CURZON REGARDED AS NEXT PREMIER TO SUCCEED LAW

British Statesman Resigns Because of Failing Health

LONDON, May 21.—Political gossip almost unanimously are of the opinion that Marquis Curzon, secretary of state for foreign affairs, will be offered the premiership and that either he or Andrew Baldwin, will be the successor to Andrew Bonar Law, who has resigned because of poor health.

Lord Derby is also spoken of as a possibility for the office. The age of the Earl of Balfour, is generally regarded as ruling him out.

In accepting the Premier's resignation, King George expressed the deepest regret and inquired solicitously as to Mr. Bonar Law's health. A bulletin issued today by Mr. Bonar Law's physicians said:

"In spite of his rest, the Prime Minister's voice still is unsatisfactory and we are unable to promise an improvement within a reasonable time. The state of the Prime Minister's general health is not good."

This ends Mr. Bonar Law's brief but eventful administration and it ends with important and perplexing problems, particularly Great Britain's relations with France and Russia, unsettled.

The King will summon one of the Conservative leaders to form a new cabinet. It is generally accepted that Marquis Curzon will be the next Premier.

The crisis comes upon the government in the midst of the holiday when parliament is dispersed and few members of the government are in London.

Two days ago when the result of Mr. Bonar Law's consultation with physicians in Paris became known this end was foreseen, but the country was not prepared for it and will await developments with anxiety and regrets over the untimely dropping of a trusted pilot.

One consolation, it is generally conceded Mr. Bonar Law will have, is that he has no enemies and that no one will withhold from him sympathy. He accepted his high office with reluctance; he leaves it amidst unfeigned regrets on the part of both the supporters and opponents.

Mr. Bonar Law's resignation was taken to the King at Aldershot by Colonel Waterhouse, the Prime Minister's private secretary, and Sir Frederick Sykes, his son-in-law, who motored from London. They had a long audience with the King, who appeared much moved by the news of the aggravated condition of Mr. Bonar Law's health.

Britain Reinstates Women as Police

LONDON.—Women are to be reinstated in the metropolitan police force and with increased authority. For the first time since they obtained recognition they they will have the same power of arrest as the men police.

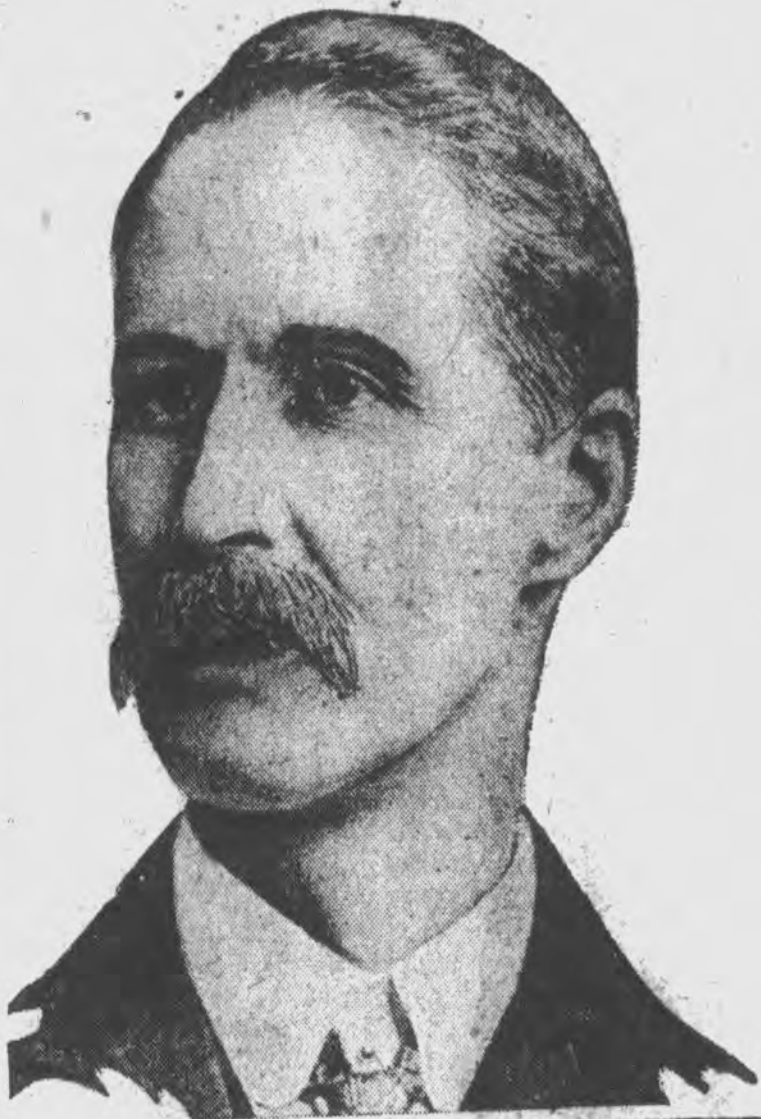
They will not be expected to perform any duties which may be beyond their physical strength, and will not be required to quell riots. Also they will not be sent to tackle burglars in empty houses or dark alleys.

There were originally 114 women constables in London. They were organized during the war. But the Geddes Committee, looking around for something to save money on, spotted them and recommended their disbandment.

St. Louis Extends Opera Season.

Lieutenant William H. Santelman, of the United States Marine Band of Washington, has been chosen as chief judge. High school bands will compete on June 4, 5 and 6 and grammar school and military academy bands on Thursday, June 7.

OTTAWA, ONT.—Canada ranks second among the nations in the world in the per capita value of exports with \$100.63 for every unit of population, according to a report issued by the Federal department of trade and commerce based on figures up to March 31.

Since that year the congregation has grown to more than 500.

Funeral Services For Camden Dead

CAMDEN, S. C., May 21.—Community memorial services for the 75 men, women and children known to have perished in the Cleveland school fire last Thursday night, were held at the Littleton Street Methodist church here last night. Ministers and members of every church in the city participated.

The services were presided over by Rev. F. H. Harding, pastor of the Camden Episcopal church, and president of the Camden and Kershaw County Chamber of Commerce. Addresses were made by L. T. Mills, of the Presbyterian church; Rev. Harding; Rev. W. H. Hodges, of the Littleton Street Methodist church; Carter Taylor, of the American Red Cross, and Circuit Judge Mended L. Smith, representing the Camden Baptist church. Rev. Bragg pastor of the Wateree Mills Baptist church, delivered the opening prayer, and Rev. Paul G. Wood, pastor of the Clover Methodist church, and former pastor of the Beulah Methodist church, of which many of the fire victims were members, rendered the closing prayer and benediction. Rev. Hatfield, pastor of the Hermitage Mills Baptist church, read the Scripture lesson.

Judge Day Quits War Claims Body, Task Too Heavy

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Former Associate Justice of the Supreme court William Day, presented to President Harding today his resignation as umpire of mixed claims commission. He explained his desire to resign was due to the recognition of the enormous volume of work facing the commission with claims aggregating almost a billion and a half dollars to be settled. In his belief a younger and stronger man should be in charge of the work of adjusting the claims on which American and German commissioners are unable to agree.

His resignation becomes effective immediately.

To Aid Overworked Chinese Children

SHANGHAI.—Various foreign women's organizations of Shanghai, notably the American Women's Club and the British Women's association, lately addressed an appeal to the Municipal Council of the International Settlement of Shanghai, asking that body to do what it could to improve working conditions for children employed in mills and factories, and to seek to put an end to night labor for children under 12 years of age.

"In bringing these recommendations to the notice of the council," says the communication sponsored by the organizations, we should like to point out that the Chinese themselves are showing an active interest in the problems presented by the development of industrial labor."

To Open Section New Paved Road To Kinston Soon

Work on the hard surfaced road between Ayden and Grifton, which forms a connecting link of the Greenville-Kinston highway is progressing rapidly, it was learned today. Under present conditions it is believed that the road will be opened to traffic earlier than originally contemplated.

It is understood that the section between Ayden and Hanrahan, will be opened to traffic next Thursday. With this stretch finished only two and one-half miles remains to be completed of the Kinston-Greenville project.

Churchmen Talk Federal Council

MONTREAT, May 21.—With three working days of the sixty-third General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church now a matter of history, the most important subjects on its calendar, the stewardship committee report, the question of withdrawal from the Federal Council of churches of Christ in America and an overture for the placing of women on executive committee—await action.

Debate on the Federal Council is expected to be re-opened immediately with the convention of the Assembly today. With opponents charging the council with maintaining a lobby in Washington or the enactment and enforcement of civil law, supporters of the organization tonight were planning to stage a strong fight to keep the assembly from severing the existing bond.

Say Kitchen Shows Some Improvement

WILSON, May 21.—Physicians today noted slight improvement in the condition of Representative Claude Kitchen, former minority leader in the lower house of congress, who has been a patient at a local hospital for several weeks. Mrs. Kitchen who is at the bedside of her husband, stated today.

Mr. Kitchen is suffering with stomach trouble, Mrs. Kitchen stated, which followed an attack of influenza. Mrs. Kitchen said the physicians attending Mr. Kitchen do not consider his condition as critical.

"Although Mr. Kitchen does not feel any better," said Mrs. Kitchen, "the doctors say his condition is slightly improved today."

Irrigation Projects May Dry Up River

COLUMBUS, Neb.—Contemplated irrigation projects and hydro-electric projects in eastern Colorado and western Nebraska will leave a dry bed of sand where the Platte river now flows, according to L. J. McAllister, Chicago engineer, who is making preliminary surveys for irrigation projects in this territory.

"I have discovered," said Mr. McAllister, "that the volume of water in the Platte river has been reduced more than 38 percent during the summer in the past 20 years by irrigation in the west, and more than 27 percent in the winter by hydro-electric projects. This reduction in the water volume reaches to the point where the Loup river flows into the Platte."

Cotton Spinning on Decreases, Claim

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Cotton spinning showed decreased activity in April as compared with March: Active spindle hours during April totaled 8,787,443.89 compared with 9,531,002.95 in March.

Assembly Rejects Report.

MONTREAT, N. C., May 21.—The general assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church rejected the minority committee report favoring withdrawal from federal councils of churches in America.

FATE OF U. S. CAPTIVES HELD BY CHINESE SWAYS IN BALANCE, IS REPORTED

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Further negotiations between the Chinese Government and the bandit leaders in Shantung are "futile," unless there is foreign representation on the Chinese government delegation, it is the opinion of observers, as reported to the state department today.

Dispatches suggested that Roy Anderson, American, of long residence and intimate association with both factions might be chosen to negotiate with the brigands and provided with plenipotentiary powers. Otherwise the only hope of early relief of prisoners is by direct foreign negotiations.

PEKING, May 21.—Reports that troops were firing on Shantung bandits were received by the diplomatic corps here today. A new note was immediately drafted and forwarded to the foreign office asking the Chinese government how it reconciled its promises to procure the release of foreign captives and the events transpiring since that assurance.

It is not denied that the situation is growing more acute. In the meantime, the fate of the foreign captives ways in the balance. There is nothing upon which to predicate the final outcome.

Presbyterians Do Big Foreign Work

INDIANAPOLIS, May 21.—Dr. Henry B. Master of Philadelphia today reported to the Presbyterian General assembly as American secretary of the alliance of reformed churches, two departments of its work are now throughout the world holding the Presbyterian system.

After reviewing what has been accomplished in the sending of clothing and shoes to Europe, and fixing approximately at \$42,300,000 the sum sent abroad by the constituent churches, the report, referring to enlarging the field of evangelization says in part:

"More than half of the 100,000 of our brethren in Russia live along the Volga River in southeastern Russia, where the famine is worst. And now another fact is beginning to loom in Europe—that there is a great movement in European Russia, east and southeast of Moscow, reaching to the Ural mountains, where hundreds of thousands who have left the Greek church have formed themselves into congregations called Presbyterian, because they have elders. If they need help, shall we refuse to help them? More than this, we cannot say at present, we must wait for the developments of God's providence. But we ought to pray for them as they struggle to the light."

Baptists Helped 900 Aged Pastors

KANSAS CITY.—Although relief and annuity board of the Southern Baptist convention is only five years old, the combined assets of the two departments of its work are now in excess of \$1,500,000, according to the annual report presented to the Southern Baptist convention here by Dr. William Lunsford of Dallas, Texas, corresponding secretary. A part of this increase is due to the rapid advance in the value of certain securities given to the board by Joan D. Rockefeller, Sr.

Over 900 aged ministers and their dependent ones have been aided by the board during the last year, the report shows. Secretary Lunsford recommended to the convention that plans be projected at once to provide for a fixed income of \$100,000 a year to be applied to relief work, in addition to the regular annual receipts from the various states of the convention. Other recommendations provide that as soon as the \$75,000,000 campaign has been completed in December, 1924, the convention shall give itself to the task of providing \$2,500,000 additional resources for the board in accordance with the original purposes of providing the board \$2,500,000 additional resources for it will enable the board to use the interest from at least \$2,000,000 to be applied to relief each year.

"From Hell to Ball Room" Vividly Painted by "Black Billy Sunday"

"From Ball Room to Hell," was the subject of the sermon of C. V. Dixon, colored evangelist, at a revival meeting last night in Forbes and Morton's warehouse. The seating capacity was taxed and overflow lined the walls of the building. The reservation set aside for white people was completely filled, and many were compelled to stand.

"Black Billy Sunday," as he has been called by the press, painted a vivid, colorful picture of the fall of Babylon. He graphically described the tragic end of that orgy of debauchery, and how God had brought down punishment upon that multitude of sinners and blasphemers. Bringing that lesson of the wrath of God down to present times, he emphasized; that

unless the tendency to live better and righteous lives becomes more marked that similar visitation might well be expected.

The evangelist has a keen sense of humor interspersed his sermon with sharp shafts of wit that found response among the audience.

At the meeting tonight at 7:45, he will preach on "Prayer Meeting in Hell." A special musical program has been arranged consisting of solos, duets and congregational singing.

Rev. Shaw, pastor of the A. M. E. Zion church, under whose auspices the revival is being conducted, announced today that ample provision would be made to seat the constantly increase attendance of both white and colored.

Superior Court to Hear Civil Suits

The May term of the Pitt county superior court to hear civil suits convened today. Judge H. A. Grady, is presiding. It is understood the two suits of outstanding importance will be heard, and the docket is expected to be cleared in a few days.

Last week announcement was made that several new members had been added to the faculty in order to widen the sphere of instruction of the present student body. The big building program is on and with the early completion of the railroad spur to expedite the delivery of materials, building operations will begin on new structures and completing additions to others.

The College is a growing and valuable institution, and while Dr. Wright, is appreciated and loved as an educator by all Greenville, his astounding dynamic force as a builder is possibly not so well known. His extreme modesty for claiming credit, or any part of it for the big things that he has done, has stood as barrier between this side of the man and the public.

His whole life is centered in the thought and determination of giving to North Carolina more and better teachers, that the present and succeeding generations may have the benefit of higher education. That has been the compelling purpose that has spurred him on to make the East Carolina Teachers College all that he planned and dreamed for it. It is needless to say that he was the dominant figure behind the movement that resulted in the state appropriating more than a million dollars to enlarge the institution to meet its growing requirements.

Few know that he has covered hundreds of miles within two or three days, attending conferences, searching for instructors that must meet his standard; often losing an entire night's rest to fill appointments, then back at his desk and dispose of a huge accumulation of work, that a less courageous man would regard with despair.

Dr. Wright is the big human dynamic

generator of the College. All "transmission lines" after completing a circuit, lead directly back to him. In brief, he is a big man, doing big things — UNSELFISH THINGS—for all of North Carolina.

He is not only a valuable acquisition to Greenville, but a brilliant star in the firmament of society at large.

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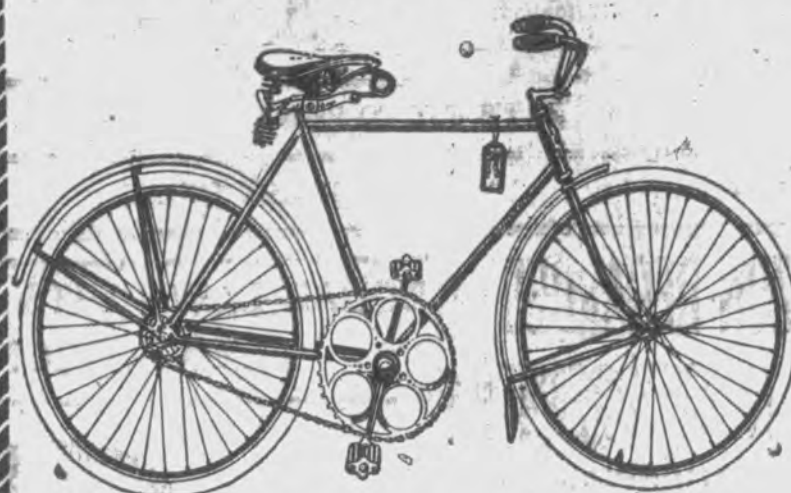

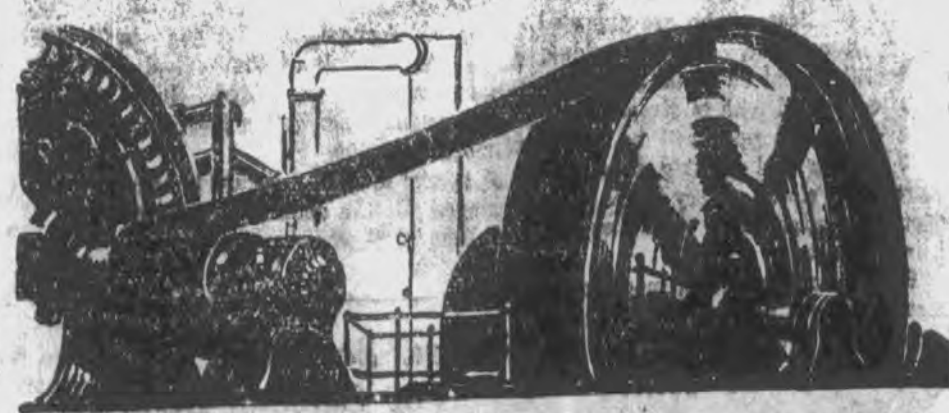

Sea Storms Breed South Cape Verde

WASHINGTON.—The lair of the wild West Indian hurricane at last has been tracked down. C. L. Mitchell, meteorologist of the United States Weather Bureau, after a year's work, has announced that the Atlantic Ocean just south of the Cape Verde Islands is the breeding place of cyclones in August and September, while the west section of the Caribbean Sea has that honor during the rest of the storm season.

In a study of 235 storms of hurricane intensity during the last 36 years it was found that all occurred between May and December.

Reports of the origin of hurricanes in the eastern two-thirds of the Caribbean were disproved, and the effect of the eddies upon cyclonic disturbances were disclosed.

World Population 1,804,187,631, Said

BERLIN.—Scattered over the face of the earth is a total population of 1,804,187,631, only seven percent of which is in cities of more than 100,000 inhabitants, according to statistics compiled here and based largely on 1922 census reports. Only 30 of the 70 nations listed have cities of or above the 100,000 class, which is the lowest counted within the classification of "large cities."

Approximately 40,000,000 of the globe's inhabitants live in the 18 centers having a million residents or more each. About 90,000,000 live in the smaller large cities, of which there are only 393 in the whole world. The average large city is said to number some 320,000 souls. From these figures, it is stated, every forty-fifth human resides in cities housing millions, while every fourteenth finds his home in a large city of some sort. New York is given as the largest city in the world, with a population of 5,262,048. London is second with 4,483,240, and Berlin third with 3,803,770.

Says Women Waste Shoes

CHICAGO.—Extravagance in footwear among women is more than a tradition, it's a fact, says the Salvation army. A glance at the piles of shoes at the Salvation army industrial home for men here will prove it, army officials say. Adjutant Arthur Fynn says that for every pair of men's shoes donated to the army, twenty-five feminine pairs are received.

Build Efficient Homes, Little Cost

AMSTERDAM.—Confronted with a housing shortage after the war, Holland undertook to remedy the situation with three fundamental ideas in mind, efficiency, economy and beauty.

The government gave subsidies. At first these were \$1,000.00 a house; today with building material cheaper the rate is \$125.00. No people are able to make money go as far as are the Dutch, even when it is public money. Jobbery seems to be practically unknown — on anything approaching the American scale, at all events. But although the work has been done economically, Amsterdam has been transformed.

The old Amsterdam with its picturesque and narrow streets and lanes, its narrow canals in the city and its larger surrounding canals is spreading out into new suburbs with wide roads and fine avenues and parks. Holland's best architects are co-operating with the town council to build the best houses at the lowest possible cost.

Engineers to Meet

NEW YORK.—Engineers of the United States and Canada will meet in Montreal May 28-31, at the spring convention of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, planned as one of the principal engineering gatherings of the year in the Dominion. A series of forums, embracing power, textiles, port development, management, flying, roads, fuel and international relations, will be held at the national headquarters of the society in this city.

DELICATE INSTRUMENTS NEED QUIET COUNTRY SURROUNDINGS

PARIS.—The international time of day is sent out twice a day from the Paris Observatory, located not far from the Latin quarter. But the noises of the city are so great, and the vibrations from street traffic so noticeable that the requisite accuracy is becoming impossible and the director of the institution says he must move his instruments to the peace and quiet of the country.

OFFICIALS INVITED TO ATTEND GETTYSBURG ANNIVERSARY

GETTYSBURG, Pa. — Vice-president Coolidge, Secretary of State Charles E. Hughes, Secretary of War Weeks and United States Senator George Wharton Pepper of Pennsylvania, have been invited by members of the Corps of Skelly Post, Grand Army of the Republic of Gettysburg, to join them in celebrating the sixtieth anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg here on July 3 the last day of the conflict between the armies of the North and South.

Danzig Reports Prosperity

DANZIG.—Unlimited freedom of trade and a favorable geographical location are spelling prosperity for the Free State of Danzig, says the first annual report of the Danzig Credit Bank. This institution, founded 15 months ago, already records a total turnover of 64,500,000,000 German marks and a net profit of 48,400,000, out of which a 40 percent dividend has been declared.

Ask Government Aid

LONDON.—"Unless government help come quickly many of the fishing companies of England will be ruined," is the opinion of the president of a big steam trawler company who is clamoring for protection. He says it no longer pays to run British trawlers because of the competition of German and Danish trawlers.

U. S. SMOKED 173,317,000

PHILIPPINE CIGARS IN 1922

MANILA.—Total exports of tobacco from the Philippine Islands during the year 1922 amounted to \$8,670,000 compared with \$8,232,000 in 1921, according to figures obtained from the bureau of customs. The great bulk of the tobacco exports were in the form of cigars, which numbered 390,484,824, and were valued at \$5,800,000. Of the cigar exports, the United States took 173,317,045, or more than fifty percent of the total.

Exchange Welcomes Woman

THE HAGUE.—For the first time a woman has appeared on the floor of the Amsterdam Stock Exchange. She is Miss H. W. D. terding, representing an Amsterdam firm of stock brokers. When she made her initial appearance the members of the exchange gave three cheers and presented her with a hug bouquet.

14,000,000 War Medals

LONDON.—More than 14,000,000 medals have been awarded by the British government to men and women who served the country with distinction during the Great War. The total length of ribbon on these medals would extend 1800 miles.
