Scouts to Go to Camp Leach for 10 Days Camping Trip

The Kiwanis Club has very kindly come to the assistance of the boys with a donation sufficient to pay for the use of the camping site, consequently all the expense the boys will have to bear will be the \$7.50 fee to cover the food and cooking expenses.

Alfred Greenville's noted chef, will be in charge of the mess hall.

The members of the troop wish transportation to be provided them, hence are calling on the people of Greenville to furnish their cars to take them to camp. Those who can loan the cars for this purpose should call High School and ask for either Mr. Rose or Mr. Davis.

CHERRY LOSES HIS SUIT FOR DAMAGES

George Cherry, lost his damage suit against the Atlantic Coast Line in the Pitt county Superior court today. The jury returned a verdict for the railroad. An appeal was noted by counsel to the supreme court.

Cherry alleged that he was injured by a moving train of the railroad at the local station in 1909. Last fall when the case was before the superior court it was taken from the jury by the presiding judge. This action was appealed by attorneys for Cherry to the supreme court. It was remanded by the higher court for new trial.

Attorneys James and Son, D. M. Clark and F. C. Harding, represented Cherry. Judge H. W. Whedbee, appeared for the railroad. Judge H. A. Grady heard the case.

Dam Breaks, Town Threatened, Report

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 24.—According to report made to the States marshal here today, Rush creek dam at Pauls Valley, Okla., had broken and a portion of the town was flooded. Telephone communication with the city had been cut off, and four feet of water was in the telephone office.

The way to make a success of salesmanship is first to have something worth selling, and let the world know about it. This applies to selling the advantages of a section of country just as much as it does to selling commodities. Every article that is nationally and internationally known owes its reputation and demand to one single consideration—PUBLICITY. Pitt County is sadly in need of that important factor beyond its own confines.

It is puerile to question the faith of the residents of this county in its soil and other natural conditions that go to make it an outstanding and envied spot throughout the Union. It is also true, that these splendid possibilities are not being developed to their capacity. We need a group of specialists in live stock, poultry, dairying and other diversified lines of agriculture to take the initiative and demonstrate by results just what can be added to our wealth by practical application of scientific and intensive farming methods.

There is a big migration every fall of the year from Iowa, Michigan and the Dakotas to other sections. They are not tenant farmers, but in most cases the younger genera-

tion of pioneer farmers of those states. Many of them are graduates of agricultural colleges and are ready to locate in any section of the country where they believe opportunity is the best. A group of this type of farmers were "sold" on the possibilities last summer in Mississippi and Alabama.

And why did they settle in those states? The answer is, wide-awake citizens appreciated the value of men who would add to the permanent expansion of their communities. They organized, and with a mass of data and pictures went after and invited them to visit their states. The invitation was accepted with the result they located and their presence is already being reflected by the impetus they have given to better farming. They are teaching farmers in the communities where they have settled how to raise stock feed; how to get the best results from poultry; how to begin the basis of purebred live stock through the gradual process of elimination of the scrubs, and other things.

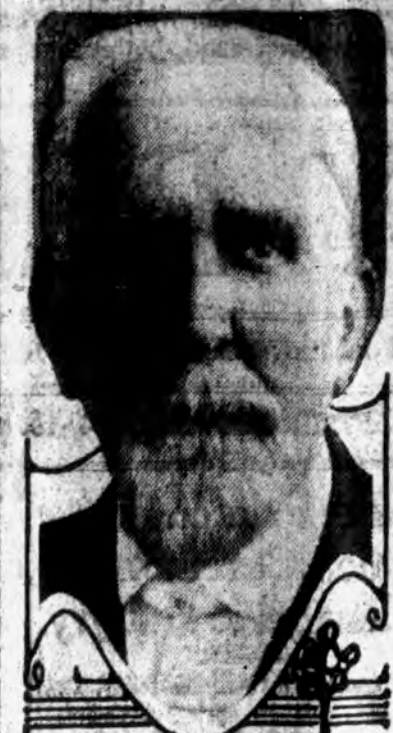

The high cost of deep drilling

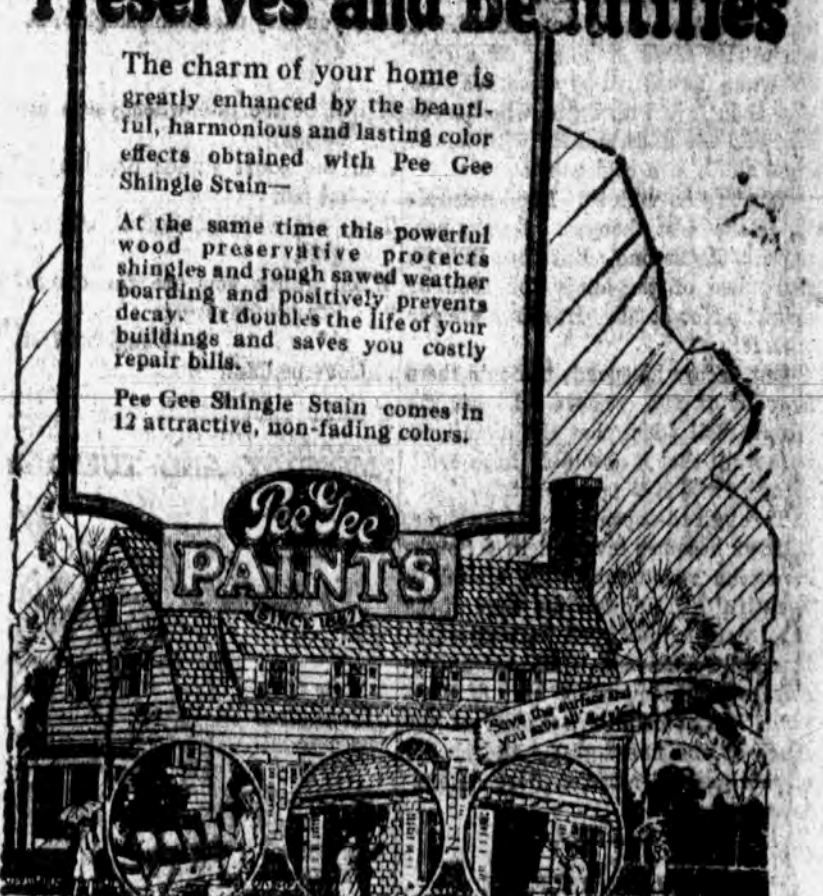
