Tanners Organize to
Give Public Better
Grade Leather Goods

NEW YORK, May 26.—Tired of having the public and others "pass the buck" to them upon every complaint of price or quality, tanners of 90 per cent of the sole and belting leather produced in the United States have perfected a national organization, with officers in this city.

They will act as a clearing house for all facts concerning their industry, which is one of the earliest basic ones in America. In addition they will perform some of the functions of a leather "Institute."

The association, known as the American Sole and Belting Leather Tanners, has established headquarters in the Whitehall Building, at 17 Battery Place.

One of the chief functions of the association, according to T. R. Elcock, its president will be to lay before the American public the entire situation that obtains at present in the sole and belting leather fields. This contains, it is said, considerably more dramatic and historic interest than appears on the surface.

TOBACCO CO-OPS ECONOMIC
FALLACY, LUCAS TELLS OPEN
WAREHOUSE MEN AT MEET

The Co-operative system of handling tobacco is an economic fallacy, asserted the present marketing system. Lucas, who declared that it would soon be compelled to retire from the field, W. A. Lucas, Wilson, told a representative gathering of open warehouse men at Wilson yesterday.

Lucas discussed at length the legal aspects of the co-operative marketing contract, at the same time stressing the necessity of individual activity among tobacco warehousemen in their local communities to keep constantly before the farmer the advantages of the auction sale of tobacco.

Lucas called attention to the fact that the co-operative organization is actively engaged in handling tobacco for about four months in the year, while salaries of high priced executives were continued throughout the year, and that eight months of the year were devoted to activities in attempting to strengthen the hold of the plan.

Methods Scaled

Apathy exists among the independents, he declared, partly due to a well defined feeling that eventually the co-operatives will go out of business, because their system cannot be made a success. Another handicap, he said, was lack of organization to keep farmers fully advised of

One of the most extraordinary sociological inquiries ever undertaken is nearing completion in the Bureau of Social Hygiene, in New York, of which Dr. Katherine Bement Davis is general secretary. It has sent questionnaires to thousands of women that, for frankness and intimacy of detail, are breath-taking. Of 1,000 college women interrogated 520 of 691 admitted they had practiced birth control. At least 375 admitted they had spooned, kissed and caressed men before their marriage, but 208 said the only man had been the man they finally married. Of the 1,000 872 said they had made happy marriages.

Steamers Collide,
Serious Disaster
Avoided by Crew

GLASSGOW, May 26.—The steamship Metagma from Glasgow for Quebec and Montreal with 1,100 passengers collided with the British freighter Baron Vernon today. The freighter was seriously damaged and the liner slightly. The collision occurred in the river Clyde. The Baron Vernon was beached near Dunbarton and the Metagma returned to Glasgow with port bow damaged, nine feet above the water line.

Panic and possible loss of life was averted by the crew of the Metagma, who reassured passengers there was no danger.

Dr. R. H. Wright, president of the East Carolina Teachers College, presided at the business session of the gathering. Twenty Greenville Rotarians attended the meeting.

The entertainment program included a barbecue, minstrel show given by the students of the Methodist Orphanage and witnessing a ball game in which Raleigh defeated High Point 8 to 6.

COUNTRY CLUB TO

At a recent meeting of the board of governors it was decided that the new Country Club would be officially opened to members on Thursday, June 7.

PAYS PENALTY SABOTAGE

DUSSELDORF, May 26.—Albert Schlageter, was executed by the French today for sabotage on the railroads in the occupied regions and other offenses.

He was shot in a stone quarry near a cemetery and his body delivered to the cemetery officials. This is the first execution that has taken place in the zone occupied by French troops. Germans are incensed over the action, while they declare that it must be understood that no interference or work of sabotage will be tolerated by the Germans.

How to Make Sweet
Potato Crop Pay

RALEIGH, May 26.—The best soil for sweet potatoes is a light well drained sandy loam with a clay subsoil. This light soil will give plenty of room for the proper growth of the potato and produce one that is readily marketable. The clay subsoil will prevent roots from growing deep into the ground and making a stringy potato. The disease known as scurf is more severe on the dark soils than on light and mars the looks of the crop. These are some of the suggestions about the kind of soil to use for sweet potato growing as recommended by R. F. Payne to the division of horticulture, State College and state department of agriculture.

GET ON THE ARK OF CHRIST
OR SINK, WARNS BLACK BILLY
SUNDAY IN FORCEFUL SERMON

In a sermon that bristled with flashes of brilliant and original thought Forbes and Morton's warehouse was taxed to its seating capacity last night by an audience that heard an extraordinary discourse by C. P. Dixon, colored evangelist, who the press of the country has given the sobriquet "Black Billy Sunday." He spoke on "Come In Out of the Rain," in which he compared Noah's ark to Christ in that unless one did not make reservation now, that no room would be left for those who did not recognize in Jesus, the only salvation to escape the flood of sin and wickedness of modern times. It was generally regarded as one of the best efforts that the evangelist has made since the beginning of the revival.

That the homely but forceful truths enunciated having a wholesome effect is attested by the large number of persons attending his meetings from points throughout the county.

The schedule of services announced for tomorrow promises to be one of the outstanding days of the meetings. The evangelist will speak at 11 a. m. on "People Had a Mind to Work," at 2 p. m. he will lecture to women only and to men only at 3:30 p. m. At 7:45 he will preach on "Vision of the Dry Bone." The latter subject is declared by churchmen, both white and colored who have heard it to be one of the most powerful that the evangelist delivers.

Special music by a massed choir of mixed voices and congregational singing will be a feature. Special reservations are made at every meeting for white people, but in order to insure seating accommodations early attendance is suggested. The revival is being held under the auspices of York A. M. E. Zion church. The Rev. J. S. Shaw is pastor.

RALEIGH, May 26.—Miss Jane Graham Trappier, graduate of St. Marys School and a well known local teacher, has been elected dean of women at the State College summer school Dr. W. A. Withers, the director, announces. Miss Trappier will enter upon her new duties at the opening of the summer term June 12.

Prospects for a large attendance this summer seem to be unusually bright, says Dr. Withers discussing the plans for the term. Already the applications for admission exceed those received at the corresponding period in any year of the summer school's history, but with increased facilities in the college plant the authorities anticipate being able to take care of all who apply.

Two women with baby carriages athwart the sidewalk carrying on an animated conversation. Shabbily dressed man who in some indefinitely was simply radiated prosperity. Three prominent time killers, arguing how they should spend more of their stock in trade. Man in a meat shop buying a 35 cent piece of boiling meat that appeared mostly bone. Six girls of the Teachers College arm in arm, making a raid on a soda fountain.

HERE'S A REAL OPPORTUNITY

The Reflector carried a news story Thursday under a Rotterdam date line stating that Dutch farmers were carrying large numbers of Dutch farmers from that port to settle in the United States, some in Iowa, others at points in the Mississippi Valley.

The story went on to say that many others were expected to sail for this country—possibly thousands within the next few months. It was also emphasized that they were young, successful farmers all financially able to purchase lands and farming equipment. Men-

tion was also made that numerous inquiries were being made of United States consuls in Norway, Holland and Denmark by farmers and dairymen with a view of finding suitable locations here.

Well informed persons know that the farmers of the nations indicated attain higher individual scores over any in the world. They know how to farm, and go about it in scientific way to make the land produce to its capacity. They are just as familiar with what is necessary to build a purebred dairy herd after the most economical and profitable plan. In brief, they know agriculture in its various branches, and know it well.

Withal they are splendid citizens and community builders. Their forebears have had considerable to do with making the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota and the Dakotas what they are today.

It is patent why they are coming to the United States. They realize that intensive farming is virtually in its infancy here. They know that conditions as to product prices and market distribution are better. Again they also know, that the average American farmer is not really alive to what can be added to the national wealth by agriculture.

If Pitt County really wants to go ahead, it might be a good suggestion to let its resources be impressed on prospective settlers through the press of those countries. If briefly put in sharp, convincing manner, undoubtedly a flood of inquiries would follow for additional information.

It would, in any event, blaze the way to interest a group of desirable farmer-citizens in a section of the world that offers every advantage and resource that agriculture is capable of developing.

CHILD CONSERVATION

Conservation is the order of the day.

Considerable attention has been directed in the past to the preservation of national forests, coal, oil and other natural resources, and is as it should be.

But what of our children?

A recent study shows that 200,000 babies die in infancy each year and 20,000 mothers die in childbirth. Thinking persons should pause and reflect.

It is also disclosed that there are millions of school children who are suffering from more or less serious defects, ranging from dental troubles to malnutrition and heart disease. These figures would be startling in any event, but they are the more so when we are told that at least one-half the deaths could be avoided and that proper care would eliminate practically all instances of undernourishment.

In the circumstances, it appears that our duty is plain. It is proposed by educational methods and with the assistance of sincere men and women who have dedicated their lives to the cause, to bring about a change in this order and to concentrate on a child conservation program.

This work should have the moral, and where possible, the active support of the entire country.

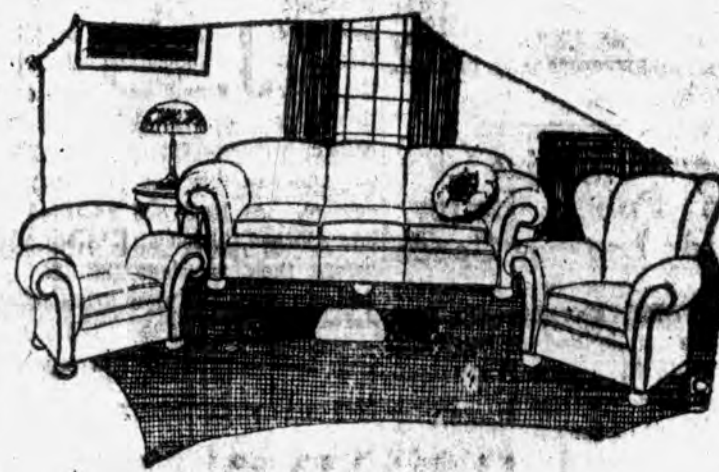

FAMOUS ROSARY IN "BELLA DONNA"

Pola Negri Wears Historic Ornament
in First American-Made
Photoplay.

Carved with a dagger from black ebony and amber, a Mohammedan rosary of authentic origin and color, and "prop" in Pola Negri's first American made Paramount picture, "Bella Donna," which will be on view at White's theatre next Monday, matinee and night.

The rosary is the property of Dudley Stuart Corlett, an Egyptologist who served as technical director during the filming of this Paramount picture. Captain Corlett spent ten years in Egypt, and the rosary was secured by him while in Somaliland.

Representing native workmanship at its best, the rosary was the personal property of a retainer of the infamous "Mad Mullah" of the Abyssinian border. For his participation in one of the "Mad Mullah's" raids on residents of Somaliland, the owner was sentenced to death. On the eve of his execution he presented the rosary to its present owner.

Most Christian people regard the rosary as a distinctly Christian institution, but its origin dates back to the prayer beads of the early Hindu and Buddhist philosophies.

The Mohammedan rosary consists of ninety-nine beads, each representing one of the ninety-nine attributes of God. The hundredth attribute of God is known only to the Imman of Constantinople, official head of the church, and is represented in the rosary by a bead of different color and size.

The rosary worn by Pola Negri in "Bella Donna" consists of the usual number of beads cut by a dagger from ebony, leaving them faceted like a diamond. The hundredth bead is a huge amber, one of beautiful color and fish.

In Ouida Bergere's adaptation of Robert Hichens' story, the rosary plays an important part. George Fitzmaurice directed this picture, and the cast includes Conway Tearle, Conrad Nagel, Lois Wilson, Claude King.
