He has visited western and other states and studied how poultry maintains the cost of family upkeep, and returns from staple crops are "velvet."

He suggests as the initial move to make similar conditions obtain in Pitt County is equipment to care for 10,000 eggs at one setting. Operation of such a hatchery in addition to the output of private incubators means 100,000 chicks hatched through artificial incubation. This does not include the number by the natural method—the hen.

Figured on this basis in two years this county would have ONE MILLION ADDITIONAL LAYING HENS. The returns estimated on these flocks will mount into thousands of dollars. In less than a decade, in any sort of favorable circumstances, the money value would run into MILLIONS. Remember it is SIDE money.

BRIGANDS FIGHTING AMONG OWN RANKS, IS CHINESE BELIEF

Mysterious Firing Gives Color to General Disruption

TIENTSIN, May 25.—Considerable mystery attaches to the heavy firing heard about six miles north of Tsao-Chang, last night in the direction of Uao-tsauka the stronghold of the Suchow train bandits. It is assumed that the brigands may have encountered government troops and are attempting to escape to the hills, or that more bandits have joined the outlaws who are holding foreign captives and combined forces are attempting to break through the government cordon. The most likely theory, however, is that the bandits were fighting among themselves.

SHANGHAI, May 25.—The cordon of troops about the postzuku stronghold today was tightened in all directions. Messengers traveling to and from the outlaw hill retreat have been stopped and troops are engaged in breaking up all the bandits' lines of communication in an effort to isolate the band that is holding the foreigners.

Brigand Chiefs Hopeful.
Chiefs of the brigands are said to be greatly discouraged at the refusal of the diplomatic corps at Peking to deal with them and are reported to be anxious to come to some sort of terms before it is too late to save their own lives.

Such a man is found at La-Fayette Ala., Mr. A. H. Singer asked us if we would like to see a fine Jersey cow? We replied: "Nothing would please us more." So soon we were over in his lot looking at a beautiful cream colored Jersey that, at three years of age is giving four gallons of milk from three teats and leaving the fourth for her remarkable beautiful heifer calf.
Unfounded Complaints.
This cow is of Eminent and Noble of Oakland breeding, and Mr. Singer would not take \$300 for her. Now many of our farmers are complaining that they cannot sell cattle. The trouble is they haven't the class the people are willing to pay for. Our farmers as a rule do not know how to breed good cattle, nor how to feed and care for them so as to develop the best that is in them. You should have seen Mr. Singer's rye patches and clover patches. This cow lacks for nothing. Why should she? She will repay one hundred fold for every consideration given her. We cannot help the farmer who "has not got time to read."
"We cannot help the farmer who is in the all cotton rut—and cannot see on either side—but we can say with confidence and truth, "That any farmer will make money who will keep and raise high class milking cows. We would like to see the day when our small farmers would take more

We do not know : business of greater interest or one of more certain profitable returns Mr. Singer has raised several good cows and has sold them for prices ranging from \$150 up to \$300. The market is never overcrowded with good Jerseys."
The above article expresses my view: so full that I want to call particular attention to the things set forth.
Need of Purebred Stock.
There is a paramount need in Pitt county for pure bred dairy cattle. It is time for the scrub cow to be discarded and have her place taken by pure bred Guernseys, Jerseys or other breeds.
This subject is being prominently taken up by the North Carolina Bankers association, and as a result of their agitation, great strides have been made toward bettering the type of dairy cattle.
The Chamber of Commerce has made a splendid contribution, joined in by the county agricultural agent, in bringing this matter to the attention of the entire county of Pitt. Several cars of dairy cows have come into Pitt county since the active campaign staged by these organizations.
How will the message of pure bred, tuberculin-tested dairy cattle become effective in Pitt county?
I would answer by the banks cooperating in making it possible. Of course the Chamber of Commerce and county agricultural agent should continue to keep the matter clearly before the people and after that is done, the banks can assist in a material way by making it possible for these cows to come to Pitt county.
I believe the earliest moment we, as a group of bankers, realize that a wonderful contribution will have been made to our country—it's health and wealth by our active support of this movement that a new dawn will soon appear for this section.
Does the future look bright for Greenville and Pitt county? With the pure bred dairy cow as our partner yes. I believe that the Pitt county bankers association will concur in this statement and join hands in making it a glorious reality.

Poincare to Continue As Premier, Given Big Ovation

PARIS, May 25.—The entire chamber of deputies with exception of the communists gave Premier Poincare, a great ovation when he entered the chamber today for continuance of the deliberations on the Ruhr question. The communists booed the premier, but this seemed only to increase enthusiasm of the remainder of the deputies. Poincare submitted his resignation as premier together with those of his colleagues in the cabinet to President Millerand yesterday, who declined to accept them. Action of the ministers was the outcome of the refusal of the senate to proceed with the trial of Marcel Cachin and other communists, charged with illegal acts against the French republic.

RUSSIAN NOBLEMAN EXECUTED

MOSCOW, May 25.—Fifteen persons all of the princes, generals or members of Russian nobility have been executed as a result of the alleged discovery of an active counter revolutionary plot in Soviet republic of Georgia, says a dispatch from Tiflis today.
The names of those executed were not given out, but it is declared all were active participants in the movement. It is generally believed in well informed quarters that the Trotsky-Lenin regime has its hands full to suppress from active outbreak a growing sentiment of unrest and hatred against the form of government.

Negro Hits Farmer With Brick When Directed to Work

Giving as an excuse that he would not work the way W. W. Moore, farmer, living about a mile and half west of Greenville, wanted him to, Johnny Johnson colored, struck Moore with a brick this afternoon inflicting a scalp wound between three and four inches. More was treated at the hospital of Drs. Skinner and Smith. Johnson is in jail pending a hearing.
Despite that he was knocked down by the blow Moore quickly recovered and pursued the negro. He was joined by a neighbor and Johnson was overtaken. He was brought to Greenville tied with his hands behind, and his body completely encircled with rope.
Johnson offered no reason for hitting Moore, other than he did not like the way the latter wanted him to do a particular piece of work which provoked the dispute.

Hold Suspect In U. S. Mint Robbery

MONTREAL, May 25.—Detectives arrested on the streets here today, a man believed to be one of the bandits involved in the big Denver mint robbery several months ago. The suspect is being held pending identification by Colorado authorities.

Plan to Curtail Opium Production

GENEVA, May 25.—The American government's plan for complete control of the opium and narcotic trade by limiting the production and tightening the supervision of exports and imports was presented today to the opium advisory committee of the League of Nations, by an American delegation.

"Forty-Niners" Protest Naming Women On Church Committees

MONTREAT, May 25.—Although the General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church in its closing session issued instructions to its executive committee to add immediately not more than three women to the membership of each, the "forty-niners" opposing the recognition of women, left a protest in the records tonight as they departed for home.
Opponents to the placing of women on the committees, thereby giving them a direct voice to the Assembly, went down in defeat yesterday by a vote of 40 to 49, despite the fact the majority report of the committee on bills and overtures supported their contention. The protest was introduced by Dr. R. C. Reed, former moderator, Columbia, S. C., Dr. A. M. Frazer, Staunton, Va.; Dr. W. C. Alexander, Nashville, Tenn., and others, just before the assembly adjourned.

Walk Barefoot to India's Holy Shrine

RANGOON.—The spectacle of wealthy American women removing their silk stockings in the streets of an Oriental city has attracted much attention in Rangoon during recent weeks. The occasion for these crowd-drawing incidents is a rule, enforced since the fall of 1920, prohibiting footwear upon the platform of the Shwe Dagon pagoda, one of the most important Buddhist shrines in Asia.
Although the Burmans themselves have removed their footwear before ascending the pagoda steps, until recent years Europeans have been allowed to visit the pagoda without taking off their shoes. The present ruling made in connection with the nationalist movement, requires the removal of stockings as well as shoes.
Due to the after-war revival of the tourist trade, about 1250 American travelers have visited Rangoon during the last few weeks, and another shipload is expected before the end of the season. Many of these are willing to climb the pagoda hill with bare feet rather than to go away without seeing the Shwe Dagon at close range.

Novel and ridiculous stunts in which Chief of Police Lester Jones and other Greenville men figured the election of Lloyd E. Turnage, Ayden, and L. H. Bowling Greenville, as royal princes of Ziza Temple D. O. K. K. furnished the fun and principal business of the Dokie ceremonial at Ayden yesterday.
The entire program was devoted principally to amusement, but it certainly had a serious side for the candidates who bore the brunt of the fun-making for the whole town.
Chief Jones was given a big broom and told to clean up the place. The way he went at the job was convincing that he is no novice at cleaning up. The admirable manner in which he completed his task won the commendation and plaudits of the gleeful crowd. He is just as much master of the broom as he is in line of official duty—he did the job thoroughly and unhesitatingly.

Carson in Hard Luck.
Be it remembered that H. G. Carson, is the local representative of the Texas Oil company, but he did not utter a word of protest when he was presented with a huge can of the product of the big rival concern—the Standard—and admonished to tell it. He made a brave and gallant effort, but despite repeated price cuts he could not find buyers.
Most everybody knows that H. L. Smith, secretary of the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce, is "sold" on the value of purebred cattle. Whether it was premeditated or coincidence, who can say, but in any event, a large cow bell was attached around his neck. The rest of his uniform consisted of a bungalow apron and sunbonnet, making an altogether good impersonation of a milk maid. With the bell ringing in claxon tones, it was whispered that Smith was trying to lure purebred cattle to Pitt county from the distant fields of the middle west.

Ask Jones, He Knows.
If Pat Foley ever needs work, it can be set down here, that it will be his own fault. As a shoe polisher he excels, if there be skeptics of this assertion, they are referred to Chief Jones. After the latter had finished his task, his ordinarily highly polished black boots were soiled. It was suggested that the official bootblack undertake to clean them. He did this by applying a heavy coat of whitewash.
Duke Morgan, may be a good salesman, but he cannot sell women's hose direct to the wearers. He carried a splendid line of samples, but even his persuasive supplication to the ladies to buy failed to move them. His offer to give them away fell on unresponsive ears.

Craven County Bootleggers Do Large Business In Pitt, Claim

For some time it has been known to county authorities that a great volume of liquor was finding increasing outlet in Pitt county and that it was being peddled, wholesale and retail by Craven county bootleggers.
This belief was confirmed yesterday by Sheriff Amos Jackson and Deputy O. F. Clark, who uncovered several gallons of whiskey together with a number of empty jugs, fruit jars and other receptacles that had contained liquor in a dense thicket about three miles from Greenville.
Word was passed to the officers yesterday at Ayden where they were attending the Dokie ceremonial that whiskey was being openly offered for sale in any quantity desired. Jackson was informed that a group of "artful dodgers" were planting the "moonshine" in the woods adjacent to the old Greenville and Kingston road. The highway was patrolled for practically its entire length and then a search of the undergrowth was instituted which resulted in finding that the traffic was being carried on through a clandestine system.
Sheriff Jackson and Deputy Clark, hid in the vicinity until after nightfall in the hope that either the claimants would appear or additional "plants" would be made by the rum runners.
According to well authenticated reports this band of liquor peddlers extends as far as Wake county. Recently the police of Raleigh confiscated a large quantity of whiskey which they say was brought there from New Bern.
In order to avoid detection, it is said, the band have representatives throughout this district who solicit orders, with the understanding the stuff will be placed in a hidden spot known only to the peddler and the victims.
Pitt county officers will maintain a close lookout, and will exert every effort to stop the operations in this county, or at least curtail it, it was announced by Sheriff Jackson today.

These words spoken by Samuel Adams in 1772, are good words for us to heed today.

There is no better or effective way to serve the common good than assembling together persons representing all branches of life for the interchange of thought and ideas that might be applied in constructive and beneficial development. It conveys a better understanding of our various problems including social and economic.

One of the important purposes of getting together is not so much to find fault because things have been left undone, but to get into our own particular niches, and ask what we have done to help civic development along.

Pitt county is at the threshold of an era of unprecedented advancement. The outlook was never so encouraging for laying the foundation for tremendous expansion as now. All we lack is the get together spirit, weld it along hard and fast lines, and the future is just as big as we care to make it.

ARE WE AS HUMAN AS WE CLAIM?

No thinking person would say that Americans are not, as a whole, kind hearted, in-

dulgent and sympathetic. With prison conditions being brought into the spotlight in Florida—and even our own state—he would be brave who would deny that we are also ostrich-like; we shut our eyes to what is unpleasant and deny that it exists.

As a matter of course, prisons are necessary, society has a right to protect itself against those who break the laws, which all must obey if we are all to be safe and happy.

But flogging prisons, prisons where cruelty is practiced, prison positions which are political rewards for deserving party workers, prisons which make unwise but not bad men into criminals, which make criminals worse, which deform mind and body, are not necessary.

When they exist, the fault is not, primarily, with those who keep and manage them. They are certainly not the fault of the courts that sends men to inhabit them. They can be logically blamed upon those who permit them; upon the electorate, which shuts its eyes to man's inhumanity to man.

Yet we shut our eyes, turn deaf ears, we put our heads in the sand. We wait until torture, murder and other outrages against God and decency find their way into print to rouse us to our neglected duty towards those who, no matter how they sin against society, are still human and therefore still made in God's image.

Crime could be greatly diminished, if the hand of society were more frequently extended to those who have lost hope and are driven to desperation because of the lack of a kind or encouraging word, that might alter the channels of countless thousands.

A little more leveling of the accepted conventions would go a long ways in improving the quality of our social fabric.

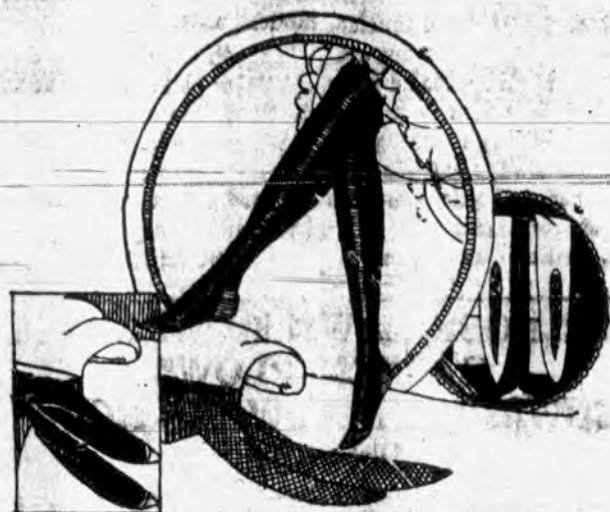

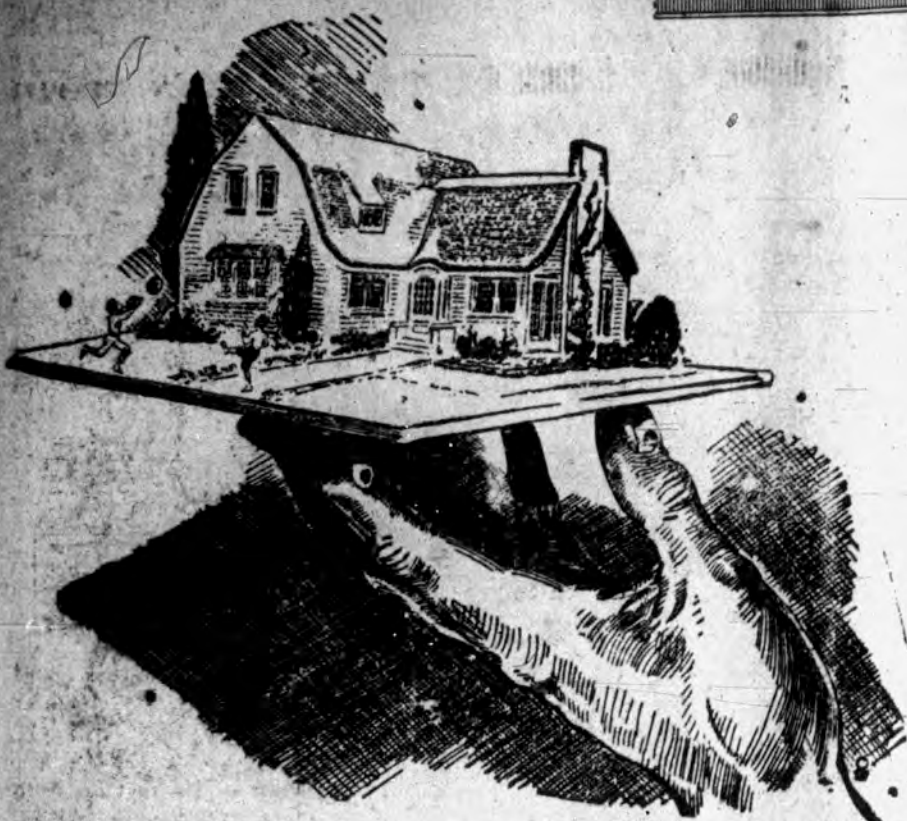

LABOR 36 YEARS ON HEAVENLY MAP

PARIS.—What is regarded here as one of the most interesting and valuable results of modern studies in astronomy is nearing completion in the Paris Observatory after 36 years of pains-taking labor. It is a new map of the catalogue of the stars. The compilation shows that there are approximately 300,000,000 heavenly bodies visible through the powerful telescopes.

Photographing the heavens was a plan first developed by the Paris Observatory and its then director, Admiral Mouchez was called here in 1887 to an international congress of astronomers, which decided to map the heavens. There were 18 nations, including Mexico, Chile, and republics of Argentina and Brazil, which agreed to contribute to this work.

The heavens were subdivided with four French observatories taking the central zones of the heavens.

Ten thousand leaves of the photographic may contain stars to the fourteenth magnitude, whereof there are above twenty millions. Stars to the sixth magnitude may be seen with the naked eye and above that, telescopes and other aids are needed.

In reality, it is explained, the number of stars appear to be infinite. As huge lenses are constructed each increase in the size of the lens reveals a larger number of stars.
