SEE PROSPECT OF
SAVING CAPTIVES
FROM EXECUTIONZero Hour Strikes; Not
Believed the Chinese
Slayed Foreigners

SHANGHAI, May 22.—The zero hour of the Suchow bandits has passed and no announcement has been received from the brigands stronghold of any executions. Government troops are withdrawing as desperadoes demanded.

TIENSIN, May 22.—The latest advices from Thao-Chawang today confirmed the complete deadlock reported in negotiations conducted by the Peking government in effort obtain the release of foreigners held by bandits in the Shantung mountains. The conditions under which several foreign captives were held at summit of Paotzuka mountain were described as horrible.

Reports Not Confirmed

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The state department received no additional advices today, with respect to earlier advices that the bandits intended to kill two of their prisoners if their terms were not complied with by the time specified.

Dispatches from Consul Davis and Major Wharton, relayed by the Peking legation, expressed the opinion, however, that the negotiations with the brigands would be futile unless there was at least unofficial foreign intervention in the conversations. They reported that Roy Anderson, an American of long residence in China and with personal acquaintance with some of the bandits, had volunteered to join with the Chinese authorities in new efforts to reach an agreement, provided he was clothed with full power to act by the Chinese government.

Problems Separate

Lacking such a development, it was the opinion of the American observers that there remained only a resort to direct negotiations by the foreign governments, presumably through the agency of the diplomatic council and the brigand leaders, a situation which the Peking diplomats have thus far sought to avoid. At the state department, it was emphasized that the immediate question of obtaining the release of the captives and the future of insuring foreigners in China against similar outrages, hereafter are regarded as distinct and separate problems.

Socialists Want U. S.
to Recognize Mexico

NEW YORK, May 22.—The socialist party in annual convention here adopted a resolution here today, demanding the United States recognize the present government in Mexico. Another resolution protested against the imprisonment of 40,000 socialists in soviet Russia, and requested the soviets to abandon its policy of "persecuting" persons who hold political views at variance with those of the government.

Amnesty for all political federal prisoners was demanded in another resolution.

Gorman Operate Warehouse
As Independent, This Season

J. N. Gorman, widely known tobaccoist, announced today on his return from Richmond where he conferred with officials of the Co-operative Marketing association, that future control of his warehouse here had been by common consent cancelled. Greece to Fight
Before Granting
Terms of Turkey

LAUSANNE, May 22.—If Turkey insists on war to settle the question of the indemnity she claims is due from Greece, then Greece will accept the gage of battle, M. Alexandris, the Greek foreign minister told the foreign correspondents tonight.

The Greek delegation, he added, will be withdrawn from the Near East conference this week if Turkey persists in her reparation demands.

The Turks have given no indication of an intention to recede from their reparation demand and M. Alexandris' declaration that Greece was resolved not to pay one cent of indemnity, brought increased pessimism in conference circles.

The Greek foreign minister denied that he had come to Lausanne in a bellicose mood, but said the Greek army had been re-organized since the overthrow of Constantine and was now well equipped and armed and able to take care of itself.

"I think," he said, "if the worst comes to the worst the Greek army will be able to defend its honor."

M. Alexandris added that he would like the American people to realize Greece's position, especially that, although Greece had numerous provocations which would reasonably justify her in re-opening war with Turkey she had ignored them all because she was sincerely desirous of peace.

Crime in England
Wanes, Say Experts

LONDON.—Less drunkenness, more burglars arrested a big drop in minor cases, more suicides 35 double tragedies, and British prisons not so full, are some of the outstanding features of the crime statistics for 1921, which have just been made public.

During 1921 cases of drunkenness totalled 81,383 against 98,606 in 1920 and 204,038 in 1913. Offences of violence declined to 966 in 1921 from 1,107 in the previous year. The decrease in the number of cases for offences of a less serious character says the report, confirm the impression that poverty and distress were potent influences in determining the number of crimes and offenses during the year.

England Builds Two
Super-Power Planes

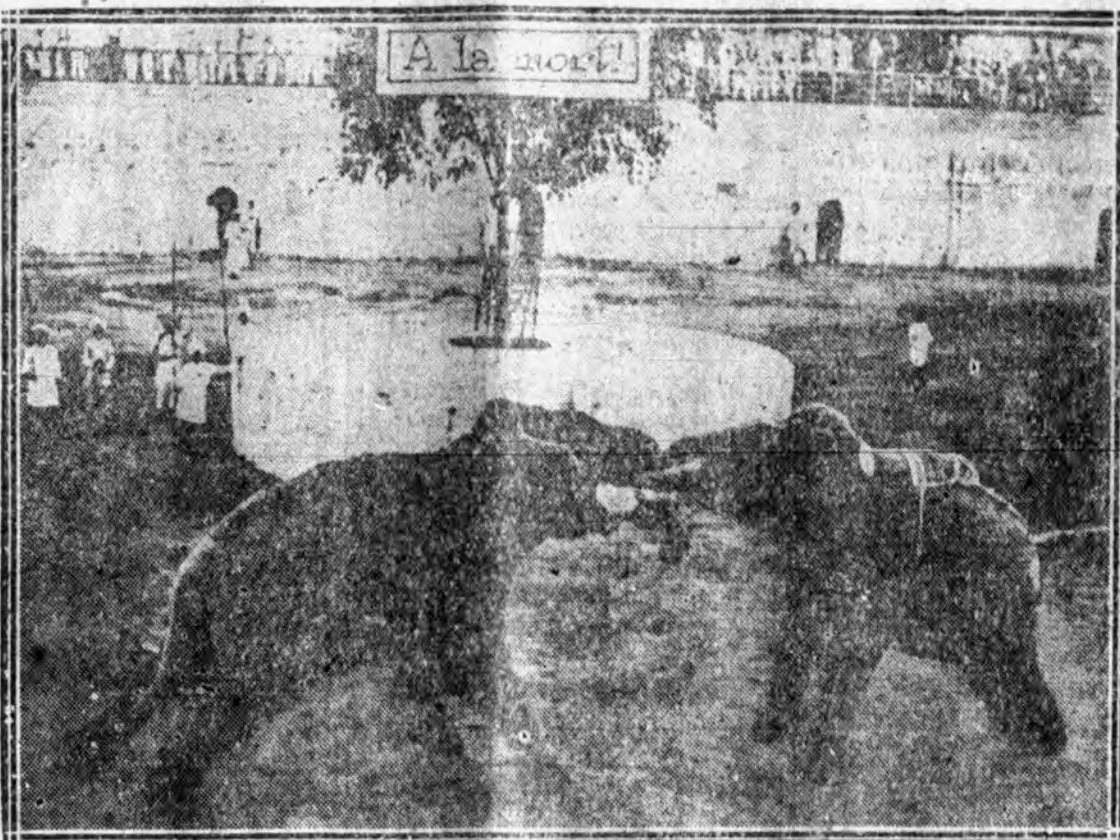
London.—Great Britain is building a super-airplane of 600 horsepower which will attempt to break the world's speed record this summer. It will be capable of a speed of 250 miles an hour, and will take part in the Aerial Derby and the race around Britain for the King's Cup. Later it will go to France and contend for the Gordon Bennett Cup. It will be christened Mars XIV.

At the same time British designers are completing one of the largest flying-boats in the world. It is fitted with four engines of a combined horsepower of 2,800. The new flying boat has a hull of triple thickness and is capable of cruising as a surface craft for long distances.

Dies at Raleigh Home

RALEIGH, MAY 22.—JUSTICE PLATT WALKER, OF THE NORTH CAROLINA SUPREME COURT, DIED AT HIS HOME HERE TODAY, AFTER AN ILLNESS OF ONE WEEK FROM KIDNEY COMPLICATIONS.

JUSTICE WALKER, COMPLAINING OF FEELING UNWELL FOR THE LAST TWO WEEKS OR MORE, HOWEVER, HIS CONDITION WAS NOT REGARDED SERIOUS UNTIL A FEW DAYS AGO. HIS DEATH WAS EXPECTED FOR THE LAST 24 HOURS.

In many quarters the appointment of the chancellor of the exchequer came as a surprise, as it was more generally believed that the robe would fall to Marquis Curzon. It is understood that Baldwin is ready to assume his new duties at once.

Find Murder Ring
in Mexico, Uncover
Over Score Bodies

MEXICO CITY, May 22.—Newspaper dispatches from Nueve Laredo, say 32 bodies that are believed to be those of Italians and other persons of foreign birth who have been robbed and murdered while attempting to enter the United States illegally. The bodies were recovered from the waters of the Rio Grande river in the vicinity of Laredo, Tex., on the Mexican side of the river.

Investigation is under way at Monterey, dispatches said, to determine the truth of the charges that members of a family there have been murdering and robbing foreigners whom they inveigled into attempting clandestine entrance into the United States.

SEES 100 PER CENT
BONE DRY NATION

INDIANAPOLIS, May 22.—Dr. Charles Scanlon of Pittsburgh, general secretary of the Presbyterian Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare, today presented the 42nd annual report of his board to the Presbyterian General Assembly. In turning the board's affairs over to the new Board of Christian Education Dr. Scanlon said that prohibition was an unfinished task. He said it would not be fully enforced until we elected officials who had courage, inclination and ability to do what they were paid and sworn to do. "When we have 100 per cent patriots," declared the speaker, "we shall have 100 percent prohibition."

Dr. Scanlon said that financially the government was nearly \$5,000,000 ahead of expenses, in fines exacted and property confiscated. He charged that what Spain had done to Iceland, threatened to boycott the fisheries unless Spanish wines were admitted, was not commerce but blackmail. He denounced "the aggressiveness, insolence, imperiousness and practical piracy of the liquor brigands just off our sea coast," and said that the United States "should, can and must find a way to prevent foreign conspirators from doing what she has forbidden her own citizens to do."

2 Killed; 2 Injured
In Gun Street Battle

JERSEY CITY, N. J., May 22.—Two policemen were shot to death and two others wounded in a gun battle today when they tried to arrest Frank Sayes, holdup suspect at his residence here. Sayes and a woman companion were caught finally by the police reserves after being driven from the house with gas bombs.

It was largely through his suggestions and advice that terms for refunding the British debt to the United States were agreed upon. He made a splendid impression here among the leading men in public and business life.

Interest in Military
Camp at Ft. Bragg

FORT BRAGG N. C., May 22.—Applications for attendance at the Citizens Military Training Camp, which is to be held here during the month of August, are coming in at a slow rate of speed, according to Lieut. Frederick E. Coyne Jr. Recreation Officer of the Post. Lieut. Coyne was a visitor in Greenville last summer in the interest of the training camps at that time and spoke to local audiences on the subject.

It is recollected that just about one year ago the State of North Carolina was trailing in the race for applicants, and her plight helped to keep the Fourth Corps Area from being among the leaders in the Nation sponsoring the great Citizens Military Training Camps movement. After a rousing campaign of publicity throughout the old North State, applications came in like snowdrifts and the State "went over the top," the Corps taking the lead in the National race.

A this time according to the officer, North Carolina stands next to last on the list of eight states included with in the Fourth Corps Area. Louisiana, Georgia, Florida and Mississippi are bunched in a neck and neck race for top honors.

LABOR AGENT FINED.
PETERSBURG, Va., May 22.—Edward Karabinus was fined one thousand dollars in police court here today on a charge of soliciting laborers for an outside concern without license. The fine was the minimum under a city ordinance requiring all labor agents operating here to take out a license, the cost of which is \$1,000. Karabinus who said he represented a cement company at Stewardville, N. J., was arrested at the local railroad station with about 25 negroes whom he was sending north.

THE "JINX" STILL PURSUES BRYAN

The most ardent admirers of William Jennings Bryan, cannot deny that he is the most defeated candidate for office in our history. However, it also must be said he is a good loser and accepts defeat graciously. It is apparent Mr. Bryan cannot shake-off the "jinx," as evidenced by his defeat for the office of Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church at Indianapolis.

It would be interesting to know what it was that beat him. We will in time. Could it have been the monkey issue which he has been agitating for some time have proved his undoing? In any event, the vote of 451 to 427, it is evident by the small margin, if his anti-Darwinism had anything to do with it, he was not without supporters in the Assembly.

Be that as it will, he was not daunted by the choice of another. He immediately announced to the Assembly that the chief problem which confronts the Presbyterian and all other churches is the work of reaching of the non-church millions of this country. He advocated an active campaign which should be inaugurated with the purpose of doubling the membership of protestant churches within the next decade.

It would be a glorious thing if everybody in the United States was a sincere member of some religious body, or lived in accordance with the Golden Rule. However, it appears to many honest onlookers that the first problem which confronts the churches is to reach the hearts and lives of thousands who already belong to them nominally.

If all church members were thoroughly

converted and 100 per cent. genuinely religious, the churches would go forth conquering and to conquer.

Nothing could resist them.

KIND OF CANADIANS

It is kind of Canadians to protest against the red tape which has prevented the admission into Canada of armed marines who were to serve as a firing squad at the funeral of a dead comrade. And this protest brings out the gratifying statement that Canadian veterans had been treated with such courtesy in Detroit that "hard-and-fast" rules were waived in their honor.

Bureaucracy is not always insensible to the proprieties. But maybe America, after all, could imitate to advantage the care which Canada exercises over the public use of firearms.

A GLANCE OVER THE POLITICAL MAP

The analyst of present and prospective conditions within the republican ranks will find them even more unpromising for President Harding, if turning from states in which the "organization" is "regular," he surveys the situation in any of the balliwicks of the republican progressives. Wisconsin may at once be ticketed as "hopeless for Harding." The followers of Shipstead in Minnesota and Brookheart in Iowa are as firmly set against Harding as LaFollette's retainers are.
