to tax a bachelor is puzzling a number of communities in the Rhineland, especially in localities where the authorities are for the most part married men with families.

The little town of Repelen, near the Dutch border, decided simply to call a spade a spade and declared an out-and-out "bachelor tax" of 2,000 marks a month. Young men between 18 and 23 years of age were permitted a 25 percent rebate, and complete immunity was provided for such unmarried chaps as had little or no income. The latter clause wrecked the scheme, for it ran the town amuck of the federal finance ministry at Berlin, which ruled the income tax was a sole and pet privilege of the central authorities. Therefore, the ministry decreed neither Repelen nor any other German community could levy against an individual's earnings.

Baptists Show Big World Gain

KANSAS CITY.—Greatly increased numbers of baptisms in all the 18 mission fields around the world during the past year were reported to the Southern Baptist convention by Dr. J. F. Love, corresponding secretary of the foreign mission board in presenting his annual report.

Southern Europe is the newest territory in which Southern Baptists have been operating during the past two years, and during the year new theological schools and publication houses were established at Barcelona, Budapest, Bucharest and Petrograd, the report said. While native missionaries have been employed in Palestine and Syria for some time, this year marked the sending out of four American missionaries who have established headquarters at Jerusalem and are now making a survey of Palestine and Syria with a view to the establishment of a more extensive work in those countries, embodying evangelistic, educational, publication and benevolent work.

Lord Birkenhead Will Address U. S. Lawyers

LONDON.—Lord Birkenhead, former Lord Chancellor and one of Great Britain's most brilliant legal minds, will sail early in August for the United States, where he will deliver this year's annual address to the American bar association. The Canadian Bar association also hopes to have the former chancellor address its members. Lord Birkenhead will remain several months in America and will make a first-hand study of all phases of American life.

SOUTH TO EXTEND WELCOME TO SONS OF REVOLUTION

NASHVILLE.—More than two hundred delegates from nearly every

May 20, 21 and 22 when Tennessee will turn out to entertain the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution in its thirty-fourth annual congress. The gathering will be held for the first time in the south. With large delegations virtually assured from New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio, Kentucky and the Pacific coast states.

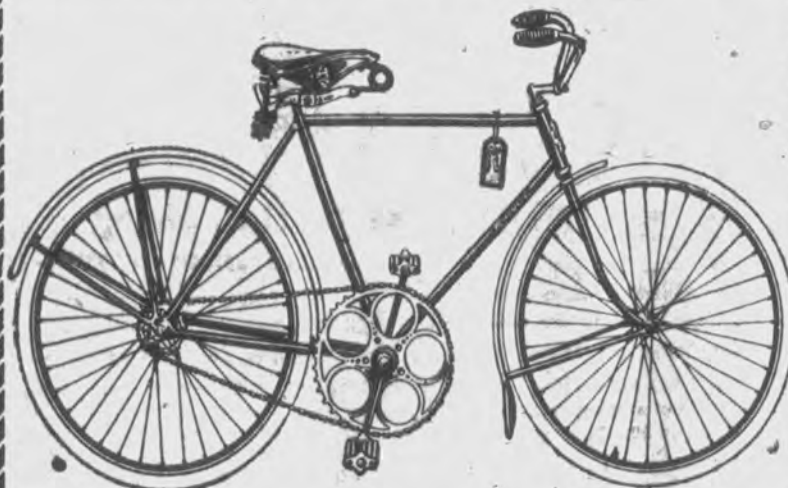
