CHINESE BRIGANDS HOLD IN OBEYANCE THREATS TO SLAY

Advices Say Foreign Captives Given A Short Reprieve

SHANGHAI, May 23.—Relief workers at Thao-Shwang, the nearest point to the stronghold of the Suckow train bandits, today reported the arrival of messengers from the outlaws mountain retreat with the information that the desperadoes had not carried out their death threat against the foreign captives.

The prisoners, it was stated, are in good health except G. D. Musso, Italian lawyer of Shanghai, who has been ill for a number of days.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The Washington government had been without advices from Minister Schurman in Peking for more than 24 hours today when the Cabinet met to devote the entire session to consideration of the plight of the foreigners, including American citizens, held as hostages by Chinese bandits.

In the absence of information as to what course the Peking diplomatic corps had determined upon with relation to undertaking direct negotiations with the bandits for release of the prisoners, the Cabinet approved Secretary Hughes' action in awaiting recommendations from Minister Schurman to guide the course of the Washington government.

Await Further Word.

It was said emphatically at the White House that the administration had full confidence in Mr. Schurman and believed the country was fortunate in having a man of his judgment and experience to represent it on the scene at so critical a time.

While it is recognized, the administration spokesmen said, that to undertake direct negotiations with the bandits through the Peking diplomats would be in effect to waive the question of the responsibility of the Peking government for the safety of foreigners in its territory, there would be no hesitation in following that course in the last resort to get the prisoners out of jeopardy.

NORFOLK SOUTHERN RAILROAD MOVES TO STOP LABOR EXODUS

E. D. Kyle, vice-president of the Norfolk Southern railroad realizing the tremendous loss to farmers and business generally that will follow the lack of labor to harvest the staple crops of the south, in an interview declares that every legal measure should be employed to halt, if possible, the work of labor agents in enticing workers from the farms to the industrial centers, under the promise of inflated wages.

Agents of his company, Kyle says, have been instructed to co-operate in curtailing this movement by maintaining a sharp look out and to see that law officers are notified of any apparent irregularity in inducing laborers, to leave the south under the alluring inducements offered by labor agents.

Will Maintain U. S. Reserve Discount Rates, Says Board

Washington, May 23.—Federal reserve rates will be maintained at their uniform level of 4 1-2 per cent, because of satisfactory business conditions throughout the country, it was announced at the conclusion of the meeting of the board's advisory council.

Members of the council as well as the Reserve Board maintained strict secrecy regarding the council's discussion and, aside from the announcement relative to discount rates, nothing official was forthcoming. It was known, however, the two days' discussion had included every phase of the economic conditions obtaining throughout the country, together with the question of extending Federal Reserve banking activities into foreign lands and the proposition of abolishing the present list of services performed free by the reserve banks.

INTERNAL SITUATION IS PUZZLING



With Premier Nikolai Lenin in a critical condition, unlikely ever to recover, the political situation there is puzzling. One report has it that Leon Trotsky, who, who used to edit a little revolutionary paper in New York and who is now Minister of War, will assume a military dictatorship of the country, while another declares that M. Leo Kamenoff, Lenin's right-hand man and President of the Council of Ministers, already has been selected to take over the government.

GERMAN POLICE AND MINERS CLASH; SEVERAL ARE KILLED

DUSSELDORF, May 23.—Rioting is in progress in the Dortmund district. Several miners have been killed and others wounded in conflict with police.

According to reports reaching French headquarters here today, 30,000 striking miners held a demonstration in the public square in Dortmund and the police in endeavoring to disperse the gathering fired into the crowd killing several persons and seriously wounding many others.

The infuriated crowd attacked the police. Some were wounded. A similar demonstration occurred at the Schurhorst mine recently when several workmen were killed and others wounded by police.

Ku Klux Methods Scored by Judge Connor in Court

RALEIGH, May 23.—Defining secret political societies, prohibited by the constitution, so as to leave no doubt in the minds of his hearers that the Ku Klux Klan was included in the definition but not mentioning that organization by name, United States Judge Henry Groves Connor warned citizens against affiliation with any organization which draws a distinction among other citizens, "whether they be white or black, Jew or Gentile, Catholic or Protestant."

Declaring that nine-tenths of the menace to the integrity, perpetuity and welfare of our form of government arises from organizations which aim at "group government," Judge Connor took occasion to express his views concerning "secret orders, societies, clubs leagues, or organizations by whatever name known which seek to regulate the political rights of citizens."

Boost Cotton By "Endless Chain" System, His Plan

ORANGEBURG, S. C., May 23.—"A gigantic cotton movement through the South is to be pushed by the American Cotton association in an effort to remove cotton from the market and to put its price where cotton farmers of the South can make a legitimate profit," declared J. Skotow, Wanamaker president of the American Cotton association, in an address here before the Orangeburg Rotary Club.

The plan as outlined by Wanamaker, involves the buying of bales of cotton by individuals, clubs and corporations, the cotton to be stored in warehouses and the certificates and trust receipts placed in banks with the conditions that the cotton is not to be sold within a period (1, 2, or 3) years, unless cotton goes up to fifty cents per pound before the time agreed upon.

Wanamaker urged in his address that every individual start an "endless chain" of pledges to store the cotton until the fifty cents per pound price was realized.

"The world is facing an acute cotton famine," said Wanamaker.

Venizelos Cannot Predict Result of Indemnity Dispute

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 23.—The Turkish government today formally called attention to the fact that the Greek fleet is cruising about the entrance of the Dardanelles. Rumors of the war activities on the part of the Greeks is causing much uneasiness here.

LAUSANNE, May 23.—No compromise to the deadlock on the question of Turko-Greek reparations was found today at the Near East Conference. M. Venizelos, head of the Greek delegation, spent a feverish day consulting with various conference leaders, discussing ways and means in an endeavor to ameliorate the situation.

Tired but smiling, Venizelos emerged from the hotel. He was immediately surrounded by a group of newspaper men who desired to know the trend of affairs. A young Turkish correspondent asked the former Prime Minister if he was optimistic or pessimistic.

"The two knots in a handkerchief," Venizelos replied. "One represents your pocket and pull it out quickly Mr. Optimism and the other Mr. Pessimism. Put the handkerchief back in and see which knot comes out first. That is the only answer I can give you, for, alas, I know no answer to this conundrum. Perhaps the Greek Gods will decide."

Ismet Pasha, chief delegate of the Turks and the hero of many battles, added another touch to the comedy by sending down a message from his apartment where he still remains in solitary confinement, owing to the request of the Swiss police, who fear an attempt to assassinate him by mysterious Armenians who are supposed to have reached Lausanne incognito. Martial law reigns at Ismet's hotel. Every stranger entering the hotel is viewed with the utmost suspicion.

SOCIAL WORK AID TO ADVANCEMENT

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Social interpretation through the scientific journal will help social workers to overcome difficulties and objections and to develop the newer ideals and plans of a growing profession, according to Howard W. Odum, Chapel Hill, N. C., Editor of the Journal of Social Forces, who delivered an address here today at a group meeting of the National Conference of Social work on the topic "Printers' Ink and Social Interpretation."

"Social work is now entering upon new reaches and meeting new challenges," said Odum. "The history of progress in public health and public education in government, and in economic and social programs indicates an important function of the academic and scientific journal. The presentation of scientific information in each of these fields has been a forerunner of the desire for more knowledge, the means and methods for obtaining this knowledge, and the plans and active programs for the utilization of this knowledge for the common good. To those who have been sceptical or prejudiced the word of science has often proved convincing where other evidence did not avail. And in many spheres of political, economic and social progress the academic question has preceded social action."

TRENTON, N. J., May 23.—Jess Willard will be permitted to box in New Jersey if he passes the physical examination set up by the boxing commission, Newton Bugbee state director of boxing announced today, when asked for his attitude on the proposed match between Willard and Luis Firpo.

14 Dead In Movie Fire, Town Swept By Blaze; Money Loss 5 Millions

MEXICALI, Lower Calif., May 23.—Fourteen persons are known to have been killed and more than three blocks of buildings were destroyed by fire last night, which started in the operating room of a motion picture house here.

The property loss is placed at approximately \$5,000,000. Thousands are homeless. While only 14 bodies have been recovered officials believe that at least 20 were killed, while some place the number of dead as much higher. It is believed as the work of searching the ruins proceeds that other bodies will be found. Many Chinese are believed to have been caught in cellars and sub-cellars where they had gone to escape the heat.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., According to special dispatch to a local newspaper here from Mexicali, it is stated that 150 Chinese were missing after the fire. All the property destroyed was covered by insurance, the dispatch said.

U. S. May Recover Millions Paid Out On War Time Work

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The claim of the Bethlehem Steel corporation for eight and one-half million dollars, alleged to be due under war time contracts was tentatively disapproved today by the shipping board claims committee in a decision which was said to have the approval of the majority of the board.

The decision of the board sets forth new and sweeping interpretation of government contracts which, if sustained, by the courts, will result in the recovery by the government of hundreds of millions of dollars paid out in settlement of emergency construction.

Church Assembly Defeats Bryan's Evolution Plans

INDIANAPOLIS May 23.—William Jennings Bryan was defeated and revolutionists scored a victory today when the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church defeated his resolution to bar schools permitting the teaching of the evolutionary hypothesis from use of church funds.

The fundamentalists under Bryan's leadership, went down fighting in the most bitterly waged struggle the General Assembly has seen, according to church historians; since Charles A. Briggs, of Union Theological Seminary, was unfrocked more than 80 years ago because of his Old Testament criticisms.

BUSINESS NEEDS, PRESENT AND FUTURE

Editor's note. This second of a series of articles on some of the future needs of Pitt county. Mr. J. E. Winslow, who has studied the development of the poultry industry in Kansas and other states reviews the possibilities of what can be done here, and tells HOW.

J. E. Winslow, Business conditions and Greenville and Pitt county's future is a subject of such absorbing interest as to thoroughly inspire every progressive citizen of this town and section. Yielding to the request made I gladly take advantage of the opportunity offered to give expression on so important a subject.

Having given some thought to the subject of poultry and having watched the interest manifested in same since the campaign put on by the Chamber of Commerce and County Agent in January, I am positively intoxicated over the future of the industry in this section.

Praises Hatchery. According to the information I am able to gather, the custom hatchery which was launched in Greenville, for the development of the movement in all parts of the county has assumed such proportions as to be almost unbelievable. When the next hatch is taken off, which will be during the coming few days over 10,000 chicks will have been hatched this season. The 10,000 chicks will represent what has been hatched, but into what could have been hatched. The demand for space has exceeded the capacity each time.

Is this all? No. Since January this year a number of private incubators have been launched in the county, all of which have made a fine record.

Need More Equipment. What do we need now? To properly care for the present and future demands that are being made for incubator space, we need to install additional equipment so as to care for 10,000 eggs at one setting. Then there will be a number of private incubators installed this fall. What will this mean? It simply points to 100,000 chicks being hatched during the coming season through artificial

incubation, to say nothing of the large number that will be hatched by the natural method—with the hen.

What does this mean? It simply points to a 1,000,000 additional laying hens in Pitt county during the next two years. Is this a worthy objective? Does it have anything of promise for the future of general business conditions in Greenville and Pitt county?

There is no reason why Pitt county cannot and should not increase her poultry development during the next ten years as to have at the expiration of that time a revenue of \$3,000,000.

The Way to Do it. How will it be done? Necessarily it will require a lot of work by many hands; constructive suggestions and not adverse criticism; the spirit of "It can be done" and not that of "the task is too great."

How will it be done? By the co-operation of the banks in extending loans to worthy boys and girls, through regular channels, for the purpose of purchasing initial foundation stock.

How will it be done? By the County Agent and Chamber of Commerce getting busy and organizing poultry clubs in every section of the county.

Again, it will be put over by increasing the membership in the Pitt county poultry association. 1,000 members should be enrolled.

Carry Out Program. What about the future of general business conditions in Greenville and Pitt county?

The above program thoroughly permeating our citizenship and with willing hands to join in putting it across, and the future of this section is as bright as the rose that blossoms in the spring time.

We have no room for the pessimist in this section. Problems? Yes, we will always have them, but we will be the masters of the petty things which annoy.

I call on my fellow citizens to give this matter their most earnest consideration, bankers, merchants, farmers, commercial organizations, and when the time for action comes to respond as a unit.

North Carolina is destined to assume a commanding position as the greatest industrial section of the South?
What part will Pitt County play?

MINIMUM WAGE HYPOCRISY
Minimum wage laws were ostensibly designed to insure the payment of adequate wages to the least skilled and efficient workers. Labor leaders and social reformers have preferred to define them as "affording needed protection to defenseless and down-trodden humanity."

The actual effect of the minimum wage laws in this country, whether mandatory or not, has been to rob of their jobs large number of workers who were unskilled, inefficient, old or in poor health, while tending to raise the general level of wages paid to skilled and able-bodied workers. The minimum wage has usually been so high that manufacturers and storekeepers have had no alternative but to discharge the inefficient and decrepit who otherwise might have been provided with easy work at lower, but fair pay. This legalized and enforced inhumanity has simply made more jobs for the skilled workers, and fewer applicants for a given job higher wages have followed as a natural sequence.

Dilettante social workers may be excused for not knowing of this result of such legislation which is in force in several states, but professional reformers and labor leaders have

no such excuse. There is the rankest kind of hypocrisy in exploiting minimum wage legislation for "the protection of humanity" when they must know it to be the cause of much unnecessary suffering and unemployment, and that its only benefit to labor has been in raising the general average wages paid to skilled workers at the expense of those not in that class.

NORFOLK SOUTHERN SOUNDS WARNING

Here is a wide departure from the customary business practice followed by railroad management.

The Norfolk Southern along with others has sensed the danger and loss that will inevitably follow unless the labor exodus from the south is halted. E. D. Kyle, vice-president of that railway, has broadcasted a circular-poster, in which attention is directed to the activities of labor agents, and the laws prescribed for the suppression of their actions.

Agents of the railroad are instructed to call attention to sheriffs and police officials of the counties, towns and cities traversed by its lines to any "unusual movement of laborers or others, so that they might examine and see if the laws are observed."

Mr. Kyle goes on to emphasize there is a wide spread movement "to strip the south, and especially the farms, of its labor. Should the movement succeed it will severely hamper the development of this section of the country and may destroy its prosperity."

The point brought out by Mr. Kyle virtually reiterates what The Reflector has contended when the movement first started. This paper has put forth every effort, and will continue to bring home to laborers that the high wages promised and better living conditions assured in the industrial centers are not permanent.

It is gratifying, however, to see that railroads, or least the Norfolk Southern, is giving its active support in curtailing and knocking on head activities of labor agents whose operations frequently bring them within the law.

PROPER CARE OF RURAL TEACHERS

The pioneer rural teacher "boarded around," sometimes staying two weeks in a place. This was unsatisfactory to the teacher because he was always on the move, and equally unsatisfactory to the patron.

When "boarding around" became impossible or undesirable teachers selected their own rooming and boarding places. Because there is no home for them in many communities of the several states, many teachers are suffering the inconvenience of driving or walking, in some cases miles, to their schools and large numbers change from one district to another at the close of each school year because of poor living conditions.

Happily this situation does not prevail generally. Teachers' homes are now being acquired in many ways. Some have been donated by public spirited citizens. The Virginia community league last year built five for the schools of that state. Some are old school buildings re-modeled, and this appears an excellent way to dispose of old school buildings, after they have been replaced by modern structures, those who ought to know.

Rural education in North Carolina is rapidly gaining an enviable record. The achievement in Pitt County is gratifying, but the surface has not been scratched of what it will be, if the program contemplated by the county board of education and Superintendent Fitzgerald is carried forward.

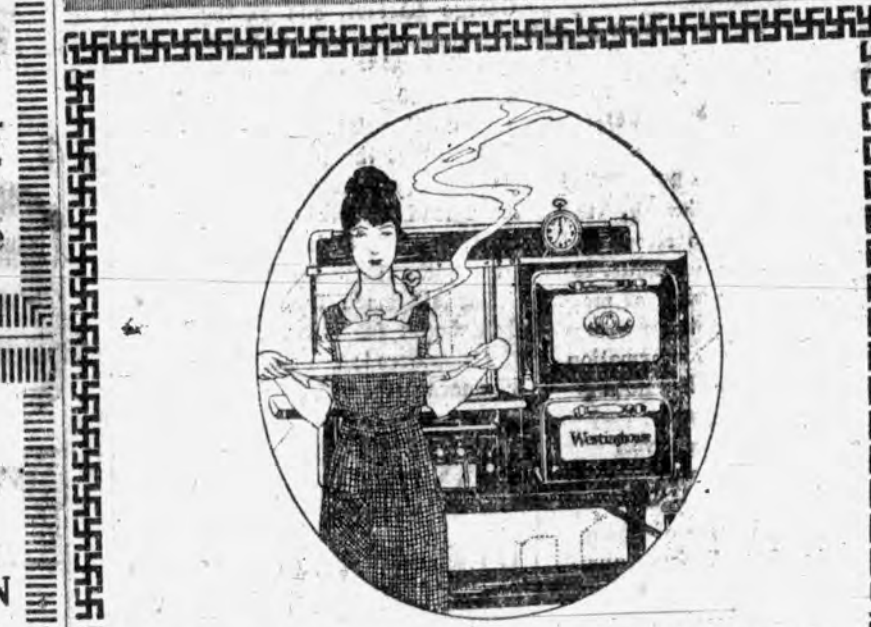

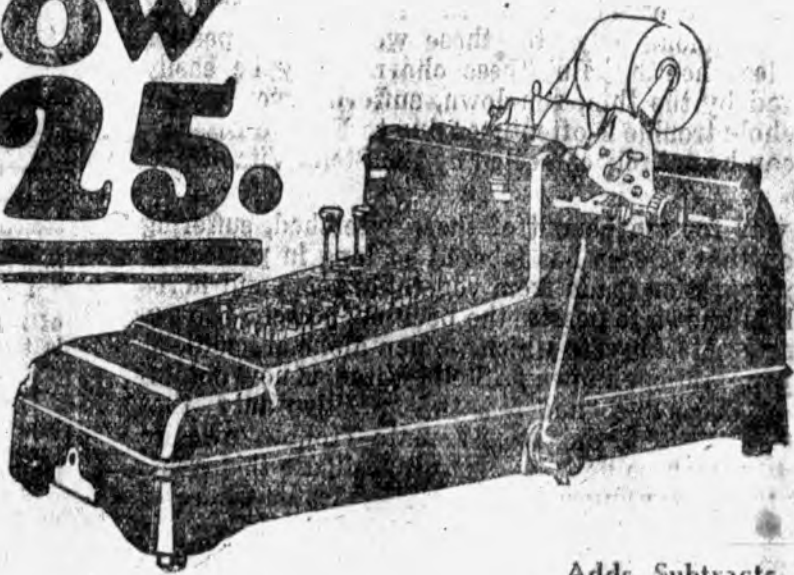
